# Overpass open tomorrow

THE Port Wakefield overpass and duplication project has hit a major milestone with the overpass opening to traffic from tomorrow (Wednesday, December 22).

Holidaymakers and local motorists will be able to experience safer and smoother journeys to and from Yorke Peninsula just in time for Christmas.

The project has been jointly funded by the federal and state governments and includes the creation of an overpass to eliminate the Copper Coast and Augusta Highways intersection.

Two lanes of Adelaide-bound

traffic are also being created around the town.

"The completion of this significant project will make the lives of the thousands of motorists who use this route each day easier, safer and more efficient, helping them get to where they need to be, when they need to be there," Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Infrastructure, Transport and Regional Development Barnaby Joyce said.

"It's an early Christmas present from the Australian and South Australian Governments to the people of South Australia." Premier Steven Marshall said the completion of the overpass was a crucial election promise.

"We know Port Wakefield Highway typically caters to nearly 9000 vehicles per day through the town of Port Wakefield – and that number can double during holiday peak periods," Mr Marshall said.

"This overpass is going to make a significant difference in the lives of so many people and is a prime example of how we continue to build what matters for South Australians.

"This build alone is supporting 95 full-time jobs each year


during construction."

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said it's wonderful to see the progress on this transformative project which will have significant benefits for road safety and travel time.

"The greater project works have caused significant inconveniences for motorists but this stage shows we are closer to completion on this truly nation-building project," Mr Ellis said.

"This is just part of the significant and unprecedented roadworks spending in Narungga during the past four years."



# Big plans afloat for Port Vincent

JOURNALIST

FLOATING houses, waterfront townhouses and a 32-apartment complex are all part of big plans for Port Vincent.

Vilis Group director Peter Vilis said the company wants to inject more life and vitality into the town through the project.

"We have studied the accommodation trends with great depth on Yorke Peninsula and have had a lot of detailed discussions," Mr Villis said.

"We think we have a project that is going to serve the tourism needs for Yorke Peninsula in the years ahead.

"We are looking at things that will really make Port Vincent a

genuine destination in tourism and generate employment and regenerate the local economy."

The project, if granted the proper approvals, would initially include two lots of three waterfront townhouses followed by the apartment complex.

"At ground level in the complex we are looking at putting commercial facilities and we envisage a food and beverage offering," Mr Vilis said.

"At that location we are intending to expand the current pontoon so we have a floating entertainment facility which would be quite unique in South Australia.

"One of the interesting things we want to do as a start-up venture is in finger E (of the marina) put in a floating café which has received genuine interest from council and the people within Port Vincent."

Mr Vilis said nine floating houses are also being explored for the protected area of the marina.

"Having looked at the peninsula and what the growth prospects are at the moment, we are proposing something that will bring the area as a key destination," he said.

"It is a central location; the sailing waters are excellent and amongst the best winter sailing waters in the world.

"The bay and touch of historical buildings makes it an excellent place to visit and become part of."

Mr Vilis said the company hopes to get started on the project next year with completion by summer 2023.

### **Information sessions**

VILIS Group will hold two community consultation sessions on Sunday, January 16.

Group CEO Nathan Wright, director Peter Vilis and Studio Nine Architects architectural director Tony Zappia will provide an overview and presentation about the project.

"After we have had community consultation we will go for approval, we want the community to have input and endorse the project before we lodge," Mr Vilis said.

"The critical thing is we have market acceptance; we will have a soft entry point for people who want acquire property in our proposals. "There are a number of things we have identified that we would like community engagement on and council involvement to make Port Vincent a genuine long-term destination."

The sessions will be held at 10.30am and 2.30pm in the Port Vincent Institute Main Hall.

Due to COVID-19 restrictions, seats are limited.

# Hot summer night

PEOPLE across Yorke Peninsula were treated to a wild lightning show on Friday night, December 17.

About 8000 lightning strikes were recorded directly over the peninsula, about 3000 of which struck the ground.

Weatherzone meteorologist Joel Pippard said the thunderstorm was the result of a front which passed across the state Friday evening and Saturday

"This event was expected and it is not unusual for this time of year," Mr Pippard said.

"Early summer is a favourable time of year for thunderstorms across Yorke Peninsula.

The hot and humid air and the cold upper air, along with a strong cold front, created the perfect conditions for powerful thunderstorms with lots of lightning?

Mr Pippard said typical summer pat-

terns have started to set in, with warm to hot temperatures and little rainfall through December so far.

"Yorke Peninsula can expect warm to hot temperatures from Christmas Day to the New Year, as a high-pressure system moves in on Christmas," he

"This system will direct southeast to easterly winds with mostly clear condi-

"A low-pressure trough may develop in the east of the state closer to New Year's Day which may bring unsettled weather to northern Yorke Peninsula."

At least four YP power outages were confirmed on Friday night.

An SA Power Networks spokesperson said three were single customer outages, while one affected about 50 properties around Warooka from 9.10pm Friday to 1.17am Saturday.

The outages were not confirmed to have been directly caused by storms.

#### **Lightning starts fires**

LOCAL CFS volunteers were kept busy with grassfires following several lightning strikes on Friday, December 17.

Northern Yorke Peninsula CFS Group members attended six fires including two at Kulpara, one at Tickera, Barunga Gap and Nalyappa between 8.30pm and midnight.

Group officer David Bussenschutt said most of the blazes were extinguished by farm units before crews

"(The fire) at Barunga Gap was down in a gully and tricky to get to, but most of them were put out in minutes," Mr Bussenschutt said.

"About five volunteers from all seven of our stations attended fires.



# Positive but don't panic

THERE was one active case of COVID-19 on the Copper Coast as of Sunday, December

At the time of print, there were no reported exposure sites on Yorke Peninsula.

The state recorded 154 new cases today (Tuesday), taking the total active cases to more than 500.

A SA Health spokesperson said the Communicable Disease Control Branch will focus on containing chains of transmission as quickly as possible.

"We will now be prioritising high risk, vulnerable close contacts and settings where there are people at the highest risk of poor health outcomes," the spokesperson said.

"These groups include older people, pregnant women, or those with chronic health conditions and locations such as aged care facilities, hospitals, correctional services and disability services.

"Exposure locations will still be listed on our site as deemed necessary; however, the priority will be these high-risk groups and settings.

"CDCB will continue to con-

tact other businesses by email, phone or voice message in order of priority."

People are being encouraged to monitor closely for symptoms and get tested as soon as they appear.

Premier Steven Marshall thanked all South Australians for getting tested as numbers increased

"Thank you for your patience as testing lines and delays are increasing," he

"Our testing sites have gone from 2000 per day to 20,000 at the moment."

As a result of the increasing

testing numbers, interstate travellers no longer need to be tested when they arrive in SA if they are asymptomatic.

"We are also keen to provide booster shots sooner to increase protection — if you are eligible go and get it as soon as you can to increase your immunity and resistance to the disease," Mr Marshall said.

#### Restrictions still set to ease

SOUTH Australia's COVID-19 restrictions will ease from Tuesday, December 28.

Stand-drinking and dancing will be allowed at venues with fully vaccinated staff and patrons – these venues will be allowed to operate at 75 per cent capacity.

Nightclubs will be allowed to operate at 50 per cent capacity under the same circumstances and home gathering limits will be removed.

Seated events and venues can go back to 100 per cent capacity and the minimum attendance for events needing COVID-19

management plan has been raised to 3000.

Quarantine for international arrivals will go from seven days to 72 hours.

Rules for the unvaccinated will be unchanged.

"We're going to be giving venues the choice to be a vaccinated venue or an unvaccinated venue and there will be a differential in terms of restrictions." SA Premier Steven Marshall said.

'Some venues will be able to have a vaccinated event one day and an unvaccinated event the next day, and there will be a little bit of complexity with regard to this."

# Reviving Moonta's main entrance

MOONTA's main entrance is set to receive some tender lov-

Copper Coast Council recommended the northern corner of Blanche and Blyth Terraces be cleared and tidied to create a better entrance to the state's top tourist town.

A memorial/cairn is expected to be installed near to the old power house site, incorporating some of the original stonework and the foundation stone.

CEO Russell Peate said whilst further investigations were being completed in relation to future uses, he had requested the land be tidied.

"This will involve some research regarding previous uses of the land prior to such works," Mr Peate said.

"We want to do some research to ensure we don't overlook the history of the area.

"We are keen to make this land a more presentable entrance into Moonta which should start to look better over the next 12 months."

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said it was important people arriving at Moonta, from the north, encounter a tidy entrance.

"Moonta is the top tourist town in South Australia and to arrive to an unsightly entrance certainly doesn't exude the impression we would like people to have of the area," Mrs Talbot said.

"This area had some significant buildings of importance prior to their demolition.

"A monument with perhaps some historical information will ensure our heritage is remembered and the stories of the past are continued to be told."

Mrs Talbot said the large parcel of land would be important for the future development of Moonta.

"I would like it to be tidied for the moment and retained for when there is a real need for a use in the future," she said.

"The Moonta Urban Design Framework, adopted by council, recommended in the short term it be tidied and landscaped giving us options into the future, exploring the possibility of a roundabout and increased accessibility to the Moonta township.

"The land provides numerous development opportunities to reinforce the character and the function of the town and provide improved connections to the tourist office as well as slow the speed of vehicles travelling into the town centre.

"Ultimately, the town entrance is an invitation to explore, stay and discover

# Criminals caught after large-scale operation

A SIGNIFICANT Yorke Mid North police operation targeted traffic, property and drug offenders last Wednesday, December 15.

STAR Group, Water and Dog Operations Unit, Traffic Services Branch, Road Policing Section and local Crime Prevention Section resources were utilised during the operation which commenced across the Copper Coast from 9am.

A total of 396 breath tests, 34 drug wipes and 10 vessel safety compliance checks were conducted.

The tests resulted in 10 traffic expiation notices and one caution fine, eight defects and one caution defect, five cautions for general expiation notices, five drug diversions, plus nine cannabis expiation notices issued.

#### Drugs, weapons, jewellery seized

Officers seized illicit drugs and illegal

weapons after numerous properties were searched, resulting in several people being arrested and reported.

Police located cannabis and drug paraphernalia after searching a home on Cornish Terrace, Wallaroo.

Three occupants received cannabis expiation notices, while a 50-year-old woman was arrested and charged with unlawful possession and possessing prescription medication.

Two safes containing a large quantity of collectable coins and jewellery were seized from the same address.

Further enquiries are set to be conducted in relation to this property.

#### Pair charged with drug trafficking

Police located six grams of methamphetamine after searching a Kadina property. A 31-year-old woman and 35-year-old man were arrested and charged with trafficking in a controlled drug.

The man was further charged with possessing a dangerous article after a taser was located and seized by police.

#### **Cannabis found in Hamley**

A small amount of cannabis was located at a Hamley, Moonta, address after a search by

A 61-year-old man was issued a cannabis expiation notice as a result.

#### Plants and ammunition seized

Seven hydroponically grown cannabis plants and ammunition were seized following the search of a Jericho, Kadina, home.

A 47-year-old man was reported for cultivating cannabis, possessing prescribed equipment and possessing ammunition.

Both he and another 39-year-old man were issued with cannabis expiation notices and drug diversions for possessing prescribed equipment.

#### Man reported for growing 11 plants

Police located 11 cannabis plants after searching an East Moonta home.

A 35-year-old man was reported, drug diverted and issued a cannabis expiation

He is set to appear in court at a later date.

#### Three more men arrested

Additionally, a 48-year-old man and 29-year-old man, both from Wallaroo, were arrested on warrants.

A 41-year-old man of no fixed address was also arrested and charged with two counts of breaching an intervention order.

He was granted police bail to appear in court at a later date.



### November Narungga update

### Health status quo cannot continue

I released my Regional Health Plan last week, which outlines a number of solutions to what I describe as South Australia's regional health crisis.

As I have publicly stated many times, regional health care is the biggest issue facing the Narungga electorate — and all country South Australians— and it was an issue long before the pandemic and will continue to be one long after it is finished.

During the past three and a half years I am proud to have played a part in securing some improvements, such as the new surgical unit at Yorketown, after-hours Xrays and a salaried doctors model for Wallaroo Hospital under a new Rural Health Workforce Plan, and decentralising local health network boards.

But problems still exist, and it is clear the status quo can't remain.

I welcomed the recent federal government announcement of incentives to pay HELP debts of graduating doctors and nurses who commit to working in regional areas, but more still needs to be done.

Over past months I have consulted with rural health professionals from across the state, shared ideas with the Minister for Health, and heard from constituents about improvements they seek.

The critical issue is the shortage of doctors themselves, and whilst there are a large number of carrots in place to entice doctors to the country, few are working.

It is time to get a stick out.

My plan raises the following as potential system solutions: local health networks to employ accident and emergency doctors to replace the locum system; federal government to limit the allocation of Medicare provider numbers to ensure efficient distribution of GPs across SA; increased funding for rural training places; redraw of local health network boundaries for more balanced administration; state government to appoint an Assistant Minister for Regional Health; and for governments to fully commit to the SA Rural Medical Workforce Plan 2019-2024.

# Time's up for talking newspaper

AFTER almost 30 years, the volunteers behind the Voice of the Times are stepping away from their microphones.

This week's YP Country Times will be the last edition the service, formerly known as the Talking Times, records.

A support group for visionimpaired people on Yorke Peninsula was established with help from the Royal Society for the Blind in 1992, which led to the production of a talking newspaper.

In the beginning it was done with a small tape recorder, secondhand cassette tapes and a team of willing and enthusiastic volunteers.

Group founder Val Langton said the popularity of the service quickly increased.

"Back in 1993 we sent out 13 tapes to our new clients but by 2003 we were sending out 65 tapes," she said.

"It was a big job to copy that many, but with donations from various local groups, we were able to eventually purchase three copiers, which meant we could copy nine tapes at a time which really cut down our working

Mrs Langton said when technology changed, it became harder and harder to justify keeping up.

"We had to learn a whole different way of recording, as by this time, cassette tapes and players were becoming obsolete and very hard to buy replace-

"We tried to delay this change as it seemed so different to what were used to, but the RSB encouraged us to go

"We lost quite a few clients mainly because they felt they couldn't cope with this new way of listening to the

The RSB cancelled its funding and support to talking newspapers in September 2020, but the YP group continued under the title of Voice of the Times.

"But things change, technology advances, people age and get involved in other projects and commitments which take their time, so it seemed now was the time for us to have a rest," Mrs Langton said.

"With age comes health problems which is inevitable and so we are putting our long-standing project to

Mrs Langton offered her sincere gratitude to everyone who had been involved over the years.

"I would like to thank everyone who has contributed over the years and in particular the volunteers, the clients and those at the Country Times," she

"Thanks to Lynn Spurling at the Copper Coast Library, Kadina, who always gives us a quiet room for recording every week even if sometimes it's her office and Michael Ellis and the whole team at the paper have always been really good to us, simply outstanding."

# **Chemist** recovery nears completion

**NEWBERY** Chemists, Wallaroo, is back on its feet less than a month after its Owen Terrace premises were gutted by a fire.

The chemist has secured a two-year lease of Wallaroo Shopping Centre's shop 6 and reopened to the public, in limited capacity, after more than a century of history burnt to the ground on Monday, November 29.

Staff have started transitioning operations into the new store after being forced to navigate medical scripts and clients' payments online and Newbery other from Chemists stores.

"The care and dedication of our staff to looking after the Wallaroo community have been exceptional."


Mr Gross said dispensary shelving had already been installed and stocked.

# Vale Helen Tucker 6-1-1940 ~ 24-6-2021

HELEN Faye Tucker had a huge impact on the all nursing staff. peninsula through her career and as a volun-

She spent nearly five decades in the nursing profession, which seeped into her retirement though volunteering.

Helen Staley arrived in Maitland to start her career in nursing in 1957.

It was there she met her future husband Barry Tucker; they were engaged in 1959 and married in 1961 after Helen graduated from

Helen and Barry had three sons, Daniel (deceased), Christopher and Damien.

In 1961, Helen relieved at Maitland Hospital as a registered nurse and from 1962-63 she was sister in charge of the hospital.

She had a year off from nursing from 1964-65 and was employed as a dispensary assistant with the local chemist.

From 1964-68, she accepted a part-time position offered by four hospitals as a tutor sister to student nurses.

Helen first accepted a casual position as a tutor sister at Wallaroo Hospital in 1968, by 1974 it was a part-time role.

It was then she decided to commence a diploma in teaching nurse education and in 1975 she was a full-time student fully supported by SA Hospitals department travelling to Adelaide CAE to complete her study.

Helen also juggled working part-time at the Wallaroo Hospital where she was responsible for setting up and implementing in service for

Following a discussion with the director of nursing she was also responsible for setting up ward procedure manuals.

From 1976-81 Helen was employed fulltime as a nurse educator.

On returning to the Wallaroo Hospital in 1978, Helen was responsible for setting up and updating the intensive care unit and implementing in-service for all nursing staff.

In the 1980s, Helen became involved with many schools across the peninsula through School Health Services.

This included implementing a program to 33 schools on the peninsula, producing and distributing booklets, dietary surveys and

Helen retired in 2002; however, she was kept busy with her many volunteer roles.

She worked as a volunteer telephone counsellor for Wesley Uniting Care working on Lifeline and domestic violence helplines until

Helen joined the board of CYP Hospital in 2003 which afforded her many opportunities to attend workshops in the country and

She called a public meeting in December 2004 engaging with Yorke Peninsula and Copper Coast Council mayors to establish the University of the Third Age Yorke Peninsula.

Helen was also on the roster for Meals on Wheels Maitland and Community Care and Transport.

One bike lost its chain on the long ride and was trailered back with no harm to the


Despite numbers being down, the club raised \$980, also collecting some toys and gifts for the St Vincent de Paul Society in Kadina.



# Sleeves up or bowls down

Bowling Association chairperson Leith Daniell said the association and clubs have a responsibility to uphold.

"It's probably fair and we've got to abide," he said.

"It might cause a fair few problems in regards to each club recording their vaccinations but the percentage of those already vaccinated is high which is good.

"Really, there are thinning participation numbers already, and the only other big problem will be getting those who aren't vaccinated already, jabbed by the cut-off

Bowls SA caretaker CEO Taryn Sexton said the decision was not made lightly.

"We embrace the opportunity to be a leader in the South Australian sporting community and show how much we value the health and safety of our players and volunteers, who are mostly part of a very vulnerable demographic," she said.

The SANFL announced its vaccination policy for South Australian football, with all players aged 16 and up in men's and women's competitions requiring vaccination.

However, the mandate doesn't include community football, with leagues set to make their own decisions regarding vaccination.

For community netball, vaccinations are not a requirement for participation except when attending Netball SA stadium at Mile End in Adelaide.

The SACA hasn't introduced a vaccination ruling for community cricket, but urges the public to follow guidelines outlined by SA



# Barunga Gap farmer in industry program

BARUNGA Gap farmer Tom Michael is a grains leader.

Mr Michael is one of 10 growers selected to participate in GrainGrowers Grain Social Leadership Program in 2022.

The program works with those who are keen to share the story of Australian grains.

"It further equips individuals with the leadership and communication skills to engage in meaningful conversations with all parts of the community," Grain Growers general manager grower and industry development Kaitlin Leonard said.

"The GSLP is about ensuring grain farmers are powerful voices for our industry, and channelling awareness and understanding across Australian communities.

"We've seen what the impact of growers sharing what is happening on their farms can have and how appreciated it is by so

many people who might not have known the hows and whys around grain production previously."

Mr Michael believes grain growers have got a great story to tell and the connection to local customers is breaking down as Australia becomes more urban.

"I'd like to have some of these stories to roll over into the community," he wrote in his biography.

"I'm very passionate about social licence, having the community support to use modern farming techniques and best practice to make us the most efficient, economic grain producers."

## **Industry on track** for lucrative crop

LATE season rain, hail and wind has failed to put a dampener on the record South Australian 2021-22 grain crop.

The state government's latest Crop and Pasture report estimates a \$3 billion farmgate value return from this

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development David Basham said, despite an average crop estimate, high global wheat and barley prices have resulted in an increase to the projected crop value.

"Cool conditions and regular rain delays during October and November slowed early harvest progress but we are now in full swing and about halfway complete across the state," he said.

"The report highlights, despite the mixed weather conditions this year with late opening rains followed by a wet mid-winter, a dry late winter and stormy wet October finish, indications are that crops have grown well mostly due to deep soil moisture stored from June and July rains.

"While winter frost and the spring storm events on October 28 and November 6 caused some grain losses, the report has surprisingly found rain associated with the storm systems increased the yield prospect of undamaged ripening crops.

"While the Bureau of Meteorology has now declared La Niña for summer 2021-22, it is unlikely to have significant influence on South Australia's rainfall with the current seasonal outlook to February showing the most likely outcome is average rainfall for most of the state."

## Watch out for drift with summer weeds

are being reminded to consider their neighbours when planning spraying operations in coming

PIRSA executive director of biosecurity Nathan Rhodes said heavy rains over parts of the state in recent weeks would lead to increased weed control activ-

"Producers, particularly those in northern and eastern agricultural and viticultural areas will place a priority on spraying operations in broadacre cropping and vineyards in an effort to control any emerging weeds and minimise potential fungal disease," he said.

"With the amount of spraying likely to take place, diligence will be required when planning and applying sprays to ensure no spray drift occurs.

"It is also vital not only the right chemical is selected but also weather conditions are closely monitored and appropriate for the proposed activity.

"Spraying should not occur under inversion weather conditions which generally exist from evening and overnight through until early morning.

Mr Rhodes said in the coming months the department would be closely monitoring spray operator activities, including through chemical user audits, investigation of reported spray drift incidents and taking regulatory action when noncompliance was identified.

"Anyone found to have deliberately or negligently caused damage to other properties by not following the regulatory requirements for agricultural chemical use can receive a maximum penalty of \$35,000 per offence," he said.

"Such penalties reflect the seriousness of not following mandatory label instructions."

Grain Producers SA R, D and

E committee chair Nick Hillier encouraged producers to practice the endorsed Code of Practice for Summer Weed Control, and to report any spray drift events to the Agricultural and Veterinary Chemicals Hotline on 1300 799 684.

"Over the past few seasons GPSA has had an ongoing campaign encouraging growers to Hit Your Target," he said.

"Growers have rallied to adhere to the Harvest Code of Practice and to not reap grain when the Grassland Fire Danger Index is above 35.

"GPSA is seeking a similar response from Hit Your Target in which communities of growers work together to minimise the risk of spray drift."

# **Battle against burr** weeds to continue

PREVENTING burr weeds from taking root and multiplying this summer will require a concerted effort from landholders, according to Northern and Yorke Landscape Board officer David Hughes.

Generous rainfall during spring has delivered ideal conditions for burr weeds like caltrop, innocent weed and khaki weed to repeatedly germinate and set seed throughout the warmer months.

"Many landholders may have already found and sprayed the first germinations of burr weeds, but they should expect repeated germinations throughout summer," Mr Hughes said.

These weeds can set seed within two weeks of germinating, so it's important not to turn a blind eye as they can quickly spread throughout your property and even into neighbouring land."

Burr weeds thrive on bare ground and are known to produce large quantities of

One innocent weed plant can form 16 burrs, with each burr containing four seeds; a total of 64 seeds.

A single caltrop plant can form 400 burrs, with each burr containing up to 20 seeds; a total of 8000 seeds.

Their spiny exterior also means burrs are easily lodged in tyres, shoes and animals and then carried across the landscape.

"On farms and in vineyards, it's important to decontaminate all equipment before leaving weedy spots," Mr Hughes said.

"Land managers who use motorbikes, ride-on mowers or slashers should also be on the lookout."

Khaki weed (Alternanthera pungens), which forms a dense mat over the ground surface, is a problem in recreational parks and commonly hitches a ride with travellers who camp in caravan parks and reserves.

It also damages the feet and mouths of stock and degrades wool quality.

The Northern and Yorke Landscape Board encourages land managers to look out for and control any burr weeds on their property this summer.







Featuring stars Dwayne "The Rock" Johnson, Ryan Renyolds and Gal Gadot, the blockbuster was Netflix's most expensive yet.

After creating great films such as Central Intelligence and We're the Millers, writerdirector Rawson Marshall Thurber made a blunder out of what could have been a great

It's a wannabe James Bond blockbuster, in which Red Notice tells a tale of a journey endured by John Hartley (Johnson) in his pursuit of capturing the world's most wanted. His global pursuit forces him to partner

with a world class art thief Nolan Booth (Reynolds) in order to catch the world's best art thief, The Bishop (Gadot). The somewhat confusing adventure takes

the trio around the world, across the dance floor, into the jungle and always into each other's company, which may be the worst part of it all.

For the high number of fight scenes, the entire film was strangely bloodless.

Through bombs, explosions, fires, car crashes and even a rampaging bull, not a cut or bruise was sighted.

Without the sheer excitement and watchability of Johnson, Gadot and Renyolds, the film would have been completely intolerable.

#### **HOT FISHING TIPS**

Wallaroo: A grain ship was again at the deep end of the jetty for much of the week as local anglers picked up some blue swimmer crabs and tommy ruff (Australian herring) in the late afternoons. Several boaties were out fishing the Magazine and Bird Reef grounds for King George whiting, blueys, gar and squid last Thursday. Point Riley has gar, tommies and squid.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: KG whiting and gar have been the fish species of choice as crews enjoyed weather allowing them to fish far and wide at Cape Elizabeth, Barker Rocks and West Light. Blueys and squid have also been in reasonable numbers. Both jetties are worth a try for squid and blue crabs. Big snook are off Weetulta beach.

Port Victoria/Balgowan: Boat crews fishing off Wardang Island and Balgowan caught bag limits of KG whiting last week, along with squid, garfish and flathead. The jetty has blueys, tommy ruffs and souid.

Point Turton: I checked out Point Turton on

Tuesday last week as the south-easterlies blew at a persistent 15 knots with gusts even stronger. Boat anglers chased gar and small squid off Point Souttar and Hardwicke Bay, while jetty-based fishers reported tommies and squid.

Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: For the third week in a row big tommies have been a welcome catch for jetty fishing. Tuna to 10kg, although not huge, are at last starting to appear off Kangaroo Island and Pondalowie Bay. Gym and Richards Beaches have salmon trout.

Edithburgh/Stansbury: Sultana Point and Marion Reef hold medium-sized KG whiting, snook and small leather jackets. Whiting to 39cm are out at Tapley Shoals and the jetty has ruff and the occasional larger salmon trout. A few gar are out from The Hut and snook are at the Orontes Bank.

Pine Point/Ardrossan: Yellowfin whiting and blue crabs are the go-to species for shore-based anglers from the wharf at Pine Point to the beach at Tiddy Widdy. Boat crews fished Long Spit for whiting and Billy Goat Flat for blueys and garfish. Windara Reef on the drift is a good try for squid at the moment.

# No jab, no play, no bowls today

Bowls SA is the first state sporting body to implement a COVID vaccination policy for community sport.

The No Jab, No Play policy requires
