## Alford community calling for safe street crossing

A PEDESTRIAN crossing has been proposed for the main street of Alford.

Barunga West Council asked the Department for Infrastructure and Transport to consider the installation of a crossing from the town's RV park to the opposite side of the Spencer Highway.

The crossing would be accompanied by signage reading "slow to 25 kilometres when children present".

However, DIT has initially responded by stating the volume of pedestrians would not be sufficient to warrant a crossing.

Councillor Brian Lockyer said the matter was brought to his attention whilst working at the Alford polling booth for the state election last month.

"The traffic that speeds through Alford have residents concerned (particularly with) the number of children catching the school bus in the morning and afternoon," Cr Lockyer said.

"(A crossing) would also slow down traffic entering Alford.

"Hopefully, this matter will be taken into consideration for the safety of our children, plus people crossing between the RV park and Karimi's Kitchen."

Karimi's Kitchen owner Karimi Manners said she suggested the crossing to

Councillor Brian Lockyer Cr Lockyer following safety id the matter was brought to concerns.

"We have a growing population in Alford with a couple young families moving to the area," Mrs Manners said.

"There's more than 10 children who catch the school bus now so there's always kids at the bus stop.

"Speeding vehicles have become quite regular through Alford and we need something to slow the traffic.

"When motorists see a pedestrian crossing, they would be more likely to slow down – I think this could make a big difference."

Council is awaiting written confirmation regarding DIT's advice.



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# Considering a sister town for Moonta

COPPER Coast Council is considering a twinning/sister town arrangement between Moonta and the Camborne Town Council in Cornwall, England.

At its March meeting, Copper Coast elected members voted in favour of the proposal to explore the possibility of and interest in the arrangement.

Cornish Association SA Yorke Peninsula branch president Liz Coole said it would be an important connection for Moonta, also known as "Australia's Little Cornwall".

"To have a partnership/ friendship with Cornwall would be great," she said.

"We would hope some benefits could come from it such as people holidaying between the two towns, we could help each other with family history and ultimately we would love for it to contribute to Moonta Mines being World Heritage Listed."

Elected member Brent Walker said the arrangement made sense because of the heritage and background of Moonta Mines and Camborne.

"There is tourism potential and it could benefit both councils and how they both operate — but

people need to get behind this proposal and provide feedback for it to be able to work."

CEO Russell Peate said council was keen to progress the various steps towards World Heritage Listing of the Moonta Mines.

"Councillor Walker approached by the president of the local Cornish association in late 2021 about the feasibility of a twinning proposal with Cornwall," he said.

"Cr Walker has explored the possibility of a twinning/sister town relationship with Camborne Town Council in Cornwall, England.

"I understand Camborne has a significant Cornish mining history and sister city affiliations are quite common throughout Australia.

"Given the progression of World Heritage Listing for the Moonta Mines and Burra application, it is considered prudent to explore the possibility of a sister town arrangement with Camborne.

"Schools, Moonta National Trust and tourism bodies would be contacted to ascertain their interest in such a sister town arrangement.

"As a result of Zoom video conferencing, one example could be educational content and development between, for example, the Moonta Area School and a school in Camborne.

### **SA to keep masks** in schools... for now

SOUTH Australian students will continue to wear face masks for another month once school resumes.

Premier Peter Malinauskas announced the decision after the state's Emergency Management Council met yesterday morning (Tuesday, April

All adults, including visitors, are required to wear masks, as well as high school students, with mask wearing strongly recommended for students in years 3 to 6.

"We all want to ensure we are doing everything we can to ensure we have a Covid-safe return to school next week," Mr Malinauskas said.

"Unfortunately, South Australian schools faced greater disruption than other states during term 1.

"We want to reduce this risk in term 2, ensuring more students can go to school and more parents can stay at

"We are taking the prudent step of retaining current mask settings for the first four weeks, while we rollout other actions to help make our schools safer."

Mask settings in schools will stay for at least the first four weeks of term 2, to be reviewed closer to the end of week 4.

Mr Malinauskas also suggested the government would install 1000 air purifiers in schools across the state, and would undertake more work to improve ventilation.

"That work will now be accelerated over the course of the coming weeks to get our ing the past two years," Mr classrooms in a position where Malinauskas said.

there is adequate ventilation that then mitigates the need for mask wearing," he said.

The move comes as the premier announced the end of close contact quarantining as of Saturday, April 30.

People deemed close contacts will be prohibited from high-risk settings and required to undertake five rapid antigen tests during a seven-day period, wear a mask when leaving the house and notify their employer or educational facility of their status.

"This change is recognition of a continuing improvement in the Covid situation in South Australia and a well-earned reward for the hundreds of South Australians who have made significant sacrifices dur-

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# Upgrades fit for a Queen

UPGRADES to Queen Square, Moonta, are well underway.

Works began at the start of April with the stripping of the public toilets.

Power was isolated and all the fixtures, fittings, floors and ceiling, concrete paths and external brick wing walls were removed.

Copper Coast Council director infrastructure services Tim Neumann said the focus was now on rendering the existing internal and external walls to allow for an alternate clean and modern finish.

"New timber fascias and Colorbond gutters and roofing are in progress," Mr Neumann said.

"To complete the upgrade of the building a new epoxy floor covering is to be laid, finished off with new partitions and fixtures.

"The toilet upgrade is expected to be complete by the end of June, there are new shared paths to be installed throughout the park and around the toilet

that will follow the completion of the toilet block."

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said the upgrades to Queen Square were coming along nicely.

"The toilets were in desperate need of an upgrade to meet health and safety requirements, to make them inclusive and more clean in general," Mrs Talbot said.

"It is also really important that we made the park accessible to everyone.

"I think as able-bodied people we forget or take for granted how easily we can wander through parks, so I'm very pleased upgrades to the paths will enable everyone of all abilities to enjoy Queen Square."

Council received funding for the upgrades through the state government's Open Spaces and Places for People program.

#### Man caught riding uninsured pit bike

A man has lost his licence after being caught riding an unregistered motorbike in Moonta Bay.

Copper Coast police saw the man riding a small pit bike along Highview Grove at about 4.10pm on Monday, April 25.

The rider was stopped and issued a blood alcohol test, to which he returned a positive reading of 0.093.

Further checks revealed the bike was unregistered and uninsured.

The 29-year-old Moonta Bay man was reported for exceeding the prescribed concentration of alcohol,

driving unlicensed, failing to wear a helmet, as well as driving an unregistered and uninsured motor vehicle.

He was issued a six-month immediate loss of licence and had his bike impounded for 28 days.

The man will be summonsed to appear in court at a later date.

#### Men caught after trying to escape drug test

Yorketown police stopped a vehicle which tried to avoid a driver testing station at Minlaton last month.

A search of the car led police to locate cannabis paraphernalia linked to a passenger of the vehicle.

The driver was also submitted to a roadside drug test, to which he returned a positive result for cannabis.

The 28-year-old male passenger from Kadina was issued a cannabis expiation notice worth \$342.

The 39-year-old male driver, also of Kadina, was also issued a cannabis expiation notice worth \$863 and four demerit points.

An empty boat connected with the seizure was also found last month.



### **Key works progress** for Fisherman Bay

CONSTRUCTION of the new Port Broughton Community Wastewater Treatment System is nearing completion.

Earthworks have been finalised and the installation of a liner for the new lagoon is underway

The rising water main, set to benefit new property freeholders at Fisherman Bay, has also been installed and is being tested for pressure.

Rocks excavated to make way for the new lagoon are set to be used for a range of Barunga West Council landscaping projects.

Council also approved a tripartite Preservation Deed between BWC, Fisherman's Bay Management and Fisherman Bay contractor Bardavcol Pty Ltd, at its monthly meeting on Tuesday, April 12.

CEO Maree Wauchope said the agreement has been intended to give council step-in rights in the unlikely event FBM defaults in its obligations under the construction contract with Bardavcol.

"This should facilitate a seamless transition from FBM to council, in the unlikely event of a default by FBM, to enable

construction continues without unnecessary delay and cost," Ms Wauchope said.

"The deed is a measure to ensure Fisherman Bay ratepayers get the infrastructure they have been promised under the freehold arrangement."


Essential construction works have been estimated to commence in late May.

Stage six of the freeholding process has started and will involve the settlement of 23 freehold titles, all under contract for purchase.

Twelve stages of the project are yet to be completed.

"Total operating expenses are to be held where possible, within levels of the previous financial years and adjusted by the Local Government Price Index allowing above indexation increases to be allocated directly to maintaining community assets, such as stormwater infrastructure, roads and foot-

"The plan is to complete the upgrade to Bay Road, work through planned stormwater priorities, Moonta masterplan works, road seals, rural roads and re-sheeting as outlined in the five-year roads plan, footpaths and our wide range of services and facilities."

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### What's-on in Grey

THE Australian Labor Party has nominated Julie Watson as its candidate for Grey at the May Federal election.

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



### Wartime friendship remembered

THE lead up to Anzac Day always revives memories for Elaine Hoyle about her late dad Norman Sparrow.

Elaine, of Minlaton, describes her relationship with her dad, who served as a cook in the army, as very close.

"I worshipped the ground he walked on," Elaine said.

It was only a few short months after Elaine's birth in November 1941 that Norman joined the army and was soon aboard a ship preparing meals in rough seas travelling to Balikpapan in Borneo.

It was largely by accident Norman found himself in the kitchen.

During training, the endless marching caused Norman acute ankle and shin pain.

Offered a job as a cook, as it meant no more marching, he quickly accept-

It wasn't long before Norman's culinary efforts were noticed and he was recommended for promotion, as well as being asked to cater for an officer's wedding.

Stories of camaraderie and mateship go hand in hand with many wartime stories, and Sergeant Norman Sparrow was no different.

Sgt Sparrow formed a bond with a 16-year-old Javanese boy named Baimin who had escaped the Japanese after being brutally tortured and left

"He was tied to a tree, not fed for days and bayonetted repeatedly in the back of the legs but somehow he got away," Elaine said.

Baimin found his way to the Australian forces where he helped out in working groups.

"Dad noticed this young lad struggling to operate a pick so he went over and showed him how to use it properly," she said.

Norman managed to arrange for Baimin to become a kitchen hand working under his guidance until the end of the war.

"Dad taught Baimin to read and write and they formed an amazing bond," Elaine said.

"Dad never talked much about the war but always spoke fondly of his friend Baimin.

"Dad wanted to bring him back to Australia after the war and Baimin desperately wanted to as well but it was impossible in 1945."

Elaine still wears a ring on her right hand Baimin sent with a letter to the Sparrow family during his time with the Australian Army.

Numerous attempts were made by the Sparrow and Hoyle families to track him down after the war without suc-

"The trouble was Dad only ever knew him as Baimin and didn't know his surname so it was futile," Elaine

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

### New mural honours town story

EDITHBURGH RSL and Bowls Club has honoured both sides of its story with a striking new mural.

Adorning the western and southern sides of the building, the mural is a homage to the stories of those who have made an impact both in military service and bowls.

The clubroom walls and roof tiles were badly affected after the 2019 Yorketown bushfire which encouraged the club to apply for a grant from the Black Summer Bushfire Recovery grants program.

The club received \$40,000 and was able to install the new artwork by artist Dylan Butler, who also worked on many of southern Yorke Peninsula's water towers.

One side features a soldier and a fighter jet while the other has a large club bowl and depiction of late club stalwart Effie Bartram in the clouds.

Effie was featured on the wall prior to its damage and son Peter Bartram said it filled him with personal pride to see her on the wall.

"She was a foundation member of the club and I think over her time involved she won the hearts of a lot of people," he said.

"She was the club's first patroness and I'm pretty sure if you asked most people who were at the club at the same time as her, they'd say she'd been here forev-

"It's nice to know they thought of her."

Mr Bartram is the current SYP Bowling Association secretary as well as club manager and believes the entire mural helps bring the town to life.

"It has a wow factor, in my opinion," he said.

"You drive into the town and the first thing you clearly see is the RSL, but you go around the corner and you'll think 'oh it's the bowls club as well'.

"Everyone involved has done a fantastic job."

With money left over from the grant, as well as some of its own, the club will now investigate installing a rooftop solar system.

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
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














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
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### **Kleinig awarded Southwood Medal**





"It's a difficult one because you never really know what teams are going to be where, but we understand we probably haven't played the strongest teams yet," he said.







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## Norwood **honours for Neil**

Peter Argent REPORT BY

Neil Craig was one of four new inductees to the Norwood Football Club Hall of Fame earlier this month.

Craig, who started playing with Maitland Football Club as a junior, was joined by Tom Woodroofe (circa 1930-39), Mervyn Roberts (1946-56) and James Gallagher (1999 to 2012) in receiving recognition.

Craig grew up on his family farm at Sandilands and said he remembers his first game of junior colts vividly.

"I can remember it like it was yesterday," he said.

"I was on bench for Maitland at Port Victoria, who wore maroon and white jumpers.

"At three-quarter time my coach said I would get an opportunity in the forward pocket.

"I had to come back to the coach to find out where the forward pocket was

"I have some good memories of those early times.

"It was a full day out.

"After my game, I'd run the boundary in the senior colts and B grade, then attend to the scoreboard in the A grade game ... and maybe get a pasty as my day's pay."

Craig was the youngest of five siblings, Leslie, John, Gavin and Ian, who all went to Adelaide for secondary schooling.

"Norwood had a visionary called Bert Baulderstone," Craig said.

"You need to remember that back in those days that while suburban Adelaide was zoned, country SA was open slather.

"He built a great social club and also a boarding house for young footballers from the country called Carmel Court.

"I lived at the boarding house for a

period with my brother Ian, and they were some of the best times of my life?

Craig won the 1971 McCallum Medal for the fairest and most brilliant player in the SANFL Colts (under 17s)

Playing as a centreman, he was believed to be the youngest winner of the medal at that time.

The following season he was awarded the Tomkins Medal, for the best player in the SANFL Under 19s com-

Craig made his league debut early in 1973, aged just 17 and he played seven senior games for the year.

Showing great enthusiasm and professionalism beyond his years, Craig further developed his skills and fitness and played 20 games in 1974, winning Norwood's most improved player award.

In 1975 he made another 21 league appearances and was an important contributor to the side which broke the club's 25-year premiership drought by defeating Glenelg in the grand final.

Craig played 124 games for Norwood between 1973 and 1979, including the one-point grand final victory against Sturt in 1978 and the 1977 Ardath Cup win.



would generate strong buyer enquiry and achieve a great result for the owners," she said.





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## Wallaroo T-Ports site closer to completion

JOURNALIST

T-PORTS' new Wallaroo bunker and port facility is edging closer to completion.

One steel silo has been fully erected at the site, on the corner of Chatfield Terrace and Cresco Road, with the second one on its way up — storage capacity will be 20,500 tonnes of grain.

Construction on the nearby bunker site will begin in early May and be completed by October just in time for the 2022-23 crop intake. The six bunkers will have a total capacity of 240,000 tonnes of grain.

The 500-metre rock causeway is progressing well with the build predicted to be done by the end of the year/early January.

Overall, the first ship is expected to reach the site from March 2023

T-Ports CEO Kieran Carvill said there had been a huge amount of support from growers.

"The site will be ready to receive grain for harvest 2022-23 and the company is looking for-



ward to offering competition in the grain supply chain for Yorke Peninsula and Mid North growers," Mr Carvill said.

"Grain will be carried via an enclosed conveyor along the causeway, loaded onto the transshipment vessel, then transported to bulk carriers anchored off-

"We have a construction licence in place and are working with the government and

Narungga Nations to extend through the appropriate portion of land.

"We have a partnership approach and will continue to coexist with the stakeholders because it is important we get it

"For now there is restricted access on the causeway side for safety and security reasons but we can assure the community when the work is done there will be

public access on each side to enter the beach.

"Australian company, Allied Grain Systems, is leading the port construction and we will look to utilise South Australian expertise and contractors as we have done at Lucky Bay, with up to 150 jobs to be created during the construction phase."

The project is estimated to cost \$80 million and be fully operational by March 2023.

### **Establishing an** agri-freight task group

A GROUP of locals has been working toward creating an agri-freight taskforce for the Copper Coast.

The group includes Regional Development Australia Yorke and Mid North's Jo-anne Buchanan, Copper Coast Council CEO Russell Peate and local farmers.

A need for a plan for regional roads was highlighted as there will be a significant increase in freight movements to Wallaroo with the new T-Port facility.


"We need to identify a medium to long-term strategic approach to freight route infrastructure improvements," Ms Buchanan said.

"We want to minimise, where possible, the interface between truck movements in townships, in particular where issues of safety are of concern and to consider domestic and tourism traffic interface

"Port Road, Kadina, and Blanche Terrace, Moonta, are two key roads of concern regarding truck movements and interaction with traffic activity. businesses, schools and tourism."

A report on the agri-freight taskforce, whether it be established, and who would be involved, will be presented at Copper Coast Council's May meeting for consideration.

# **Seeding begins** across the leg

FARMERS across Yorke Peninsula will capitalise on good sub-soil moisture and begin seeding this week.

While some will wait a little longer in the hope of early winter rain, most will be underway by the first week of

Curramulka farmer Craig Hickman, who runs a mixed farming operation with wife Abigail, will begin seeding this week.

The Hickmans are bucking a trend across the industry which shows more and more farmers going totally into cropping and getting out of sheep.

"We run 700 breeding merinos in conjunction with our cropping program so as to not have all our eggs in one basket," Mr Hickman said.

"Being able to control weeds, giving paddocks a bit of a spell from chemical is something I quite like and we enjoy running sheep as well.

"We're putting in around 800 hectares of crop this year made up of 60 per cent cereal and 40 per cent legumes with some winter pastures in that mix."

Mr Hickman said he is much happier with the subsoil moisture this year compared with last season and thinks conditions for germination are excellent.

"The soil moisture probe is showing good soil moisture so I'd be pretty confident about germination," he said.

Mr Hickman said the price increases in inputs have been scary but it's (the inputs) something he has to have.

"Urea prices have doubled and that hurts so the big question this year is going to be how much we throw at it," he said.

"We'll be doing some urea spreading but it's going to be managed a lot harder than it ever has been because of the price.

"We'll be watching things closely and doing some deep end tests to see what's there and what is available to the plant before we just throw more money at it."






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## **GRDC** seeks industry input

Research Development Corporation is asking growers where they think the industry should be in the future.

The organisation is asking stakeholders including growers, advisers and researchers to have input into its new five-year plan which will guide research, development and extension funding from 2023 to 2028.

"This brain-storming stage will be the first opportunity for growers to contribute their insights and perspective on the drivers, threats and opportunities for the grains industry," GRDC chairperson John Woods said.

"Recognising people are busy, GRDC will provide multiple opportunities for consultation and feedback between now and February.

"It is critical industry has an opportunity to be involved and engaged in the development of the plan, which would guide targeted and strategic RD&E investment into the future.

"Grain growers manage about four per cent of the Australian continent covering an estimated

22.4 million hectares, and this year growers will contribute more than \$20 billion to the national economy, so they play an important part in delivering economic and environmental outcomes on behalf of the broader

"It is important we understand growers' needs and priorities, so research dollars are invested in RD&E that yields results; for this we need industry input, guidance and support during the consultation phase."

Mr Woods said the current RD&E plan had prioritised investments designed to improve growers' bottom lines.

"GRDC is looking forward to exploring growers' insight and appetite for a longer-term focus on transformation research that comes with higher risk, higher reward ratio," he said.

"When we launched the current RD&E plan in 2018, feedback from growers showed they wanted us to achieve more in our portfolio and be less conservative with a clear focus on the future, including more agile and responsive to immediate needs.

"The current RD&E plan continues to deliver impactful research outcomes for industry with gains in varietal development, agronomic, crop protection and the climate challenge space to name a few areas, but there is still more to be done."

The next plan will determine where GRDC invests as well as its priorities.

"Australian grain growers are recognised globally as innovative, resilient and highly efficient, with proven abilities to adapt," GRDC managing director Nigel Hart

"Through this plan we want to deliver ambitious, diverse RD&E that supports and improves their production and profitability.

"This means identifying and maximising the opportunities and looking at a five-year RD&E plan that discovers and deploys new solutions and innovations to set the sector up for 2030 and beyond."

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




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# Fine tune your fertiliser decisions

GROWERS looking to refine their fertiliser strategy are encouraged to use test strips this season.

Grains Research and Development Corporation has published a new fact sheet outlining how to set up fertiliser test strips and use the date to make decisions.

"Fertiliser test strips are sections of a paddock which are set up to compare the impact of different rates of nutrient on crop growth and yield," Agronomy Solutions director and GRDC leader Sean Mason said.

"Application rates can be estimated using pre-season soil testing results from within paddock zones and then test strips can verify the effectiveness of those rates and whether in-season applications of fertiliser are warranted.

"Often the fertiliser rate used by the grower in the paddock is compared a strip where fertiliser is applied at a higher rate or a strip with low-to-no levels of nutrient

Dr Mason said test strips can be used for any nutrient; however, nitrogen test strips are the most common and can help growers to decide on top-up rates during the season.

"For nutrients only applied at sowing, such as phosphorus and zinc, test strips can gauge the effectiveness of the seeding application and whether any adjustments to fertiliser use need to occur for future crops," he said.

Comparing responses in fertiliser strips between different zones in the paddock can help growers and advisers understand what is limiting crop growth and yield.

"If the crop in the high rate of fertiliser strip looks better than grower rate, then increasing the application rate of that nutrient may boost crop performance, provided soil moisture is sufficient," Dr Mason said.

"If plants in the high or low-rate strips are responding the same as those in the grower rate strip, decreasing rates may

"It is important to remember other factors such as soil constraints like acidity or compaction need to be considered, as they may be limiting growth and the response to fertiliser."

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## Trials confirm new cereal herbicide benefits





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#### HOT FISHING TIPS

Wallaroo: Reasonable fishing weather was pretty much the order of the day for the week etween Easter and Anzac Day, A grain ship was at the jetty and another moored well offshore as jetty-based fishers tried for blue crabs, squid, tommy ruff (Australian herring) and garfish. Boat crews fished south of Bird Reef for King George whiting, blueys and squid.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Many holidaymakers fished local sandy beaches for small mullet, tommies and an occasional yellowfin whiting. Offshore, Cape Elizabeth has salmon trout, garfish and squid.

Port Victoria: Large KG whiting came from the Moorara wreck and Wardang Island northeast grounds last week, while blueys, gar and squid are around the Songvaar wreck and the

Point Turton: I sighted good catches of KG whiting to 38cm from here last week, from Port Rickaby grounds, The Banks and The Pines. A few large blue crabs were caught from the Port Rickaby jetty late on Saturday.

Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: Scattered showers swept through here late on Sunday afternoon as boat crews returned from Hillocky's, The Althorpes and Penguin Point with mixed bags of sweep, flathead, red nannygai, squid and whiting. Both jetties have tommy ruff, squid and salmon trout. Local shore-based fishing produced mullet and salmon trout at Browns Beach and the Dust Hole

Edithburgh/Stansbury: Scattered mullet schools are at Wattle Point then along the coast to Klein Point and in past Port Vincent town wharf. Jetty-based fishing has an occasional bluey, tommies and mullet. Boat crews have fished far and wide for whiting from the Tapley Shoals, gar and squid off Coobowie and snook from Marion Reef.

Ardrossan: There are still reports of nighttime mulloway from the jetty, along with blueys and small ruff. Rakers have been at most local beaches over the Anzac Day weekend - from Billy Goat Flat to Tiddy Widdy and Port Clinton. KG whiting are generally small, but crews managed a legal feed from Gus Shoal and gar from Windara Reef on the drift.
