Airstrip upgrades propelled forward by \$250k in funding

MAITLAND and Copper Coast airstrips have received a combined \$250,000 in federal funding for much-needed upgrades.

Yorke Peninsula Council will get \$220,000 to reseal and line mark Maitland's airstrip.

Copper Coast Council will receive \$30,000 for certification works to allow for a GPS arrival process to be installed and implemented to

allow all-weather landing in Kadina.

The councils are among those to have received grants totalling \$1.4 million under round two of the Australian Government's Regional Airports Program.

Director of assets and infrastructure services Andre Kompler said the funding would allow Yorke Peninsula Council to overcome problems at the airstrip, reseal some parts and seal others for the first time.

Fisherman Bay freeholding wins development approval

FISHERMAN Bay has secured its final development approval from the State Commission Assessment Panel.

The panel has approved the division of land currently held by Fisherman's Bay Management Authority into 432 freehold allotments.

Infrastructure developments including connection to sewerage, stormwater management, upgraded roads and coastal protection mea-

sures are all part of the approval.

Barunga West Council CEO Maree Wauchope said the approval represented a major win for the Top of the Yorke region.

"This final approval brings with it further certainty for Fisherman Bay residents around this development and the future of their community," Ms Wauchope said.

"With the conveyancing process now underway, residents can expect to receive their freehold titles soon."

Fishies Bay freehold

THE news Fisherman Bay is finally going to be freeholded will have residents of the settlement rejoicing, and it should be celebrated in the wider region as well.

The State Commission Assessment Panel has announced final development approval for the project, which has been in the works for well in excess of two decades.

There is a lot of on-the-ground work required yet, but this is an exciting step.

It will mean massive infrastructure improvements in the area, required as part of the freeholding.

This includes an upgraded and expanded sewerage system with an associated expansion of the Port Broughton treatment plant, a rising main from Fisherman Bay and a storage lagoon.

This will completely modernise the region's wastewater system.

Beyond that, there will also be coastal protection works that could have flow-on benefits to tourism, and much more.

Fisherman Bay's Management first lodged a development application to subdivide the land with the then-District Council of Barunga West in 2000.

A decade later the application lapsed and FBM applied for an extension with variances, promising to spend more than \$1.5 million on infrastructure.

Residents received letters offering them the chance to purchase their land freehold earlier in 2010, and almost 300 people attended a public meeting to discuss the situation.

The following year, council handed the application to the state government because too many local Development Assessment Panel members had conflicts of interest.

Five more years of back-and-forth ensued before the state panel granted development plan consent and land division consent in 2017.

Fast forward another four years and the final approval has been granted.

Council estimates the project will support 230 full-time equivalent jobs and provide a huge boost to the economy.

Most importantly, will Fisherman Bay residents finally own their properties.

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\$3 million boost for Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park

THE state government will invest \$3 million in a new lookout, upgraded campgrounds and improved visitor facilities for three sites in Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park.

A new lookout will be constructed at Chinaman's Hill to give visitors a dedicated place to take in the views of Investigator Strait, the Althorpe Islands group as well as Kangaroo Island in the distance.

Improvements will also be made at Stenhouse Bay and Shell Beach, including constructing additional facilities picnic areas, toilet facilities and carparks at the day-visitor areas and campgrounds.

Minister for Environment and Water David Speirs said the upgrades are part of the state government's Parks 2025 initiative.

"Parks 2025 is a once-in-a-generation investment in more than 30 parks across the state to improve the visitor experience and boost conservation," Mr Speirs said.

"Dhilba Gurranda-Innes National Park is a spectacular part of our state with its beautiful coastline and beaches and these upgrades will further enhance its reputation as a must-visit destination.

"Our national parks are more popular than ever with visitor numbers at record levels as many South Australians look to holiday in their home state."

Mr Speirs said visitors to national parks provide a significant economic boost to the regions and support local jobs.

"I am proud to be part of a government which is delivering record amounts of funding to our national parks to improve visitor facilities, enhance nature-based tourism offerings and boost conservation of our natural landscapes and wildlife,"

Mr Speirs said.

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said he believes Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park is undersold as a tourism destination.

"Everything we do to encourage more visitation will have positive flow-on effects for our tourism economy," Mr Ellis said.

"I look forward to seeing this investment occur and the wonderful improvement it will make for visitors to our beautiful community."

The Department for Environment and Water is working with the park's Traditional Owners and Friends of Parks volunteer groups to ensure the best outcome in creating new visitor facilities at the park.

Construction is expected to start in September.

What's being upgraded?

Chinaman's Hill lookout: A new lookout will give visitors an even better viewing experience, with 360-degree views of southern Yorke Peninsula, multiple viewing platforms and interpretative signage. Works will also include the construction of sealed two-way access roads, a new carpark for up to 25 vehicles and minor infrastructure and signage updates.

Stenhouse Bay: Facilities at the day visitor area will be boosted with the construction of new toilet blocks, a new picnic shelter with two barbecues and picnic tables, stone fencing and an upgrade to the visitor car park. The large Stenhouse Bay campground, which services visitors in tents, caravans, campervans and camper trailers, will have a new toilet blocks and barbecues.

Shell Beach: Upgrades at Shell Beach will benefit swimmers at the popular nearby Blue Pool along with campers staying at Shell Beach campground. Works will include the construction of new toilet facilities, improved day visitor parking, new signage and a redesign of the campground including construction of new campsites.

Green light for Fisherman Bay

BARUNGA West Council CEO Maree Wauchope said final approval for the Fisherman Bay freeholding project was a major win for the region.

“The benefits of this \$20 million project extend far beyond the township of Fisherman Bay,” she said.

“We believe it will attract ongoing tourism and residential and investment interest in the entire region.”

Council has commenced the tender process for the first piece of infrastructure to be delivered, an upgraded and expanded

Community Wastewater Management System.

The CWMS tender was released on the SA Tenders and Contracts website on July 2 and closes on Thursday, August 19.

The works include the upgrade and expansion of the Port Broughton wastewater treatment plant, a rising main from Fisherman Bay to the Port Broughton plant, plus a new storage lagoon.

Economic modelling estimates the project will support 230 full-time equivalent jobs and contribute more than \$25 million in benefits to the regional economy over six years.

Commonwealth Bank Kadina hours reduced

These centres receive more than a million customer

enquiries every month, according to Commonwealth Bank executive general manager of customer service network Mark Jones.

“Our branches in regional Australia will continue to play an important role in delivering great service to our customers now and into the future,” Mr Jones said.

“This is an example of how we are adapting to meet customers’ evolving needs while ensuring jobs stay in regional communities.

“We’re expanding our Australian-based contact centre network from five dedicated locations to over 90 communities across the country, while keeping a physical banking presence in regional communities.”

Outside of these new trading hours, Bank@Post will continue to be available at Australia Post outlets for customers seeking face-to-face banking services.

The Dunes Port Hughes stage one sold

THE first stage of The Dunes, Port Hughes, is off the market.

Rural Bank chief operating officer Will Rayner has written to Copper Coast Council to advise Peter Kallin “and his related interests” had purchased the developed and undeveloped land within stage one of the precinct.

Stage one features the nine-hole golf course and all developed and undeveloped allotments on the site.

Rural Bank acquired the development in 2013 after it had been placed into receivership the year before.

“We believe the sale will allow the development to move forward,” Mr Rayner said.

“We can also confirm we are in advanced discussions for the sale of the stage two land to a separate party and will confirm this in due course.

“The bank and its parent, Bendigo and Adelaide Bank Limited, feel the sale gives this key asset for the Copper Coast region the best opportunity to progress.”

Settlement for stage one is expected later this month.

Airstrip upgrades

YORKE Peninsula Council director of assets and infrastructure services Andre Kompler said controlling downhill subsoil water flow into the Maitland airstrip runway subgrade was key to overcoming ongoing problems.

“Council will be seeking to retrospectively limit the extent of moisture change under the runway pavement to save a lot of future runway remediation expenditure, such as stabilisation of the subgrade or use of a geotextile and a runway pavement overlay,” Mr Kompler said.

“Furthermore, as part of the works, council will look to reseal failing sections of seal around the general aviation parking area and sealing (an) extension adjacent to the existing taxiway.”

Copper Coast Council CEO Russell Peate said the project at the airstrip between Kadina and Wallaroo would allow the Royal Flying Doctor Service to land for emergencies in all weather.

“It will also benefit aerial firefighting aircraft operated by the Country Fire Service, Adelaide flight training schools and other visiting planes,” Mr Peate said.

“Council will engage a consultant to undertake a site survey and produce a validation audit report, the necessary operating manual and documentation for CASA certification.”

Federal Member for Grey Rowan Ramsey said to have capital injections into vital infrastructure like local airstrips reduced pressure on ratepayers and freed up resources for local governments to allocate to other priorities.

“Every dollar spent on local infrastructure is a dollar well spent and I look forward to working with the community to deliver this vital funding as we continue recovering from the pandemic,” Mr Ramsey said.

Both projects are expected to be completed next year.

Grant powers up Bay Road project

COPPER Coast Council's plan to underground powerlines at Bay Road, Moonta Bay, has been given a boost.

Council received \$970,400 in June last year for works between Caroline and George Streets, as well as a section of Bay Road and part of Tossell and Bowden Streets as part of the state government's Power Line Environment Committee funding program.

The works were due to be completed in the 2022-23 financial year as part of coun-

cil's overall Bay Road upgrade.

However, PLEC wrote to council in July to advise it the project had been brought forward to the second half of 2021-22.

Council will now receive \$1,186,023 from PLEC, and is contributing \$593,011 of its own funding and a further \$50,000 in in-kind costs towards the \$1,455,600 project.

Mayor Roslyn Talbot has welcomed the funding boost.

"The undergrounding of powerlines was a key consideration of residents during consultation, and we are very

pleased to be able to bring this forward as part of the works," Mrs Talbot said.

"Letters will go out to affected residents shortly and we will try to limit interruptions.

"Individual connections will also be included at no cost to residents, that will be covered in the funding we received.

"This really is a great project and it's pleasing to see it being brought forward."

The Bay Road redevelopment is broken into six stages, with council keen to apply for more PLEC funding for the remaining phases.

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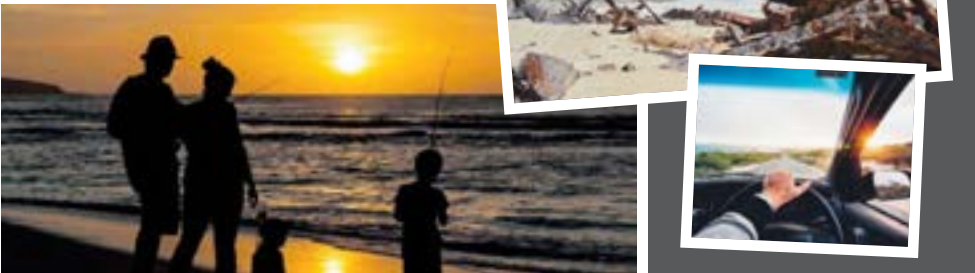

Rolling up for vaccinations

ABOUT 42 per cent of Yorke Peninsula residents have had their first dose of a COVID-19 vaccine.

New figures from SA Health reveal a steady increase in vaccination numbers across the peninsula since June.

This comes as Therapeutic Goods Administration approved the Moderna vaccine yesterday (Monday, August 9).

The government purchased 25 million doses of the mRNA vaccine in May and Minister for Health Greg Hunt said the first million are due next month.

The state vaccination clinic at the Wallaroo Hospital continues offering Pfizer immunisations to all regional residents over 16, with appointments opening up in October.

AstraZeneca vaccinations are available for those 60 and over as soon as next week.

GP clinics, including Medical HQ Ardrossan, are also offering Pfizer.

The practice is holding vaccination clinics on Mondays, and demand is high.

“Really it is all dependent on supply, we’re hoping that will change soon and we can have more,” practice manager Julie Johnston said.

“It was a little confusing initially

because we thought we'd be able to vaccinate all those over 16, but that's only at the state clinics.

“We have been able to do a lot of frontline staff — from hospitals, aged care facilities and even super-market workers and teachers.”

Mrs Johnston said the clinic is also vaccinating people with AstraZeneca but people appeared to still be unsure about that vaccine due to mixed messages and media reports.

“People seem to really want the Pfizer, but we really do only have a limited supply of that,” she said.

Mrs Johnston said staff have also been kept busy by the extension of after-hours GP services with Medical HQ Maitland, from 10am to 1pm on alternate Sundays.

Opposition calling for senate inquiry

FEDERAL Minister for Health and Ageing Mark Butler wants to put a spotlight on GP shortages like those experienced across Yorke Peninsula.

Mr Butler is calling for a Senate inquiry into general practice workforce shortages in outer metro, regional and rural Australia.

"A lack of doctors and other medical professionals in regional and rural communities across Australia is not a new problem, but a series of government decisions and the pandemic means it is time to spotlight this critical issue before people are left with no health-care options in their community," Mr Butler said.

"Labor wants the inquiry to seek practical, positive solutions to make sure Australians have access to quality health care regardless of where they live."

RDAA president John Hall said the inquiry must focus on solutions.

"We welcome the Senate inquiry, but it is essential that it not distract from, or delay, the good and much-needed work that is already

underway to address this nation-wide issue," he said.

"(It must) not just provide yet another forum for everyone to wax lyrical about issues that have been talked to death for at least 10 years, and not resolved."

"What we don't want to see is the issues in outer metropolitan areas being lumped in with the issues in rural areas."

Rural and remote areas have low numbers of GPs per capita, and significantly poorer health outcomes, Dr Hall said.

"This inquiry must ensure there is (a) very clear distinction between the issues affecting outer metropolitan, small and large regional communities, and rural and remote, and address the genuine inequity of access found in rural and remote areas," he said.

"We need rural workforce dollars to work smarter, not harder, and deliver outcomes into the rural services they were intended for, not being frittered away in duplication, bureaucracy or metro and large regional centres that don't need them and shouldn't have them."

Slight change of restrictions in SA

A MODEST easing of COVID-19 restrictions in South Australia will take place as of 12.01am Thursday, August 12.

The Transition Committee met this morning (Tuesday) to discuss the further easing of restrictions across the state.

The latest changes mainly surround density arrangements for seated activities.

Seated food and beverage consumption in hospitality venues, cinemas, and theatres will increase to three per four square metres or 75 per cent capacity.

Standing density for sports competitions and retail will remain at one per two square metres, while gyms and other indoor fitness will remain at one per four square metres.

Home gatherings are still capped at 10, but private gatherings outside of the home have increased to 50 for birthdays — weddings and funerals remain at 50.

There is no change to mask or border restrictions whatsoever and the ban on singing and dancing still stands.

Premier Steven Marshall said the state remains on high alert with the developing cases across the country.

"We acknowledge the restrictions are tight but they need to be tight," Mr Marshall said.

No new cases of the virus were announced today but two were confirmed on Sunday, August 8 — a women in her 30s and a child who both acquired their infections overseas and have been in a medi-hotel since their arrival.

This takes the total cases notified in South Australia to 868 — the state currently has seven active cases.

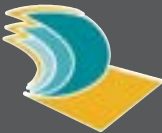

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Planning board? Don't plan on it

YORKE Peninsula councils are abandoning their bid to create a regional planning board, after about four years' work.

Barunga West, Copper Coast and Yorke Peninsula Councils began the process to create a Joint Planning Agreement in 2017.

The board would then be able to create a regional plan, which planning staff believed would give

them a greater say in decisions in the regions.

Copper Coast director development services Muller Mentz said a lot of effort went into the formation of the board.

The councils developed a business case for the proposal and wrote to the then Minister for Planning Stephan Knoll for more autonomy.

A response was delayed, due to the roll out of the Planning and Design Code, and in June Copper

Coast Council was told the board would not get that freedom.

"The main reason we wanted to do that was so we could do the regional plan, not the state government," Mr Mentz said.

"But after speaking to the other councils we reached the conclusions we should not put the time and effort in if the Minister (for Planning) can overrule us.

"We can be involved in consultation, but the final say is removed."

Mr Mentz said the implementation of the board and plan would also create an increased financial cost to councils, with planning departments already under pressure due to the new planning code.

"I find it really disappointing the staff have put a lot of work into this agreement thinking it would give us a bit more control, but things changed," Copper Coast mayor Roslyn Talbot said.

Homelessness is here — you just can't see it

NATIONAL Homelessness Week was observed August 1-7.

This year's event focused on unlocking the door to 'home', seeking to raise awareness about people experiencing homelessness, issues they face, and action needed to achieve long-lasting solutions.

Local events couldn't happen due to COVID-19, but services including Uniting Country SA and The Salvation Army continue to advocate for and help the vulnerable.

Salvation Army Copper Coast Corps Captain Karen Armstrong said in 2019-20 the Salvos' homelessness services helped more than 41,000 people at risk of, or experiencing, homelessness.

"Our vast network of social services enables people experiencing homelessness to access accommodation, case-management services, advocacy, financial assistance, counselling and meals, as well as connection and referral to other specialist services," Mrs Armstrong said.

"We believe everyone should have access to safe, secure and affordable housing.

"When communities invest in social and affordable housing, we can end homelessness."

Locally, The Salvos have recently hired two more people to help offer emergency relief, as well as case management services.

"This way I am not as stretched and we can help more people, more often," Mrs Armstrong said.

"Our services will always be open for the community including our shower facility, and our strong partnerships with services such as Foodbank and Community Care and Transport will continue."

First outcome from roundtable

Copper Coast Council and local service providers discussed achievable outcomes in the fight against homelessness at a roundtable meeting in May.

CEO Russell Peate said council had since completed the 24-hour list for service providers.

"We went back and forth about three times to make sure we included everyone," Mr Peate said.

"The brochure is almost finished but there's still something to work on.

"The other priority was crisis accommodation but that will take some time to progress."

Telstra payphones free

TELSTRA has made its payphones free across Australia.

In the past year, about 11 million calls were made across Australia from Telstra payphones.

This included more than 230,000 calls to critical services like Triple Zero (000) and Lifeline.

"Everyone can now use payphones to make a free local or national call to a standard fixed line or a call to an Australian mobile, when they need to," Telstra CEO Andrew Penn said.

"They are an iconic and critical part of our community, and for many Australians, the availability of a payphone is a vital lifeline, especially for those vulnerable including the homeless, people who are isolated or someone escaping an unsafe situation.

"It's not always easy for people in these situations to use a home phone or their mobile to get help, so I hope making payphone calls free might play a small part in helping them get the assistance they need.

"It's really important to break down that sense of social poverty, social isolation, and to connect with a friend or with support services."

Where are homeless Australians staying?

- Severely crowded dwellings — nearly half (44 per cent) of all homeless people live in 'severely' crowded dwellings
- Supported accommodation for the homeless — almost one in five (18 per cent) homeless people live in supported accommodation for the homeless
- With other households — roughly one in seven (15 per cent) of homeless people stay temporarily with other households
- In improvised dwellings, tents or sleeping out — seven per cent of people experiencing homelessness are rough sleepers

Keeping the projectors rolling

STATEWIDE Cinema Kadina has been allocated \$35,000 through the federal government's \$20 million Supporting Cinemas' Retention Endurance and Enhancement of Neighbourhoods Fund.

Federal Member for Grey Rowan Ramsey said the grants would support the recovery of independent cinemas from significant declines in revenue due to COVID-19.

"This funding will enable our independent cinemas to keep operating, which is so important to the fabric of our community, during a period of severe disruption," Mr Ramsey said.

"While there are so many different platforms for accessing movies in this modern world, taking in a movie on the big screen, sending the children off to the pictures in the school holidays, means cinemas still have an important role to play in today's world.

"Cinemas were hit hard during COVID-19, particularly last year when the major production houses held back on the release of new movies, and many are still doing it tough.

"I was very pleased when the fund was announced in March and am even happier now it has been allocated to the local businesses."

Administered by Screen Australia, the fund assists independent cinema operators who have experienced declines in revenue of at least 30 per cent due to the pandemic.

More than \$8.7m has now been granted for 158 independent cinema sites across Australia.

Without grant, cinema would "definitely" close

STATEWIDE Cinema Kadina owner Carol Burford said a Supporting Cinemas' Retention Endurance and Enhancement of Neighbourhoods Fund grant of \$35,000 would be a tremendous help.

The funding will assist the cinema with day-to-day business costs, she said.

"Because limited tickets can be sold due to COVID-19 restrictions, and because people are still not coming to cinemas in high numbers, the grant helps to cover the running costs of the cinema during these adverse times," Mrs Burford said.

"It is hoped this once-off grant from the federal government will bridge the gap until things return to more 'normal' business trading.

"The film distributors are beginning to release their big-name movies and it is hoped people will make the effort to come back to watch movies at cinemas again."

Mrs Burford said if it hadn't been for the SCREEN grant her cinema would definitely be closed.

"It is very tough times for all businesses out there," she said.

"Obviously the current restrictions make it harder but I am hoping the local community makes an effort to come along to the cinema and show their support.

"I know there are now so many avenues to watch movies with different streaming platforms, but nothing is like watching a movie on a big screen with surround sound."

The state government is also helping businesses with grant funding after the state lockdown.

"Luckily I meet the criteria for this as well," Mrs Burford said.

"I do feel for smaller businesses who are impacted but cannot apply for the grant because they don't meet all the criteria, like not being registered for GST.

"These small businesses still deserve the grant and I think they need to talk to Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis to make a plea on their behalf."

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Program builds resilience

YORKE Peninsula's recent bushfires have prompted the creation of a new program to help fire-affected communities increase their preparedness.

The Community Resilience and Readiness program is funded by Country SA Primary Health Network and part of the federal government's mental health response to bushfire trauma.

It is designed to help communities increase their resilience for future bushfires and other disasters, led by a community resilience officer.

Country SA PHN CEO Kim Hosking said there are now seven CROs across the four bushfire-affected communities in SA.

"As the emergency response services were wrapping up, we could see the importance of keeping the great work of many in these communities going and continuing that momentum in a capacity-building role," he said.

"We're very pleased to fund the CROs in such an important initiative to assist communities to face inevitable future challenges with resilience, preparedness and a sense of empowerment."

YP CROs Kate Martin and Katie Hughes said the fires at Yorketown, Price and Maitland highlighted gaps in the community's preparedness, and exposed other wellbeing issues were bubbling beneath the surface.

"The fires were a catalyst for many Yorke Peninsula communities to identify some of the concerns and gaps they had in their disaster resilience and awareness, and wellbeing more generally," Ms Martin said.

"This resilience and preparedness education is the key to improving understanding about natu-

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ral hazards in the local environment and ways to keep communities safe from harm before, during and after an emergency or disaster."

YP's program will focus on empowering the community through psychological and physical preparedness, the development of individual and collective strength and resilience, and providing a coordinated and consistent approach to disaster resilience awareness and education.

The CROs have already planned a Community Group Governance information session presented by Community Legal Centres SA and Volunteers SA/NT on August 4, Support for the Yorke Peninsula Indigenous Round on August 7 and Accidental Counsellor training with Wellbeing SA on August 10.

Southern Yorke Peninsula sporting legend Graham Trevor Gutsche passed away peacefully at home on Saturday, June 26, aged 82 years.

The middle sibling among five brothers, Graham was an outstanding sportsman in the summer passion of leather and willow, and the southern states' obsession Australian Rules football.

He grew up alongside older brothers Kevin and Neale, and after him came Leon and Colin.

Born at Yorketown on April 14, 1939, Graham was schooled locally at the old Yorketown School, before getting an opportunity for secondary education at Concordia College, Adelaide.


After some old-fashioned convincing from his two older brothers, he ventured to Adelaide with his cousin Gerald Gutsche.

A connection with Jack Strandling, then Prospect Cricket Club president, proved fruitful for the young cricketing talent.


By 14, Gutsche was playing in the Prospect C and D grades, and debuted at district A grade level at 16.

A left-handed batter and left-arm unorthodox spinner (googly bowler), Gutsche also went on a world tour with the Old Collegians Cricket Team in 1958-59.

After the initial trial, he was first reserve, but illness gave him the opportunity to play cricket in exotic places including Singapore, India and Pakistan, along with the home of cricket Lords in England and the Americas.

In total, he played 54 matches on the tour, which took four and a half months.

At Prospect, Gutsche developed a great friendship with state fast bowler Graham "Clackers" Clarke and played alongside cricket's greatest all-rounder Sir Garfield Sobers when he came to play for SA.

Gutsche played 60 A grade matches for Prospect and was a member of the club's inaugural SACA A grade district flag in 1960-61, after being a member of the grand final team the previous summer.

His highest district A grade score was 56 runs, with an aggregate of 1150 at an average of 19.49. He sent down 247.2 overs, including 25 maidens, and took 48 wickets at an

impressive average of 21.67 per scalp.

Gutsche started playing football with the Walkerville Cats division one amateur league side as a 17 year old.

In 1959, after his coach Ray Linke (former South Adelaide and state footballer) had a Panthers official watch him play, Gutsche was offered

a guaranteed league game at South, but North would not clear him.

He started at Prospect Oval with North the following season, in 1960.

By round three in early May, he made his SANFL league debut against Norwood, playing four senior games in that premiership season and qualifying for the expenses-paid end-of-season trip to Bunbury and Perth, Western Australia.

He played his fifth and final game in round 17, 1961, against West Adelaide, kicking two goals, before venturing back to Yorketown to start an electrical business in early 1962.

Gutsche's cricket continued to flourish at Sunbury, the home to cricket for many generations of the Gutsche clan.

He was the first of the three generations of his family, along with son Richie and grandson Blake, to make 1000 runs in a summer of Lower Yorke Peninsula cricket.

Graham was selected to play for SA Country against the touring South Africans in 1962-63 and also played against the MCC (English team) a couple of years later.

After a couple seasons as playing captain-coach at Western United in the SYPFL, Gutsche returned to his foundation club Yorketown, where he won successive Mail Medals.

His season 1964 effort, in which he received a massive medal 36 votes, has folklore status across the district.

Collecting back-to-back Mail Medals in 1965, Gutsche was then third behind John Tape in 1967.

He was a regular SYP district representative footballer and cricketer throughout his playing career.

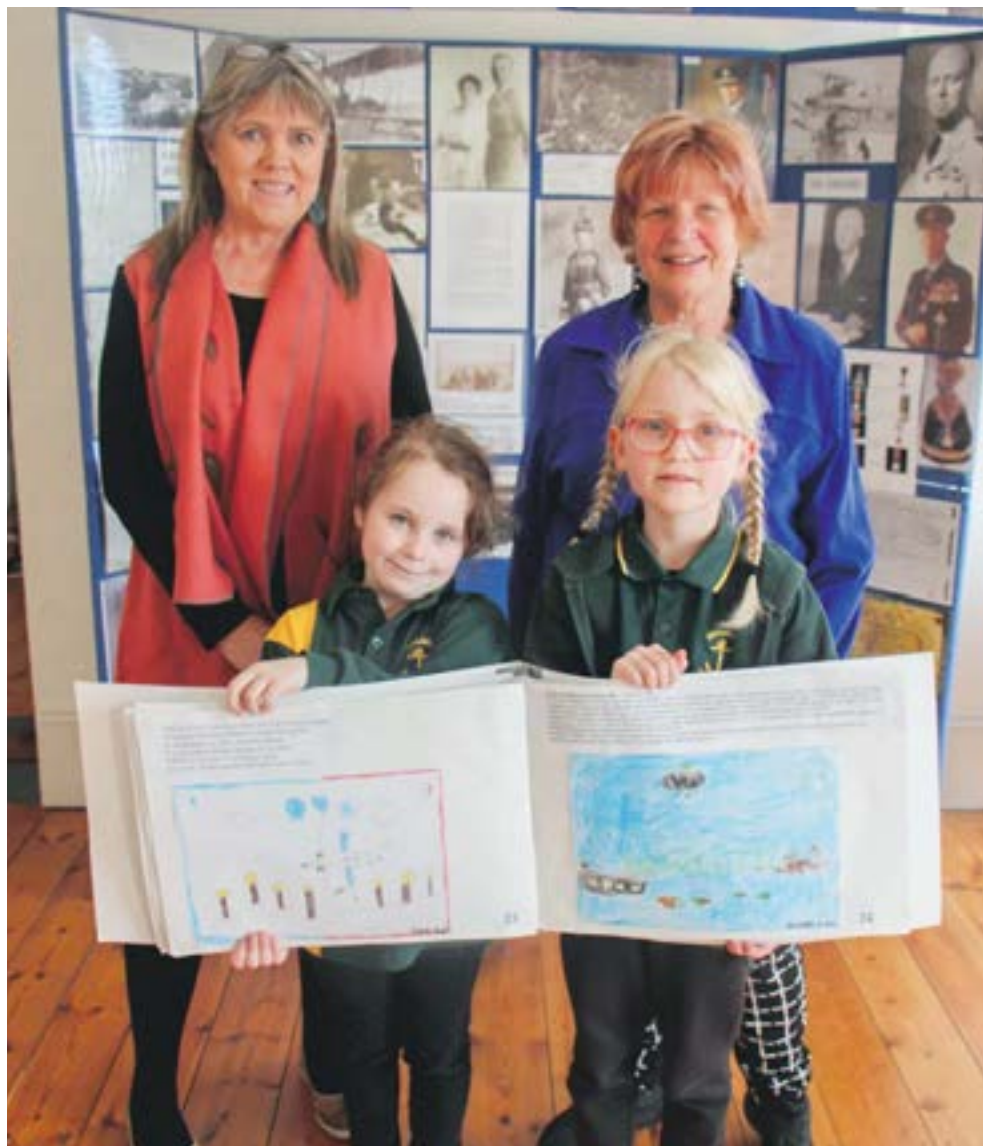
"We urge everyone to visit the Moonta Gallery of the Arts and appreciate the talent in our community, from the young children through to our veteran artists," Mrs Longo said.

Celebrations in November

THE Sir Richard Williams Centenary Celebrations have been postponed.

Organisers had planned to hold a parade through Moonta and unveil a statue of the aviation legend in August, but have pushed it until November due to the pandemic.

“It is essential we maintain safety for the people who will be attending the celebrations and also maximise the number of people who can attend the events, given the importance of the project Australia wide,” Sir Richard Williams Centenary Celebrations committee chair Robyn Knight said.

Celebrations will now begin at 10.30am on Sunday, November 7.

“The street parade and march from Verran Terrace, next to the Moonta Memorial Park Bowling Club, will head down George Street to Queen Square,” Mrs Knight said.

“At 11.20am we will have a vintage plane fly past, then at 11.30am we will unveil the Sir Richard Williams statue.

“A RAAF fly past will occur at 12.15pm and will be followed by book launches, lunch and a thanks-

giving church service at Moonta Mines Uniting Church at 2.30pm.”

The bronze sculpture of Sir Richard, commissioned by the committee, was funded by local groups, businesses, individuals and the state government.

Sculptor Tim Thomson brought the bottom half to Moonta recently to fit it to the bench, created by Goerecke Memorials.

The current art exhibition — Reaching for the Sky, at the Moonta Gallery of the Arts — was intended to be held at the same time as the celebrations; it is open until August 29.

“Much of it will then be transferred to the Moonta History Centre until November 6 when it will be put in the town hall for the event day,” Mrs Knight said.

“The RAAF has also cancelled the Commemorative Church Service in Adelaide for August 13, the centenary of the date the RAAF was made Royal, due to the impact of COVID restrictions.

“Preparations and planning are continuing and we will welcome anyone who wishes to be involved in assisting in the events.

“We are grateful for the assistance of Shaun Mercer from Goercke Memorials with the project.”

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Glaucoma implant

A new once-a-year ocular implant, the iDose TR for sustained release of travoprost – usually prescribed in eye-drop form for glaucoma – is being trialled.

The implant is hoped to dramatically improve patient compliance, which can be as low as 50 per cent with eye-drops.

As glaucoma is usually caused by an increase in intraocular pressure (IOP), the purpose of any treatment is to lower the IOP within the eye to prevent the deterioration of optic nerves that causes permanent vision loss.

Eye-drops are the most commonly prescribed treatment; other alternatives include oral medication (short-term only), laser or minimally invasive glaucoma surgery to place microscopic stents to lower the IOP.

Having completed patient enrolment and randomisation, Glaukos Corporation is set to commence phase 3 clinical trials for the iDose TR, designed to continuously release therapeutic levels of travoprost for at least a year.

Once all the travoprost is released, the iDose TR is removed and replaced with a new iDose TR, thus offering an alternative to daily eye drop treatment.

Glaukos's US Food and Drug Administration New Drug Application Phase 3 clinical trials have randomised 1150 subjects across 89 clinical sites, the majority of which are in the USA.

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Locals at Patterson House opening

PORT Broughton locals travelled to Farina for the official opening of the historical Patterson House recently.

John and Rosalie Patterson, with son Richard, all of Port Broughton, made the journey for the opening of the restored home, which was originally owned by John's father.

The project has been the culmination of more than three years of work and was officially opened by Dick Smith.

"The original house my grandparents and father lived in was burned down in the '80s; however, due to the work of the Farina Restoration Group, it has been rebuilt to similar specifications," Richard said.

"It is now used as a welcome centre but more importantly to sell the proceeds of the rejuvenated underground bakery next door.

"As a kid the bakery was used to hang meat in — I was told never to climb into the oven or it would fall in and kill me."

Richard said the Patterson family held the title of Patterson House from 1926.

"The old place had none of the mod cons we take for granted today," he said.

"No power, water, refrigeration, plumbing or sewer; food was railed from Quorn once a week.

"The wood stove and kerosene lamps added to the oppressive heat."

Richard said many people believed the house was haunted.

"Doors opened and closed in the night and an apparition was seen in the kitchen," he said.

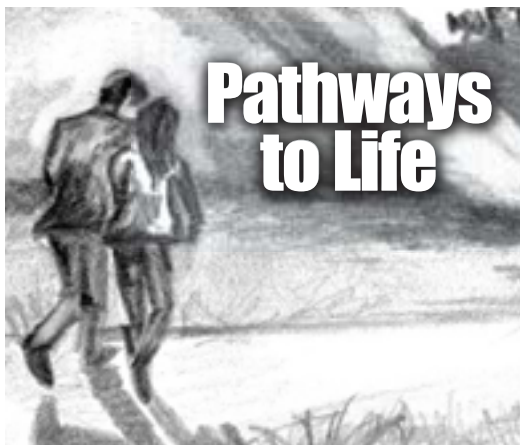
"The more formal dining room and lounge in the centre of the house were rarely used as most activities occurred in the large kitchen.

"Bath time was sometimes once a week using a bucket of water, heated in the copper and an old tin shed served as the washhouse."

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Time to encourage kids to get active

PHYSICAL activity plays such an important role not only in having a healthy heart, but also overall health and mental wellbeing.

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According to the Australian Bureau of Statistics, about 80 per cent of 5 to 17 year olds are not active enough, failing to meet the Australian Health Department's physical activity guidelines.

These guidelines recommend kids this age are active for at least 60 minutes per day to help reduce their risk of being overweight along with preventing the development of heart disease, diabetes and other chronic conditions.

Being physically active is also essential for healthy bone and muscle growth and brain development.

There are also social skill learning and mental health benefits of interacting with other kids through play and being active.

It is important to encourage children to be physically active from an early age as research suggests the exercise patterns we establish as children are likely to continue into our adult years.

As adults, we must set good examples, encourage our kids to be active, but also participating ourselves.

Think about walking or cycling to school with your kids instead of driving them.

If you live too far from school for your children to walk, park the car a bit further away and walk the last 10 minutes.

If you have a garden, encourage the kids

to get involved.

They'll stay active digging, weeding and planting.

It is also a great idea to keep a supply of frisbees, balls or skipping ropes around the house to provide plenty of options.

We know screen time can have an impact on physical activity levels, with research suggesting children who spend more time on screens are less active during the day and more likely to be overweight or obese.

The good news is it can be turned around.

Researchers identified significant improvements in kids' activity levels when they reduced their screen time by just one hour a day.

It is important to set limits from an early age to establish healthy behaviours right from the beginning.

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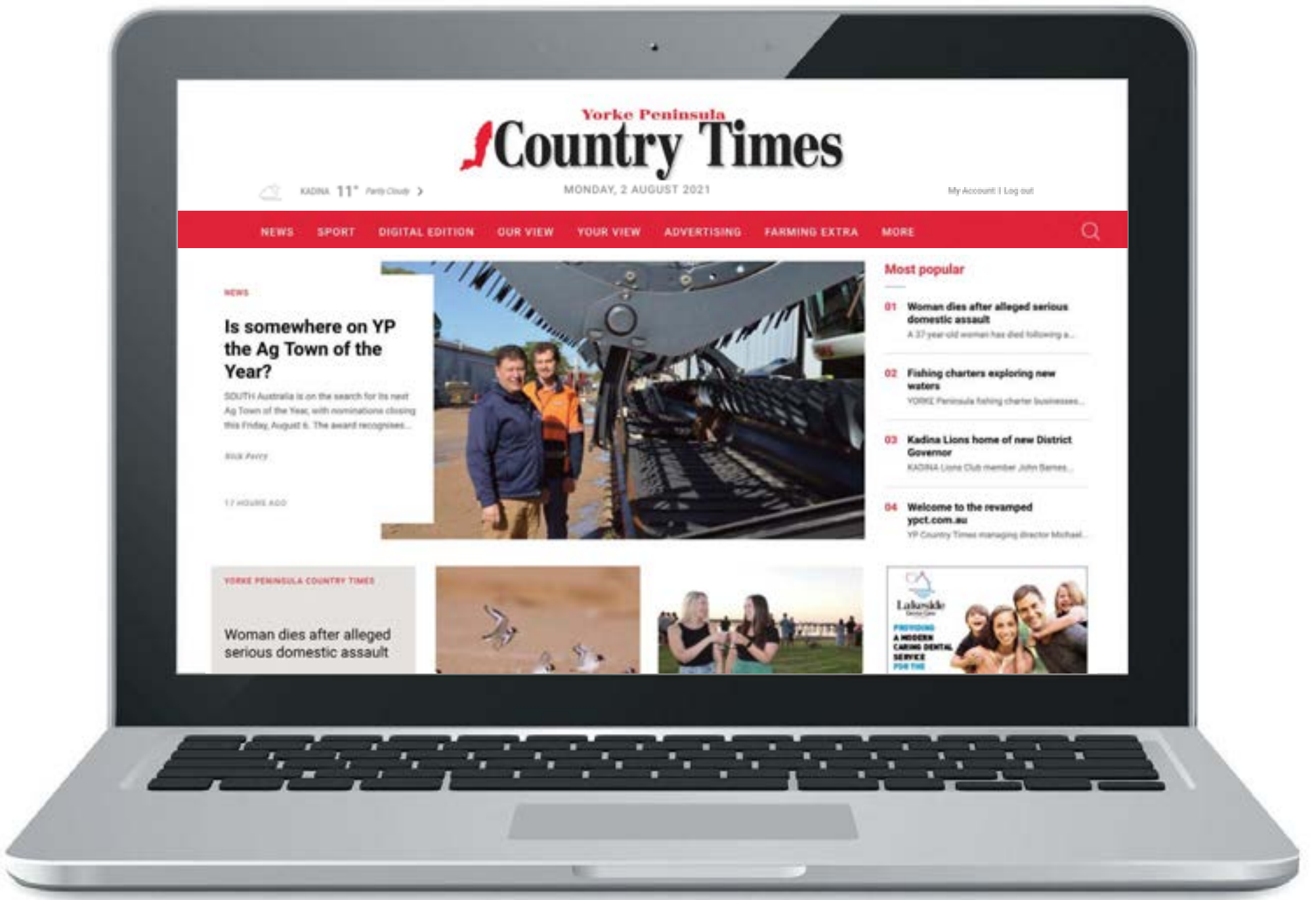

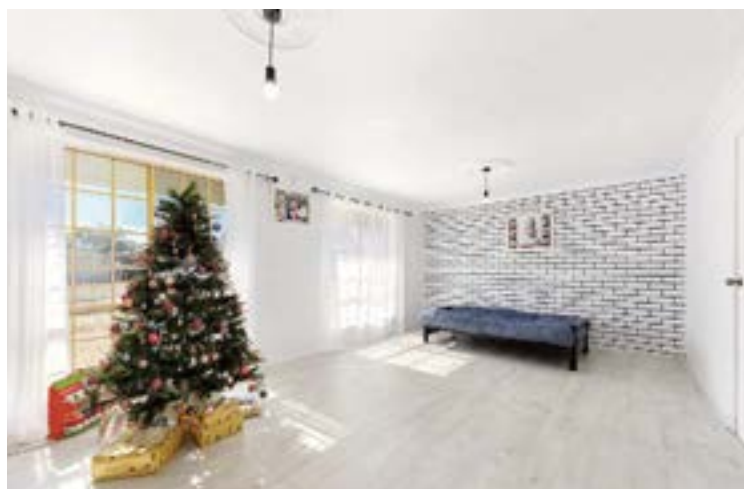

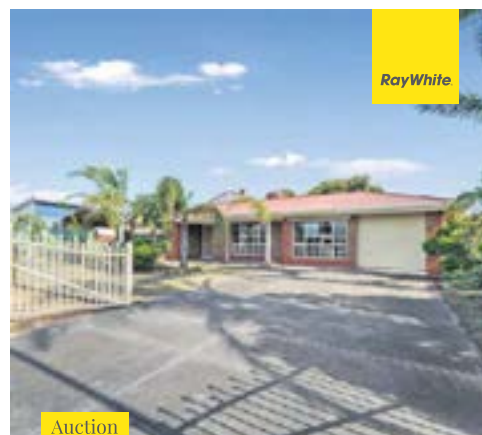

Strong start to ram sale season at North Cowie

"We abided by restrictions, but there was lots of uncertainty in the lead up and it wouldn't have gone ahead if the lockdown continued," stud owner Joe Murdoch said.

The most expensive ram was sold

In total, 63 of 64 rams sold in the main auction at an average of \$1693.

A further 71 of 81 were sold in a mini auction.

Mr Murdoch said the sale had a high clearance level and was an overall success.

"It was good to have a couple of new buyers this year, as well as some returning buyers from the Flinders Ranges after a couple of tough seasons," he said.

"This was the deepest line-up we've ever had — body weights were about eight kilograms up on the past couple of years, as a result of good seasonal (conditions) and management."

Opals ousted by eventual champs

It was a frustrating and disappointing Olympics for Kadina's Steph Talbot, who battled injury as her side lost in the quarter finals last Wednesday, August 4.

A foot injury kept Talbot out of the Opals' opening-round loss to Belgium, 70-85.

Talbot took the floor in her side's next game, against China, but was helped to the locker room after re-aggravating her injury.

In Talbot's absence, the Opals went blow for blow with the Chinese only to lose due to a foul call in the dying seconds that gifted their opponents two shots for the win.

Talbot had gone scoreless in 10 minutes but had three assists, two rebounds and a steal.

She sat out the Opals' next game, and only victory, against Puerto Rico.

In this thrilling contest, Australia needed to win by 25 points just to advance to the next round of the tournament.

The Aussies trailed at quarter time and led by one point at halftime before lifting their game to outscore Puerto Rico 23-8 in the third quarter.

The Puerto Ricans, determined not to let the Opals advance, played their best side right to the end of the match but the Opals won by 26 points — the go-ahead basket coming on a Cayla George turnaround mid-range jump shot — to keep their hopes alive.

Unfortunately, Australia then faced eventual gold medallist the United States in the quarterfinal.

Talbot had been considered unlikely to play again in the Olympic campaign but bravely put her hand up for the USA contest.

Clearly unable to perform to the best of her ability, Talbot nonetheless played strong defence and scored four points, with three boards, two dimes and two steals.

She was only able to play for 16 minutes and was held out of the game once it became clear the USA was going to win.

The Opals went down 55-79, their tournament over, and missed out on a medal for the second consecutive games.

The Aussies were always going to struggle without Talbot, the reigning Women's National Basketball League most valuable player, and the runner up for that award, centre Liz Cabbage.

Minlaton's Olympian

Emily Abbott, who grew up in Minlaton, competed in the Australian Rhythmic Group gymnastics at the Tokyo Olympics.

The 24 year old, who now lives in Brisbane, started learning gymnastics in Minlaton at age 7.

Her Australian team performed two routines — in qualification rounds one and two — scoring 20.85 and then 19.5.

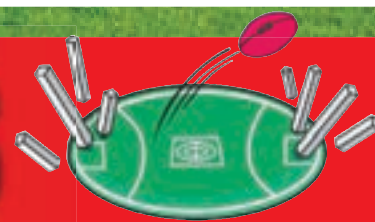

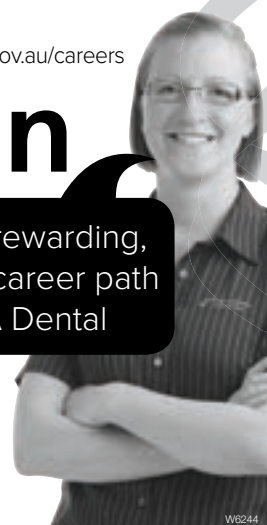

Get Starstruck

THE world is an uncertain place, but one thing remains true — I'm a sucker for good comedy.

BBC and HBO Max series Starstruck is the latest offering to catch my attention and here's why it should be next on your must-watch list.

New Zealand's Rose Matafeo wrote and stars in this six-part series which can be found on ABC iView.

Matafeo's Jessie meets Tom (Nikesh Patel) on New Year's Eve in London and the pair hit it off.

It's not until the next day Jessie realises Tom is actually a pretty famous actor.

It may sound derivative and pretty standard for a romantic comedy — boy and girl meet, drama ensues and everything gets resolved.

While Starstruck does follow some moderately predictable plot points and has been described as Notting Hill-esque, it's so much more.

Firstly, Hugh Grant would never have walked away from a one-night stand, dancing joyfully to Return of the Mack and engaging with everyone he walked past now would he?

Jessie doesn't crash any very important press conferences to declare her undying love for Tom, they had their fun and then went their separate ways, she was happy with that at the end of the first episode.

But that would make a very short series, so as you can imagine entertaining complications ensue.

The series is heavy on the comedy as Matafeo and co-writer Alice Snedden don't rely on the romance to

drive the plot.

It's the quality writing and depth of the characters that keep you engaged.

Matafeo is truly hilarious — dry and engaging and imperfect.

There are moments you cringe at her behaviour and wonder why but there were also times I couldn't stop laughing, or want to grab her in a giant hug.

Patel is also exceptional, and the two leads balance each other well, while Emma Sidi as housemate Kate is a delight.

London is almost like another character, a wonderful one at that, and provides a kind of catharsis in a world where we can only dream of travel.

Starstruck currently has a 100 per cent critic rating on Rotten Tomatoes, so you have to know I'm not just making this up.

And, if you need more proof, a second season was commissioned before the first season had even gone to air.

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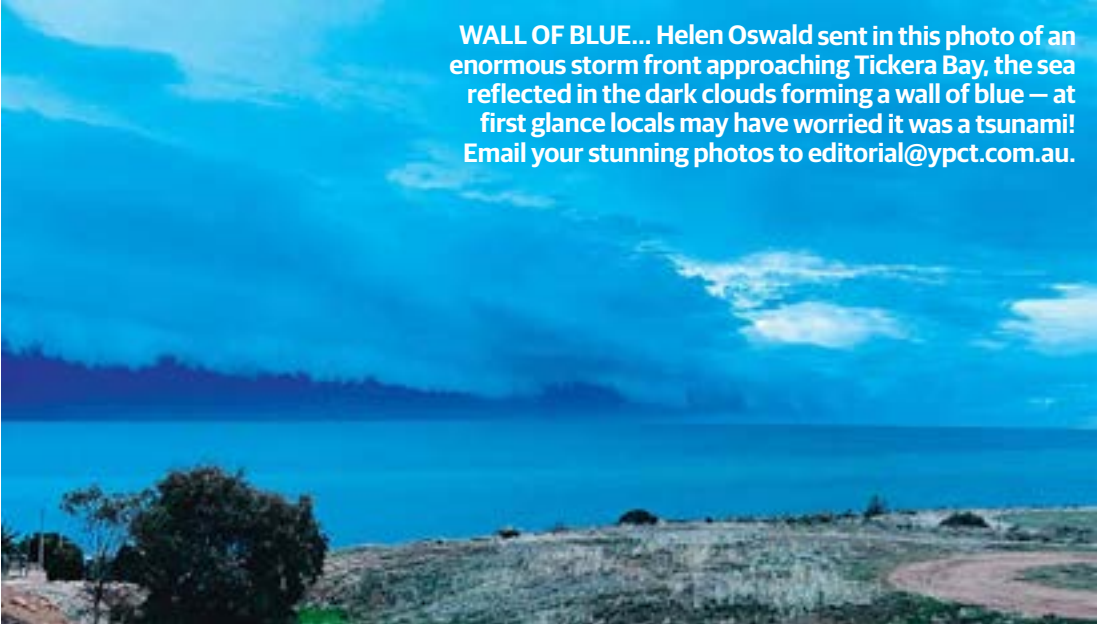

Ardrossan: Anglers enjoyed some decent fishing weather at the weekend as the winds dropped back and the sun broke through for calm conditions offshore. Try the jetty for mullet, tommy ruff (Australian herring) and squid, while boat anglers should be fishing for King George whiting, squid, snook and tommyes.

Stansbury/Edithburgh: I spent much of last week along this part of the peninsula as people adjusted to the on-again, off-again lockdown and tried the jetties for tommyes, squid and mullet. Edithburgh has tommyes and mullet from the golf course beach, jetty and Sultana Point. On Sunday the weather was just perfect for fishing by boat as crews caught whiting, squid, flounder and tommy ruff.

Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: Steady rain persisted since my last report and this has limited most fishing opportunities along the southern end of YP. The jetties occasionally

put up a feed of tommyes and mullet, and boaties are fishing for red nannygai, squid, flathead and snook.

Point Turton: Those on-shore north-westerlies again affected boat crews planning a trip to Minlacowie, The Banks or west to Point Souttar. Hardwicke Bay holds a few squid on the drift and whiting are around the broken grounds and blue line north of Leven Beach and Point Souttar. Try the jetty for squid, tommyes and salmon trout.

Port Hughes/Moonta Bay: I checked in here around midday on Sunday and the on-water traffic had lifted after a relatively quiet week. North-westerlies to 15 knots had boat crews fishing West Light for squid, garfish and whiting. Jetty-based fishing has ruff and squid.

Wallaroo: The north-westerlies were just starting to get up on early Sunday afternoon as boaties were spotted at The Magazine and Bird Reef fishing for whiting, squid and snook. The bay has small squid and tommy ruff, as does the jetty at night.
