



Donation debacle

Councillors punted over paperwork deadline

TWO Yorke Peninsula Council elected members have been stood down from their roles after allegedly failing to submit their donation returns on time.

Minister for Local Government Geoff Brock announced 46 councillors from around the state had been embroiled in the issue last Thursday, February 9.

Elected members are required, by

legislation, to lodge gift or donation disclosure returns during and after the local government election.

The second form, at the centre of the controversy, was due on either December 12 or 21, depending on whether the election was uncontested or contested.

A one-month grace period was given, marking the final deadline as either January 12 (uncontested) or 21 (contested).

Affected people can contest the determination through the SA Civil Administrative Tribunal, which can restore individuals to office if satisfied the failure arose from circumstances beyond their control.

If the ousted elected members are unable to have the decision overturned, supplementary elections will be called.

Due to ongoing legal proceedings, a list of those involved has not been released; however, publicly, available

Electoral Commission of South Australia records indicate the date all candidates submitted their returns.

The two YPC members concerned submitted their donations returns on January 18 and 23 respectively.

Both were contacted by the Yorke Peninsula Country Times but declined to comment in order to participate in tribunal hearings today (Tuesday, February 14).

Rural health crisis

IF you were a doctor or nurse, would you choose to move away from your city for a job that is less supported and more demanding?

Would you choose a job in the country that pays far less than you could earn in the city?

Would you move to a town with limited child care and job prospects for partners?

How can we attract and retain quality health staff in our area?

It is going to cost money.

Paying locum doctors and agency nurses to fill the gaping holes in our hospital rosters is not the answer. Those funds could be directed into building a sustainable workforce.

The fragmentation of funding for health care makes this difficult, but if the state government sees this as an important issue it could make some changes.

The financial incentives for nurses in training and general practice registrars who choose to train in the country need to be greater than those in the city to draw them to rural areas.

The state government could bolster the federal Workforce Incentive Program which currently does not incentivise training doctors in their first year of training in our area.

It could create a similar incentive for

nursing and allied health staff to reward longevity in the rural workforce.

Health professionals are leaving rural areas in droves.

Things need to change before we see more local hospitals close and more towns without GPs.

Poor health

AN issue of major concern is the poor quality of care some people receive while a patient at Wallaroo Hospital.

When my husband became a patient there with Covid in January I realised others' accounts of very inadequate treatment were not exaggerated.

Covid is highly contagious and unpleasant if contracted so I can understand the staff's reluctance to be near my husband, but he seemed to be abandoned by many.

I requested to speak to the doctor, and it took six hours for her to come into my husband's room.

When she finally came, she was incredibly rude to me, my husband and the nurses who were with her.

When my son finally brought my husband

out of the hospital, no information was given about how to treat my still very sick husband at home.

Whilst we have experienced very good assistance by the allied health services at Wallaroo, this experience has broken our trust of the hospital section of the complex.

There could be many reasons for the poor service some people are receiving when in the hospital and we feel there needs to be an immediate and thorough investigation into the issues, with steps to bring about long-lasting improvements to the treatment of patients.

Connected foreshore into planning stages

COMMUNITY workshops will be held to help guide the Wallaroo foreshore master plan.

Council is currently asking for comment through an online survey and will host two Hatch Design-led workshops on Friday and Saturday, March 3-4.

Hatch director Corey Brown said the plan would act as a set of parameters to be worked towards over a

period of time.

"We're looking at developing a draft master plan through a workshop, where we can find out what's missing and how we can tighten some areas," Mr Brown said.

"Then, later in the year, we'll seek further community consultation."

The public survey has already received about 130 responses regarding potential development.

"It's clear people enjoy walking along the foreshore, (utilising) accessible beaches, heritage areas and the

uninterrupted views of the coastline," Mr Brown said.

"Other feedback has been people want to see more swimming areas, as well as an improved linear walking trail which gives people the ability to walk from one end (of the foreshore) to the other.

"Outdoor seating, natural shade and landscaped beautification are other high priorities.

"The foreshore is a lot of things for a lot of people... it's important we retain the qualities people like about

the foreshore."

Council director development services Müller Mentz said there was a lot of work to be done along the foreshore.

"A master plan allows us to look at the whole area rather than as individual projects," Mr Mentz said.

"This is about making sure everything ties in well along the foreshore.

"I encourage everyone to fill out the survey, as this is one of the best ways to involve the public."

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said the

foreshore was one of council's most valuable assets.

"We're planning to stagger the works and complete the upgrades in separate parts," Mrs Talbot said.

"Upgrades could include extra shade and improved access to the foreshore.

"Some areas just need a bit of beautification to help show off the wonderful place this is."

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Drain upgrade set to allow road sealing

AN upgrade of the stormwater drainage along Moonta Road, Moonta Bay, has commenced.

Works will include the enlargement and extension of the existing swale drain, situated beneath the median island, which divides the road.

Copper Coast Council director infrastructure services Tim Neumann said vegetation had already been cleared ahead of the project's first stage.

"The upgrade consists of enlarging the existing swale drain along Moonta Road from Marine Parade to Chapman Road and extending the swale drain from Chapman Road to East Terrace," Mr Neumann said.

"Phase 1 will be (enlarging the drain) from Marine Parade to Coast Road.

"Culvert upgrades are also to be installed at each road crossing which could cause some road closures at the crossings.

"Extending the drain will link our stormwater basin to the swale, meaning we can drain stormwater to the sea."

Mr Neumann said the upgrade would unlock further development in the Moonta Bay area.

"We're essentially formulating a better stormwater system for the road which has to be done before its sealing takes place," he said.

"Unsealed roads are always being repaired due to rutting so this project will be a big benefit.

"This is an important piece of the puzzle."

Mr Neumann said council planned to revegetate the median island once works were complete.

Undercover upgrade looms for bowls club

MOONTA Memorial Park Bowling Club has taken its first step towards a new six-rink synthetic green.

The club is set to receive an \$80,000 loan from the Local Government Finance Authority, through Copper Coast Council, to help construct a new all-weather bowling green.

Works are dependent on additional state government funding.

The green, set to cost \$260,000,

would be the first stage of the club's broader development, estimated to cost \$1.52 million.

Further stages include scope for an overhead dome, shed and lighting.

CEO Russell Peate said council was pleased to be working with the bowling club to facilitate the project.

"(Recent) public consultation on this project by the Moonta Memorial Park Bowling Club has seen member-

ship numbers increase significantly," Mr Peate said.

"There would be several benefits of a new synthetic green, including to provide an important service for residents as well as tourists."

The bowling club has been allowed 10 years to pay back its loan.

"It is worth noting the bowling club previously had a loan through council of \$225,000 which was

repaid in full in 2022, five years ahead of schedule," Mr Peate said.

"Moonta Area School also supports the project and will include lawn bowls as part of its years 11-12 physical education course, and could extend interschool competitions through School Sport SA."

Stage 1 of the development will commence in September if funding allows.

Potential stages of development

- Stage 1 – six-rink synthetic bowling green, \$260,000
- Stage 2 – overhead dome, \$650,000
- Stage 3 – shed structure, \$460,000
- Stage 4 – lighting, \$150,000

Free tickets are no longer available for the event, which includes a barbecue at 5pm and a community forum at 6pm.

Premier Peter Malinauskas, the cabinet and department executives will all be on hand to discuss relevant topics with the community.

The meeting is just one part of a two-day trip to the region with stops at various locations around the peninsula booked in for tomorrow and Thursday, February 16.

A booked out women’s forum will be held at Copper Coast Sport and Leisure Centre, Kadina, and chaired by Minister for Women and the Prevention of Domestic and Family Violence Katrine Hildyard

tomorrow, while Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven and Ms Hildyard, also Minister for Recreation and Sport, will host a recreational fishing forum at Wallaroo Sailing Club on Thursday at 5.30pm.

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said, while there are many issues which will be covered during the visit, health is the priority.

“Since the reinstatement of Country Cabinet, I have been pleading for the government to pay Yorke Peninsula a visit to hear directly from our local community,” he said.

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Councils to pitch

YORKE Peninsula’s three councils will have the opportunity to present to the state government on Thursday, February 16.

YPC CEO Andrew Cameron said the three councils would collaborate and present together in a bid to provide as compelling a presentation as possible.

“We (the councils) will present a three-minute video about how important the region is to the state, before the three mayors each present on two important key topics,” Mr Cameron said.

“Mayor Darren Braund will present about the 12 jetties in our council area which are owned by the state government, are leased to council for a 50-year term, but can be given back after 25 years.

“That is coming up in 2025, so we’ll propose that the state government either come to the table or they may be handed back.

“He’ll also present about the unsanctioned camping happening on a number of our beaches, and pitch to collaborate for the implementation of two new Aboriginal rangers to work with council to care for country.”

CCC CEO Russell Peate said he was looking forward to discussing local issues with the state government.

“There will be potential for council to meet with ministers, but I expect there will be greater benefit in following up on potential projects and matters after the Country Cabinet,” Mr Peate said.

“Council intends to raise a number of issues with ministers and follow them up in the near future.”

BWC mayor Leonie Kerley said she hoped this was the first of many visits by ministers to the Top of the Yorke.

“Country Cabinet is a chance for our community to find out more about the state government’s perspective on a range of issues, and for state government ministers and departmental chief executives to hear firsthand about our priorities, interests and concerns,” she said.

“We will be discussing a range of matters with the Premier and ministers including the state of the Bute to Port Broughton section of Upper Yorke Road.

“Council would like to understand from government when they intend investing in a long-overdue upgrade of this state government-owned road.”

Copper Coast deciding from tomorrow

RATEPAYERS will help decide who fills the final Copper Coast Council seat from tomorrow (Wednesday, February 15). Ballots will be mailed out through the next week (finishing on Tuesday, February 21), before voting concludes at noon on Tuesday, March 14.

There are 11 nominees for the one position — Robyn MacDonald, Matthew Colin Stock, Dominica May Thomson, Bernard Shults, Nick Milewich, Grant Darnedde, Adrian Ladner, Robert Davis, Phil Camporeale, Brenton Chappell and Daryl Wayne Semmler.

Mayor Roslyn Talbot encouraged people to read about each of the nominees and make informed decisions.

“To get the representation the community wants, we need the majority of the community to vote,” Mrs Talbot said.

Shared path pedals towards finish line

COPPER Coast’s shared recreational path network is nearing completion.

Four new bike repair stations, as well as four shelters donated by the Rotary Club of Northern Yorke Peninsula, have been installed at various points, marking some of the project’s final stages.

Copper Coast Council director infrastructure services Tim Neumann said two stations had been positioned on the Copper Coast Rail Trail (Kadina to Wallaroo), as well as one at the

Moonta Tourist Office and another on the new Wallaroo to Moonta section.

“The stations each feature retractable tools, a bike pump and wheel chock,” Mr Neumann said.

“These will be good for people riding longer distances.

“People can also develop their own tracks by utilising landmarks such as the four new Rotary shelters and distance markers.”

Mr Neumann said he expected council would begin sealing the final stages of the Wallaroo to Moonta shared path in the coming weeks.

“Final stages will include sealing the section from Cornish Terrace, Wallaroo, around the (Wallaroo) golf course and onto the main Wallaroo to Moonta path,” he said.

“Council has also completed the native vegetation and site contamination reports required for development approval for the section within the National Heritage area (Moonta).

“We’re also looking at adding some water stations along the path, pending grant funding.”

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said the new path had been a great addition to the

Copper Coast’s cycling and walking trails.

“Negotiations for the completion of the track within the (Moonta) mines precinct have been successful and the track should be officially open to the public soon,” Mrs Talbot said.

“I often see people on the trail and hear many positive comments from residents and tourists.

“The Rotary shelters are wonderful additions — they offer somewhere to rest and shelter from the weather.

“Council thanks the Rotary Club of NYP for this valuable contribution.”

HELP MAKE DRIVING ON BEACHES SAFER

The lowering of speed limits on South Australian beaches is being considered with the aim to improve safety for all beach users.

Beaches in South Australia are considered road-related areas which means that, where there is no signed speed limit, the default speed limit for a non built-up area of 100km/h applies.

Speed Limits on Beaches community consultation

The Department for Infrastructure and Transport is seeking feedback on the following options for a default speed limit that would apply to all South Australian beaches that allow vehicle access:

- a default beach speed limit of 40km/h
- a default beach speed limit of 25km/h
- a default beach speed limit of 40km/h and 25km/h when passing or within 100m of a pedestrian
- no change to the default beach speed limits.

TWO boys will appear in court after being caught riding motorised bicycles in Kadina.

Police received a report of youths riding motorised bicycles at the Kadina Golf Club course on Russack Road at

7.23am last Wednesday, February 8.

Patrols attended the course and stopped one of the boys riding away from the area.

His motorised bicycle was seized and classified as a motorcycle after it was found its electric motor output exceeded 200 watts.

The 14-year-old Kadina boy was reported for driving unlicensed, unregistered and uninsured.

Police also attended a New Town address where they located the second boy and a petrol-powered bicycle, which was also classified as a motorcycle, at about 10.20am on Wednesday.

The 15-year-old New Town boy was reported for misuse of a motor vehicle, as well as driving unlicensed, unregistered and uninsured.

Both youths will be summonsed to appear in the Kadina Youth Court at a later date.

Kadina police were acting on numerous complaints received from the public in relation to the reckless and dangerous manner the motorised bicycles were being ridden within the township.

They thanked the community for assistance in this matter.

Immediate loss of licence for drug drivers

SOUTH Australia Police have announced changes for its immediate loss of licence penalty system.

Police officers will have the authority to issue ILOL notices to drivers who test positive for prescribed drugs, removing them from the road immediately.

Currently, offending drivers are issued with expiation notices or a summons to attend court, which could result in loss of licence, but allows them to continue driving in the meantime.

SAPOL Assistant Commissioner Ian Parrott and Minister for Police Joe Szacaks said the changes came into effect yesterday (Monday, February 13).

Mr Parrott said the changes were made to keep South Australians safe.

"Driving is a privilege," he said.

"These changes send a hard and clear message that reckless and drug drivers are making very dangerous decisions.

"They do not deserve to be on the road.

"Those who drive dangerously or with drugs in their system are unable to react quickly or use good judgement on the roads.

"This puts other drivers, pedestrians, police and other road users at significant risk."

On average, 20 per cent of road users killed on South Australian roads between 2017 and 2021 tested positive to a prescribed drug.

YORKE Peninsula Council is seeking funding to repair the seawall along the Stansbury foreshore through the Coast Protection Board's annual Coast Protection Grants Program.

It is hoped funding will be made available for the construction of a 200 metre cement wall facing the water opposite the Dalrymple Hotel.

Stansbury Progress Association is committed to making a financial contribution to the project; however,

the total cost expected to exceed \$400,000.

Progress representative Don McPhee said the history of this project went back more than a decade.

"The damage that is here now was foreshadowed a long time ago," he said.

"Progress's contribution of \$33,000 is conditional on the grant being approved, so we won't be putting that in until we know it's a going thing.

"This is probably our second attempt to get a proper seawall put in here; we previously entered a similar

co-contribution arrangement with council for a rock-revetment wall, also conditional on a grant which wasn't forthcoming.

"Since that time, further damage has occurred which is progressively getting worse and more dangerous, to the point now where it's in council's interest this work proceeds."

YPC last sought funding worth \$200,000 in 2020-21, but were unsuccessful.

"If we don't do something about this now, it's not unreasonable to think the whole infrastructure along the foreshore will collapse," Mr

McPhee said.

"The proposal on this occasion is to use a seawall which will be to maritime standards, but essentially a steel post and concrete sleeper type wall, that'll be the first phase of the operation, but the advantage of that is it will be rather quick to implement and cost effective.

"We're very pleased from a number of points of view, first of all we're very relieved to know something is going to happen.

"We're also very pleased to work with council as co-contributors working towards getting the seawall

Councillors quashed by legislation

AN Electoral Commission of South Australia statement said the legislation, amended and introduced in 2021, allows for no discretion.

"More than 1200 candidates nominated for the 2022 local government elections and, of those, the vast majority have complied with the legislative requirements," it said.

"It is the elected members' responsibility to ensure they understand and comply with the relevant legislation.

"ECSA provides extensive guidance to candidates to assist them to meet their legislative obligations."

Minister for Local Government Geoff Brock said it's a basic requirement of the Local Government (Elections) Act 1999 all candidates complete returns describing donations received, even if there are none.

He said candidates received notification of the requirement on 12 occasions, including after nominations closed and after the election, as well as both electronically and via the mail.

"This requirement ensures councils' constituents are aware of gifts their members have received, and who has provided them," he said.

"It is fundamental to the proper transparency and accountability of council members' decision making; it is also not onerous.

"It should not be forgotten that primarily it is the responsibility of each and every elected representative... to ensure they meet all of the legislative requirements that apply to them.

"It is deeply disappointing so many members of councils and the councils themselves are at this juncture."



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Fisher speaks out on snapper trauma

A YORKE Peninsula fishing charter operator has spoken out about fishing regulations which he said force fishers to put snapper under stress.

Under current regulations, any snapper caught in most South Australian waters, apart from the South East, must be released.

The move was part of a package of measures announced by the state government in December to conserve and build stocks, including extending a ban on all snapper fishing until June 30, 2026.

However, Ryan Valente of Reef Encounters Fishing Charters at Marion Bay said it was impossible to avoid catching snapper as bycatch when targeting other species.

Mr Valente said there was a lot of disappointment amongst recreational fishers about the decision to extend the snapper ban for three years.

"We were prepared for an extension of the ban but possibly they jumped the gun by extending it for such a long time," he said.

"I think an extra year would have been reasonable."

Mr Valente also suggested a heavily reduced personal bag limit for snapper, such as one fish per person, could be introduced for recreational fishers, including those on charter boats, and a ban on commercial snapper fishing retained.

"Five per cent of fishermen are catch-

ing 95 per cent of the fish," he said.

"No one wants to point fingers but this fish stock has been mismanaged for so long."

Mr Valente said it was distressing for him and his customers to see snapper struggle after release because of the impact of barotrauma.

Barotrauma is caused by expansion of gases within the fish's body and is commonly identified by a swollen abdomen or the stomach everted from the mouth.

Its severity increases with depth as a result of the greater pressure change.

The impact of barotrauma on snapper is being investigated by Fisheries Research and Development Corporation.

Lead researcher Dr Troy Rogers, of the South Australian Research and Development Institute, said the research would build on earlier projects FRDC funded through the Released Fish Survival Program.

To measure survival rates of released snapper, his team has caught fish in the wild, fitted them with electronic tags and monitored them using acoustic telemetry for three months.

The fish were caught at various depths to emulate commercial and recreational fishing and released using different techniques, with and without a weighted descender device.

The team found fish caught in shallow water had much higher survival rates than fish caught in deep water, consistent with the relationship between the severity of barotrauma and depth.

Fish released at depth also had a higher probability of survival.

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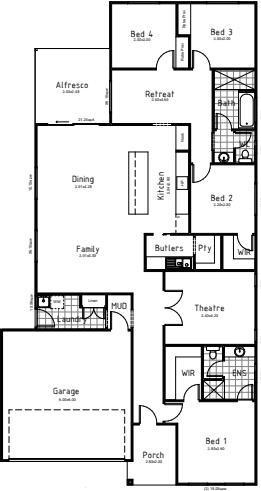
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BWC mayor's ANZAC tribute

BARUNGA West Council mayor Leonie Kerley has challenged herself to craft 1000 poppies ahead of Port Broughton's Anzac Day commemorations.

Mrs Kerley said she was inspired by Victorians Lynn Berry and Margaret Knight, who set out to crochet 120 poppies in 2013 to place at the Shrine of Remembrance.

Through community donations, they reached 5000 poppies in the first year.

BWC, in partnership with the Port Broughton RSL sub-branch, will be using Mrs Kerley's poppies to create a field on the Port Broughton foreshore for the Anzac Day service on April 25.

Mrs Kerley said making the 1000 poppies was a respectful way to honour the servicemen and women who gave their lives.

"I have already knitted 500 red poppies and have four women who have just started knitting to try and get to that 1000 mark," she said.

The tribute is a personal one for Mrs Kerley as her father served as part of 2/22nd Lark Force in the

Second Australian Imperial Force during World War II.

"Many men and women gave their lives while serving their country and those who came home lived a pretty tough life, my dad was one of those who returned," Mrs Kerley said.

"My hope is the installation will be a place of contemplation, a place to remember and be grateful to all who have fought and died, and those who returned."

Council is encouraging enthusiastic knitters and crocheters to help Mrs Kerley reach her target by making their own red, white and purple poppies.

"Purple poppies commemorate the animals which were involved and died during conflicts and white poppies are a symbol of peace and of remembrance for all the casualties of war, both civilian and the armed forces," Mrs Kerley said.

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Art policy out for debate

ART displayed publicly on the Copper Coast will soon be subject to guidelines.

Copper Coast Council released a draft Public Art Policy for consultation following an increased number of requests for artwork to be displayed in the community.

The policy would evaluate public art submissions based on criteria, including whether the art supported council's strategic priorities, its ability to stimulate creative and cultural opportunities and community safety and maintenance requirements.

Council would also be able to fund ongoing maintenance of the art, as well as reject or remove pieces with offensive themes or those that deteriorate.

Director corporate and community services Katrina Borlace said council recognised the need to implement a policy to provide guidance.

"Public art can play a significant role in creating and celebrating council's unique identity and sense of place," Mrs Borlace said.

"It can promote social inclusion, diversity and artistic expression.

"The policy (has been formed) to ensure there is a consistent, fair, transparent and accountable approach towards the provision of public art within the Copper Coast.

"It will also ensure the method for commissioning public art is supported by progressing council's strategic vision to create a vibrant location that expresses a unique character and identity."

Tickera on hold

RESIDENTS of Tickera have expressed their disappointment with the federal government's response to plans for a Telstra telecommunications tower in the township.

The original plans, created by Barunga West Council, for a Telstra mobile tower were proposed to be funded by all three levels of government, with local and state chipping in 25 per cent and the federal government contributing 50 per cent.

Council CEO Maree Wauchope sent the plans to state Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Tom Koutsantonis before they were passed to federal Minister for Communications Michelle Rowland.

BWC waited five months for a response from Mrs Rowland's office, which gave no indication of when or if the tower would be funded. Instead it had a list of different government-funded programs related to fixing blackspots.

The response has left Tickera locals Janet Sexton and Chris Knight

concerned.

"I've been pushing this issue for almost three years and we still haven't heard anything," Mrs Sexton said.

"I have called local council, state MP Fraser Ellis and federal MP Rowan Ramsey, and no one can seem to give us here in Tickera any kind of response.

"It's not just an issue of no communication, but one of safety as well.

"We have farmers and families around here who can't call emergency services if needed because, when we try, there is no connection.

"They built a tower near Alford a couple of years ago which was supposed to fix this issue, but the signal doesn't reach the town.

"We get told by Telstra and council we need to purchase boosters to help with the signal, but it (Telstra) offers little to no support.

"Now, when a plan to fix the issue has been provided, by building a tower in Tickera, it keeps getting handballed by each of the different governments with no progress.

"It's a frustrating issue, and one that seems to have no end in sight."

KITCHEN CADDY LINERS

A second free roll of compostable kitchen caddy liners will be available to all households for collection from either the Port Broughton or Bute Council office from March. Part of the funding from Green Industries SA for the implementation of the FOGO system included funds to supply all households with twelve months of supply of kitchen caddy liners.

KERBSIDE COLLECTION UPDATE

As we near six months of operation of the new kerbside collection program Council continues to monitor and review the efficiency to ensure constant improvement and encourage all households and businesses to utilise the service to meet their needs. Feedback from our new collection company Clare Valley Waste has provided valuable insight into the materials and amounts of waste being disposed of via the three different bins.

A priority for us going forward is to ensure that the majority of our premium corrugated cardboard is recycled through the yellow bin so that it can be re-made into new cardboard products. Council will work with businesses in particular to ensure that additional yellow recycling bins are available to them in place of other less-used bins where necessary. While the lime green FOGO bins can accept small amounts of cardboard we encourage households and businesses to prioritise recycling of premium cardboard instead. Any household or business that requires additional recycling bins can contact Council to discuss their needs.

UPDATE ON WORKS

Council's construction team is re-sheeting a 5km section of Ward Hill Road. This work forms part of Council's 2022-23 road re-sheeting program at an overall expected cost of one million dollars. Work is also expected to commence shortly on Council's sealed road network. These roads were identified as requiring treatment as part of Council's transport asset management planning.

A contractor has been secured through a competitive tender process which was run jointly with Copper Coast Council to ensure best value for ratepayers. Barunga West Council's portion of the works will be approximately \$558,000.

Council staff and contractors have recently been focused on reducing the impact of weed growth on our streets and footpaths. This work is ongoing and with the recent rainfalls we are expecting another round of regrowth. You should see council's spray unit out and about spraying throughout the district over the coming weeks.

Staff are also replacing the deteriorating retaining walls at the Port Broughton skate park. Expect to see an improved terraced retaining wall with added greenery and vegetation. This area will soon be irrigated by treated water from a recently completed \$3 million upgrade

of the Port Broughton Community wastewater treatment plant and irrigation station. Work is also once again underway at the \$1.4 million upgrade to the Bute facultative lagoons water re-use project. Contractors are currently on-site installing geo fabric and liners to the lagoons, the rising main to the oval has been installed and works are being planned for the irrigation distribution shed and tanks to follow in the coming months. This is a fantastic project for the town's sporting community with water from the lagoons being used to irrigate the town oval and remove the need for the sporting club to pay for mains water.

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The wonder of one man's life

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander readers are advised this story contains images and names of people who have died.

HE overcame poverty, multiple family tragedies and countless instances of institutionalised and informal racism to become one of Yorke Peninsula's most successful footballers and coaches, a pioneering Indigenous activist, an arts leader and Member of the Order of Australia.

Now the autobiography of Ngadjuri Elder Vince Copley has been released posthumously, following his death at home at the age of 85 in Adelaide on January 10, 2022.

Written with Clare-based writer Lea McNerney, *The Wonder of Little Things* traces the amazing arc of Vince's life, starting with his early days at the Point Pearce mission.

He began his football career as a promising junior with Port Adelaide Football Club, but a falling out with the club meant he returned to Yorke Peninsula to live with his uncle at Pine Point in 1953.

That was when the canny Curramulka Magpies recruiters made their move and signed him up.

From 1954, when he played in the A grade premiership team as a 17 year old, Vince played in eight A grade premierships and became the first known Aboriginal player to coach a rural A grade football team in South Australia.

He also led the Magpies to four premierships in as many years as captain-coach.

Vince came and went from Curramulka for about 14 years, working as a shearer, grain lumper and general hand.

He boarded with local families, including Frank and Pat Joraslafsky, whose warm acceptance of Vince literally helped open many doors for the talented young footballer.

Their daughter Sandy Joraslafsky, who now lives on a farm near Foul Bay, was an infant when Vince came to stay and they formed a bond she still feels today.

"My dad just accepted everyone for who they were," Sandy said.

"Vince was another person, we

didn't see race or colour. "Of all the things that he (Vince) has done in his life, Curramulka has meant the most to him."

Vince met his future wife Brenda Thomas while working for her parents as a farmhand at their property near Port Julia in 1957.

The pair married in 1971 and had two children, Kara and Vincent junior, and a long and happy life together until Brenda died in 2020.

Brenda has been described by many as Vince's rock and a sounding board for his ideas for improving the lives of his people.

Lea credits Brenda for encouraging Vince to work on his autobiography, so Kara and Vincent could learn more about his life.

Lea said Vince had a very effective

way of telling stories that gently left it up to the listener to work out for themselves what life was really like for him and other Aboriginal people.

"He made a choice to not be angry but not to pretend that things didn't hurt," she said.

In some of the most powerful chapters in the book, Vince simply tells the story of how he tragically lost his big brother, Colin.

Colin died of an untreated infection from tearing his knee on barbed wire, after being turned away from the Maitland hospital because they would not treat Aboriginal people.

At the age of 15, Vince nearly died too, because he was turned away from two hospitals on Yorke

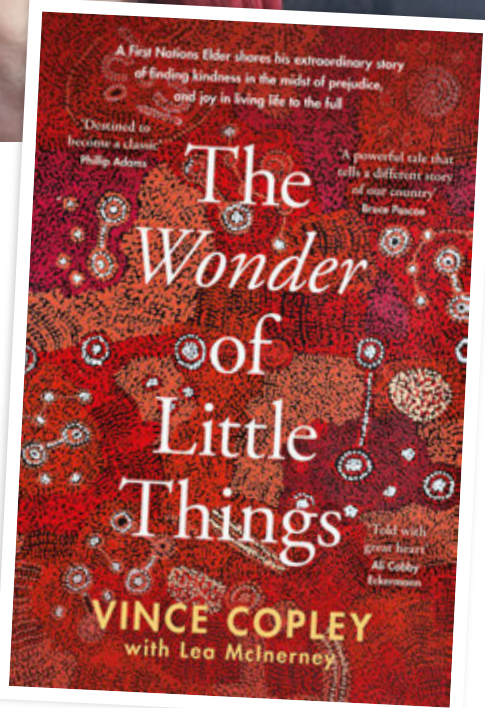
Peninsula before being accepted at the Wallaroo Hospital and treated for acute appendicitis.

Throughout the book, Vince returns to the central importance of the people of Curramulka in helping him to shape his extraordinary life.

He made a final trip to Curramulka in November 2021, to catch up with old friends and leave some of Brenda's ashes on local soil.

"The Curramulka people and the feeling in that community — well I just love it... Currie gave me a different vision of life," he wrote in *The Wonder of Small Things*.

"I'm forever grateful for that."

"People kept coming back, so we thought there might be scope to do more with it and we decided to raise money for an incredibly worthy cause.

"Some of the stories are incredibly tragic and if we can make a difference by playing music in caravan parks and help them create memories through Make-A-Wish, then we will."

While fundraising started slowly, the charity Campfire Sessions has raised \$51,000 for Make-A-Wish, which grants life-changing wishes to critically ill children. Hayden is looking to add more next week when he visits YP.

The travelling family will be spending time at Port Vincent Caravan Park on February 23, Point Turton Caravan Park on February 24 and Coobowie Caravan Park on February 25, with sessions running from 5.30pm to 7.30pm.

SA schools slapped with phone ban

SOUTH Australian schools will be banning mobile phones by term 3, under a new state government policy.

The policy prohibits students using devices which receive cellular signals — including mobile phones, smart watches and select tablets such as iPads during school hours.

Students will be required to place their phones in a secure locker, with some schools choosing to implement lockable lead-lined bags.

The decision to ban phones has come after improved academic suc-

cess and lower cyber bullying rates resulted from the implementation of similar policies in Victoria, Western Australia and Northern Territory.

Minister for Education, Training and Skills Blair Boyer said he believed the ban would be a turning point for students and schools to embrace learning and personal engagement.

“Research shows excessive use of technology and social media can have detrimental impacts on developing minds as well as strong correlations with increased depression and anxiety,” Mr Boyer said.

“The trials undertaken in this

policy, and through extensive consultation, show considerable improvements to schools’ overall culture, a focus on learning and improved relationships among students.”

Select schools on Yorke Peninsula have already implemented a phone ban, with Minlaton District and Moonta Area Schools having bans in place for more than a year.

“MDS already has a phone policy pretty much identical to the one all schools must adopt by term 3,” principal Andrew Dickinson said.

“The kids here are a fantastic bunch and they comply with the policy.

“It is great to see people actually chatting and playing together during breaks rather than staring at a device in their hand.”

Moonta has had a ban in place since term 4, 2021 and principal Beth Hector said students understood the reasons behind it.

“The school’s student leadership and governing council at the time, came to a decision about the ban,” Mrs Hector said.

“Since the ban there has been little to no arguing from students, it has really helped build the social culture of our school and students have taken it in their stride.”



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Growing new opportunities for Central Yorke School

CENTRAL Yorke School has installed a new greenhouse hydroponics system at its Maitland campus after it received a \$30,000 grant from Food Ladder.

Food Ladder is a not-for-profit organisation which uses hydroponics technology and controlled greenhouses to provide regional schools across Australia with small scale food growing systems and specialised education resources.

The greenhouse, which will be used as a student resource for select subjects, was built in November under the supervision of Food Ladder project coordinator Nigel McLean.

Principal Sharon Illingworth said the project would focus on a range of topics including global food security, social entrepreneurialism and sustainable practice using hydroponics.

“This project is part of developing three diverse gardening zones,” Mrs Illingworth said.

“These include the current traditional ground garden system, permaculture kitchen garden, which includes chickens, and greenhouse with hydroponics system.

“Under supervision from Nigel McLean from Food Ladder, staff, community members and students have helped clear ground, dig and lay foundations, construct and bring to operational status to the high-tech system.

“Nigel ran through the basics of the setup with staff with a view to incorporating the learning into their teaching.

“A huge thank you to Nigel for his comprehensive overview and thanks also to Food Ladder for their support throughout the process.”

CFS keen to restore fire safety rating

THE Country Fire Service is reviewing the national grass fire rating system introduced for harvest 2022-23 and has indicated it would favour a return to the previous rating system used by SA grain growers.

During summer 2022-23, South Australia's voluntary Harvest Code of Practice was transitioned from the state-based Grasslands Fire Danger Index to the new national Fire Behaviour Index.

Growers had the option to use either index during the latest harvest.

Now, a working group of representatives from the SA CFS, Grain Producers South Australia, and Primary Industries and Regions SA is reviewing use of the FBI and is due to circulate its findings on August 1.

The CFS is also working with fire behaviour scientists and fire agencies from other states and territories to review the national code.

CFS acting executive director of operations Brenton Hastie said the GFDI had provided a good balance between safety and enabling grain growers to harvest.

Mr Hastie said the aim had been to replicate the GFDI under the new FBI, but one of the findings from the transition harvest was the weighting given to fuel loads under the FBI.

"If the fuel loads are getting too high, the model increases (the overall score) exponentially," he said.

"It hits a threshold at an earlier point than the old system.

"If we cap fuel loads at 4.5 tonnes/hectare, the model of the FBI at 40 is similar to the old model at 35."

The influence of fuel loads

on the total score under the FBI was particularly pronounced during the introductory harvest as it had produced many high-yielding crops.

Mr Hastie also said the wind speed parameter under the FBI had been based on a poor assumption and needed to be recalibrated to account for the difference between wind speeds measured at 10 metres above ground and wind speeds measured using hand-held meters.

Under the GFDI, growers had been able to make their calculations using a static chart, presented as a sticker which could be placed in harvest vehicles, rather than having to access an online app.

Networked weather stations are also used by some grain growers to obtain more accurate readings of factors such as wind speed and temperature.

Mr Hastie said fire agencies

had less control over the assumptions that underpinned the calculations made by the apps and CFS was keen to return to use of the static chart on stickers for next harvest.

"I would love to get back to people having a sticker and using a handheld meter outside their (harvester) cab," he said.

Grain Producers SA chief executive Brad Perry said grain growers had made a lot of comparisons between the Grass Fire Danger Index and the Fire Behaviour Index during harvest.

"It is quite evident the FBI, as it stands, will knock out harvest days we have been able to harvest on before," he said.

"Almost every producer wants to use the old GFDI.

"We need to get a solution to this and do it quite quickly.

"I am confident we can get a solution growers can trust."

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Plant structure key to preventing pod drop

LENTIL plants' growth habit and structure could be key to determining their susceptibility to pod drop, trials at Kulpara and Tickeria have found.

Findings from the trials were presented to an audience of 85 people as part of the Grains Research and Development Corporation Grains Research Update held at the Bute Sporting Club last Thursday, February 9.

Agronomist Jordan Bruce, of Trengove Consulting, Bute, said data from trials at Kulpara in 2021 and 2022 and at Tickeria in 2022 showed a direct relationship between the height of plants and their propensity to drop pods.

"The taller the lentil plant, the greater the pod loss we are seeing," he said.

It was found pod drop loss in the control treatment was 163 kilograms per hectare at Kulpara in 2021.

"The relationship between plant height and pod drop was reasonably consistent, and for every millimetre increase in plant height, an extra 2.5 kg/ha was lost," Mr Bruce said.

Mr Bruce said pod drop in mature lentil plants had been a significant issue for growers in most seasons, particularly in windy environments such as Yorke Peninsula.

Grower Tim Millard, who hosted the Kulpara trials, said his area was prone to wind damage and pod loss in lentils.

"We have been losing between 30 to 55 per cent of our crop but it's hard to quantify," he said.

"It's not isolated to my property, others around me agree with those numbers."

Mr Millard said the open canopy structure of some lentil crops made them more susceptible to wind speed and gusts, resulting in dropped pods.

However, Mr Millard said the atypical nature of the 2021 and 2022 seasons meant they were not ideal for the trial.

Mr Bruce said the trials at Kulpara utilised a range of management strategies early in the season, including varying seeding rates and fertilizer application, to alter plant growth habits.

Mr Bruce said lentil varieties such as PBA Bolt had a very upright growth habit and did not branch out as much as spreading varieties like PBA Jumbo2, which tended to grow into neighbouring furrows and tangle with other plants.

Erect types with minimal canopies had reduced risk of being infected with botrytis grey mould but were more exposed to pod drop caused by wind.

Mr Bruce said stubble retention could protect lentils from weather during the growing season, but also influence plant growth habits and structure.

Sowing into taller stubble, such as stripper stubble, could produce taller lentil plants compared with sowing into shorter, conventional stubble or

no stubble.

A trial at Tickeria in 2022 found different stubble height treatments had different effects, as measured by the September Greenseeker normalized difference vegetation index, July plant height, harvest canopy height and harvest lowest pod data.

However, Mr Bruce said those effects did not translate into any sig-

nificant pod loss or yield differences.

A pod protection product was also trialed at Kulpara in 2021 and 2022 through application at desiccation and was found to reduce pod drop by 39 per cent, reducing the loss to 100kg/h.

However, Mr Bruce said the overall yield of the crop was not significantly greater than the control treatment.

"Risk mitigation is difficult, as

AUSTRALIAN mortgage holders are beginning to feel the sting of another interest rate rise, with new statistics showing some are falling behind on their repayments.

Comparison site Finder surveyed 1054 respondents, 313 of whom have a mortgage, with one in eight missing a repayment.

Nine consecutive rate hikes from the Reserve Bank of Australia means an Australian with the average loan size of around \$600,000 will be paying roughly \$1000 per month more compared with what they were paying in April last year.

Home loans expert at Finder Richard Whitten said the level of mortgage stress in Australia was worrying.

“If you know you're going to miss a payment, talk to your lender first,” he said.

“It's better to negotiate some kind of hardship arrangement or a repayment holiday than to simply stop repaying the loan.

“If you think your lender can't give you a good enough deal, then find something better and switch.

“Refinancing your home takes a few hours' work but the savings are well worth it.”

More and more Australians are taking up refinancing according to recent statistics from the Australian Bureau of Statistics.

Total housing loan refinancing between lenders remained high at \$19.1 billion in December.

“The biggest hack to making the change would be not waiting until the last minute to start thinking about refinancing,” Joust home loan marketplace CEO Carl Hammerschmidt said.

“Start researching your options and gathering information several months before you plan to refinance, so you have plenty of time to compare rates and terms, gather necessary documents, and complete the application process.”

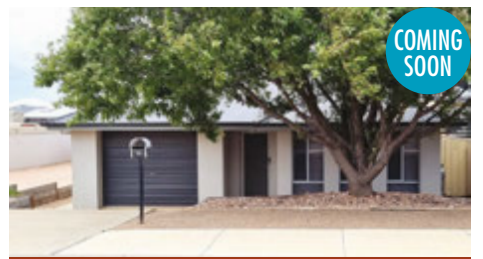

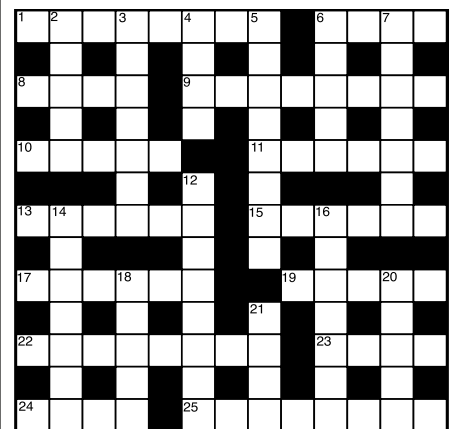

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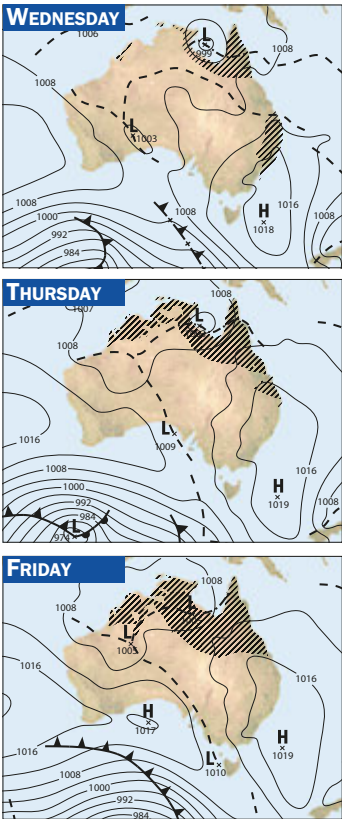

Port Broughton: Plenty of caravanners were on the roads when I called in here last week. On the jetty has been quiet, but small tinnies were in the channel trying for yellowfin whiting, mullet and garfish.

Wallaroo: A grain ship was in port while it was loaded with some of that massive crop recently harvested. The jetty had blue crabs and squid at night while Point Riley and Tickera had garfish, blue swimmer crabs and an occasional squid, but boat crews had to time their runs in those persistent southerlies.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Extremely hot midweek weather meant heaps of early boat-ramp traffic as crews launched and headed out to Tipara Reef and West Light for garfish, blueys and rat kingfish in the Steamer Channel. The jetties had the odd blue crabs and not much else.

Point Turton: Sporadic catches of King George whiting continued from The Banks and across to Corny Point. Garfish, squid

and tommy ruff (Australian herring) were the other main reports.

Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: Tuna reports improved markedly in recent days with fish ranging from 5kg to 40kg coming in from The Althorpes and surrounding offshore reefs at Marion Bay. Big snook, flathead and squid were along the 8m line out from Foul Bay and Mozzie Flat. Both jetties have been worth a try for squid and tommyies.

Edithburgh/Stansbury: Blue crabs were the main reports from both jetties, especially in the warm weather on Thursday and Friday. Boat crews fished far and wide for KG whiting north of Troubridge Island and garfish and squid out from Sultana Point and Coobowie/Port Giles.

Ardrossan: Crews in big boats made the run down to Long Spit for KG whiting, flathead and snook on the way back. The old north-east artificial reef grounds had a few garfish and small tommy ruff, while the jetty had blueys and garfish. Blue crabs were about in reasonable numbers at Port Clinton and Price.
