# SYP CHILD CARE PUSH



YORKE Peninsula Council is preparing a grant application in the hopes of establishing a childcare facility on southern Yorke Peninsula.

This comes after a sustained push by local parents, whose studies into the issue have confirmed a lack of child care is severely impacting families.

Council has identified a facility could fall within the guidelines of the Black Summer Bushfire Recovery Grants Program - but will have to move quickly as applications close early next month.

## Dogs must be on leashes

DO I need to have my dog on a leash?

Yes, you must have your dog on a leash of no more than two metres in all public places and in private places where you do not have the consent of the occupier to have your dog off-leash.

Dogs must be on leash when walking along all public roads and footpaths unless otherwise signposted.

You can have your dog off-leash in off-leash areas designated by council.

Even when off-leash, your dog must be under effective control, which means it returns when called and obeys commands.

Your dog is not under effective control if you allow it, and/or it is able, to run towards another person or dog unrestrained.

Last week, while out with my old small dog on a short leash — a couple walking on the opposite side of the road with their dog off-leash made no attempt to call their dog to them when it ran across the road towards me and my dog.

Even when the couple did cross the road, they still made no attempt to put their dog on leash until after it had growled and snapped at my dog.

Just two days later, my dog was again forced into a face-to-face situation, this time with a different and much larger dog whose owner had his back to his dog and was oblivious to what was happening until I yelled.

Your dog may usually be friendly, but an unrestrained dog has an unfair advantage over a dog on leash.

Please have your dog on leash when other people are nearby.

## **Passionate plea to the Premier**

IT is fantastic news the YP Field Days committee is continuing to prepare for the event despite COVID-19 uncertainty but, for the event to go ahead, organisers will need government support.

That will mean COVID management rules that can still allow for a good event, with enough people permitted through the gates to make all the effort worthwhile.

The fate of the 2021 field days therefore rests with a few people, including Premier Steven Marshall, a previous guest of the YP Field Days with whom the committee will meet next week. Mr Marshall knows — as we all do — there is still a threat of COVID-19 spreading from other states. Still, that should not mean restrictions on an event like the YP Field Days have to be onerous to the point where the event would have to be cancelled. Organisers are prepared to adhere to COVID-19 rules, with Covid Marshals, check-ins and other requirements. All they need now is to know they can have a big enough crowd.

So this is our plea to Mr Marshall. Please, come up with a compromise that will still allow the YP Field Days to proceed.

There are many reasons to feel passionately about this.

For one, the organisers have already done most of the hard work. For such a massive event, the YP Field Days staff and committee members are relatively small in number — but hardworking and dedicated. They have been working on this event since the 2019 field days ended. It would be a terrible shame for all their effort to amount to nothing due to a road block right before the finish line.

Then there are the community groups who rely heavily on the field days to raise money. The event alleviates pressure on their volunteers to fundraise quite as much during the rest of the year. This is all the more important given how many groups are struggling to attract and retain volunteers.

Further to that, charities benefit immensely from the field days as well. This

year's official charity is Lions Skin Cancer Screening and that's just the beginning, as the Royal Flying Doctor Service, Angel Flight and more intend on setting up at Paskeville.

From big companies to small businesses and market stallholders, the field days provides an opportunity for sales, publicity and networking. Consumers benefit by having such a wide range of products and services available in one location, many of which offer field days specials. These businesspeople have already put effort into securing their sites and preparing their displays. Some small business owners have done so singlehandedly, all in hopes of a little boost over those three days.

Finally, and most importantly, we must consider the societal benefits. The field days allow for locals to come together, catch up and enjoy time outdoors. This is more vital than ever given the restrictions and occasional lockdowns of the past two years. We know farmers are at high risk of poor mental health due to several factors, including the isolating nature of their jobs. Many look forward to the field days for the social aspect more than anything else. The wider community receives an economic boost as visitors stay and spend money in Yorke Peninsula towns. The total economic benefit is estimated at \$3.5 million.

The benefits of the YP Field Days are immense. The negative impact of having to cancel the event would be immense as well.

It all comes down to whether enough people are allowed to attend. We believe they should be. A crowd of 15,000 people was allowed into Adelaide Oval for the Showdown earlier this month. That is more than would be expected on any one of the three days of the field days. And, unlike Adelaide Oval, the field days site spans 30 hectares.

With all this in mind, we reiterate, one more time for luck, please Mr Marshall, let the YP Field Days proceed.

# Committee ploughing ahead with field days preparations

IT remains all systems go for the 2021 Yorke Peninsula Field Days, with organisers planning for the event to go ahead on Tuesday to Thursday, September 28-30.

Field days committee members will visit Parliament House as guests of Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis next Tuesday.

There, they have a private meeting scheduled with Premier Steven Marshall to discuss the event.

YP Field Days CEO Peter Anderson said the committee will work with SA Health, which will advise of any potential restrictions; however, he is excited for the event to proceed.

"At this stage we are planning to go ahead," Mr Anderson said.

"We are about three-quarters full of exhibitors and there is still room for more to come on board.

"We are expecting a late surge of exhibitors as we get closer to the event and confidence grows about the COVID situation.

"The feedback we are getting from the local community is they are keen for the field days to proceed — they are looking forward to the event and we are hoping to have good attendance this year."

Despite likely COVID management requirements, this year's field days will include the regular favourites such as fashion parades, working sheepdogs, wool and sheep demonstrations and guest speakers.

There will also be new additions like a tractor pull, antique crawler tractors and spray equipment demonstrations.

Mr Anderson said the field days were important for the wider community.

"It draws millions of dollars into the local economy and the committee is always keen to support the local community, sporting bodies and local groups," he said.

"Accommodation, restaurants, hotels all benefit from the field days being held and we don't want to disappoint them."

Mr Anderson said a new component this year will be online ticketing, which he hopes will launch soon.

"We will ask people to buy their tickets online, as we want to minimise the handling of money due to COVID-19," he said.

## Retrial results in Jesse Penhall being found guilty of murder again

JESSE Penhall has been found guilty of murder for a second time.

Mr Penhall was found guilty two years ago for the 2017 murder of David Norris, but won an appeal last year.

His conviction was overturned partially because the jury had not considered the partial defence of excessive self-defence.

The retrial started on July 20 but reporting was restricted due to suppression orders on Mr Penhall's successful appeal.

That was until the jury

returned a guilty verdict last Wednesday, August 11.

Mr Penhall was sentenced to life in prison with a non-parole period of 23 years after his first conviction.

Sentencing submissions from the retrial will be heard later this year.



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## Natural progression for reef

BARUNGA West Council approved a site suitability and verification study for a proposed natural reef project at its meeting this month.

Elected members voted unanimously to progress the natural reef project to a stage that will allow it to be considered shovel ready so grant funding can be sought.

A working party for the project has been established consisting of Mayor Leonie Kerley, Deputy Mayor Peter Button, CEO Maree Wauchope, manager assets and infrastructure Steve Davey, manager corporate and community services Michael Oertel, YP Tourism manager Brooke Liebelt, and Landscape SA representatives Anthony Fox and Rosemary McDowell.

Mr Davey said the working party met with Green Light Consulting's Amanda Price-McGregor and The Nature Conservancy's Anita Nedosyko in May.

"Successful reef restoration depends on several factors, including physical and biological processes, as well as logistical considerations," he said.

"The Nature Conservancy will work on a model to allow a large potential coastal area near Port Broughton to be narrowed down to a much smaller suite of optimal and suitable locations for shellfish and reef restoration.

"The output of this work will include a report to support an informed discussion of the important driving factors which will guide suitable reef locations.

"This includes bare sand seafloor habitat, water depth, good connectivity with other rocky reef and seagrass systems, proximity to boat ramps for recreational access and no expected disturbance to existing infrastructure and fishers or boaters."

TNC will survey the area using underwater cameras to work out the best way to establish a reef.

"The addition of the video surveys provides a record of the baseline habitat conditions and confirms specific areas within these locations where there is bare sandy substrate suitable to build a reef," Mr Davey said.

"Based on the footage collected from 84 transects, the data is then used to support the suitability of the site for development approvals."

Mayor Kerley said council will release the outcomes of the work to the public.

The study will take up to two weeks and cost about \$35,000.

Once completed, it will be used to determine the size and location of the proposed reef, which could be as small as five square metres or up to five hectares.

## Contractors meet new management

LOCAL contractors learned more about new state government facilities management coordinators Ventia last week.

In August last year, the state government announced its plans to outsource the department responsible for its Across Government Facilities Management Arrangement.

AGFMA ensures the maintenance of public buildings including schools, hospitals and police stations.

Local tradespeople protested the decision, citing concerns about the impact on local service levels.

Ventia was appointed in July, and the Future AGFMA team held an information session with local tradespeople last Wednesday, August 11.

"We are pleased to be able to introduce Ventia as the successful contractor for facilities management in South Australia and to provide contractors with as much information as possible ahead of the transition to the Future AGFMA on 1 December, 2021," a Department for Infrastructure and Transport spokesperson said.

"We are also delighted to reaffirm that, under the contract, there will be a strong focus on local work for local contractors, supported by local offices.

"The information sessions are the beginning of an extensive transition and support program which includes the assignment of individual relationship coordinators for each business as part of the on-boarding with Ventia.

"We will continue to work closely with all contractors and would encourage them to reach out with any questions they may have as we make the transition to a safer, more reliable and more efficient system for the management of state government assets."

# **Push for SYP childcare centre**

YORKE Peninsula Council will look at applying for grant funding to construct a purpose-built childcare centre in Minlaton.

CEO Andrew Cameron believes a childcare centre would fit the guidelines of the Black Summer Bushfire Recovery Grants Program but council only has a couple of weeks to apply.

Mr Cameron said it would probably cost less to build a childcare facility than to try retrofitting an existing building, as none were suitable and therefore would require extensive renovations.

"The problem with the grant is we don't have a lot of time, we have to have a submission in by September 2," he said.

"It's not an onerous process but we would need to have a concept done.

"There are examples of recently built centres that we could look at."

Mr Cameron said several sites had been looked at for a centre, with the most suitable option being the old tennis courts adjacent the Minlaton Bowling Club.

## Lack of child care is forcing

### families away Council discussed the idea after a presentation from

Southern Yorke Peninsula Childcare Feasibility Group members Katie Hughes, Amy Honner and Anna Phasey at the YPC meeting last Wednesday, August 11.

The group has run two surveys to gauge the need for child care on SYP, and said they had identified more than enough need to justify a centre being established.

Mrs Hughes said only 32 per cent of respondents, 175 families, indicated they could access formal childcare options.

"It is important to note the majority were not able to access the number of days they would ideally like," Mrs Hughes said.

"Fifty per cent of families were relying solely on friends or family to provide child care.

"Of great concern were the sheer number of families choosing to relocate off the peninsula due to a lack of care or not being able to utilise their muchneeded skill sets within our community."

Elected members talked about the pros and cons of

applying for funding under the grant program, which supports the recovery efforts of communities affected by the 2019-20 bushfires.

Councillor Adam Meyer raised concerns about applying for funding to build a facility without having a childcare provider locked in.

"I don't think there is a doubt in anyone's mind that it's a required facility," Mr Meyer said.

"There is a lot of support from the elected body, but who would manage it?

"My concern is if we build a facility and we get a provider, that they come in and says it's not how they would have built it."

Councillors acknowledged these concerns but others said it would be worth applying for the funding while it was available.

Staff are now working on a draft application.

## No new cases but restrictions remain

South Australia but current restrictions will remain in place.

SA Police Commissioner Grant Stevens said the transition committee met this morning (Tuesday) and was continuing to monitor the restrictions daily.

"At this point in time no restrictions will be changing and I have no indication when they will be relaxed," Mr Stevens said.

"We are trying to be as responsible as possible.

"We don't know what the situation will be in the coming days or weeks."

There have been 868 cases in SA to date, and there are currently two active cases. A man in his 20s remains in ICU in a stable condition.

YORKE Peninsula medical practices are crying out for permanent doctors as locums again fill the gaps.

Minlaton Medical Centre lost a permanent doctor at the end of July and is still searching for a replacement.

"Luckily, we've been able to source a locum doctor for this week," practice manager

Heather Joraslafsky said.

"We have two permanent doctors and this one locum allows us to fill our roster, with only a week's wait for appointments.

"At this stage though we have not been able to secure one for next week, so we're playing it week by week."

Yorketown Medical Practice

has contracted locum staff until the end of September.

"After that, we might be finding it harder," practice manager Leanne Warren said.

"We're also administering about 80 AstraZeneca vaccines a week, so we've been working around that and ensuring we don't have too long a wait time for appointments."

# Homeopath suspended

GAWLER homeopath Monika Milka has been suspended after allegedly publishing COVID misinformation.

Ms Milka, who has also operated out of Wallaroo, has been issued an Interim Prohibition Order by the Health and Community Services Complaints Commissioner.

The order prohibits Ms Milka from publishing and otherwise engaging in false, unsafe and unethical "education" about COVID-19 and vaccines in her capacity as a massage therapist and homeopathy therapist.

HCSCC received a complaint advising false statements had been published on 'Monika's Entity' Massage Therapy Facebook page about COVID-19 and vaccines between June 25 and July 26.

The order will be in place for up to 12 weeks while it is being investigated.

"Health services are defined under section 4 of the South Australian Health and Community Services Complaints Act 2004," HCSCC Associate Professor Grant Davies said.

"A person can offer a health service through the promotion of health care or health education and I consider the posts to constitute a health service.

"As I have stated before, the Code of Conduct exists primarily to protect the health or safety of members of the South Australian public."

This is Ms Milka's second prohibition order, the first coming in 2016 after she claimed to have successfully treated a range of health conditions and terminal illnesses, through treatments and tonics.

Adelaide men arrested with stolen car

Port Victoria police arrested four Adelaide men in relation to a stolen car on Saturday, July 31.

The Nissan X-Trail was stolen from an Adelaide address, and a member of the public reported seeing the vehicle at Port Wakefield.

It was later found and recovered with minimal damage at Point Pearce.

The men were charged with illegal use of a motor vehicle and will appear in court at a later date.

Reported for driving offences

Ardrossan police reported a 30-year-old southern Yorke Peninsula woman for driving offences last Thursday, July 12.

Officers were carrying out speed detection on the Yorke Highway, near Price, when they stopped the woman.

Enquiries revealed she was driving disqualified and at an excessive speed, considered to be more than 45km/h over the limit.

She will be summonsed to appear in court at a later date.

FISHERIES officers have caught several recreational fishers in breach of bag limits already this month. They were fined \$986 and their catch was seized. "Fishing rules such as daily bag

"Fishing rules such as daily bag limits are important to ensure longterm sustainability of our fisheries and anyone who breaks these are effectively stealing from all South Australians," Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development David Basham said.

"The fishing community and the general public have little tolerance for those who blatantly break the rules and neither does the government.

"An increase in on-the-spot fishing fines has been long overdue with some remaining unchanged for 30 years and price of seafood has risen well above these penalties.

"Those who exceed the limits can expect to be caught and expiations or court-imposed penalties of up to \$20,000."

# Home heating fire prevention

SOUTH Australians risk losing their homes and potentially their lives if using heaters incorrectly this winter.

On average, the Metropolitan and Country Fire Services battle up to 60 house fires linked to home heating annually.

MFS community safety officer Angelo Mastripolito said many of those incidents have a common link.

"One of the leading causes of home heating fires is having clothes, bedding or other flammable items too close to heaters and open fires," he said.

"Our rule of thumb is to keep anything flammable two metres from the heater this winter.

"That's because beds, curtains, furniture and clothes hung on clothes airers can easily catch alight."

The MFS warned leaving a heater switched on too close to your bed while you sleep was dangerous and posed a significant house fire risk.

"People can become too hot in their sleep, kick bedding off and continue to sleep," Mr Mastripolito said.

"If a heater is too close, that can result in your bedding touching the heater, causing your bed and bedroom to catch alight — it's a situation that could quickly turn fatal."

The MFS urged householders to combine these safety tips with hardwired, interconnected smoke alarms less than 10 years old and a Home Fire Escape Plan.

## Home fire safety tips

- Keep any items that can burn well clear of heaters and fires – clearance from clothes, bedding, furniture, curtains and other combustibles should be at least two metres
- Clothes airers placed around or near heaters and open or solid fuel fires are a high fire risk if they fall over, clothing can end up dangerously close to the heater
- Turn heating equipment off when you leave the house, and do not leave portable heaters running for extended periods
- Discontinue using any faulty heating equipment immediately — have it repaired by a qualified tradesperson or replace it with a new item
- Choose a portable heater with an automatic safety switch that turns the heater off if it is knocked over

# **YPUNDER PRESSURE**

GREY, which encompasses all of Yorke Peninsula, has been named in Australia's top five electorates for high blood pressure

More than 38,000 people in Grey live with high blood pressure, which is the single largest risk factor for stroke, one of Australia's biggest killers and a leading cause of disability.

Research shows 48 per cent of strokes could be prevented if high blood pressure alone was eliminated.

Port Broughton doctor Alison Edwards said high blood pressure had a multitude of causes, many of which were lifestyle factors.

"By itself, it often causes no symptoms or even awareness of it being an issue, though some people can get headaches," Dr Edwards said.

"In the short term it is not a major concern, but longterm high blood pressure increases risks for heart attacks, strokes, kidney failure, blindness."

Dr Edwards said high blood pressure can sometimes be hereditary so there is a need for Hays said blood pressure checks extra awareness.

"Living a healthy lifestyle with regular activity, healthy eating, losing weight if needed, minimising alcohol and salt intake and not smoking can all help with lowering blood pressure as well as helping modify the risks associated with it," Dr Edwards said.

"Your GP is in the best position to keep a check on your blood pressure and other risk factors to help you live your healthiest life."

Stroke Foundation South Australia state manager Luke can save lives.

"It's estimated more than 38,000 people in the Grey electorate are living with high blood pressure, many unknowingly, putting themselves at serious risk of a potentially devastating stroke," Mr Hays said.

"You may think your health is fine but high blood pressure often has no immediate symptoms.

"Over time it puts extra stress on blood vessel walls, this can cause them to narrow or break down, increasing the risk of stroke and heart disease."

## **F.A.S.T.** action can save lives

FRONTLINE health workers and everyday residents in South Australia, who act F.A.S.T. when stroke strikes. were celebrated during Stroke Week, August 2-8.

"This National Stroke Week, I thank every person who plays a role in a stroke emergency," Stroke Foundation South Australia state manager Luke Hays said.

"That includes the person who recognises a stroke and calls triple zero (000), the call taker, the paramedics, the doctors and nurses who treat the patient and the dedicated health professionals who support their recovery.

"Families, carers and communities also play a role in helping survivors reconnect after stroke."

Stroke attacks the brain, the human control centre. People in South Australia are being urged to learn and share the most common signs of stroke, F.A.S.T.

Think of the word F.A.S.T. and ask these questions if you suspect a stroke:

Face: Check their face. Has their mouth drooped? **Arms:** Can they lift both arms?

Speech: Is their speech slurred? Do they understand you?

Time: Time is critical. If you see any of these signs, call triple zero (000) straight away.

#### **COVID-19** restrictions

Please keep up to date with the current COVID-19 restrictions which are a constantly moving feast. When speaking with the Premier late last week, I again implored upon him the need for tiered restrictions and found a sympathetic ear. Restrictions should be imposed relative to the risk profile and after 18 months of this pandemic we have a large enough sample size to show the country is safer than the city. It can therefore be trusted, or even rewarded, with lighter restrictions than our metropolitan friends.

It was very disappointing for all to hear the news the Adelaide Show has been forced to cancel for the second year running due to the ongoing pandemic. At time of writing, things were still looking positive for the YP Field Days at the end of September. It is sincerely hoped the eastern states can soon get their cases and tracing under control for the betterment of all of Australia.

Small businesses in our region continue to suffer and I was pleased last week that at least social distancing was elevated to 75 per cent capacity for our local hotels and restaurants. I remind a further round of cash grants has been opened to help businesses and sole traders in eligible industry sectors which have experienced a decline in turnover of 30 per cent or more over a twoweek period as a result of trading restrictions imposed on July 28 - applications opened August 13 and close October 17. This support is on top of the \$3000 emergency cash grants and \$1000 grants for sole traders announced in July. #### Good news in our community

## **Call for YPC elected member reduction**

A RATEPAYER is calling for a reduction in the number of Yorke Peninsula Council elected members.

Vivienne Lambert, of Port Victoria, has submitted a second lot of feedback to council suggesting a mayor and 10 councillors one fewer than at present.

Following the first round of public consultation, council opted to remain with 11 elected members and a mayor — despite having more councillors than most councils its size — in April.

YPC has 8835 electors spanning 5834 square kilometres while, in comparison, Copper Coast Council is represented by a mayor and nine councillors with 11,405 electors, spanning 773sqkm.

All councils have to review aspects of their composition and the division, or potential division, of the council area into wards.

"There is significant merit in the three-ward structure of 10 councillors and giving representation of Kalkabury ward four councillors, Gum Flat three and and population." Innes/Penton Vale three," Mrs Lambert said.

"This is the fairest change taking into account elector ratios, communities of interest, potential population fluctuations and development and logical ward boundaries.

"Councillors should take into account the intention of the Local Government Act and the comment from the Electoral Commission in relation to avoiding over-representation compared with other councils of similar size

Mrs Lambert said fewer elected members would also save council money


"This not only saves the councillor allowance but also provision of computer equipment, travel allowances and insurance," she said.

"This is a one-in-eight-year chance for councillors to make a responsible decision for the benefit of the whole council area."

Council will now prepare a final report to submit to the Electoral Commissioner for consideration.

## Wheeled sports and recreation parks have a say

YORKE Peninsula Council is asking for feedback to shape a plan for wheeled sports and other recreational facilities.

YPC regularly receives requests from progress associations and community members asking for new wheeled sport and rec facilities, such as pump tracks and skate parks.

Council recognises the current lack of facilities to cater to young people's needs but doesn't have an evidence-based framework to guide decisions, including understanding what type and size of facility is best suited to individual towns.

To address this gap, council is developing a Wheeled Sport and Recreations Parks Proposal.

The proposal's aim is to help council and the community understand the range of possible facilities including the specific type of features and the scale of projects.

Deputy Mayor Tania Stock said these types of facilities were critical for local communities.

"Council only has a finite amount of money for new infrastructure so it's imperative elected members are assured money is spent where it is needed the most and delivers the most benefit," Cr Stock said.


"Violet asked us what we wanted to see and we thought it would be fitting to have something sea-based given we are in Wallaroo.

# SA bushfire management plan

SOUTH Australia's inaugural State Bushfire Management Plan 2021-25 is complete.

Minister for Emergency Services Vincent Tarzia said the development of the plan was one of 15 recommendations by Mick Keelty AO as part of the Independent Review into the 2019-20 bushfire season.

"The plan builds the foundation for a collaborative approach to bushfire management and will engage and build understanding of shared responsibility for bushfire management in the community," Mr Tarzia said.

"Protecting lives and property is a top priority for the Marshall Government.

"We will continue doing possible everything to strengthen South Australia's bushfire resilience."

State Bushfire Coordination Committee acting chairperson and CFS acting chief officer Georgie Cornish said everyone had a part to play in managing bushfire risk.

"It's only through collaboration and joint effort that we'll be able to reduce the impact of large-scale bushfires in the future," Ms Cornish said.

"We now have a clear roadmap for the way forward, and we'll be commissioning high-level research on behalf of the committee to help identify major risks and identify the

areas where we are most vulnerable as a state.

'The actions we take now can dramatically affect the impact of bushfires on individuals, businesses and communities when they occur."

The finalised plan follows the completion of all 27 immediate action items from the Keelty Review.

The Marshall Government's \$97.5 million response to the review has included additional support and resources for volunteers, extra staff and equipment, better protection for critical assets, enhanced communications, state-of-theart technology and improved mental health assistance for the emergency services sector.

## **MFS regional station assessments**

METROPOLITAN Fire Service regional station proficiency and audit assessments have begun.

Yorke Peninsula stations in Moonta, Kadina and Wallaroo were all tested in early July, giving them the chance to demonstrate their skills, community spirit and commitment to public safety.

At the completion of the process, five of the 17 MFS regional stations will receive awards including the Chief Officer's Shield, Regional Command Shield, Regional Assistant Chief Officer's Shield, Most Improved Shield and the Family Friendly Regional Station Award.

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## Locals nominated for awards


SYP Community Hub and Community Care and Transport have both been nominated in the South Australian Community Achievement Awards.

\$500 Woolworths voucher. All nominees and finalists




The community hub originally started as a telecentre with a focus on connecting people with technology.

## How should SA dispose of PFAS waste?

A PARLIAMENTARY Committee led by Member for MacKillop Nick McBride has been launched to study the safe disposal of per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances.

"PFAS are a group of chemicals that can persist for a long time in the environment as they do not break down naturally," Mr McBride said.

"They have been used in firefighting foam, non-stick cookware, furniture, carpet stain remover and food packaging among other products since the 1950s."

South Australia was the first state to ban PFAS in firefighting foams in 2018, but does not have a designated waste disposal facility licensed under the Environment Protection Act to accept PFAS-contaminated waste.

Earlier this year the SA Environment Protection Authority refused an application by Southern Waste ResourceCo to receive PFAS waste at its landfill site in McLaren Vale.

"The committee understands this is a complex issue for South Australians," Mr McBride said.

"We know the long-term impacts of PFAS are still under investigation and also that PFAS chemicals, while being phased out, are still present in our community.


"The committee would like to hear from experts, companies, industry, communities and individuals about the criteria for the disposal of PFAS in SA, including the consequences of not having an appropriate pathway for their disposal."

## Pacific Hydro gives \$55,000 for projects

MUNDOORA Community Sports Club is one of 10 community groups to share \$55,000 from Pacific Hydro's 2021 Clements Gap Sustainable Communities fund.

The club will use the money to create an outdoor dining area that will increase capacity limits for dining and events while abiding by COVID-safe guidelines.

"Feeling socially connected has never been so important, especially for regional areas that are socially isolated," MCSC committee member Stephen Stringer said.

"The community here relies on the club as a social hub but capacity limits mean we don't always have space; the new outdoor dining area will allow us to seat more people and provide a comfortable area for the community throughout the year and in all weather conditions."

Pacific Hydro senior project leader - community investment and communications Bernadette Holland said the company was proud of how far its community investment program had come.

"Since its inception in 2005, Pacific Hydro has invested \$4.8 million to support more than 980 local projects in our wind farm host communities across regional Australia," she said.

"This year alone we are funding more than \$600,000 of projects across Australia.

"Pacific Hydro is proud to give back to the community-identified projects and organisations that serve and benefit the people who neighbour our renewable energy projects.

"Many organisations have shared that, without Pacific Hydro's help, their projects would not move forward or serve nearly as many people."

Pacific Hydro's Community Investment Program aims to empower local residents to identify the initiatives and projects Pacific Hydro should support.

"All eligible applications were reviewed by a fair and transparent panel process, which included members of the community and the local council," Ms Holland said.

## **Elite Ellie at the CrossFit Games**

ELLIE Turner got her first taste of the CrossFit Games and is already preparing to go back for more.

At only 23, Ellie was among an elite few selected for what is known as the Olympics of the sport — which combines various feats of fitness — in Madison, Wisconsin, USA.

"I watch the CrossFit games every year on television so I had some idea what I was about to go through but I soon realised the games aren't as glamourous as an athlete," Ellie said.

"They look cool to watch but they are brutal to do.

"In saying that I absolutely loved it!"

The CrossFit Games were held over five days with 15 events total.

"The days were long and we didn't know what we were in for sometimes until we were about to do the event," Ellie said.

"The first day we had to swim one mile (1600m) and then kayak three miles (five km)," she said.

"We were then taken straight back to the outdoor stadium where we did a gymnastic/odd object event which led straight into event three, a 500m sprint, before finishing in the indoor stadium for the final event of the day

difficulty of each event."

Day two was a rest day for Ellie before she geared up for day three, which consisted of a rope climb, ski erg and sand bag carry.

"We then had a back-to-back workout for events six and seven which involved increasing weight barbell cleans and running," she said.

"These workouts went better than expected and I surprised myself with a heat win."

Ellie then faced her biggest challenge, handstand walking, an event she knew she couldn't do due to a shoulder and neck injury she had sustained before the games.

"I had to muster all the courage I had to walk out on the floor in front of thousands of people and attempt to walk over the first obstacle even though I knew I wasn't going to get over it," she said.

"The next workout was a couplet of the rogue echo bike and snatches, and I went on to win my heat by more than 20 seconds and place fourth in the event which was my best placing of the weekend.

"I was proud of myself for bouncing back after such a disappointing finish in event eight."

Ellie finished in 26th place, just shy of making the top 20 and continuing the weekend's events.

"It was such an amazing experience, I learned so much about competing and about myself — it has definitely motivated me to come back better than ever next year," she said.

"I was absolutely distraught after getting cut and not being able to finish the weekend properly.

"I said to my coach I was going to make sure I never felt like this again, I was going to go back and work harder than I ever have before, so next year I would be in that final heat of females on the final day."

Ellie said travelling during COVID-19 was difficult but she felt the love and support from home.

"I'm not doing too much training in quarantine so when I get home the work begins for next season," she said.

"I will hopefully head back to Canada to get some training in with my coach in the lead up to the next season which starts in February.

"I also want to do some other competitions to get as much experience as I can because that was my downfall at the games all the other girls had been in CrossFit for eight-plus years and this was only my third major competition."

Ellie went to school at Moonta before boarding at Immanuel College and then completing a Bachelor of Physiotherapy degree.

She lives in Glenelg and coaches at GEDfit in Kidman Park, and her family is still based in Moonta.

## **Applications** open for public space projects

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
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## **President's report**

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## **Looking back**

The idea of a show is believed to have come from a discussion between two or three gentlemen, Mr William Graham, a Mr Lang and Mr F. W. Gurner.

A meeting was held at the Exchange Hotel, Kadina, for the purpose of forming an agricultural society in late August, 1871.

"A good working committee was appointed to arrange for a ploughing match and a cattle and farm produce show, to be held on a piece of ground adjoining Messrs. Parnell and Bowman's paddock, between Wallaroo and Kadina on Wednesday, 13th September," an article from The Wallaroo Times and Mining Journal read.

The first agricultural society committee was formed in late August and early September, and plans progressed for the first event.

"No sooner was the idea mooted than it was taken up with spirit, and so energetically carried out, that this first show of the Yorke's Peninsula Agricultural Society would seem to have come into the world, not in an infantile or embryo stage, but full blown and matured," The Wallaroo Times and Mining Journal wrote in September.

The new show society moved its show closer to the Kadina township to land that it purchased bounded by Julia Terrace, Waring Street and Christie Street, in 1874 but by 1882 it had outgrown the site and changed to the current location.

The exhibition building was completed in 1883 and from 1884 the Kadina Showgrounds became the focal point of the community, with many special events and all manner of sports held there.

By the 1930s, there were five show societies on Yorke Peninsula, so the Kadina Agricultural, Horticultural and Floricultural Society was born.

The annual shows brought the community together and, as new ideas progressed in farming equipment and products, they also became the means to showcase these interests.

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# Healthy eating can protect your heart

Heart Foundation Healthier Hearts on Yorke Peninsula

CARRYING excess weight, particularly around your middle, puts you at a higher risk of a heart attack or stroke.

A new Heart Foundation survey found just one in four Australians know being overweight is a risk factor for heart disease.

About 67 per cent of South Australians are overweight or obese and many are getting more than a third of their daily kilojoules from processed, packaged and takeaway foods at the expense of healthy foods.

Poor diet is a leading cause of

heart disease but there are some simple heart-friendly changes most people can make to their daily diets.

Eating more plant-based foods like vegetables, fruits and wholegrains, and healthy proteins like fish and other seafood, will help keep your heart healthy. This approach is naturally low in unhealthy fats, salt and added sugar.

Eggs and milk, yoghurt and cheese are good options if you are healthy, just choose unflavoured varieties because flavoured milk tends to be high in sugar. But if you have a heart condition, or if you are watching your cholesterol, choose reduced-fat dairy, and eat fewer than seven eggs per week.

Limit unprocessed beef, lamb, pork and veal to 350 grams a week. That's around one to three lean red-meat meals, like a beef stir fry or two lamb cutlets. Processed or deli meats should be strictly limited, as they have been consistently linked to a higher risk of heart disease, cancer and other conditions.

Limit alcohol to no more than 10 standard drinks per week and no more than four standard drinks on any one day. For people at higher risk of heart disease, or if you already have a heart condition, it may be safer to drink even less, or not at all. We know alcohol can affect blood pressure and heart rate, and it has also been linked to diabetes.

Aim for 30 minutes of physical activity every day to help maintain healthy blood pressure, cholesterol and weight, and reduce your risk of heart disease.

## **Bayside Caravan Park fees up**

BAYSIDE Caravan Park, Port Broughton, fees and charges will increase.

Barunga West Council voted unanimously to raise the fees as part of the Fees and Charges Schedule for 2021-22 at its July meeting.

Council decided on a service charge for water and power of \$480 per year for permanents, \$200 per year for semi-permanents (45 days a year), and \$320 per year for semi-permanents (150 days a year).

CEO Maree Wauchope said elected members voted to offer an option to semi-permanents to stay at the site for up to 150 days a year, for no longer than 28 days at a time, at a cost of \$3660 per year. "This is a slight increase for semi-permanent

"This is a slight increase for semi-permanent

leaseholders from \$2846," Ms Wauchope said.

"Previously, payment of the licence fee entitled the occupier to 45 free nights at the park — over and above 45 nights incurred the nightly casual rate on each occasion, set at \$30.

"Licence holders under the current fee schedule were not charged for services and licence fees to date or been subject to CPI increases."

The 150-day option for semi-permanents is consistent with offerings at the Port Broughton Tourist Park, and annuals are charged \$80 a quarter for service charges.

Permanent leaseholders are permitted to reside at the park year-round, and pay an annual fee of \$8538.

## **Blue-light and** digital eyestrain

If you believe the hype, blue light emitted from electronic devices is causing an epidemic of digital eyestrain.

Enter blue-light blocking glasses, which are claimed to alleviate the symptoms of sore, tired eyes.

But do blue-blocking lenses actually reduce evestrain from extended screen time. when compared to standard clear lenses?

In a recent double-masked controlled trial, 120 patients were randomised to either blueblocking or standard clear lenses.

The trial looked at an objective measure of eyestrain called critical flicker-fusion frequency before and after a two-hour computer task, and found there were no differences between the two groups (bluelight blocking and clear lens wearers).

Optometrist Dr Luke Arundel from Optometry Australia says, even for someone with perfect vision, eye muscles will become sore, tired and fatigued with spending long hours in front of a computer or other screen.

"A good habit to adopt to avoid this is the 20/20 rule, where every 20 minutes you should look up and into the distance (20 feet or 6 metres) for 20 seconds, to give your eye muscles a break," Dr Arundel says.

Other recommendations are keeping hydrated, using lubricating eye drops and turning down the brightness of your screen.

# Adams breaks parkrun record

Caitlin Adams, of Wallaroo, broke the global parkrun record recently. Parkrun is a free five-kilometre run/walk held in thousands of locations around the world every Saturday morning.

Adams set the new global women's record of 15 minutes and 38 seconds — previously 15:45 — at the parkrun in Lochiel Park, Campbelltown.

She also holds course records in Lochiel, Torrens in Adelaide and Queenstown, New Zealand.

Adams said she felt fit going to the event after stringing together months of uninterrupted training.

"We decided on Lochiel parkrun as the course seemed relatively quick apart from a gradual uphill climb on the way back from the turnaround point," she said.

"I knew the female Australian and global record was around the 15:40 pace.

"However, it wasn't until I had crossed the finish line that I realised how fast I had actually run ... during the race I did not look at my watch and just ran to feel."

Adams said she was thrilled to have broken the global record.

"Parkrun is widely recognised and it brings together all people including elite runners and recreational runners and walkers, the whole community," she said.

"I was definitely channelling the excitement and inspiration I had felt the whole week from watching our Australian athletics team do so well at the Olympics.

"I have been running consistent 120-130 kilometre weeks recently and specific sessions have been long and aerobic focused."

Adams said parkrun was a great opportunity to see a new area and be involved in a community event.

"During the normal road running or athletics season there isn't as much of an opportunity to do a parkrun as the regular racing and training schedule is quite busy," she said.

"However, recently it was the perfect opportunity to jump into parkrun and use it as a fun way to simulate a race and get the legs rolling, since most races have been postponed or cancelled due to COVID-19 lockdowns."

Adams has her sights set on the upcoming City to Bay and will try to make the national team for the 2022 world cross country championships.

# From Minlaton to the Olympics

Former Minlaton girl Emily Abbot realised her Olympic dream when she competed in the rhythmic gymnastics in Tokyo earlier this month.

Abbot and her teammates Himeka Onoda, Alannah Mathews, Alexandra Aristoteli and Felicity White participated in the group all-round event, finishing 14th.

As the games ended, Abbot had time to speak with me about her gymnastics career to date.

The conversation has been edited for brevity and clarity.

**PA:** Please confirm how you first got involved in the sport of gymnastics and your current discipline?

EA: When I was young I would cartwheel absolutely everywhere, even down main road side-strips, so a family friend suggested I should join them for a trial gymnastics class. I was super excited because I thought I was about to learn how to do flips, so I actually started rhythmic gymnastics thinking I was going to do artistic gymnastics. I had never heard or seen rhythmic before, so when I was handed a hoop apparatus in that first training instead of learning how to do flips I was confused. However, I fell in love with the sport and haven't looked back since.

I was always an individual rhythmic gymnast until I was invited to trial for the Australian Senior Group, based in Brisbane, in October 2018. I have been a group athlete ever since and I have absolutely loved it.

PA: Did you have any role model, mentors or people who played an important role? EA: I am the luckiest 24 year

old in the world to have such supportive parents, Chris and Margy Abbot, who have always believed in me and my dreams. During 2016 I had two left hip surgeries. One was for a shredded and detached ligament and the other was for a rare benign bone tumour called an osteoid osteoma. They flew me to Melbourne 10 times to get the best surgeons and care and despite it looking like I would not be a gymnast again and it taking me one-and-a-half years to get back into full training, their unwavering belief and support kept me strong and the dream alive during my recovery. They supported me in my move to Brisbane and have always been my biggest cheerleaders - I would not be achieving my childhood dreams without them.

Two coaches have played a very important role in my life, one (being) Romana Becker, who was my coach in Adelaide. My (current) coach Gina Peluso has played the most important role in our team representing Australia at the Olympic Games.

My most admired sportsperson is Anna Meares.

**PA:** What accolades have you won across your gymnastics journev?

**EA:** Through being a part of the Australian Senior Group I have had the opportunity to

represent Australia in World Cups in Pesaro, Italy, and Sofia in Bulgaria, which was a big dream of mine.

In 2019 the group also represented Australia at the Napoli Summer Universiade in Italy, an amazing competition where we placed sixth in finals on the world stage, which was very exciting.

**PA:** What was the overriding emotion when you were told you were going to the Olympics?

EA: On the day the announcement was going to be made I found myself crying multiple times because of the realisation the dreams that I had for almost 15 years could come true. I was imagining stepping onto the Olympic floor and because that is all I had ever wanted I would get emotional.

We sort of knew the time that the announcement would be made so I wanted to spend the exact moment of the announcement with people that I really cared about. Because my family live in South Australia and I live in Brisbane for training, I spent this special moment with a family who have the most special place in my heart, the family of a young teenager who I care for who has cerebral palsy. They are like a family to me so I couldn't think of anyone better to spend it with. When I arrived they had balloons and party hats and poppers. I facetimed my family at the time as well and it felt like one big happy celebration, it was perfect.

**PA:** Give me a brief insight into how you thought you per-

formed in Tokyo?

EA: For the past 15 years I have dedicated everything I have to achieving my goal of representing Australia at the Olympic Games for rhythmic gymnastics. My parents have taught me the importance of resilience and hard work and because of this, each training session I give it my 100 per cent not just for myself but for my team. In all aspects of my life I also try to give it my all so I do extra hours in the gym, extra fitness and rehab exercises and I regularly go to sports psychology, physiotherapy, sports massage and doctor appointments as well as sports dietician appointments so I am as healthy as possible.

So in the lead up to the games I feel I gave it my all.

Although I had a stress reaction in my foot at the games, my main aim was to enjoy each moment and to do everything I could to make my team and country proud. I would not change the five minutes I had on the Olympic mat for anything - I felt in the zone, I gave it my all, I went for the hard catches but most importantly I had an absolute ball, the best time of my life. I have no regrets, it was everything I had ever wanted, it was magical.

**PA:** What are your ambitions moving forward?

EA: I feel I am not quite done yet, and being at the Tokyo Olympics made this ambition to continue even stronger. I have my heart set on going to the Paris 2024 Olympic Games. While I am training I will continue my psychology studies part-time, while also working as a disability support worker in my spare time.

**PA:** *Tell me about your time at Minlaton.* 

EA: Minlaton is such a special place to me. I had the best childhood. I spent weekends with my father at the beach, we would take our little bongo van to various beaches on Yorke Peninsula and I loved looking for crabs, playing in the sand and watching Dad surf, windsurf and sail. I also have special memories of going fishing with my grandfather at Port Turton with takeaway fish and chips with chicken salt and vinegar and a tube of condensed milk for a treat. I couldn't have asked for a better childhood.

When I lived in Minlaton I went to Maitland Lutheran School. I absolutely loved it there, it was such a beautiful school and I have special memories of our end-of-year performances at the Maitland hall.

My parents at the time owned the IGA in Minlaton so us three kids would take whatever we wanted off the shelves. It was a bit of a shock to the system when we moved to Adelaide when I was 7 and (we'd) do our usual putting the lolly packets in our pockets and having alarms go off when we would walk out of a supermarket.

In Adelaide my parents own a fruit and vegetable wholesaling company called AMJ Produce. I honestly wouldn't be where I am today if I had not learnt my biggest values from seeing my parents operate their business. From 9 (yes, I could drive a forklift at age 9) in the holidays I would go to work with Dad at 12.30am. I would help him to take the orders off the answering machine before going to the produce markets. After the produce markets, I would start packing orders for cafes and restaurants before going out on the road with Dad to deliver to the customers. These days would often end at 5pm and in my early teens I would go from work with Dad straight to gymnastics training.

I grew up watching my dad work 120-hour weeks for us kids. My parents built a broke business into a thriving business through sheer hard work and resilience. I could not have achieved my dream of going to the Olympic Games without them.



Luke and Trent McCauley had good games and Sam Taylor dug deep to influence his Roosters.





## **Is Britney free?**

SO much has happened in the world of Britney Spears this year.

New York Times documentary Framing Britney highlighted just how messed up our treatment of young female celebrities has been in the past.

It also looked at the conservatorship which has been in place since 2008.

A conservatorship is when a judge appoints a responsible person or organisation — in this case, Britney's dad Jamie — to care for an adult who can't care for themselves or their own finances.

For years a burgeoning online movement #FreeBritney has been campaigning for Britney, analysing her every social media post in a bid to find out what exactly is happening to her.

Many disregarded the hashtag and the people behind it as super fans but, late last year, the mood started to change.

Through her court appointed lawyer, Britney filed to open up parts of the conservatorship last year.

In that court appearance, she said she wanted to have another baby with her boyfriend but the conservatorship would not allow it.

"Instead of trying to investigate my behaviour or my capacity, I want my dad investigated," she said. "This conservatorship is literally allowing my dad

High-profile members of the court-appointed management team soon started to resign after Britney's statement.

For the first time, she was even able to hire her own lawyer.


All this was huge, but the biggest news came last week when her father lodged paperwork in the Los Angeles Superior Court announcing his decision to step down from his role.

"There are, in fact, no actual grounds for suspending or removing Mr Spears as the Conservator of the Estate under Probate Code section 2650," the document states.

"And it is highly debatable whether a change in conservator at this time would be in Ms Spears' best interests.

"Nevertheless, even as Mr Spears is the unremitting target of unjustified attacks, he does not believe that a public battle with his daughter over his continuing service as her conservator would be in her best interests."

This is the most positive step towards Britney's actual freedom yet, but there's still a long way to go until she can truly make her own choices.







couple of times last week and found jetty anglers trying for yellowfin whiting on Tuesday night and small fishers in tinnies chasing bloodworms at Shag Island on Wednesday and Friday. Big boat fishing produced squid, whiting and snook.

Wallaroo: What a cracking weekend weatherwise! Whiting are at the Ballast grounds and squid around Myponie Point. Crews also fished Bird Reef for tommy ruff (Australian herring), salmon and squid. The jetty was quiet.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Some good mates of mine finally managed to launch a boat late Wednesday and did well with King George whiting from Coopers and the Bamboos. Afternoon fishing brought the results with fresh cockle as bait. Try the jetties again for

school sharks and snook on the way back.

Stenhouse Bay/Marion Bay: Mullet can be caught from the shore at Gym Beach, the Dust Bowl and Richards Beach. The jetty at Stenhouse Bay has squid on the clear days, tommies and snook at night. Boat crews fishing well offshore found sweep, flathead, red nannygai and snook.

Edithburgh: Tommies came from the jetty on Saturday evening in the almost balmy weather along the coast. Squid came from Port Giles and whiting from Tapley Shoals and the island marker. Ardrossan: Long Spit is worth a try for whiting, red mullet and even an early season blue crab. Try the jetty for mullet and squid at night.
