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CHRISTMAS **MIRACLE?**

Restrictions could ease over the holidays

DESPITE the growing number of COVID-19 cases in the state, restrictions could ease during the holiday season.

After a meeting of the state's COVID Transition Committee this morning (Tuesday, December 14), SA Police Commissioner Grant Stevens said he would be in a position to announce the next phase of the state's COVID-Ready Plan by Friday, December 17.

Mr Stevens said the change would most likely happen between Christmas and the end of the year.

"We continue to review the ongoing situation and latest information available and let the community know of all updates in our response to stopping the spread of COVID-19," he said.

"I was hopeful it was going to be before (Christmas) but the indicators are at this stage that it will be after Christmas but before the end of the year."

The state government had contemplated the next stage of easing restrictions would occur once 90 per cent of the population aged 12 and over was fully vaccinated.

The latest figures show 84.2 per cent of South Australians aged 12 and over are now double dosed, with 91.1 per cent having had their first dose.

As per the state's COVID-Ready Plan, changes could include borders opening to fully vaccinated travellers from interstate and overseas, restrictions on most activities lifted, and high-risk activities including dancing at nightclubs and standing alcohol consumption available to fully vaccinated patrons.

"We haven't landed on what full capacity looks like and there will be different variations for different types of activities but we're trying to make it as simple as possible and provide as much latitude as possible for businesses to operate and take advantage of the relaxation," Mr Stevens said.

"I also encourage people to continue checking in despite the risk of being placed into quarantine for Christmas.

"Unfortunately the pandemic doesn't follow a calendar ... it doesn't recognise Christmas or any other significant event."

Big carrot for health

THE federal government is dangling a more than \$100,000 carrot for doctors and nurse practitioners to work in rural and remote areas.

Part of the government's Mid-Year Economic and Fiscal Outlook report, the move will wipe off university debt for eligible healthcare workers.

If someone were to want to work at Yorketown, they'd have to be there for half as long as it took them to do their degree while elsewhere on the peninsula they'd be employed for the same length of time as their study.

The move will come into effect from January and I hope it is beneficial to the

I mean, \$100,000 less university debt feels like a reasonable incentive to want to give something a go.

This new move aims to direct interested doctors and nurse practitioners away from the bright lights of the city, where traditionally their courses have led them.

RDAA also has slight concerns about changes to Distribution Priority Area status, this will mean practices in Modified Monash Model 3-7 locations can actively recruit international graduates and medical scholarship holders.

Until now, this was reserved for more remote areas but opening it up to large rural towns like Murray Bridge could divert people away from more remote communities.

It's also well and good to say you can recruit international graduates but COVID-19 has made it increasingly difficult to bring people into the country.

The federal government has also been working on a National Rural Generalist Pathway for some time to create space and opportunities for doctors to learn the skills needed in regional areas.

This is great, and must happen. But they're the first step.

We know living in a regional area is the place to be, but there are still more incentives needed.

FOR Yorketown Area School students Harper Davison and Indilee Pedler, yesterday (Monday, December 13) officially marked the beginning of the rest of their lives.

The release of Stage 2 SACE results marked the end of most year 12 students' high school chapter.

After receiving the highest Australian Tertiary Admissions Ranking at Yorketown, Harper will be given a chance in her choice course, a Bachelor of Media (Social Media and Digital Promotion), at The University of Adelaide.

"I'm very excited to move to Adelaide," Harper said.

"I have lived on Yorkes since I was 5 and it's a great place to grow up, but I can't wait to experience life elsewhere.

"I decided to apply for a degree in media as it's currently a very prevalent field and can lead to a lot of different careers."

Harper received Yorketown's Year 12 Academic Achievement Award and also received a distinction for her Flinders University Extension Studies subject in philosophy 'Mind and World'.

"Having a good year in terms of grades was important to me in the sense I wanted to ensure I was pushing myself to do as well as I possibly could," she said.

"I finished my schooling with the majority of the people I started reception with, which was really special, and I know I have a group of lifelong friends."

For Indilee, achieving a high ATAR wasn't such a big issue, as she had already been accepted into a Bachelor of Laws with a Bachelor of International Relations at the University of Adelaide, based on her year 11 results.

Dozens of vax clinics to close over Christmas

ONLY eight of SA Health's 51 COVID-19 vaccination clinics will remain open over the Christmas period.

SA Health said four metropolitan and four regional clinics — along with hundreds of GPs and pharmacies - would provide plenty of opportunities for South Australians to get vaccinated or to receive their booster shots.

"With plenty of appointments available now, we encourage South Australians not to hesitate to book or walk-in for vaccinations so they can stay safe and protect their family this festive season," an SA Health spokesper-

"SA Health vaccination clinics will close on public holidays and we will share information on clinic opening times ahead of the Christmas period so people can plan ahead.

"We thank our hardworking vaccination staff for their incredible effort in vaccinating the community this year."

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis has called for more COVID-19 testing sites to be opened in the Narungga electorate to meet demand and to relieve existing stress on the local health workforce.

"I have contacted the state government for a third time requesting urgent allocation of additional testing sites for our region after constituents have advised the lack of services are now impacting scheduled surgical procedures," Mr Ellis said.

"There is only one testing site in the Narungga electorate that is available for asymptomatic people, and that is at Maitland Hospital.

"Wallaroo Hospital should become an option for surgical patients requiring presurgery testing, and for more testing site

Omicron safety adjustments

THE state government will also be adjusting quarantine requirements for contacts of Omicron, or suspected Omicron, cases.

This adjustment will reduce the quarantine requirements for fully vaccinated close contacts back to seven days, while unvaccinated close contacts of Omicron cases will still need to complete 14 days of quarantine.

This change will align with the response to Delta cases in SA.

As a reminder, vaccinated close contacts still have requirements for a day 13 test, not attend a high risk setting or COVID management plan events, wear a surgical mask when around other people, avoid contact with vulnerable people and avoid shared spaced and maintain physical distancing.

Bay Road open for Christmas

BAY Road, Moonta Bay, will be more accessible over the holiday period.

Site works are set to shut down during Christmas and ramp up again from January 10.

Copper Coast Council director infrastructure services Tim Neumann said the contractor had been instructed to clean the area and open the road over the closed period.

"Traffic management and project update notices have been provided to residents along Bay Road and all associated side roads via mail, VMS boards, council social media platforms and the YP Country Times," Mr Neumann said.

"Due to lost time with collapsing sands, water main shut downs and some inclement weather, the program of works has been adjusted.

"Kerbing and road construction has been rescheduled until late January."

Mr Neumann said underground stormwater works along the main line from Coast Road towards the foreshore had been completed.

"Our focus is now moving forward to the section from Hughes Avenue towards the Moonta township," he said.

"Council is working with SA Power Networks on the installation of electrical conduits for future proofing the undergrounding of powerlines.

"Six crossings between Hughes Avenue and Coast Road are completed, with contractors installing conduits between Coast Road and the foreshore."

The contractor, together with council staff, are working with SA Water where trenching impacts aged SA Water mains.

"Special consideration is required in crossing each water main resulting in temporary shut downs whilst the pipe work is laid and backfilled," Mr Neumann said.

"Residents affected are notified in advance and SA Water is providing alternative water solutions.

"Council is also working with SA Water in applying underground water connections for irrigating the Bay Road median strips."

CEO Russell Peate said Bay Road would be cleaned up as best as it could be for Christmas before works began again in the New Year.

"We want the area to be accessible over this period but we are keen to continue this \$7 million project," Mr Peate

"Large projects are complex, we have to underground powerlines at both ends.


"But, we look forward to it being completed at the end of March?

Increased safety for motorcyclists

THOUSANDS of young motorcyclists transitioned to an enhanced Graduated Licensing Scheme on Monday, November 22.

In an attempt to improve road safety, Minister for Road Safety Vincent Tarzia said the changes would save

"The enhanced licensing system boosts road skills over a longer period, Mr Tarzia said

"We're giving young and novice riders the time they need to hone their skills on

"That additional time means more road experience and gives riders a far greater

chance to arrive home safe."

A learner rider in breach of the new restrictions can be fined \$389 and accrue three demerit points.

Any rider who holds an R-Date licence and is caught with a blood alcohol content greater than zero will be fined \$771 and accrue four demerit points.

The GLS reform was based on recommendations from the Centre for Automotive Safety Research and was strengthened by key road safety stakeholders, motorcycle groups and industry representatives, Mr Tarzia

Debt wiped to attract doctors

THE federal government will eliminate university debt for doctors and nurse practitioners working in rural areas from January.

Federal Minister for Regional Health Dr David Gillespie said the changes would provide a real difference.

Junior doctors who have completed their initial intern year and two post graduate years would receive significant reductions of the Higher Education Loan Program once they had worked in a remote or rural area for a set period of

Those who work in Modified Monash Model (used to measure remoteness and population size) 6-7 communities, which include Yorketown, for a time equivalent to half of their medical degree would have their debt removed.

Health practitioners working in MMM 3-5 areas, which is the rest of the peninsula, would have to work for a time equal to their degree to have their HELP debt eliminated.

Member for Grey Rowan Ramsey said he knew local practices would be working hard to take advantage of the

"Doctor shortages are an issue I have been raising for some time, but it is a multifaceted problem with no easy answers," he said.

"It has been taken incredibly seriously by the government and over the past five years we have committed \$1.3 billion to address the problem.

"Some of the measures, particularly those targeting trainee doctors who want to work in regional practice have been effective, but have a very long time line.

"However, this move on the HELP debts is a here and now measure and can have an immediate impact."

Rural Doctors Association of Australia president Dr Megan Belot said it was step in the right direction.

"If we are truly going to address the doctor shortage in rural Australia, we need to fix gaps that are starkly obvious in the career pipeline," she said.

"The two to three years immediately after medical school are critically important in engaging junior doctors to look at a career in rural medicine.

"Too many of them gravitate towards urban practice in non-GP specialist fields because the pipelines and supports are

"Rural general practice, rural generalist practice and rural consultant specialist practice also need pipelines and supports...and these need to be clearly marketed to junior doctors when they are deciding on their career direction.

"We urgently need to progress implementation of the National Rural Generalist Pathway to make this happen.

"We also need to reform the Workforce Incentive Program to ensure it fully reflects rurality and the scope of services that a Rural Generalist and rural GP provide.

"This measure will not only help meet medical student and junior doctor concerns about large HELP debts, but will make working in a rural town a more attractive option for

Ellis plans for regional health

MEMBER for Narungga Fraser Ellis has released his plan to address the regional health crisis.

Mr Ellis's Regional Health Plan calls for drastic and urgent change to address continuing issues in rural health areas.

"As I have publicly stated many times, regional health care is the biggest issue facing the Narungga electorate — and all country South Australians — and it was an issue long before the pandemic and will continue to be one long after it is finished," Mr Ellis said.

"During the past three and a half years, I am proud to have played a part in securing local improvements such as the new surgical unit at Yorketown, after-hours X-rays and a salaried doctors model for Wallaroo Hospital under a new Rural Health Workforce Plan, and decentralising local health network boards.

"But problems still exist, and it is clear the status quo can't remain."

Mr Ellis said he consulted with rural health professionals across the state, as well as constituents and the Minister for Health about his

"The critical issue is the shortage of doctors,"

There are a large number of carrots in place to encourage doctors to work in the country, but few are working. It is time to get a stick out."

Mr Ellis is calling for responsibility to be given to local health networks to employ accident and emergency doctors, increased funding for those LHNs to allow them to be recognised training providers and the appointment of an assistant minister for regional health.

"I believe we need the discerning allocation of Medicare Provider numbers by the Federal Government to ensure efficient distribution of GPs across the state and State Government to appoint an Assistant Minister for Regional Health delivered as a priority," he said.

"If I am re-elected as the Member for Narungga I give my word to the people of our electorate that regional health care will be my primary focus."

CRUISING down George Street in Moonta could become a little slower.

Councillor Brent Walker raised the possibility of reducing the speed limit on the town's main street during Copper Coast Council's December

The speed limit between Blanche Terrace and Ellen Street has already been lowered to 40km/h.

"The current speed limit of 50km/h between the intersection of George Street and Ellen Street and down to the intersection of George and William Street should be reduced to 40km/h," Mr Walker said.

"I have spoken to all affected residents and various businesses along George Street and there has been near unanimous support for this pro-

"I am proposing the speed limit alteration also include the area adjacent to Queen Square as this is where families and children can be seen enjoy-

"It would also be obviously beneficial when markets are being held in the square.

"The main streets of both Wallaroo and Kadina have speed limits of 40km/h and this motion ensures conformity for the three towns' CBD areas."

A letter from the Moonta and District Progress Association supported the speed limit change.

MDPA president Matthew Stock said the progress association supported the extension of the 40km/h zone in George Street to be extended to the corner of William and George Street.

"We believe this will have the benefit of increased safety along the main street," Mr Stock

"It will reduce the number of drivers who do not notice the speed reduction as it currently

"It will also bring Moonta in line with Wallaroo and Kadina creating a uniform speed for main shopping areas within the Copper

CEO Russell Peate said council would send the motion to the Department for Infrastructure and Transport for consideration.

"I believe if it replicates Wallaroo and Kadina and with the support of elected members and Moonta Progress it could be favourable — but it is their (DIT) decision not ours," Mr Peate said.

Another view of local history

LOCALS were given a chance to look at some of Moonta Mines' historical landmarks in a completely different way recently.

Contractor Nelson Surveyors spent a couple of days using laser survey technology to capture National Heritage listed areas including Richmans and Hughes Enginehouses.

The project is part of the National Trust SA's major conservation and tourism development project at the Moonta Mines national heritage site.

Nelson Boquin and his team created the first 3D digital renderings of the mine areas and key buildings using the latest in laser survey and drone technol-

"It's the first step in us moving forward with the conservation management plan," National Trust of SA Moonta branch chairperson Stephen Stock said.

"We want to bring people along with us, so we will continue where we can, to hold sessions like this and let people see how it all works.

"It's a good step as part of the big picture, these surveys will allow us to preserve and conserve these heritage areas."

Mr Boquin said it took about a day to get one structure surveyed.

"When it's done, they have got it for life," he said.

"The data is stored on a worldwide database - it's the same technology they used to scan the Notre Dame and what they're using to rebuild it."

Wolfe's brain tumour battle

HEARING your child has a tumour in their brain is any parent's worst nightmare; however, it has become a reality for Kira Bromley and Joel Stevens.

Their 3-year-old son Wolfe started complaining about head pain on October 9 which triggered Kira.

"It didn't really seem to bother him too much; however, this alarmed me straight away as I too presented with headaches at the age of 2, leading me to a diagnosis of familial multiple cavernous malformation syndrome," she said.

"This is a hereditary condition that causes clusters of blood vessels that typically grow in the brain, brain stem, and

"These blood vessels have abnormally thin walls which leaves them vulnerable to haemorrhage."

By October 12 the pain had become unbearable for Wolfe to the point he was hitting his head to try to make the pain disappear.

"I took him to the emergency department of the Women's and Children's Hospital, after a long visit the doctor concluded a CT or an MRI wouldn't be necessary at that current point in time," Kira said.

"(We were told) to record his headaches, any suspected triggers and he informed me of signs to watch out for.

"I took him home and on October 14 he spent the majority of the day sleeping, at this point I was really concerned because Wolfe is usually a very active and bubbly child."

On October 18, Kira noticed Wolfe was walking strangely; however, she was unsure if her eyes were deceiving her so she sent him to child care.

"An hour or so after dropping him off, the child care called to say he was shaking and in a lot of pain," Kira said.

"I picked him up straight away and by lunch time he vomited on me (one of the signs to watch for).

"Immediately, I told my mum I needed to take him to emergency so we took him to a country hospital.

'No neurological tests were done; Wolfe was in a bad way so we left the hospital with no idea as to what was going on."

Kira decided to take Wolfe back to the Women's and Children's Hospital where he underwent testing and a CT scan.

"At this point, he was still really sleepy and was becoming more difficult to wake," she said.

"As we waited in the little room the doctor came in to tell us that he had a large mass in his midbrain between the pineal gland and the cerebellum and we were about to be on a long journey.

'The feeling in that moment is like nothing I could ever explain.

'The doctor said that they needed to take him in for emergency surgery to relieve the pressure that had built up in his head from the tumour."

Kira said the tumour obstructed the pathway for the cerebral spinal fluid to flow from the brain to the spinal cord.

"As a result, he had acquired hydrocephalus and a tonsillar herniation (his cerebellum pushing down in to the spinal cord space)," she said.

"The pressure and the herniation had caused his brain to start shutting down and this is why he was hard to wake.

"If we had left him any longer, it would have been fatal."

Wolfe was taken in for biopsy and endoscopic third ventriculostomy (ETV) which created a pathway for the fluid to move through the ventricle on October 23.

The biopsy results found that the tumour was in fact a cavernous malformation and it had bled," she said.

"On October 29 we got to return home to Yorke Peninsula; however, by November 4 his walking had started to become a little unsteady again.

We took him back to the emergency department where he had a CT that revealed the ETV had failed and this meant he had to have it converted to a

A GOFUNDME page has been set up to help ease the financial pressure on Wolfe Stevens and his family.

Mum Kira Bromley said the situation has been life changing and in 2022 the family will move back to Adelaide to have immediate access to help if anything happens.

"Throughout this time, we have had to spend most of our time in Adelaide, meaning there is no income from usual work to cover the costs of rent, bills, and living," she said.

"We are so grateful for the support we have had from the GoFundMe our beautiful friend Carley (Forrest) set up for us.

"It has been really difficult to accept this kind of help but the funds raised so far have helped us immensely with living costs while we go through this with Wolfe."

lifelong shunt that would run from the brain to the stomach."

Kira said throughout the process Wolfe's personality has changed, he drags his words and he's no longer able to run.

"This has been extremely difficult to process and so heartbreaking to see him struggle," she said.

"In the new year, he may be having a surgery to remove the cavernoma; however, the surgery is still up in the air as it has many risks that come with it, including blindness.

"Leaving the cavernoma in also has risks including another stroke with further deficits and seizures, et cetera.

"This has made us feel hopeless but the days as they come."


"Each student was given a pillowcase to decorate and take home, to start their own personal emergency kit."





"Next year, I will be offering our years 9 and 10 students photography."





The school embraces a holistic approach to it's recycling in all the usual areas, but it's food waste recycling where students really shine.

All leftovers from the morning fruit snack are collected and taken to feed the school's chickens, which begins the cycle of creating more fresh fruit and veg-

Year 1/2 teacher Olivia Clifford started the initiative after winning a Woolworths Junior Landcare Grant worth \$1000 for a sustainable garden project plus a bee bonus worth \$500.

Ms Clifford's students feed the chooks, and are responsible for composting, the school worm farm

"The students absolutely love the concept," she said. "They've just totally taken ownership of it and they're very responsible, they ask to go and complete the jobs that are needed each day.

They really understand why we are doing it and that we are making a better future for ourselves."

Ms Clifford said the students embraced National Recycling Week each year.

The students also maintain an egg incubator and chick hatchery, the latter made by year 2 student, Taj Davey and his dad Ben.

Bilateral cataracts

Cataracts are the commonest and safest operation in the world.

Same-day bilateral cataract surgery may be more convenient for patients — with less time off work, only a single trip to hospital, often more cost effective and faster full recovery — but is associated with worse visual outcomes.

Previously, the main argument against same-day surgery has been infection, but that risk can be effectively mitigated by using completely separate equipment between

Recent data from the IRIS Registry in the USA shows, of 1.8 million patients split between same-day bilateral surgery and delayed bilateral surgery, the same-day option was associated with worse visual outcomes.

The delayed surgery cohort was broken into an early group (second eye operated within 14 days), and a late group (second eye operated within three months); the bestperforming group was the early delayed, followed by the late delayed, while the sameday group came in last.

On average, the same-day group performed worse by three to four letters in uncorrected vision, despite having better presurgical vision, compared to the delayed groups; also, the proportion who achieved uncorrected 20/20 vision in the second eye was smaller in the same-day group (21 per cent) compared to the delayed group (24.2

There is a role for same-day cataract surgery: in cases where anaesthetic may be risky, or intellectual disability, where the goal is to reduce the number of trips to hospital. Source: insight.com.au

PBAS principal Joelene Anderson commended Vaughan and Cohen for their initiative and effort, saying it required an extension of their research skills and knowledge for the extra-curricular task.

"We put a fibreglass liner in to the gutter and it was good but if we got a heavy rain the water would run over the top and fall onto the timber court surface, sometimes even during games.

"We applied for a grant from the Office for Recreation, Sport and Racing and were lucky enough to get \$21,350 towards the work.

"All the advice we received was a new section of roof was required."

McMahon said the association is enjoying excellent numbers in the junior ranks.

"Because we've got plenty of juniors we're getting lots of mums and dads and grandparents which is putting more money through the gate which in turn is putting more money back into the facility," he said.

Local contractor Jamie Giles, of Giles Roofing, completed the works with SYPBA funding the rest of remainder of the project.


Giles even had help from his partner Kelly Porter, an ambulance officer, who found herself high up on the roof putting in hundreds of screws to help complete the project on time.



FARMERS across the country are facing an anxious wait as they attempt to secure fertiliser and herbicide for 2022.

The pandemic, associated shut downs and shipping backlogs have created a perfect storm with the potential for some farmers to miss out on the sought-after commodities completely.

Prices have been sky-rocketing in recent months with superphosphate

more than double its usual price and urea, four times its pre-COVID price at around \$1500 per tonne.

Chemical supplier Jill Vater said everything that could go wrong has gone wrong.

"COVID-19, I think, has weakened the global economy and put everything on its weakest edge, and if you then throw in the China-Australia political row and massive shipping delays, there are serious concerns," she said.

Chinese energy policy has resulted in massive reductions in the production of yellow phosphorus, the key ingredient in soluble fertilisers and other chemicals, adding to supply reductions.

Yellow phosphorus is also the key ingredient to glyphosate, the most commonly used herbicide in Australia, with China and the US the major global suppliers.

"Monsanto, which is now owned by Bayer, also has a massive plant in Louisiana which normally produces glyphosate but Hurricane Ida took that plant out of action," Ms Vater

"So, you have these rippling effects adding to the situation, which now has the glyphosate price up to \$12 per litre, nearly three times its normal

"We're paying the price of putting all our eggs in the China basket."

Yorketown farmer Jo Honner said the extra costs are something he'll just have to wear and is more concerned with the timing of supply.

"Supply is the biggest worry, we haven't been in this position before even though we've been close," he

"Last year we were cutting it pretty fine, even though I got my order in early, and that made me nervous, but we still got it but next year could see significant delays and time will cost you most of all."

Mr Honner said machinery orders were also a big concern.

"Sometimes you can be 12 months out with what you've ordered," he said.

"I had a header front (comb) ordered for this harvest 11 months ago and I'm still waiting for it, and spare parts are the same.

GM canola most valuable

SOUTH Australian farmers are reaping the rewards of being able to grow GM canola with local crops currently the most valuable in the country.

The November Bayer GM Canola Market Report revealed SA crops are priced at \$915 per tonne compared with \$840 per tonne in Victoria and \$830 per tonne in the traditionally strong Western Australian market.

"It also brings our farmers and researchers onto a level playing field with their counterparts around the country who have had access to GM technology for at least a decade."







Recipe, Tommy ruff menuiere with lemon caper sauce - Ingredients: 6 tommy ruff fillets, 2 tspn caperberries, 4 tblspn butter, 1 tspn minced garlic, lemon juice, chopped parsley, plain flour. Preparation: Dust fish fillets with flour. Melt butter in small pan, then add chopped capers, garlic, lemon juice and cook slowly for 30 sec. Stir. Cook fish in more melted butter and plate. Drizzle warm sauce over fish and serve with a cool glass of Riesling.

Wallaroo: Off-shore winds from the east to northeast finally arrived on Sunday as temperatures rose and the water cleared. allowing anglers to visit the jetty and fish for blue swimmer crabs, squid (at night) and tommy ruff (Australian herring). Salmon, gar and squid have been the main targets at Point Riley, while shore-based anglers fished for yellowfin whiting near the old boat ramp at

Port Hughes/Moonta Bay: A few King George whiting were caught from the northern end of the Steamer channel over the weekend as marine traffic increased in direct relation to the good weather. Salmon trout are at Bird Reef and gar can be caught off West Light. The jetties have a few blueys.

Point Turton: The Banks rewarded earlymorning boat anglers on the outgoing tides with whiting, squid and some decent tommies. The local jetty has ruff and squid, while again the grounds out from Minlacowie hold garfish and squid.

Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: The big squid and tommy ruff runs continue from both jetties. Offshore crews are targeting tuna, red nannygai, sweep and KG whiting. Water temps are still low, keeping the big barrel tuna in deeper water for the moment. Mullet and salmon trout have been caught from Daly Head and Gvm Beach.

Edithburgh/Stansbury: Persistent southerly winds were the order of the day last week, but that did not stop jetty anglers doing well on tommy ruff. I enjoyed a good catch at Edithburgh ietty last Tuesday as a few hardy boat crews launched from Stansbury to fish for whiting, bluevs and garfish.

Ardrossan: I had an unconfirmed report of a couple of soapies (legal mulloway) coming from the jetty on Saturday night, along with tommy ruff and squid. Boat anglers are trying hard to catch a feed of gar, squid and blue crabs.



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

Sparking outrage

Despite the private use of fireworks being illegal in South Australia, a group of young partygoers put on a New Year's Eve display which could have gone horribly wrong. In video footage which went viral, a girl leant down face first to light the top of the firework. A man wearing thongs kicked the firework, sending the sparks flying into his friend's path before they moved just in time to avoid serious injury.

Innes the park of the month

Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park was celebrated in January, with National Parks and Wildlife Service South Australia naming it Park of the Month. Located on the southern tip of Yorke Peninsula, the park has been a popular beachside camping holiday spot for generations.

Cemetery vandalism

A historical bell weighing more than 100 kilograms was significantly damaged after a spate of vandalism at the Moonta cemetery. The 125-year-old bell was removed from its tower and smashed, and two brass plaques were also stolen in December.

Jetty reopens for summer

Locals and visitors returned to the Port Hughes jetty before Christmas. The jetty had been closed since August when it was damaged by a storm. Repairs by Copper Coast Council and contractor Maritime Constructions included pile driving the jetty to install two steel bored piles and reinstating four crossheads.

Bute hall's new lease on life

Bute Soldiers' Memorial Hall was opened to the public, more than 12 months after it was closed due to safety concerns about the roof and ceiling.

YP groups receive safety grants

Yorke Peninsula community organisations shared in funding through the RAA Regional Safety Grants. The grants help fund critical projects to improve the safety and wellbeing of local communities. Marion Bay CFS, Weavers Ag Bureau, Lochiel Progress Association and Riding for the Disabled Association Yorke Peninsula collectively received nearly \$16,000.

Adelaide Strikers hold clinic for keen cricketers

A small but enthusiastic bunch of junior cricketers braved the heat to participate in the Adelaide Strikers Holiday Program at Moonta oval. The cricketers spent time working on their skills before playing some games.

Dumping ground

Thousands of donations were made to the Copper Coast Salvation Army's Kadina op shop during the Christmas and New Year period — but most items had to be thrown out. Items placed on the footpaths, even if alongside the donation bins, are considered to have been illegally dumped and are often ruined by the weather before they can be

Facebook's message to Aussie users




Wallaroo resident Colin Roberts signed up to the World's Greatest Shave and had his head shaved to raise money for the Leukaemia Foundation.


South Australian firefighters were named among the nation's fastest first responders according to a 2021, Productivity Commission report on Government Services.

Maitland Hospital reached a critical shortage of doctors, resulting in several patients being turned away from the emergency department. The town medical clinic provides three physicians for the hospital's on-call roster, the remaining shifts being filled by Ardrossan GPs and SA Health contracted locums since earlier this year. Concerns were raised about the level of care given by the locums, with reports patients were being sent back to their general practitioners

\$3 million for wastewater

Barunga West Council received \$3m in state government funding to improve wastewater management for Port Broughton and Fisherman Bay. The funding commitment will allow the Port Broughton community wastewater management system on Arbon Road to be upgraded and expanded to service Fisherman Bay.

Huge cash boost for local sporting facilities

Local sporting organisations received funding to upgrade their facilities from the SA Recreation and Sport Grassroots Facilities Program. Minlaton District Community and Sports Centre received \$445,400 to complete redevelopments at the Minlaton sporting complex. Bute Sporting Club received nearly \$200,000 to upgrade its changerooms into unisex facilities and the trainers' and officials' rooms, plus equipment storage areas and verandahs. Port Vincent Progress Association received \$37300 to upgrade and resurface three courts at the town's sports hub, and Southern Yorke Peninsula Basketball Association's \$21350 will be used to replace the Minlaton stadium roof and install solar panels. Copperclub Golf and Community Association received \$12,400 to construct an on-course toilet block and drinking fountain at The Dunes, Port Hughes.

Groups catch latest wave of Stronger **Communities grants**

Yorke Peninsula community groups received funding through the latest round of the federal government's Stronger Communities Program. Ardrossan Progress Association, Yorkes Junior Surf Club and Port Broughton Historical Association shared in almost \$15,000. Yorkes Junior Surf Club, in Corny Point, received \$7000 to purchase an equipment shed and clubrooms.

Copper Coast Battle Dragons are big winners

Copper Coast Dragon Boat Club was well rewarded at the annual Dragon Boat South Australia awards, held at Glenelg Golf Club on May 29. It was smiles all around for the 19 Copper Coast Battle Dragon paddlers and partners who attended the dinner when the club received the richly deserved Regional Club of the Year Award.

Brutal attack

A man who bashed another man's face with a metal baseball bat and then doused him in petrol at Wallaroo was sentenced to jail. Mark Popowycz, 38, pleaded guilty to aggravated recklessly causing serious harm and aggravated threatening to cause serious harm in the District Court on June 2.



Copper Coast Council received \$1.11 million from the federal government to establish the centre, which started offering 10 courses earlier this year

Black Point ramp rebuild starting

The Black Point boat ramp modifications began, and were expected to be complete by late September. Yorke Peninsula Council formally accepted a \$330,000 SA Boating Facilities Fund grant last year, and committed a maximum of \$250,000 towards modifying the ramp.

Moonta man \$100k richer after winning Keno twice in one week

A Moonta man claimed two Keno Spot 8 prizes — both worth \$50,000 — within just five days. His first ticket was drawn on June 12, before his weekly winnings totalled to \$100,000 when his second lot of lucky numbers was read out on June 16.

SYP childcare survey

A group advocating for childcare options on southern Yorke Peninsula asked the community to complete a survey so specific data could be given to providers. More than 170 families responded to an initial online survey, in September last year, which found Minlaton to be the preferred location for future child care.

Bute's silos were set to receive a makeover thanks to \$50,000 of funding through the federal government's Tackling Tough Times Together program. Barunga West Council will match the funding, bringing the total project cost to \$100,000.

Green light for infrastructure



The steamship Clan Ranald came to grief near Troubridge Hill, south-west of Edithburgh, on January 31, 1909. Of the 63 crew aboard, 40 lost their lives and were buried in the Edithburgh Cemetery.

150th Kadina Show

After years of planning, the 150th Kadina Show finally arrived. The event had only been cancelled twice in its history — in 2020, and 1942 when the Kadina AH&F Society was asked to keep the showground free as a staging area for the troops. The two-day event looked slightly different this year, but was still jam packed with everything from shearing demonstrations to colouring competitions.

\$3 million boost for Dhilba **Guuranda-Innes National Park**

It was announced the state government would invest \$3m in a new lookout, upgraded campgrounds and improved visitor facilities for three sites in Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park.

Liddys call last drinks

Publicans Dennis and Jenny Liddy called last drinks on their hospitality career, which spanned 35 years. Having moved to Moonta in 2006 for a sea change, the couple took over the lease of the Royal Hotel where they served the community for 15 years.

Fisherman Bay freeholding wins development approval

Fisherman Bay secured its final development approval from the State Commission Assessment Panel. The panel approved the division of land currently held by Fisherman's Bay Management Authority into 432 freehold allotments.

Airstrip upgrades propelled forward by \$250k in funding

Maitland and Copper Coast airstrips received a combined \$250,000 in federal funding for upgrades. Yorke Peninsula Council will get \$220,000 to reseal and line mark Maitland's airstrip. Copper Coast Council will receive \$30,000 for certification works to allow for a GPS arrival process to be installed and implemented to allow all-weather landing in Kadina.

Bettongs are back

One of Australia's rarest marsupials, the brush-tailed bettong, was reintroduced on Yorke Peninsula more than a century after going extinct locally. Forty of the nationally endangered animals were released at Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park. The 28 females and 12 males were translocated from nearby Wedge Island, where more than 1500 brush-tailed bettongs live.

Rolling up for vaccinations

About 42 per cent of Yorke Peninsula residents had received their first COVID-19 vaccine as of Tuesday, August 10. Figures provided in August from SA Health revealed a steady increase in vaccination numbers across the peninsula since June.

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

The event was nearly sold out on all three days by loyal locals and visitors from across the state. Exhibitors reported that, whilst attendance was down, enquiry levels were promising.

Eagles go back-to-back

Woodville-West Torrens, featuring a pair of Yorke Peninsula talents, claimed its second consecutive SANFL premiership, by 67 points against Glenelg. Small forward Angus Poole, Kadina, and ruckman Jarrad Redden, Southern Eagles, contributed to the back-toback triumph. Jake von Bertouch, Kadina, was unfortunately left out of the team, while Curramulka's Matthew Goldsworthy suffered a hamstring injury in the semifinal and was unable to take the field.

Barnes Seafood slapped by jetty regulations

Barnes Seafood, Port Broughton, was ruled ineligible to use the town's jetty in order to safely secure its vessels and transport produce. State government restrictions meant commercial boats couldn't moor at jetties for longer than four hours.

Medical staff needed at Maitland

Maitland residents called for increased medical support at their local hospital. There had been several occasions when the Maitland Hospital had no doctors available on site. A lack of local doctors had continued to place stress on communities and affect the care and admission of inpatients.

Get Stoked visits **Edithburgh**

The Lighthouse Youth Project was engaged to hold a Get Stoked BMX workshop for kids at Edithburgh. The event was intended to share the joy of BMX riding and teach skills to kids of any ability. The Day at the 'Burgh organising committee member Di Griffiths said engaging children in activities like this could help improve mental wellbeing.

Moonta lights tour returns

The National Trust SA, Moonta branch, announced its renowned Christmas lights tour would return after a year off due to COVID-19. Residents were expected to register their households to be included in the light displays.

Solar farms proposed

Two new solar farm proposals were made within Kadina's town boundaries. MPower, New South Wales, lodged applications for a pair of farms on industrial-zoned land in the town's CBD. There had been no provisions in Copper Coast Council's development plan regarding solar farms, but there was also nothing to oppose the concept.

Black spot clear issue at Tickera

A lack of phone coverage became an increasing issue for Tickera residents. The community had been lobbying better internet service for up to 20 years, with the town being a confirmed black spot for coverage.

Neumann notches BnF

Kadina local Will Neumann took out the best and fairest award for Woodville-West Torrens U18s. Neumann topped off his premiership success earlier in the year alongside Will Pearce, Paskeville, who notched his side's most improved

North Coast Road gets overlooked

North Coast Road, Point Turton, was overlooked for grant funding despite being ranked as a higher priority than some successful projects. Yorke Peninsula Council applied for \$1.41 million in state government funding to seal four kilometres of road, but was unsuccessful.

Promising YVBA competition

A range of very strong competitions took to the court for rounds 2 and 3 of the Yorke Valley Basketball Association juniors and seniors. Kadina's A Men remained undefeated after its opening few matches, while Arthurton Black shaped up as clear favourite in the Senior Women comp

Freeholding for Fisherman Bay

Residents of Fisherman Bay were on track to receive their first freehold titles after more than a decade of fighting. Fisherman's Bay Management previously reached an agreement with Barunga West Council that it would invest funds from title sales into the town's infrastructure. The town upgrades were set to include a wastewater collection system and upgraded roads, among other infrastructure improvements.

Big upgrade for **Edmund Street**

Barunga West Council approved a \$15,000 upgrade for Edmund Street, Port Broughton. The road's issues were brought to the attention of council after many locals complained about the road and footpath late last year. Council was set to engage tenders the following month.

Harvest begins new oval

Harvest Christian College, Kadina, commenced a \$700,000 upgrade for a new AFL-sized oval. The oval had been part of the college's master plan for years, and the self-funded project was finally set to come to fruition with the help of tenderer Greene Eden, Adelaide.

New journalists at YP Country Times

The Yorke Peninsula Country Times welcomed a pair of new faces to its editorial team. Patrick Goldsmith, cadet journalist, and Nigel Parsons, journalist, were both hired from a strong pool of candidates for their respective positions.

Community grants handed out by BWC

Barunga West Council rolled out about \$40,000 in grant funding to 10 community groups. Mayor Leonie Kerley said council was pleased with the standard of submissions. Port Broughton RSL sub-branch and Bute Community Gym were the highest-receiving groups, landing \$5000 each.

Trail work begins

Work began on the Wallaroo to Moonta shared path. When completed, the Copper Coast Council project will stretch 14.4 kilometres between the two towns and has received support from the state government, Moonta Lions Club and Apex Club of Kadina.

Sir Richard celebrated

A statue celebrating the achievements of Sir Richard Williams and the centenary of the formation of the Royal Australian Air Force was unveiled in Moonta. Sir Richard grew up in Moonta and is considered by many to be the father of the RAAF.

YP passenger ferry sunk

A proposal to run a passenger ferry from Glenelg to Port Vincent will not progress. SeaLink indicated an interest in the service in 2019 but the project was canned as it did not receive enough government support.

Tourism plan developed for Wardang Island

Community members discussed ideas for future tourism developments at Wardang Island. A community consultation session was held to create a master plan for the space, with attendees including government departments and Point Pearce Aboriginal Corporation.

Hunt for hydrogen

An exploration company indicated its intent to explore southern Yorke Peninsula's hydrogen field. Gold Hydrogen Pty Ltd was granted a 9500 square kilometre tenement across parts of SYP and Kangaroo Island and planned to explore the asset across the next three years.

Woman arrested after deliberate fires

A 48-year-old Minlaton woman was charged with six counts of causing a bushfire after allegedly lighting grassfires across central Yorke Peninsula. At least 50 CFS crews and farm firefighting units put out the six blazes before any serious damage occurred.

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

Barunga West Council buried a new time capsule to replace the one removed as part of Port Broughton's 150 year celebrations. The capsule included photos for the township, a program from the history festival, a local phone book and students' work, and is set to be opened on June 12, 2071.

Five-year transport plan in motion

After more than a year of planning, Copper Coast Council elected members approved a five-year transport and infrastructure plan. The plan consisted of timelines for resheeting, reconstructing and resheeting of local roads as well as footpaths, stormwater management and the sealing of unsealed roads within the townships.

Landowners pleased with access report

Ongoing unseasonal weather caused mixed fortunes for Yorke Peninsula farmers. Heavy spring rain and storms damaged northern crops but farmers were still hopeful for solid returns.

SP Hay in liquidation

SP Hay, which had a processing plant at Paskeville, was placed in liquidation with more than 66 unsecured unrelated creditors owed more than \$4 million. The debt was expected to increase as creditors lodged claims with the liquidator.
