SIX retired seafarers and their spouses could soon be evicted from their units on Jetty Road, Wallaroo.

The tenants were informed The Moorings Retired Seafarers Units, owned by the Sailors' Society, United Kingdom, had been advertised for sale late last month.

Pending the new purchaser's intention, the retirees, all aged 65 and

older, could be forced to find somewhere new to live.

Pat Nicholson, 88, has lived in one of the five units since they were built 19 years ago.

"When we first moved in, our contract had no expiry date and we were told this was our home for life," Ms Nicholson said.

"We paid our rent to the Sailors' Society committee in Port Adelaide before it dissolved in 2012. "Then, the remaining tenancies were transferred to fixed leases through the estate agent.

"It was not understood this (transfer) took place through a verbal agreement and, consequently, we are not here for life."

Ms Nicholson said her late husband Fred served in the merchant navy throughout World War II as a veteran of the Arctic convoys.

"He was sunk four times during his service and died thinking I was safe in my home for the rest of my life.

"His service is being dishonoured by the actions of the society which (may be) legal but (are) morally reprehensible.

"As we are a long way from England, perhaps there is no understanding of the impact of making six elderly people homeless.

"A way of solving the problem would be to sign the tenants on a lifetime lease prior to the sale and make hon-

ouring the leases a condition of sale. "This would uphold the spirit of the agreement my husband and I entered into."

If the tenants were evicted, Ms Nicholson said there was little possibility each would obtain rentals.

"We will be homeless unless the sale is abandoned... the impact for myself and the other tenants is terrifying," she said.

"This is not the time to be putting people, especially the elderly, out on the street."

We like many purchased land and built our then holiday home there. Unfortunately, The Dunes went into receivership due to a debt of \$13 million.

But in fairness the global economic crisis hit during the sales period and sales significantly reduced.

In my opinion, a major poor decision was not building the 18-hole golf course first where it would have attracted many people throughout South Australia and interstate to play it, and possibly become golf members.

The houses planned within and around The Dunes would still have been built.

It would have provided the return on investment the investors were initially seeking although it was rumoured they received \$40m with the initial first sales.

Being an extremely optimistic person, I believe an 18-hole golf course is still a reality to be developed.

There are investors around, including the government, who, if pursued with a detailed business plan indicating an attractive return on investment, could negotiate for the development of the remaining nine holes.

If it occurred, I have no doubt The Dunes could become one of the best golf courses in Australia, attracting professional golfers from all over the world to play in financially lucrative ProAms with thousands of fans.

A substantial financial injection all over Yorke Peninsula would happen through tourism, travel, accommodation and hospitality facility requirements requiring many jobs to be created to meet demands.

Membership of the Copperclub would significantly increase on a regular basis providing the financial revenue required to make the it economically viable into the future.

For your information, if you play golf, or want to learn to play, the Copperclub has an excellent professional golfer working there part-time who, for a small fee, will teach you how to play or improve your game.

Tenants left to scramble for homes

RESIDENT Pat Nicholson said each of the tenants had been looked after on a cheap rental rate since moving in.

"Even if they decide to keep the units, the new owner will be able to put the rental price up to an amount we can't afford," she said.

Michael Dare, 65, moved into one of the units less than 18 months ago after retiring from the navy.

"I lived in Queensland for most of my life," Mr Dare said.

"I'm worn out from shifting so much and it's felt incredible to think I've had this place to live for the rest of my life - we all love living here.

"You hear about local homelessness and evictions, but when it's happening to you, you think "how has it come to this?"

The group of tenants has approached multiple levels of government and suggested the SA Housing Authority could purchase the property, which includes additional land yet to

be developed.

"The homelessness problem not only locally but across the whole country is ridiculous," Mr Dare said.

Sale a tough decision

A Sailors' Society spokesperson said the decision to sell the units had not been taken lightly. "The charity sector has been hit hard over recent times and Sailors' Society is not unique in having to make hard decisions to ensure we can sustain ourselves moving forwards," the spokesperson said.

"Our trustees discussed all options and made the hard decision to sell some of our fixed assets in order to continue funding our core work and support to seafarers worldwide; this has included properties in the UK and also units in South Australia.

"We are deeply sorry for the upset and anxiety caused to our tenants and we will do all we can to support residents through this difficult time, working with them and our agents in Australia."

Assisting with the sale, Blights Real Estate Yorke Peninsula, property consultant Neville Hibbard said he believed these were the last Retired Seafarers Units to be sold in Australia.

"The property will likely be used for holiday rentals, and there is enough room to build four more units," Mr Hibbard said.

"Rental prices could increase by \$200 per week if the new purchaser hopes to keep the tenants.

"Depending on the purchaser, the tenants could have until the end of June (2023) to vacate."

Mr Hibbard said the tenants would be prioritised as soon as local rentals became available.

"We are close to having a rental for one (tenant), and are trying our best to find homes for the others during this unfortunate situation," he said.

Heart-stopping support compulsory

SOUTH Australia became the first state in the country to legislate defibrillators as compulsory in public buildings on Tuesday, November 29.

Under laws introduced by SA-Best MLC Frank Pangallo, buildings including sporting facilities, shopping centres, schools, prisons and libraries are now required to install automated external defibrillators.

Minister for Health Chis Picton said there's substantial evidence widespread access to AEDs can prevent deaths by cardiac arrest.

"We know time is crucial during a

cardiac arrest and every minute counts," he said.

"They (AEDs) are incredibly userfriendly, guiding users every step of the way to help someone in a lifethreatening situation.

"With an AED, an electric shock is only distributed if it is required.

"We are pleased to support the passage of this legislation before the end of the sitting calendar, recognising its importance in supporting good, and potentially life-saving, health outcomes for our community."

Mr Pangallo said many lives would be saved because of the new laws. "The statistics not only speak for

themselves but also paint a very dis-

turbing, deadly picture," he said.

"More than 30,000 people suffer cardiac arrest in Australia each year.

"Worse still, the survival rate for a person who suffers a cardiac arrest out of a hospital environment is only about 10 per cent."

Mr Pangallo said it's an undisputable fact the availability of an AED dramatically improves a person's chance of survival.

"For every minute defibrillation is delayed, the chance of survival decreases by 10 per cent," he said.

"It has been proven around the world that AED save lives — these nation-leading laws will ensure more lives are saved as more defibrillators will now be available throughout the community."

Service already nearby

There are already a large number of defibrillators available for public use across Yorke Peninsula, with community groups aware of their need.

Port Vincent Progress Association received a \$2693 grant through the federal government's volunteer grants program to purchase and install a defibrillator at the town institute earlier this year.

PVPA committee member Sue Hall said, although the defibrillator hasn't been installed yet, it should provide those in the town with extra security should something occur.

"Our volunteer first responders will be greatly assisted by the addition of it and having it at the institute close to the main beach will ensure if a child or adult is in need of resuscitation, the correct equipment is available," she said.

"The more support we can give to our volunteers with carrying out their duties, the more they will feel valued and respected.

"A defibrillator will provide our volunteers with the security if a medical event should occur whilst they are performing their volunteer duties, medical equipment is close by."

Fire wipes out lentils, wheat

ABOUT 150 hectares of lentils and wheat crops were destroyed by a fire last Wednesday, December 7.

The blaze broke out near Port Victoria Road, Maitland just before 3.30pm.

CFS issued a watch and act notice for residents in Maitland, with the north easterly winds pushing the blaze towards the town.

Crews from Maitland, Port Victoria, Balgowan, Weetulta, Kadina and Ardrossan, as well as farm firefighting units, took just over an hour to contain the fire, with the blaze being officially contained at 4.34pm.

Yorke Valley CFS group officer Andrew Cadd said two helicopters were called in for water drops but, due to the swift response, they were not required.

Mr Cadd encouraged locals to have their fire action plans in place.

"By putting these plans in place, it makes it easier for CFS crews and strike teams to quickly contain and control possible outbreaks," he said. UP IN SMOKE... A SUPPLEMENTARY election is set to be held by Copper Coast Council next year.

Eight people nominated for the new council term, which began last month, one short of the nine required councillors.

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said the Electoral Commission of South Australia advised council of the need for a supplementary election.

"Council would usually be able to run with just eight (elected members), but we're not able to do this from the start of a term," Mrs Talbot said.

"This last seat could be a hotly contested position, as I think some people may have regretted not nominating in the recent election.

"The successful nominee will have a good opportunity to help mould the Copper Coast and enable it to grow into an even better community. "This is a great chance for you to have a voice."

Council calls for public nominations

Council is also planning to lobby the Local Government Association for the reinstatement of public election nominations.

CEO Russell Peate said nominations were strongly encouraged to be submitted via an online portal and there was no legal requirement for the display of nominations.

"The reinstatement for councils to display all nominations received for councillor and mayoral vacancies should be done as part of the election review by the Local Government Association and state government," Mr Peate said.

Mrs Talbot said she thought the absence of public nominations could again discourage people from nominating.

"If nominations are drawing to a close and people can see the last council position hasn't been filled, I think more people would put up their hands," she said.

"Council could've at least had all nine positions filled if nominations were public (in the recent election). "We also would've saved having to

pay for two elections.

"I fully expected the cost for the supplementary election as people will be using the ballot materials and other charged services this time."

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said he was disappointed there weren't enough candidates for the Copper Coast during the recent state-wide elections.

"We need to encourage people to serve on local government to ensure the bureaucracy is reflecting the will of the ratepayers," Mr Ellis said.

"I will happily consider any proposal from councils to improve the election process and ensure we have a full field of candidates put their hands up next time."

An Electoral Commission spokesperson said the local government nomination process was brought into line with federal and state elections to improve election integrity, following a 2018 Council Election Report.

"Under the Local Governments (Elections) Act, it is an offence to exercise violence, intimidation or offers or give a bribe inducing a person to submit or withdraw candidature for election," the spokesperson said.

"Unlike previous elections, the 2022 Council Election saw no evidence of this type of behaviour prior to the close of nominations.

"The integrity measures in the Electoral Act are the gold standard for election integrity in Australia.

"As a result of adopting these measures, there were no complaints or accusations of violence and intimidation resulting in candidates withdrawing their nominations."

The spokesperson said ECSA was not responsible for promoting or

attracting nominations to council positions, only the conduct of the nominations process.

"Promotion and attracting nominations are the responsibilities of the individual councils and the Local Government Association," they said.

New firebug tracking law

SOUTH Australians are set for better protection from firebugs this fire danger season.

New monitoring laws have passed through state parliament which will allow South Australia Police to apply to the Adelaide Magistrates Court for an order to monitor the movements of bushfire offenders, by use of an electronic monitoring device.

Attorney General Kyam Maher said South Australians can rest assured the government is doing everything in its power to combat the scourge of deliberately lit bushfires.

"These laws will give SAPOL the power to seek a court order to monitor people convicted of bushfire offences who could pose a risk," Mr Maher said.

Minister for Police, Emergency Services and Correctional Services Joe Szakacs said these were laws the community and firefighters deserved.

"Now SAPOL can keep track of individuals who may seek to put others' lives at risk, they have an invaluable tool to minimise the risk of bushfires," he said.

Phone detection cameras announced for SA's roads

STATE parliament has approved mobile phone detection cameras for South Australian roads.

The Statutes Amendment (Use of Devices in Vehicles) Bill 2022 will amend the Road Traffic Act 1961 to include an enabling provision allowing for the use of MPDCs.

Driver distraction is one of the leading causes of fatalities and serious injury crashes on South Australian roads, with it accounting for 247 lives lost and 1330 serious injuries between 2017 and 2021.

This equates to 51 per cent of all lives lost and 34 per cent of serious injuries.

Data provided by South Australia Police showed 30,354 expiation notices had been issued for mobile phone offences, equating to about 7600 offences per year in the past four years.

The introduction of mobile phone detection cameras is aimed to detect and deter distracted drivers who illegally use mobile phones while driving.

The cameras are expected to be operational from late 2023, with a three-month education period.

Fines raised from the illegal use of mobile phones will be invested in the Community Road Safety Fund.

Minister for Police, Emergency Services and Correctional Services Joe Szakacs said he was relieved to see this important legislation pass before the end of the year.

"Inattention is the leading cause of death and serious injury on South Australian roads, a stark fact that demonstrates the importance of legislation such as the introduction of MPDCs," Mr Szakacs said.

"It is my hope, through driver education, these cameras become redundant as drivers realise the dangers of using their phones while driving." SAPOL Assistant Com-

SAPOL Assistant Commissioner Ian Parrott said SAPOL would work with the Department for Infrastructure and Transport to administer a tender process with the aim of having mobile phone detection cameras installed by the end of 2023.

"The use of a mobile phone whilst driving is a dangerous and potentially fatal act," Assistant Commissioner Parrott said.

"Both education and enforcement play important roles in reducing the incidence of dangerous driving behaviours.

"If we can increase the likelihood of detecting someone using their phone, we have a higher chance of influencing this dangerous behaviour.

"The prevention of one death or serious injury through detecting illegal mobile phone use will make the introduction of this technology worthwhile."

Registrations open for Masters Games

George Street stormwater upgrade on track

A STORMWATER upgrade on George Street, Moonta, should be completed this month.

The new 500 metre central stormwater pipe, linking with the existing stormwater system along Moonta's main street has been installed underground in four phases. Copper Coast Council director for

infrastructure services Tim Neumann said works had been progressing on the fourth and final zone.

"This zone is the head of the drainage network and includes six side entry pits and five junction boxes, the most of all the zones" he said.

"There are numerous services to

work around within this intersection - some have conflicted with design and onsite alterations have been required to keep the project moving.

'Trench reinstatement and road sealing were scheduled for the second week of December, before cleaning up and demobilising will proceed, finalising the upgrade?

VACCINATION CENTRE CLOSURES

Boosting inclusivity at BWC

BARUNGA West Council is hoping for greater inclusivity at Australia Day celebrations in Port Broughton and Bute after receiving \$16,300 from the National Australia Day Council.

Councils from across the country were encouraged to apply for the grants to go towards community events which encourage reflection and respect, as well as celebrate Australia Day 2023.

Council CEO Maree Wauchope said some of the funding would be used for new chairs for Port Broughton and a portable sound system for Bute to make events fully inclusive and accessible for community members with visual, motor and auditory issues.

"Many of our residents and attendees at our Australia Day events are aged over 60 and require chairs," Ms Wauchope said.

[°]Many have reduced mobility and more than 200 (people in the council area) require assistance due to long-term health conditions and disabilities.

"For Australia Day 2023, we will be able to have easy-to-relocate chairs and tables for people to use and more visual and audible information to create more accessible and inclusive events.

"It has also been identified at previous events in Bute that the portable sound system has not been adequate for people with hearing impairments.

"This grant will provide for an updated sound system to allow more members of our community to hear the program."

Around 400 people are expected to attend the Port Broughton celebrations on the foreshore, while a further 150 are expected at the Bute Soldier's Memorial Hall on Thursday, January 26.

More coverage in the Yorke Peninsula than ever before

CONSTRUCTION is well underway on the Yorke and Northern Local Health Network Rehabilitation Service at Wallaroo Hospital.

The service is located in the old day options centre, and is expected to take its first patients in March.

RN clinical lead Lyndal Stanley said the need for a local rehabilitation facility was identified by the community.

"It was included in the YNLHN

Clinical Service Plan and director of nursing Sue Watkins has really driven this project," Ms Stanley said.

"Our rehabilitation project, led by Jacqui Larwood, also won the YNLHN Excellence in Integrated Care Award earlier this year, and this facility builds on that."

The unit will significantly improve health outcomes for consumers in the Yorke and Northern region needing specialised rehabilitation and ensure consumers receive better access to specialist multidisciplinary rehabilitation locally, allowing them to be closer to home.

Stage one of the redevelopment features a therapy garden, occupational therapy kitchen, rehabilitation gym and telehealth rooms, and is almost complete with the exception of flooring and accessibility ramps and bannisters.

All work so far has been complet-

ed by local contractors and subcontractors.

The second stage of the service will include two purpose-built inpatient therapy rooms and will soon go out to tender.

Patients will be able to access the facility whilst in the hospital and after they are discharged.

"It will also provide an ambulatory program for people to receive rehabilitation care while staying in their communities," a YNLHN spokesperson said.

"The ambulatory program allows people to participate in intensive rehabilitation at the purpose-built gym and therapy areas or in their own homes. "It enables a smooth transition from

inpatient rehabilitation to outpatient — or ambulatory —rehabilitation."

Plans are also being made to incorporate Narungga art into the space to recognise the importance of the space on Country.

Petitions rolled out for the holiday period

THE number of signatures is growing on Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis's petition for health reform.

Mr Ellis launched the petition in October and is aiming for at least 10,000 signatures to trigger a formal parliamentary hearing.

The petition has five key objec-

tives, which include a guarantee of equitable distribution of general practitioners across South Australia, the reclassification of Wallaroo Hospital to become the major hospital for Narungga, and the appointment of a Minister for Regional Health.

"One of the primary reasons that we need a significant upgrade in the capability of our local healthcare system is because of the significant number of visitors our region plays host to on a regular basis," Mr Ellis said.

"For example, over the summer holidays we can expect to have an extraordinary number of visitors descend upon our community.

"To that end I am working with caravan parks and other tourism ventures to ensure the petition is available to all of those who visit.

"We need to get to 10,000 signatures and I'm sure visitors, who might

need to rely on our health services while they're here, will be eager to assist our push.

If you are correctly enrolled for state elections in South Australia, you will automatically receive your council ballot papers through the post. You are eligible to be on the state electoral roll if you:

- are an Australian Citizen;
- are 18 years or older; and

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have lived at your address for at least one month.

It is important your electoral enrolment is up to date and includes **your correct postal address** where you can receive your ballot papers. You can check or update your enrolment at **www.ecsa.sa.gov.au/enrolment.**

Council voters roll (supplementary roll):

If you are not enrolled on the state electoral roll you may be eligible to register on the council voters roll if you are:

- a resident or a non-Australian citizen who has lived at your residential address for one month or more
- an owner of an organisation or business
- an owner of a holiday home
- a sole owner, or group of owners, of a rateable property
- a sole occupier, or group of occupiers, of a rateable property
- a landlord of rateable property.

"It has really created a safe non-threatening space for students.


"From my understanding, Gidget loves coming here and the school loves having her.



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Regional medical students supported by new scholarship

THE family of former Yorketown resident, the late Richard Watson has established a scholarship for regional medical students at St Mark's College, Adelaide.

Richard was a medical student at St Mark's from 1956 to 1961 and later served the college in many capacities, including as a member of the College Council from 1976 to 1993.

He was also elected an Honorary Fellow of the College in 1993.

Richard's wife Mary and sons Mark and Guy created the scholarship in his memory after his passing in 2020.

"The Richard Watson Scholarship will be awarded annually to a student from regional Australia who is or will be studying medicine. It will be awarded on the basis of academic excellence, commitment to service, and financial need, and may be awarded to either a new or returning student," a St Mark's spokesperson said.

"Richard Watson was born in Yorketown in 1936.

"Growing up, he spent many hours driving through the countryside making house calls with his father, a GP.

"He was educated at Yorketown Area School and then as a boarder at St Peter's College, where he was a House Prefect and took part in rowing, football, and the debating, science, and music societies."

Richard was actively involved in college life and was also highly regarded as the coxswain of the Adelaide University Boat Club's Senior VIII over several years."

After graduating MB BS, Richard added FRCS (Edinburgh) (1968) and FRACS (1972) to his medical qualifications and his early medical work including lecturing in anatomy at Guy's Hospital, London, in 1964-66, and working mainly in plastic surgery in Bristol and Glasgow (1967-71).

Richard returned to Adelaide as Senior Visiting Specialist (Plastic Surgery) at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, from 1972, and helped set up and was head of the Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery Unit there from 1989.

From 1972, he also lectured in surgery at the University of Adelaide.

"Richard is remembered in the St Mark's community as a kind, gentle, warm-hearted, humble, amusing and engaging man, who was also confidently decisive in a collegial way: in the words of one who knew him well, 'a true delight," the

Engagement for hydrogen and renewable energy

THE Department for Energy and Mining is engaging with the public on a proposed Hydrogen and Renewable Energy Act which will guide the integration of hydrogen and expansion of renewable energy.

The department held a popup booth to raise general community awareness as a part of consultation at Ardrossan on Tuesday, December 6.

"South Australia is already a

world leader in the transition to renewable energy and this landmark Hydrogen and Renewable Energy Act will enable the orderly, competitive, and government-led development of large-scale hydrogen and renewable energy projects within a regulatory framework," a DEM spokesperson said.

"For South Australia to realise its ambition to be a world leader in green hydrogen production for export and

domestic use, stakeholders must have a voice in the finalising the proposed changes."

The spokesperson said development will deliver investment certainty and security and unlock the pipeline of renewable energy projects including partnering with Aboriginal people as coexisting landowners, regulation of the full lifecycle of projects and a pre-competitive process to determine where the state

should host projects.

It will also manage impacts and leverage the benefits for all South Australians, in line with environment, social and governance requirements and provide provisions which enable coexistence of land uses and support fair outcomes communities.

"The South Australian Government is committed to working with Native Title groups, recognising their status as co-existing landowners with the government and other traditional owners... and support their ongoing participation in regulating the sector," the spokesperson said.

"By 2050, South Australia seeks to achieve net-zero carbon emissions, while experts project global electricity capacity will rise by more than 400 per cent.

"The government-led drive to create a green hydrogen economy in South Australia is progressing at scale and at speed through its \$593 million hydrogen jobs plan, which comprises an electrolyser, gridscale storage and power generation by 2025."

Submissions will inform the development of a draft bill, expected to be introduced to parliament by mid-2023.







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

Twelve days of Christmas

DID you know Christmas lasts until the evening of January 5?

"The five golden rings recalled the Books of Moses - the first five books of the Bible, the six geese alaying stood for the six days of creation, the seven swans a-swimming represented the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit found in Isaiah 11 and the eight maids a-milking were the eight Beatitudes found in Matthew 5.

"Nine ladies dancing were the nine fruits of the Spirit found in Galatians 5, love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control, 10 lords a leaping were the Ten Commandments, 11 pipers piping stood for the 11 faithful apostles and 12 drummers drumming represented the key points confessed in the Apostles' Creed.

"Whether you are local or just visiting this beautiful region of South Australia, may you enjoy the 12 days of Christmas and know because of Christ there is hope for tomorrow, and every day into the future. Jesus is the Way, the Truth, and the Life.

Giving back to the school community

MOONTA Area School year 10 students are giving back to their school community by participating in a range of different projects.

Community Studies class members identified different needs and ways to support their school community, through projects including designing and publishing year 10 school newsletters, recycling 10c drink containers, rejuvenating gardens, attending to IT projects, designing stickers and making artwork to put around the school.

With the guidance of teacher Tracey Peters and SSOs Peter Williams, Glenys Schlink and John Andrew, students engaged in activities which gave them the opportunity to do things they had never done before and which would have an impact on others.

"One example of these groups is our 10 cent container recycling group, called the Recycling Rummagers," Mrs Peters said.

"Two or three times a week we have a handful of students go around the school to collect cans from recycled tubs we have set up."

"The money we have raised (just over \$400) helped us fund some of the other different Community Studies projects and allowed us to purchase many plants, tools and other materials."

Students have also been working on regenerating a school garden, with a focus on vegetables to sell to further develop this entrepreneurial venture.

"The area we are working in was previously a bit hard to look at," student Ayden Aurisch said.

"We have put a bit of work into regenerating it and laying an irrigation system.

"We now have garden beds filled with corn, beetroot, tomatoes, eggplant and a few other different things."

Another group of students has been working on creating a sign to officially name a historical hill slope within the school.

"It was unofficially called Huddy's Hill in the 1880s," Mrs Peters said.

"The students researched the background of this location and have designed an information sign which will be physically located on the hill at a later date, to draw attention to its history.

"Our students have been diversifying into some interesting and purposeful projects throughout our school community and they should be quite proud of what they have achieved."

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

Sutcliffe named Magpies' best

Kadina's Cameron Sutcliffe was awarded the A R McLean Medal for Port Adelaide's best and fairest SANFL player at the Adelaide Convention Centre on Monday December 5.

Sutcliffe adds his name to an iconic list of Port Adelaide Magpie greats including Bob Quinn, John Cahill, the late Russell Ebert and Paul Northeast to claim the medal.

Team captain Sutcliffe recorded 128 votes, eight ahead of Sam Mayes while Nick Moore finished third.

"It was pretty humbling to win," he said.

"Your never play to win individual awards, but to have my name in gold letters alongside some of the biggest names in Magpies history is special.

"The premiership is still the ultimate goal, and there are plenty of new faces on the track as we get into pre-season.

"It will be nice to go one better than we did in 2019."

The honour is named after Allan Robert Charles "Big Bob" McLean OBE, who, after retiring as a player at the end of the 1949 season, served as Port Adelaide's secretary and general manager for more than 30 years.

McLean, a right-handed batsman and a leg-break bowler, also appeared in 20 first-class cricket matches for his state.

Port's SANFL coaching team and

manager Shane Grimm award each player a score between zero and five for each game.

This means a player can be awarded a maximum of 20 and a minimum of zero votes for a match. Sutcliffe missed two games through injury early in the season but polled votes in 16 games to win. Now 30 years old, Sutcliffe paid special tribute to outgoing SANFL

coach Matthew Lokan for his tireless efforts.

"It's a really difficult thing to coach the Magpies, especially when 'Lokes' had a lot going on with the AFL side as well but I really appreciate his efforts and think he deserves a round of applause," Sutcliffe said.

"I'd also like to thank the volunteers at the club. "You guys go unrewarded

throughout the year but we really appreciate all you do for us.

'To the entire Port Adelaide Football Club, I know I also work at Alberton day-to-day, thank you for giving me the opportunity to come back from Fremantle and to be able to play for such a great club.

"I really appreciate being a part of it." Bute's Lachlan Jones was also recognised for his top AFL season, winning the Gavin Wanganeen award for Best Player Under 21.

The 186cm, 90kg utility played 14 games in this year's campaign, receiving an AFL Rising Star nomination and displaying his versatility by playing across half forward for a portion of the campaign.





New guidebook highlights key to spraying efficiency

A NEW technical and troubleshooting resource for grain growers is available in the form of a Grains Research and Development Corporation guidebook for mixing and batching agricultural chemicals.

The guidebook is a key outcome of a four-year GRDC extension investment into spray efficiency and efficacy, which also included hands-on sprayer calibration and application workshops for growers.

The guidebook showcases day-today practicalities, with grower case

for the right results.

Egenerae

studies for various enterprise sizes, each bringing different concepts, ideas and creative engineering to spray operations.

For Phil and Tom Longmire, who crop 5700 hectares near Esperance, Western Australia, over six adjoining properties, spraying operations are logistically complex.

"Timeliness of spray operations is critical for their success, and this is contingent on the capacity you have available — both labour and equipment," Mr Longmire said. "We have upgraded our spray equipment over the years, customising it to the area of crop we need to service, but probably the key efficiency gain is how we use our limited labour source, particularly for mixing and batching chemicals."

The Longmires use a tag-team approach to allow for the pre-batching of chemical granules and dry product for the next spray operator.

This means products have time to dissolve and can be pumped straight into the spray units. "Each year we spray around 40,000 hectares," Mr Longmire said.

"When spraying, on average we cover 1000ha per day, which equates to five to six spray tank loads per day."

The case studies included in the guidebook cover a range of operation sizes (both grower and contractor) and crop mixes in different rainfall zones.

They explore the individual requirements – such as farm infrastructure, equipment and staff management – required to service their spray operations. Aspects to consider to identify efficiency gains for mixing and batching agricultural chemicals include water availability, labour availability, farm size and layout, spray units, size and number of units to suit farm conditions, mobility of the units, ease of decontamination and occupational health and safety.

It's flashier than the likes of La La Land but more grounded than The Greatest Showman.


It is a must-watch for musical lovers. 1. Top Gun Maverick

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

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
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
