Yorke Peninsula's Copper Coast is the perfect location to visit if you're looking to relax; we have beautiful white, sandy and safe swimming beaches, and great fishing and diving spots.

The ancestral home of the Nharangga people, the area is also steeped in colonial history, dating back to the peak of South Australia's copper mining days.

With a population of more than 15,000, the Copper Coast's main towns of Kadina, Moonta, Moonta Bay, Port Hughes and Wallaroo are just a 150-kilometre, 90-minute drive from Adelaide.

This is an ideal destination for day trips, short or long stays, and there are many attractions, accommodation and dining

Copper was discovered near what was to become Wallaroo Mines (Kadina) in 1859 and the now Moonta Mines in 1861.

Cornish miners and Welsh smelters soon made their way to Australia's 'Little Cornwall' to extract and process the ore. The mines closed in 1923.

Moonta Mines was recognised as a National Heritage Site in 2017 and, if all goes to plan, could be inscribed on the UNESCO World Heritage List by 2029.

Nowadays, the Copper Coast's prosperity is attributed to the wealth of the land which lends itself to a rich agricultural sector.

Great weather, beaches, fabulous fishing and all amenities, including upgraded boat ramps, make this a special place to visit and

Vibrant retail businesses and service providers support the local community and people visiting the area.

Enjoy a traditional Cornish pasty, coffee and cake, or a meal at one of the many cafes, bakeries or restaurants.

There are many things for you to experience in the area so please drop into or contact the accredited Copper Coast Visitor Information Centres located at 50 Mines Road, Kadina, and Blanche Terrace, Moonta, to plan your stay.

Helpful, friendly staff can provide you with all the up-to-date local information about what to see and do to make the most of your time visiting the Copper Coast.

Relax on the beach, catch some fresh seafood, enjoy the walking and cycling trails, have a game of putt putt mini golf, bowls or golf, or explore all the region has to offer.

Now in its third biennial edition, this flagship regional festival continues to attract thousands of visitors to the region. It's a multi-event program that ignites the senses and celebrates the Copper Coast's creative spirit.

The 2026 festival will feature a wide range of events designed to suit all ages and interests. The program will include a mix of returning favourites and new attractions, showcasing the best of the local creative scene.

FLAME provides a platform for artists, performers and producers to connect with the community and visitors.

Festival goers are encouraged to explore each town's unique contributions and enjoy the warm hospitality of the Copper Coast.

**Moonta Mines** 

Before European settlement began around 1840, following the British colonisation of South Australia, Yorke Peninsula known as Guuranda — was home to the Nharangga people. Four Nharangga clans shared the land: Kurnara in the north, Dilpa in the south, Wari in the west and Windarra in the east.

The Copper Coast name reflects the region's rich copper mining heritage.

On December 17, 1859, shepherd James Boor discovered copper on a pastoral lease held by Walter Watson Hughes and John Duncan, almost 10 kilometres southwest of their sheep station. The find led to the creation of Wallaroo Mines.

Hughes quickly secured mineral leases and, in February 1860, began mining with four Cornish miners from Burra. By midyear, 150 miners were working the site, and the Wallaroo Mining Company was formed. By the mid-1860s, the mine was producing 26,000 tons of ore annually and, between 1870 and 1875, employed around 1000 men and boys.

In May 1861, shepherd Patrick "Paddy" Ryan discovered copper in a wombat hole at what would become Moonta Mines. Hughes obtained a lease and formed the Tipara Mining Association, later renamed Moonta Mining Co. Operations began in late 1861, producing nearly 5000 tons of ore in the first year. By 1865, it employed 1200 men and boys, supporting over 5000 people.

By 1876, Moonta Mines employed 1700 people. In 1890, it amalgamated with Wallaroo Mines. Over the next 33 years, the joint company employed an average of 1900 people, peaking at 2700 in 1906, and extracted ore worth £5.6 million.

In the 1880s, the combined population of Moonta Mines, Moonta, and nearby suburbs exceeded 12,000, with more than 6000 people living and working on the mine site.

Most of the miners were from Cornwall, bringing with them centuries-old hard rock mining expertise and a distinctive cultural heritage.

So influential were the Cornish that Moonta

Mining operations ceased in 1923, and much of the infrastructure was dismantled. However, the impressive Cornish enginehouses, such as Hughes and Richmans, still stand as architectural icons of the era.

became known as Australia's Little Cornwall.

#### **Tentative World Heritage**

Moonta Mines is now considered one of Australia's most significant industrial and cultural heritage sites. In 2024, it was included — alongside Burra — on Australia's World Heritage Tentative List as part of the Australian Cornish Mining Sites, with hopes of achieving UNESCO World Heritage status by 2029.

The National Trust SA Moonta branch has cared for much of the site since 1964. Highlights include the historic school (built for 800 children in 1878), tourist train, lolly shop and interpretive displays.

#### Smelting at Wallaroo

The port town of Wallaroo was surveyed in 1860, with waterfront allotments allocated to the Wallaroo Mining Company for smelting operations. Smelting began in 1861, and the first shipment of refined copper left in January 1862.

The site employed many skilled Welsh smelter men, and Welsh was commonly spoken in the town. Over 65 years, the smelter produced more than 300,000 tons of copper, along with gold, silver, lead and fertiliser by-products.

After closing in 1926, only the 36-metre Hughes Chimneystack was left standing as a lasting monument to the industry.

#### RIDE, WALK, RUN:

# COPPER RAIL TRAIL

Explore the Copper Coast at your own pace along the scenic Rotary Copper Rail Trail — a network of sealed, shared-use walking and cycling paths that connect Moonta, Wallaroo and Kadina.

These trails follow the routes of former railway lines and are perfect for walking, running, cycling or using mobility aids.

Designed with minimal road crossings, they offer a safe and relaxing way to take in the region's rich history and beautiful surroundings.

#### MOONTA TO WALLAROO — 17KM

The newest section of the trail runs between Moonta and Wallaroo, beginning at the Moonta Visitor Information Centre, located in the heritage-listed railway station on Blanche Terrace.

The track winds through scenic countryside and follows the path of the old railway line, arriving at Ryan Street in Wallaroo via Cornish and Park Terraces.

Allow about one hour to cycle or three to four hours to walk each way. Along the route, you'll find interpretive signs, sheltered rest stops, and plenty of photo opportunities.

#### WALLAROO TO KADINA - 8KM

The trail from Wallaroo to Kadina begins near the Wallaroo Town Hall and takes in the Wallaroo Avenue of Honour, a memorial recognising those who lost their lives in service.

From there, the path follows the historical rail corridor to Port Road, Kadina, ending near the roundabout at Powell Terrace.

This section takes around 30 minutes by bike, or 1.5 to two hours on foot.

Like the longer section, it features signage, rest areas and flat, easy terrain.

Whether you're up for a full day of exploration or just a short stroll, the Copper Rail Trail is a great way to connect with the region, its people and its stories.

#### DISCOVER MORE HERITAGE TRAILS

The Copper Coast is rich with history — and it's easy to explore with a network of heritage trails across Moonta, Moonta Mines, Port Hughes, Wallaroo and Kadina.

These local trails are designed to help you uncover the stories, landmarks and hidden gems of the region. Whether you prefer to walk, ride or drive, you'll find a trail that suits your pace and interests.

Each town features its own set of historical trails, from mining and maritime heritage to architectural and cultural highlights.

For more detailed information, see the trail entries in each town's section of this guide.

You can also visit the Copper Coast Visitor Information Centres in Kadina and Moonta, or the Wallaroo Heritage and Nautical Museum, where friendly staff can help you choose a trail and provide brochures and maps to guide your journey.

Take your time, follow the signs, and enjoy discovering the Copper Coast's proud past at your own pace



#### Looking for a fun, social and active way to start your weekend?

Copper Trail parkrun is a free, five-kilometre walk or run held every Saturday morning between Kadina and Wallaroo.

The scenic course starts at 203 Racecourse Road, Kadina — opposite the Kadina Pony Club — and regularly welcomes around 50 participants.

Organised by local volunteers, Copper Trail parkrun is more than just a run or walk. It's a friendly community event with a strong social side — participants often head to a local cafe afterwards to chat and connect.

There's no need to make a regular commitment — just register once at parkrun.com.au before your first event.

Parkrun began in London in 2004. In 2022, the global parkwalk campaign launched to encourage everyone to take part regardless of fitness level. Whether you walk, jog or run, you'll be warmly welcomed. Copper Trail event director Nichole

Yeoward says the local parkrun attracts visitors year-round, with numbers doubling to nearly 100 over Christmas and holiday periods.

"The aim is to bring people together to enjoy a morning run or walk and support each other," she says.

"It's been great to see more people joining in, especially with the parkwalk option."

South Australia's unofficial Statesman parkrun Challenge encourages participants to complete every course in the state (52 as at October 2025), making Copper Trail a popular stop for parkrun tourists.

If you're in the Copper Coast region on a Saturday morning, head to the Rotary shelter opposite the Pony Club off Airport Road by 8am and join the Copper Trail parkrun team.

It's a free, healthy and welcoming way to kickstart your weekend!







# FUN FOR THE WHOLE FAMILY

The Copper Coast is packed with family-friendly fun.
Whether you're travelling with toddlers, teens or pets, there's something here for everyone.

In Moonta, families can explore McCauley Park and Victoria Park — perfect for a relaxing picnic or letting the kids run and play under the shade of native gums. Hire an e-bike from Copper Trails Bike Hire to explore the area on two wheels.

The Polgreen Park bike path offers a fun and educational ride, where children can learn to navigate road signs and line markings in a safe setting.

For summer fun, Splashtown Moonta Bay is a must-visit. This free water park is ideal for cooling off and enjoying the coastal atmosphere. Just a short drive away, the Moonta Mines Tourist Railway offers a scenic loop from the Moonta Mines Museum, complete with guided commentary along the way.

In Wallaroo, you'll find even more seaside adventure. The jetty, sandy beaches, and Wallaroo Adventure Playground are all within walking distance. Visit the Wallaroo Heritage and Nautical Museum for an engaging glimpse into the town's maritime past.

Nearby, the Cutter Canberra, displayed near Office Beach, is a great stop for naval history enthusiasts.

For something a little different, Tarnasey Farm offers hands-on animal experiences and family-friendly accommodation.

In Kadina, the Copper Coast Visitor Information Centre precinct is a one-stop hub for fun. Young visitors can enjoy the indoor playcentre, tackle the putt putt mini golf course, or ride the Copper Coast Railway miniature train, operating on select days. The New Town Playground, with its giant slide, and the Victoria Square train park and the Walk in the Trees trail round out a great day out.

Every town — Moonta, Wallaroo and Kadina — also has a dedicated dog park, so no family member is left out.

To many, the Copper Coast is our beloved home. To others, it is a place to visit and fish, relax and enjoy time with friends and family.

So, a warm welcome to those who are visiting the Copper Coast — please get out and about on our beautiful waters, our impressive jetties and our magnificent beaches and catch a fish, crab or squid.

The Copper Coast Visitors' Guide will help you make the most of your visit and fishing experience!

#### RECREATIONAL FISHING ADVICE

As a result of the harmful algal bloom that emerged in 2025, stock assessments of the waters of Gulf St Vincent, Kangaroo Island and Spencer Gulf showed declines of some species including calamari, garfish and King George whiting, particularly in Gulf St Vincent.

Other species including blue crab and abalone have also been impacted.

Temporary fishing restrictions have been introduced to support recovery. These measures will remain in place until at least June 30, 2026, subject to ongoing scientific review:

- A temporary 50 per cent reduction in bag and boat limits will be implemented for recreational fishing and passenger bag limits for charter boat fishing in the Gulf St Vincent and Kangaroo Island Fishing Zone
- A temporary 50 per cent reduction in bag and boat limits for recreational fishing and passenger bag limits for charter boat fishing will apply to calamari, garfish, blue crab and King George whiting in the Spencer Gulf Fishing Zone, where fishing effort is expected to be increased

 A temporary restriction on all commercial marine scalefish fishing and blue crab fishing will be implemented in Gulf St Vincent and Kangaroo Island Fishing Zone

Subject to existing limits or catch quotas, commercial fishing in Spencer Gulf will remain unaffected. Commercial sardine, abalone and rock lobster fisheries across the state will remain unaffected.

Prawn fisheries will operate as normal, noting a temporary November–December spawning closure will occur in parts of northern Gulf St Vincent.

Fishing restrictions on snapper have been extended until June 30, 2027.

#### **SNAPPER BAN**

A total snapper fishing closure applies off the West Coast and in Spencer Gulf and Gulf St Vincent until June 30, 2027.

The targeting, taking and possession of snapper are prohibited; fines and penalties apply.

#### Rest baits

There is one important rule when choosing bait for fishing — always use fresh bait. Most bait from recognised retail outlets is frozen, so it is important that the freeze has been once only. The best bait for the following fish is:

- Salmon/salmon trout lures and fish strips
- Blue crabs —
   fish heads and frames
- Tommy ruff (Australian herring)
   gents, small cockles and fish flesh
- Garfish gents and small cockles/pipis
- King George whiting softened squid, cockles/pipis, clickers
- Yellowfin whiting bloodworms, cockles/pipis, clickers
- Squid jigs (lures), small whole fish or a peeled potato on a jig

Using a small amount of berley is a great way to attract fish. Acting like a scent trail in the water, berley is available from most fishing tackle stores.

To keep your catch fresh—
especially in warmer months— it's
important to store it properly. Many
experienced fishers use an ice
slurry, which is a thick mix of ice and
water in an esky. For best results,
use saltwater to make the slurry.

Alternatively, you can keep your catch cool by placing a wet towel or hessian bag over it. This helps preserve freshness until you're ready to clean and prepare the fish.

Public art across the Copper Coast is thriving, with installations offering locals and visitors a full day of discovery.

Copper Coast Council has produced art trail brochures for Kadina, Moonta and Wallaroo, along with a separate guide to the fairy doors trail in Kadina CBD. These are available at visitor information centres or online at visitcoppercoast.com.au/arts-and-culture.

"The trails identify public art pieces and allow everyone to discover and appreciate the work of our talented local artists," says Copper Coast Council tourism coordinator Lynn Spurling.

"They offer a chance to experience a wide range of local art and artisan works."

New artworks include the vibrant Windy Wallaroo mural at Wallaroo Primary School and a silo light show in Wallaroo, which is updated every three months. In Moonta, Polgreen Park now has a birthday-themed large-scale artwork

Kadina's CBD has a community photo board in Victoria Square and murals in Graves, Hallett and Goyder streets. A large mural on the old water tower pays tribute to the area's copper mining past and Cornish heritage.

In Moonta's Queen Square, visitors can view the wombat statues and a statue of Sir Richard Williams. A striking double-sided mural in North Beach is another local highlight.

# OPSHOP TREASURE TRAIL

Op shops across the Copper Coast offer a treasure trove of pre-loved items donated by the community and beyond.

From homewares and clothing to books and toys, these shops are a great place to find a bargain — and support a good cause.

As well as supporting a local charity, such as the Salvos and Vinnies, op shops support sustainability and the circular economy. The region is home to a mix of commercial and not-for-profit op shops, each with its own unique offerings.

In Kadina, the not-for-profit St Vincent de Paul (Vinnies) store is located at 7 Doswell Terrace. It stocks a wide selection of affordable items, including homewares, toys, games and knick-knacks.

Store manager Sharon Nelson says their stock is carefully selected by volunteers:

"We don't put anything out unless we're completely happy with it," she says. "We take pride in the stock that is put out and hope there is something nice for everyone.

"Ladies' clothes are definitely our popular items, as well as kids' books and toys. From the tourist side, books and DVDs seem to be a big seller."

Funds raised through the shop support the Vinnies assistance program.

"If we make more than what they need, the funds also go towards other programs that Vinnies run," Ms Nelson says.

Other programs include Fred's Van meal service, refugee/asylum seeker help, youth and senior buddy programs, and more.

Vinnies Kadina is open 10am to 4pm, Monday to Friday, and 9am to 1pm, Saturday. More volunteers are always wanted. Contact 8821 3931 for more information.



The museum highlights the challenges and ingenuity of life on the land, from early land clearing to the evolution of farming methods. Exhibits explore the transition from horse-drawn equipment to tractor-powered farming, with a vast collection of vintage machinery on display.

You'll also find exhibits that go beyond the paddock, exploring the role of women and children on the farm in Her Side of the Story and Farmyard. Starting between Powell Terrace and Port Road in Kadina, near the western roundabout, the trail stretches approximately eight kilometres and features minimal vehicle crossings, making it ideal for families and recreational users.

Travel time is around 30 minutes by bike or 1.5 to 2 hours on foot each way.

Along the route, you'll find shelter stops, interpretive signage and peaceful surroundings — making this trail both a relaxing journey and an informative experience.

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



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#### COPPER COAST VISITOR INFORMATION CENTRE

Located in the former railway station — built in 1909 — the Copper Coast Visitor Information Centre welcomes travellers at the entrance to town.

Visitors can pick up pamphlets and maps of the area, browse a range of quality souvenirs and giftware, and explore books about Moonta's rich history. While in the grounds, take a moment to view the World War I trophy gun and learn more about its background.

#### MOONTA MINES MUSEUM

Moonta Mines Museum is housed in the former Moonta Mines Model School, built in 1878. At its peak, the school educated up to 1250 students and remained a central part of the community for 90 years before closing in 1968.

The museum tells the story of the Cornish pioneers who came to South Australia during the copper mining boom between 1861 and 1923.

Across 14 rooms, the museum features displays on mining life, lodges and friendly societies, sports and pastimes, and the hardships of daily life. Exhibits include costumes, china, silverware, photographs and memorabilia, as well as a reconstructed circa 1900 classroom.

#### MOONTA MINES TOURIST RAILWAY

A trip on the hugely popular, award-winning tourist train leaves from the station located in the Moonta Mines Museum car park. It takes passengers on an entertaining 50-minute guided tour through the historic landmarks of the former mining operations. Sit back and listen to the history of the region and the stories of the world-renowned Cornish miners, the mines' workings and ore sorting floors, reservoir and the tunnel through Ryans Skimping Heap, as well as other interesting tales.

#### THE BLACKSMITH SHOP

Step back in time at the Moonta Mines Blacksmith Shop — a working display that shows how a traditional blacksmith operated during the copper mining era. Watch demonstrations and browse a selection of handcrafted items available for purchase.

#### MOONTA MINES SWEET SHOP

Often considered a must-visit on the Copper Coast, the Moonta Mines Sweet Shop is located in the former Moonta Mines Post Office. This charming store offers a large variety of old-fashioned sweets and drinks - perfect for a nostalgic treat or gift.

#### MINERS COTTAGE AND GARDEN

Opened by the National Trust as a museum in 1967, the cottage is preserved for present and future generations so they may appreciate the way Cornish families lived in an era with no reticulated water or electricity. Step back in time and see the pioneers' way of life. The cottage and its magnificent garden are lovingly tended by a group of enthusiastic volunteers.

#### MOONTA MINES CHURCH

Built in 1865, this stone chapel is a replica of the Wesleyan Chapel in Truro, Cornwall. The foundation stone was laid by local mining icon Cap'n H. R. Hancock.

A gallery was added in 1872, increasing seating capacity to 1250. In 1890, a pipe organ was purchased with a donation from Cap'n Hancock. The building was purchased by the Adelaide-based Field of Dreams Church in 2022.

#### **HUGHES ENGINEHOUSE**

Hughes Enginehouse is one of Moonta Mines' iconic buildings and features prominently in almost all of Moonta's promotional material. Erected between 1863 and 1865, the building contained a 60-inch Cornish beam pumping engine whose function was to pump water from the underground workings on the largest ore bodies, which made it a significant contributor to the Moonta Mining Company's success. The engine pumped water from the adjacent shaft at a depth of 366 metres, and from Taylors Shaft 300 metres to the north at a depth of 768 metres, until the mines closed in 1923.

#### **RICHMANS ENGINEHOUSE**

Built in 1869 by Frederick May, Richmans Enginehouse was constructed using stone gathered from local beaches.

It housed a 32-inch Cornish beam engine that pumped water from nearby Stuckeys Shaft. The water was used to power boilers, and support the concentration, crushing and treatment plants, as well as an adjacent

#### SKIMPING HEAPS

Remnants of Moonta's copper mining era, the skimping heaps contain the materials left behind after ore was concentrated and prepared for transport to Wallaroo for smelting.

Richmans Concentrator Way, Ryan Road and Verco Street, Moonta Mines.

#### MOONTA FAMILY HISTORY AND RESOURCE CENTRE

The resource centre, located in the historic Moonta School of Mines, is run by friendly volunteers with extensive experience in family history research.

Visitors can use the available equipment and facilities to explore their own family heritage — particularly Cornish ancestry.

The centre also features interesting collections, including a large medical display, working mine models and historic photographs.

#### Ellen Street, Moonta.

#### MOONTA BAY JETTY

The long L-shaped jetty at Moonta Bay is a favourite for recreational fishing. Common catches include Australian herring (tommy ruff), garfish and squid — especially in the late afternoon and evening when the tide is coming in. The jetty also provides access to a safe swimming enclosure, making it ideal for families.

Stretching from Moonta Bay to Port Hughes, the sandy beach suits all ages. At low tide, there's plenty of space to play and explore the shallow rock pools.

#### SECRET GARDEN

Tucked away near Moonta Bay beach, the Secret Garden is a much-loved local spot, beautifully maintained by residents.

This tree-shaded grassed area is ideal for picnics and small weddings. It includes child-friendly seating and is accessed by steps. A short path connects the garden to the beach, making it a peaceful and scenic place to relax.

#### DINING IN MOONTA, MOONTA BAY AND PORT HUGHES

#### MOONTA GALLERY OF THE ARTS

Moonta Gallery of the Arts features a new exhibition each month, often launched with an opening event. Exhibitions showcase a wide range of styles and themes — from local artists to internationally renowned names. Most artworks are available for purchase.

#### Moonta Town Hall, George Street.

#### **QUEEN SQUARE MARKETS**

Held on long weekends, the Moonta Country Markets in Queen Square attract large crowds and a vibrant mix of stallholders. Browse crafts, toys, collectables, jewellery, books, fresh produce and bric-a-brac. Enjoy a variety of food and drinks, including baked goods and homemade treats.

#### COPPER RAIL TRAIL

Copper Rail Trail links Moonta and Wallaroo via a sealed 17-kilometre track. Starting at the Moonta Visitor Information Centre on Blanche Terrace, the trail follows the old railway line. In Wallaroo, it passes along Cornish and Park Terraces before finishing at Ryan Street.

Allow about one hour each way by bike, or three to four hours on foot. There are several road crossings along the route, please give way to traffic.

#### SHARED PATHWAYS

Moonta Bay, Moonta and Port Hughes are also connected by safe, convenient shared pathways, perfect for leisurely strolls or bike rides.

The Coast Road Shared Path is also underway, with Stage 1 connecting Bay Road to Rossiters Road in Moonta Bay.

Once finished, this path will seamlessly link Moonta Bay with Port Hughes.

#### MOONTA HERITAGE TRAIL

A relaxed drive, covering about 16 kilometres, the Moonta Heritage Trail starts and ends at the Moonta Town Hall and can be completed in two hours or less. The trail gives visitors an enjoyable and well-rounded tour of the history and development of Moonta and adjacent settlements.

#### MOONTA HERITAGE WALK

Many of Moonta's buildings were erected between 1863 and 1875, with most of these retaining their authentic shopfronts and verandahs. The Moonta Heritage Walk starts and finishes at the Moonta Town Hall and covers many of the town's shops, hotels, banks, the post office, meeting halls and several residences.

#### MOONTA MINES WALKING TRAILS

Explore the history of the Moonta Mines — part of a tentative World Heritage Site — on a series of scenic walking trails that highlight the remains of the region's copper mining era. Paddy Ryan's Walk is a five-kilometre return trail from the Moonta Mines Museum to the

trail from the Moonta Mines Museum to the old railway station. Allow around two hours to complete the loop. Richmans Walk takes you from the museum

to the Richmans Enginehouse area and back. This two-kilometre trail takes about 90 minutes to explore.

Truer's Walk, also starting at the museum, leads to the Truer's area and covers approximately 2.5 kilometres. Plan for around 90 minutes for a return trip.

Hughes Walk offers a shorter option, taking visitors around the historic Hughes Enginehouse site. A comfortable walk of about 30 minutes allows time to explore the area.

Hancocks Walk begins either at the Miner's Cottage or the Moonta Mines Sweet Shop, with signage to guide you along the way. This trail takes around an hour and can be walked in either direction.

#### **PORT HUGHES JETTY**

Port Hughes jetty is a popular fishing spot, especially for blue swimmer crabs, Australian herring (tommy ruff), garfish and squid. Whether you're an experienced angler or just starting out, it's an ideal place to cast a line and enjoy the coastal atmosphere.

#### PORT HUGHES BOAT RAMP

Port Hughes is home to one of South Australia's busiest boat ramps, featuring six lanes for launching and retrieving. The site includes ample parking and wash-down facilities.

Daily permits are available via the EasyPark app, and annual permits can be purchased from the Copper Coast Council's Kadina office. For more details, visit coppercoast.sa.gov.au.

#### PORT HUGHES MEMORIAL

Located on the Port Hughes foreshore, this unique memorial honours those who set sail from Port Hughes, Simms Cove and Moonta Bay but did not return, as well as locals who lost their lives at sea elsewhere. The memorial is interactive, with plaques featuring QR codes that link to the stories of each of the 23 remembered seafarers.

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# WALLAROO

#### Wallaroo, home to more than 4700 people, offers a mix of places to eat, stay and shop.

The town's shipping terminal supports international grain exports and

Once South Australia's second-busiest port, Wallaroo has preserved many historical buildings from its mining and smelting heyday.

Visitors are drawn to Wallaroo's stunning coastline, boating and fishing spots, walking trails and resort-style atmosphere. The town also invites you to explore its rich heritage and connection to South Australia's past.

#### WALLAROO BEACHES

Wallaroo has several beaches, including Office Beach, North Beach (pictured) and Sailing Club Beach — all great spots for swimming.

North Beach is one of the few beaches in South Australia where you can still drive a vehicle. The area is also popular with scuba divers and snorkellers, and Wallaroo is a favourite destination for those chasing a great day's fishing.



#### WALLAROO INFORMATION OUTLET

The Wallaroo Information Outlet is located inside the Wallaroo Heritage and Nautical Museum on Jetty Road.

Along with local visitor information, you can also purchase souvenirs of your visit.

#### WALLAROO HERITAGE AND NAUTICAL MUSEUM

Housed in Wallaroo's first post office, built in 1865, the museum offers fascinating insights into the town's early years as a key South Australian port.

Extensive displays cover the copper smelting era (1861-1923), maritime history, shipwrecks, railways, postal and telephone services, local religion, civic life, entertainment, sport, wartime experiences and general local

The large nautical section highlights the region's strong ties to copper mining, agriculture and the sea. More than 70 ship models, along with photographs, documents, relics and record books, showcase the rich history of Wallaroo's port.

A standout exhibit is George the giant squid - discovered inside a whale caught off Albany, Western Australia, many years ago.

#### WALLAROO GUIDED **WALKING TOURS**

Take a historical walk through Wallaroo and discover the stories behind many buildings listed on the South Australian Heritage Register. Tours run during peak tourism periods, or you can book a private group tour by appointment.

Each tour takes about 90 minutes and departs from the Wallaroo Heritage and Nautical Museum.

#### WALLAROO HERITAGE TRAIL

Starting at the Wallaroo Heritage and Nautical Museum, this self-quided driving trail covers about nine kilometres and takes less than 90 minutes to complete.

The route passes several sites of historical interest and gives visitors a glimpse into the history and development of Wallaroo.

#### WALLAROO HERITAGE WALK

This self-guided walk explores the town centre and highlights commercial and public buildings dating back to 1861.

Many of the buildings along the Owen Terrace streetscape were constructed between 1864 and 1900. While their appearances remain largely intact, their uses have changed significantly over time.

#### WALLAROO SMELTERS TRAIL

At the base of the Hughes chimneystack near the Wallaroo foreshore is the Wallaroo Smelters Trail. This is a short walk with interpretive signs explaining the early smelting history of Wallaroo.



trail pays tribute to residents who lost their lives at war.

#### COPPER RAIL TRAIL

The sealed Rotary Copper Rail Trail follows former railway corridors, connecting Wallaroo with Kadina and Moonta.

This shared trail allows people to walk, run, cycle or use mobility aids between the three towns with minimal road crossings.

The track to Kadina begins with the Wallaroo Avenue of Honour — near the Wallaroo Town Hall — recognising those who lost their lives

The Moonta trail starts on Ryan Street, Wallaroo, then follows Cornish and Park Terraces before joining the original railway

There are informative signs, shelter stops and scenic highlights along the way.

#### WALLAROO COMMUNITY SPORTS CLUB

Opened in 2011, the Wallaroo Community Sports Club is home to the local golf, croquet and bowling clubs.

The venue features indoor carpeted rinks, a bar and a function centre with seating for up to 300 people.
