

### **Patience** please hospital awaiting review

ARDROSSAN Community Hospital is awaiting a state government review about its future.

The review into accident and emergency and acute care services at the hospital by consultant Michelle Smith is expected to recommend a sustainable model for supplying on-call health services in Ardrossan.

Ms Smith is expected to submit the review to Health and Wellbeing Minister Chris Picton later this week.

A spokesperson for SA Health said the department partners with a number of private hospitals to deliver safe, high-quality care.

"A review is currently underway with the Ardrossan Community Hospital and we will continue to work in partnership to ensure the best possible health services are provided to the Yorke Peninsula community," the spokesperson said.

More than 160 people attended a public information session held to provide an update regarding the delivery of services and planning for the future at the Soldiers Memorial Hall on Sunday, May 21.

Board chairperson Margaret Tomsen said although she could not provide any details about what the review might recommend, it was likely to propose a public/private operating model for the hospital.

The hospital had received some funding from the state government for the accident and emergency service.

"We have been haemorrhaging money from this section for many years," she said.

Mrs Tomsen said the board and staff were doing all they could to ensure the future of the hospital and its aged care residential service, the Ardrossan Community

Currently, the staff work with local doctors and SA Health's Virtual Care Service to provide 24-hour medical coverage but Mrs Tomsen stressed it was not intended telehealth would replace the service of local doctors.

She pointed out in February 2023, the hostel was awarded four stars by the Aged Care Standards and Accreditation Agency.

She described this as a "great achievement", given only 54 aged care homes from a total of 2200 throughout Australia were granted the highest rating of five stars.

Chief executive officer Narita Stone called on local community members to do all they could to support the hospital.

We are not closing," she said. "We are here to do whatever we

can to keep our hospital and aged care going."

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

# IT'S NOT GOOD ENOUGH Union slams the 'lack of urgency' on hospital security

THE Australian Nursing and Midwifery Foundation has slammed the state government and Yorke and Northern Local Health Network for its lack of urgency in responding to security concerns at Wallaroo Hospital.

The ANMF SA branch is calling for 24/7 restraint-trained guards to be employed at Wallaroo and Port Pirie hospitals, following recent "code black" incidents.

Police had to taser a man four times when he smashed through two sets of entry doors at Wallaroo Hospital and then attacked the back of an ambulance on February 14.

A police patrol was on site at the time after dealing with an aggressive, handcuffed patient who required sedation and they confronted the man who had smashed into the hospital.

When asked what was being done



to address security concerns, a spokesperson for SA Health and YNLHN said a review had been completed and a working party formed, which would have input from frontline and management staff.

The working party will review security data and provide advice on potential improvements additional to those implemented earlier this year.

The spokesperson said security cameras at Wallaroo Hospital had been adjusted to cover all outdoor areas and strong, temporary doors were installed hours after the code black incident in February, along with other measures.

"We are considering all perspectives regarding restraint-trained security guards before making a decision on this matter," she said.

"While we will share high level findings and actions on its completion, it would be inappropriate to share full details of the hospital's security processes with the public.

"There have been three incidents since February 14 this year when staff reported some form of aggressive behaviour from consumers.

"No staff were harmed during any of these incidents."

ANMF SA branch chief executive Associate Professor Elizabeth Dabars said the union had not received any formal correspondence or commitment from the YNLHN about its security review.

"It is completely unacceptable nurses, midwives, healthcare professionals and patients and visitors have been left vulnerable to violent and aggressive attacks for too long," she said.

"There are very regular routine police call outs for various issues — for example, searching patients for weapons or dangerous objects, escorting abusive people off site.

"All health workers are entitled to a safe workplace where any incident of violence or aggression is taken seriously by management and executives."

A petition launched by ANMF in early March as part of its campaign for security guards to be employed at the two hospitals has since collected more than 1863 signatures.

We are working with our members to determine what measures we will take in the next stage of our campaign, expected to be launched in the coming weeks," Ms Dabars said.

### Focusing on family-friendly facilities

FINDING adequate baby change facilities when out and about can be an extra pain in the backside for parents.

Baby change facilities can be few and far between and while council websites can help to locate public toilets, some amenities don't provide change tables and, in particular, options for both parents to comfortably change their child in private.

Mum-of-two Melissa Angus, of Wallaroo, said she rarely ventured out when her children were babies because the lack of changing facilities put her off.

"Locally, there's either no change table or it is always located in the female toilets," she said. "I don't ever remember a time my husband Cade mentioned there being a change facility in male toilets.

"I think having more family-friendly facilities would encourage more mums, especially new mums, to go out more having the comfort of knowing there is a safe space to change their babies.

"Personally, we would always have to change nappies in the car or in the pram around a corner if we couldn't find a suitable option."

Copper Coast Council director infrastructure services Tim Neumann said it would be great to have dedicated parent rooms to provide more space and resources for parents and caregivers.

"We do have two (parent rooms) located at the Ascot Theatre and Copper Coast Visitor Information Centre in Kadina and we are investi-

gating other areas similar to this in more private locations which are less likely to be vandalised," Mr Neumann said.

"While adding change tables to make the accessible toilet blocks more versatile in their use is a budget-friendly way for councils to aid families, it does not cater for simple, yet sometimes essential, requirements like microwaves, private feeding rooms and comfortable furnishings."

CCC provides about two to three public change facilities in each of Kadina, Moonta, Wallaroo and surrounding suburbs.

Mr Neumann said another 11 change tables would be installed in unisex accessible bathrooms within the next few weeks.

"The majority of our public changing facilities are located in our accessi-

ble toilet blocks, allowing for a larger unisex accessible family," he said.

"We always strive to provide enough facilities and services in our area to cater for our community and as our area continues to grow, we will expand on what we offer as best we can.

"We continue to upgrade our toilet facilities, with 13 public toilet blocks upgraded in the past six financial years — each including a public change facility."

### BWC is looking to improve amenities

Most public buildings in the Barunga West Council area have change facilities, while toilet blocks do not.

CEO Maree Wauchope said council was looking at how this could be improved.

"The one amenity building we have with a changeroom table is a unisex toilet which has recently been built," Ms Wauchope said.

"The amenity facilities we have planned as part of the new tourism and events facility at the Port Broughton foreshore are unisex.

"There can always be improvements to our facilities, and this is something we look to address.

"I strongly believe a well-planned amenity building can cater for parents — in larger retail centres a dedicated parent room may be warranted, and we also encourage businesses to cater for the needs of their customers where it is practical to do so."

### **Hospital** services check given to public

MEMBER for Narungga Fraser Ellis said the decision by the state government to invest in Keith Hospital, which was formerly a community-run facility, was a positive sign for the future of Ardrossan Community Hospital as it showed the government was supportive of regional

"What happened at Keith shows that the state government might step in and do more here," he said.

Hospital finance committee chairperson Craig Farrow said the hospital had strong building and land assets worth \$8 million but "the challenge has always been operating performance" and the hospital was expected to report a loss for 2022-23.

"The board recognises the issues and is working proactively to improve the situation," he said.

There is no one single action that will address all the issues.

Mr Farrow said the cost of employing agency nursing staff to make up for the lack of permanent staff was a major draw on the budget.

Director of nursing Georgina Drewery said the hospital accepted both public and private patients and was working closely with agencies including Medstar, the Royal Flying Doctor Service and the operators of the local general practice, Medical HQ, to maintain its services.

### Keeping mental health on the forefront

SOS Copper Coast SPN has welcomed an independent review into South Australia's mental health laws.

The South Australian Law Reform Institute, based at the University of Adelaide, recently made 61 recommendations for reforms to improve mental health laws in the state.

The review also made 11 suggestions regarding key issues recurring throughout consultation that fell outside the review's formal terms of reference.

Key recommendations include promoting Aboriginal mental health and implementing culturally responsive and appropriate services, addressing the complex intersection between mental health and the use of illicit drugs and/or alcohol,

updating language to reflect rights-based and modern practice, increase the relevance of laws to children, adolescents and older persons; and safeguarding the decision-making capacity of consumers to name a few.

SOS Copper Coast SPN secretary Gerry Guerin said SOS Copper Coast advocated for those who were not okay and offered ideas of pathways available for assistance.

"If this legislation manages to increase the relevance of laws (mental health), our community will be well served," Mr Guerin said.

"Wherever people are, having someone prepared to connect, listen to their story, trusting, understanding, respecting their experience meeting them where they are at and responding in real

time to support them is the SALRI will consult with relestarting point.

"I agree with the Health and Wellbeing Minister's view that we need to get the balance right for our mental health laws — ensuring we prioritise wellbeing and rights of consumers, and protection and appropriate treatment which aligns with our position."

As part of this review,

vant parties including experts, persons with lived experience of mental illness, carers and interested groups.

A review of the Mental Health Act is required every

### RAA addresses elephant in the room for National Road Safety Week

RAA launched a week-long campaign across the state promoting the Fatal 5 causes of road trauma as part of National Road Safety Week, May 14 to 21.

Five inflatable elephants appeared at prominent locations across South Australia, each representing one of the Fatal 5 -Distraction (including mobile phones), Speed, Dangerous road users, Not wearing a seatbelt, and Driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol.

The "Speeding" elephant was displayed during the Kernewek Lowender Cavalcade Fun Fair at Kadina oval on Sunday, May 21.

It was accompanied with a message about the dangers of unsafe road use, with cavalcade attendees informed that more than 7500 drivers had been detected speeding in SAPOL's Yorke Mid North Local Service Area in 2022.

RAA senior manager of road safety Charles Mountain said he hoped the elephants would prompt conversations about safer driving.

"We know to influence change, we must be brave enough to talk about it - RAA wants people to address the 'elephant in the room'," Mr Mountain said.

"Everyone knows someone who might check their phone while driving, creep over the speed limit or be guilty of one of the Fatal 5.

"We want people to understand any of these behaviours dramatically increase the risk of a crash.

"With the 2023 road toll spiralling, it's time to ask ourselves if we've been complacent when sharing the road with others lately, and to realise just how the tragic consequences of this behaviour can be.

"That's the elephant in the room."

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### **Increased support for** regional crime victims

COMPENSATION will be easier to find for victims of crime living in regional South Australia.

Changes to the rules for victims of crime applying for compensation amended by the state government have come into effect, making the certification of documents easier for those in regional and remote areas.

Previously, when victims of crime applied for compensation, they needed to provide certified copies of two forms of photo identification, which involves finding a legal practitioner or Justice of the Peace to certify the documents.

The government has updated this to allow police officers to certify the documents and only one of the two forms of ID will now need to be a photographic ID.

"For those of us living in a metropolitan area, it's often easier to find a JP or a legal practitioner," Attorney-General Kyam Maher said.

"However, for people in regional and remote South Australia, it can be quite a challenging task.

"We firmly believe the process for applying for compensation should be as simple as possible, sparing victims any further or unnecessary stress

"These changes will make it far easier for people in regional areas to carry out this task." Commissioner for Victims' Rights Bronwyn

Killmier said people who have been victims of crime needed fewer barriers, not more.

"I'm pleased to see the government acting on an issue which has placed an unnecessary burden on victims of crime living in regional and remote areas," she said.

"I'm aware of numerous cases where people have been forced to embark on round trips of 80 kilometres or more, simply to get certified copies of the documents required to apply for compensation."

BARUNGA West Council appears to have backed down on plans to immediately tackle the issue of unauthorised fences around homes at Fisherman Bay.

Director of planning and regulatory services Trevor White had previously said property owners who erected fences without development authorisation would receive enforcement notices to remove the fence in the "near future".

However, on Friday, May 19 a council spokesperson said staff would not speak to people about their "specific fencing issues" until after an information sheet was sent with rate notices in July.

The spokesperson said information about the compulsory requirements for fencing at Fisherman Bay was included in a community

update in October as well as a community engagement program and survey which started in December.

However, the description of fencing in the community engagement survey described tubular style fencing only as an "option" rather than an enforceable planning regulation.

Fencing would only be permitted on side and rear allotment boundaries, with no fencing past the building line of the dwelling setback the farthest from the front or seaward boundary.

Fences would not be permitted on the front boundary of allotments facing the sea.

Respondents to the survey were almost evenly split on the option for fencing permissions, with 48 per cent partially or completely agreeing and 52 per cent disagree-

Those who agreed cited the need

to create privacy and stop people walking in between homes to access the beach and to provide security for their children and pets.

Those who disagreed said 1.2 metres was not high enough to provide protection against large and agile dogs and the proposal to prevent fencing of front yards meant these areas would be used as parking spaces by others.

A survey respondent against fencing wrote that Fisherman Bay was a shack community, not a residential township and fences would destroy the ambience.

Another who answered "no" said changes to what could be done with fences should have been aired prior to development approval or at least before settlement.

"Doing so now affects property values and what many of us have planned to do with our properties," the respondent wrote.

### Safety concern for dog owners

FISHERMAN Bay shackowner of 10 years Michael Papps believes fencing should be allowed at the settlement.

However, he said he was disappointed as he had been repeatedly knocked back by Fisherman Bay Management for putting up any permanent or semi-permanent fencing, even though there had been plenty around the bay in previous years.

"We used to have some chicken wire we put up with star-droppers, to comply with the council's dog regulations to restrain our dog, and to have an area for young kids to stay within," Mr Papps said.

"During this time, our dog was attacked three times by other dogs coming to our shack.

"One time (was) in front of the front

porch, with two young, terrified children on the porch, watching their old dog being attacked."

Mr Papps said once his family had freehold of the property, they worked with their neighbours on an agreed form of fencing and installed a Colorbond fence between the two shacks that extends from the front of the buildings.

The neighbours on the other side did not want a boundary fence, so the Pappses only put a chain fence from the back corner of the shack to the shed to create a safe space for their dog.

"We have never seen the council enforcing its current dog rules in the bay, so a safe space for our big, goofy, retired grey(hound) is very important to us," he said.

### It was rainy and gloomy but... Cornish spirit shines bright for festival

AN estimated 30,000 people attended this year's Kernewek Lowender Copper Coast Cornish Festival, held Monday to Sunday, May 15 to 21.

Locals and visitors alike enjoyed events including pasty baking, art shows and concerts, as well as language and historical lessons, light shows and a blessing of the waters.

Bigger events such as the Fer Kernewek in Moonta on Friday and the Classic Cavalcade of Cars and Motorcycles on Sunday attracted thousands of people.

Kernewek Lowender president Lynn Spurling said while it was disappointing Friday and Saturday were beset by rain, the festival atmosphere kept everyone's spirits

"I think everyone who was here really enjoyed the experience and everything we had on offer as we celebrated our 50th year, despite the rain," she said.

"It was great to see once again we could host such a wonderful festival event which continues to showcase all we have to offer."

The 2021 festival attracted just more than 20,000 people, as the community dealt with the ongoing effects of the Covid-19 pandemic, while a whopping 40,000 people came along in 2019.

Mrs Spurling said people enjoyed the variety of experiences on offer.

"All of our associated events, concerts and lessons were so well

attended; the pasty making, Cornish lessons, band performances, they all had full capacity which was great," she said.

"Probably it was just on the Friday and Saturday, the weather kept people away from the main events which were outside, but we couldn't do anything about that.

"But all the kids involved in the dancing loved it and they didn't care about the rain at all, I'd say."

### Inroads to protect Port Hughes coast

Fin Hansen REPORT BY

EROSION along the Port Hughes Coastal Trail will be studied by an environmental consultant.

Copper Coast Council received \$15,000 from the Coast Protection Board for the study, which aims to identify a solution to prevent further erosion to 1.2 kilometre of cliff face.

This is one of three local projects to receive funding, with Yorke Peninsula Council also landing \$198,000 to repair Stansbury's seawall along with a \$5750 grant for Barunga West Council for a Tickera Foreshore Rehabilitation Project.

Port Hughes resident Graham Fleet said erosion had been threatening the coastal trail, used by walkers, runners and cyclists, for as long as he could remember.

"My wife sent photos of the damage to a former (council) CEO 10 years ago and nothing eventuated," Mr Fleet said.

"When it rains, water runoff has a serious effect on some parts of the walkway.

"We need a solution that ensures water doesn't keep eroding the cliff so we can preserve the face.

"If something isn't done there will be much bigger problems down the track."

Council CEO Russell Peate said water runoff, combined with wave and inundation, had contributed to the cliff damage.

"We're likely to use an experienced environmental consultant whom we've used before to come up with a practical and achievable plan," Mr Peate said.

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said, once a coastal protection plan was identified, council would seek funding, complemented by a council contribution, for the works.

"If we don't protect the cliff top, it will continue to erode and parts of the coastal trail will also be affected," Mrs Talbot said.

"Many people use the trail and we want to preserve it for the future."

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### **BWC** considering varied rate rises

A RANGE of rate rises between 8.6 per cent and 10.2 per cent are being considered by Barunga West Council to increase its overall rate

Elected members were presented with three options for 2023-24 rates at a public information session on Tuesday, May 16.

The options feature a range of increases for different property types, including residential, commercial, industrial, primary production and vacant land, and would increase total rate revenue by either 10.2 per cent, 8.6 per cent, or 8.9 per cent.

CEO Maree Wauchope said she recommended council adopt a total rise of 8.6 per cent, which would increase rate revenue in 2023-24 to \$5.286 million.

This overall increase was capped to reflect the rise in the consumer price index.

Under the 8.6 per cent option, residential rates would increase by 5.2 per cent, commercial rates by 2.3 per cent and primary production by 10.5 per cent.

Figures from the Office of the Valuer-General show residential and primary production properties in the BWC area are expected to increase in value by an average of 12.5 per cent in 2023-24 while all classes of commercial and industrial land were expected to increase by 7.5 per cent.

Ms Wauchope said the greater proposed increase in rates for primary production properties reflected council's expenditure on road maintenance in rural areas.

"We spend \$1.7m a year on unsealed roads, which are mainly used by farmers and we do about 37 kilometres a year," she said.

The preferred option also includes a 19.8 per cent increase in rates for vacant land.

"We want to encourage and stimulate development of these blocks and stop land banking," she said.

The proposed rate increases align with BWC's Long Term Financial Plan, which aims to ensure council's financial sustainability, bring its assets up to standard, and reach an operating surplus by 2028.

Ms Wauchope pointed out BWC's fixed charges (base amount charged to all properties) were less than those charged by neighbouring councils and BWC did not charge a separate waste collection fee.

However, she said council had to

budget for many cost increases in the coming financial year.

These include an extra \$50,000 for fuel, \$40,000 for electricity, and \$54,000 in finance costs.

Total salaries will also go up by 5.7 per cent as a result of enterprise bargaining.

Federal Assistance Grants will decline by \$20,000 due to the growth in the capital value of properties in the BWC area but council will continue to seek other grant

Ms Wauchope said elected members could consider standardising the grants paid by council to progress associations within the BWC area.

These varied widely, with the Mundoora Progress Association receiving only \$1000 compared with the \$6500 given to the Bute Progress Association.

Council will continue to discuss the proposed rate increases at its next council meeting on Tuesday, June 13, and Ms Wauchope said she was aiming to finalise a draft budget

"In the financial years coming, we need to finish what we have started," she said.

### **BWC** to leave Legatus group

BARUNGA West Council has voted to withdraw from a local government group which represents 15 local councils, citing a lack of tangible benefits for its ratepayers.

BWC chief executive Maree Wauchope said council was concerned about the group's performance and a lack of alignment with Barunga West's

"Council has previously expressed concerns over the draft plans and budget presented by the Legatus Group,"

'These concerns include an operating deficit of \$73,300 in the 2022-23 budget, reliance on grant funding for many identified projects, and proposed increases in annual council membership contributions."

She said Legatus had fallen short in achieving its objectives and BWC was not alone in this viewpoint.

Legatus Group is chaired by Wakefield Council mayor Rodney Reid and includes Copper Coast and Yorke Peninsula Councils.

It aims to facilitate community and economic development by representing constituent councils at a regional level when dealing with other governments, private enterprise and the com-

Council has written to the Legatus Group, to give it 18 months' notice of its intention to withdraw.

If the required improvements are not made, BWC will approach the relevant state minister in 2025 to seek approval to cease being a constituent member.

Ms Wauchope said Legatus needed to make sure it did not duplicate the functions of organisations such as the Local Government Association, state government agencies, councils, Regional Development Australia, landscape boards and tourism boards.

Mr Reid said he was not surprised BWC had decided to resign from the group, given the responses he got from some elected members in March.

"I don't think it's the fault of Legatus,"

"Councils that tend to put more into it get more out of it."

He said Barunga West Council was the only council which had indicated it would resign from the group.

"I am disappointed in the decision because I think how as an organisation Legatus can and does help councils in different ways," Mr Reid said.

Mr Reid said BWC had benefited from its membership in numerous ways, including a subsidy for BWC's membership of the SA Coastal Councils Alliance.

The group is supporting Lifeline's bid to set up a counselling facility at Port Pirie, which would benefit BWC residents, and has advocated to the state government to drop the royalty imposed on rubble extracted from borrow pits for road repairs.

Council currently contributes \$12,479 annually to support and maintain its membership with the Legatus

The Legatus board has proposed membership fees will rise by 10 per cent for 2023-24 to account for inflation of eight per cent, plus an extra two

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### **Council confidentiality explained**

COUNCILS are bound by legislation when it comes to advertising and conducting meet-

There have been questions in the community about the number of confidential informal gatherings held by Copper Coast Council.

CEO Russell Peate said councils were required to advertise all ordinary and special

"I understand people can become upset when meetings are confidential (and we still advertise them), but this is a requirement under the Local Government Act 1999," Mr

"We are required to publish the notice of all council meetings on a website and also choose to on Facebook and in the Yorke Peninsula Country Times newspaper so people are aware."

Mr Peate said the decision to make meeting agenda items confidential was up to council.

"Items are usually made confidential when we are legally advised to do so," Mr Peate said.

"This may happen when a matter is raised in commercial confidence, when tenders are being discussed for works and services, or when council employees are involved.

"Council tries to be transparent and provide as much information as it can but there are good reasons for items being confidential.

'We then outline what's occurred in the meetings when the items are no longer confi-

The Local Government Act obligates council CEOs to publicly display notices at least three days before an ordinary meeting, and as soon as practicable prior to a special

### **Energy efficient homes the way forward**

HUNDREDS of dollars will be slashed from the power bills of eligible Yorke Peninsula households following the announcement of new energy rebates set to take effect this winter.

From July, people on government support payments, including pensioners, veterans, seniors and concession card holders will be eligible to receive a \$500 rebate on their power bills.

The relief package is a joint

measure between state and federal governments, with the Commonwealth matching South Australia's \$127.2 million commitment towards the National Energy Bill Relief Plan.

Under the plan, eligible small business will also receive \$625 to help combat rising energy costs.

State Treasurer Stephen Mullighan said the government was doing all it could to help struggling households manage increases to their electricity bills. "We promised energy bill relief and we delivered," Mr Mullighan said.

"This will make a significant difference to those who can least afford higher energy bills."

In a separate federal budget initiative, \$1.3 billion has been allocated to the Household Upgrades Fund, of which \$1b will go towards around 110,000 low-cost loans to help households improve their energy efficiency.

This includes upgrading homes with battery-ready solar systems, transitioning to mod-

ern appliances and supporting other initiatives such as double-glazing windows.

It is estimated upgrading an average house from a one-star rating to a three-star rating could cut energy bills by around 30 per cent.

Baden Napier Electrical and Solar owner Baden Napier said any efforts to reduce the amount of energy consumed by households was a positive step forward.

Mr Napier said initiatives to improve energy efficiency were needed because energy consumption was growing rapidly.

"Low-cost green loans have been around forever, so I don't think it's an announcement that will change the world," he said.

"However, it will be interesting to see what the government is offering and how they offer it compared to what is already in place."

Mr Napier said, in his experience, previous schemes had been more effective in encouraging consumers to transition to solar compared to low-cost loans

"I would personally rather see more direct benefits similar to schemes already in place," he said

"At the moment for solar, we have basically a carbon tax (type incentive in place) — each system can create small-scale technology certificates and at the time of the install, they can be claimed to get a reduction off the price of the install

"That is reducing each year as time goes by, but there is still a direct benefit which helps with affordability."



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
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### **Facelift for Polgreen Park amenities**

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### **Driving** program hits the skids

A PROGRAM created to subsidise driving lessons for young Australians has reached the end of the road.

The Keys2drive Program, founded in 2008, was an Australian Governmentfunded program providing learner drivers and their caregivers a free lesson with an accredited professional driving instructor.

Accustom Driving School and Training Centre, Kadina, provided the program locally and state-wide for more than nine years and directors Kevin and Nelly Burgemeister said they were shocked when the funding was axed.

"If anything, we thought (the funding) would be increased because it was such a great program," they said.

"Keys2drive had a real emphasis on road safety rather than just 'passing a test'.

"We found it beneficial to have caregivers involved in the lesson to reiterate road safety to everyone while the driver was a learner — before being able to drive on their own.

"It also allowed learners to

gain more basic road skills, rather than a supervisor just directing them and telling them what to, giving them the ability to think for themselves."

Kevin and Nelly said thousands of learner drivers took the course locally every year and to see it ending at a time the road toll in South Australia was worsening was very sad.

"It is also worrying, as the cost of living increases, families won't have access to a free lesson and may choose to cut back on paid lessons because services aren't cheap," they

"We hope the state government might throw some funding behind a new but similar program because being able to implement road safety in a practical way is so important."

A federal Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Development, Regional Communications and the Arts spokesperson said the Australian Automobile Association advised the Australian Government in late 2022 of the decision to not seek further funding for the Keys2drive Program beyond

ported the program with \$55 million since it began in 2008," the spokesperson said.

"Driver education and licensing is the responsibility of state and territory governments; however, the Australian Government has supported the Keys2drive Program and others like it to support Australians to be safer on our roads — demonstrating our commitment to road safety.

"We are committed to supporting new programs and initiatives aligned with the National Road Safety Strategy 2021-30 and National Road Safety Action Plan 2023-25, which have been agreed upon by the Australian, state and territory governments."

### **Government's commitment to road safety**

IN the recent 2023-24 federal budget, the government increased its funding commitment to road safety.

More than \$4 million has been committed to the new National Road Safety Action Grants Program over four years, which will provide non-infrastructure grants to help implement the National Road Safety Action Plan 2023-25.


Community education and awareness, including young driver training, is one of the focus areas of this new program.

A federal Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development, Communications and the Arts spokesperson said the government would also continue

delivering road safety improvements through the Road Safety Program, with more than \$976m available for new projects across 2023-24 and 2024-25, building on the more than 1400 projects delivered to date.

"In addition, the budget has \$16.5m allocated to the Car Safety Ratings Program to improve testing protocols for new light vehicles and provide safety evaluations for used vehicles," the spokesperson said.

"Through its Office of Road Safety, the government will continue to coordinate and facilitate the national efforts to eliminate road trauma in Australia, including by delivering on these commitments.'





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DHILBA Guuranda-Innes National Park's brush-tailed bettong population is thriving.

New monitoring by researchers as part of the Marna Banggara project, a plan to restore lost native wildlife to southern Yorke Peninsula, found almost half of the 85 bettongs caught had been born on the peninsula.

Nearly every female caught was also carrying pouch young, Northern and Yorke Landscape Board ecologist Derek Sandow said.

About 120 bettongs have now been

released during the past two years as part of Marna Banggara, which is jointly funded through the Northern and Yorke Landscape Board, the Australian Government's National Landcare Program, the South Australian Department for Environment and WWF-Australia, and Foundation for National Parks & Wildlife, in partnership with the Narungga Nation Aboriginal Corporation and with the support of Traditional Custodians, the Narungga

"It's fantastic to see so many new animals in the population," Mr Sandow said.

"It shows the bettongs we released in 2021 and 2022 are comfortable in the landscape, they're finding food, they're finding shelter, and they're finding mates.

"We also caught bettongs from Wedge Island and Western Australia in the same areas, which is a good indicator the two groups are mingling and breeding and that's great for the genetic health of the population."

One of the bettongs caught was a juvenile male — known as a young at foot — whose mum was born on Yorke Peninsula.

almost ready to venture out on his own," University of Adelaide PhD candidate Chloe Frick said. "It's wonderful to see these Yorke

Peninsula-born bettongs are surviving the juvenile stage and now having pouch young of their own."

WWF-Australia's rewilding project manager Rob Brewster said the recent monitoring was the best indication yet the species may successfully reintroduced when there was suitable habitat and ongoing feral predator control.

"If this population can be sustained over time, it would be the first successful reintroduction of this species beyond islands and fenced safe havens," Mr Brewster said.

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

### **SA Water** installs new main at Alford

SA Water crews are installing new water main infrastructure in Alford.

Crews are currently working on a 1.2 kilometre stretch beneath the Bute Road, as part of SA Water's water main management program.

Senior manager of capital delivery Peter Seltsikas said the new pipe was made from PVC, known for having better flexibility and being more resistant to soil movement, compared to fibro-cement.

"Our water main replacement program is one of the ways we are proactively working to limit the frequency and impact of leaks and breaks, which are often caused by soil movement and other environmental factors," he

"Water mains have a lifespan of up to 100 years and the installation of this pipe will help to ensure a secure supply of clean, safe drinking water to local customers well into the future."

Construction will take around 10 weeks to complete, with works typically occurring between 7am and 5pm, Monday to Friday.

"For the safety of our people and the community, we ask residents and road users to please take note of localised traffic management in place while the works are underway," Mr Seltsikas said.

"We will also ensure our customers are notified of any temporary water supply interruptions that are necessary when we move their connections over from the old to new pipes."

"With the funding provided we aim to develop a section of land which extends from the middle years' classrooms to a garden area recently revamped by a volunteering group of

A lucky ticket prize draw came next, the winners selecting their choices from a range of wines and chocolates.


Meanwhile, the social chitchat continued, making for a successful occasion.

Austin McDonald has already built consistent form just a few months into his powerboating career.

The 26-year-old adrenaline junkie, who lives in Wallaroo, has joined the Australian Formula Powerboat Grand Prix circuit for 2023.

McDonald finished eighth in his first race meeting earlier this year and has since chalked up several promising results at races along the east coast of

Growing up in Gawler, McDonald took the traditional route to sprint cars by racing dirt karts as a junior across regional South Australia.

'I was SA2 and 3 for a while in dirt karts and won plenty of races... the best part was being able to race almost every weekend of the year," McDonald said.

"I grew up going to the speedway as a kid so I've always been pretty keen on motorsports."

McDonald and his family shifted to Wallaroo for a sea change about three years ago and, at the same time, he started racing 410ci sprint cars.

"I won a couple of state series in formula 500s, before moving to the premier 410 cubic inch sprint car class," he said.

Having experienced ample success on the dirt from a young age, McDonald turned his attention to the water.

"My dad (Andrew) raced powerboats in the '80s and '90s so I wanted to follow his lead," he said.

'You need a high-level boat to race at all so I bought an F2 Molgaard hull race boat, which weighs about 450 kilograms, from Denmark last year.

"It's fitted with a Mercury Optimax 200XS engine and is averaging about 175 kilometres an hour."

Having missed his grounding years of powerboating, McDonald said he's spent lots of time learning the ins and outs of

"I think I've adapted pretty well and racing pretty competitively at a national level already," he said.

"Basically, each course is 2.7kms with four or five left-hand turns and a right turn. The race is timed at about eight minutes with one lap at the end to decide who wins.

"I've hit speeds of 180-190km/h — it's like you're floating on water, there's nothing like it.

"One of the tests I had to pass to be able to race was the cell test, where they strap you to a cockpit upside down in a pool and you have to get out three times."

McDonald has been juggling his powerboating career whilst managing his own business, Premier Mobility and Equipment Repair Service, which repairs all types of mobility aids in

"I spend about 15 hours a week working on my boat in the shed, meaning lots of late nights working on it after work,"

"With the speeds we race at, you really have to run right through the boat carefully checking all the nuts and bolts before a race.

"We also have to rebalance it some times, depending on where we're racing."

McDonald said joining the International Formula Powerboat Grand Prix circuit was his overarching dream.

"You need to be winning in Australia consistently to get to Europe," he said. "But at the moment I'm pretty focused on learning as much as I can and contin-

uing to improve my speed." McDonald visited his major sponsor Can Do Marine (Copper Coast Marine Centre) whilst meeting some of his sup-


porters at Wallaroo on Friday, May 12. Can Do Marine owner Bruce McKenzie said he was very pleased to be sponsoring Austin McDonald Racing.

"I've always enjoyed working on highpower performance motors, so to be involved with a race boat like Austin's really suits us," McKenzie said.

"I've watched him in three or four race meetings in New South Wales this year.

'The cost of competing in powerboats is big so there's opportunities for other local sponsors to get behind this local boy. "All sponsorship money goes towards

"I have played in the under 20 game for the past two years, but this is the only time I've had the opportunity to wear state colours," Pearce said.


"With the conditions after halftime, players had to work harder with their skills but before that, the ball pinged around a fair bit."

The past few years there have been some gaps between metropolitan and regional opportunities for young netballers," she said.


"It will be great to meet girls from other areas and gain netball knowledge from our coaches."





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

scoring shots.


"It was a really windy day, so I think any forward who can have that sort of impact with a number of factors going against them, has done really well," Pridham said.





### New report highlights best grain varieties

Research Development Corporation has released its latest National Variety Trials Harvest Reports for southern Australia.

The six reports cover Eyre Peninsula; Northern Victoria; Mallee SA and Victoria; Central SA; High Rainfall SA, Victoria and Tasmania; and Wimmera and Upper South East SA.

GRDC Southern Panel and research member agronomist Andrew Ware said the harvest reports were a useful resource to help growers and advisers make better informed decisions when choosing what crop variety to plant.

"The harvest reports show us the potential of some of the new varieties and how they can perform in a really good year, like 2022," he said.

"If you can grow a variety that yields well in both those scenarios — and there are varieties that can do that — then you have a lot of confidence that your choice will do well whether it's a good season or a poorer season.

"The harvest reports have up-to-date information on varietal resistance to help growers plan their management strategies."

The NVT is the largest independent coordinated trial network in the world and harnesses data from more than 650 trials across 300 sites Australia-wide for wheat, barley, canola, chickpea, faba bean, field pea, lentil, lupin, oat and sorghum.

GRDC NVT regional manager south Trevor Garnett said the reports contained accurate, consistent, independent and timely information about existing and newly released commercial varieties.

"The reports help accelerate the adoption of new and superior varieties, ensuring growers can stay at the top of their game and remain profitable," he said.

"For the past two years, much of the southern region has been wetter than normal, a lot normally drier areas had higher yields and a lot of disease — you wouldn't want to judge a variety just on how it performed in those two years.

"The harvest reports contain data for the past five years, allowing growers to assess varietal performance across different years and seasonal conditions.

"They really are an essential tool to help growers find a variety that suits their farming system and local climate conditions, while delivering the best likely outcome under forecasted weather"

Point Riley on Monday last week and managed to return safely with a feed of squid and blue swimmer crabs, which are still about and full of meat. Many other boaties were regularly moving location, an indication the fishing was slow. I slowly fished my way down south of the jetty. The jetty has squid and tommy ruff (Australian herring) after dusk.

Port Hughes/Moonta Bay: A colleague fished Tipara Reef before packing up and heading over to Streaky Bay in his caravan last week. Slow tides did not help but he caught King George whiting, squid and sprat tommies. Garfish reports are slow but the jetties have a few squid. Mullet are in the shallows at Cooper Beach on the high tide.

Point Turton: Those rat kingfish pillaged the jetty again last week as anglers tried for

sauid, tommy ruff and garfish. Boat crews chased whiting, snook and gummy sharks from The Pines and Corny Point.

Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: The run of big tommies continues from both jetties and off the rocks at Foul Bay and Mozzie Flat. A couple of large KG whiting were caught from next to the Foul Bay boat ramp on Sunday when the winds eased a tad. Mullet are off Browns Beach, Gym Beach and the Dust Bowl.

Edithburgh: Tommies and salmon trout are at the jetties at Edithburgh and Wool Bay/Port Giles. Boat crews reported KG whiting, squid and garfish from Wattle Bay, Marion Reef and Troubridge Island (north).

**Ardrossan:** Large numbers of travellers are towing vans and tinnies to this part of YP at the moment. Garfish, tommies, squid and blueys are the main targets with the odd KG whiting coming from the deeper water drops on a fast tide. The jetty has tommies and small squid.
