BANNING trucks longer than 30 metres from driving at night is among a range of proposals from Yorke Peninsula Council as it seeks to improve safety on its roads.

Other possible measures for heavy vehicles outlined in a new report include speed reductions to 30km/h. daylight-driving-only permits, and no permits to be issued during wet weather.

The proposals have been slammed by Grain Producers South Australia and the South Australian Road Transport Association, with both organisations saying they have not yet been consulted on any possible changes.

The proposals are part of a Heavy Vehicle Access Strategy for managing safety risks associated with truck use of the road network managed by YPC.

The council is seeking community feedback on the strategy, with submissions closing on Friday, May 24.

The strategy document, tabled at this month's council meeting, outlined that YPC had about 3300km of unsealed roads, the largest such network in SA.

YPC chief executive Andrew Cameron this week said the council also has about 530km of sealed roads, including about 330km of sealed rural

"Council's unsealed road network is primarily used by those in the agricultural industry to facilitate the movement of livestock and grain off-farm as well as the movement of agricultural equipment between paddocks," Mr Cameron said.

The strategy document states up to \$70 million in upgrades are needed for big road trains carrying grain to operate more safely on the roads, but that is "not going to happen", so alternative plans are needed.

The plans are intended to balance road safety with transport-access needs and the community's capacity to pay for road maintenance.

Funding for road maintenance in the 2023-2024 budget is about \$600,000 per year, the strategy states.

Improving mental health care

I FEEL very sad for the people affected by the tragic events at Bondi recently, particularly families of the deceased and the heroic police officer forced to shoot the perpetrator.

In Australia, we regard all human life as sacrosanct.

However, increasing security in shopping centres and powers of security personnel is a mere Band-Aid fix.

The root causes must be addressed.

Schizophrenia and its related serious mental health diseases are currently receiving random, uncoordinated management at best.

With the almost normalisation of abuse of mind-altering drugs, chemical imbalance in the brain seems to be increasing, resulting in irrational and delusional behaviour.

There are too few mental health practitioners who are stretched and stressed due to financial and other constraints.

The ideology of treating the whole person, resulting in closure of mental health hospitals in the past, has led to a "jack of all trades, master of none" approach to health care.

It has reduced the ability of our health system to provide mental health centres of excellence, where research, knowledge, expertise and coordinated management of serious mental illnesses could develop.

General hospitals have to cope with mental illnesses with little or no necessary intense

Added to this is the idealised view of the rights of everyone to be free to make their own decisions.

But, where serious mental illnesses are concerned, they sometimes impinge on the rest of society's rights to safety, wellbeing and freedom to work, shop and play unhindered.

There are currently too few competent and experienced practitioners to closely monitor the serious cases.

Ardrossan has lost its hospital, swimming beach and has a poor boat ramp.

Please do not let the jetty become another loss of history for our town.

Snapper set loose

THE release of a new batch of 20,000 young snapper attracted more than 50 interested onlookers to Black Point boat ramp during the chilly dawn of Monday morning.

The snapper fingerlings release is part of a state government program to help repopulate the fish in South Australian waters.

State primary industries minister Clare Scriven helped release some of the small fish from buckets, as did several children who braved the cold water to get their feet wet on Monday, April 22.

Ms Scriven said the ongoing snapper release program was on track and progressing well.

"It's fantastic to be here today celebrating with the community the restocking program," Ms Scriven said.

"It's a really good crowd, particularly since it is so early in the morning," she said.

She said the government has invested more than \$5 million in the science of repopulating snapper.

"Hopefully we now see stronger snapper stocks into the future."

Narungga Nation Aboriginal Corporation chief executive Doug Milera said the stretch of coastline where the fish were released is important to local Indigenous people.

"The sea country has provided sustenance for thousands of years and, although stocks are depleted, bringing back these fingerlings to multiply and regenerate can provide not only for the immediate future but for our grandchildren and their grandchildren," Mr Milera said.


"We're providing sustainability so future generations can have a feed of snapper down the track."

More than 100,000 snapper fingerlings were released into the northern Spencer Gulf as part of the program in January

They are bred at the Aquatics Sciences Centre at West Beach by the South Australian Research and Development Institute, the research division for the Department of Primary Industries and Regions.

SARDI has delivered annual releases of fingerlings since 2021 after successfully breeding snapper from adult brood stock collected from Spencer Gulf and Gulf St Vincent in early 2020.

The waters of Spencer Gulf, Gulf St Vincent and the West Coast remain closed to snapper fishing until June 2026.

Memorial given given light

IN AN about face, Yorke Peninsula Council elected members have voted to support the installation of a permanent war memorial at the Port Clinton seafront, reversing a resolution made in December.

It is proposed the memorial be placed at the corner of Yoolamardy Terrace and Yelta Street, where the town's annual Anzac Day dawn service is held.

Before the new decision was agreed to at the council's meeting last Wednesday, April 17, Port Clinton resident and Iraq War veteran Dusty Miller spoke passionately in support of the memorial.

Mr Miller told those present, including Mayor Darren Braund, councillors and about 10 supporters in the public gallery, he could not understand why the YPC had not backed the war memorial proposal at its December meeting.

"Before I start speaking, I'd like to apologise for my outburst in December when I left when that decision was made," Mr Miller said.

"I was just pretty emotionally charged up."

Mr Miller said there are a "very small number of people" opposing the memorial, and many of them are not permanent residents.

"We are not trying to build the Great Wall of China here (but) merely a small, permanent monument"

He said the Port Clinton Anzac Day service attracted about 180 people last year, and it was not "practical or safe" to hold it in front of the community hall, as had been suggested.

"Holding a dawn service on the main road outside our community hall completely lacks the emotion, vision and environment that the foreshore reserve has."

More than 80 per cent of the town's residents support the permanent memorial, he said.

"This project is not about personalities; it's about respecting our diggers," Mr Miller said.

Before the favourable vote, the elected members held in-camera discussions which lasted more than half an hour.

Returning to the public domain, councillors then voted to "support a permanent ANZAC Memorial installation at the corner of Yoolamardy Terrace and Yelta Street, Port Clinton, subject to the necessary consents being obtained."

A community member first contacted the council seeking approval for a permanent memorial at the site in 2021, and a completed application was submitted in February 2022.

The initial proposal featured a 90 centimetre tall, 120cm wide, etched black metal plaque; these plans later changed to include an 120cm tall metal soldier on each side.

Port Clinton Progress Association was then asked to seek further consultation and a petition with 133 signatures in the plan's favour was presented the following September.

After more community-led consultation, elected members decided the proposal hadn't met the requirements of the council's Community Engagement Policy and a further council-led consultation process would take place.

Only 13 submissions were made, with an option for a temporary structure put in place for the services receiving the most votes (eight).

Push to streamline EV charging zones

CRACKING down on people parking in designated electric vehicle charging station spaces is one focus of a range of new road-rule changes

Two new offences have been brought in to stop non-electric cars from parking in EV parking areas, and stop EVs parking in a charging area when not being charged.

The first offence will attract a \$75 on-thespot fine, while the second will result in a fine of about \$110.

Councils will install more EV parking bay signs to help remind drivers.

State Transport Minister Tom Koutsantonis said the road-rule changes are all about safety and accessibility.

"(We are) embracing the increasing numbers of electric vehicles on our roads by ensuring smooth integration and access to charging infrastructure," Mr Koutsantonis said.

"These broader amendments introduce practical changes that align with the state government's vision for safer roads and better support for families."

Port Broughton EV owner Ben Ervin said the network of chargers in regional areas is continuing to expand, making the cars a more accessible option for country people.

"I bought an EV to catch up with some of the newer models of vehicles and to help move towards greener energy," he said.

Further road-rule changes include removing restrictions on some types of child restraints to make it easier for parents and carers of children with a medical condition or disability to source specifically designed models.

Parents and carers will also no longer be required to have child restraints inspected, but will still need to carry a certificate from a medical practitioner when driving.

There are also changes to U-turn rules and giving way to cyclists and pedestrians.

It is also now illegal to interrupt or interfere with funeral processions.

The changes to the Australian Road Rules

were approved by all transport ministers in June. The Australian Road Rules are a national body of laws governing the use of roads, footpaths and other shared spaces. Media contact: Tom Richardson 0416 144 977



Slow down to 25km/h when passing breakdown services vehicles

DRIVERS will now need to slow to 25 kilometres per hour when passing a stationary breakdown services vehicle, such as an RAA van or tow truck, with flashing amber lights.

The new speed limit only applies to drivers who are on the same side of the road as the breakdown services vehicle.

Failure to slow down may result in a fine and demerit points based on the level of speeding, with a maximum court penalty of \$2500.

The new legislation from the state government is aimed at improving the safety of breakdown service workers as well as drivers and passengers when stopped at the roadside.

Transport Minister Tom Koutsantonis said inattentive driving around breakdown sites can have dire consequences.

"(Roadside) workers might be out of sight, underneath the vehicle working on a repair or changing a tyre - and there may also be small children nearby waiting with their family to get back on the road," Mr Koutsantonis said.

RAA workers attend almost 1000 callouts a day in South Australia, with an increasing number on high-speed arterial roads where the workers are particularly vulnerable to passing traffic.


There have been 20 reportable safety incidents in the past four years caused by cars driving past breakdowns without due care, according to RAA data.

Australian Manufacturing Workers Union assistant state secretary Stuart Gordon said roadside workers deserve to be safe when doing their jobs.

"The members of the AMWU in the RAA have been campaigning for 20 years to see these reforms introduced after a road-side worker was nearly killed by a driver who hit a roadside assistant vehicle in 2003," Mr Gordon said.

This legislation is an extension of the existing 25km/h speed limit when passing frontline volunteers and emergency services workers responding to incidents at the roadside.





Petitioning Plibersek for Moonta World Heritage

Minister on a Marna Banggara tour

FEDERAL environment minister Tanya Plibersek visited the Marna Banggara project at Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park and Flaherty Beach during her day on the peninsula.

Ms Plibersek met a brush-tailed bettong (yalgi in Narungga) — one of those which has been returned to southern Yorke Peninsula after more than a century's absence — in the national park's visitor centre, thanks to Animals Anonymous.

Marna Banggara (Narungga for healthy or prosperous Country) project manager Derek Sandow and ecologist Claire Hartvigsen-Power explained the role of the yalgi as a soil engineer and how its digging turns over the soil, composts leaf litter and creates divots to catch seeds for new plant growth, an NYLB spokesperson said.

'The group visited a malleefowl mound in the

park and discussed how species like the malleefowl and heath goanna are indicators of the landscape's health," the spokesperson said.

Narungga Elder Cyril Kartinyeri performed a Welcome to Country and shared how Narungga people are part of the Marna Banggara project.

At Flaherty Beach, the minister was shown the predator control fence that prevents foxes and feral cats entering the project area.

It was a wonderful opportunity to show Minister Plibersek the scale of the Marna Banggara project area, which stretches across 170,000 hectares, the spokesperson said.

The minister also visited the Moving Murals project at Warooka and met with Yorke Peninsula community members.

The Northern and Yorke Landscape Board, which is leading the Marna Banggara project, hosted the minister's visit.

MOONTA Mine's World Heritage bid became a point of discussion when federal environment minister Plibersek visited Peninsula this month.

Copper Coast Council took the opportunity to raise the topic with Ms Plibersek in Warooka, during her trip to Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park on Thursday, April 11.

Ms Plibersek makes World Heritage nominations, of which countries can propose only one per year, on Australia's behalf.

"The department understands the Regional Council of Goyder and the Copper Coast Council have put a lot of effort into preparing a World Heritage nomination for the Australian Cornish Mining Sites: Burra and Moonta," an environment department spokesperson said.

"The department looks forward to receiving the relevant documentation for this when it's

endorsed a proposed draft universal values statement, which will need to be endorsed by the state government and then federal government for the sites to reach the national World Heritage Tentative List.

State deputy premier Susan Close, who is also SA's environment minister, is expected to visit the Moonta Mines and Burra at the end of May, which will serve as a formal endorsement and move the bid forward.

CCC chief executive Dylan Strong said the council's meeting with Ms Plibersek was highly constructive, and underscored the efforts of the Australian Cornish Mining Sites comprising Consortium, Copper Coast Council, the Regional Council of Goyder and National Trust SA.

"It is imperative that we maintain our advocacy to all levels of government to achieve the recognition this bid deserves," Mr Strong said.

CCC economic development and community engagement coordinator Holly Cowan said At its April 3 meeting, CCC the meeting was an opportunity

to share the progress of the bid since its official origins in 2019.

"The importance of this bid on a global scale outlines the technological advances made in mining that were then adapted over the world but also the Cornish cultural transfer that happened in Australia," Ms Cowan said.

Ms Cowan said world heritage listing would result in economic benefits for and global scale interest in the region, including site maintenance funding and increased tourism.

Council is continuing ongoing conversations with Yorke Peninsula Indigenous group Narrunga Nation Aboriginal Corporation and expects other aspects such as storytelling and interpretation to also be included in the bid.

Moonta Mines and Burra contain the most authentic and historically significant components of the Cornish mining landscape in Australia for the period 1845 to 1923.

Moonta Mines received National Heritage listing in

Buckle up for changes

"THIS funding has been secured from a three per cent rate levy on primary producers," it states.

There is a serious limit to what this can achieve but it is a start."

An accompanying report says the strategy is based on expert analysis by engineering consultant HDS Australia and consultation with the council's External Roads Working Party and the community at forums in Maitland and Yorketown in October 2022.

Many of the council's roads have inbuilt issues that pose a risk to road-user safety if the road network remains open to B-double use, the report states.

"This presents a civil liability risk to council.

"Council needs to have a strategy which provides a level of network access for heavy vehicles that balances the tension between the majority of real heavy vehicle access needs and the community's willingness to pay for such safe access?

During the meeting, Councillor Naomi Bittner questioned the proposal to restrict heavy vehicles to daylight hours, which she said would cover the period between 5pm and 7am in winter and could be a restriction of trade.

"If you've got a road train and you're trying to get home to your farm and you get to Federation Corner (intersection of Copper Coast Highway and Yorke Highway) and it's 4.55pm, what do you do?" she said.

"Do you pull up at Federation Corner for a night? Do you unhook

"I do appreciate the need to be seen to be implementing as many safety regulations as possible but I just think that restricting their operation to 10 hours per day is not fea-

Cr Scott Hoyle said the truck industry is constantly changing the way it operates and one of the main issues road upgrades.

"It's pretty clear that what's lacking here is funding for roads," he said.

GPSA chief executive Brad Perry said this week he is "flabbergasted" by the proposals, some of which could bring harvest to a halt, particularly in areas where unsealed roads are the only option for transporting

"Suggestions such as reducing speed limits, night curfews and restrictions in wet weather for heavy vehicles raise more questions than answers," he said.

"What constitutes daylight hours? How wet will be too wet for a heavy vehicle to operate?

"Who would police the new speed limits for heavy vehicles?

"The SA grain industry is a \$4 billion sector, and YP plays a critical role in this."

Mr Perry said GPSA acknowledged the condition of the roads and that safety should be paramount.

SARTA executive officer Steve Shearer said the proposals would harm the local economy.

"If the industry cannot use B-doubles, there will be 50 per cent more trucks on the road to get the job done, which would be utterly counterproductive," Mr Shearer

"It would increase road conges-

tion, increase road safety risk, increase emissions and dramatically increase the cost of transport for the primary producers, probably harming their capacity to compete in the market."

Mr Shearer said banning nighttime road use by heavy vehicles would be "absurd" and dramatically increase the number of trucks on the road during the day.

"Suggesting 30km/h speed limits shows a lack of appreciation of the fact that fuel is typically one-third of a truck operator's cost structure.

"At 30km/h the fuel consumption sky rockets, again hiking transport costs for farmers."

Once the current community consultation is completed, elected members will consider any staff recommendations for amendment before the strategy is presented for endorsement.

If approved, it will then be incorporated into a management plan for the road network.

New skin clinic open for checks

YORKE Peninsula's first specialist skin-care clinic has opened for business in Kadina.

YP Skin and Aesthetics, part of Kadina Medical Associates, offers skin assessments, cancer surveillance, health and sun safety education, varicose vein treatments, treatments for conditions such as eczema and dermatitis, and a range of cosmetic procedures.

The clinic is led by medical director Dr Will Daehn, a rural generalist with qualifications in primary care dermatology and aesthetic medicine, who has worked at KMA since 2017.

"Skin checks are strongly recommended for all adults in Australia over the age of 30," he said.

"Risk factors for skin cancer include having multiple moles, fair skin, a past history of sun exposure or solarium use, and a family history of melanoma.

"Melanoma is a type of skin cancer that develops in the skin cells called melanocytes and usually occurs on the parts of the body that have been overexposed to the sun.

"Australia has the world's highest rate for melanoma and it is the third most commonly diagnosed cancer in Australia.

"Often melanoma has no symptoms, however, the first sign is generally a change in an existing mole or the appearance of a new spot."

Dr Daehn said Squamous Cell Carcinoma accounts for about 30 per cent of non-melanoma skin cancers.

"It begins in the upper layer of the epidermis (top skin layer) and usually appears where the skin has had the most exposure to the sun, such as on the head, neck, hands, forearms and lower legs.

Dr Daehn said about 700 Australians die each year from SCC and it generally grows quickly across weeks or months.

"Although when caught early, SCC (patients) have a good prognosis," he said.

Treatment for varicose vein conditions can be provided at the clinic by Dr Marissa Zamora, who is completing sclerotherapy training with the Australian College of Phlebology.

One passenger, a 32-year-old local woman, was taken to hospital with non-life-threatening injuries and a second passenger, a 17-year-old boy also from Yorke Peninsula, was not injured.

Yorke Mid North police are investigating the circumstances surrounding the crash.

Phone detection trial begins

South Australia's first phonedetection cameras have been installed at four busy locations across Adelaide, targeting motorists who use their mobiles while driving.

The sites are South Road, Torrensville, Southern Expressway, Darlington, North-South Motorway, Regency Park, and Port Wakefield Road, Gepps Cross.

A fifth site at Port Road, Hindmarsh, will go live in coming weeks.

During the testing phase, April to June, vehicles will be photographed and validated by SA Police but no further action will be taken against drivers until June 19, when a threemonth grace period begins.

Owners will be issued a warning letter and, from September 19, fines of \$450 and three demerit points will apply.

In a trial of the technology last year, SA Police detected one in 84 drivers using their mobile phones, at an average of 177 times a day.

The cameras are part of a \$15.9 million state government investment in reducing the common behaviour, which increases a driver's crash risk by at least four times.

SAPOL branch Superintendent Darren Fielke said distraction is one of the Fatal Five causes of road deaths.

"Our message to drivers is simple: leave your phone alone while driving," Superintendent Fielke said.

Taking your eyes off the road, even for a split second, to read or respond to a message, slows down your reaction time and increases the chances of having a crash."

Seven of the 27 lives lost on SA roads this year have been linked to distraction.

Snowtown accomplice out of prison

Snowtown bodies in the barrels accomplice Mark Ray Haydon has been released on parole after 25 years behind bars.

Haydon will live at a minimumsecurity unit the Adelaide Pre-release Centre until his sentence ends in late

Conditions include electronic monitoring, curfew, and no contact with the media.

He was granted parole in February, but was subject to an automatic provision under the Correctional Services during which Commissioner Grant Stevens, Attorney-General Kyam Maher and Commissioner for Victims' Rights Sarah Quick could ask for a review of a parole board decision within 60 days, but they did not do that.

The state government has applied to the Supreme Court to declare Haydon a high-risk offender and extend supervision beyond his sen-

Haydon was jailed in 1999 for seven counts of assisting in the killing of 11 people, after eight bodies were found in barrels in a disused bank vault in Snowtown.

John Bunting and Robert Wagner were convicted on 11 and 10 counts of murder respectively and are serving life sentences.

Yorke Peninsula man faces court over child exploitation material

A Yorke Peninsula man charged over child exploitation material faced court last week.

The 38 year old appeared in Kadina Magistrates Court on Wednesday, April 17, in relation to two counts of possessing the material.

He was refused bail, and prosecution sought 14 weeks to determine the charges.

The hearing has been adjourned until July 24 at Adelaide Magistrates

Date delay for Minlaton Family Centre

CONSTRUCTION delays have hindered plans to open Minlaton Family Centre with the new target opening date set for term two.

Remaining aspects of the build generally relate to external aspects, such as playground areas and boundary fencing.

Yorke Peninsula Council and operator Yorke Peninsula Learning and Care, which also

runs Maitland Family Centre, said the project had encountered unforeseen construction delays beyond the control of either party.

"Council has been in regular communication with the builder and the project superintendent throughout this

major project and has escalated its involvement across many months now to ensure construction is finished as soon as practicably possible.

"We have been told the project is on track for the revised opening date during term two.

He said, while this is later than originally hoped, the centre will provide lifechanging services for families for many years after the opening.

"Our group was lucky enough to have a tour and were blown away by the design, and the warm and welcoming space that awaits the community," a statement from the group reads.

Educators advocating for better pay

AUSTRALIA'S childcare sector is crying out for help.

In line with new multiemployer bargaining laws, the United Workers Union is pushing for a 25 per cent pay rise for childcare educators, in line with the increase aged care workers received in March.

Those increases were considered a new benchmark for underpaid, mostly feminised industries.

With only weeks until the Federal Budget is due to be handed down on Tuesday, May 14, the union is asking people to sign a petition as part of its Big Steps Campaign.

The aim is to put pressure on the federal government during a time the sector is facing critical staffing shortages.

Kadina Child Care Centre director Caren Hammerstein supports the union's campaign.

"Educators have been undervalued and underpaid too long," Hammerstein said.

"It would mean we would receive an adequate pay rate for the high-quality work we do providing education and care to children.

"It is important for childcare workers to receive better recognition for the work they do (so) we are encouraging as many people as we can to sign the petition, as it is a positive way to have our say and show support."

United Workers Union early education director Helen Gibbons said early learning is in crisis, with workers forced to make the hard choice between the job they are dedicated to and leaving to find work which better pays the bills.

"Educators cannot stay in the sector on its current poverty wages," she said.

"That's why educators have been negotiating with employers and government representatives through multi-employer bargaining to set a new standard for wages.

"In November last year, educators put the government on notice, that they needed to commit to funding the new wage standard for the sector to keep centres open, or educators would be forced to take

Memories of heroics

WWII vet marches on

ON THURSDAY, 98-year-old John Atkinson will proudly lead the Anzac Day march in Port Broughton, as he has done for many years.

One of Australia's dwindling band of World War II veterans, John signed up as a teenager in 1943, inspired by his family's legacy and news reports of the brave exploits of British air force gunners.

"I wanted to be a rear gunner — I was the right size — but just as well I didn't, because I wouldn't be here today," he said.

"They used to wash them (dead gunners) out of the aircraft."

John's father, Arthur Edwin Atkinson, served in the Australian Imperial Forces in Gallipoli and the western front, and two of John's uncles also served in that war. John's brother, Fred, was a commando with the Australian Army and survived being shot three times while parachuting.

John was so determined to serve his country he travelled from Pitcairn Station, east of Peterborough, to the enlistment centre in Adelaide the day after he turned 18 on September 5, 1943.

Although compact in stature, John was fighting fit from many years working as a farmhand and shearer.

"I walked into the old bank on the corner of King William and North Terrace and the joker looked at me," he recalled.

"I saw the air force fella there and he laughed at me. I could have picked him up and threw him over the counter. I was pretty powerful in those days.

"He said you can't join up until I see your birth certificate."

So, John went home to Angaston to get his birth certificate. He had to clear two more obstacles — getting clearance to enlist from his employer because farming was a protected occupation, and six weeks in hospital recovering from measles and pneumonia.

After training in Sale, Victoria, John was finally sent to serve as a RAAF transport driver, arriving at Melville Bay, Northern Territory, in a Catalina amphibious aircraft.

He later served at air bases in New Guinea and the Philippines, where he witnessed plenty of bombing by the Japanese. Although fortunate not to be injured in combat, he suffered serious illnesses, including blood poisoning, and has had recurrent bouts of malaria.

John's resilience saw him through those tough times and he still lives in his own

He is proud his family's military tradition is being upheld by his grandson, John "Jack" Atkinson, a member of the Australian Army who has done a tour of duty in Afghanistan.


Port Broughton RSL sub-branch president Sandy Owen said John Atkinson senior represents "what a member of the RSL is all


"He is a lovely man and we are very fortunate to have him," she said.

"He's passed on now, of course, but a lot of his artefacts and things my parents still own," he said.

"One of my favourite things that he did, it's called trench craft, and he's fashioned a boat out of a big artillery shell. You cut into the artillery shell and sort of fold it all


"It's like a tall ship that he's made out of a brass shell."

Mr Gearing said the management of the YPVCCMM wanted the artwork to also reflect the centre's connections with Vietnam War veterans who returned home without being hailed as heroes.

"It wasn't accepted very well at the time because a lot of people believed we weren't supposed to be involved," Mr Gearing said.

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Disability access ramp for Moonta Bay

MOONTA Bay's newest disability ramp opened this month as part of a focus by Copper Coast Council on access and inclusion for everybody.

Previously, the only ramp access to the beach was a steep concrete slope about 50 metres from the new ramp.

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said the new ramp will allow people living with a disability, the elderly, and people with prams, trolleys or kayaks, to more easily access the beach.

"We have made a commitment to improve disability accessibility with all of our infrastructure assets, so it's something that we're making a real focus and gradually working to make the whole of the community accessible to everybody," Mrs Talbot said.

"It's really important for our tourism... people are considering where to go for a holiday and if we've got a lot of accessibility it's a big tick."

Councillor Cathy Vluggen, who uses a wheelchair, said steep steps had made it "extremely difficult" for people with limited mobility to access the beach in the past.

"I know a wheelie that lives in Port Hughes who carries his canoe and bums down over the rocks, so it (the ramp) is going to make a big difference to many," she said.

Novita team leader for Yorke and Mid North Sarah Griffin said she is excited to see inclusive solutions supporting accessibility in the community.

"The design is very sturdy and practical - the fitting of the handrails and width accommodates many needs," Ms Griffin said.

"The flooring is anti-slip and allows any debris to fall through and to not build up."

However, some comments on the council's Facebook announcement of the opening said the ramp would collect seaweed, and that a rock wall

could have been constructed to prevent this.

Moonta resident Brendan Coston, who uses a wheelchair, agrees this is one issue that could cause problems for ramp users.

"I was down there (two weeks ago) and we had a high tide come right in (at) midafternoon and water was coming up to the ramp on one of the landing bits — it was nearly overlapping," Mr Coston said.

'When you hit that soft sand, anything that's got wheels, it's going to

"People going down the ramp (could get) stuck at the end and, if they are by themselves in a wheelchair, how are they going to get themselves back?"

He said a rubber mat that runs 20-30m out from the ramp would allow wheelchairs, prams and trolleys to get onto firmer sand.

Mr Coston, 40, has spent several years unable to go onto the beach since he lost both his legs in 2018 after an infection

"I managed to get down to North Beach with my support worker... to get into the water a little bit and that's only happened once which was last summer, it's been that awkward and hard," he said.


"It makes you upset because you know other people on hot days are down at the beach."

Mr Coston said he has moved to the Copper Coast because he enjoys fishing and the relaxing lifestyle of living by the water, and looks forward to being further immersed in it thanks to the new ramp.

"I love the ocean," he said.

"It's definitely going to be used a lot and I'll be able to go on the actual sand and be close to the water instead of above the water on the jetty."

Beach wheelchairs are available for free hire at Moonta Bay Caravan Park, Port Hughes Caravan Park and Wallaroo Holiday Park.

Growing more than minds

YORKETOWN Area School has installed an onsite hydroponic greenhouse from national food security and education program Food Ladder.

The greenhouse was funded by a state government food security grant of just under \$45,000, shared between YAS and Stirling North Primary School.

While Food Ladder has more than 30 greenhouses in schools across Australia, the YAS greenhouse is one of the first for South Australia.

YAS principal Michael Beelitz said the 24 square metre greenhouse with hydroponic equipment provides almost 100 planting opportunities, supported by recirtemperature control.

"It's got such broad opportunities for us and links to so many curriculum areas, particularly ag and home ec," he said.

"We really try to create those authentic learning experiences of connecting seed to spoon — the growing all the way through to using it in the kitchen, understanding where food comes from.

"We've got our canteen on site so the things that are grown in (the greenhouse) can also be used in there and impact the menu.

"There's an entrepreneurial component to it through the curriculum area as well where produce can either be marketed or branded and sold and (we can) talk about the economic impact of those

week of term one, and are enthusiastic about continuing to learn in the space and cooking with fresh produce at school and home.

"It should take two or three days for those seeds to germinate and poke through and when we come back from school holidays in week one we'll have a massive crop of a range of produce in the greenhouse ready to go," Mr Beelitz said.

Food Ladder chief executive Kelly McJannett said she founded the organisation after working in remote Indigenous communities and seeing students' wellbeing and performance at school affected by food security issues.

'What was missing was just a very, very simple foundational building block for health and well-

"The intention was always to provide food, but the way it's manifested is very different — the system itself is a classroom.

'Teachers tell us every day that they love it (the greenhouse) for the fact that (for) kids who find it a little bit hard sometimes to focus in class, it's a really great way to get their hands dirty and doing something physical in a beautiful environment.

"We work really hard at Food Ladder to integrate everything into the curriculum, so any school that's part of the Food Ladder program has free, ongoing access to hundreds of educational resources (and) teaching resources.

"This is not about giving teachers something else to do; it's about solving the food problem and providing a really practical, engaging way to teach kids."

KADINA's biggest school has moved to help ease traffic congestion during busy times by adding another parking space to its three-minute drop-off and pick-up zone.

The added on-street park will be in front of Kadina Memorial School's disability unit.

On weekdays, the zone restricts drop-offs and pick-ups to three minutes from 8.15am to 9am, and 3pm to 4pm, and prohibits parking between 9am

Copper Coast Council development services director Muller Mentz said the space will become a part of the zone

as soon as the closest sign indicating the drop-off zone can be

The current sign will be moved about 5.5 metres eastward to include one car park located between the pedestrian crossing and the disabled car park," Mr Mentz said.

KMS principal Alistair Williams said parents requested he take the idea to the council, which agreed to it at its April 3 meeting.

The streets surrounding the school, Doswell Terrace and Hallett Street, are often congested during peak times.

"Kadina Memorial School is a school of over 1200 students," Mr Williams said.

"With this many students

exiting from a site at one time, it is always going to be challenging.


'However, despite this, work between the students, parents, staff and bus drivers means it is managed well every day, limiting the congestion to only a short period.

"We are unfortunately surrounded by buildings and therefore the opportunity to create more parking is limited.

"We are aware of the issue for parents and look for opportunities to alleviate their stress and are happy to listen to ideas they may present."

There are as yet no further plans to expand parking in the area or further re-arrange the on-street parking situation.

Dunes on the move

A GROUND-BREAKING study into the movement of coastal sand dunes paints a picture of what will likely happen to Yorke Peninsula's extensive dune systems across coming decades, according to a leading global coastal studies expert.

Flinders University Professor Patrick Hesp said, as rising sea levels and less rainfall impact coastlines, dunes will increasingly migrate back from beaches and encroach on properties behind them.

"Certainly, farmers would be concerned about greater dune activity and losing some property," Prof. Hesp said.

"The concern with declining rainfall patterns and then potential for greater dune mobility is there for the farming community."

The findings come from an extensive case study of a long section of dunes on Younghusband Peninsula in the state's South East, which Prof. Hesp said shows what to expect at some of YP's more exposed beaches, including Ethel Beach, Berry Bay and Hardwicke

A section of the foreshore dunes at 42 Mile Crossing started eroding in the 1980s, causing a rapid acceleration of sand movement for the remaining dunes behind it.

Some of the dunes in the study have moved up to 100 metres further back from the beach, with the movement gathering momentum as their front sections are more rapidly eaten away by wind and waves.

"It's a proxy for probably what will happen with sea-level rises along lots of sandy coasts in that, when you have shoreline erosion of

this magnitude, it simulates, or is a proxy for, sea level rise doing much the same thing," Prof. Hesp said.

'While we're not seeing much effect of sea-level rise erosion yet, one would assume we're going to get to some tipping point if it keeps going, and there's every reason to think it will."

Sea levels have risen about 30 centimetres in the past 120 years, but the rate of the rise is increasing.

The study has shown that, once the front section of any dune system erodes, wave action increasingly eats away at the shoreline and wind carries the sand further inland, where new dunes form at an average rate of nearly 2m per year, soon increasing beyond 3m a year.

"That's equivalent to losing a tennis court from the front of your house every seven years," Prof. Hesp

The dunes at 42 Mile Crossing are now marching inland at a rate of 10m a year, he said.

A new field of coastal dunes has developed in just over a decade, with the landward edge of the dunefield moving inland more than 100m in eight years.

Prof. Hesp said three factors may have caused shoreline erosion and dune evolution over the past 10 years: offshore reefs that would have protected the coastline are breaking down, the sea level is slowly rising and wave energy is increasing in the Southern Ocean.

"Such shoreline erosion and dunefield changes suggest what may happen in future to many Australian beach and dune systems as sea levels continue to rise with climate change," he said.

"Once you're up against this big older dune system and you scarp, or cliff, that, you end up with a 10 or 12m scarp, the wind accelerates that and then starts to cannibalise it, so you see much greater dune activity."

He said sand dunes in areas such as Daly Head currently experience about a 3m per year migration inland.

"You would theorise that will increase."

He said dune stabilisation techniques such as fencing and increasing vegetation do slow dune migration, but may not be feasible in remote dune systems.

"Where there's significant infrastructure in the way you've got the same options you do on the Adelaide foreshore — you retreat, get the hell out of the way," Prof. Hesp said.

"With dunes you then go and manually stabilise them."

WORK has progressed on the new water feature at Port Broughton, with the first layer of footings now built.

The feature, which includes a children's water-play area similar to those in Adelaide's Henley and Moseley Squares, with water jets and lighting which can be used as backdrops during special ceremonies including Anzac Day, will be part of the new civic square surrounding the war memorial on West Terrace by the jetty.

A council spokesperson said two layers of stabilising sand mixture, with a total depth of 350mm, were poured to encase the piping on Thursday, April 11.

The mixture has 15 per cent cement, plus sand and water and an additive to protect against saltwater.

Stone was not used as it could damage the pipes.

"This base will cure for approximately 21 to 28 days when the final concrete slab will be poured and we now anticipate that will occur in either the first or second week of May," he said.

"While we are waiting for the stabilising sand to cure, the in-ground circulating tank and the dirty water tank are being cleaned out and dried and once that has been done, we will

then seal the inside of the tanks with three coats of sealing paint."

The project is running to schedule to be finished on June 30, barring any material, labour or weather delays.

A grant under the federal government's Growing Regions Fund has also been sought by the council to build a new tourism centre next to the square; this would incorporate the Visitor Information Centre, now located on McKay Street.

Due to the works around the war memorial, this year's Anzac Day commemorations on Thursday (April 25) will instead be held at the Poppy Fields on the foreshore lawns to the north of the jetty, near the corner of West Terrace and James Street.

This will also be the end point of the Anzac Day march.

Road safety campaign to curb trauma

SOUTH Australia Police has launched a new road safety campaign, It wouldn't hurt, as part of its road safety education efforts.

It wouldn't hurt delivers a strong message depicting the real consequences of crashes involving drivers who choose not to wear seat-

The crashes and depicted injuries were designed with input from investigators attached to SAPOL's Major Crash Investigation Section, who brought detailed expertise in the forensic features of crashes to the depiction of common regional and metropolitan crashes.

Traffic Services Branch officer in charge Superintendent Darren Fielke said traffic intelligence data shows people who did not wear a seatbelt in a crash were more likely to sustain potentially life-threatening injuries.

"The stories in the campaign are grim for a reason; they are real," he said.

"Drivers or passengers who choose not to wear a seatbelt and are involved in a rollover crash can be violently propelled from the vehicle which can then land on them or they can be launched around the cabin of the vehicle with a force the human body cannot endure.

"We at SA Police have seen people lose their lives or suffer serious life changing injuries in these exact scenarios.

"I'm hoping this campaign will shake the apathy from drivers and passengers and make them realise it wouldn't hurt to wear a seat-

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Caravanners asked to share the road

CARAVANNERS should be aware of the importance of sharing the road with heavy vehicles, National Heavy Vehicle Regulator chief executive Sal Petroccitto said.

A recent NHVR survey of 1000 Australian drivers revealed caravanners lack understanding about how to share the road with trucks.

The survey showed 60 per cent of caravanners have parked in a truck-specific rest area and 22 per cent are doing so often.

Mr Petroccitto said it is important for caravanners to understand truck drivers need specific rest areas to manage their fatigue work and rest requirements.

"While 66 per cent of Australians surveyed are currently aware they shouldn't use these truck rest spaces, they don't understand the implications or the why — and the consequences can be devastating," he said.

"Fatigue is one of the leading factors which affect safety and heavy vehicle crashes and, when fatigue management requirements aren't adhered to, there can be serious consequences for all road users."

The survey also highlighted caravanners' uncertainty about communicating with truck drivers on the road, with only half aware they can and should use a UHF radio to do so.

"Using a UHF radio if available is vital for communicating with heavy vehicle drivers, to let them know you are going to overtake them, or so they can let you know when they're going to overtake you," Mr Petroccitto said.

Epilepsy Centre of South Australia and Northern Territory chief executive Robyn Wakefield said it is important for people to understand epilepsy and its impacts.




"NAIDOC Week is a chance to honour the invaluable contributions made by outstanding South Australian Aboriginal leaders," she said.

New tool to manage cancer's unspoken side effect

MANAGING fatigue can be another unwanted burden for people with cancer, but the Leukaemia Foundation is aiming to make the process that little bit easier.

The group has launched a new "digital energy coach" to help people combat the persistence of the debilitating side effect.

Described as an "innovative and evidence-based technology", the online program is Australia's first and only support tool for cancer-related fatigue and is part of the Leukaemia Foundation's online blood cancer support ser-

The program can be accessed on computers, phones and other

mobile devices and helps patients with tracking sleep, nutrition, exercise and energy levels while unlocking insights and advice tailored to each individual person.

Leukaemia Foundation CEO Chris Tanti said blood cancer has soared by 47 per cent in the past decade, meaning at least 70,000 Australians who live with the disease are facing a daily battle with exhaustion.

"People can suffer fatigue for onths, or even years, during and following treatment... placing a significant strain on their physical, social, and emotional wellbeing," Mr Tanti said.

"It's a hidden side effect that can

be difficult for patients to talk about and explain to family and

Common symptoms of cancerrelated fatigue include excessive tiredness, weariness and feeling worn out, difficulty concentrating, nausea, poor appetite and stress that lasts for months and some-

"We encourage Australians living with blood cancer to take charge of their cancer-related fatigue and use the digital energy coach to help increase their energy levels and get back to living their life," he said.



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

As well as singles and doubles prize winners, there were also medals awarded in certain age







The Proof and Experimental Establishment Port Wakefield is a vital Defence test and evaluation capability that has supported Defence since 1929.

These firings may require specific tidal or weather conditions, and are critical for the safety of current and new Defence capabilities. Members of the public may notice noise, vibration, flashes and/or smoke during the testing. There is no risk to the public outside of the gazetted Defence Practice Areas.

For reasons of public safety, there is a permanent exclusion zone covering land, sea and air around the Port Wakefield Establishment. Specific details on the Port Wakefield Prohibited Area can be obtained from Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No GN 26, 4 July 1990, and is shown on the diagram below. Trespassing in this Area is strictly prohibited and very dangerous due to the presence of unexploded bombs. Any person found within the Prohibited Area or on Defence land will be subject to prosecution.

Specific test and evaluation activities may also require restricting public access to the Port Wakefield Defence Practice Areas over specific periods with these areas articulated in the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No. GN 40, 7 October 1992, and also identified on the diagram below. This may affect access to the Gulf of St Vincent at Port Wakefield and Port Parham.


You could buy Polaroid photos of yourself in front of this backdrop for \$15 each.

Recipe, pan-fried King George whiting. Ingredients: 4 fresh KG whiting fillets, olive oil, lime juice, salt and pepper. Preparation: place fish fillets on a plate and cover with generous amount of oil and salt. Heat frypan to high and cook fillets for 2 mins skin side down. Turn once and cook for a further 2 mins. Serve with lime juice and a pepper sprinkle.

Wallaroo: The first week of the school holidays came and went as fishers enjoyed good early morning conditions for tommy ruff (Australian herring), squid and even gar at the jetty, while boat crews ran out to Point Riley and Myponie Point for garfish, an occasional whiting and squid. The grounds just south of the ferry channel have early morning King

Port Hughes/Moonta Bay: Boat crews reported squid, whiting and gar from Warburto Point, West Light and Cape Flizabeth grounds. The ietties have sould and snook at night.

Point Turton: Garfish can be caught from boats at Port Rickaby, The Pines and Point

Souttar, with a few KG whiting in the broken grounds off the coast at Souttar. The busy jetty has after-dusk tommy ruff and a few squid.

Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: Large numbers of shore-based anglers are all over the southern tip of The Leg as they try for mullet, mulloway, rockies, flathead from Corny Point, Gym Beach and Pondalowie Bay. Boat crews are venturing out early to fish for KG whiting, flathead, squid and snook. The jetties have snook, tommies and squid.

Edithburgh/Stansbury: KG whiting, blue morwong and flathead came from Troubridge Light during the week before the afternoon sea. breezes moved in. The jetties have squid, tommies and salmon trout, while local shorebased fishing has produced mullet and tommy

Ardrossan: A busy boat ramp was the continuing story during last week as crews ran out for garfish, squid, blue crabs and KG whiting. The jetty has the occasional overnight soapie mulloway and squid.

Please remember, if you catch a snapper, it must be returned to the sea immediately, and then perhaps change your fishing spot.
