End o(f) pain filled wait

Yorke Peninsula to have state's first pelvic pain clinic

PEOPLE on Yorke Peninsula who suffer endometriosis and pelvic pain will soon be able to access enhanced services through a new clinic funded by the federal government.

The clinic will be led by Kadina Medical Associates and will start providing services at GP surgeries and other healthcare settings throughout the peninsula in June 2023.

The clinic will be the only one in South Australia and receive more than \$700,000 over four years to support hiring specialised staff, including nurse practitioners and allied health professionals, investment in equipment resources, training and development.

Endometriosis affects at least one in nine Australian women and sufferers wait an average of seven years before diagnosis.

Pelvic pain can be similarly complex and debilitating and is estimated to cost the Australian economy \$6 billion a year.

Federal Health and Aged Care Assistant Minister Ged Kearney said the clinics would reduce diagnostic delays and promote early access to multi-disciplinary intervention, care and treatment.

"As well as directly helping patients, the clinics will raise awareness of endometriosis and pelvic pain, build professional knowledge and skills in this area, and improve access to information and care pathways," she said.

"These clinics are about providing women with an accessible front door to the care that they need.

Gathering expertise under one roof, fostering knowledge to improve diagnosis and services, having referral pathways in place these are all crucial elements to getting the support that women need right."

Kadina Medical Associates' GP and obstetrician Dr Anna Kearney said the funding would enhance the existing provision of multidisciplinary services, including GPs, physiotherapists, dietitians and psychologists, at various YP centres.

I have been liaising with Australia Post, including meeting with the Territory Manager Delivery SA before Christmas, urging customer engagement on this issue and in general, for services to keep up with township growth.

Whilst these talks progress, I see the federal government consultation as a valuable opportunity for constituents across the electorate to have their say on what Australia Post services they most value.

Whilst Australia Post does not receive financial support from the government, as a self-funded government business enterprise it is required under legislation to meet a range of community service obligations.

As is Australia Post, I am also mindful of the need for future decisions to not unfairly impact on the revenue and profitability of licensed post offices and community postal agents who play such a crucial role in rural and remote communities, thus certainly a balanced approach is needed.

Period pain

LATE last month, the federal government announced plans to establish 20 endometriosis and pelvic pain clinics across the country.

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Which in itself is brilliant news. But one of those clinics, the only one in South Australia, will be here on Yorke Peninsula through Kadina Medical Associates.

So often we report on instances where we miss out on services because of geographical distance, but here we are leading the way.

This would be exciting news for any condition, but it feels remarkable for the area to have access to these services for conditions which so rarely get recognition.

At least one in nine people who are assigned female at birth are thought to have endometriosis, a condition where tissue similar to the lining of the uterus, grows outside of the uterus.

People with endometriosis can experience a raft of incredibly awful symptoms, but for so many, it takes about seven years for a diagnosis.

This is because symptoms vary between women, they can change, or they are asymptomatic.

There's also the belief that period pain is normal, and should be expected.

"It's not normal if you have to miss school or work, and it's not normal if you are vomiting or passing out in the shower because of the pain," KMA's Dr Anna Kearney said.

But this is the reality for many people with endometriosis and pelvic pain.

As is the exhaustion of having to advocate for yourself, to try and get people to believe that what you're experiencing isn't normal.

There are some brilliant health professionals out there, but there are few people I know with these chronic health conditions who haven't had to see multiple GPs or even specialists to fight for a

With the clinic set to focus on upskilling health professionals and creating multidisciplinary services, it's nice to know that support might be a little easier to come bv.

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

Council steps up for safety's sake

A NEW set of steps has been installed at the Edithburgh jetty, allowing much safer access for divers dipping below the surface.

Yorke Peninsula Council consulted with the local community on how to deal with the quickly deteriorating northern steps, which were removed in March.

As a result, an extension of the already existing southern steps was added, providing a secure platform just below the water line and further steps which nearly reach the seabed.

Councillors budgeted \$15,000 for design work for northern dive access steps through the 2021-22 annual business plan and budget, and will apply for funding soon.

Local diver Dave Place said the new southern steps makes it a lot easier to negotiate the at times tedious entry into the water.

"The problem in the past has been, at low tide, the bottom step has been almost out of the water, if not completely out of the water," he said.

"I'm pretty happy with them; they're strong, they're secured, you can still do a giant stride entry from the platform.

"All of a sudden, you don't need to worry about what time you're diving and whether it's high tide, low tide or anything in between."

Mr Place said he had enjoyed being a part of council's consultative committee for the new northern

"Steve Simmons (local diver) had a lot to do with getting these (southern steps) in because he realised while we were waiting for something to happen with the northern steps, an improvement would need to be made here," he said.

"The council have been really accommodating and keen to hear what we have to say on how to make improvements, which has been pleasing."

YPC operations south leading worker Stuart Heinrich-Smith said conditions had to be perfect for the operation which required cranes to complete.

"The whole jetty car park was blocked off and we had a good crowd watching from the two top carparks," Mr Heinrich-Smith said.

"We had a very good crew of four on the day with two being in the water for most of the install of the new ladder and removal of old stairs.

"The new ladder was bolted to the existing wooden stairs and extended down to the sea floor for easier egress for divers."

Mr Heinrich-Smith said the ladder also had a footing at the base which could slide out to be attached to the sea floor.

"The old northern steps were broken and dangerous and had to be removed," he said.

"After a couple of weeks planning on how the job was going to run the day went very well and everything

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Port Broughton beach facelift

PORT Broughton beach is set to receive a major facelift as Barunga West Council begins work on the first stage of its sand replenishment program.

The program is aimed to help combat erosion caused by tides and weather, and the impacts of coastal infrastructure, such as sea walls and the boat ramp, on the movement of sand and seawater.

Storm events resulted in major erosion and the inundation of beachfront properties in 2016.

Local company Aitchison Earthmoving will cart and deposit 500 cubic metres of locally sourced sand along the toe of the seawall at West Terrace and around Port Broughton jetty.

BWC assets and infrastructure manager Steve Davey said the top-up would provide a buffer of sand to protect the toe of the seawall from future erosion and should be completed in time for the Easter holidays.

The project is part of council's beach nourishment program, which will include similar work along the Port Broughton Tourist Park beachfront, up to the northern limit of the project at John Lewis Drive over the next three years.

The latest works follow council's pilot sand replenishment project completed at the beach in front of Dalling Street in June.

The pilot involved monitoring sand levels at intervals along Port Broughton beach before works were completed, and regularly after-

The data shows the amount of sand retained in the system and where it is likely to build up if more is added in coming years.

Mr Davey said deposits of sand along the foreshore would naturally spread and re-distribute with the tides and wave action to start filling in areas of significant sand loss.

"The ultimate aim of the project is for the level of the beach to remain stable at a desired height to provide adequate erosion protection for beachfront properties," he said.

The first stage of Port Broughton's naturebased solution to beach erosion received \$30,000 from the state government's 2021-22 Regional Coast Protection Grant Funding Program.


Council also received a federal government grant of \$359,000 last year.

The entire program is expected to be delivered

Council is also seeking funding from the Coast Protection Board to monitor and assess erosion of sand dunes at Fisherman Bay.

KADINA Medical Associates' Dr Anna Kearney, who is not related to the minister, also teaches obstetrics and gynaecology for the University of Adelaide's Rural Clinical School and provides in-service professional development on YP.

She said one of the most important aspects of the funding was it would enhance the current upskilling of local medical and health professionals in their understanding, diagnosis and management of endometriosis and pelvic pain.

Dr Kearney said the typically long waits for diagnoses and the lack of services for sufferers were a reflection of women not being taken seriously when they describe their pain and symptoms.

"It's not normal if you have to miss

school or work, and it's not normal if you are vomiting or passing out in the shower because of the pain," she said.

"The disease process affects the muscle and nerve endings in the pelvis

"There is data to show the pain can be as severe as a heart attack."

The announcement of the YP clinic was welcomed by the Pelvic Pain Foundation of Australia, one of the advocacy groups which has been pushing for better care and access to services for sufferers of endometriosis and pelvic pain.

The foundation's executive director Kirsty Mead said the condition affected more people than diabetes.

"We know people do not present to their GP for endometrial lesions, they present with pain, and when they do, they want to be taken seriously," Ms Mead said.

Ellis makes hopes for SA budget known

MEMBER for Narungga Fraser Ellis has written to Premier Peter Malinauskas and spoken in state parliament detailing his funding wish list for the upcoming 2023-24 state budget.

Mr Ellis outlined several issues and projects on Yorke Peninsula which would benefit greatly from further funding consideration ahead of the early June announcement.

Featured on his list were further road upgrades on Upper Yorke Road (Arthurton to Kulpara, and Bute to Snowtown) and Harry Butler Road, further funding for Maitland, Yorketown, Wallaroo and Ardrossan hospitals and more public housing.

Also rating a mention was more financial support for avoiding mobile phone black spots across the peninsula, jetty, boat ramp and sand dune care, a replacement sea rescue vessel at Point Turton, a new administration building at the YP Field Days site and a replacement swimming facility at Wallaroo.

Mr Ellis said the community desperately needed the funding to continue flowing.

"I want to raise a few things that, as the budget takes place, as it is formed behind the scenes, I hope the government is considering Narungga," he

Mr Ellis said the welfare of local roads was crucially important to the success of the region's produce growers.

"We have enjoyed a steady stream of road maintenance projects during the past five years and, with most of those initiatives coming to an end, it is desperately important new projects are started," he said.

"It is imperative the government funds road improvements in our electorate."

He said the support for the Wallaroo swimming enclosure at the Country Cabinet forum surprised him, but was proof something needed to be done.

"It has been some years now since the previous iteration was destroyed by a storm and we have not yet seen any progress made on replacing it; it was such a wonderful community asset," he said.

"So many kids do so much of their swimming training at the beach, or they used to, and its replacement needs to be accelerated and prioritised.

"(Copper Coast) Council needs to be empowered to replace that facility as soon as possible."

Mr Ellis labelled the current capacity of 21 beds at Wallaroo Hospital as woeful in a push for financial support.

"Putting aside problems with attracting health professionals, which will require multi-governmental solutions, we have need for capital investment in our regional hospitals," he said.

"The Wallaroo Hospital is woefully undersized for the community it serves and would benefit from a dramatic increase from the current 21 beds.

"Maitland Hospital has had plans drawn up to realign its emergency department, Yorketown Hospital would benefit from a more efficient accident and emergency unit and the Ardrossan Community Hospital needs certainty around the annual funding provided by the state to continue its operations."

Illicit drugs in spotlight

Crime Stoppers has launched a campaign to put organised crime and the illicit drug trade in the spotlight.

"They'll never know it was you who spoke up" is the message from Crime Stoppers, which launched a national campaign to shine a spotlight on organised illicit drug syndicates.

Crime Stoppers Australia chair Vince Hughes said people linked to the illicit drug trade often reached a point where they become concerned for their personal or family's safety and look for a way out.

"Because Australians are high consumers of illicit drugs, the trade provides a highly lucrative and profitable market for organised criminal networks such as outlaw motorcycle gangs, cartels, triads and Italian organised crime," Dr Hughes said.

"With the illicit drug trade estimated to be worth more than \$10 billion per year, the profits they make are now the lifeblood of their illegal activities.

"Those profits are often used to fund other illegal activity, including human trafficking and sexual servitude.

"Our campaign has been funded by the Australian Government through a Proceeds of Crime Act grant, which is using \$3.55 million from seized criminal assets to turn the tables on organised crime and unsettle domestic drug markets."





Watch out for walkers as daylight saving ends — RAA warns

ROAD users have been reminded to drive to the conditions and be mindful of pedestrians after daylight saving ended on Sunday morning, April 2.

RAA crash statistics reveal an alarming jump in casualty crashes involving pedestrians in autumn and winter, which were up 24 per cent when compared with spring and summer between 2017 and 2021.

RAA senior manager safety and infrastructure Charles Mountain said the clocks going back served as a reminder to be vigilant.

"The clocks going back means a lot more driving and commuting will be happening in the dark," Mr Mountain said.

"Drivers should be aware casualty crashes involving pedestrians jump by almost a quarter in the months when days are shorter.

"This may be due to lower visibility at certain times, so the advice is to be mindful of the conditions and adjust your driving accordingly.

"What we have seen on our roads this year — currently 40 fatalities compared with 18 this time in 2022 — reminds us we need to pay full attention whenever we're behind the wheel.

"We should always leave at least three seconds between ourselves and the car in front, to ensure there is enough time to come to a stop should

the traffic in front of us stop suddenly.

"We should also always drive at a speed that allows us to safely stop should a hazard appear, and turn our headlights on if we're driving through anything but sunny conditions."

Mr Mountain said the data also revealed a spike in rear-end casualty crashes during the hour between 6am and 7am in autumn and winter, up 73 per cent when compared with the rest of the year.

Further works for Agery Road

AGERY Road, Kadina will be closed for about a month for the installation of a 450 metre water main relay.

Copper Coast Council commenced an upgrade of the road, including kerb replacement, the rectification of intersections and cement stabilisation, in

Council's Director infrastructure services Tim Neumann said SA Water had since been engaged to lower several property services which connected to the main.

"As Agery Road was being stabilised, (we realised) these services would have been hit," Mr Neumann said.

"Further investigation showed the main line was very old and, in sections where the new road design was lower than the existing surface, the line coverage was not going to meet SA Water

Mr Neumann said the 100 millimetre polyvinyl chloride pipe relay, to run the length of Agery Road, would cost coun-

"Stage 1 of the works between Mines Road and Roach Street will take up to three weeks to complete," he said.

'Workers will then move to Stage 2, a small section of Agery Road on the eastern side of Roach Street, which is set to take up to one week," he said.

"There are several valve sets along the route and upgraded property connec-

Mr Neumann said council would resume the original road upgrade soon after the main relay is completed.

"Council is meeting with the contractor this week to determine project schedules," he said.

"We would like to see a finished product by the end of June."

An SA Water spokesperson asked people travelling through Agery Road and Roach Street to be aware of temporarily changed traffic conditions.

"We will provide advance notice to local residents of any temporary water supply interruptions required when their connections are moved over from the old to new pipes," the spokesperson said.

"We would like to see a finished product by the end of June."

The work included installing a new 250 millimetre pipe, to replace the previous 150mm pipeline.

An SA Water spokesperson said the infrastructure upgrade would enable a continued reliable supply of drinking water, whilst supporting future growth in the area.

"As part of the works, we used PVC pipes which are known for greater flexibility and resistance to ground movement compared to fibro-cement," the spokesperson said.

"We appreciate the patience and understanding of the Moonta community as we completed this important work safely and efficiently.

"This upgrade is part of our ongoing program to renew water mains across South Australia, with around 40 kilometres of pipe expected to be replaced in regional areas during 2022-23."



Specialist service win for YP stoma patients

STOMA patients throughout Yorke Peninsula can now get expert help with the introduction of enhanced services provided by a specialist nurse.

The service, which began in February, is provided by Tim Garfield, who is based at Wallaroo Hospital and regularly visits Yorketown, Minlaton and Maitland.

Previously, stoma patients on YP only had access to appointments with a nurse from Port Pirie one day a month at Wallaroo Hospital.

A stoma is a surgically constructed opening, especially one in the abdominal wall which permits the passage of waste after a colostomy or ileostomy.

A bag (appliance) is then used to manage output from the organs which can no longer function properly.

Mr Garfield, who is a registered nurse, received a part scholarship from the Combined Lions Clubs of Yorke Peninsula to study a Graduate Certificate in Wound Ostomy and Continence Nursing at Curtin University, Perth.

He can assist with many types of stomas, including the most commonly used for the bowel, bladder and stomach.

"Complications may arise after a stoma is newly formed, however it is also common for people with long standing stomas to have changes that a stoma nurse can assist with," he said.

"Leakage of bags, difficulty getting bags to seal and stay on, frequent and persistent bleeding, and irritation or pain around certain areas of a stoma are common signs and symptoms that should prompt a person to seek a

stoma nurse review".

The Stomal Therapy Service also supports hospital in-patients and their carer and clinicians.

The enhanced service has been introduced by the Yorke and Northern Local Health Network after five years of staunch advocacy by the YP Ostomy Support Group, led by Helen Colliver.

She said the previous once-a-month service was often booked out for months in advance, which meant patients had to try to seek help in Clare, Burra or with their specialist in Adelaide.

Mrs Colliver applauded the YNLHN

decision and thanked Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis for his support.

Among some 140 stoma patients on YP is Wallaroo's Bob Napier, who said the new service was vital to help ostomates deal with hygiene, daily care and comfort issues.

"Before, there was nobody around to help," he said.

"There's nothing more embarrassing and degrading than having a bag burst

Mr Garfield said patients could choose to have one-on-one consultations or bring along a support person and he could also make home visits, given patients were often recovering from major surgery or may not have private transport.

Mr Garfield is available at Wallaroo on the first and third Wednesday of the month and makes monthly visits on a Friday to Southern Yorke Peninsula Health Service in Yorketown, Minlaton Community Health and Central Yorke Peninsula Hospital in Maitland

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Local news alive and well



A NEW national report by Deakin University is calling on governments to revise advertising rules to help newspapers better serve local communities

The report, Media Innovation and the Civic Future of Australia's Country Press, was a three-year project by Deakin University's Professor Kristy Hess in conjunction with Country Press Australia and RMIT.

Professor Hess said the project's aim was to examine the local media landscape to identify challenges and opportunities for sustainability and innovation.

The report is the first of its kind in Australia, with its 22 recommendations providing a blueprint to preserve and grow rural and regional news.

"The first thing we did was conduct a major national survey to find out what people valued about their local mastheads," Professor Hess said.

We found people in many regional and rural towns and cities were passionate about their local mastheads but rejected an overreliance on syndicated content, in print and digital, sourced from neighbouring areas or other parts of the country."

One key finding was the strain caused by lost revenue from local, state and federal government advertising, which has trended towards the larger digital reach of metropolitan news outlets and social media.

"Our research found there is this obsession with digital reach," Professor Hess said.

"That's all well and good, but a local masthead, whether in print or online, isn't designed to reach a million people.

"If we use the digital reach metric as an indicator as to which news outlets should get government advertising, these independent regional and rural outlets are going to lose out every time."

The report supports a recent Parliamentary Inquiry recommendation which stipulates 20 per cent of all federal government advertising expenditure be directed to regional and rural news organisations.

Government funding schemes were also often linked to digital innovation and technological purchases, the research found, when news outlets really needed support to upgrade print infrastructure or hire more staff.

"Print is not dead for many regional and rural communities," Professor Hess said.

"We need to remember there is a digital divide in Australia that means some communities still struggle with poor-quality and unreliable internet connections.

"Some segments of the community, including older citizens, find it difficult to use newer technologies. Younger audiences also like the look of a printed newspaper."

The report also recommends better incentives, including pay, to attract seasoned reporters to the regions.

"Our research shows people in these communities want more local news content, including stories on locals' achievements, successes and milestones," Professor Hess said.

A POTENTIAL Wallaroo marina crossing has been included in Copper Coast Council's draft Strategic Plan.

The crossing is one of several long-term projects being considered as part of the 10-year plan, which is reviewed every four

Possible crossing designs had been proposed to the previous council in 2019, but it was decided other projects were of higher priority at the time.

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said, if a potential crossing was included in the strategic plan, it would still be far from a done deal.

"This is just a matter of council revisiting the idea of a Wallaroo

marina crossing," Mrs Talbot said.

"(Pending the plan's adoption), we would be looking at suitable locations for the crossing and decide whether it should be progressed.

"We need to at least see if this is something the community is interested in."

Mrs Talbot said a significant population increase in the marina development was a key reason for revisiting the idea.

"I'm always getting questions about why people can't walk straight from the beach or marina to the Wallaroo township," she

"I think the community has become more physically active, so people should be able to walk straight there if they choose.

"If we don't look at this project

now, we'd have to wait another four years (when the Strategic Plan is next reviewed) until we can look at it again."

Three elected members voted against the potential crossing being included in the Strategic Plan.

Of these, Cr Brent Walker said his vote was based on previous community views being opposed to the project.

"This is a good idea which has merit, just not right now," Mr Walker said.

"I would rather see other projects completed at Wallaroo first, such as the swimming enclosure and foreshore master plan.

"There's a lot going on down there (at Wallaroo) at the moment, so another (project) could be seen as a smokescreen.

"I'm not opposed to having a bridge sometime in the future, but I'd rather wait to be guided by the community's views."

CEO Russell Peate said, being a new council, elected members may wish to consider incorporating a refined design or an alternate design.

"Having endeavoured to understand the volume of material available, there still needs to be further work so councillors are in the best position to make an informed decision," Mr Peate

"Once comments are received on the draft Strategic Plan, and if council wishes to consider a possible crossing, a subsequent report would be submitted to council highlighting the body of work to be undertaken."

Work still to be done

COPPER Coast Council CEO Russell Peate said, in order to make an informed decision about a potential Wallaroo marina crossing, a range of information needed to be obtained, including:

- The identified modified design or an alternate design for the possible bridge (including location)
- A third party independent expert assessment of the proposed design and estimated cost for the bridge
- An estimate of the annual maintenance cost
- A benefit-cost ratio analysis of the economic and environmental benefit
- Funding for the project, excluding ratepayer funds and loans, but with funding from the Wallaroo Holiday Park, possible private sector and federal/state government funding







Foundation gives to Mary Potter Hospice

LETITIA Linke Research Foundation board members recently donated \$17,045 to the Mary Potter Hospice's Complementary Therapy Program.

The Letitia Linke Research Foundation is a South Australian-based not-forprofit with a focus on increasing awareness of ovarian cancer, alongside fundraising for research into an early detection test and targeted treatment for women with ovarian cancer.

"At the time of the foundation's major annual fundraiser, Adelaide Silver Style Gala Ball in October, 2022, one of the founding members of the foundation and ovarian cancer patient, Kel Pitman, was in palliative care," foundation chair Madelyn Duckmanton said.

"This got me thinking about when my late daughter Letitia (of Maitland), who passed away in August 2018, was gravely ill and hospitalised.

"One of the things that made life just that little more bearable for her was the services provided by the complementary therapy treatment team for patients at Calvary.

"The therapists funded by the Complementary Therapy Program provide facials,

pedicures, manicures, and massages to cancer patients and their families, both on the wards and in Mary Potter.

Madelyn approached Mary Potter at Calvary to find out how the foundation could support the Complementary Therapy Program, which costs around \$500 a day to provide four therapists, and is offered five days per week.

"During the Adelaide Silver Style Gala Ball, the foundation added a mystery live auction item — a gift of day of personal care to patients and their families in palliative care at Calvary or the Mary Potter Hospice," Madelyn said.



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Celebrations rev up with car meet



A sign of the times at Corny

TWO entrance signs have recently been installed at Corny Point after three years of hard work.

The signs sit alongside the road at the town's two main entrances and feature stone walls and large lighthouses, with the town's name.

Construction on the project officially started in April and finished in January.

Corny Point Progress Association formed an entrance sign sub-committee in a bid to officially get the idea off the ground, and with the help of a \$2500 grant from Yorke Peninsula Council, their dream became a reality.

Sub-committee member Marilyn Hall said the idea came up around the same time as the town concept plan was being finalised in 2020.

"There were conversations about how we could beautify the town, and so this became a part of the plan," she said.

'We wanted to do something which added some character and brightened up the town in general; but that was three years ago and it's taken a long time to get to this point.

"We wanted the signs to be classy but simple and to make a statement."

The lighthouse was chosen to pay homage to one of the town's main attractions, and limestone was chosen from nearby properties for the walls.

The construction of the signs cost \$12,500 which the group said wouldn't have been possible without the tireless efforts of volunteers.

"We contracted work with Crowell concrete to supply the base, A&R Masonary to build the magnificent rock wall and Kingsway Cutting to build our laser cut metal lighthouse and Corny Point letters," Ms Hall said.

"Otherwise, most of the work has been done by our committee with volunteers from progress and the local community helping.

"We would like to thank Fred, Mel and Robert Mason, Andy and Emma Bennett, Anthony and Deb Liddiard, Jamie and Amy Murdoch for allowing us to use the limestone rock from their properties."

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Bruce brothers make history

KANGAROO Island was no match for Arthurton brothers Angus and Jackson Bruce, as they became the first people to successfully run across Kangaroo Island to raise funds for Canteen.

The dynamic duo set off from the Cape Willoughby lighthouse at noon on Saturday, March 25 and by daybreak the following day, they had traversed the 160 kilometres required to cross the finish line at Cape Borda.

Flanked by their support team, the brothers completed the Cape to Cape route's fastest known time - 20 hours and 37 minutes attributing their success to high morale and a shared chemistry between one another.

"It was really special to be reunited (Angus lives in Western Australia and Jackson in South Australia) after planning this run for months," they said.

"To finally be on Kangaroo Island, ready to get stuck in, was super exciting."

Angus and Jackson agreed running for Canteen was a constant reminder they were doing something for a cause greater than themselves, having eclipsed their donation target of \$16,000 before they started.

"As a good mate told us before we got started, we had 16,000 reasons to keep running," they

Despite Jackson fighting early in the run to overcome a sore

Achilles and calf, the duo said they were up and about for a large majority of the run, taking breaks every four hours to recu-

"We were really in the zone between the 90 and 130 kilometre point as we were flying along the empty highway during the night," they said.

We took in our surroundings, chatted quite a bit and put our headphones in from time to time to help break things up.

"The final 30 kilometres were a real battle in the depths of the early morning darkness, and as the rain began to set in, we felt like we were made to earn every last kilometre.

"It didn't help the final stretch took place on a very corrugated dirt road, which made it hard to get in a rhythm or find any consistency.

"We had to really dig deep to keep the legs ticking over when they were burning towards the

The Bruce brothers said none of their efforts would have been achievable without the backing of their team and the community that rallied behind them.



Her year 2 teacher Jane Owen heard about her desire to become a lifeguard and so encouraged Trinity to do a school passion project on the topic, which led to her becoming a member of the Henley Surf Life Saving Club.

"I got my start at Henley

during my school project, when I started fundraising money after a few incidents here on the Yorke Peninsula," Trinity said.

"Mrs Owen knew the president of the club, Roy Menner, and she invited him to the school to help me inform everyone about water safety.

"When he was here, I gave Roy the \$160 I had raised and afterwards he sent me an invitation to try out."

Trinity said she jumped at the opportunity and has been hooked ever since.

"I love being out on the boards, doing the flags and the beach relays," Trinity said.

"The friends I've made at Henley are nice and we have a great team."

Although it can be hard work travelling down for training and competitions almost every weekend, Trinity said the family tradition of ordering Dominos and sitting at the Port Adelaide wharf after a long day makes it even more worthwhile.

Trinity hopes to one day set up her own club to give residents the opportunity to participate in surf lifesaving, going as far as designing a potential logo for her proposed group.

"I want to make a surf club here where everyone can have fun but also stay safe in the water," Trinity said.

"It would be good to have people join in who can't travel all the way to Adelaide."

Trinity's efforts were recognised at the HSLSC presentations, where she was awarded the Under 10 Henley Safety Award on Saturday, April 1.

With competition now over for the year, Trinity said she would use the downtime to practise her beach sprints and board relays at home in preparation for next season.

Take care on Crown Land

AHEAD of Easter and the school holidays, the Department for Environment and Water is encouraging visitors to take care on Crown Land.

About one-fifth of South Australia is classified as Crown Land, including locations like Wauraltee Beach on Yorke Peninsula.

The department is encouraging everyone to play their role in protecting these areas' environmental and cultural value for enjoyment today and for future generations.

DEW Crown Land operations manager Mel Carson said most visitors were already doing the right thing.

"We're asking people to be responsible, to respect other campers, our wildlife and our environment," she said.

'We need to continue to take good care of these sites to ensure we leave no trace of our visits, which includes taking your rubbish with you and disposing of it appropriately."

DEW has launched a #LeaveNoTrace social media campaign, informing Crown Land users how to play their part in protecting, as well as enjoying, these popular sites.

People can camp on Crown Land for a maximum of 21 days, have a campfire as long as it is in line with fire ban regulations and drive on the beach, provided vehicles remain on established tracks.

You can't remove or interfere with fossils or Aboriginal heritage items on Crown Land, or damage or remove vegetation, litter or close off roads.

There are penalties for misusing Crown Land, including fines of \$405 plus a \$92 Victims of Crime Levy for littering.

"But whilst these talks progress I am alert to this valuable opportunity that is now available via the federal government for constituents to have their say on what Australia Post services they seek.

"I, as is Australia Post, am also mindful of the need for future decisions to not unfairly impact on the revenue and profitability of licensed post offices and community postal

agents that play such a crucial role in rural and remote communities, so certainly a balanced approach is needed."



DOCKSIDE Port Vincent has announced the addition of a floating cellar door to its development, believed to be an Australian first.

The 75-seat floating cellar door and alfresco pontoon will feature Flinders Gin's full range as well as local oysters and grazing platters.

To mark the occasion, visitors to Port Vincent this Easter will be able to have a taste of what life could be like, with Flinders Gin and oysters on offer as part of sailing tours on Brindabella, the 80-foot maxi yacht which won the Sydney to Hobart race in 1997.

The Dockside team will be onsite at Marina Drive from 10am to 2.30pm, Friday to Sunday.

Construction of the floating cellar door and neighbouring nine floating homes as part of the \$40 million development, is expected to commence in late 2023, subject to development approval, with a view to opening in early 2024.

Alby Trotta of Flinders Gin said the company was proud to be bringing its distinctive artisan gins to a new audience on Yorke Peninsula and partnering with Dockside Port Vincent.

"This venture at Port Vincent is also part of a major expansion program this year for us after just two years and includes us expanding our heritage home-base distillery in Quorn," he said.

Dockside Port Vincent project director Peter Villis said the partnership with Flinders Gin was an exciting step forward and important milestone.

"By securing Flinders Gin for our floating cellar door we can ensure Dockside becomes a catalyst for regional tourism and service operators driving economic activity in the region," he said.

"Finders Gin is an award-winning South Australian distillery, so this is a major coup for Port Vincent and the Yorke Peninsula as a whole."

Dockside Port Vincent will be developed by Lillis Group over three areas; in addition to the floating homes and cellar door, a five-storey apartment complex with retail, cafes and coworking space, and eight townhouses, six of which will be waterfront properties with access to a shared pontoon, will also be built.

Development approval for the Dockside apartment complex is anticipated in the coming months; construction is expected to begin later this year.

"Dockside will set a new benchmark for waterfront living, whether for holidaying or working remotely or as an investment opportunity," Mr Villis said.

"We have had significant interest in the project so far, with two absolute waterfront townhouses sold and strong interest in the remaining six."

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






Cornish miner a labour of love

CORNISH miners were known as the best hard rock miners in the world — and now a former Copper Coast local has paid tribute to their skills and resilience with a carving created from a single piece of solid jade.

It is one of many intricate sculptures created by Dennis Noble, a member of the Yorke Peninsula Gem and Mineral Club, and will be on display at the club's premises in Moonta during this year's Kernewek Lowender Copper Coast Cornish Festival.

The original piece of jade weighed about half a kilogram and Mr Noble had it sent to him from New Zealand about 40 years ago, wrapped in brown paper and string.

"It was triangular shaped and I tried to think of what animal I could make from it," he said.

"I had already made some Cornish miners out of casting copper, using the lost wax method."

As a gem and minerals enthusiast since the age of 10, Mr Noble has visited many mine sites in Australia and has great admiration for the miners from the years before mechanisation and stringent safety standards.

"A lot of people died in the

mines, it was pretty hard going," he said.

Many years ago, Mr Noble talked to the late Fred Paulson, then aged 92, who had been involved in mining in the Copper Coast area at the turn of the 20th century.

"He was really tough — you had to be in the mines," Mr Noble said.

"He had all these draft horses and he would also plough paddocks before and after his shifts."

Mr Noble and his family lived in Kadina until they moved to Adelaide 30 years ago but he is still a regular participant in the club's monthly workshops.

Club treasurer Denise Rowe said the club has been going for almost 50 years and the workshops allow the 35 members to work on their gem and mineral collections using the club's tools and equipment.

The club will hold an open day from 10am to 3.30pm at its premises on Military Road, Moonta, adjacent to Moonta Bowling Club, on Friday, May

Sutcliffe first took the reins at Port Adelaide in 2019, following in the footsteps of Bob Quinn, Fos Williams, Geof Motley, Jack Cahill, Greg Phillips, Tim Ginever and, most recently, Steve Summerton by wearing the number one

"I have been skipper from 2019 to this year, but 2020 was the Covid year and we got booted out the competition," Sutcliffe

"At SANFL state level I was honoured as vice-captain of the side in 2021 when we played here at Adelaide Oval."

Summerton has been in the Panthers leadership group for two seasons, but has taken the top job for the first time this year, as the club aims to end a 59-year premiership drought.

While there have been upwards of 100 players from the peninsula don league jumpers over the years, there are only a

handful of other known captains.

Maitland's Ron Kneebone, who won the Magarey Medal in 1966 and is in the Norwood team of the century and SANFL Hall of Fame, was the Redlegs skipper in 1963 and 1964.







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Sand and straw show promise for saline soils on Upper YP

SAND, straw and gypsum are being tested as possible treatments for dry saline soils on upper Yorke Peninsula, with two trial sites at Tickera.

The project, led by consulting agronomist Sam Trengove of Bute, is examining management practices to ameliorate saline soil patches.

A preliminary report on the project was included in Hart Trial Results 2022, recently published by Hart Field Group.

Two approaches are being trialled to ameliorate saline soil patches. The first was to apply sand, straw or gypsum to reduce evaporation of soil moisture or reduce the moisture needed for germination by increasing the sand content of the soil surface.

Gypsum was also added to increase the amount of calcium relative to the level of sodium (salt) and address sodicity in the longer-term.

Sand and gypsum treatments were spread on the soil surface on May 3, 2022, then baled wheat straw applied on May 27.

Treatments included control, gypsum 10 tonnes/hectare, straw 3.3 tonnes per hecatre, straw 6.6 t/ha, straw 10 t/ha, sand 130 t/ha, sand 650 t/ha and sand 1300 t/ha.

Sand from a pit at Alford was applied in layers of 1cm (130 t/ha), 5cm (650 t/ha) and 10cm (1300 t/ha) to cover the surface. The gypsum applied had a purity of 69 per cent making it a grade three product.

The trial was sown with Hurricane XT lentils on May 26 at a rate of 50 kg/ha.

Fertiliser at seeding was applied as MAP one per cent Zn at 60 kg/ha and the trial was managed to ensure a weed, insect and disease-free canopy.

The second approach was to investigate the performance of different crop types on saline soils and between varieties with improved salt tolerance.

"Lentil crop cover assessments at harvest showed that sand applied at 650 t/ha and 1300 t/ha had the highest level of crop cover at 70-90 per cent," Mr Trengove wrote in the sum-

also translated to improved grain yields of 0.45 t/ha and 0.57 t/ha compared with the control plot yield of 0.12 t/ha.

These results indicated the higher sand rate treatments provided a non-saline layer for crops to establish well and yield more in year one of the trial (2022).

Application of at least 650 t/ha of sand or 6.6 t/ha of straw produced higher crop cover at harvest and grain yields compared with the untreated plots.

Mr Trengove observed the application of sand at that rate was logistically difficult unless there was a nearby source.

"Where sand is not readily available it is likely to be unviable and application of straw at 6.6 t/ha would be more achievable," he wrote.

"The longevity of response is important for these amelioration treatments due to high cost and needs further investigation."

The first-year results of the project show crop type has a bigger impact on crop performance compared to variety selection.

Mr Trengove wrote it was expected wheat lines which were almost genetically identical to Gladius and Scepter would perform better than those two standard varieties, as they had a greater capacity to

"However, no crop or yield benefit was measured in this trial and more investigation is required to determine why this occurred," he wrote.

Another surprise from the trial was the performance of different crop species.

It was expected that barley, triticale, wheat and safflower would perform best; however, Mulgara oats produced the greatest grain yield of 0.9 t/ha closely followed by safflower, barley and field pea.

Mr Trengove explained that dry saline soils occured in soils with high levels of naturally occurring salt but were not associated with a shallow water table.

Poor plant growth and yields were commonly observed on impacted areas, because it's more difficult for crops to up take water and high salt levels could have a toxic effect on the plant.

The saline trial area at Tickera is hosted by Michael Barker and was selected based on historical crop performance and soil test result.

Rainfall at Tickera in the 2022 growing season (April to October) was 250 mm in 2022, with the comparable long-term average at 252 mm.

The trial will continue to be monitored in 2023 to observe any residual effects of applied sand and stubble and the effect of the different crop types.

The project is a partnership Mallee Sustainable Farming and received funding from the Australian Government's Future Drought Fund.



Members of the public may notice noise, vibration, flashes and/or smoke during the testing. There is no risk to the public outside of the gazetted Defence Practice Areas.

For reasons of public safety, there is a permanent exclusion zone covering land, sea and air around the Port Wakefield Establishment. Specific details on the Port Wakefield Prohibited Area can be obtained from Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No GN 26, 4 July 1990, and is shown on the diagram below. Trespassing in this Area is strictly prohibited and very dangerous due to the presence of unexploded bombs. Any person found within the Prohibited Area or on Defence land will be subject to prosecution.

Specific test and evaluation activities may also require restricting public access to the Port Wakefield Defence Practice Areas over specific periods with these areas articulated in the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No. GN 40, 7 October 1992, and also identified on the diagram below. This may affect access to the Gulf of St Vincent at Port Wakefield and Port Parham.





Wallaroo: Local coastal breezes were slightly stronger than predicted last week, forcing boat crews to remain closer to home with limited run-out time. Gar and squid are off Point Riley and there are still a few blue swimmer crabs south of the jetty. Slow weekend tides had a few squid at the jetty and not much else.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Large numbers of early Easter and school holiday visitors are already up and about as shown at a couple of busy boat ramps over the weekend. Gar. squid and even some early King George whiting are down at Cape Elizabeth and out at West Light. Blueys and squid can be caught from the jetties.

Port Victoria: Good reports of KG whiting continue from Port Victoria, Balgowan and Chinaman Wells, plus gar and squid in the late afternoons. Mullet can be found at most local beaches on the high

Point Turton: It was an unusually quiet week on the local fishing scene and slow tidal movements did not help. Boat crews

ventured out far and wide for small gar, squid and snook. Mullet can be caught from Hardwicke Bay, Point Souttar and The Pines beaches, while the jetty is worth a try for tommy ruff (Australian herring) after

Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: Most bottom-end beaches have mullet at the moment with Browns and Gym Beaches being inundated with shore-based anglers trying their luck. Tuna are still the targets for crews from Marion Bay, along with red nannygai, sweep, kingfish and KG whiting. Jetty-based fishing has tommies, squid and

Edithburgh/Stansbury: Steady onshore southerlies were very much of last week's fishing action, so the sheltered grounds at Edithburgh, Stansbury and Port Vincent were popular spots for crews in tinnies trying for blueys, gar and squid. The jetties have tommies and squid.

Ardrossan: A couple of nice KG whiting were caught from Long Spit and about 1km south of the Zanoni wreck at the end of the week. Gar and a few blueys are at the north-east reef and the jetty has tommies, squid and overnight mulloway at times.

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NO SALARY CAP BREACH AT ARDROSSAN FC

ARDROSSAN Football Club has defended its player payments under the SANFL Community Football salary cap.

The Kangaroos were left stunned by an Adelaide radio station's accusation they were being investigated by the SANFL for breaching the state-wide cap on the morning of Yorke Peninsula Football League's opening round, on Saturday morning, April 1.

A SANFL spokesperson said Ardrossan FC was not under investigation.

"We have (salary cap) investigations ongoing and, when these are finalised, we'll issue statements," the spokesperson said.

Ardrossan FC executive member Danny Le Feuvre said the club received calls from its members who were listening to the station on Saturday morning.

"We (the club) had a discussion with the SANFL which assured us we weren't being investigated, and the accusations were false,"

Le Feuvre said.

"We take our responsibility of following the salary cap very seriously - it's all done through the
