DELTA ON DOORSTEP

A SERVICE station in Port Wakefield has been named a tier two public exposure site after a COVID-positive truck driver from New South Wales stopped at the facility yesterday (Monday, August 30).

The driver stopped at the Wakefield OTR (formerly BP) between 1.50pm and 3.20pm yesterday, as well as a Metcash Distribution Centre at Gepps Cross earlier in the day, from 8.30am to 9.30am. SA Police Commissioner Grant Stevens said the truckie believed he travelled through Port Wakefield, Yorke Peninsula and into metropolitan Adelaide, before returning to NSW.

Last week, two other truck drivers returned positive tests in Western Australia after travelling from NSW through Ceduna, Port Augusta and Nundroo.

Authorities are now searching for people who failed to check in at the listed exposure sites.

ANY doubts about the 2021 Yorke Peninsula Field Days going ahead have been quashed.

Caps on attendees have been lifted to 5000 each day, giving organisers confidence.

Field days committee members met with Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis and Premier Steven Marshall at Parliament House on Tuesday, August 24.

The committee held a meeting last Thursday, August 26, and voted to proceed with the three-day event, September 28-30.

There is no doubt now the event is going ahead given there is no unforeseen crisis with the COVID-19 situation in the next few weeks," YP Field Days CEO Peter Anderson said.

"The way the state is looking at the moment and the controls that have been imposed are working well so we are confident it will go ahead.

"The outcome of the meeting is that the YP Field Days are going ahead and we have had our cap raised to 5000 people allowed through the gate each day."

The committee initially was expecting a 3000 per day limit. "We have capped the numbers to

500 children per day so 4500 paying visitors through the gate," Mr Anderson said. "This decision will give people

more reassurance and a cap of 5000

people per day is a reasonable number.

"Given we had about 19,000 through the gates last event to have a three-day cap of 15,000 is pretty close to the mark so I can't see any reason why we wouldn't have a good event."

People planning on attending the event will need to purchase their ticket online with no tickets sold at the gate.

"The sites will be like they usually are depending on the bookings we receive over the next couple of weeks," Mr Anderson said.

"There may be a slight reduction in exhibitors for external sites but time will tell.

"Now we have this good news I think there will be renewed enthusiasm and more site bookings will come in."

Mr Ellis said it was a pleasure to facilitate a meeting with YP Field Days committee members and the Premier.

(The Premier) was very supportive in attempting to ensure that SA Health regulation did not force the field days into unviability," Mr Ellis said.

"We have now been in this pandemic for some 18 months and, as vaccination numbers increase, we need to start to look toward returning our state to free normality.

"Holding the field days will be an important step in that direction."

"Council and I have been working hard to ensure this vital community asset, the main entrance road to one of our main tourism destinations, is finally given the treatment it has needed for so long."

Mr Ellis thanked local businesses that helped promote and collect signa-

"The result is a deserving light shone on the dire need for investment in this road," he said.

"I continue to advocate in all quarters for funding, we have made a tremendous start in fixing roads up and down the YP that have needed upgrading but unfortunately there was such a backlog left by the former government we were never going to get to them all as quickly as we would have liked.

"It is now time that we fix the Wallaroo entrance road and I am committed to seeing that happen."

COVID sites close to home

ANYONE who visited the Port Wakefield service station during the specified times is required to immediately quarantine away from others where possible, for 14 days and get tested immediately before getting tested again on days five and 13.

If you were at any of the locations, but not at the specified date and time, monitor yourself for symptoms and get tested as soon as symptoms develop.

More than 140 people have been quarantined as a precaution from last week's exposure sites but no positive cases have yet emerged.

Discussions continue about restrictions

South Australia will be lifting all testing restrictions for Katherine and southeast Queensland effective today (Tuesday, August 30)

SA Police Commissioner Grant Stevens said the areas had now displayed sufficient periods of infection-free days within their communities

Mr Stevens, speaking after a state transition committee meeting, also flagged potential changes to private activities like weddings.

"The committee also had a significant discussion in relation to private activities, the category in which most weddings and other receptions fall under," he said.

"We will be making changes to the private activities direction activity within that particular sector for weddings.

"We haven't landed entirely on what those changes are going to be.

"SA Health will be making contact with sector representatives over the course of the next couple of days to see how we can free things up in that particular environment but do so safely.

"We are very fortunate in South Australia to have the level of activity we do have but we are still in a race against time to get to that point where the vaccination program hits its stride and we can start to lift these restrictions entirely."

COVID-19 protests in Kadina

A GROUP met in front of Federal Member for Grey Rowan Ramsey's office in Kadina this morning (Tuesday) for what they said was a protest of "pro-choice".

The group explained they would be peacefully protesting for no mandatory COVID-19 vaccinations for adults for work and especially children, no more lockdowns, no masks or QR codes and no more human rights violations.

"We are a country in distress," the protesters said.

"It is against the law to mandate people to wear masks and get vaccinated - we are

amazed the health department is letting this happen

"People should not be getting locked down in their own homes and state borders should not be shutting, it's not right.

"We care about our community and our children - this has to stop."

SYP Show stopped

ORGANISERS of the SYP Minlaton Show have decided cancel this year's event, scheduled for Wednesday, October 6.

"Given our growing concerns around COVID-19, it is with great sadness we must inform you that as a committee we have made the difficult decision to cancel the SYP Minlaton Show this year," the SYP Agricultural Show Society said. "This was a tough call but with the likelihood of COVID restrictions, our risk assessment was just too great.

"We simply don't feel it's fair to our siteholders and to the general public to put on a compromised event with a capped capacity.

Unmasking an environmental disaster

EVERY day, 6.8 billion disposable single-use face masks are used around the world and most are being disposed of incorrectly adding more and more waste into landfill and oceans.

Anti-waste campaigners are begging the public to consider more sustainable alternatives to the familiar blue-and-white surgical masks, warning of an environmental disaster.

Clean Up Australia chair Pip Kiernan said they picked up lots of masks for Clean Up Australia Day in March.

"We need to remember whatever we drop on a footpath or on a roadside is likely to end up in a waterway," Ms Kiernan said.

"They're made up of a variety of plastics so it includes polypropylene, polyethylene, and vinyl and can take up to 450 years to break down if they're dropped in the environment."

Earlier this year the RSPCA began a campaign urging Australians to 'snip the straps' on disposable face masks in a bid to prevent threats to our wildlife.

"Wildlife can get tangled up in it, they don't deserve to be dropped, they don't belong in the

environment," Ms Kiernan said.

Yorke Peninsula's Vicki Penhall said she wanted people to be more aware of the damage disposable masks had on the environment, wildlife and marine life.


"I just want people to realise the straps can get tangled around animals — they already have enough rubbish and waste in the environment and oceans threatening them now," she said.

"I know the disposal mask straps would eventually break down, as I believe they are biodegradable, but if we can just educate people to break, snap or cut (the straps) before they dispose of them it could make a huge difference."

Ms Penhall said our local community had a beautiful marine playground so anything simple we could do to help, we should.

"If one person reads this, they can then tell their family and friends and more people will become educated and implement change," she said.

"I am also looking into contacting the mask companies to see if they would put a sign on their packets so people can become more aware and Copy King helped me create posters to put in local businesses— I'm just passionate about our planet."

Doctors continue to fight for better deal

ALMOST 80 per cent of country doctors believe staffing is near or already below critical mass in their areas.

A survey by Rural Doctors Association of South Australia also revealed 55 per cent of respondents believe there is tension between the available doctor workforce and the health services needed in the local community.

This comes as RDASA and Australian Medical Association of South Australia continue to push for a fairer reform package for rural GP visiting medical officers.

The agreement covering doctors who work in their town hospitals, like those in Minlaton, Yorketown, Maitland, Ardrossan and Port Broughton, expired last year and has yet to be renegotiated.

AMASA and RDASA have been attempting to work with the state government for months to create a longterm reform package to better support

"Rural GP VMOs not only provide general practice services in their communities, but also provide crucial services at their local hospitals, including accident and emergency care; critical inpatient, surgical and post-operative care; and obstetrics support," RDASA president Dr Peter Rischbieth said.

"Much of this work includes being oncall for significant periods of time, and being called to the hospital at any time of the day or night.

"SA Health's initial response to our reform offer — which we developed to better support South Australia's rural GP VMOs and rebuild the rural doctor workforce in the state - was unacceptable and woefully inadequate.

"We urgently need SA Health to come back to us with a genuine response to our reform offer - one that better supports SA's rural doctors and better supports rural South Australians.

"At the moment, however, SA's country doctors are being left out on a limb by

RSS also offered a nine per cent increase to the offsite sessional rate and Dr Meyer said the onsite sessional rate, paid to GPs while working in a hospital would be increased to align with that paid to locums booked in advance.

"There are new provisions enabling contracted GPs to claim \$200/hour to undertake mandatory training required by the regional LHN, and \$190/hour for attending regional LHN initiated meetings (e.g. committee meetings aimed at clinical safety and quality improvements, accreditation, health service planning and performance, audit and risk management, and development and implementation of models of care)," Dr Meyer said. "All time spent in preparation,

attendance and follow up work is claimable.

Breaker caught in Kadina substation

A 40-YEAR-OLD Kadina man has been arrested after he was caught within the grounds of a power substation at Kadina last week.

Police were tasked to the substation on the corner of Mines Road and South Terrace following reports of an intruder at about 11pm on Tuesday, August 24.

A security officer reported seeing a man on the site's CCTV climb over the fence into the yard and handle items before climbing back over the fence.

The suspect was last seen walking north on Mines Road.

Police searched the area but were initially unable to locate him.

A short time later, police located a man riding a pushbike wearing the same clothing worn by the suspect in the CCTV footage.

A male was arrested and charged with being unlawfully on premises and possessing house breaking implements/tools.

He was bailed to appear in the Kadina Magistrates Court on September 27.

Cannabis use rises, methamphetamine falls

Wastewater samples taken during 2020 show methamphetamine use plunged in Australia during the first COVID-19 lockdown while cannabis use spiked, according to a new study led by the University of South Australia.

Western Australia recorded the largest drop in ice loads, falling more than 50 per cent between April and June 2020, attributed to border closures restricting imports of the popular drug.

Cannabis is largely produced locally so national supplies were still plentiful, and wastewater samples reflected this, with all states except the Northern Territory showing large increases in cannabis use.

Researchers from UniSA, The University of Queensland and University of Adelaide collaborated on the study, published in Environmental Science and Technology Letters.

Wastewater samples are taken every two months from 20 treatment plants across Australia, covering about half the population, and tested for methamphetamine, MDMA, cocaine, cannabis and alcohol.

Samples collected before the COVID-19 pandemic (August 2016 — December 2019) were compared with those taken between February and June 2020 when Australia went into a national lockdown.

According to the Ecstasy and Related Drugs Reporting System, about half of Australia's cocaine users stopped using the party drug — or cut down drastically — during the lockdown when global sup-

Don't get scammed this tax season

TAX scams are on the rise, so make sure you don't get scammed this tax time.

There are many variations to this scam; however, it normally starts with a robo-call from a mobile number claiming that your Tax File Number has been used illegally and that if you don't 'press 1' to speak with a representative then you will be arrested.

Alternatively, the recorded message may claim your TFN has been suspended and you need to transfer your money to the Australian Tax Office for safekeeping.

Scammers can also manipulate incoming caller ID and text messages to mimic local police stations, tax agents and the ATO to reel you in.

Don't be pressured, if in doubt hang up the phone and call the person back on a known, reputable number.

Payment methods have been demanded through 'cardless cash' ATM withdrawals, retail gift cards and even via a courier service to collect cash. Police, ATO and government agencies will never request payment by these means or request

sensitive information via phone, text or email. It is recommended that you log into MyGov to view official ATO correspondence.

Wallaroo **Shores** shapes up

THE Wallaroo Shores resort townhouses are beginning to take shape.

Monopoly Property Group director Ben Howard took development partners and Copper Coast Council representatives on a tour of the site last Thursday, August 26.

The project, on the former Incitec Pivot site, is slated to include 100 townhouses along Heritage Drive, with the resort expected to be up and running by November 2022.

Along with the two-bedroom townhouses, the resort will include a cinema, swimming pool, gymnasium, function centre and more.

The project was launched in 2015 and work initially expected to start in April 2016.

"The townhouses will now go back onto the market for people to buy as an investment but people won't be able to live in the resort," Mr Howard said.

"However, people who do purchase will have up to 14 days free to use the resort whenever they like and the rest of the time the townhouses will be under the resort management.

"Civil construction is 98 per cent complete, we are very excited and construction has now commenced on the townhouses which is the easier part."

Mr Howard said it's hoped the townhouses will be ready for the 2022 peak holiday period.

"The demand for regional accommodation is incredible and we want to be able to provide what will be the peninsula's largest resort accommodation," he said.

Mr Howard said the company wants to engage more with its partners going forward.

"We want to get the messaging out there and really show people what the difference is between the resort, which is a major tourist attraction, and the estate," he said.

"Separate to the resort we have the residential component where local people can build their dream home and we have people who will be buying holiday homes. "Yorke Peninsula, especially Wallaroo,

just represents exceptional value." The first residential dwelling has

received council approval and construction is expected to begin before the end of the year.

"Because of the strength of the market we are now on pre-release for stage two of the residential release," Mr Howard said.

"What we are seeing is a 100 per cent uplift in people looking for a sea change, people looking to work, live and retire on the coast.

"We are definitely seeing a real trend for coastal living and we want to release product as quickly as we can to meet the demand.

MOONTA's Betty Smedley is a mask making machine.

Betty began sowing reusable masks at the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic and the demand has continued to grow.

"I saw a need for masks when COVID-19 first made itself known so I made a heap and then probably gave about 100 away," Betty said.

"This year I decided to put out an expression of interest on Facebook and I think in one night I had about 156 orders — so the demand was well and truly still there and I took the advert off Facebook pretty quickly."

Betty doesn't charge a fee for the masks but she said some people had left donations or given some material and elastic which she didn't expect.

"I enjoy making the masks as it is my way to give back to people and the community," she said.

"I send masks, dolls and beanies to Knit for Charity in Adelaide and it can really help the homeless and needy because not everyone can afford these items — especially disposable masks as mine are washable and reusable.

"I also sent about 25 masks to the Cancer Council SA Greenhill Lodge recently as well."

Betty has made more than 800 masks — about 500 this year alone.

"On a good day I could make about 75 masks — I cut the material, pair the front and back and then sow them in a

huge line before pressing and trimming them all," she said.

"To receive recognition from the Copper Coast Council was a shock and I didn't expect to get an award.

"I love people's reactions to my creations they're always so grateful and that's what makes it worthwhile for me — it's just my little way of giving back."

Copper Coast Council mayor Roslyn Talbot said it was wonderful to meet Betty and see all of the work she does for charity and to keep the community safe.

"The reusable masks not only help protect us from COVID-19 they help protect our environment," Mrs Talbot said.

"The disposable masks are beginning to have an impact on the environment as they find their way into landfill and when disposed of incorrectly are a threat to wildlife and are becoming an evesore.

"We have so many people volunteer their time in many ways in our community and it was pleasing to be able to recognise Betty for the work she does.


"The volunteers in our community certainly help make the Copper Coast the wonderful place it is to live.

Nharangga women in focus

A PIECE of art conveying the significance of Wallaroo Hospital to Nharangga women was unveiled last week.

The work is the latest to be funded through the Country SA PHN Welcoming Environment Grant, and is displayed in Kadina Medical Associates' Wallaroo surgery.

Sonder Indigenous health project officer — country Peta Purba thanked Country SA PHN for their funding and KMA practice manager Kylie May for working with them on the project.

The work depicts the Seven Sisters, one of the most widely distributed Dreaming Stories amongst Aboriginal Australia, and tells the story of Nharangga women's health and healing on country. "Wallaroo is significant to the Nharangga women as it was the only hospital who allowed Aboriginal women to have children back in the old days," the accompanying plaque reads.

"The painting represents Nharangga women's health and healing on country and pays tribute to the women who have lost their babies trying to get to Wallaroo to give birth."

Violet said the black spots on the painting, reflected towns where women couldn't go to get help and it also showed the back track to get from Point Pearce to Wallaroo.

"This is an important piece of our history and it's important to tell our stories in a respectful way," she said.

Generous donations for refugees

IN times of crisis, the Yorke Peninsula community rallies together.

Ardrossan Newsagency owners Colleen and David Kluske started a fundraiser to collect items of clothing for the Afghanistan refugees who landed in Adelaide recently.

Many of these people fled Afghanistan with few to no possessions in order to survive the current humanitarian crisis.

"We just wanted to help," Colleen said.

"We were feeling so many emotions about the ongoing situation in Afghanistan we decided to ring the Afghan Cultural Association of South Australia and see what we could do to lend a hand.

"Most of these people left with just the clothes on their back or maybe a small bag if they were lucky.

"I know a lot of people want to do something but they just don't know how or what, and donating clothing is such a simple way we can help."

Colleen said people had donated second-hand clothing but new clothing was preferred while the refugees were in hotel quarantine due to COVID-19 protocols.

"The pre-loved donations will still find homes once these people finish their quarantine so they won't go to waste but brand new clothes are preferred at this stage," she said.

"I also really feel for our troops at the moment too — like I said there have been a lot of emotions but it is better to do something you can do than nothing at all."

Ardrossan Newsagency collected donations last week and will send them to the Afghan Cultural Association of South Australia for distribution.

COPPER Coast Council is moving forward with cemetery management plans for the four sites within its area.

Council received four submissions as part of a public consultation process for the plans, created by Changing Places' Russ Allison, all in favour of the suggested recommendations.

Recommendations included issuing interment rights in perpetuity, progressively plotting two years' supply of graves at each site, creating a more manageable records system, and master planning for the sites and lawn sections at the

Moonta and Wallaroo cemeteries.

Mr Allison spoke to councillors at an informal gathering last month about the five plans — one for the entire council region and one each for the Kadina, Wallaroo, Moonta and Greens Plains cemeteries. He described the lawn section in Kadina as a brilliant idea and thought it could be introduced easily into other

areas to provide different options to those burying their loved ones.

Mr Allison also discussed token memorials for ashes, which would provide a historical reference point as well as a place people can visit to remember their loved ones.

"What happens from here is I will put together a simple action plan and we will run it past the cemetery working party," council CEO Russell Peate said.

"That plan will then go to council with any changes the working party may have, and become a document we work on.

"The action plan will prioritise the recommendations so that when funding and resources become available we can apply."

"I love making people laugh, so it was nice to be able to do that in what was often a pretty tense environment."


Laura said it was unusual having no contact with the outside world for an extended period.

Amy's innovative forensic find

FORMER Kadina local and Harvest Christian College dux Amy Griffin is innovating forensic science.

Amy and her colleagues recently discovered a way to recover DNA from the surface of drug capsules after just 15 seconds of contact.

This discovery means it could be possible for law enforcement agencies to track down criminal syndicates from around the world.

Amy completed her Bachelor of Science (Honours) (Forensic and Analytical Science) in 2014 and is currently in the middle of her PhD.

"This is the first part, sort of like a chapter, which goes towards my whole PhD," she said.

"I am currently doing other research which follows on from this preliminary study.

"In my bachelor degree I had lab demonstrators/tutors who were PhD students and always found it interesting that they were able to continue at uni conducting research.

"I really enjoyed my honours year as I was able to design my own experiments to answer specific questions.

"I struggled to pick between the biology and chemistry streams in the bachelor degree, so I did both as much as I could and when I had to choose for my PhD I managed to find a project which has a bit of both!"

The study has been published in Forensic Science International: Genetics.

"It is pretty cool to see all that hard work paying off," she said.

"My supervisors do a lot of research around trace/touch DNA and are always trying to find ways to improve the methods of collection, and in this case, we decided to extend the type of sample that could be tested.

"Previous research (about 12 years ago)

was conducted looking into DNA in illicit drugs, but that investigated more powders and a few tablets, but not necessarily the surface of capsules.

"After deciding on what the project was about, a thorough review of the current literature was conducted and the methods were determined by aligning as closely as possible to current methods in both the literature and in real life casework samples (as conducted at Forensic Science SA).

"I then asked a couple of volunteers to handle the capsules, after which I swabbed them and extracted, quantified and amplified their DNA to produce DNA profiles.

Following data analysis and the writing up, the manuscript has to be submitted to a specific journal where it will be peer reviewed and accepted for publication.

"After seeing that I could get a decent profile I started to get pretty excited and couldn't wait to tell my supervisors that we actually got stuff off the capsules."

Amy said the sensitivity of DNA technology and the ability to analyse complex profiles has improved in recent years; as such, touch DNA is becoming more increasingly sampled.

"This pilot study demonstrates the potential for laboratories to recover human DNA from the exterior surface of capsules which are commonly used to encase illicit drugs such as MDMA, enabling both biological and chemical profiling methods to contribute to the investigation of clandestine drug production," she said.

"The ability to generate profiles from 82 per cent of capsules highlights how valuable it could be for operational forensic laboratories to sample the exterior of pill capsules."

Amy said she and her fellow researchers are continuing to explore the possibilities of touch DNA, and are now investigating how it can be used in a more realistic scenario encountered in police work.

Spring weather outlook

THE Bureau of Meteorology is predicting a warmer-thanaverage spring.

Yorke Peninsula is likely to experience temperatures above 16 degrees during the first week of September, around two degrees higher than average.

The latest seasonal outlook issued by the bureau also revealed spring is likely to bring above-average rainfall.

Bureau climatologist Dr Andrew Watkins said predictions for a wetter and warmer spring come after a particularly wet and warm winter.

"Nationally, we've seen the wettest winter since 2016," he said.

"Australia's average winter temperature is also expected to be one of the 10 warmest on record, particularly in the tropical north."

Dr Watkins said the main reason behind the bureau's prediction for a wetter than average spring was a climate driver called the Indian Ocean Dipole.

"We've currently got a negative IOD - a phenomenon which typically brings an increased chance of rainfall to southern and eastern Australia," he said.

"This negative IOD is expected to persist throughout spring but is currently weaker than the last negative IOD event we saw in 2016, which brought Australia's wettest May-October period on record."


Another relevant climate driver, known as the El Niño-Southern Oscillation (or ENSO), is likely to remain neutral with no declaration of a La Niña event expected in the coming months.





New cataract technique

A BRISBANE clinic has become the first in Australia to offer the CAPSULaser procedure, enabling surgeons to perform highly accurate and consistent capsulotomies (type of cataract surgery) in less than a third of a second.

OKKO Eye Specialist Centre, founded by ophthalmic surgeon Dr Matthew Russell, recently adopted the technology Dr Russell said ensured precise size, circularity, and position of a lens implant.

Developed in the USA, CAPSULaser is a pain-free, non-invasive procedure that uses laser to perform the critical component of the cataract procedure.

Russell said femtosecond laser-assisted cataract surgery (FLACS) - currently the most used laser-assisted cataract surgery approach nationally - requires two separate procedures; it also involves a suction element applied directly to the eye that can be uncomfortable for patients.

Replacing FLACS, CAPSULaser can be seamlessly integrated into current cataract surgery, eliminating the need for a two-staged procedure, he said.

With a predictable and precise capsule opening, the procedure enables the use of a new generation of extended depth of focus capsular-fixated implants.

Having performed more than 20,000 surgical procedures over the past 15 years, Russell said the evidence so far suggested a capsulotomy created by CAPSULaser may be stronger than, and therefore potentially safer than, current laser cataract surgery.

WALKING is often called a wonder drug.

Walking for an average of 30 minutes a day at least five days per week can reduce your risk of heart disease, stroke, and type 2 diabetes.

It can also help maintain healthy blood pressure, cholesterol and weight.

A survey of more than 2300 participants showed 92 per cent noticed an improvement in their overall health, and almost all of those who completed their plan said they would continue to do regular walking or physical activity.

Before joining the program, only 20 per cent of those surveyed said they did the recommended 30 minutes a day of physical activity on five or more days a week; by the end of their plan, this had more than doubled to 48 per cent.

For those who reported doing no physical activity at all before signing up, by the end of their plan almost a third of this group was meeting guidelines for physical activity.

The walking plans also helped many people reach the health goals they'd set for themselves. These include weight loss, better fitness, the ability to do more steps, more motivation, increased energy and feeling better about themselves.



Football legend honed craft on YP

Ten-time SANFL premiership coach Jack Oatey was elevated to the status of Legend at the Australian Football Hall of Fame last week.

He became just the 30th Hall of Fame Legend to date.

Before his heroics as a player and coach at Norwood, and mentoring roles with West Adelaide and Sturt, Oatey's skills were honed at Port Victoria Football Club.

The son of Ted Oatey, who played a couple of SANFL games for Port Adelaide in 1921, Jack first tried out at Alberton in his teens, but was rejected.

The younger Oatey proved himself at Port Victoria, being a member of the premiership team that defeated Wallaroo by 13 points in 1939.

He was also the Mail Medallist that season with 40 votes, 12 ahead of runner-up Robert Lander, of Wallaroo, who had collected this award three times earlier in the decade.

Oatey played well for a Yorke Peninsula representative side against Murray Districts in a curtain-raiser to a SANFL semifinal on Adelaide Oval, impressing Norwood official Len Martin who gained his signature.

He went out to The Parade in 1940 and was runner-up to the

Magarey Medal in 1941, the year he was a member of his first Redlegs premiership.

Oatey also won the best and fairest at the Redlegs on four occasions, including his first two years at the top level, as well 1945 and 1947.

Between 1942 and 1944 he played in the World War II competition for the combined Norwood-North side, including in a winning grand final in 1943.

Serving in the Australian Imperial Force during the war, Oatey also represented South Melbourne in 1944 whilst on army service in Melbourne, playing a handful of VFL games.

He coached Norwood to three flags as captain-coach in 1946, '48 and '50 before retiring in 1952 after 162 league games.

Oatey went across to West Adelaide in 1957, where he lost a pair of season deciders to Port Adelaide in 1958-59, the first by two points after a shot hit the post with 90 seconds left, and by 10 points the following year.

He took over perennial cellar dwellers Sturt in 1962 and revolutionised the way the game was played, chiefly through the use of the slick and skilful handball, guiding the Double Blues to seven flags, including five in a row from 1966.

Oatey remains as SANFL's longest-serving coach having guided Norwood, West Adelaide

and Sturt for a total of 786 games across 38 years.

In 1978, he was awarded the Order of Australia (AM) for his services to Australian Football.

Since 1981, the Jack Oatey Medal has been awarded to the best player in the SANFL grand final.

He is a member of the Teams of the Century for Norwood and Sturt.

Oatey represented South Australia on seven occasions, as captain-coach in '49-50 and coach in '59.

In '96, he was a member of the inaugural induction into the Australian Football Hall of Fame.

He has now joined North Adelaide champion Barrie Robran and Malcolm Blight as the South Australian Legends in the Australian Football Hall of Fame.

His legacy lives on with the Jack Oatey Stand at Adelaide Oval.

His sons, Robert (301 games with Norwood and Sturt) and Peter (120 games for Norwood) also had significant careers.

Peter was also a state tennis player and noted neurosurgeon. Grandson David continued

the family's coaching tradition, currently as the under 18s coach at Sturt, after becoming the fourth generation to play SANFL football for the Double Blues in the 1980s.

Naturally like all hopefuls in their elite programs, Litster's dream is to be drafted to the AFL.

"I spoke to a few clubs last year, but haven't talked to any as yet this season," Litster said. Litster is expected to play for Woodville-West Torrens Eagles reserves this weekend against Central District, having been one of their most consistent at the level this year.

KMS makes sporting history

Kadina Memorial School's First XVIII football side has etched its name into school sporting history, claiming its inaugural title on Tuesday, August 24.

KMS defeated Victor Harbor High in the Pool B grand final of the All-Schools Knockout Competition at Thebarton Oval to win, its first win since the competition began in 1984.

After both teams kicked a goal in the opening stanza, before the KMS midfield took control and won the game, 11.14 (80) to 3.1 (19), a handsome 61-point margin.

With an outstanding display, which included a number of telling marks and plenty of run and carry with ball in hand, Will Neumann won the Chris Brown Medal as best on ground.

Other significant contributors in the victory included big man Jonte Hunter-Price, the smooth moving Jedd Thomson, Dylan Branford and Taj Kleinig.

The trio of Dylan Niotis, Branford and Angus Cock kicked two goals each in the victory, while Darcy Snodgrass, Taj Kleinig, Tate Kay and Ryan Kirley also made it onto the goal scorers' sheet.

"The boys played great footy throughout the competition," team coach and teacher Nick Hewett

"We got close last year losing the final and the boys were keen to make amends.

"We had a very even team across the board and a good mix of year 10, 11 and 12 lads; and they were a pleasure to coach."

KMS defeated Glossop and Kapunda High Schools in the first round, and took care of Saint Marks College and Golden Grove High Schools in the second round. High School and Nazareth Catholic College at the semifinal stage to make the decider.

Previously, a combination southern Yorke Peninsula team (featuring players from Yorketown Area and Minlaton District Schools) had been the only local side to win the competition in 1990 — defeating Victor Harbor High 12.6 (78) to 6.11 (47).

Eagles one win from three-peat

Broughton-Mundoora's A grade will have a shot at its third-straight premiership after defeating Orroroo by three points in the Northern Areas Football Association second semifinal on Saturday, August 28.

The Eagles are set to feature in every grade on grand final day after advancing by six goals in the junior colts, 95 points in the senior colts and nine points in the B grade at Laura on the weekend.

After picking up a minor injury against Jamestown-Peterborough last weekend, usual playing coach Nick Hewett led his Eagles from the sidelines on Saturday.

"I've done a bit of coaching from the box now — I'd much prefer to be on the field, but it provides an opportunity to give feedback straight away," he said.

Heading into the top-of-thetable semifinal, Hewett said his main message to his team was to play their style of footy. The first half was a nearstalemate, as Orroroo kicked 3.3

(21) and Broughton-Mundoora managed 3.5 (23)."The first half was a real arm

wrestle as the pressure was high, and surprisingly both teams struggled with the breeze all game," Hewett said.

Into the breeze, Eagles turned the tide in the third quarter by bagging five majors while the Roos only converted one goal from seven scoring shots.

"We spoke about tidying a few things up at halftime and the boys implemented them which was pleasing," Hewett said.

"We were lucky they missed a few shots but our pressure was good — we also missed some good opportunities, but overall we kicked fairly straight."

The Roos finished with three final-term goals, but BM just closed out with the help of one

major in the last. "We were fortunate to hold on

in the end — we had a few sore boys and Orroroo was coming, but we showed a lot of character," Hewett said.

Orroroo will now face Booloeroo-Melrose-Wilmington in the preliminary final, which edged out Southern Flinders by 16 points in the first semifinal at Port Broughton on Sunday.

"BMW have been playing some good footy, but Orroroo have been the top team all year so it will be interesting to see who comes out of it," Hewett said.

"We've been fortunate to play in a few grand finals previously and it's always an enjoyable week.

"I think we should have five available who didn't play on the weekend (including me), which will make selection tough."

Eagles will also face the winner of Jamestown-Peterborough and Crystal Brook in the junior colts, Orroroo and Southern Flinders in senior colts, as well as Southern Flinders and Crystal Brook in B grade.

Yield potential shaping strongly

YORKE Peninsula's crops are well on track as a result of consistent rain so far this season.

Particularly strong moisture levels throughout central and southern YP have maintained high confidence in yield potential.

Central Ag Solutions, Arthurton, agronomist Matt Correll said the widespread rainfall has been welcomed by areas which missed out last season.

"There is plenty of stored soil moisture so, unless the weather takes an unexpected turn for the worse, harvest should be promising," Mr Correll said.

"The dry sowing conditions did cause some early pre-emergent chemical damage but, due to the rain that followed, most crops have grown away from that and look very healthy."

Mr Correll said the recent sunshine and warmer temperatures have also created ideal growing conditions.

"In particular, the lentils are starting to put some major growth on and reaching canopy closure timing earlier than expected," he said.

'The wheat and barley have tillered out well, so high yields are definitely within reach."

Mr Correll said most farmers have been finishing late broadleaf and grass herbicide applications, and are now moving into fungicide applications.

"Fungicide programs are very important in a wet year like this, as it's been ideal for infection and disease which limit yield," he said.

"The major yield-producing leaves are emerging in wheat, so it's very important to keep these clean with robust fungicide programs.

"The most important lentil fungicide timing is just before

the canopy closure stage, so this should also be a priority for farmers in the next few weeks."

Through the remainder of the season, Mr Correll said a cool and wet finish would be ideal for grain-fill.

"The longer it remains cool and wet, the longer plants have to keep filling the grain," he said.

"Urea fertiliser is in very short supply, but if the rain continues it will be beneficial to apply some more nitrogen to meet wheat and barley yield potential."

Port Victoria farmer Ben Wundersitz said getting a hold of urea has been a challenge this year.

"Urea has just about doubled in cost since last season due to its high demand," he said.

"With an above-average yield, there's a chance we could get low-protein grain if we don't have enough nitrogen down."


Test and evaluation activities involving static firings and/or firings of naval and artillery weapons are conducted at the Proof and Experimental Establishment Port Wakefield throughout the year. The Proof and Experimental Establishment Port Wakefield is a vital Defence test and evaluation capability that has supported Defence since 1929.

These firings may require specific tidal or weather conditions, and are critical for the safety of current and new Defence capabilities. Members of the public may notice noise, vibration, flashes and/or smoke during the testing. There is no risk to the public outside of the gazetted Defence Practice Areas.

For reasons of public safety, there is a permanent exclusion zone covering land, sea and air around the Port Wakefield Establishment. Specific details on the Port Wakefield Prohibited Area can be obtained from Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No GN 26. 4 July 1990, and is shown on the diagram below. Trespassing in this Area is strictly prohibited and very dangerous due to the presence of unexploded bombs. Any person found within the Prohibited Area or on Defence land will be subject to prosecution.

Specific test and evaluation activities may also require restricting public access to the Port Wakefield Defence Practice Areas over specific periods with these areas articulated in the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No. GN 40, 7 October 1992, and also identified on the diagram below. This may affect access to the Gulf of St Vincent at Port Wakefield and Port Parham





coconut cream, 6-8 cherry tomatoes. Preparation make a warm glaze/syrup of red wine, honey and seasoning. Reduce. Baste the scotch fillet whilst roasting to medium-rare. Allow to stand. Make a garlic prawn topping sauce in pan with prawns, crushed garlic, skinned and blitzed kiwifruit, coconut cream and seasoning. Slice beef roll into thin, rare pieces and top with garlic prawns and warmed cherry tomatoes. Serve with a glass of sparkling pinot noir.

Wallaroo: Good catches of King George whiting have been made from Point Riley, Myponie Point and out from Tickera in the past week. Smaller whiting are off the Magazine and Boiler ground. The jetty has tommy ruff (Australian herring) and squid. Mullet have been caught from the marina breakwater

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Local jetty and shore-based fishing has yellowfin whiting, mullet and even the odd flathead down at the Bamboos and The Gap. Boat crews reported whiting, squid and big snook from Warburto Point and the Steamer channel.

Point Turton: KG whiting can be caught from Point Souttar and the Banks and then west to Corny Point. The jetty here has salmon trout, mullet and small squid. Hardwicke Bay drift grounds hold whiting and squid.

Stenhouse Bay/Marion Bay: Anglers enjoyed calmer conditions as the weekend progressed and caught mullet. salmon trout and gar from the rocks at Daly Head, Berry Bay and Browns Beach. Fishing by boat has red nannygai, squid, snook and flathead off Hillocky and south of Penguin Point.

Edithburgh: Jetty fishing has again been intermittent. The almost balmy weather on Saturday evening produced tommies and squid after a quiet week. Boat crews caught whiting from Tapley Shoals, Coobowie and Troubridge Island.

Port Vincent/Ardrossan: Squid catches have improved here and up at Port Julia with clear water days also producing snook and an unconfirmed report of size blueys from Port Vincent. Try the Ardrossan jetty for mullet and squid.

Schulz, Cunningham claim colts medals

Southern Eagles have clung onto an A grade finals berth after derailing the CMS Crows by two goals on Saturday, August 28.

The reigning premiers could have dropped out of finals if they lost to Crows and Bute defeated Kadina to leapfrog the Southerners on percentage.
