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Seafarers find their feet

SIX retired seafarers and/or their partners have found new homes thanks to the assistance of a property developer.

Neville Roberts, director of Anchung Pty Ltd, Adelaide, allowed the tenants six months to relocate from The Moorings Retired Seafarers Units, Wallaroo, after he purchased the estate in December.

Previously owned by the Sailors'

Society, United Kingdom, the five units were placed on the market despite the society promising them to the seafarers as forever homes.

The units were the last of their kind to be sold in Australia, with the Sailors' Society citing the sale was needed to continue supporting seafarers world-

Blights Real Estate sales consultant Neville Hibbard said Mr Roberts was graceful to the tenants upon purchasing the units.

"The property was sold for an offer which was \$150,000 less than the highest offer, but allowed for six months until settlement," Mr Hibbard said.

"Neville (Roberts) allowed one particular tenant to stay for an extra week after the eviction date and didn't charge them rent while they found somewhere else to live.

"He also purchased furniture from (88-year-old) Pat (Nicholson) and helped her move into Star of The Sea

Mr Roberts said he wasn't bothered by the timeframe in which the tenants had to relocate.

"We've all got parents and when you see our senior citizens under pressure like this it reminds you what you would want for your own parents," he said.

"It was very stressful for everybody, particularly because these people had been living here (in the units) for a long time and all of a sudden they've got to find alternative accommodation, which they hadn't done for 20 years.

"It (finding somewhere to live) is a real problem locally; there's just nothing on the market and we keep reading about the rental crisis regularly."

Mr Roberts said family connections to the Copper Coast meant the region was a great place for him to invest.

"When this (property) went on the market it seemed like a great opportunity because of the stress for smaller affordable accommodation in regional South Australia," he said.

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

BWC takes levy battle statewide

BARUNGA West Council has stepped up its fight to get better value for money from the levy collected by the Northern and Yorke Landscape Board.

Ratepayers will contribute \$252,447 this financial year to the board for projects within its region, which includes 15 council areas.

BWC elected members are concerned how levy funds are distributed and are bringing the issue to the Local Government Association's ordinary general meeting on October 26.

Council is calling for the state government to review its approach to managing landscapes and natural resources, including community engagement, transparency and equitable allocation of the levy and its resources.

The submission to the LGA says there is minimal engagement with council about the board's activities and limited investment in the area or funding allocations to landholders compared with the total levy contribution.

Council CEO Maree Wauchope wrote to Environment Minister Susan Close in June, stating there was a prevail-

ing belief residents were underwriting prominent projects by NYLB in other local government areas, while neglecting more routine but critical issues such as weed and pest control.

In response, Ms Close outlined the projects BWC had directly benefited from including installation of a nest platform at Port Broughton for endangered eastern ospreys, coastal garden workshops in Tickera and Port Broughton, funding for three Grassroots Grants projects and weed management.

Ms Close said the board allocated funding for roadside weed control in each council area and this had included African boxthorn control by contractors near Tickera and the Willamulka

However, Councillor Kevin Beinke said boxthorn was prevalent on roadsides throughout the council area and could even be seen growing next to signs put up by NYLB to encourage its control.

"There is more to boxthorn control than putting up signs," he

"We could employ a team of locals to do that work."

African boxthorn is a declared pest throughout South Australia under the Landscape SA Act

According to Primary Industries and Regions SA, landscape boards are required to control plants on road reserves and may recover costs from adjoining land owners.

Mayor Leonie Kerley said BWC could use the levy funds far more effectively than NYLB.

'We could do wonders with that \$250,000," she said.

"It's in the millions of dollars we have outlaid (in levy funds) and we have not got millions of dollars back."

Members of the public will also get a chance to learn more about the issue when council holds a public information session at its Port Broughton chambers at 5pm on Tuesday, August

It will feature a presentation by NYLB chief executive Tony Fox and audience members will be able to ask questions.

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Water play set for summer splash

PORT Broughton's new water play feature could be ready for the peak summer tourism season.

The feature is part of the upgrade to Civic Square which is scheduled to be commissioned in December or January.

Demolition has begun around the square, in front of the town's jetty, to enable preliminary works including relocation of an SA Water main and meter and adjustments to irrigation pipework.

Mayor Leonie Kerley said the demolition was an exciting first step in a transformative community project.

"It's thrilling to see works commence on the transformation of Port Broughton's Square, which will include the first water feature of its kind in the Mid North and Yorke Peninsula," she said.

Revised designs for

the water feature's filtration and pumping system have been provided to council and will be reviewed at its project control group meeting today (Tuesday, August 15).

Once the revisions have been agreed upon, additional demolition will be completed by council staff to enable the water feature's construction.

Marina property tops sale record

A TWO-STOREY waterfront marina property has sold for a record price.

The property at 58 Pamir Court, Wallaroo, was sold at auction for \$2.71 million last Wednesday, August 9.

The sale trumped the previous town record for the highest selling house, set in May when 12 Oriental Court sold for \$1.71m.

The auction attracted about 100 people and six registered bidders competed for the threeyear-old Wahlstedt Quality Homes property.

The residence is situated on 1084 square metres of waterfront land and features four bedrooms, three bathrooms, two powder rooms, a butler's pantry, cocktail bar, a lift and a private pontoon.

REAL Estate Agents Group sales associate and selling agent Andy White said the result had blown all expectations out of the water.

"We had a lot of farmers who looked through the property

along with a lot of Adelaide residents and a number of interstate enquires as well - it generated a lot of interest," Mr White said.

"It was announced to market at a reserve price of \$2.3m and the bidding went from there."

The auction came down to a battle between two Adelaidebased parties with the successful purchasers planning to use the property as a holiday home.

"The auction took 45 minutes which is not short," Mr White

"It was really exciting to see the result achieved — \$410,000 over reserve is incredible."

Mr White said the residence was built to be a forever home.

"The vendors planned for it to be their final retirement destination but circumstances changed and led them to put the property to market," Mr White said.

"The purchasers loved it and I can see why, it is simply amazing.

"The owners thought of every little aspect during the build.

"It is situated just around the first bend of the marina making it a bit more sheltered from the elements too."

SA lives lost tally exceeds last year's total

RAA has urged motorists to take more caution on the roads after the number of lives lost reached last year's total.

A total of 74 lives have been lost on South Australian roads so far this year already, exceeding last year's overall total of 71 with five months left in the year.

This is the earliest South Australia has reached 71 lives lost on the roads in a year since 2010.

RAA senior manager safety and infrastructure Charles Mountain said it was alarming how quickly the number of lives lost on SA roads had risen.

"We're urging drivers to remember what's at stake when they get behind the wheel," Mr Mountain said.

"It is too easy to become complacent, particularly on our daily drives we may have done many times before.

"Hazards on our roads can occur and if you are not focused, the consequences can be horrendous.

"We want drivers to increase their awareness on the road to reflect different driving conditions and to continually monitor road users nearby.

"Drivers should take extra precautions to limit distractions while driving and to always remain in control of their vehicle.

"Please be patient of other road users and take regular breaks when driving regionally to keep alert behind the wheel."

Mr Mountain endorsed the safe system approach which relies on safe drivers, travelling in safe vehicles on safe roads at

"Make sure your vehicle is well maintained and ensure tyres have plenty of tread across the entire width of the tyre,"

"Check all lights are working and your wipers clear the windscreen effectively without leaving smears."

Fire danger season coming in hot

WEATHER event El Niño, associated with hotter and drier conditions, could lead to more days of high fire danger as summer approaches.

Australians have been warned to expect a scorching fire season as the weather is drying up after years of La Niña's torrential rain.

Weatherzone senior meteorologist Brett Dutschke said there was an increased chance of a drier and warmer than normal spring and summer which would in turn increase the risk of fires due to the trend towards an El Niño and a positive Indian Ocean Dipole.

"However, these dry phase climate drivers will be occurring off the back of a run of wet years in Australia, which should help offset their influence this fire season," Mr Dutschke said.

"So, while some parts of Australia may see an active fire season this spring and summer, it is unlikely to match the severity of the 2019-20 Black Summer.

"Grass fires are much more of a risk than bushfires due to how rapidly grass typically dries out.

"At least grass fires can be

CFS planning for hotter, drier season

THE CFS supports the state's nine Bushfire Management Committees to plan for the impacts a potential hotter, drier bushfire season could have on South Australian communities. In addition, the CFS is:

- Collating assessments from regional headquarters across the state to determine Fire Danger Season dates
- Working with local councils to measure fuel loads and hazards on the ground in each region
- Supporting landowners and residents through the provision of Farm Fighting Unit grants
- Preparing our fire fighters for response with equipment and training

more easily prevented than bushfires, by mowing."

CFS director community risk and resilience Alison May said bushfire preparation for their agency was a year-round effort, with prevention activities for the upcoming Fire Danger Season commencing from the moment the previous season ended.

"We are also in the process of hosting a program of community information sessions across the state, including most recently in Kadina, to help people plan and prepare for the upcoming bushfire season," she said.

"After recent above-average rainfall, increased vegetation growth means high fuel loads this year will require additional efforts from landowners to reduce hazards on their properties by cleaning yards and gutters, removing fallen branches and installing or repairing irrigation systems.

"People also need to think about their five-minute bushfire survival plan.

Seafarers units back on sale

SINCE purchasing the units, Neville Roberts sought Copper Coast Council approval to split them from one title, and is now offering them for sale as five separate freehold properties.

"We have a couple of tourism operators who are looking to buy the whole lot (five units) and want a bulk of units to AirBnb," he said.

"I hope they get sold individually because they then become more likely to be in the rental market or private housing which we desperately need

Pat Nicholson had lived in one of the units since they were built 20 years ago for retired seafarers like her late husband Fred.

"When my husband was a sea merchant in England, it was to the seafarers he would go to have a shower and do his washing," she said.

"But these days that's all done on the ship, so there wasn't a need for the missions and obviously there wasn't a need to look after the old sailors

"England (the Sailors' Society) did the dirty on us... moving was very stressful and certainly affected everybody's health."

Ms Nicholson thanked Mr Roberts for making the process smoother than expected.

"Let's hope I win X Lotto so I can buy my unit back," she said.

Five more units to be built

ADELAIDE property developer Neville Roberts has planned to develop five more two-bedroom units on the 1400 square metre block which neighbours the former retired seafarer units on Jetty Road, Wallaroo.

Mr Roberts purchased the allotment in December, along with the five existing units, all of which was sold as a single title.

He is now seeking Copper Coast Council approval to split this land into six separate allotments.

"When that application is approved, I'll put another development application in to put units on that land," Mr Roberts said.

'They (the proposed new units) will be similar (to the existing units) because this is a heritage area, so there's an obligation on developers to meet a criteria.

"We're hoping we'll get five units on there without crowding the site and we'll develop the site to feature a park, swimming pool and barbecues, subject to planning approval.

"I'm not sure whether I'll sell the new units or hold them myself.

"It will create a nice environment for local tourism."

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Fence rule changes Final fuel winners drawn at Fisherman Bay

SOME homeowners at Fisherman Bay will now be permitted to erect solid fences at the rear of their properties — despite earlier information from Barunga West Council stating only open, tubular style fencing would be permitted.

An information sheet, which lists the requirements of council's proposed new planning policy, has been sent to ratepayers with their 2023-24 rates notices.

It states rear fences of solid steel up to 1.8 metres high and of an approved colour can be erected with permission on some allotments.

The map shows blocks on

Whiting, Snook, Silver Perch and Salmon Roads, as well as Catfish Lane and some other areas are not permitted to have solid rear fences.

Information provided by council as part of its community engagement survey on Fisherman Bay in December 2022 stated residents were permitted to build open style tubular fences at a maximum height of 1.2m on side and rear allotment boundaries only, with no fencing past the building line of the dwelling setback the furthest from the front or seaward boundary.

A spokesperson for BWC said revisions to the fencing policy reflected feedback from the com-

He said fencing requirements were necessary because of the unique way the Fisherman Bay community had developed, and the influence fencing could have on its appearance and streetscape.

"The policy aims to maintain the coastal aspect free from obstructions and to prevent the potentially negative impact of tall solid fences lining the narrow road corridors," the spokesperson said.

'Homeowners can have fences between their properties as long as it is open style fencing and be no greater than 1.2 metres in height.

Homeowners facing the sea can also apply for development approval for rear fencing which meets specific criteria, including open style fencing.

"Any homeowner seeking to erect fencing should always contact council in the first instance."

Fisherman Bay shack owner Michael Papps said all fencing restrictions should have been flagged to potential buyers of properties in the settlement before purchase, as they affected the way people could live in those properties.

"It should have been made clear to people when the land was sold," he said.

"Effectively, we have an encumbrance on our land.

"People want fences for three things - privacy, safety and security. You can't get those three things with a 1.2m high pool (tubular style) fence.

"We thought that it would be the same as Port Broughton but what you can do on Kerley Street is different to what you can do on Whiting Road."

Mr Papps said he was particularly concerned that 1.2m high fences were inadequate to protect dogs and children from attack by large and agile dogs.

YORKE Peninsula Council will soon roll out a new booking system for its hugely popular 19 bush campgrounds, but not in time for this summer.

Council plans to release the new system during an off-peak period in 2024, so final testing doesn't coincide with large numbers of potential visitors.

An influx of campers in the past years, a rise of almost

500 permits issued for peak New Year's period days between 2018-19 and 2022-23, revealed limitations with council's current in-house system.

Council staff noted improvement needed to be made regarding a limit in the number of permits sold, the provision of booking specific campgrounds and reducing the environmental impact at each site.

Staff audited all 19 campgrounds to determine the maximum capacity at each, resulting in a total of 458 sites at

any one time, a decrease of the 762 booked for December 31 last year.

"A professional online booking system will ensure our campgrounds no longer become overcrowded, which will create better camper experiences and reduce the impact on our coastal environment," YPC manager economic development and business sustainability Nick Perry said.

"Before it is implemented, council will give people a lot of notice and run an educational campaign about the use, and benefits, of the new booking system."

The new system will allow each campground to have a set capacity and, when sold out for a specific day, no more permits will be issued.

Visitors who like the freedom of the current system, which allows for a blanket permit across all grounds, would still be able to manage their booking across campgrounds.

Benefits for campers will include knowing they will have space when they arrive at a campground, additional details during pre-booking such as

road condition and phone service, and the ability to manage their own bookings," Mr Perry said.

We know many people like the flexibility of the current permit system because they can buy one permit and move between campgrounds they will still be able to do this with the new system, except as an added bonus they will be able to see whether their next destination has capacity before packing up and

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Policy to protect older people's rights

THE state government has outlined its commitment to prevent, recognise, respond to the abuse and mistreatment of older South Australians through the release of a new state-wide policy.

Future Directions Safeguard the Rights of Older South Australians 2023-2027 sets out the direction, strategic priorities, and conditions to address the abuse and mistreatment of older people in South Australia during the next five years.

It focuses on tackling ageism as a fundamental element of safeguarding the rights of older

Ageism can impede living and ageing well, negatively affect the provision of services, supports and care, prevent older people from participating in the workforce, and lead to abuse or mistreatment.

Council on the Ageing SA chief executive Miranda Starke said COTA SA's purpose was to represent the rights and interests of older South Australians.

'We strongly support the priorities the state government's Office for Ageing Well has outlined for safeguarding the rights of older South Australians," she said.

"COTA SA sees ageism as the main barrier to people

being able to age well and contribute to their communities.

"Ageism is a leading contributor to older people's rights being diminished and it's the first step towards elder abuse.

"It's everyone's responsibility to challenge ageism in our community and to call out ageist practices and language when we see it.

"We feel these future directions are a great step forward."

The policy also recognises the importance of developing age friendly communities where older people can thrive, and the important role of the Adult Safeguarding Unit in upholding the rights of those who experience abuse or mistreatment in South Australia.

It has been shaped by extensive consultation with older people as well as a wide range of stakeholders, advisory groups and networks.

A national prevalence study showed more than 60 per cent of older people didn't seek help or advice when they were experiencing abuse or mistreat-

Anyone who suspects abuse or mistreatment of an adult who may be vulnerable, can seek free confidential advice and support or make a report to the Adult Safeguarding Unit on 1800 372 310.

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Wellbeing boost for local schools

SCHOOLS across Yorke Peninsula are set to benefit from a recent government funding boost.

More than \$14 million has been allocated through the Student Wellbeing Boost program to be shared by every school in the state.

Each site is responsible for deciding how best to utilise the funds so long as it contributes to improving student engagement and mental health.

Minister for Education Blair Boyer said students with poor mental health could not be expected to perform academically or engage positively within their school community.

"This investment in mental health and wellbeing will see a workforce including psychologists, social workers, occupational therapists, speech pathologists and other learning support specialists in place to help young people tackle issues early," Mr Boyer said.

St Columba's Memorial School, Yorketown, will receive \$11,500 to support a dedicated school counsellor and broader wellbeing efforts for students.

"We have recently increased the counsellor's role, thanks in part to the increase in wellbeing funding. This has been a great initiative which our families have supported immensely," principal Scott March said.

"The counsellor works with students individually, in small groups and in wider classroom sessions helping them to develop a variety of tools

Reception intake pilot takes off

KADINA Memorial School has commenced its midyear reception intake pilot program.

Almost 20 students from Kadina Preschool Centre were welcomed with open arms by specialist teacher Melanie Kemenyvary and schools services officer Sarah Tutthill at the start of term 3.

The school is one of three across South Australia participating in the initiative before all government primary schools begin to offer a midyear intake from 2024.

The children are the first to complete six terms of reception in an SA public school since 2013.

Deputy principal and head of reception to year 6 Jayne Winter said students would benefit from the additional time to familiarise themselves with the school environment.

"The extra two terms of reception will give us the opportunity to build children's resilience, confidence and sense of belonging within the school community," Mrs Winter said.

"What we know about children and how they learn is, the deeper that sense of belonging is, the more likely they are to engage in their learning."

Mrs Winter said the students would primarily focus on play-based learning, building connections and oral language skills over the next two terms.

"These skills, which are developed through play, will be present when they start their formal structured learning, making them more ready to learn," Mrs Winter said.

"We're also excited to think about the long term — it will be interesting to see the academic impact being in the school environment for an additional two terms will have."

Ms Kemenyvary said the initial weeks of the program had proven successful.

"There has been a lot of movement and the kids are very energetic and curious — I'd say we've probably played with everything in the room," Ms Kemenyvary

"The kids have responded well because it is a playbased program and play is the best way for little people to learn."

Ms Kemenyvary said the school had been working closely with the preschool to ensure a seamless transi-

"We've already done visits back and we've had some of the preschool educators come over to join in with our classes, so we've maintained the connection the students had at the centre." Ms Kemevary said.

"Rather than the transition being a one-way process, it is now a bit of a pendulum between the two as it is more authentic for

Swooping season has begun

THE transition from winter to spring means the weather is warming up, bird breeding seasons are starting and magpies are likely to begin swooping to defend their young ones.

Department for Environment and Water principal ecologist Karl Hillyard said magpie breeding season was typically between August and October.

Females will usually lay three to five eggs before sitting on them for about three weeks until they hatch.

"During this time, male magpies take up the role of the protector, with some using swooping as a tactic to defend their nests," Dr Hillyard said.

'They will do this from the time the eggs are laid until the young birds are ready to fly, which is normally about four to five weeks after hatching.

"Although it can be frightening, swooping is nothing malicious. It is just part of a magpie's natural instinct to protect their chicks.

"While not all magpies will swoop, those that do will attack anything they consider a threat, no matter if it's another bird, a dog, or a human."

Dr Hillyard said magpies were highly intelligent birds with an excellent recall of faces and long memories.

He said people who had been swooped before were likely to be swooped again because magpies generally returned to the same area to breed every year.

"However, magpies typically only defend within about a 100 metre radius of their nests so you can avoid getting swooped by taking a detour around known nest sites if you can," Dr Hillyard said.

The best way to avoid being swooped is to change your route.

If that's not possible, Dr Hillyard encouraged people to travel in groups as swooping birds usually only target individuals, carry an open umbrella over your head, wear sunglasses and a broad-brimmed hat, walk your bike through a bird's territory and avoid making eye contact with the birds.



Chief advocate National Seniors Australia Ian Henschke said the organisation rejected calls for raising the age to 70 on both fiscal and

because of ill health — we should consider a Canadian-style system where you can opt to get the pension earlier but get a bit less," Mr Henschke said.

We've also argued the best way to tackle declining participation is to provide incentives to those who choose to work longer.

"Our Let Pensioners Work campaign calls for a reduction in the income test taper rates so you can keep more of your pension if you choose to continue working.

"This is fairer than raising the pension age because it rewards people who want and need to

"Pensioners who chose to work would benefit from extra income and their participation would also help the economy.

"If you are on a pension and you want to keep working, it'll be a win for the economy, it'll be a win for the pensioners, and it will be a win for the government."

The latest National Seniors Australia poll, of more than 2000 people, showed just seven per cent supported the move to 70, 45 per cent are fine with 67 and 46 per cent want it back to 65.

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

Wallaroo one shot closer to greens

Wallaroo Golf Club users are getting close to putting on 18 holes of greens for the first

Poona Crushing and Gravel, Moonta, commenced excavation works to replace the black scrapes with sand on holes 10 to 18 earlier this month.

Copper Coast Council carted 900 tonnes of sand to the course as part of its inkind contribution to the longawaited project.

Once the back nine holes have been refilled, Santa Ana Couch turf will be rolled onto the sand.

Club president Alan Poole estimated the first holes would be ready for play within two to three months.

'When they (holes 10 to 18) are ready, we'll close off the front nine and start working on them," Poole said.

'Santa Ana is a friendly turf which is salt-resistant, requires minimal chemicals and is affordable to maintain.

"We're now discussing how we get the greens to mould into our mounds which will bring about a few different options (at each hole)."

Poole said the excavator had also been digging up sections of fairway lawn on holes 10 to 18.

"We're replacing sections of soil where the grass hasn't grown as well as we'd like," he

"While the back nine holes are closed, this is the perfect time to do it."

A turf practice putting green, estimated to measure 10 metres wide and 18m long, will be installed near the Wallaroo Community Sports Club entertaining area after the first holes are completed.

Once the transformation from scrapes to turf comes to fruition, Wallaroo will boast the only 18-hole greens course on Yorke Peninsula.

"We won't be putting our fees up — we've budgeted to not do that," Poole said.

"I can't believe how long it's been but it's all coming together.

"It's time for everyone to polish their putters."

The project was enabled by a \$65,000 state government grant and \$220,000 in selffunding.

All 18 greens are on track to be ready for competition by March.

Ivens raising concussion awareness

One-time Central Yorke Cougars junior Luke Ivens is spreading awareness of the longterm effects of concussion.

Ivens, who played 194 games for North Adelaide in the SANFL between 2000 and 2013. is now an ambassador for the Concussion Legacy Foundation Australia.

The non-profit foundation, which had its beginnings in the United States, and aims to raise awareness of concussion and advocate for individuals and their families who suffer longterm effects.

Ivens, 40, suffered multiple concussions in his career, including five in a season when he was aged 21.

"At the end of that season I was given two choices by the medical staff — wear a helmet or retire," he said.

"The latter wasn't an option for me, so the helmet became part of my uniform for the remainder of my career.

"I would take pride in being courageous at the contest and not taking a backward step."

Ivens said the understanding around the risks of concussion had since grown, and he didn't have any resentment towards those involved in his playing days.

After he finished his SANFL career, Ivens played for Uraidla in the Adelaide Hills.

It was there he started to notice some issues.

"There were the obvious changes of getting slower on the field, but I was also becoming increasingly anxious, particularly in social settings," he said.

"Over the next three years, other signs crept in, including headaches and short-term mem-

ory loss. "Becoming frustrated and going down a rabbit hole in search of answers, my self-worth declined.

"At the lowest points, I would need to self-medicate with half a dozen drinks before going to any social event."

Ivens, who has three children Nate, 8, Leo, 4, and 10-month-old Gus with wife Sally, was diagnosed with probable Chronic Traumatic Encephalopathy.

CTE is a degenerative brain disease caused in part by repeated head trauma but can only be properly diagnosed during an

Symptoms can include memory loss, poor impulse control, impaired judgement, aggression, anxiety, depression, and eventually progressive dementia.

"I am faced with some challenges I need to manage throughout my life, but would I take it back?" Ivens said.

"Definitely not, the game gave me so much joy and lifelong friendships.

"It also played a big role in shaping the person I am today."

With the support of family, friends, health professionals including psychologists, psychiatrists and neurologists, Ivens has been guided in the right direction to live a "normal", healthy life.

Ivens has been visiting football clubs across the state, telling his story and spreading the word of the importance of correct concussion protocols and the risks involved if they are not followed.

"I'm keen get out to clubs in the country and happy tell my story as often as possible," he

"In the future I would also love to set up a past players' support system for brain injury sufferers."

A part of his ambassador role, Ivens has organised a Team Triathlon event at the Semaphore foreshore November 19.

"The event caters for all ages, abilities and genders — our aim is to get everyone together to support this worthy cause," he

"We have engaged a number of celebrity teams including Andrew Jarman and The Rush Hour Crew, Natalie von Bertouch and the Australian Diamonds, Crows and Port legends, the Hockeyroos, Rachael Sporn and the Opals, along with a number of SANFL superstars.

"I'll be participating in a team that includes my father and sis-

Play was abandoned as medical volunteers from both teams tended to Linhart until an ambulance could arrive.





Samara Shane and Laurent Guerrero in their Sabres and Iason Storr in his Illusion took to the water in light, overcast


With a breeze of only seven knots gusting to nine knots, our intrepid sailors had to work hard to get around the course.

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Midnight Oil burns bright at Orrie Cowie

THE Reade family of Mount Rat bought the top-priced ram at Orrie Cowie's 58th annual on property auction last Wednesday, August 9.

They bought an April 2022 drop son of Midnight Oil 20 for \$5000.

A total of 82 Poll Merino rams sold from the 90 offered at the auction at an average of \$1530.

All 10 Merino rams offered were sold to an average of \$1750.

The top priced Merino went for \$3200 to a wool producer from Burra. The ram was a June 2022 drop, sired

by 86.8 Grandson. Buyers came from Queensland, New South Wales, Victoria, Western Australia as well as the West Coast, Yorke Peninsula and other regional SA areas.

Orrie Cowie proprietor John Dalla described it as a good, solid sale across the board.

"We are aiming to breed good, balanced Poll Merinos which grow fast, have good muscling, good mothering ability and cut plenty of high-quality wool," he said.

The overall top-priced ram aver-

aged19.8 microns, carried 7.45 kilograms of greasy wool at 11 months and weighed an impressive 120kg.

Its buyer, Gavin Reade, said the ram had white, bold and lustrous wool with a good crimp and would cut plenty of wool.

He bought two other Orrie Cowie Poll Merinos at the sale.

The Reade family runs a selfreplacing flock of 950 ewes, aiming for 20 to 21 microns on the ewes and 18 to 20 microns on the hoggets.

"This year, we are looking for more wool. Before that, we were working on the frame," Mr Read said.

'Three generations of our family have bought sheep from Orrie Cowie over the past 40 years."

Also on offer at Orrie Cowie were 27 White Suffolk prime lamb sires, all sired by Ramsay Park, with 18 head selling to a top of \$1300 and an average of \$1028.

Orrie Cowie will display its sheep at the Copper Coast Show in Kadina on Saturday and Sunday, August 19 and 20, and will offer rams for sale at the Royal Adelaide Show on Friday, September 8.

It will sell its surplus stud Poll Merino and Merino ewes by private selection in September.

"There is ducted reverse-cycle air conditioning through the main home, a private dam, a 240,000 litre squatters' tank for irrigation and a croquet green just some of the added features of this property."





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Urgent national action needed for rental crisis

THE Councils of Social Service network is calling for immediate national action to limit rent increases and ban nogrounds evictions.

COSS wrote to the Prime Minister, Premiers and Chief Ministers to highlight their concerns ahead of this week's National Cabinet meeting.

"There are more than 640,000 lowincome Australian households with an unmet housing need — people who are homeless, living in overcrowded housing, or spending more than 30 per cent of income on rent," the letter said.

"Our frontline service organisations are witnessing distressing levels of housing need.

"The rental crisis requires immediate attention.

"Without government intervention, housing will continue to be unaffordable and insecure for many Australians.

"Law reform is required to limit rental increases, prevent no-grounds evictions, and ensure homes are energy efficient."

The network, which includes the

Australian Council of Social Service and state and territory bodies, is calling for rent increases to be capped, alongside a ban on no-grounds evictions, including those at the end of fixed-term tenancies

The network is also calling for the implementation of energy efficiency standards for rental homes, a permanent increase to income and rental support payments, and plans which deliver accelerated housing supply and seek to end housing need in Australia.

ACOSS ČEO Cassandra Goldie said states and territories must coordinate action to make renting affordable and fair for the one-third of Australian households that rent.

"Australia's hodgepodge network of rental regulations is failing renters," Dr Goldie said.

"We urge federal, state and territory leaders to seize the chance for meaningful and substantial reforms that make renting affordable and fair."

SACOSS CEO Ross Womersley said announcements earlier this year by state and federal governments were welcome, but weren't enough.

"South Australia needs to build around 1000 public housing dwellings each year to begin to rebuild the stock of social housing and put downward pressure on rental prices across the market," he said.

"The SA Government has also announced its intention to legislate to ban no-cause evictions and provide rights for renters to have pets.

"While we welcome these promises, Premier Malinauskas needs to double down at National Cabinet and confirm these changes will be introduced in the next session of parliament, while also going further to legislate to stop excessive rent increases and implement minimum energy efficiency standards.

"Housing is a basic right with impacts on people's health, security and economic opportunity.

"Governments, both state and federal, need to act urgently and substantially to address a housing system that is in crisis."

Wallaroo: Souid were high on the catch list after the weekend's close-to-perfect fishing conditions (even with the dodge tides), allowing boat crews to cruise far and wide to pick up good numbers. Jettybased anglers caught squid and a few tommy ruff (Australian herring) after dusk.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: King George whiting was the main target species, reported at Warburto Point and West Light grounds. A few red-beaked garfish are in the bay and there's squid at both ietties.

Point Turton: Try the jetty for squid, tommies and salmon trout; mullet are still in the high tide shallows around at Levens Beach and Point Souttar's old moorings. Boat crews are targeting KG whiting,

garfish and squid. Salmon trout and mullet are at the Dust Bowl and the Pondalowie rocks.

Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: Big tommies and snook are in and around the Stenhouse Bay jetty at the moment, plus squid and garfish. Marion Bay boat crews ventured out in the cold but calm weather on Sunday for snook, KG whiting, flathead and squid.

Edithburgh: Slow tides had a negative effect on fishing in the later days of the week, as crews fished for squid, garfish, small to medium KG whiting and tommy ruff out from Port Giles. The jetty has a few tommies and sauid.

Ardrossan: The boat ramp had a few occupants when I checked in here last Thursday, with anglers trying their luck for whiting, squid, garfish and snook. Try the town jetty for soapie mulloway and squid after dark.

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Inquiry in to YPFL spectator incident

SANFL is investigating an incident involving a spectator and players during an Under 14s Yorke Peninsula Football League match between Wallaroo and Moonta at Wallaroo on Saturday, August 12.

"Investigations are ongoing after reports of a spectator entering the field of play," SANFL Yorke and Mid North football operations coordinator Simon Purdue said.

"The Yorke Peninsula Football League board will hand out necessary sanctions after a meeting on Tuesday night, (August 22)."

In the same fixture, four yellow cards were issued in the Wallaroo versus Moonta A grade match.

This brought the total cards issued across the YPFL in 2023 to 36, compared with 34 at the conclusion of the 2022 season.

Wallaroo and Moonta Football Clubs were also each fined \$150 for engaging in a melee, a penalty which requires the involvement of at least six players.
