rug boss caught on '

AN international drug trafficker was caught on Yorke Peninsula as part of Task Force Ironside on Sunday, August 21.

South Australia Police Serious and Organised Crime Branch arrested the man, a 47-year-old formerly of New South Wales, on a first instance warrant.

He has been charged with 15 counts of trafficking a large commercial quantity of a controlled drug, nine counts of trafficking a commercial quantity of a controlled drug, five counts of trafficking a controlled drug,

and 17 counts of money laundering.

Police will allege the man is the head of a national and international organised crime syndicate, with the controlled drugs trafficked valued in the millions of dollars.

"His syndicate was a heavy user of the AN0M encrypted communications platform and it was used to facilitate his illegitimate business," Detective Chief Inspector Darren Fielke said.

"This is a significant arrest in relation to tackling the ongoing impact of organised crime."

The man is believed to have fled Australia to avoid apprehension in relation to the seizure of 50 kilograms of methamphetamine located in a truck with horse feed at Port Wakefield in April 2021.

"Since that time, using all the powers and contacts we have, we've been able to track him back to Australia and ultimately find him on Yorke Peninsula," Det Chief Inspt Fielke said.

"What the draw for him to come back home is, we're not exactly sure yet.

"He is not a minnow in many

respects, in terms of the level of organised crime he is involved in.

"He is a high-level organised crime player and it's a really significant arrest for organised crime in South Australia and for that matter, Australia.

"He is also wanted by the FBI on a Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organisations indictment emanating from his use of the AN0M encrypted

"We are working with our partner agencies in respect to this issue."

Mr Fielke said the arrest should

send a message to all people who choose a path of becoming involved in any aspect of organised crime.

"SAPOL and law enforcement partners both in Australia and overseas will leave no stone unturned to locate and bring to justice those involved in organised crime and who heap misery on the community through the trafficking of drugs," he said.

The man appeared in the Adelaide Magistrates Court yesterday Monday (August 22), and has been remanded in custody.



Road to improvement

A 15 YEAR fight by North Coast Road. Point Turton, residents has finally resulted in good news.

More than \$1 million in government funding is headed for Yorke Peninsula Council's busiest unsealed road.

The works will be done in three stages the first the sealing of almost two kilometres of the 11km road.

Further stages will be completed subject to grant funding and council endorsements, but is a very important start.

Residents have agitated for speed reductions and sealing for many years, talking to local, state and federal levels of government to push for action.

The road was re-sheeted in May 2016 in a bid to improve the road surface; however, just two years later some residents felt the \$1.1m improvements actually made it

As a key road in accessing some of the region's best tourist spots, it is important it is accessible for visitors.

But more than that, it's heartening for residents who hopefully will no longer have to contend with constant dust.

And it is constant, with an average of 1000 cars travelling along the road each day during peak times.

YPC has been active in applying for grant funding in recent years, a process which takes a lot of time.

We could have been reporting this news last year had YPC not been overlooked for same Special Local Roads Funding despite being deemed a high priority.

While it took longer than it should have, it's happening now and that's the main

Elsewhere on the peninsula, it's promising to see works progressing on the Spencer Highway upgrade.

To have the central corridor of the peninsula in its best condition can only be a good thing.

However, these works can't just be one-off funding boosts. More must be done to ensure these highways are regularly maintained so the don't deteriorate like previous works.

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Reason to rejoice for the road ahead

NORTH Coast Road, Point Turton, will finally be upgraded after years of advocacy from Yorke Peninsula Council and local residents.

YPC has received \$1,141,000 through Special Local Roads Program's Supplementary Local Road Funding for stage one of the upgrade.

The works will be completed in three stages, subject to future grant funding and council endorsement.

Stage one will include sealing the first 1.82 kilometres of North Coast Road at a cost of \$1,711,500; council is contributing \$570,000.

Local Mark Hardy said residents

had lobbied for action on the road for 15 years.

"To be quite honest, I didn't think I'd ever see it in my lifetime," he said.

"We've been (living) here for 16 years and there has always been huge traffic and dust problems along this road and so with this, I think 95 per cent of residents along here are ecstatic."

Mr Hardy said the region had seen a significant boost in tourists during the past 12 months, only making the problem worse.

"More and more people are coming to the area, partly due to Flaherty's Beach being named as one of the five best beaches in the country, and with all the caravans and the cars comes safety issues," he said.

"Yorke Peninsula Council has bent over backwards in the past year for this and we're incredibly grateful for their efforts despite numerous hurdles."

YPC CEO Andrew Cameron said North Coast Road was both a popular tourist route and major link between destinations.

"Importantly, the road also passes about 150 residential properties divided into four built-up areas," he said.

"Due to increasing road use and the

fact the road is unsealed, tourists and residents along the route have complained about the road's deteriorating condition for many years."

North Coast Road is council's most used unsealed road, with about 500 vehicles travelling the stretch per day and an average of 1000 a day during peak times.

Mr Cameron said council had fought to have North Coast Road upgraded for years.


"Council is pleased the state government has finally recognised the upgrade of North Coast Road as a high priority under the Special Local Roads Program," he said.

"This project will enhance road safety, improve the road standard, reduce the dust nuisance and impact on residents, improve access to a popular tourist destination, and improve the driving experience for locals and visitors.

"Council welcomes the investment from the state government and looks forward to working with them on further stages of the project."

Stage two is expected to include a similar seal length as stage one while stage three will create a better surface for the remainder of the road.






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Kiosk open for business... soon

THE clifftop kiosk site at Balgowan will be reinstated as a communityrun kiosk, takeaway and general store.

Yorke Peninsula Council elected members voted in favour of the locally led cooperative plan rather than Adelaide-based architect Damien Chwalisz's idea to convert it to short-stay accommodation.

Mr Chwalisz was initially the sole applicant for the property lease, but community concern forced council to open the Expressions of Interest period again.

The successful plan includes the sale of takeaway food, coffee, ice-cream, drinks and day-to-day items such as bread and milk.

Group leader Benjamin Sporton said the whole community was behind them and they were pleased to have been given the green light.

"We're excited to get going and get the community actively working with us so we can get it going as soon as possible."

"This is a real community asset and it's a real shame it hasn't been operating for the past few years," he said.

"Community members are really keen to make it a place where we can

come together and have some coffee, takeaway food and enjoy the fantastic views Balgowan has to offer."

Mr Sporton said there was now a lot of work to do to get the kiosk up and running.

He said it would be open by the October school holidays in a best-case scenario, but the end of the year otherwise.

"We need to go ahead and legally form the cooperative and, given the building hasn't been in use for a couple of years now, it needs a bit of a refresh so we want to do some renovations to get the building back up to scratch," Mr Sporton said.

"We'll hopefully be able to do that while we're going through the legal processes of getting the business formally established so it'll take a bit of time but we're going to work hard to try and make it happen as soon as we can."

YPC's elected members voted unanimously in favour of the plan.

"I believe it's the best option as far as the community focus, it's one which will be inclusive and I think it will have benefits for people who reside at Balgowan and visitors to the community as well," Deputy Mayor Tania Stock said.

Councillor Roger Johns said the increased population in the area should be beneficial to the operation.

"I think we're extremely fortunate the community cooperative group has had the strength to lead this and get an outcome for the kiosk which everyone has been wanting for a long time," he said.

The group will need to confirm tit has formed a legal entity before entering the lease agreement with council.

REPORT BY

ROADWORKS along the Spencer Highway between Maitland and Urania should be completed by the new year, bringing to an end the delays faced by motorists using the peninsula's middle route.

Despite difficult weather, work has been tracking smoothly with 14 kilometres of a total 18km rehabilitated and 12km sealed.

Motorists using the road have become accustomed to difficult conditions, decreased speed limits and regular stops, often waiting up to 15 minutes as traffic is restricted to one-way at a time.

A Department for Infrastructure

and Transport spokesperson said only weather could derail the current timeline.

'Works including resurfacing and shoulder widening are currently being undertaken to improve safety for all road users on an 18km stretch of the Spencer Highway, from Maitland to Urania," the spokesperson said.

"These works are being jointly funded by the Australian and South Australian Governments on an 80/20 basis as part of the \$315 million Road Safety Package.

'Speed and lane restrictions will be maintained during work times, with one lane of traffic maintained.

"(We encourage people to) plan ahead, allow extra time and take care while travelling through the area.

"Please follow onsite temporary signals and slow down for everyone's safety."

The works were announced in May last year, adding to the already announced funding for Upper Yorke Road, between Arthurton and Maitland.

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said the throughfare had once been the most notoriously bad stretch of road across the electorate.

"I am ecstatic the final section between Maitland and Urania is finally being done," he said.

"After so many years waiting, it will soon be a pleasure to drive down the entire centre of our leg, for locals and visitors.

"We have had a tremendously productive period of improving road infrastructure and there is plenty more to do - I am as committed as ever to continuing to lobby for road infrastructure improvements."

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
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Fatal crash at Boors Plain

Springing into a wet season

WEATHER experts are predicting a wetter than average spring.

The Bureau of Meteorology recently moved from La Niña Watch to La Niña Alert with the likelihood of La Niña returning this spring increasing to around three times the normal risk.

Weatherzone director of meteorology Duncan Tippins said an increase of the El Niño-Southern Oscillation Outlook from the Watch to Alert level was a result of ocean and atmosphere indicators for ENSO moving closer to La Niña conditions.

"In particular, the ocean temperatures in the central Pacific Ocean have cooled in the past six weeks," Mr Tippins said.

"In addition, four of the seven climate models monitored by BOM are indicating La Niña may return in spring."

Mr Tippins said the rainfall over Yorke Peninsula was influenced by the conditions in both the Indian Ocean (as monitored by the Indian Ocean Dipole) as well as the Pacific Ocean (as monitored by ENSO).

"The latest seasonal climate outlook from BOM is indicating a slightly higher than normal chance of exceeding the median rainfall for YP across spring (September

July rainfall below normal

YORKE Peninsula experienced either below or very much below normal rainfall during July.

"This followed a near normal start to the growing season rainfall (April to June)," Weatherzone director of meteorology Duncan Tippins said.

"August has seen a return to near normal and above normal rainfall for YP.

"So far in August, Kadina has received 35.2mm (112 per cent of normal), Maitland 51.2mm (84 per cent), Stenhouse Bay 113.2mm (182 per cent), Warooka 50.2mm (86 per cent). "August has seen a number of fronts move across South Australia, bringing regular rainfall to the agricultural parts of the

"These fronts have often been associated with a cloud band extending from the Indian Ocean, which is a feature more common during negative phases of the IOD."

November)," he said.

"IOD events usually break down around the end of spring as the monsoon season arrives over northern Australia.

"ENSO events usually persist until autumn but have the greatest influence on summer rainfall over eastern Australia.

"As a consequence, it is difficult to predict, at this stage, the chances of above or below median rainfall for YP during summer.

Mr Tippins said the climate patterns did have an influence of temperatures as well.

"Usually, an increased chance in cloudiness and precipitation is associated with below average chances of exceeding daytime maximum temperatures and above aver-

age chances of exceeding night time minimum temperatures," he said.

"BOM's seasonal climate outlook for temperatures across spring (September to November) is consistent with this pattern."

A front moved across South Australia yesterday (Monday) bringing rainfalls of 4-12mm across YP.

Today (Tuesday) to Thursday (August 23-25) will see light showery conditions continue, although rainfall totals are only likely to be up to 1-2mm each day.

Another front is likely to move across SA early next week, although at this stage rainfall totals are expected to be less than 5mm.

Camping fees rise across peninsula

YORKE Peninsula Council has doubled its bush camping fees for the 2022-23 financial year, going from a \$10 daily fee to \$20.

Weekly, monthly and annual fees have also doubled, with YP ratepayers still receiving a 50 per cent discount on all forms of permits.

Elected members were given the option to raise the fees to \$12.50, \$15 or \$20, moving the region closer to the state average of \$22 a night for similar style camping.

Based on 2021-22 figures, a base \$20 flat fee is expected to raise between \$252,000 and \$336,000 in additional revenue for council.

Local bush camping rose in popularity on the back of the Covid-19 pandemic, jumping to 34,867 permits booked across the 2021-22 financial year, an increase on 17,042 across 2019-20.

Deputy Mayor Tania Stock said it wasn't an unreasonable rise.

"Over the past few years, we've been adding improvements to our bush camping and for us to keep improving we're going to need to improve our income," she said.

"Although it seems like a steep increase, really when you look at what other people are paying in other regions, it's a reasonable price and I think we have a premium location as well."

Councillor Leanne O'Brien added her support for the \$20 fee and said

council undervalued itself.

"We've seen an influx of tourists during the past couple of years and still have not been making a profit," she said.

"To do that we need to put the money back into making bush (camping) sites better, protecting our coastal environment and backing our rangers who are overworked and understaffed.

"At the moment we're treading water in the bush camping area.

"We need to make money to spend money to bring in the clientelle we are looking for."

Cr Naomi Bittner said she had supported the \$15 fee option.

"Even though the average around the state is \$22 and we need to get up to speed fairly quickly, doubling the rate in one foul swoop will be a significant hit," she said.


"There is a big online community when it comes to camping and I fear the backlash of a doubling is potentially going to put tourists off."

"Now that we're moving to a cashless, all done online system, we don't necessarily need to stick to the round figure increments, we can be more nuanced going forward."

Cr Adam Meyer said he would've supported an increase to \$15 this year followed by \$20 the year after.

"I baulk at the idea of a 100 per cent increase, I'm uncomfortable with that,"

"I believe an increase this year followed by another next year would be a more comfortable option."





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Moonta Town Hall set for revitalisation

MOONTA Town Hall is set to undergo a significant redevelopment.

Copper Coast Council has appointed architect Richard Woods, of Habitable Places, as the successful tenderer for the hall's master plan.

The redevelopment is aimed to revitalise the iconic building through upgrades to its cinema, art gallery and foyer areas, as well as a new commercial lift, expanded front entrance, stage extension, storage and information technology facilities.

Mr Woods said he was excited to get an opportunity to work on the hall.

"We identified the downstairs area of the hall has good usage, but there's 300 square metres of unutilised space upstairs and lots of inaccessibility around the building," Mr Woods said.

"Improving the connectivity of the building will be key, as user groups made it clear there's issues with steps and ramps situated in inconvenient areas.

"We need to provide a practical and economical solution whilst maintaining the building's heritage."

Mr Woods said there were multiple community groups who had expressed interest in utilising a revitalised hall.

"The (Moonta Area) school has showed great interest in using the hall's stage for performing arts," he

"There's also potential for new building works and an entrance from the Henry Street side of the building to provide an improved quality of space in the hall.

"Council could also consider interpretive design to help tell the story of the hall.

"It would be great to see this building become a community hub rather than stay a traditional town

Council CEO Russell Peate said a master plan would build on the \$900,000 of work completed several years ago, which included a new roof, salt damp removal and upgraded flooring.

"Council has spoken to all 19 hall user groups and received good feedback about how it could be improved," Mr Peate said.

"Some areas of the hall are still not utilised to level they could be for the community," Mr Peate said.

"We're aiming for the hall to become a thriving and vibrant community hub with linkage to Queen Square and businesses along Moonta's main streets."

Mr Peate said he expected the Moonta Town Hall master plan to be considered by a newly elected council at the December or January monthly meetings.

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Bourke takes on historic role

MEMBER of the South Australian Legislative Council Emily Bourke, formerly of Maitland, has been appointed to the newly established role of Assistant Minister for Autism.

Ms Bourke is the first member of any government in the country to be given the sole responsibility of ensuring the autism community is represented.

Ms Bourke, who is also the Assistant Minister to Premier Peter Malinauskas, will be responsible for implementing the state government's autism policies.

She said the role will entail a large amount of education.

"Knowledge brings change, that's what I keep saying because it's incredibly true," she said.

"We want to give people the chance to understand what autism is, which is why we're pushing it with our public primary schools, because it's the perfect place for people to learn.

"We're keen to work across as many government departments as we can and implement a whole of government reform"

Autism is a neurological difference in the way in which individuals experience and respond to the world around them, with over 200,000 Australians identifying as autistic.

Ms Bourke will work closely with human services minister Nat Cook and education minister Blair Boyer to identify and implement any necessary reform.

"There is a huge group (of people) involved; one in four families has an autistic family member, it's the biggest group on the NDIS and it's a growing prevalence," Ms Bourke said.

"So many people miss out on opportunities because the adequate support isn't there, particularly when you look at schools.

"Autistic kids are twice as likely to drop out in year 10 than the average population, that's not right and if we're not having people finish school then it needs to be improved."

Ms Bourke has established the Autism Education Advisory Group, comprising of autistic people, parents with lived experience, experts, community stakeholders, and unions, to ensure these policies are supported by extensive and meaningful consultation.

The government will now seek to work with service providers, including Autism SA, to offer early intervention services in children's centres, develop a State Autism Strategy and require all government agencies to sign up to an Autism Friendly Charter.

The government has also promised to develop facilities in schools by investing \$28.8 million towards the appointment of autism inclusion teachers in every public primary school, increasing the number of autism-qualified staff in preschools and investing \$50 million to fund 100 additional speech pathologists, occupational therapists, psychologists and counsellors for access in public schools.

Reviewing the new code

A TEAM of industry experts will review South Australia's Planning and Design Code, two years since it was established.

The code, part of the state's planning reform, replaced councils' individual development plans with one universal set of rules, causing concerns for many local government bod-

The review will include The Planning, Development and Infrastructure Act 2016, and The Planning and Design Code (and related instruments) as it relates to infill policy, trees, character, heritage and car park-

It will also assess the e-planning system with a view to ensuring it is delivering an efficient and userfriendly process and platform.

The PlanSA website will also be reviewed to ensure its usability and access to information by the community.

The code has been in effect at Copper Coast Council for a year.

Director development services Muller Mentz said the introduction of the new system coincided with the state and federal government's Covid-19 building incentives.

"They resulted in a huge spike in development applications which had to be dealt with under a new, very much unknown, system," Mr Mentz said.

"The system had significant teething problems and while many of these problems have been sorted out there still remain a lot of impractical issues.

"The system is not as user-friendly as purported to be."

Mr Mentz said the one good thing about the system was the planning portal, where all development applications were managed.

"There is consensus among many practitioners the best system would have been the previous system, combined with the planning portal," he

"We employed one additional town planner and also engaged the services of a planning consultancy on a two day per week basis.

"Even without the significant increase in development applications, due to the Covid incentives, we would not have been able to meet statutory timeframes under the new act with the resources we had before.

"We also have to pay a fee every year, to the state government, for the right to use the planning portal."

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said he welcomed the review and would be seeking to make submissions to benefit the community.

"The change in design code was supposed to simplify the process for applicants and councils; unfortunately, that hasn't necessarily been the case in all instances and we now have an opportunity to provide suggestions to improve the system," Mr Ellis said.

"I'll be doing a stocktake of the

queries that have come through our office to survey if there are opportunities to provide constructive feedback.

"If there are any other suggestions from those in our community, I would encourage you to make a submission."

The expert panel will provide recommendations to be considered by the government in 2023.

Using the plan two years on

Barunga West and Yorke Peninsula Councils have been using the new plan for two years having made the switch to the system July 2020.

YPC director development services Roger Brooks said YPC was part of the phase two rollout.

"Council has worked through many issues, as they arose, and the new system hasn't been the cause of an increased workload, nor has there been the need for additional staff," Mr Brooks said.

BWC CEO Maree Wauchope said the code had enabled more consistency in development assessments and decisions across Yorke Peninsula.

"It also provides transparency for our ratepayers who can track development applications and their assessments via the portal," Ms Wauchope

"Like all new systems it has taken a bit to get used to, but the more we have worked with the new code the easier it has become to apply to development in our district.

"The code is also subject to ongoing reviews and amendments and the department has been open to constructive feedback, so I see it improving with time.

'With the new code and portal, we've been able to engage contractors who are very experienced planners to help us process applications online while only having to undertake physical site inspections on an as-needs

Planning in state government's hands

COPPER Coast Council was originally interested in establishing a Joint Planning Board with Yorke Peninsula and Barunga West Councils in 2017 but abandoned their bid in 2021.

"The main driving force behind this was to prepare our own regional plan," CCC director development services Muller Mentz said.

"In accordance with the Development and Infrastructure Act 2016 only the Minister or a JPB can prepare a regional plan.

"In our draft Joint Planning Agreement with the Minister we wanted a provision in the plan that amendments to the regional plan (once finalised) can only be made subject to the written consent of both the Minister and the JPB.

"This was refused which opened the door for the Minister to amend the plan without the consent of

"The three councils then opted out as we could not see why we (the councils) should invest in resources to prepare the plan which can then be amended by another party without our consent.

"The regional plan will now be prepared by the state government."

"Anyone who wishes to help such children can drop in filled backpacks or items to put in backpacks and we will ensure these items are delivered to Backpacks 4 SA Kids.

"Items needed include essential things such as clothing, pyjamas, underwear, toiletries, as well as games, puzzles, and stationery.

"We have already received items at the office and advise there is no end date for collection the initiative will be ongoing with items and backpacks able to be dropped any time Monday to Friday, 9am to 5pm."

Local Backpacks 4 SA Kids ambassador, Justine Koch of Kulpara, is pleased the Narungga electorate office has come on board as a drop off point.

She said, since her involvement with the charity, she has been kept busy delivering donations to the charity's Adelaide warehouse.

"Being a foster carer, I understand the value of children having their own backpack of personal items when entering care, and since being involved in promoting the charity I have seen the backpacks initiative gain momentum across Yorke Peninsula," she said.

"Having a convenient, central drop off point in Graves Street in Kadina will be invaluable and I thank Fraser for his commitment to helping this worthy cause."

Boost for nature tourism

THE state government is delivering on its election commitment by establishing a \$2 million nature-based tourism fund.

South Australian Tourism Commission's Experience Nature Tourism Fund is expected to boost South Australia's visitor economy and spur investment in nature-based tourism experiences.

Grants from \$10,000 to \$50,000 will be available for new and improved naturebased tourism products and experiences in or near a national park, reserve, wilderness protection area or marine park.

"This \$2m boost for nature-based tourism is all about leveraging our state's strengths to attract more visitors from interstate and overseas, while supporting conservation efforts and communities to keep our landscapes beautiful and pristine," Minister for Tourism Zoe Bettison said.

"We also know visitors seek out South Australia for its unique wildlife, spectacular coastlines, vast outback, rolling green hills and cultural heritage, so we're building on our assets to recover domestic and international tourism and help return our state's \$8.1 billion visitor economy."

Applications to the fund are limited to private sector businesses, not-for-profit organisations, and community associations.

Applicants will need to demonstrate their project will deliver to the visitor economy and must also have support from key stakeholders including landowners before making an application.

Grants are available via two funding streams: Stream 1 - Quick Activation Projects with grants available from \$10,000 to \$20,000; and Stream 2 -Innovative Development Projects with grants ranging from \$20,001 to \$50,000.

The funding program runs over four financial years, with up to \$500,000 available in each year.

Reverend Sarah Wiles' Vietnam connection

NEW Copper Coast Anglican Church priest Reverend Sarah Wiles officiated at her first war memorial ceremony for Vietnam Veterans' Day in Moonta last Thursday, August 18.

Rev. Wiles arrived on the Copper Coast in June and is spending alternating weeks leading services across Kadina, Wallaroo and Moonta and working at the office of the Diocese of Willochra in Gladstone.

This service had a special meaning for Rev. Wiles, as her father, John "Jack" Shepherd left to serve in the armed services in Vietnam when she was just 5 months old.

"He served in what they called the university regiment, so when he finished his medical degree he essentially went straight to Vietnam," she said.

"He was told he was going when I had just been born, left when I was 5 months old and then he returned when I was over a year old.

"So, a lot of my early childhood was spent living at the Woodside (army) barracks."

Rev. Wiles said, as she grew older, her connection with the armed forces became deeper and clearer.

Her son is currently serving and she wore the stoll her grandfather, a padre during World War II, wore when leading dawn services in Adelaide.

She said she was honoured to lead the service as the officiating chaplain for the Vietnam Veterans Association of Australia Copper Coast sub-branch.

"It really means something (to me), because when people go to war and offer themselves in service, it doesn't end when they come home, it continues to impact their whole life and their family behind them," she said.

"I guess I grew up in a family very conscious of the service and sacrifice made and also the value of the service they gave to each other.

"In many ways there's a truth and reality to the lives which they (veterans) live that other people can't really fathom.

"I think it's really important for other people to be conscious they (the veterans) have seen the truth of the world and they can share that with each other."

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Running the leg for ultra-fast time

ADELAIDE Hills man Jim Delderfield is aiming to complete the 500 kilometre Walk the Yorke journey in the fastest known time, just four days.

Aiming to raise money for the Black Dog Institute, Mr Delderfield will begin his journey this Thursday, August 25.

Mr Delderfield said he had a long association with endurance events and he was always looking to discover how far he could push his limits.

"I started off doing standard, shorter distance runs of 10-12km, I did the City to Bay a few years in a row which led to me looking for bigger and better challenges," he said.

"I got into obstacle course racing in 2015 and then fell in love with that

"A few years later I attempted a 24-hour obstacle course race and from there it has progressed and I'm constantly looking for bigger and better challenges."

Mr Delderfield also has a long-stand-

ing connection to Yorke Peninsula.

"My grandparents lived on Yorke Peninsula for 30 years, unfortunately they've both passed away now but it's a special place," he said.

"I've spent a lot of time going over there most years for different events such as Christmases, birthdays and things like that.

"Just over 12 months ago, I proposed to my now-fiancée over at Sturt Bay.

"That's where my grandparents lived and it happens to be the halfway point of the Walk the Yorke trail which is pretty cool too."

Mr Delderfield isn't trying to just beat the record, he's trying to smash it.

After doing some research online, he discovered the fastest-known completion time for the trail was eight days and 11 hours.

He plans to spend 20 hours running each day to complete the feat.

"I guess the whole purpose of it is to challenge myself physically but also mentally as well, that's kind of why I thought it would be fitting to raise money for mental health awareness," he said.

"I think it's very achievable from the calculations which I've done, it's just about whether or not the body holds out for that long and with that number of kilometres I want to get done each day.

"(There are) a lot of beach sections, it will be fairly flat which is unusual for my running style because I normally run in the hills around Adelaide so changing the terrain to something sandier and flatter could be quite challenging."

Calling all young people, have your say in Youth Survey

MISSION Australia wants young people, aged 15-19, to have their say in Youth Survey 2022.

Youth Survey is the largest of its kind and last year more than 2255 young people in South Australia shared their personal concerns, aspirations, and views on broader issues.

In 2021, young people said the most important issues in Australia were the Covid-19 pandemic, the environment and equity and discrimination.

Alarmingly, more than one in 20 young South Australians had experienced homelessness for the first time during the pandemic.

Mission Australia CEO Sharon Callister said life in a post-Covid world was rapidly changing and highlighted the importance of listening to what young people were saying.

"For more than 20 years, Youth Survey has provided a critical platform for young people to communicate what is going on in their world," she said.

'We know from last year's results they were heavily impacted by the pandemic and were severely affected in a range of ways including mental health, education and employment."

Youth Survey results are used by governments,

William Ivan Oates — gone to the big supermarket in the sky

Obituary March 17, 1931 — July 3, 2022

A TRUE Cousin Jack, William Ivan Oates loved everything about Moonta.

Better known in the local community as Ivan, he was born at Moonta Mines to Frank and Norma Oates and was a brother to Lorraine.

Ivan grew up in Moonta Mines, on Smith Street, and loved working on his grandfather Woodward's farm, learning life-long lessons, sewing wheat bags and feeding horses.

He enjoyed school at Moonta Mines, played in the fife band and wanted to be a woodwork teacher when he grew up.

But this was not to be, as his dad broke his leg and Ivan had to help in their small grocery business as a delivery boy from the age of 14.

Ivan first delivered groceries by bike, then horse and cart and loved the purchase of his first Austin A40 Ute, which made deliveries much easier.

Frank Oates and Tom Croxton had opened the first Four Square store in George Street, Moonta In 1945.

It was an over-the-counter business and customers had an account they usually paid at the end of the month.

Then Lloyd and Beth James gave Frank and Ivan their grocery business, so they could focus on their own newsagency. The only stipulation was they had to take on the Jameses' staff and paid £12 a week rent.

Ivan met wife Winsome in 1954 at the Moonta Deb Ball, after the Andrews family moved from Angle Vale to Woodlands, south of Moonta.

They married on January 22, 1955, and had three children Louise, Denby

In 1964 Frank and Ivan acquired the Hollands and Croxton store, still with over-the-counter sales.

In 1966, when his father passed away, Ivan built his first purpose-built shop, with self-serve shopping trolleys.

He was determined Moonta people would not travel elsewhere to shop, hence his vision to build and expand his grocery business.

Moonta Foodland came to town in 1972 and Ivan was happier than ever — a purpose-built supermarket with

As business grew, so did Ivan's ideas, deals with the bank and the risk of building a new supermarket at Wallaroo in 1984.

He could see there was a need for a bigger grocery shop in Wallaroo and, as Winsome would say, "he always did what he wanted to do." So, he built it.

During this time, Ivan became a Foodland board member, and he and Winsome had many trips overseas to look at supermarkets and to holiday with other Foodland store owners.

Ivan also found time to contribute to the Copper Coast community.

He was a life member of Moonta Traders Association, Moonta Lions Club and Moonta Golf Club.

Ivan also served on the Moonta and Copper Triangle councils for 30 years — he was mayor for seven years and deputy mayor for a few years as well.

Ivan was awarded citizen of the year for service to the community — a great honour and one of which he was very proud!

Ivan was a great supporter of the Kernewek Lowender leading the parade in Moonta for many years with his Foodland staff and family.

He and Winsome gave generously and annually to Moonta Area School prize winners and sponsored and donated to various community and sporting clubs in Moonta.

Ivan always had a dream Moonta would become a popular tourist town with its beautiful beaches and clean

He was so proud of the many developments in tourism, the Moonta National Trust, Patrick's View and Cove, The Dunes and the expansion of Moonta Bay and Port Hughes.

Moonta was progressing as he had always hoped, and he was so proud.

Ivan always took a keen interest in the town's families, people, places, and

As the years grew so did his family - he enjoyed the company of his sons-in-law Kevin and Graeme and daughter-in-law Meg.

He displayed unconditional love for his 11 grandchildren and 18 greatgrandchildren.

Ivan retired at 67 and, although he had lived near the ocean all his life, he had rarely been fishing but took up the hobby with great passion.

He also enjoyed horse racing, cooking, talking to friends, neighbours and family about the history of Moonta, fishing, farming, finance, football and of course Foodland.

Ivan was never happier than when he was going to the shop, digging a hole in the heat, helping at a town working bee or doing odd jobs for the family.

He was proud of his life's work, loved his family and friends, and was a good man of strong character, a respected and successful businessman and a true Moonta stalwart.

Moonta was his home, a place of hard work, of family, community, connection and comfort.

It is his final resting place.



AMaGA national director Katie Russell said projects receiving funding would enrich communities and deepen understanding of local collections.


Whether it be through activations, display upgrades, or visitor safety improvements, these projects show originality and flair," Ms Russell said.







Jarrad Redden retires

Southern Yorke Peninsula sporting talent Jarrad Redden has called curtains on his state league football career.

"From a coaching perspective, definitely Michael Gooden and now, over the past couple of years, Jade Sheedy have been strong mentors.

"I was at Alberton and with the Power for seven years on an AFL list as well.

"Before football my state basketball coach Paul Salter was a guy who stayed in touch and was a strong influence on me.

"My family, starting with Mum

supporters, along with younger brother Daniel and sisters Lauren and Alycia.

"My wife Hannah and our son Judah (who will be 2 in December) also deserve a special mention as well."

Redden is employed by club sponsor Wise Employment, working with people with medical conditions to find sustainable employment.

Before committing to footy, Redden played basketball at state representative level for SA Country and went to the nationals at under 18s level.

"Paul Lindsay called from the Eagles, and I made the call to stop training with the state under 20 basketball team and went out to Woodville," Redden said.

"I always wondered where basketball could have gone, but happy I've had a substantial football journey."

Redden's first SANFL league game was against North Adelaide at Prospect in 2008 and the pinnacle being the 2021 grand final performance against Glenelg, where he played a pivotal role in ruck and was high amongst the best players.

"What a great contributor Jarrad has been to the football club over a long period of time," coach Jade Sheedy said.


"It has been a privilege to coach Reddo and see up close how good he is at his craft. He has played a major role in the club's recent successes."

Cougars' chances at goal went begging before Jon Dutschke nailed a settling goal, an effort matched by Charlie Hay from outside 50 later in the quarter.









dispute resolution and renting with pets are key issues being discussed after a South Australian residential tenancy laws stakeholder forum.

The forum was chaired by Minister for Consumer and Business Affairs Andrea Michaels and Commissioner Dini Soulio earlier this month.

Rental increases, water billing and rooming house regulations were also discussed by relevant stakeholders including Shelter SA, the Real Estate Institute of South Australia, the Landlords' Association, Uniting Communities, St Vincent de Paul, SACOSS and the University of Adelaide.

The meeting marked the commencement of a review into the Residential Tenancies

Ms Michaels said the forum was an important step in ensuring South Australia's residential tenancies laws are modern, and balance the interests of both tenants and landlords.

"We are currently facing a housing crisis," she said.

"While the current crisis is largely an issue of supply, I am looking to use the levers at my disposal to improve availability and affordability for South Australian renters.

"I am bringing together stakeholders who represent

RENTAL security for tenants, both tenants and landlord, so we can have a frank and open discussion about how we can ease pressure for all involved.

"The current rental shortage highlights the need for contemporary, effective residential tenancies laws."

Ms Michaels said ensuring all parties - including landlords, government and groups representing vulnerable tenants were involved in discussions was important to finding improvements.

"We want to see more landlords in the system without sacrificing the rights of tenants, with a stronger framework that ensures there are safeguards for both tenants and landlords, while making residential properties an attractive form of investment," she said.

Shelter SA executive director Dr Alice Clark said the stakeholder meeting was a sensible approach.

"Shelter SA has been working hard behind the scenes to establish areas of consensus and assist the Minister by bringing a balanced view of the rights and responsibilities of tenants and landlords to the table," she said.



For reasons of public safety, there is a permanent exclusion zone covering land, sea and air around the Port Wakefield Establishment. Specific details on the Port Wakefield Prohibited Area can be obtained from Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No GN 26, 4 July 1990, and is shown on the diagram below. Trespassing in this Area is strictly prohibited and very dangerous due to the presence of unexploded bombs. Any person found within the Prohibited Area or on Defence land will be subject to prosecution.

Specific test and evaluation activities may also require restricting public access to the Port Wakefield Defence Practice Areas over specific periods with these areas articulated in the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No. GN 40, 7 October 1992, and also identified on the diagram below. This may affect access to the Gulf of St Vincent at Port Wakefield and Port Parham.

My least favourite doco to date

NETFLIX'S new true crime documentary, I Just Killed My Dad, wasn't as compelling as I thought.

To start, this series is only three parts and, in my opinion, not long enough to paint the whole picture.

The series briefly explores the life of Anthony Templet, who, at 17, shot his father, Burt, three times in their home and killed him.

At first Anthony is depicted as a kid with no remorse who simply killed his dad because he felt like it but as the series goes on we come to learn his situation was quite harrowing.

At 5, he was kidnapped from his mother by his biological dad and hidden, so he would never be found.

Anthony is effectively cut off from the world, never attends school, never sees a medical professional of any kind and never goes outside alone. He's conditioned to be that way, to be afraid of everything from his mum to anyone who's... well, not his dad.

The shooting in general still confuses me – why did Anthony have access to two guns? Why shoot



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

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

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HOT FISHING TIPS

Port Broughton: A few showers and 15 knot winds were the marine weather here last Saturday morning. Big-boat crews can find King George whiting at the Plank shoal and squid out from Kanaka. The jetty has a few night-time tommy ruff (Australian herring) and at times there are mullet in the channel for fishers in smaller tinnies.

Wallaroo: Boat anglers braving the weather caught bags of whiting and snook with the best grounds being in the bay, Point Riley and Bird Reef. Night fishing at the jetty produced squid and tommy ruff.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: The two jetties have been good for tommies and squid in the evenings. Boaties fishing West Light grounds landed garfish, whiting and snook.

Point Turton: The jetty-based fishing action really turned on as anglers

enjoyed a few days of good results with squid and tommies last week. The beaches from Point Souttar to The Pines have salmon trout and mullet while boaties did occasional trips out for KG whiting, squid and garfish.

Edithburgh: Small-tinny anglers fished the shallows and blue line at Sultana Point up to and beyond Coobowie and Port Giles for small KG whiting, a few gar, tommies and squid. The Edithburgh jetty has squid and tommies.

Stansbury/Port Vincent: Broken grounds south of Port Vincent and The Hut have whiting, red mullet and squid. Crews fishing the Orontes Bank reported big snook, KG whiting and the occasional flathead. Jetty-based anglers had a quiet week.

Ardrossan: KG whiting, gar and squid were out from the old town boat ramp. but they moved frequently and berley was needed to keep them interested. The jetty had tommies, mullet and squid.

Bloodhound to miss finals clash

Kadina midfielder Angus Poole has been suspended for one match by the Yorke Peninsula Football League after receiving his third yellow card this sea-

The ruling means Poole will miss his side's qualifying final against Moonta at Minlaton this Saturday, August 27.

A central umpire issued the card for frontal contact just before three-quarter time in the Bloods' four-point loss to Central Yorke Cougars on Saturday, August 20.

YPFL secretary Phil Brand said there would be no avenue for Kadina Football Club to appeal the sanction.

The suspension is one of three issued by the YPFL in just two weeks after Corey Graham, CY Cougars, and Chase Martin, Wallaroo, were both banned following a pair of incidents in a round 17 clash at Maitland.

Martin was issued with two matches for striking after an unsuccessful challenge at

the YPFL tribunal last Thursday, August 18. He initially received three matches, before the penalty was downgraded to one game as the incident was found to be careless but not intentional.

The penalty lifted to two matches following the tribunal hearing, meaning Martin missed his side's last minor round contest at Wallaroo on the weekend and will also sit out round 1, 2023.

The sanction resulted from a Central Yorke Football Club complaint — YPFL hadn't received a club report in at least three years prior to the CY Cougars versus Wallaroo match.

"A Cougars player was forced from the

field following the striking incident," Brand said.

Graham was handed a two-match suspension for striking in the same match, but an early guilty plea reduced the penalty to one week, making him available for Cougars' elimination final this Saturday.

Brand said the investigation found there was intent by Graham to initiate contact with his opponent.
