


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Rex commits to next phase, ramps up plans

REX Minerals has committed to moving forward with financing and operational plans for its Hillside copper-gold mine project, south of Ardrossan.

The company announced it will seek finance worth \$850 million to begin construction of the project.

However, farmers on neighbouring lands continue to raise concerns about the mine's environmental impact.

Subject to finance, stage one including delivery of the first concentrate, has been scheduled for late 2025, with

processing plant construction set to begin next year and general mine operation in 2024.

Rex expects to provide employment for more than 500 people during site construction and more than 400 during operations.

The mine is expected to produce 42,000 tonnes of copper and 30,000 ounces of gold each year for the first 11 years of operation.

Rex CEO Richard Laufmann said the company remained on track to become a significant Australian copper producer.

"Despite the current global headwinds, the economics remain robust, and Hillside is

planned to be in production at a time when the world will require a significant amount of copper to drive global electrification initiatives," he said

"We have received strong interest from a range of external financiers, traditional and nontraditional lenders, equipment suppliers and the major copper smelters and metal trading companies.

"This is an exciting time for copper developers, for Rex Minerals, for shareholders, and for the South Australian and local communities which are poised to reap regional economic benefit from Hillside."

There are also the crossover works at Bridge Road and High Street with the same problem but not quite as severe as the other one previously mentioned.

Surely the state must get involved to rectify these sorts of dangers and drivers' comfort if they are serious about the reason they are employed by we taxpayers.



Locals raise Rex doubts

BRENTON Davey, of Pine Point, said he believed Rex would find it incredibly difficult to fund the project.

Mr Davey, whose family has owned land neighbouring the proposed mine site for 150 years, said they've been opposing the development since 2007.

"I don't want them destroying a future generation of farming," he

"We know from the original little Hillside mine at this site, that everyone who has touched it has gone bust, and I think history will repeat itself and it'll happen again.

They haven't got finance yet and they're struggling to get it (finance) to construct this project, and, with the economic climate we've got here now, that's only going to get worse.

"Furthermore, they've been given a deadline by the Department for Energy and Mining to commence mining by the end of year; they haven't even started the roads, which need to be completed first."

One of the first projects Rex must complete is a diversion of the Yorke Highway, further east to the St Vincent Gulf and south towards

A Department for Energy and Mining spokesperson said Rex had notified the department it would start mining operations by December 31 this year.

"Early works will include road diversion works, groundwater and geotechnical investigations, together with ongoing community engagement and other supporting activities," the spokesperson said.

"Since approval of the PEPR in 2020, DEM has focused significant regulatory effort to the oversight of the Hillside Project to ensure Rex Minerals adheres to all regulatory requirements and obligations.

Should Rex Minerals breach its regulatory requirements, DEM will apply its compliance tools in accordance with the requirements of the Mining Act 1971 and compliance and enforcement policy.

Out at sea for three more years

YORKE Peninsula Council will push ahead with its plan to upgrade the boat launching facility at Marion Bay; however, the project won't be completed for at least another three years.

YPC elected members voted last Wednesday, December 14, to endorse the boat ramp design and commit in principle to fund construction should they be successful

through the South Australian Boating Facilities Fund.

The Fund is committed for the next two years, rendering funding unavailable until the 2025-26 finan-

The project has been costed at \$2.7 million; however, council expects rising building costs will mean the figure jumps to \$3m by the time funding is available.

Should it gain funding, council may be eligible to receive up to 80 per cent of the total project cost, leaving it with a contribution of \$600,000 (for a total project worth \$3m).

CEO Andrew Cameron said, while the ramp is owned and controlled by council, it's acknowledged the costs involved are beyond its financial

"Council has committed to funding the construction of the facility, subject to receiving funds from the South Australian Boating Facilities Fund," he said.

The designs for the new ramp feature two lanes for different length vessels, a walkway between, wave attenuation past the ramp end and parking space for 36 vehicles with trailers and

Marion Bay resident Craig Thompson said it was ridiculous the community and tourists should be forced to wait another three years for

"Don't get me wrong we appreciate the work done by YPC, in particular director assets and infrastructure services Andre Kompler, for getting the ramp proposal this far," he said.

"It's all very well to say it's going ahead but then to say in another three years is downright disgusting.

"Surely, after so long in discussion with the South Australian Boating Facility Advisory Committee, they should see this ramp at Marion Bay as a priority and release the appropriate funding, thus allowing council to start the work within the next 12 months.

"Everyone down here says we're the forgotten part of the peninsula and it's

The building is set to also be illuminated to coincide with each officer's funeral.



Concealment laws take effect

KILLERS who hide their victims' bodies will be subject to tough penalties under laws which came into effect on Friday, December 16.

The reforms address a deficiency in South Australian laws, which did not previosly specifically criminalise the concealment, mutilation, destruction of or interference with human remains.

People found guilty of the new offences will face up to an extra 15 years in prison and, where the acts are done to frustrate criminal investigations, sentences will be cumulative.

Members of the public who find human remains are also obliged to report the find to South Australia Police, or face a five-year prison term.

Attorney-General Kyam Maher said the absence of the specific offence had been a significant shortcoming in the legal system.

"We've seen cases where attempts by a victim's family and loved ones to find closure have been thwarted when an offender refuses to help authorities find their victim," Mr Maher said.

"This will ensure offenders who try to stymie a police investigation and add to the already significant trauma experienced by a victim's family and friends can be prosecuted and punished appropriately."

Whale removed at Corny Point

AUTHORITIES have removed a deceased juvenile sperm whale which was found on a reef off Corny Point last week.

The seven metre whale was observed on the submerged reef at about noon on Tuesday, December 13.

National Parks and Wildlife Service rangers towed the carcass at high tide to deeper waters beyond Wedge Island at about 7pm on Friday, December 16.

A NPWS spokesperson said they were investigating the whale's death.

"It was observed alive last weekend in nearby Hardwicke Bay but looked to be in poor health," the spokesperson said.

"Whale carcasses will naturally break down over time but

this can be a slow process that takes several months.

"Members of the public are advised to stay a safe distance from the carcass as marine animals can carry various diseases that are transmissible to humans.

"Sharks also will be attracted to the carcass, which potentially creates an increased risk for water users in the area."

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Mixed feelings towards proposed Fisherman Bay freeholding changes

BARUNGA West Council has received mixed reactions towards proposed changes to the Fisherman Bay Freeholding Project from residents following two recent public consultation sessions.

Council is currently developing proposals regarding traffic management, fencing, landscaping coastal protection areas and foreshores, and providing beach access for Fisherman Bay.

Due to the transition to freehold titles, council will take ownership of roads and open space from Fisherman Bay Management from mid-2023.

Council CEO Maree Wauchope said roads are due to be upgraded to public roads next year and, as such, need extra space for emergency access.

"As a result, if council is to allow roadside parking, we are faced with making some roads one way only,"

"The roads are very narrow and some houses have no driveways or areas to park on the property, so we know on-street parking is necessary.

"The roads we are considering making one way include the eastern leg of Whiting Road, Mullet Road and Trout Road, which will impact about one-third of residents."

Informal parking will no longer be allowed along Trout Road, Mullet Road, Whiting Road and Silver Whiting Road and Catfish Lane.

Other proposals include the potential relocation of the western beach playground to free up limited space near the seawall while also putting in place a 'local traffic only' area along Whiting Road.

"Council's planning expert is proposing open style fencing at a maximum height of 1.2 metres with conditions regarding setbacks," Ms Wauchope said.

"We have had mixed reactions from the community to date, with some agreeing with the proposal, and others wanting higher fencing, and even some members of the community calling for no fencing at all."

Ms Wauchope said council would need to finalise plans by April and works would begin once key infrastructure projects were completed in August.

Food trucks out

MOBILE vending vehicles will banned from Port Broughton amidst fears the food trucks are creating unfair competition for local business-

Barunga West Council's new mobile vending policy restricts food trucks operating in Port Broughton outside of special events during peak tourism periods such as the Christmas Festival or New Year's Eve celebrations.

Mobile vending will still be allowed in Bute, Kulpara, Mundoora and Fisherman Bay.

The call for the ban comes after Port Broughton businesses expressed their concerns about a Copper Coast coffee van regularly parking on the foreshore.

However, other community members signed a petition in favour of mobile vending.

Council CEO Wauchope said the Mobile Vending Policy and Mobile Guidelines and Locations would be amended to enforce the new restrictions.

"Council is likely to receive requests for mobile vending permits now the school holidays and good weather are approaching," she said.

"We acknowledge mobile vendors can increase visitors to an area, and can offer a variety of food and beverages to a

"In particular, mobile food vendors can also cater for an increased population during peak tourist periods or during an event.

"They can however, be seen as a threat to existing bricksand-mortar businesses, and therefore a balance must be struck to ensure those who take significant risks and invest in permanent businesses in our community are afforded some protection."



Planning for upgraded Wallaroo foreshore

A MASTER plan is set to help guide future development along Wallaroo's foreshore.

Copper Coast Council has engaged Hatch Design to prepare the plan, which will feature five stages of work.

The plan will include scope for

upgrades to the Wallaroo swimming enclosure, Office Beach, Wallaroo Sailing Club foreshore and Liberator

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said council was looking at a coordinated long-term plan to guide the upgrades.

"We're planning to stagger the works and complete the upgrades in separate

"Upgrades could include extra shade and improved access to the foreshore.


"Some areas just need a bit of beautification to help show off the wonderful place this is."



Backup NBN Sky Muster satellite services have been installed at the stations as well as CFS group bases in the Eastern, Western and Lower Eyre areas.

centres, improved telecommunications resilience under the Mobile Network Hardening Program and portable communications facilities across the country.

Plover count complete

MORE than 40 volunteers travelled 355 kilometres of Yorke Peninsula coastline to track hooded plovers in late November.

Led by BirdLife Australia through its Beach-nesting Birds program, the biennial count on Yorke Peninsula is part of the Marna Banggara project, which is jointly funded through the Northern and Yorke Landscape Board, the Australian Government's National Landcare Program, the South Australian Department for Environment and Water, WWF-Australia and Foundation for National Parks and Wildlife, in partnership with the Narungga Nation Aboriginal Corporation

The biennial count is a huge, coordinated exercise which simultaneously covers all hooded plover habitat across the country from South Australia to New South Wales, including Tasmania, and allows BirdLife Australia to track the long-term trajectory of the country's hooded plover population.

Northern and Yorke Landscape Board project manager Janet Moore is cautiously optimistic BirdLife Australia's number crunching will reveal an increase of Yorke Peninsula hooded plovers, considering a record number of fledglings last breeding season.

"In 2022 we counted 285 adult hooded plovers, which was a third of SA's population, highlighting just how important Yorke Peninsula is for the

species," she said.

The count revealed hooded plovers on beaches where they had not been seen before, including at Pine Point.

Previously, the most northern location of hooded plovers on Yorke Peninsula's east coast was 12km south at Port Julia.

One volunteer also counted 31 birds on a 10km stretch of

The count results are expected in early 2023 but volunteers have turned their focus to this year's breeding season and ensuring the survival of hooded plover chicks.

Beachgoers this summer are encouraged to look out for hooded plover eggs, which are well camouflaged in the sand above the high tide line, and for the chicks, which forage for food near the water.

Hooded plovers are particularly vulnerable to unleashed dogs and vehicles driven on the beach, until they reach fledgling stage, which is when they can fly.

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






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Best wishes for the festive season

Room for change at Warooka

WESTERN United Sporting Club and Southern Eagles Football and Netball Club are hopeful plans for new changeroom facilities at Warooka Oval will come to fruition in the New Year.

The current changerooms, which has stood for almost a century, have no designated female facilities and inadequate shower and toilet services for all match day participants.

Works would feature new showers for the existing home and visitors changerooms as well as new female and umpire changerooms at the back of the building.

The facility would be used by the Southern Eagles, cricket and tennis participants, as well as the wider community as a potential hub in the event of a natural crisis elsewhere.

WUSC has applied for a grant through the Office for Sport and Recreation but will need to fund 50 per cent of the upgrades itself, the majority set to come through inkind donations of labour.

WUSC treasurer and SEFC sponsorship coordinator Jo Taheny said the upgrade would bring the facilities in line with the current standard for changerooms at

"Stage one will be a female-friendly changeroom, designed to be 45 square metres with a 25sqm amenity block and three showers, three toilets and three handbasins," she said.

"Next to that will be the umpires changerooms at 20sqm with two showers, two toilets and two handbasins.

"Stage two will then be shower blocks for both of the current changerooms, joining the two structures (existing and new)

The club recently upgraded its kitchen



and, according to Mrs Taheny, wishes to provide a structure utilised by many in the

"The AFL-preferred facility guidelines are very clear about what they want and having our football games here means a lot to the community, if we were ruled out due to inadequate changerooms, that would be bad for us," she said.

"The Southern Eagles are very much about community, we really put back into each of these communities (Edithburgh, Warooka and Yorketown).

"We could possibly have this as a com-

munity gym in the (football) off-season which all of our sports clubs could use.

"We're also identified as a place of refuge if there's a major fire in Edithburgh or especially Marion Bay, because there's no safe spaces there.

"We're a place people can come, especially after an incident, so there's also that emergency side of things we'd like to build

The clubs will find out if their grant application is successful in early 2023 and, if so, will look to commence work in August.

"It was an easy decision to champion the blue swimmer crab and highlight the recreational opportunities at the Top of the Yorke.





State government launches life-saving app across state

MOBILE phone app GoodSAM Australia to activate it after a Australia by the state government to help people in cardiac arrest access CPR sooner.

Supported by the South Australian Ambulance Service, the app will send an alert to registered responders if there is a cardiac arrest nearby, to which the responder can attend to provide emergency care while an ambulance is on the way.

In regional areas the response radius is five kilometres for regional towns and up to 15 kilometres in more remote locations.

GoodSAM was founded in London in 2013, South Australia is the second state in

Victoria in 2018.

Minister for Health and Wellbeing Chris Picton said gaining the help of those nearby is an important start in the chain of survival before an ambulance arrives.

"South Australians have been eagerly awaiting the arrival of GoodSAM and the Malinauskas Labor government is proud to help deliver this lifesaving technology," he

"We've also supported legislation in parliament to make defibrillators mandatory in public buildings, larger businesses, and public transport.

"These defibrillators could has been launched across South successful roll-out across then be quickly in the hands of a trained GoodSAM responder, with the app integrated with an AED registry that uses GPS technology to locate nearby equipment."

> SAAS executive director Kate Clarke said the activation and registration of GoodSAM responders will be done in a phased approach, with numerous SAAS personnel already putting their hands up.

> "GoodSAM will not alter the SAAS response to cardiac arrests, with cardiac arrests continuing to be our highest priority and SAAS always sending the closest available crew in an emergency," she said.

"It's also a way to celebrate our local culture itself, tied in with the idea of environment protection that we believe everybody should get behind," they said.



"It was really nice to be able to show at the Rum Awards, which were held in Queensland where the distillers have easy access to cane sugar, that South Australia can make an amazing product too."


The Sunny Hill team is preparing for a busy summer holiday period, with the doors to the distillery open for seven straight days between December 27 and January 8, excluding New

"A global pandemic definitely wasn't in our business plan," owners Derek and Nicole Matthewman said.







Harvest Christmas cheer

GROWERS across the peninsula are hoping to finish their harvest before Christmas.

Richard Daniel, of Ninnes, said this year's harvest is the best he has seen in 54 years of farming, with his crops reaping well above average after good spring rainfall.

"Our lentils are about three tonnes a hectare, barley about four tonnes and our wheat is four to five tonnes," he said.

Mr Daniel said, although he started harvesting later than usual this year, he hopes to be finished in time to enjoy Christmas with his family at

Viterra central region operations manager Jack Tansley said barley made up the highest proportion of commodities delivered to date at all Viterra's sites on Yorke Peninsula, closely followed by wheat, with lentils and some canola.

Mr Tansley said the sites, located at Wallaroo, Ardrossan, Port Giles and Bute, would be open to support growers over the Christmas and New Year period.

Growers call for understanding during fire season

GRAIN growers have called for more understanding from the public about fire safety precautions during harvest, after recent hot, windy weather on Yorke Peninsula.

The CFS made its first declaration of catastrophic fire conditions on YP for the 2022-23 bushfire season on Saturday, December 10.

This resulted in some criticism of YP growers in metropolitan media outlets and on social media.

CFS acting executive director of operations Brenton Hastie said it was important for the public to understand growers base their harvesting decisions on a set of observations taken in real time at the local level, under the Harvest Code of Practice.

Under the code, growers make observations of local conditions including temperature, wind speed, humidity, and fuel loads.

The data is entered into a fire behaviour calculator to produce a fire danger risk rating.

This year, SA is transitioning from the state-based Grasslands Fire Behaviour Index to the new national Fire Behaviour Index, with growers able to use either index during the transition period.

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Mr Hastie said the Code of Practice enabled growers to harvest their crops within reasonable time frames, while still taking necessary precautions based on sets of observations.

He said many of SA's fire weather districts, including Yorke Peninsula, encompassed large geographical areas which could experience a wide range of weather conditions in any 24-hour period.

"You could have potentially dangerous conditions on northern YP yet quite mild conditions on southern YP, or vice versa, on any given day," he

"The fire danger ratings can be based on predicted conditions for as little as 10 per cent of the entire geographical area of the fire weather district."

Mr Hastie said it was important to retain a balance between safety and the ability for growers to harvest their crops as soon as practically possible.

"We want growers to be able to harvest their crops safely and efficiently and it is an advantage for the CFS if they can get their crops off early in the season to reduce the risk of grass fires," he said.

Grain Producers South Australia chief executive Brad Perry said he understood SA was the only state or territory with a voluntary code of prac-

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tice for fire safety during har-

"We have really good adherence to the code here and safety is paramount, but we also don't want to lose any more harvest days than necessary," Mr Perry

Agery grain grower and CFS Yorke Valley group captain Andrew Cadd said it was critical growers retained the ability to utilise data on local conditions to decide whether it was safe to harvest.

"There may be a forecast for fire danger across an entire fire weather district like Yorke Peninsula, but in fact it may be a perfectly good day for reaping in your local area," Mr Cadd

He pointed out growers could make repeated observations and calculations through the day if the weather changed.

Mr Cadd praised growers who utilised their farm fire units to responded quickly to grass fires on YP over the weekend, including the 80 units who supported 45 CFS crew members and CFS aircraft at a fire near Koolywurtie on Sunday, December 18.

The fire, which was caused by a build-up of lentils in the header comb, resulted in significant damage to lentil, wheat and oat crops over 185 hectares.

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Stop silverleaf nightshade creep

LAND managers are urged to catch new outbreaks of silverleaf nightshade (Solanum elaeagnifolium) early this summer to prevent a costly eradication and crop yield problem.

Recent high rainfall is expected to trigger its arrival on agricultural properties previously considered clean of the plant, also known as tomato weed.

Silverleaf nighshade robs grain crops of available water and nutrients, reducing yields by up to 70 per cent and is difficult to eradicate if dense infestations form, with no effective herbicide treatments providing a quick fix.

Lochiel farmer Mitchell Nicholls shared his family's bitter experience with the weed and warned other farmers to take early action.

"Silverleaf nightshade is out of control on our farm despite our best efforts," he said.

"It's worth getting onto early, before it becomes a problem.

"We've tried controlling it with chemicals with limited

"We've found it keeps sending up new shoots which require multiple chemical applications

each season and in subsequent years seems to be just as prolific.

"Plus, the chemical applications recommended are expensive, so broadacre spraying is not always a viable option."


Northern and Yorke Landscape Board's Fabienne Dee encouraged land managers to be on the lookout for the purple-flowered plant around shearing sheds, stock yards, shade trees, trough areas and near gates.

"The highest priority is to control isolated plants and patches of the weed before the tap roots form," she said.

The plant's deep root system, which can extend two or more metres below ground, makes it resilient to drought and competitive against crop and pasture plants.

"The other priority is stopping seed set in order to prevent the plant from reproducing and infesting other parts of your property," Ms Dee said.

Upper Yorke Road named South Australia's worst

GRAIN Producers SA has named Upper Yorke Road as the worst grain road in South Australia.

GPSA's Worst Grain Road 2022 report identifies the top 10 worst transport routes across the state, as voted by grain producers.

This year's report featured almost 150 individual submissions which identified 58 different roads in need of repair.

The dangerously narrow nature of Upper Yorke Road, particularly the 36 kilometre stretch between Kulpara and Arthurton, was highlighted by survey respondents.

Numerous potholes, undulations and crumbling edges were also raised

GPSA CEO Brad Perry said the feedback from grain producers painted a bleak picture of the condition of key freight routes.

'The campaign has shown that grain producers are not just losing productivity due to the condition of the federal, state and local government roads highlighted in the top 10 of the

Worst Grain Road campaign, but they fear for their safety and that of others travelling these routes," Mr Perry

"This is a damning report into the condition of key freight routes for a grain sector worth more than \$3 billion to our state.

"For those who make decisions on

where to invest in South Australia's road network, GPSA is calling on these top 10 Worst Grain Roads to receive immediate investment in repairs and upgrades and we will be relentlessly lobbying for a fix to these routes."

Fire prompts haystack reminder

THE potential for a bumper harvest on Yorke Peninsula this season, and a fire at Brentwood which resulted in \$80,000 damage, have prompted a reminder to growers from the CFS about haystack fire safety.

The Brentwood, Minlaton, Edithburgh, Warooka, Stansbury, and Port Vincent CFS brigades responded to the fire, which destroyed 420 bales of hay, on Tuesday, December 13.

Crews were able to save 450 bales, valued at \$100,000.

CFS state duty commander Ray Jackson said the fire was caused by combustion within the bales.

He reminded growers to take care storing hay correctly and to regularly monitor moisture levels and check for signs of overheat-

Mr Jackson said this was particularly important now, given that continuing favourable conditions were making this year's harvest a potential record-breaker.

"Just one damp bale is enough to ignite a haystack, so make sure you protect all bales from rain, runoff, leaking roofs and gutters," he said.

"If some bales become damp, they should be stored separately and closely monitored."

Haystacks should be limited in size and have enough airflow to allow heat and moisture to

"If you get hay from another area, make sure you know the history and moisture content of the hay before you store it," Mr Jackson said.

"Be careful when using vehicles, machinery and equipment near haystacks, especially during days of high fire danger.

"Be aware that hot hay may suddenly catch alight if it is pulled apart, so if any part of the stack is near or above 70 degrees Celsius or you see or smell smoke, you should call Triple Zero (000) immediately."





Analysis: What did Joe do?

PAUL Kelly's How to Make Gravy is the greatest Christmas song ever written and is loved by Australians everywhere looking for a Christmas identity

Despite the almost inevitable fact Christmas will be spent in sweltering heat, we're inundated with imagery of a snowy season from the Northern Hemisphere.

How to Make Gravy provides a tale of heartache and longing which taps specifically into the emotional connection for Australians to Christmas

However, it does raise one notable question if you stop and think about the lyrics.

Within the first four lines it becomes evident our protagonist Joe is in jail. But at no point throughout the five-minute song do we understand why he's is in jail. What did Joe do?

Murder

I'm not going to say it's impossible, but this is unlikely. Joe's letter home gives the impression this is the first time he's been incarcerated at Christmas. He also says "if I get good behaviour, I'll be out of here by July". It turns out the average minimum sentence for murder in Australia is 20 years, meaning this timeline of around one year is unlikely.

This one garnered some support in the YPCT office and, while he does register some anger at the thought of someone else dancing with his wife while away, he doesn't seem like the type to be interested in a punch-up. He notes "I'm even going to miss Roger, because there sure is hell no one in here I want to fight". Doesn't check out to me, at least not in this weird analysis.

Armed robbery

See above for the most part. Although, I do get the impression, if push came to shove and Joe thought this was the only way he could provide for his family, he would resort to this.

Tax fraud or embezzlement

This is what I'm inclined to believe. To me, Joe seems like someone who might've done pretty well for himself, ended up with a cushy job and took it too far. The short sentence theory would make sense and it relieves Joe of a heinous act rather than a white collar crime. Despite deliberately leaving the reason out

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HOT FISHING TIPS

Recipe, prawn cocktail bruschetta: Ingredients – 8-10 cooked prawns (shelled), 1 baguette, 2-3 marinated artichokes, 1 crushed garlic clove, caper berries, mayonnaise, seasoning, olive oil, chives. Preparation – blitz artichokes, caper berries with mayo in food processor. Toast sliced baguette thinly spread with garlic and oil. Spread mixture over baguette slices and add 1 prawn. Sprinkle with chopped chives and enjoy with a cool glass of sparkling rosé.

Wallaroo: Strong southerly winds were the order for most days of last week, making for somewhat bumpy conditions offshore and pushing most jetty-based anglers to the northern side! Tommy ruff (Australian herring), squid and a couple of yellowfin whiting have been the main reports in the shallows, while a few hardy boat crews picked their times to chase blue crabs. whiting and garfish from up at Tickera and Myponie Point.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Locals fishing both jetties caught a few blueys and not much else. Offshore has King George whiting, garfish and squid at Warburto Point and West Light. I sighted a couple of rakers

seeking blueys from the Moonta Bay flats on the high tide on Sunday.

Point Turton: Shore and jetty-based anglers from Point Turton to Port Rickaby worked hard for not much during the week as poor tides negatively affected local fishing. Boat crews fished the deeper water drops off Point Souttar and Corny Point for whiting, small kingfish, snook and squid.

Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: Those persistent southerlies cracked in here last week and this kept many boaties on shore. Tommies and squid and a few garfish are at both jetties, while shore-based anglers caught salmon, flathead and mullet from Hillocky Beach, West Cape and Mozzie Flat.

Edithburgh/Stansbury: Both jetties hold a few blueys at first light and Sultana Passage has KG whiting, mullet and gar at times. Wattle Point and Suicides Beach have salmon trout and mullet on the high tides, while Tapley Shoals has KG whiting and small snapper (to be returned to the water immediately).

Ardrossan: The southerly winds were blowing when I checked in here late on Thursday afternoon with only a couple of anglers at the town jetty wistfully chasing blue crabs and squid. For boat crews there is gar, squid and tommies from the grounds near Windara Reef and blue crabs up at Price. Tight lines and see you next week!
