Extended patient care

RAMPING at our major public hospitals has nothing to do with ambulances.

It has nothing to do with Emergency Departments. The problem is deeper than that. Much deeper. It has everything to do with the system behind it.

Patients cannot get out of ambulances because the ED is full.

The ED is full because there are no beds in the hospital.

There are no beds in the hospital because there are a considerable number of long-stay patients who cannot go home. Their needs are beyond home care.

There are almost no aged care placements or other suitable care packages to make discharge

So, they sit, occupying acute beds. This is no fault of the patient.

During the COVID-19 pandemic events, the empty old Wakefield Hospital was partly recommissioned for the expected overflow of admissions. It didn't happen, but the capacity

The decommissioned RAH, before it was demolished, had a structure suitable for lowerlevel care.

Not all that capacity needed preservation for that function but, as hospital buildings, they had the fundamental facilities for extended patient care.

The government has missed two golden opportunities to provide a safety valve for the acute bed congestion problem. It's a big issue, but not glamorous.

Fix the extended care problem, and ramping Kapunda will all but go away.

WE ARE spoilt for choice for things to do on Yorke Peninsula in the coming weeks, with the 10-day GROUNDED YP Arts Festival starting on Friday, the Copper Coast Show this weekend, and the opening of the Vietnam War Memorial Walk at Edithburgh on Monday.

GROUNDED will offer more than 30 workshops, performances, events and exhibitions at 13 towns plus rural locations.

It is a fabulous opportunity to enjoy the creativity of the people who live among us and perhaps untap our own artistic energy by learning a new skill.

The Copper Coast Show at the Kadina Showgrounds also has an emphasis on hands-on experiences, and on keeping alive the skills and handcrafts that have been an essential part of country life.

The activities and displays are designed to encourage curiosity, learning and connection - and perhaps spark a new interest in showgoers of all ages and draw us away from those ubiquitous screens.

The memorial walk will have an appropriately memorable opening, with former Governor-General of Australia, General the Honourable Sir Peter Cosgrove cutting the ribbon, a genuine Vietnam War era Huey helicopter flying in from New South Wales, and a concert featuring John Schumann, of I Was Only Nineteen fame.

The days are getting longer and warmer as we head towards spring — now is the time to get out, soak up inspiration and new experiences and learn about recent history that has shaped the country we live in today.



Vietnam War Memorial Walk official opening to honour service and sacrifice

THE Vietnam War Memorial Walk official opening in Edithburgh on Monday, August 18, is shaping up to be one of the biggest events in recent memory for southern Yorke Peninsula.

The event will include speeches from two high-profile guests — General the Honourable Sir Peter Cosgrove AK AC (Mil) CVO MC (Retd), former Governor-General of Australia, and Australian War Memorial director Matt Anderson PSM.

General Sir Peter John Cosgrove will officially declare the walk open, while Mr Anderson, the son of a National Serviceman and patron of the National Servicemen's Association, will also address the crowd.

There will be a genuine Vietnamera Huey helicopter flying over, two luncheons, and a concert featuring John Schumann and the Vagabond Crew (ex-Redgum), which is very nearly sold out.

Representatives from national and state organisations will also attend the opening, to be held on the Edithburgh Golf Course, O'Halloran Parade.

The public is invited and asked to arrive at 10.30am before speeches start at 11am.

Parking will be available along the O'Halloran Parade foreshore drive, at the jetty, and on side streets, with limited accessible parking closer to the event marquee.

At the conclusion of the formalities, a luncheon at Edithburgh Sports Club will be open to the public.

This will also be a chance to get up close to the Huey helicopter, which will be parked on the oval for photo opportunities.

The event is being held on Vietnam Veterans' Day, which marks 50 years since the conclusion of the Vietnam War in 1975.

A memorial with personal meaning For Port Moorowie couple Geoff

and Louise Burt, the walk already holds deep personal meaning.

In 1968, veteran Geoff Burt spent 364 days in Vietnam during the conflict as a member of 3 RAR B Company 5 Platoon 2 Section. During that time, four of his close friends were killed in action.

With no specific memorial for Vietnam veterans on Yorke Peninsula, the Burts have long travelled to

Edithburgh from their home to lay flowers at the town's War Memorial on significant dates connected to those men.

"I don't want people to forget about those who served in Vietnam," Mr

The opening of the memorial walk between Coobowie and Edithburgh, and the purpose-built seat the couple sponsored, is now, in Mr Burt's eyes, a significant memorial that will hold a special place in the hearts of his entire family.

Inspecting the seat in place last week, they were joined by project leads Roger Hogben and John Edwards.

As they shared stories, Mr Burt recalled how he originally came to enlist — "apparently if the surf's not what you expect, you head into the

city with a friend and decide on the spot to drop into the recruitment office!"

Building the walk

Every unit that participated in the war is included in the 3.7-kilometre Vietnam War Memorial Walk, which stretches from Edithburgh to Coobowie along the Walk The Yorke trail and can be started from either end.

The memorial features 29 detailed laser-cut signs and a series of bench seats sponsored by project supporters. It was completed by local contractors earlier this month in time for the official opening.

The project is a labour of love for local Vietnam veteran Roger Hogben and community volunteer John Edwards, who received council approval to proceed and secured funding through the Australian Government Department of Veterans' Affairs Saluting Their Service Commemorative Grants Program and Veterans SA's Anzac

Day Commemoration Fund. **Huey helicopter fly-over**

A genuine Vietnam-era Huey helicopter will land on the golf course near the marquee at about 10.45am before flying over the event and parking at the oval.

The Iroquois H model Huey A2-703 served with 9 Squadron RAAF in Vietnam and later in operations across Australia, the southwest Pacific, Papua New Guinea and Indonesia. It is now maintained by the Historic Aircraft Restoration Society in New South Wales, and it

is likely this will be the final time a Huey is flown to South Australia.

Concert finale

The day will finish with a commemorative concert, Behind the Lines: Australia at War in Words and Music, at Light Church, Edithburgh, from 2pm.

Presented by John Schumann and the Vagabond Crew, the performance blends music with narration by acclaimed actor Celine O'Leary, drawing on letters, poems, newspaper reports and rare images to tell stories of Australians at war.

Local band Cruizin' Blues will open the show.

Five new retirement units in Kadina

KADINA Community Hospital has approached Copper Coast Council to borrow \$800,000 to assist with cash flow while it develops five new retirement units.

The group previously completed a similar development of four retirement units on Digby Street, Kadina, with the assistance of a loan through council. That project was successful.

The new units will be built at 7 Gawler Street, Kadina, and the \$800,000 loan will be repaid over two years.

Wahlstedt Quality Homes, which was awarded the contract for the Digby Street units, has submitted pricing for the proposed Gawler Street development, according to council's August 6 agenda.

The agenda also stated that sale proposals had been provided by Wardle Co Real Estate, giving the board confidence the project was viable.

Mayor Roslyn Talbot told the August 6 meeting that council had supported the hospital's previous development.

We helped them in this manner to build the Materne Estate, which has provided four homes for senior residents in the community — it has been a very good outcome," Mayor Talbot said.

"They (the proposed five units) do not, at this stage, have development approval."

The motion to provide in-principle support of the new project, moved by Councillor Peter Sims and seconded by Cr Brent Walker, was carried.

Aged care jobs

PORT Broughton aged care service Barunga Village is one of 16 organisations nationwide, and one of six in the state, chosen to deliver a federal initiative supporting job seekers.

WorkFoundations, funded through the Australian Government's Paid Employment Pathways Package, aims to improve job prospects for people facing complex barriers through structured support and paid work placements.

Running from July 2025 to June 2027, the program will assist 30 participants with tailored training, mentorship and wrap-around services, while fostering an inclusive workforce development at Barunga Village.

It is backed by \$450,000 in grant funding. "We are honoured to be selected as a WorkFoundations provider," Barunga Village chief executive Elizabeth Carroll

"This is a significant opportunity for us to address some of the critical workforce shortages in aged care while also making a real difference in the lives of people who have been excluded from traditional pathways into employment."

Back to the future for MP

INDEPENDENT Narungga MP Fraser Ellis says he has been approached by the Liberal Party to rejoin their ranks at the

upcoming state election. Mr Ellis was elected as a Liberal MP to the seat of Narungga in March 2018, but voluntarily suspended his Liberal Party membership in February 2021 after it was alleged he made fraudulent claims for the Country Members Allowance.

In October 2021, Mr Ellis sought the Liberals' endorsement to run as a candidate for Narungga in the 2022 state election, but they declined and ran an endorsed candidate against him. Mr Ellis was successful as an independent.

Now, ahead of the March 2026 state election, Mr Ellis said the Liberals wanted him back.

"While it's flattering to be sounded out by Liberal Party members, I am clear that I was elected as an independent at the last election, and I intend to honour that commitment to the people of Narungga," Mr Ellis told the YP Country Times.

"We have made significant progress, and my focus is on completing the work we started, particularly in enhancing Narungga's healthcare system.

"We have collected almost 11,000 petition signatures and organised community forums with decision-makers on how to improve our local healthcare system.

"Now it is time for the Malinauskas government to act on the recommendations to ensure our healthcare system addresses the needs of Narungga."

Liberal state director Alex Hyde said Mr Ellis "was informed as a courtesy that nominations were open for the Liberal preselection for the seat of Narungga."

"All applications we receive are treated with the same level of scrutiny and may be accepted or rejected," Mr Hyde said.

"At the closure of this process, we did not receive a nomination from Mr Ellis.

"We will be working through the usual democratic process which enables grassroots members in Narungga to select their candidate."

Liberal preselection nominations for Narungga closed on July 31.

In July 2024, Mr Ellis was found guilty on four charges of deceit in relation to improperly claiming the Country Members Allowance, occurring between April 2018 and June 2020 and totalling \$2738, and acquitted of 19 counts.

The Director of Public Prosecutions has lodged an appeal against the 19 acquittals, and Mr Ellis has appealed the four convictions.

Mr Ellis voluntarily repaid \$42,130 in claims, stating some may have been made in error, before the Independent Commissioner Against Corruption investigation was announced in 2020.

A date for Mr Ellis's sentencing has not yet been set, pending the outcome of the



Algal bloom inquiry submissions open

SUBMISSIONS are open for the Australian Senate's inquiry into the algal bloom, with professional and recreational fishers, tourism operators, business owners and affected members of the public invited to participate.

The committee wants to know how the algal bloom has impacted your business or livelihood, health and wellbeing, and/or mental and social state, and if you have any ideas about how this could be handled by governments at all levels.

Submissions should begin with a short introduction about yourself or the organisation you represent, highlight your own perspective or experience, be concise, and include relevant images you have taken.

The final report from the committee, as a result of the inquiry, is due by October 28.

Oyster reef restoration

Fifteen hectares of new oyster reefs will be established in South Australian waters to accelerate the underwater environment's recovery from the algal bloom.

The SA Government will work with community groups and school students to create one-hectare reefs in 15 locations.

The project will cost around \$1 million, which will come out of the state and federal governments' combined \$28 million algal bloom support package.

"At the bottom of the ocean floor in our gulfs used to be magnificent and widespread native oyster reefs that were really important to the biodiversity of Spencer Gulf and St Vincent Gulf," Premier Peter Malinauskas said in a press conference on August 7.

"That was all dredged into non-existence.

"Natural oyster reefs perform a filtration function which is worth its weight in gold under the current circumstances."

SA Government to hold Minlaton forum

There will be a community forum about the algal bloom, hosted by the South Australian Government, at Minlaton this Thursday.

One of several being held across the state, the forum will provide updates on response and recovery efforts, including the latest science, public health advice, and support measures for affected communities and industries.

The forums include the opportunity to hear from government leaders including Premier Peter Malinauskas and Environment Minister Susan Close, gain expert insight from SARDI's Professor Mike Steer, Chief Public Health Officer Prof. Nicola Spurrier and others, and engage in a Q&A with a panel of experts, the government has said.

The Minlaton forum will be held 6pm to 7.30pm on Thursday, August 14.

Parking problems solved?

FOLLOWING community backlash, Copper Coast Council will revise parking limits along Kadina's Taylor Street — converting a section to unlimited parking while retaining a four-hour limit in another.

Exactly which bays will change is yet to be determined, with council staff now tasked with finalising the details.

As reported in the YP Country Times (Not a fine day for parking, 29-7-25) residents were in uproar after receiving parking fines issued via the artificial intelligence system Aero Ranger.

This led to a motion at council's August 6 meeting to remove the four-hour limit entirely; however, it was amended to retain a section of four-hour parking to ensure shoppers would not overstay their welcome.

Speaking at the meeting, elected member Brent Walker said he supported the initial motion to convert all parking to unlimited.

"It's no different, this Aero Ranger, than someone walking around with a piece of chalk so to me, it's reasonably straight forward," Councillor Walker said.

Councillor Peter Oswald questioned how council could discourage a small number of offenders that park in front of businesses for long periods of time without penalising shoppers and staff who do the right thing.

"Some (staff) have to drive across the entire Yorke Peninsula to get here ... and there's no public transport," Cr Oswald said.

"There's over 50 employees just on Hallett Street (Kadina) and they're all driving to work."

Chief executive Dylan Strong noted that council would be undertaking and prioritising a traffic management study.

"We realise that parking limits can be a contentious subject and we see the study as an important one, so we will be placing some priority on it," Mr Strong said.

"However, with respect to current resourcing, it was important we allow ourselves some time for resource allocation but also to have a wholescale collection of data to make those assessments."

Deputy Mayor Neil Sawley then amended the motion to have a section of the Taylor Street car park keep the fourhour limit.

He proposed keeping part of the car park as four-hour parking to ensure regular turnover, with council to review the situation going forward.

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said this amendment would create plenty of long-term parking, and keep a few parks available for fourhour parking.

Cr Peter Sims said he was not in favour of the original motion with just unlimited parking, but supported the amendment.

"I think, finally, there's a wake-up call here that council is policing these parking areas in the community," Cr Sims said.

Cr Matthew Stock and Cr Walker raised concerns over two-hour parking spaces in Moonta during the discussion.

Cr Stock said he looked forward to the results of the study, particularly concerning Moonta.

"In Moonta, we are getting more businesses along Ryan Street and, at the moment, it's all day parking there," he said.

"We will see what the study brings."

The amended motion was carried, with only Cr Walker against it.

National Trust branches pass the buck back

OF the several YP branches protesting, the Moonta branch — one of the NTSA's largest — is facing a \$47,365 fee, which chair Graham Hancock has called unfair.

"We've got a tourist train, a sweet shop and a museum and they all generate an income, but it's all done on the back of volunteers," he said.

Mr Hancock said the branch had not paid NTSA any fees before, with all of the branch's profits reinvested into their work.

"We actually pay for four paid positions — a full-time, a part-time, a shop manager and a cleaner," he said.

"Running a train is a pretty expensive exercise ... our costs are relatively high."

He said the account for the new fee was delivered on June 10 and the branch was required to pay it by June 16, but they have refused.

"The motives behind it is that the Adelaide office needs to raise more money and they see the branches, in my opinion, as a cash cow," Mr Hancock said.

"It's adverse to keeping volunteers who are there for a purpose, and their purpose is to look after the local scene.

"There's quite a bit of pressure on us as a branch because of the (bid for) World Heritage Listing and the demands that is putting on us."

The Moonta chair said his branch was not consulted about the new fee being implemented, nor about the sale of a block of land under the branch's care.

"That (sale) realised \$120,000, less expenses, and the branch is not to receive one cent of it," he said.

"It's not a very rewarding feeling."

Ardrossan branch committee secretary Brenda Bowman said they already gave 10 per cent of their admissions to the Ardrossan Progress Association, which they share a building with, and now NTSA wants another 10 per cent, about \$1000.

She said the branch had also received an insurance bill from the NTSA, around the same time as the fee request, which was six times more than the previous year for no extra cover.

Kadina branch chair Gerry Guerin said the NTSA head office was "city-centric" and unaware of the challenges country branches faced.

"Local museums, heritage museums, whatever they do by way of raising funds in the local area, we want the money to stay in the local area as much as possible," he said.

A Yorke Peninsula branch volunteer who wished not to be named said this fee would be a "nail in the coffin" for struggling branches.

"They're doing it under the pretext that it's to help with financial auditing and bookwork ... but really what they care about is things like Ayers House, they're trying to get Mintaro Hall," they said.

"Ultimately places will go under, museums will close.

"We don't make enough money to financially help the National Trust.

"We'll close, they'll take our collections and then they'll put a for sale sign up at the front."

NTSA was contacted for comment.

The YP Country Times understands NTSA is holding meetings around the state to discuss the fee.

Training boost for ED doctors at Wallaroo

EMERGENCY department doctors now have greater access to specialist training on Yorke Peninsula, with Wallaroo Hospital's Dr Dewald Behrens approved as a primary supervisor under the Australasian College for Emergency Medicine (ACEM) program.

Dr Behrens' accreditation means the Northern Yorke Peninsula Health Service is now a recognised site for ACEM's Foundational, Intermediate and Advanced Emergency Medicine Training Programs — opening the door for more doctors to train locally.

Dr Behrens said he was delighted to have received the qualifications.

"Maintaining 1.0 FTE FACEM (Full Time Equivalent and Fellowship of Australasian College of Emergency Medicine) staff hours means we can provide more advanced training to prospective trainees, for instance, the much-sought-after ACEM certificate and diploma," he said.

This training builds on the Foundational Emergency Medicine Training Programs already offered in Wallaroo.

Yorke and Northern Local Health Network executive director of clinical services Hendrika Meyer said the new accreditation would provide more opportunities across the region and encourage doctors to complete their rural training in Wallaroo.

"With additional opportuni-

ties, the NYP Health Service in Wallaroo is likely to attract doctors seeking ACEM training in regional areas, which will benefit staff and consumers alike," Ms Meyer said.

YNLHN acting chief executive Coenraad Robberts said the network was thrilled to see more training opportunities available within the region.

"Within the YNLHN, our dedication to providing quality care is highlighted by the new opportunities being created at the NYP Health Service," Mr Robberts said.

The ACEM postgraduate qualifications provide increasing levels of complexity and clinical skills.

The Emergency Medicine Certificate, Emergency Medicine Diploma and Emergency Medicine Advanced Diploma are recommended for FACEM trainees and trainee general practitioners who wish to continue working in emergency departments as consultants.

Official confirmation of the accreditation will occur after an audit in January 2026 to ensure the FACEM FTE at this service still meets the required 1.0 FTE

The 2026 accreditation covers the ACEM Foundational, Intermediate and Advanced

Emergency Medicine Training Program (formerly the Certificate of Emergency Medicine).

This allows the NYP Health Service to offer rural generalist registrars advanced skills training in emergency medicine, alongside the new FACEM trainee opportunities.

The ACEM, a not-for-profit organisation, is responsible for training emergency physicians and advancing professional standards in emergency medicine in Australia and New Zealand.

For a health service to be eligible as a training site for these programs, it must have at least 1.0 FTE FACEM staffing.

Honouring Paddy Ryan

MOONTA and Auburn branches of the National Trust of South Australia have come together to unveil a plaque at Patrick "Paddy" Ryan's grave in Undalya Cemetery in the Clare Valley.

More than 30 members from both branches attended the ceremony, led by Moonta NTSA president Graham Hancock, on Thursday, July 31.

Moonta's John Andrew, who coordinated the event, said the Auburn and Moonta trusts had joined forces to recognise Paddy Ryan as the person who discovered copper ore in what was to become Moonta Mines.

"Paddy Ryan worked for Walter Watson Hughes, who owned the Wallaroo lease which covered Kadina, Moonta Mines and Moonta," Mr Andrew said.

Walter Watson Hughes occupied the land as part of his Wallaroo sheep run, with Paddy Ryan among his shepherds.

"Walter Watson Hughes asked his shepherds to keep an eye out for copper ore as he had found copper himself in Wallaroo Bay, near the current jetty," Mr Andrew said.

"In 1861, Paddy Ryan was working out in the bushland, in what is now Moonta Mines, and discovered green copper ore carbonate in a wombat burrow.

"There was quite a kerfuffle over registering the claim.

"Walter Watson Hughes first tried registering it but it was not accepted as he didn't have enough details — he just guessed where the ore was.

"After a lengthy battle, he (Paddy Ryan) was settled out of court and Walter Watson Hughes secured the mining lease for the Moonta Mines

Mr Andrew said that, after leaving Moonta, Paddy Ryan was given a weekly wage of six

In government hands

COPPER Coast Council has endorsed the final format of the preliminary assessment request for the Australian Cornish Mining Sites: Burra and Moonta World Heritage bid, paving the way for lodgement with UNESCO.

The mandatory assessment must be submitted by the Australian Government to UNESCO by September 15.

Mayor Roslyn Talbot told council's August 6 meeting that, since the agenda had been released, council had received a letter from Deputy Premier Susan Close to advise that the South Australian Government had forwarded the document to the federal government.

"The federal government will now review that document and, hopefully, submit that document by September 15 to UNESCO to commence that Preliminary Assessment process," Mayor Talbot said.

"Minister Close congratulated us on the three parties working together to achieve what we have achieved."

The motion, moved by Councillor Cathy Vluggen and seconded by Cr Bruce Schmidt, was carried.

Cr Vluggen congratulated all staff involved.

"Let's hope the federal government does what it needs to do," Cr Vluggen said.

pounds for discovering copper at Moonta Mines, along with a 10th share in the mine — a significant sum at the time.

"He and his wife and children went over to live in the Clare Valley near Leasingham," he said.

"On a very hot day, he had been wearing a black hat and he had been out in the sun and he was very intoxicated.

"When he got to the Leasingham Hotel, he continued drinking and he died at

Because he died before the first dividend was paid, Walter Watson Hughes revoked Ryan's share in the mine but continued to pay his widow the six pounds a week."

Paddy Ryan died nine months after discovering copper.

His son also died in the Clare Valley and is buried in the Undalya Cemetery.

After her son's death, Paddy's wife returned to Ireland. Her later life is still the subject of ongoing research by the Moonta NTSA branch.

Mr Andrew said he has always had an interest in geology and mining, with his great-grandfather emigrating from Cornwall and his grandfather working as a miner at Moonta Mines.

He has authored books about the collapse of Alice's Shaft (Missing In Plain Sight), and Moonta's Lesser Known Lines of Lode, and is currently working on another about Truer's Mine.

He said Moonta historian Robyn Knight conducted all the research on Paddy Ryan for the ceremony and the idea for the plaque was suggested in 2006 by Trevor Gibbons.

"With our efforts to get World Heritage listing and so on, it was nice to be able to recognise that, just outside of our own area," he said.

Mr Andrew said politicians Tony Piccolo and Penny Pratt attended the ceremony.

Following the unveiling, members of both branches met for lunch at the Rising Sun Hotel in Auburn.

Balaklava Eisteddfod Wettest July in almost 30 years

YORKE Peninsula participants were placegetters in multiple categories at the 29th Balaklava Eisteddfod, held on August 1 and 2.

The YP Schools Concert Band won first place in the Open Band section for the third year in a row, while the Maitland Lutheran Primary Vocal Ensemble took out the Junior Choir category.

Both were led by Debbie Schwartz. The Maitland Lutheran School Big Band, led by Nathan Wright-Baldock, and the Maitland Lutheran School Senior Vocal Ensemble, led by Ms Schwartz, received honourable mentions in Senior Stage Band and Senior B Choir respectively.

The Harvest Christian College Percussion Ensemble, led by Kylie Lewis and Cathy Nicholls, placed third in the Intermediate Instrumental Ensemble section.

LAST month was South Australia's wettest July since

1998, with area-averaged rainfall 54 per cent above average, according to the Bureau of Meteorology.

Rainfall was average to above average across most of Australia, but below average in small areas in southern Tasmania, south-central Victoria and western and inland Western Australia according to a drought statement release by BOM on August 7.

In its July drought statement, BOM said year-todate rainfall deficiencies had eased in severity in parts of South Australia, Victoria and New South Wales.

However, the extent and severity of long-term rainfall deficiencies remain largely unchanged.

Across much of southern Australia, root-zone deficiencies have eased, but soil moisture in areas of the south and west remains below average for this time of year.

Many water storages in the southern states have declined by up to 50 per cent compared with this time last year, according to BOM.

Urban water storages in Adelaide and Perth also remain low after following prolonged rainfall defi-



Saltbush Country brings prized works home

IT WAS an emotional moment for many as the Saltbush Country exhibition opened in Ascot Gallery, Kadina, on Saturday, August 9.

For Narungga women Lynette Newchurch, of Port Victoria, and her sister Deanna Newchurch, of Point Pearce, it was the first time their award-winning works had been displayed on Country.

Lynette and Deanna are two of seven First Nations artists involved in Saltbush Country, which is touring the state from 2024 to 2026.

The exhibition features a wide range of art styles, and one highlight is a genuine possum-skin coat created by Lynette and Deanna, the first of its kind to be produced using traditional methods in over 100 years.

Lynette has also contributed intricate shell necklaces, while other pieces range from paintings to sculptures and textiles.

Speaking at the official opening, Lynette said it meant a lot to have her art displayed on Narungga Country.

She and Deanna were joined at the opening by fellow Saltbush Country artists Heather Shearer, of Port Augusta, and Josephine







Marion Bay Depot Library moves to community hall

The depot library is open in its new home, the community hall, from 10am to noon each Wednesday.



Yorke Peninsula footballers Chelsea Biddell (Port Vincent), Rachelle Martin (Minlaton) and Shineah Goody (Edithburgh) will be on the national stage this weekend as the AFL Women's competition kicks off its 10th season.

The AFLW began in 2017, with the Adelaide Crows as a foundation club and the inaugural premiers.

Crows start their 2025 campaign against St Kilda in Melbourne, on Sunday, August 17, with both Biddell and Martin expected to be in the team.

Biddell, drafted as a forward, is now one of the competition's leading defenders and earned All-Australian selection in 2023 and 2024.

Martin has played 59 games since debuting in 2020, became a regular in 2022's season six, and was part of the premiership team that defeated Melbourne at Adelaide Oval.

Goody will line up for Port Adelaide against Fremantle at Alberton Oval in the final match of round one on Sunday, August 17.

She told the YP Country Times she was looking forward to the season and that the Power squad had been working on consistency at training.

"I played the entire trial against

the Crows and half a game against Collingwood," Goody said.

"It was a great experience last year.

"It was good to be a part of the expansion team that has gone further than anyone in the major round, but we are aiming to be like teams like North, Brisbane and Adelaide - a leading team in the competition and being in contention for the flag.

"Personally, I'm not a goal setter for me it's more around team-based outcomes and goals.

"Most of my training this year has been around playing the wing role, but you don't know what midfield opportunities may arise during the season."

Goody was Port Adelaide's best firstyear player in 2024 and won the AFL Players' Association award for best first-year player.

She averaged 13 disposals, played all 14 games and featured in three finals in her debut season.


The 12-round fixture includes a South Australian showdown at Norwood Oval in round 11.

Since the championships, he has been a consistent performer, averaging 18.3 disposals across three games and gathering 23 touches in Norwood's win over West Adelaide at The Parade.

SA U18 coach Tony Bamford describes Kelly as "a very talented footballer" and "one of those players who finds a way to make the grade".

Football runs deep in Kelly's family. His father, Richard now CEO at 1001....played 129 games for the Redlegs and Glenelg in the 1990s, winning Glenelg's best and fairest in 1999.

Uncle Matthew played 50 games for Norwood and a handful for Adelaide before a knee injury ended his career.

Their grandfather, Maurice Arbon, was a Yorke Peninsula football legend before and after World War II.

Arbon won Mail Medals on either side of the war, played 98 games for North Adelaide between 1945 and 1950, and represented SA once.

He was part of North-Norwood's wartime premiership sides in 1943 and 1944, and remains the only playing coach to lead the Western Areas Football League to a Croser Cup victory in the Yorke Peninsula interleague competition.



In 2013, Hewett was a key member of South Australia's breakthrough U18 national championship side — the state's first title at that level since 1995 — coached by Brenton "Sticks" Phillips.

"George was always hard at the contest — a competitive animal who set himself apart," Phillips, now SANFL talent and operations manager, said.

"His skill base was solid, and he worked tirelessly to win the ball and use it well.

"Whatever role he was given, he performed it to 100 per cent of his ability."

Drafted to the Swans

The late Andrew Scholefield, Sydney Swans life member and former SA recruiting manager, was instrumental in Hewett being drafted at pick 32 in 2013.

Born in late December, Hewett spent his first two years at Sydney playing in the North East Australia Football League before making his AFL debut in round 1, 2016.

That same season, he played in the AFL grand final.

Across 120 games with the Swans, Hewett built a reputation as a consistent and respected midfielder.

Making his mark at Carlton

At the end of 2021, Hewett joined Carlton as a free agent. Over his first 199 games, he averaged 20.4 disposals, 4.4 tackles and four clearances.

In his 200th match, Hewett again delivered, finishing with 23 disposals (including 18 handballs), six tackles and seven clearances.

While Carlton kicked late goals to narrow the margin, they couldn't avoid defeat — echoing a mixed milestone record for Hewett, who also lost his 50th game but won his 100th and 150th.

Celebrating a milestone

A large group of family and friends travelled to Docklands to celebrate Hewett's achievement, honouring a country footballer whose heart, skill and resilience have carried him to the highest level of the game.

Note from the author: I first saw George Hewett play in a NAFA U14s (junior colts) grand final at Laura Oval in 2009.

Playing in the centre, Hewett was best on ground in a losing side.

Broughton-Mundoora was up against a Crystal Brook team featuring future Magarey Medallist Campbell Combe and his brother Will.

I was fortunate to see him again in the U16 premiership with North Adelaide at Football Park, and later as part of South Australia's triumphant U18 state team.

I was also at the MCG when he endured the heartbreak of the AFL grand final loss, and at his debut match for the Blues in round 1, 2022.

Hewett embodies what every club looks for in a footballer — honest, dedicated, team-first, and a player who adds value while working hard in every game.

A true success story from South Australian country football.



This week's clash was much tighter, with the Eagles holding on for a fourpoint victory, 9.7 (61) to 7.15 (57).


"We got a bit lucky in this match," Eagles U18 coach Shane Reardon said.

Bute started strongly, booting five goals to one in the first term before Kadina worked its way into the contest.


Old hands Sam Trengove and Jay Pridham made their presence felt, helping Bute hold off a late Kadina surge for a 28-point win.



Fatigue culture costing lives

PUSHING through fatigue to get jobs done on the farm is one of the most under-recognised yet deadly risks in agriculture, according to Farmsafe Australia.

As part of its Second Chances — Who Knows How Many You'll Get campaign, Farmsafe is placing a spotlight on fatigue and its overlooked impact on farm safety.

Farmsafe Australia chair Felicity Richards said fatigue had long been normalised across the agricultural

"These are the jobs we push through at the end of the day — the early mornings after late nights, the must-do tasks in the middle of sowing, harvest or shearing," she said.

'We don't think twice about the 18-hour day. We shrug off brain fog, forgetfulness, dropping things, or zoning out as just part of the job — but when you're tired, your decision-making suffers.

"In this environment, mistakes can be fatal."

The message is simple: the "just keep going" mentality is putting lives at risk.

The 2025 Safer Farms Agricultural Injury and Fatality Report revealed a sobering statistic — 72 fatalities on farms in 2024, the highest in more than 20 years and more than double the 32 deaths recorded in 2023.

Serious injuries have also remained consistently high for more than a decade.

Ms Richards said fatigue was a hidden factor in many of these incidents.

"It doesn't always make it into the official report, but talk to any farmer and they'll tell you about the time they nearly rolled a vehicle, misjudged a gate, forgot a safety step or lost their footing after days with little sleep," she said.

"Fatigue is the invisible risk we've trained ourselves to ignore."

Farmsafe is encouraging a cultural shift: to see fatigue as a safety

threat, not a personal weakness.

"Too often, pushing through exhaustion is worn like a badge of honour," Ms Richards said.

"But real strength is knowing when to pause; backing yourself to rest, call in help, or wait for daylight — that's a safety decision, not a vulnerability."

Farmsafe is urging practical changes such as adjusting workloads, improving rosters and planning ahead for peak pressure seasons.

Open conversations within teams and families about fatigue and warning signs are also vital.

"If you manage staff or contractors, your choices matter," Ms Richards said.

"You set the tone — in how you work, how you rest, and how you talk about risk."

Near misses, she added, should be shared and learned from, not just dismissed as lucky escapes.

Side-by-side deaths top the list

For the first time in Australian farm safety reporting, side-by-side vehicles have overtaken tractors and quadbikes as the leading cause of on-farm fatalities in a single year.

In 2024, 14 people died in SSVrelated incidents, compared with 10 in quadbike accidents and eight involving tractors.

Despite being promoted as safer alternatives to quads — due to seatbelts, roll cages and stability — SSVs are proving dangerous when basic safety protocols are not followed.

"Too often, seatbelts go unused, helmets aren't worn, vehicles are overloaded or used on steep terrain without training," Ms Richards said.

"It's not enough to switch vehicles — we need to change behaviours."

Some of the key reminders of Farmsafe Australia's Second Chances — Who **Knows How Many You'll Get** campaign include:

- Make time for the plan, not just the job — a short pre-job check can prevent long-term consequences
- Do not let deadlines drown out danger – one honest conversation beats one emergency phone call
- Build in time for safety schedule backup and build buffer days into pressure periods
- Call the huddle a quick check-in can reveal risks someone else might not see.





HOT FISHING TIPS

Recipe, Manila spicy salmon fish cakes - Ingredients: 300g cooked salmon (in pieces), 2 eggs, 2 tbsp soy sauce, 2 garlic cloves, 1 tbsp ginger, quarter cup red onion, finely diced, 2 tbsp lemon juice, half cup panko crumbs, quarter cup sesame seeds, dash of cooking oil, 1 chopped chilli. **Preparation:** Gently combine salmon, soy sauce, garlic, ginger and chopped red onion in a bowl. Add lemon juice and eggs. In a second bowl, add panko and sesame seeds. Add cooking oil to a fry pan and heat to medium. Roll and flatten each fish cake and coat with panko mix on both sides. Pan fry each fish cake for about two minutes on each side until golden brown. Serve with green onions, chopped red chilli peppers and a spicy dipping sauce.

Wallaroo: The jetty produced salmon trout mid and late week as the weather turned fine, clear, calm and sunny. Boat crews tried their luck for King George whiting, squid and garfish but most came back with empty catch bag.

The algal bloom continues to spread north, towards the giant cuttlefish birthing ground at False Bay.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Empty jetties and a near-deserted boat ramp car park reflect some of the quietest fishing conditions locals can recall. Fishers in big boats headed well south to try for whiting and sould and a few shore-based fishers gave salmon trout and flathead a try along local beaches on the high tide.

Port Victoria/Point Turton: In magic weekend weather, charter boat crews managed to catch whiting from their secret spots along this part of the gulf. Local jetties have been quiet but sprat tommies (Australian herring) have been sighted. Garfish, normally in good numbers around Port Minlacowie, are thin.

Stenhouse Bay/Marion Bay: Local boat, shore and jetty-based fishing is on again, off again. Boat crews struggled to catch a decent feed, with people wary of eating anything from the usually pristine waters. Sunday provided great weather for crews running offshore for kingies, red nannygai and blue morwong.
