PAY UP

Copper Coast Council charged for non-election

COPPER Coast Council has received a bill for a local government election which didn't occur.

The \$35,000 bill was charged to local governments following last month's elections, including those like CCC which did not hold a local election due to an insufficient number of council nominees.

Council's bill comprises a progress claim based on estimated costs and expenses incurred to October 2022, totalling \$35,294.28.

The costs included \$6473 for an advertising campaign, \$5796 for bal-

lot materials, \$6414 for ICT systems, \$11,291 for general recharge and \$847 for postal ballot return.

CEO Russell Peate requested the Electoral Commission of South Australia review the claim.

Mr Peate detailed the costs charged for ballot materials and postal ballot return, totalling \$6643, had not been amended following the review.

"The invoice excluding some costs because no election was held, is the same as the initial invoice issued for \$35,294.28," Mr Peate said.

"This needs to be amended."

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said she expected council to incur costs in relation to the election.

"However, the charges we have received seem to be for services we haven't received, albeit hard to determine due to the lack of detail on the invoice," Mrs Talbot said.

"I would think a more detailed invoice would help us understand our liability."

Mrs Talbot said CCC ratepayers could be hit twice, pending a supplementary election next year.

"The Electoral Commission needs to take some responsibility for this. They conducted the election campaign which didn't successfully encourage enough ratepayers to nominate for council," she said.

"In my opinion, this was exasperat-

ed by the removal of displaying nominees (publicly), as the lesser number of nominees may have encouraged more nominations if people were aware."

An ECSA spokesperson said councils were required to pay for the election costs as per the Local Government (Elections) Act 1999 Section 13 – Costs and Expenses.

"All costs and expenses incurred by the returning officer in carrying out official duties must be defrayed from funds of the council," the spokesperson said.

"To ensure the equitable availability of materials and services, councils are generally charged on a per-electoral basis for the costs incurred in set-

ting up and running the council elections, regardless of whether an election is contested."

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis raised the issue in the House of Assembly last week.

"Does the Minister (for Local Government Geoff Brock) think that ratepayers should have to pay for a local government election where one doesn't actually occur?" Mr Ellis said.

"Included in the bill (of \$35,000) was an amount for printing ballot papers, postal ballot return and costs for a deputy returning officer."

Mr Ellis has since written to Mr Brock in an attempt to have the progress claim waived.

Public safety and responsibility

THIS week I received a request to pay for the upgrade of Dowling Drive, Port Hughes, i.e., kerbing.

A result of a request of a ratepayer to install kerbing, as flooding occurred on their property on several occasions, they were gobsmacked at the response.

Apparently, the director of infrastructure can bring forward these works providing the residents pay half the cost.

I urge residents with legal frontage to object to the proposal of imposing a special levy for these works and comment upgrade infrastructure ASAP.

Ratepayer's rates proportionally contribute to infrastructure, why is it necessary to introduce a special levy any time works are undertaken.

Dowling Drive had recent sewer upgrades and the streets were ripped up to enable works.

Dowling Drive's water table and stormwater control is being ignored at this time, unlike the Harry's Point Road upgrade without a special levy applied.

We on Dowling Drive were again subjected to disruptions as SA Water replaced mains supply lines, yet there is still no kerbing et cetera.

I see families walking on the roadway every day, as no footpath provision, there are children roller skating, skateboarding, trainer wheeled bicycles, child pushers and wheelchairs as the walking path is too narrow to walk two abreast, with a very rough stony surface.

If I were to park a vehicle on the seaward side Dowling Drive, once north of the reserve, all vehicles would have to cross the centre line, a regular occurrence at the beach access pathway points.

Harry's Point Road and roadways in vicinity of The Dunes are appealing to the visitor and tourism, credit to council; however, go around the corner onto Dowling Drive and whoo.

You're back to the 1980s a black strip with no water control, footpath or visual appeal.

Time is up Councillors, place these works on the upcoming works program without a special levy.

Billed but no result

COUNCILS across the state are getting down to business, now elected members have been sworn in.

It's an especially exciting time for councils like Copper Coast, who didn't actually hold elections for various reasons.

Across the state, about 10 councils did not hold any elections, whether because they had too few nominees, no nominees at all or enough to form a quorum.

These councils then copped a reasonable bill from the Electoral Commission of SA for very little.

What's worse is they're likely to get another when they have supplementary elections to fill vacant positions.

There are clearly costs involved for those councils, even if they didn't have an election, including advertising, holding workshops to encourage nominations, et cetera.

But for those councils, you could argue there was no real benefit in those events as they didn't actually result in enough nominations. And they are trying to argue that — the new online system meant no one knew who the nominees were until the close of nominations which meant more candidates couldn't be sourced.

There is realistically a cost to these things, regardless if they were successful or not, and councils are legally bound to pay these fees.

Where else is the ECSA going to get funding from?

But, to date, it seems as if they might reduce some of the costs, but it's still an incredibly unreasonable amount.

It feels like going to a dinner with some friends. Some ordered quite expensive foods and you've settled on something reasonably less expensive.

But when you go to pay, instead of splitting the bill based on what you've ordered, the group decides to chip in a fraction of the total cost, meaning you're compensating someone else's food.

It's hard to see councils walking away and paying just what they want instead of what the ECSA thinks they should.

Hopefully though they're not left holding the bill.

World heritage bid grows

A BID to enable World Heritage Listing for Moonta Mines has grown stronger. Goyder Conservation Management Plan Advisory Committee toured several mines sites during a visit to the Copper Coast last Thursday, December 1.

Committee members spent the day familiarising themselves with the Copper Coast's Cornish heritage, and how it relates to their joint bid

with Burra.

National Trust SA CEO Dr Darren Peacock said the visit was intended to help the Regional Council of Goyder and Copper Coast Council understand how the two sites connect.

"(During the tour) we discussed how the two councils will be working together moving forward," Mr Peacock said.

"At the moment, we're in the process of getting the World Heritage Listing nomination together before it's submitted to government for a final tick.

"Moonta Mines and Burra are part of the same story — lots of Burra miners once moved to Moonta, and both share a similar cultural identity."

CCC mayor Roslyn Talbot said it was great to welcome the advisory committee to the mines.

"These sites are significant parts of the Cornish mining story and culture," Mrs Talbot said.

"It was a great opportunity for the Burra group to see what we are doing and strengthen our relationship."

Mrs Talbot said it was important

all criteria of World Heritage Listing was met.

"Many years of work has gone into this application and we are getting closer to lodgement," she said.

"A successful nomination will give worldwide recognition to the significance of these sites.

"It will help attract funding to upgrade and maintain them to a standard that will ensure their preservation and provide facilities to tell their story.

"World Heritage Listing will create

huge tourism opportunities for the Copper Coast and Burra, and itineraries between the two will be able to include other regions."

Regional Council of Goyder mayor Bill Gebhardt said the tour was a great opportunity to venture into Copper Coast's backyard.

"Moonta Mines is a great site and I look forward to working with the region," Mr Gebhardt said.

"It's important we facilitate further assets for both towns to help preserve their Cornish heritage."

Push for child care goes on

A GROUP of determined and concerned parents are continuing their push for child care options in Ardrossan.

The Ardrossan Childcare Committee held a feasibility study into the need to establish a facility in October and discussions are now growing around the information collected.

Data revealed 99 per cent of those surveyed believe (the lack of) child

care was an issue in the town and currently 120 children would use a service located in Ardrossan.

Worryingly, 81 per cent of single-income respondents revealed the lack of services puts added stress on their family and relationship.

Committee member Anna Lodge said there were no child care options other than the kindergarten or a reliance on family or friends in the area.

"The group was formed by local mums who wanted somewhere they could send their children

during the day so they could re-enter employment," she said.

"The mums came together because we need change, we need access to employment and we need access to childcare in this community and I think there's a real want from mums here to work.

"It's not just mums, its dads as well; we have a large community of dads who end up having their kids at work with them, often in unsafe environments... and a large number of single dads around with no support."

The group is hopeful to utilise the town's unused Scout Hall but would need to find adequate funding to alter the building appropriately, before developing a community-based operation.

Committee member Kate Pfeiffer said the hall provides a great space with the structure already there.

"We've looked into recent rounds of grants but we've missed the cut off (for this year)," she said.

Ms Pfeiffer said the ideal scenario would be a community-run facility,

but would accept a privately run facility should it be required.

"We would benefit more as a community by having it community-based and we are more inclined (to do that); to attract a private facility you would need x number of kids every day... and we as a small country town don't have those numbers," she said.

"We also just need to touch base with our community and say, 'hey, who is willing to work here or be a director'.

"But community-based is the avenue we want to chase."

Dowling drives for an upgrade

RESIDENTS along Dowling Drive, Port Hughes, feel their road has been neglected.

Scott Bryant, whose property is situated at the northern end of Dowling Drive, said the road required more frequent maintenance, including filling and smoothing the water excavations, and repairing eroded or cracked asphalt.

“It has been pleasing to see the significant effort in community infrastructure by council, such as road improvements and bikeways, but Dowling Drive has been neglected,” he said.

“The obvious solution is to fully seal Dowling Drive, install effective gutters and widen the road to provide safer passage for vehicles and walkers.”

Recent heavy rains have increased issues, with a channel on the eastern side of the road regularly overflowing, leading to flooding in the front yards of multiple beachfront homes, according to their owners.

“The camber of the road directs water initially to the (side of the) road which causes water inundation of downstream properties and down driveways when heavy flows push this across,” Mr Bryant said.

“In the absence of a sealed

gutter, private properties are regularly flooded which is unacceptable and a clear risk and responsibility of (Copper Coast) Council.

“I have seen cyclists crash and joggers stumble on the uneven gravel, families with pushers and small kids on the road, and a number of near misses between vehicles with boats and other road users.”

Dowling Drive is one of three roads, along with Haynes Street and Martin Terrace, both Kadina, being considered for upgrades with the help of additional ratepayer contributions.

“As these works are not within council’s immediate works program, I can provide an option to bring forward these (road kerbing and sealing) works under the Upgrade of Roads Policy,” council director infrastructure services Tim Neumann said.

“That is, if the majority of

residents agree to contribute towards 50 per cent of the total project costs.

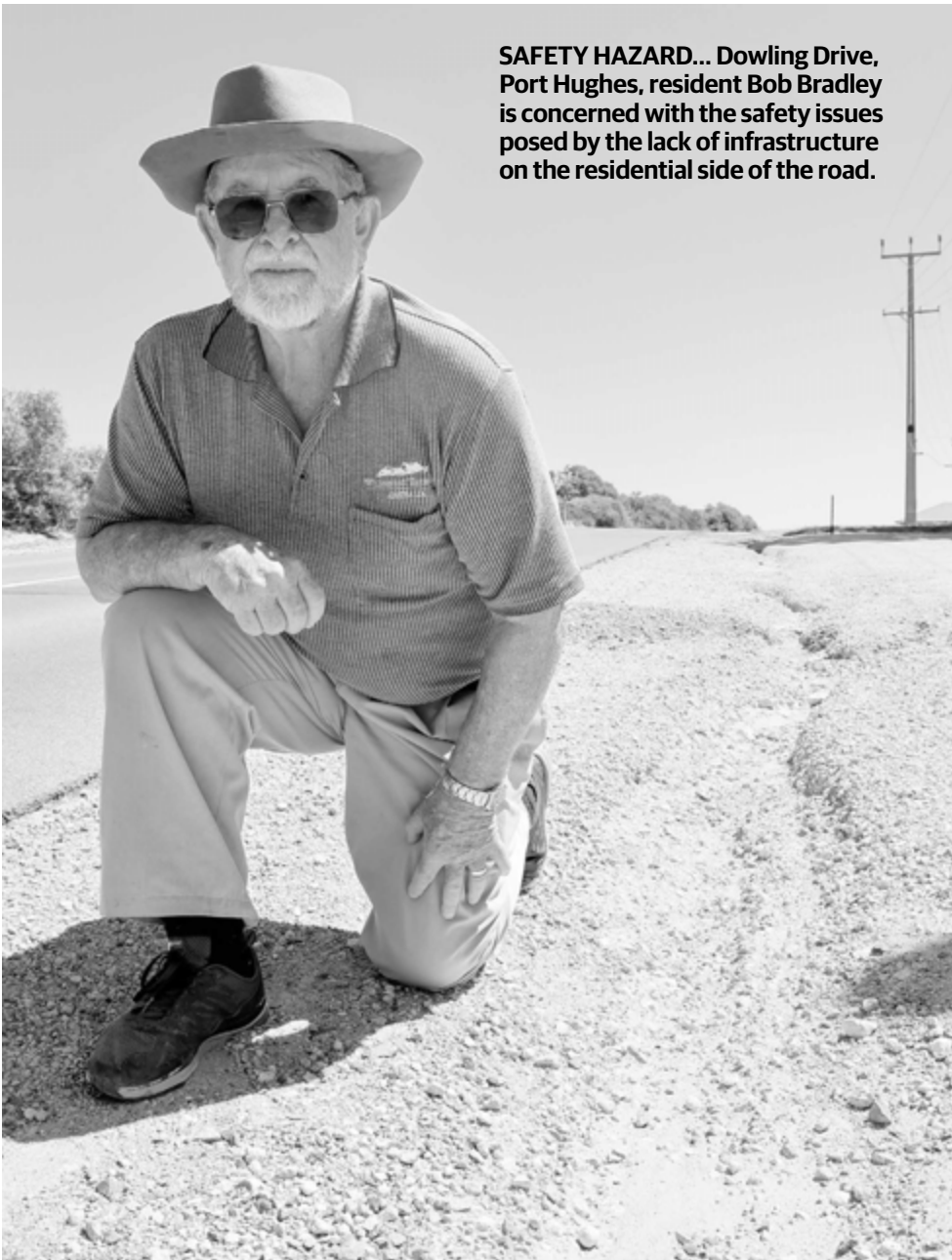
“The total cost of the (Dowling Drive) upgrade is about \$146,220, equating to \$2150 per resident, which is an even distribution between property owners who have legal frontage.”

Resident Bob Bradley said he questioned why residents need-

ed to help pay for the upgrade.

“We’ve been subjected to disruptions during stormwater and SA Water upgrades, but still have no kerbing,” Mr Bradley said.

“Harrys Point Road and roadways in vicinity of The Dunes are appealing to visitors and tourism, which is a credit to council, but when you round the corner (of Harrys Point Road) onto Dowling Drive there’s a black strip with no water control, footpath or visual appeal.”

Potential to bring works forward

COPPER Coast Council will complete sealing and kerbing upgrades to Dowling Drive, Port Hughes, as well as Haynes Street and Martin Terrace, both Kadina, if residents agree to contribute towards 50 per cent of total project costs.

The Dowling Drive upgrade would involve:

- The excavation of existing verge material to be replaced with compacted quarry rubble
- A new 695 metre concrete kerb and channel on the residential side of the road
- Backfilling of rubble both in front of and behind the kerb
- Asphalt sealing between the road and kerb
- Total project cost of \$146,219.95

Haynes Street:

- New rollover kerbing on the residential side of the road
- Pavement upgrade
- A layer of rubble
- A 7m-wide, 590m-long road sealing from Champion Street to Martinga Road
- Total project cost of \$212,272.70

Martin Terrace:

- Pavement upgrade
- A 7m-wide, 1.8-kilometre-long road sealing from the Helston Road/Martin Terrace intersection through Helston and Fairfield Roads
- Total project cost of \$504,160

Pump track plans get off the mark

YORKE Peninsula Council will apply for a state government grant to develop an asphalt pump track at Port Vincent. Councillors committed to the project at their December meeting, last Wednesday, November 30.

A council co-contribution of about \$100,000 was agreed to for the project, should the grant application be successful.

YPC assessed a number of potential sites through its Wheeled Sports and Recreation Parks Plan and Wheeled Sports Working Party after 12 local progress associations, including Port Vincent, registered interest in bringing facilities to their towns.

Port Vincent Progress Association president Michelle Twelftree said the development of the track would provide another way to stay active in the town, as it strives to continuously improve local recreational facilities.

“It’s not a standard modular pump track, it’s a bitumen one so it’s pretty unique and there aren’t any of them on Yorke Peninsula, as far as I’m aware,” she said.

“The track will be long-lasting, there’s local children, those who travel with their parents from other towns but of course the influx of visitors as well, all who will use it.”

Council has until the end of the week to apply for the Office for Recreation, Sport and Racing’s

Community Recreation and Sports Facilities funding.

The grant requires a co-contribution of 50 per cent, with progress committing \$50,000, including about \$20,000 of in-kind contributions.

YPC CEO Andrew Cameron said many communities throughout the region expressed an interest in new or improved wheeled sports facilities.

“We are supportive of this push, having put together our Wheeled Sports and Recreation Parks Plan and a

Wheeled Sports Working Party,” he said.

“After a detailed process, it has been decided that council’s first attempt to secure funding for one of these facilities will focus on a pump track at Port Vincent.

“Council will proceed with an application to the Community Sport and Recreation Facilities Program for the Port Vincent project, and will continue working with the other interested town Progress Associations to progress their plans as well.”

Planning for YP's future

THE long-term infrastructure needs of Yorke Peninsula are being considered as part of the SA Planning Commission's six new regional plans.

PlanSA announced it would consult regional communities to help compile the plans which are set to aid in identifying long-term land use and infrastructure needs to support sustainable growth.

A YP and Mid North plan will guide where houses are built, how the population is serviced, what infrastructure is needed, and how land can be developed.

Barunga West Council CEO Maree Wauchope said BWC will work closely with the commission to provide input into the draft regional plan.

“This (plan) provides a fantastic opportunity to convey our vision and priorities for the Top of the Yorke to support sustainable growth over the next 15 to 30 years,” Ms Wauchope said.

“We have agreed to submit initiatives such as our Recreational Trails Strategy, Tickera Master Plan, Main streets Master Plan, stormwater strategies and coastal management plans.”

Ms Wauchope said there were vital layers of collaboration required, starting with stakeholders and local government, before moving to extensive community consultation next year.

“A regional plan isn't about now, but what needs to happen for our children and grandchildren,” she said.

“Importantly, the plan will take into consideration the vision and aspirations of our community, and help

guide housing expansion, infrastructure and future of parcels of land.

“We need more investment in our roads, schools and health system.”

Yorke Peninsula Council CEO Andrew Cameron said local councils would work together, with the Department for Trade and Investment, to develop the plan.

“This work will include consultation with key local stakeholders and community groups,” Mr Cameron said.

“It (the plan) will provide a long-term vision for the region and identify how growth and change will occur.”

Copper Coast Council director development service Müller Mentz said CCC was made aware of the require-

ment of a new regional plan during a review of the former development act.

“Local councils (previously) participated in a trial to enter into a Joint Planning Agreement, with a view to form a Joint Planning Board,” Mr Mentz said.

“The reason for this was it would have allowed the councils to prepare our own regional plan.

“However, when we learned the minister would have the power to amend the plan without consent of the JPB, we decided it was not worth our investment.”

Mr Mentz said he hoped to see some more detail in the plan to provide more certainty to council and

prospective developers.

“The old planning regime was a very high-level plan with very broad development guidance,” he said.

“The real benefit of the plan will depend on the level of detail it contains and the weight our local input will carry.”

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said one of the important facets of the state's planning code was to have consideration for local issues.

“Some of the local focus was lost in the centralisation of the code,” Mr Ellis said.

“It's vital to maintain our identity, as smaller regions have specific local needs which are different to surroun-

"There was a genuine commitment to focus on developing tourism opportunities to better harness the economic benefits of the region's stunning natural assets," Ms Wauchope said.

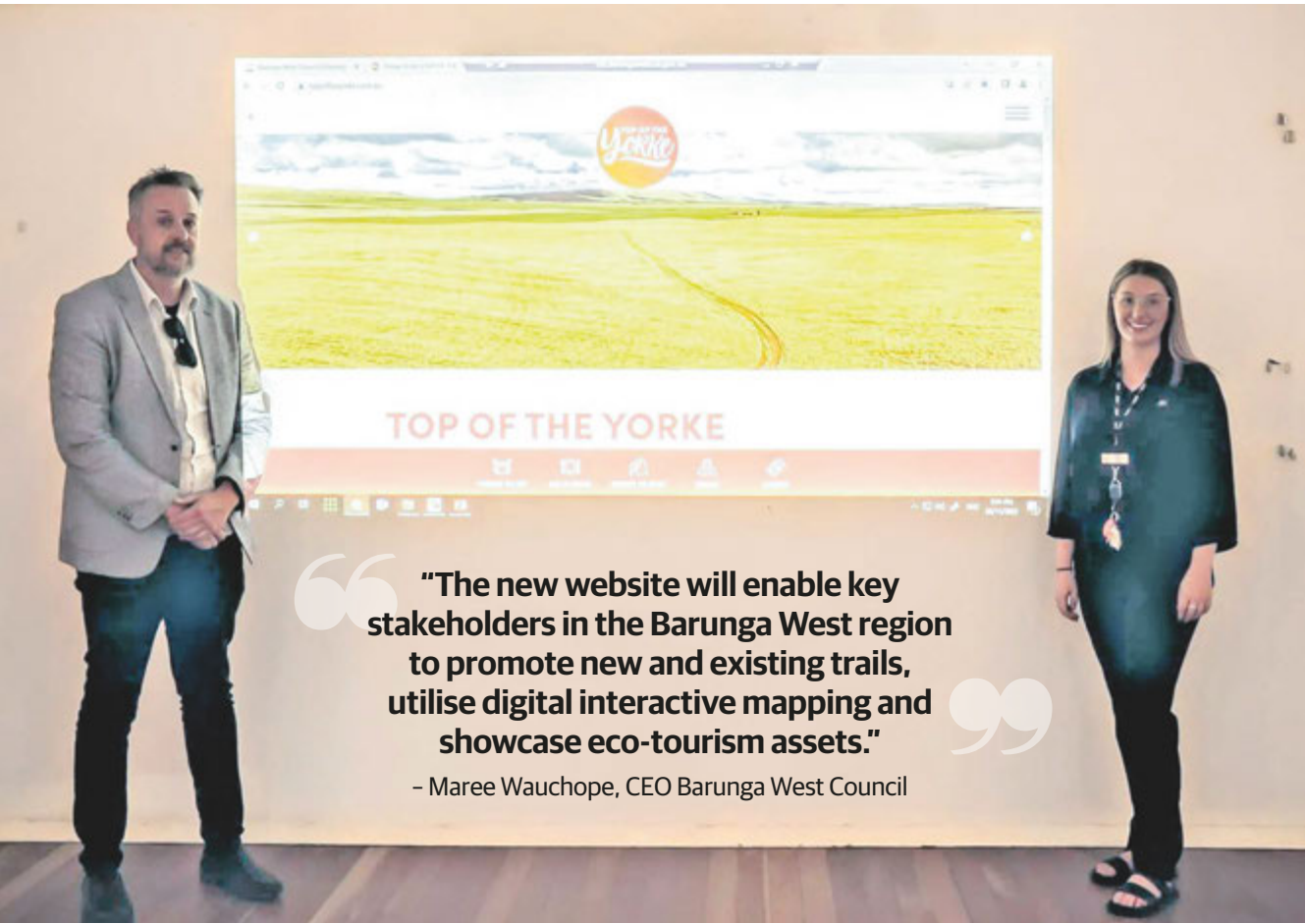
"The natural next step in our marketing strategy was to develop a tourism-based website to further support the Top of Yorke brand.

YP Council begins new term

YORKE Peninsula Council's newly appointed elected members were officially sworn into their roles last Wednesday, November 30.

Darren Braund was re-elected unopposed while Richard Carruthers was installed as deputy mayor for the first time, taking over for from Tania Stock.

Kylie Gray, Michael O'Connell and Trevor Clerke were welcomed to the chamber as councillors for the first time, while Alan Headon and Scott Hoyle resumed roles relinquished in 2018.

Mr Braund welcomed all elected members and recalled on the introductory words he said following the 2018 election.

"Four years ago, I encouraged councillors and staff to do our best to leave our egos at the door when we came into this place (the chamber)," he said.

"Whatever we focus on here in this chamber, we should all be asking the question after the discussions we have, 'is the direction we're taking helpful for our community?'"

"We're here to represent our communities and the peninsula and are encouraged to make sure our words and actions always have that goal."

Mr Braund said he was looking forward to the next four years and believes the group can kick great goals for the peninsula.

Keep kids safe

FOLLOWING on from a record number of drowning deaths in the past year, Royal Life Saving Society — Australia is urging all parents and carers to always Keep Watch around the water.

Our latest research reveals 549 children aged 0 to 4 have died from drowning in Australia in the past 20 years. Forty per cent were aged just one year old.

This clearly reveals there needs to be much more action on supervising young children around water —which is why we urge everybody to Keep Watch.

The drowning risk for young children peaks in summer; 38 per cent of all drowning deaths occur between December and February.

More than half of all deaths occurred in swimming pools, making pools the leading location for drowning among young children.

Drowning in young children is often quick and silent.

Everyday distractions like answering the front door, checking on dinner in the oven or answering a text message can divert someone's attention away from the crucial task of supervision.

This can then enable a child to enter the pool area unaccompanied.

Active supervision means giving your full attention — and avoiding distractions.

It is important you check your pool fence and gate.

Pool gates should never be propped open for any reason.

The 2022 Keep Watch campaign urges parents and caregivers to:

- Supervise. Actively supervise children around water
- Restrict. Restrict children's access to water
- Teach. Teach children water safety skills
- Respond. Learn how to respond in the case of an emergency

Snapper stocks

I READ with much interest the news item Snapper stocks still too short (YPCT 15-11-22).

Being an avid fisherman who has fished Spencer Gulf for more than 30 years and many times chasing the beautiful eating snapper, I have always been concerned when we are being told the snapper species is in low stocks to the degree a three-year ban was placed on their catch.

I have always caught a feed of snapper when I have wanted one and I am sure many fishermen have done the same.

Bag limits are a poor mindset.

Catching a feed should be the attitude and fish stocks would never be depleted.

I accept the South Australian Research and Development Institute assessment of fish species stocks relying on information from long-term fishery data, extensive biological information and documented spawning activities as well as observation of catch.

But, I am sure many fisher-people would query if this data is completely accurate or in some cases it could even be considered unreliable?

Recently I read a state-of-the-art laboratory called OceanOmics had a fishing program operating in Western Australia where they assess fish stocks through their use of DNA techniques on the various ocean fish to determine accurate numbers of each species.

They believe this technique will revolutionise ocean conservation of fish stocks by developing the next generation of genomic tools.

Considering the introduction of the fishing assessment organisation OceanOmics, one hopes SARDI communicates with them where both can coordinate the accurate assessments of fish stocks which will prevent bans being placed on the catching of specific fish species (especially snapper) by recreational fisher-people in the future.

Asthma deaths drop, but should still be lower

ASTHMA deaths in South Australia have dropped for a second straight year, according to new figures from the Australian Bureau of Statistics.

The figures, released by the National Asthma Council Australia show there were 26 asthma-related deaths in SA in 2021, down from 37 in 2020 and 42 deaths in 2019.

Nationally, there were 351 asthma-related deaths in Australia in 2021, dropping from 417 deaths in 2020.

Respiratory Physician and National Asthma Council Australia spokesperson Dr Jonathan Burdon said while it is encouraging there were 11 less deaths, this was likely due to the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic.

“The drop is very likely due in part to SA borders being closed for substantial parts of the year as well as good hygiene when case numbers did rise, including masks and social distancing that helped to limit infections such as the flu,” he said.

“Despite the drop, the sad truth is that most asthma deaths are preventable, so even 26 SA deaths is far too many.

“Asthma mortality rates in Australia are still high by international comparison, so this is not the time for complacency as we are all now circulating freely in the community along with infections and viruses including Covid-19.”

In order to get the asthma death rate down, people need to take proactive steps to reduce their risk.

“In Australia, one in four children and one in 10 adults live with asthma and the best protection is good day to day control of your asthma,” Dr Burdon said.

“That means using a preventer as prescribed and if you need to use a reliever (blue) puffer more than a few times a week, see your doctor for consideration for treatment with a preventer.

“There are also some newer treatments these days for some people with significant asthma related to allergy.

“While there is currently no cure for asthma, good asthma control can prevent symptoms such as wheezing and breathlessness from occurring or progressing into a severe flare-up that could end in death.

“The National Asthma Council Australia is urging all people in SA with asthma to check in with your doctor to review your Written Asthma Action Plan, make sure you are using your inhaler properly and that you know what to do for an asthma flare up, acute attack or in any asthma emergency.”

NAPLAN improvements on YP

THREE Yorke Peninsula schools have recorded some of the most improved NAPLAN results in the state across a five-year period.

Moonta Area School, St Columba's Memorial School and Ardrossan Area School have each reported improved results of nine percent or greater since the 2017 tests.

Minlaton District School also had pleasing results with an average score of 2498.70 throughout the five-year period.

Moonta principal Beth Hector said it was really pleasing to see students continue to grow in their numeracy and literacy learning.

"Being able to continue to grow students learning is something we think is very important," Mrs Hector said.

Community grants available to tackle suicide prevention

COMMUNITY groups and non-government organisations are encouraged to apply for a share of \$180,000 to support community wellbeing and prevent suicide.

The South Australian Suicide Prevention Community Grants focus on supporting communities across South Australia to take positive action to promote inclusion and reduce stigma and suicide risk.

Grants of up to \$10,000 are available for a broad range of grassroots, community-led initiatives which directly and clearly benefit local communities and strengthen the mental wellbeing and resilience of local people and places.

The grants aim to provide opportunities for communities to increase awareness and understanding, identify and respond to local issues or priorities, and build community compassion, capacity and connection.

"Many South Australians have been affected by suicide in some way, and every suicide has a deep and enduring impact on families, friends and communities," Health and Wellbeing Minister Chris Picton said.

"These grants will help non-government organisations and community groups to deliver important localised suicide prevention projects across the state, which in the past have played an important part in helping to prevent suicide.

"Our government is proud to be the first Australian jurisdiction to provide a legislative mechanism to reduce suicide in South Australia through the Suicide Prevention Act 2021, which started on September 5.

"Many South Australians have been affected by suicide in some way, and every suicide has a deep and enduring impact on families, friends and communities."

"A key element of the Act is the establishment of the Suicide Prevention Council which I am pleased has now been appointed and is working towards suicide prevention and postvention initiatives in South Australia.

"These Grants are another step towards promoting positive health and wellbeing in our communities to reduce the rate of suicide."

Wellbeing SA Executive Director of Mental Health and Wellbeing Nicole Keller said she was proud to be providing grant funding for communities to take action to strengthen mental wellbeing and resilience and reduce the risk of suicide.

"In past rounds, the grants have been instrumental in shining a light on positive ways communities can reach and support one another," she said.

"This has been done in a number of ways, including music and dramatic performances, art exhibitions, local community awareness campaigns, cultural events, camps and expeditions, evidence-based training, and community sporting activities."

Applications will be assessed by Wellbeing SA based on the eligibility criteria, with the Grants not designed to support existing programs or services, or for service delivery to individuals after they close on Friday, January 6.

Gavin's rose recognition

KADINA'S Gavin Woods has received one of the highest honours in national rose circles.

Gavin was one of four people presented with the Australian Rose Award for outstanding service to the rose during the World Rose Convention recently.

"I've been successful showing roses over the years, but this award was special and it was quite the honour to have it recognise my administrative roles," he said.

Gavin started showing dahlias at aged 15 and is a dominant force on the national circuit.

"I was never good at sport as a kid, but I was always quite competitive," he said.

"My mother was a florist and I was dragged along with her to get flowers, so I started showing flowers quite young.

"I sort of started showing roses at that point as well; there was a period I lived in the Adelaide Hills where it didn't quite work, but when I moved back here in 1995, that's when I really got serious about roses."

Gavin's involvement in the administration and organisations behind the events soon followed, currently serving as president of the National Rose Society of Australia, as well as terms with the state rose society.

He has also been selected to serve as Australasia's vice-president on the World Federation of Rose Societies.

Work to produce award-winning roses begins several years in advance, with proper soil preparation.

"It probably takes about two to three years for them to produce anything, then you have to make sure they are getting enough water and

nutrients," Gavin said.

"I use all Neutrog products, I did a lot of research and found them to be the best."

About two weeks before a show, Gavin will cut the flowers he wants to show.

"I'll then store them in the fridge; for the world convention I hired a cool room for them," he said.

"Because you pick them early, you

pick them quite young and then the night before the competition, I'll be up preparing the roses to show.

"Then I put them in specially designed eskies I made and try to get to where I need to go before it's light."

Gavin won The Australian Women's Weekly Interstate Trophy at the Rose Society of South Australia's recent 2022 Spring Rose Show.

He also claimed the Champion

Exhibit of Sundry Classes and overall Grand Champion, Grand Amore.

Gavin said he wouldn't be able to show roses, if not for the assistance of partner Kim.

"She is very supportive; I don't think she's as passionate about the roses but she loves engaging with the people," he said.

While the Adelaide event was Gavin's first time showing at a world

convention, due to the challenges with transporting the delicate flower, he has travelled to France and Copenhagen, and is planning to attend the next convention in Japan in 2025.

"Roses have really taken us all around the world and Australia.

"There's many places I wouldn't have been or seen if it weren't for roses," he said.

A Rich history on council

FORMER Yorke Peninsula Council elected member John Rich wrapped up a 27-year career in the chamber last month, choosing not to stand for election for the first time since the early 1990s.

Mr Rich first served as an elected member at Walkerville Council in Adelaide for 15 years from 1995, including six as mayor.

He transitioned to YPC in 2010 and was triumphant in three local elections.

Mr Rich said he initially had no desire to be on council, but quickly found a passion for it.

"I was asked by a friend who was an elected member at Walkerville whether I would consider standing, because she thought a bit of business sense on council would be good," he said.

"I said, 'okay, that's fine,' not knowing local government, but not liking to lose anything. I went to see people and wrote out what I thought were things which might be important and I got elected.

"I ended up sort of being the champion of the dissenting voices and the newbies seemed to follow me for some reason, I don't know why."

Mr Rich was appointed as Walkerville mayor in 2000 and said he's most proud of introduc-

ing a greater level of equity for his ratepayers.

"I didn't want to be (mayor)," he said.

"I had other things — I was still running a company at the time so I was busy as a general manager there and did I need to really involve myself like that? No.

"A couple of members took me aside and said 'look, you're going to be our next mayor' to which I said 'no, no, I don't think so'.

"But I did and I was probably the longest-serving (mayor) at nearly seven years, and I don't think anybody stayed that long, not in recent times anyway."

He moved to Yorke Peninsula and was elected comfortably to council in his first election.

"In the end, I became a little bit disenchanted with metropolitan councils and the way they were developing," Mr Rich said.

"We bought a house at Marion Bay and we were spending more time there and I thought I might as well join the local government on the peninsula.

"I got involved with local communities through progress associations and I had a big interest in the local fishing and marine facilities.

"I was very keen to get something done at Marion Bay before somebody got killed on that bloody boat ramp.

"It's taken me all this time and still it's only just about to get going."

Mr Rich said he enjoyed his time on council and doesn't have any regrets.

"I guess getting involved with state government departments and regional development boards where I was on hand being an influence (was something I enjoyed most)," he said.

"I enjoyed supporting the mayor and the CEO; we've got a very good CEO (Andrew Cameron) and Darren (Braund)'s doing quite a good job as mayor.

"Am I getting a bit jaded and tired? Yes, I am and, my health hasn't been as good as it was and in the past couple of years, I've struggled a bit."

He said he realised early you can't be all things to all people and you can't do everything yourself.

"I've found the individual can make a difference and if you have the occasional success in whatever you're trying to achieve, it's a great feeling and it spurs you on for the next challenge," John said.

"But you've got to try to convince people of your view and I've always accepted that on council my view might not be right.

"Local government is no different from any other enterprise, it's fundamentally about people."

Ardrossan family connections

TASMANIA'S Sue Buckland recently travelled to Ardrossan to learn more about her family history.

Sue is the granddaughter of Elsie Rosalind Bryson Vandeeper, who was born at Petersville in 1907.

"With the passing of my mother Rosslyn (Elsie's oldest daughter) in February 2020, I became more interested in Elsie and the female side of our family," Sue said.

"Her family believed the Vanderpeers had originated from Holland as free settlers to Adelaide.

"I decided in 2023 I would go to Holland to see my origins but first, I needed to know the South Australian connection, how the Vandeeper came here and where they came from.

"After doing research, I knew Ardrossan was key to how William and Susan Vandeeper (Elsie's grandparents) came to Adelaide from England in 1854.

They resided in Adelaide before purchasing allotment 101 and later 100 at Petersville."

Sue discovered the Ardrossan Museum online and spoke to volunteers Joy and Derek Birkin who put them in contact with Mike and James Vandeeper

Sue was joined on her journey by her uncle John Tate and cousin Carolyn Tate.

"When we arrived in Ardrossan, I was blown away by this beautiful and tranquil town," Sue said.

"Thank you to James and Julianne (Vandeeper) who invited us for lunch, having never met us.

"They could not have been more hospitable or generous with their time.

"We visited the land William and Susan purchased in Petersville, and saw where their homes were built.

"That night, we met Mike and Greg Vandeeper and James and Julianne joined us and we learned more about our history.

"The next day we met at the museum and were welcomed by Derek and Joy.

"They had spent time marking out all the grave sites for us to visit, and Derek had also gone through all the history books and earmarked relevant articles.

"After thanking them, we took the colour coded map Derek had made for us to the cemetery and to see our relatives' resting place was a fitting end to our trip. "We left with a deep connection to Petersville and Ardrossan."

More affordable care for families

ABOUT 85,000 families across South Australia will have access to more affordable childcare from July next year.

Legislation passed through federal parliament to increase the current child care subsidy.

Families earning \$80,000 or less will have their subsidy increased to 90 per cent.

Families with a combined income of \$120,000 with one child in care will be \$1780 better off in the first year under the reforms.

Minister for Education Jason Clare said the passing of legislation delivers on the government's commitment to cut the cost of early education and care.

"The reforms the Albanese Government is delivering are good for children, good for families and good for the economy," he said.

Minister for Early Childhood Education Dr Anne Aly said more affordable early childhood education and care means more children can access the benefits of foundation years learning.

"The first five years of a child's life are vital to brain development, that's why we're making early childhood education more affordable and boosting the number of subsidised hours available to First Nations families," she said.

"These changes will provide household budget relief for families struggling with the rising cost of living, while also improving the economic security of women."

CENTRAL Yorke School, Maitland, year 10 student Nicholas Heinrich recently travelled to the Northern Territory as a recipient of the Anzac Spirit Prize.

Nicholas spent two weeks during the October school holidays with 20 other students from across the country learning about the ANZAC involvement in World Wars I and II.

The Anzac Prize is awarded to students who produce a quality research project about military personnel who served in World War I or II.

Nicholas' project was about Sergeant William George Bridgman, who enlisted from Balaklava and served in the Royal Australian Air Force.

"The study tour focused on the historical, geographical, social and cultural aspects of Australia," Nicholas said.

"A major part of the trip was the cultural experiences we had throughout Arnhem Land and Kakadu."

Nicholas said while the trip was filled with exciting and educational features, visiting the Adelaide River War Cemetery was his highlight.

"We were asked to research a victim of the Darwin bombings before the trip, and we had the opportunity to pay our respects while at the cemetery," he said.

"We also had a ceremony to remember those who lost their lives as a result of the attacks on Australian soil.

"Participating in the service and seeing the cemetery gave us all a sense of surrealism, but in a way, this concluded the journey.

"We had been waiting so long to finally be able to show our respect and honour those who sacrificed their lives for our country."

The group also visited the Darwin Military Museum, Aviation Museum, National History Museum, Royal Flying Doctors Museum, attended a Bombing of Darwin cruise and spent time in Arnhem Land.

"It was a fantastic learning opportunity, and gave us a chance to connect more with those involved in World War II," Nicholas said.

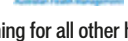

Surfing Australia announced 16-year-old Day, of Nharangga background, as one of 16 junior surfers selected for the inaugural First Nations Youth High Performance Program.

Surfers will visit hotspots such as Bells Beach, Victoria, and the Hyundai Surfing Australia High Performance Centre, New South Wales, throughout the year long program.

Day plans to travel to Victoria for the first of three camps in February.

"This program will be a great chance to experience time on other lands whilst learning about my culture," Day said.

"It will be great to travel across Australia whilst strengthening my surfing.

"I can't wait for next year and what it will bring to my career."

Day will have access to her own high-performance plan, including strength and conditioning training, sports psychology, life skills, trick acquisition, athlete wellbeing, and other development opportunities.

The cultural elements of the program will be guided by a group of well-respected Indigenous surfers, with the performance aspect to be led by SA Talent Pathways manager Clancy Dawson, performance coach Jordie Campbell and former world

champion Chelsea Hedges.

Day said she had already built connections with other First Nations surfers during her first Australian Indigenous Surfing Titles on Wada Wurrungin country, Victoria, in May this year.

"I have met other First Nations surfers from around Australia and learnt so much about my culture which was very rewarding," Day said.

"We are all a big community when we come together and support each other."

Day was runner-up in the under 18 Indigenous Surfing Titles and third in the open women category.

She also finished 28th in the Australian Junior Surfing Titles on North Stradbroke Island, Queensland, last week.

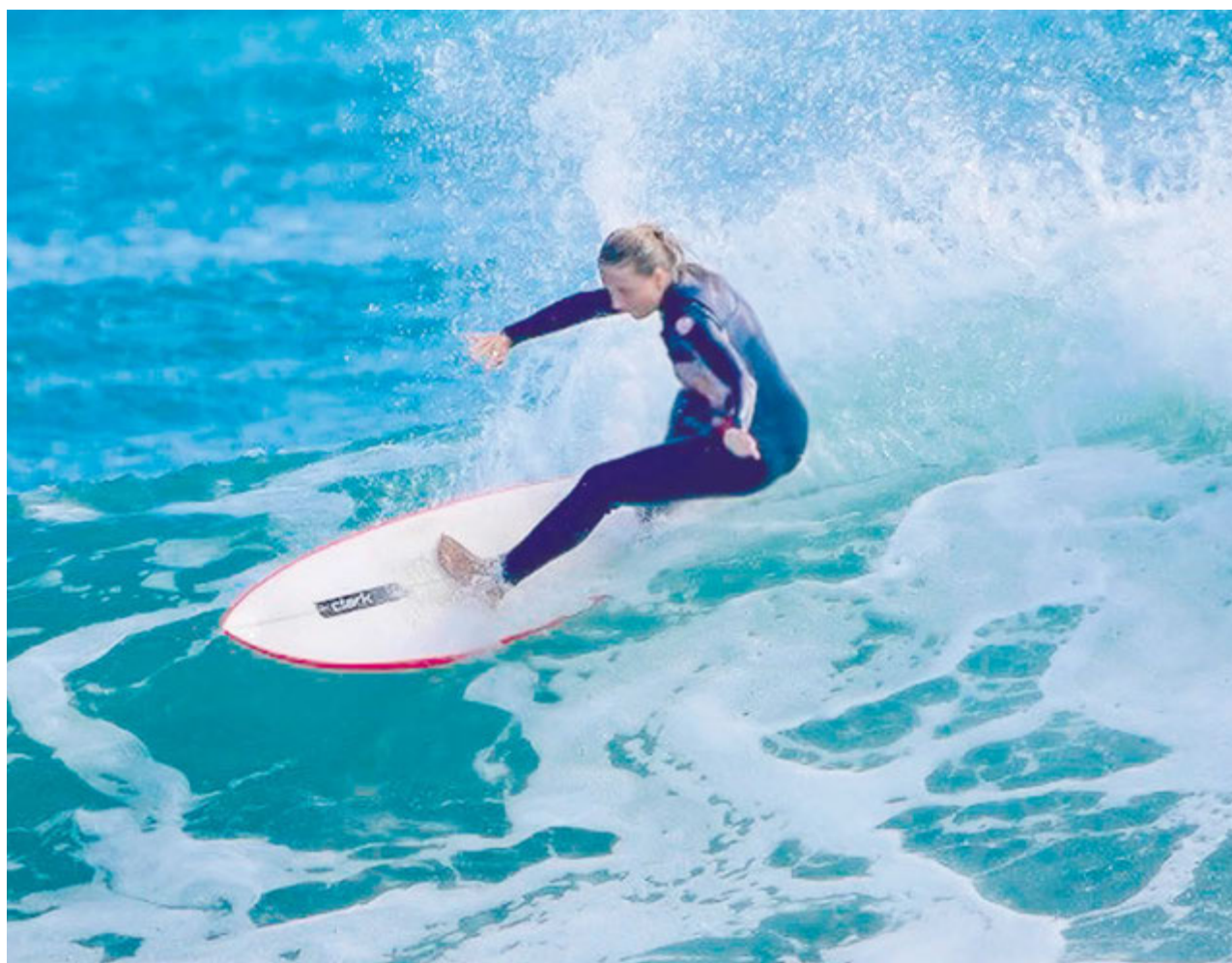
"Being our first year back from Covid (interruptions), it has been good to get back into competitions and travel interstate again," Day said.

"The last two years of nationals were cancelled, so I've missed out on my main junior years which has been super disappointing."

Day said the high-performance pathway should help make up for missing out on key coaching opportunities through the past three years.

"In South Australia, there aren't specialised facilities and coaching available compared to the bigger surfing states like Queensland and New South Wales," she said.

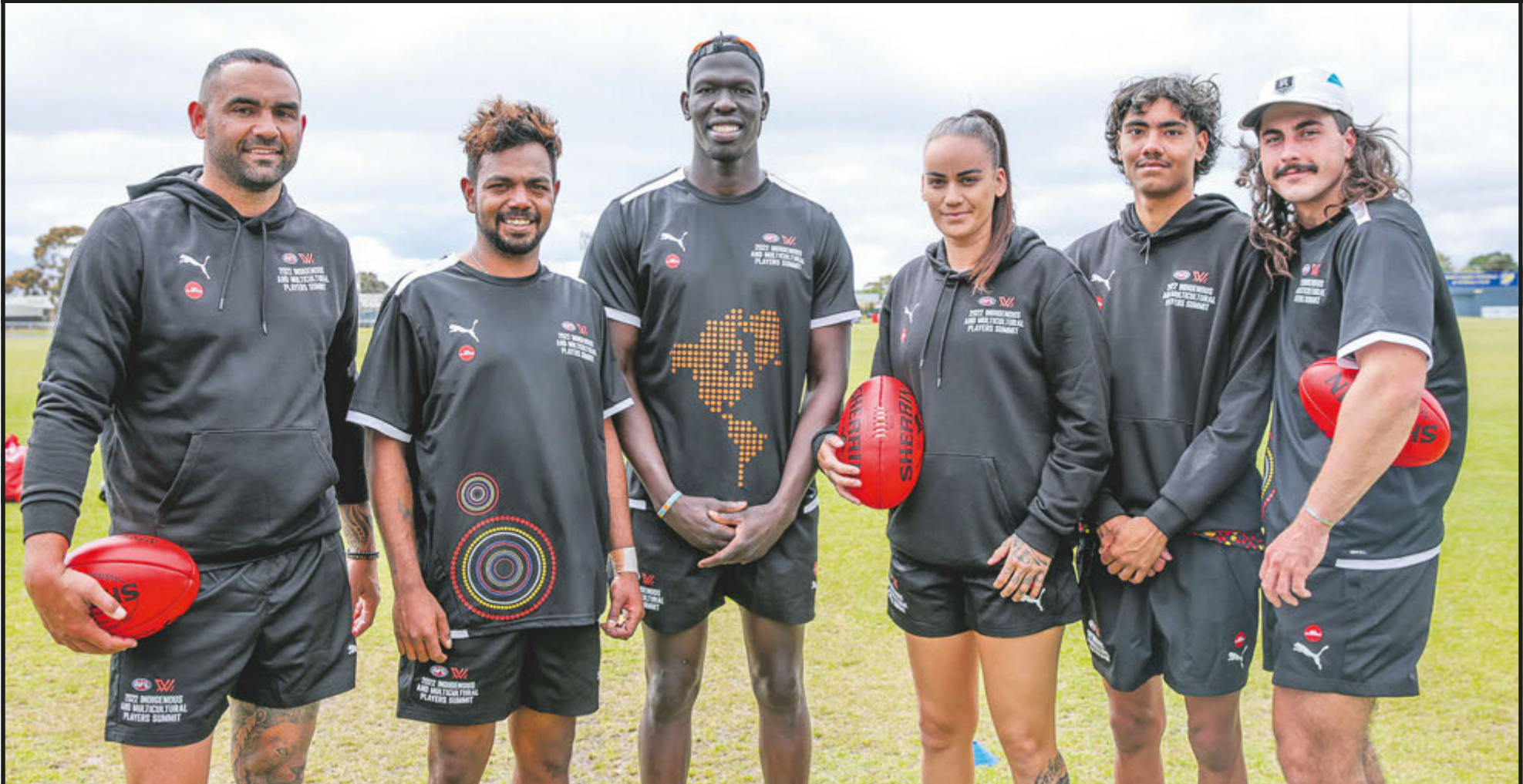

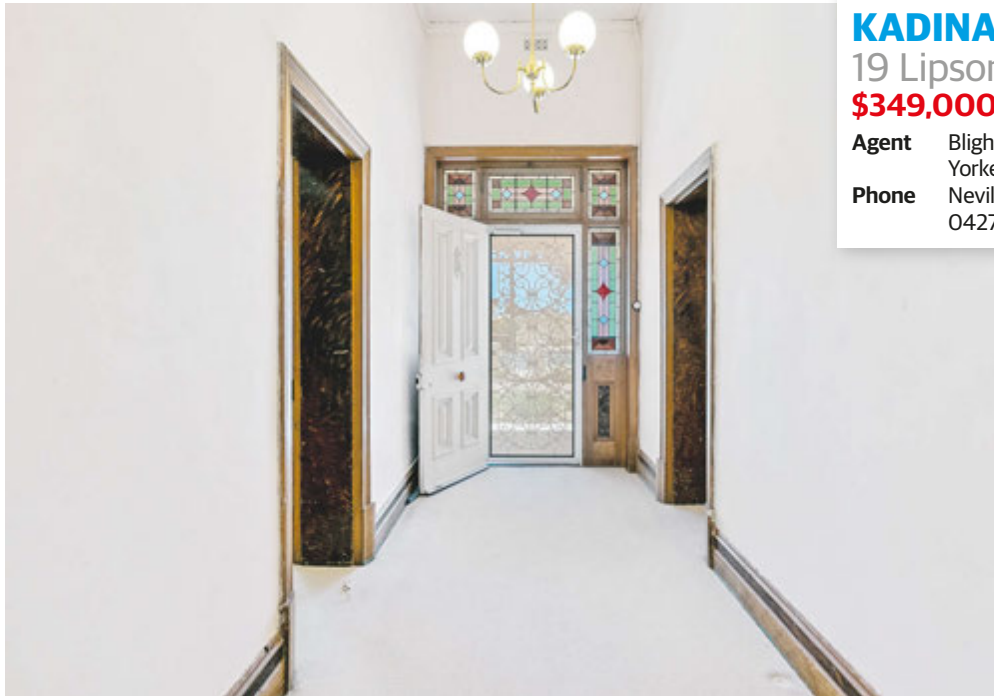

Project supports healthy soil future

A \$15 MILLION project from the CSIRO will develop a national soil information system.

The Australian National Soil Information System supports the National Soil Strategy and is funded by the federal government's Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry.

The ANSIS will allow improved sharing of nationally consistent soil data and information through online access for users.

Currently, soil data is collected using different methods, by different organisations, and at a range of depths in the soil.

This makes it hard to access, compare and use data from different sources.

ANSIS project lead Peter Wilson said improving access to the best soil data and information can help promote digital agriculture innovation and is key to sustainably managing Australia's soils.

"By using ANSIS, farmers

and agricultural advisors will have access to more soil data and be better placed to more sustainably manage the soil on which they rely," he said.

"Soil is vital to our agricultural production and natural environments, as well as our health and wellbeing.

"This information system will help us all care for this important natural resource.

"Productive, healthy and resilient soil means more economic, environmental and social benefits to Australia.

"Monitoring soil also helps our scientific understanding about how our natural world is changing.

"This work gives us insights into biodiversity, water resources, landscapes and coastlines, fauna, climate and geology.

"By harmonising Australia's soil data, we can make it accessible across many fields of science and exploration."

The system will be available for use in 2023.

Harvest record broken

SOUTH Australia's 2022-23 harvest is set to break production level and farm gate value records, according to estimates in the latest South Australian Crop and Pasture Report.

The report expects growers to produce 12.1 million tonnes (up from 11.1 million tonnes in 2016-17) despite unseasonable weather and subsequent delays to harvesting.

"Even allowing for some downgrades of the grain quality due to weather damage, high global grain prices mean the harvest also has a record high farm gate value," Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven said.

"The current estimate of \$4.4 billion is expected to bring home over a billion dollars more than the previous record of \$3.3 billion.

"This is fantastic news for our farmers as well as South Australia's economy."

The report also reveals high canola prices have resulted in increased canola area at the expense of barley, and the decline in pea area continued to a record low this year.

"Despite challenging conditions at times during the season, it is pleasing to see PIRSA's latest Crop and Pasture Report is predicting record yields and value this harvest, making the grain industry in South Australia an even more significant contributor to the state's economy," Grain Producers SA CEO Brad Perry said.

"Additionally, the consistent rainfall over recent months has provided strong sub-soil moisture, so we anticipate this will set grain producers up for a great start to next season as well."

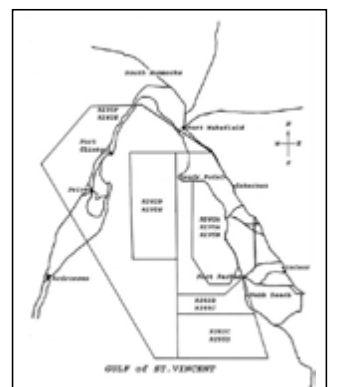

These firings may require specific tidal or weather conditions, and are critical for the safety of current and new Defence capabilities. Members of the public may notice noise, vibration, flashes and/or smoke during the testing. There is no risk to the public outside of the gazetted Defence Practice Areas.

For reasons of public safety, there is a permanent exclusion zone covering land, sea and air around the Port Wakefield Establishment. Specific details on the Port Wakefield Prohibited Area can be obtained from Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No GN 26, 4 July 1990, and is shown on the diagram below. Trespassing in this Area is strictly prohibited and very dangerous due to the presence of unexploded bombs. Any person found within the Prohibited Area or on Defence land will be subject to prosecution.

Specific test and evaluation activities may also require restricting public access to the Port Wakefield Defence Practice Areas over specific periods with these areas articulated in the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No. GN 40, 7 October 1992, and also identified on the diagram below. This may affect access to the Gulf of St Vincent at Port Wakefield and Port Parham.

HOT FISHING TIPS

Welcome again to the fishing column with all the hot tips for fishing Yorke Peninsula; contact Greg by email at greg@gregjamesfishing.com.au.

Wallaroo: Reasonably warm weather greeted fishers for part of last week as winds switched somewhat to the north then westerly as the weekend progressed. There was a grain ship at the jetty, prawn trawlers south of Bird Reef and a barge out from the old silos, so the port and surrounding waters have been busy. Garfish, squid and a few blue crabs came from the jetty, while Point Riley grounds had boat crews fishing for squid, gar and blueys as well.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: The steamer channel surprised anglers during the week with a couple of days of fishing when rat kingfish made an appearance! King George whiting are off the southern grounds at Cape Elizabeth with gar and squid at Tipara Reef. A few squid and blueys came from the jetties.

Port Victoria: Whiting catches have been steady from Wardang Island grounds, Balgowan and Chinaman's Well. The jetty has a few blueys and squid after dusk.

Point Turton: Slow tides have had somewhat of a negative effect on local jetty-

based fishing with a couple garfish and small tommies (Australian herring) the main reports. Boat crews have fished far and wide for KG whiting, squid and garfish from Port Rickaby and The Pines.

Marion/Stenhouse Bays: Both jetties have squid and tommy ruffs with garfish out from Penguin's Point and Hillock's Beach. Salmon trout and a few mullet are at Daly Heads and Gym Beach. Big boat crews are checking the islands and other offshore drops for tuna, sweep, kingfish and red nannygai.

Edithburgh/Stansbury: Several local anglers reported good catches of squid and blue swimmer crabs over the weekend from Port Giles and Stansbury. The Orontes Bank has big snook and small KG whiting, while garfish and squid are off Port Vincent and Sultana Point. The jetties have a few blueys and squid.

Black Point/Ardrossan: Boat crews reported KG whiting from the Gus Shoal and east of the old Black Point boat ramp. The Ardrossan town jetty has soapie mullo way cruising past after dusk and there are yellowfin whiting and blueys north of Tiddy Widdy Beach.
