# Marina works enter next stage

A SIXTH stage of works at the Copper Cove Marina, Wallaroo, has begun.

The marina was approved as a major development in 1999, with plans involving 500 housing allotments as well as commercial properties and up to 154 marina berths.

Construction has now started on the land along Heritage Drive, between the boat ramp and the Coopers Alehouse for a new road and installation of services to the new proposed allotments.

Crystalcorp Developments business development manager Alexander Stone said the civil works were the start of Stage Six.

"These works will facilitate future development projects, which may include tourist accommodation, residential and commercial, and marinerelated facilities; this mix is yet to be determined," he said.

"Numerous discussions with the Copper Coast Council on how these

developments will likely proceed in the future have been held and will be ongoing to establish final proposals.

"These civil works include a new sealed public road over the site with access from Heritage Drive to the wharf for the commercial fishing community, in addition to limited public access to the waterfront."

Updated electricity, water and sewerage facilities will be included within these works.

"Civil works are likely to continue until early April," Mr Stone said.

"In cooperation with Kelly Pyke-Tape of the Spencer Gulf and West Coast Prawn Fishermen's Association Inc., Crystalcorp Development have sought to have minimal interference with the fishing season and wharf access while the civil works proceed over Stage Six."

Copper Coast Council director development services Muller Mentz said council had recently approved a land division, which will create a public road, two reserves and seven commercial sites. "We have not approved any built form on any of the proposed new allotments," Mr Mentz said.

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"The new allotments can only be registered on separate titles once all the works and services are completed to service these newly created allotments.

"The proposed allotments are for commercial type uses which include a variety of possible uses, including retail and accommodation type developments as allowed in the Planning and Design Code."

#### The anti-troll fight

IN THEORY, the federal government's new anti-trolling legislation intends to make social media a safer place.

These new laws will require social media companies with more than 250,000 Australian users to have a way to deal with complaints and requests for information — a good thing.

A person can complain to a social media company about comments they feel are defamatory and the company then has three days to take the complaint to the commenter.

They can remove the comment and identify the anonymous user if consent is given.

If the company refuses to provide details, the commenter refuses to consent to its information being shared or the platform is unable to identify who made the defamatory comments, it may wear defamation

The legislation would also reverse a recent High Court decision which found operators of social media pages were liable for defamatory comments posted on them.

In the changes, those companies, like Facebook, would then be considered the publishers of comments alongside the commenters themselves instead of the page or organisation on whose page the words were posted.

Many experts believe it's too little, too late, that the damage has already been done and some definitions around trolling are subjective.

Preventing people from anonymity may also censor minority voices from speaking up.

There's no denying online bullying and hateful behaviours are truly awful and should be stopped, but I'm not sure this is the right fit.

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# **Border closures** not ruled out

not ruling out border closures as they seek more information about the COVID-19 Omicron variant.

SA Police Commissioner Grant Stevens said SA Health had recommended the closure of South Australia's borders to New South Wales, Victoria and the Australian Capital Territory.

"This recommendation was denied, instead forcing arrivals from these states to get tested on arrival and isolate until they receive a negative result (as well as an additional test on day six)," Mr Stevens said.

"At this point in time, we just don't have enough information to make a definitive decision.

"We are watching very closely, we can't rule out border closures, but if we do that, it will be on the basis of legitimate concerns that need to be responded to."

At the time of print, there were 45 active cases in the state, taking the total case number to 971. There have been 49 total new cases since the borders opened on November 23.

#### **COVID** hospital rules

Port Pirie Hospital is one of 10 regional hospitals which will accept COVID patients.

The announcement was part of SA Health's COVID-19 Acute Care Response and COVID-19 Regional Response Strategies, released last week.

COVID-19 Regional Response Governance Group chairperson Wayne Champion said, while regional hospitals were not designated COVID treating hospitals, selected regional hospitals will act as COVID accepting hospitals.

"These regional COVID accepting

SOUTH Australian authorities are hospitals in the Riverland, Coober Pedy, Port Lincoln, Roxby Downs, Port Augusta, Whyalla, Port Pirie, Kangaroo Island, Murray Bridge, and Mount Gambier, will accept and stabilise acutely unwell COVID regional patients and assist the transfer to one of the three designated metropolitan hospitals," Mr Champion said.

These include The Royal Adelaide Hospital the designated hospital for positive adult patients, the Women's and Children's Hospital for children who test positive, and the Flinders Medical Centre for COVID-positive pregnant women and their babies.

"As patient numbers increase, larger regional COVID accepting hospitals may commence providing inpatient care for some positive patients.

"Regional COVID Care Centres being established in Mount Gambier and Port Augusta will provide assessment, referral, and treatment for people with mild to moderate COVID-19 symptoms, to help reduce the demand on emergency departments and ensuring people have access to infusions and other treatments approved to manage COVID symp-

New guidelines have also been set for public hospital visitors.

All visitors must provide proof of a TGA-approved COVID-19 vaccination status upon entry, unless they have an approved medical exemption, or are a child 12 years or vounger.

Unvaccinated visitors will have to wear protective clothing and get a COVID test.

Under the new guidelines, one visitor will be able to see a patient for two hours at a time, with allowances made for paediatric patients and in circumstances when certain approved by the hospital or local health network.

## **Concerns with Flaherty Beach**

WAROOKA resident Darryl Burton has raised concerns about the road leading to Flaherty Beach.

Mr Burton said he has been visiting the beach, about five kilometres from Warooka, for two years and the road hasn't been maintained.

He also is concerned about the "daggy" state of the car park area.

"The main issue is the state of the road that leads to the beach ... the road is pretty dodgy," he said.

"I like to go for a walk along the beach, it is used by a lot of people but the road needs to be graded more

"I have been coming to the beach for two years now and I don't think that it has been graded in that time and haven't seen any improvements."

Mr Burton said the beach is great for kids and families and is a popular place for four-wheel drives.

"It also looks a bit daggy and it's a shame they (Yorke Peninsula Council) aren't maintaining the car park because the beach is an asset," he

"I don't like to sound like I am complaining, I'm thinking of other people as well because it is an asset and we want people to visit."

Yorke Peninsula Council Stephen operations manager Goldsworthy said reports of hoon behaviour and illegal dumping are common for the area.

"With such a large coastline, 485 kilometres, and limited resources we rely heavily on our ratepayers to report such problems," Mr Goldsworthy said.

"While the bumpy/corrugated road isn't ideal for normal users as the road is basically a dead end with a number of rises in it, it does slow traffic down.

"It is treated the same as any road in our network and graded as part of the shift patrol grading schedule."

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#### \$5000 for Feast on the Foreshore

PORT Broughton's Good Friday Feast on the Foreshore has received a \$5000 boost.

The state government funding will enable Barunga West Council to engage specialised personnel, hire infrastructure, develop strategic plans and amplify marketing activities for its second Easter celebration.

Council secured the funding through round two of the South Australian Tourism Commission's Regional Event Fund after trialling the event to huge success earlier this year.

Staff have been working to secure 12 food trucks — six more than this year — for the event, plus more local entertainment.

#### Novice drivers falling victim to road rage

Road rage is a major concern among teenagers, an RAA survey has shown.

More than a quarter of students with a learner or provisional licence have been victims of road rage at some point.

The alarming statistic comes as an increasing number of learner drivers spend time behind the wheel during the summer holidays.

A survey of more than 2800 high school students found 82 per cent had already witnessed road rage as a passenger.

It also showed almost half the students said their parents had instigated the aggression.

RAA senior manager community education Ben Haythorpe said road rage endangered the safety of all road users.

"It's very disappointing that an overwhelming majority of the students had already witnessed road rage as a passenger," Mr Haythorpe said.

"It's also of great concern that so many novice drivers have already been victims

Mr Haythorpe said it was frightening how disagreements among drivers could escalate so quickly into aggression.

"That is why it's important we send a message that all road users need to be courteous and considerate to each other,"

"Experienced motorists need to cut learner drivers some slack, show them patience and don't express frustration.

"It's also important for novice drivers to not be aggressive or react to aggression."

#### Men arrested in attempted break-in

Police were called to an Ardrossan address where several men were attempting to break into a home early on Friday night, December 3.

Ardrossan police arrested three men, all who failed to enter the home.

Two Ardrossan men, aged 48 and 22, were arrested and charged with property damage and aggravated assault, while a 28 year old was reported for disorderly behaviour.

"This has breathed new life into the building, which is once again safe for the public to enjoy for many more functions into the future."



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

# Chemist getting back on its feet

RECOVERY is underway for Newbery Chemists, Wallaroo, after a fire destroyed its building on Monday morning, November 29.

The chemist's ceiling, a wall and cellar all collapsed as a result of the structure fire, which bellowed toxic smoke.

The fire has been treated as non-suspicious although the cause is still under investigation.

Emergency services were widely praised for their response times and efficiency in limiting the fire's damage.

Newbery Chemists staff also responded rapidly by securing a two-year lease of Wallaroo Shopping Centre's shop 6, accessed from the outdoor foyer area.

Newbery Chemists general manager Tim Gross said he was

in the process of installing new equipment and fit outs for the premises.

"Our services are pretty limited because (the new store) is a much smaller space, but we'll be back to functioning as normally as possible soon," Mr Gross said.

"We'll have a person onsite during business hours to inform everyone how to access our services.

"We will also be sending clients' medical scripts online or to Kadina where they can be collected.

"Getting payments through has also been tricky, but we should have (this system) up in the coming days."

Mr Gross said his team had acted exceptionally despite the enormous setback.

"My trust in the team was the

main reason we've reopened so quickly," he said.

"They've all been really positive and are looking forward to the next stage.

"There'll be no jobs lost in the process and we'll have staff back at our (Moonta and Kadina) sites to deliver the same services for our valued clients."

Mr Gross said he has received an overwhelming amount of support from the community.

"Our suppliers have also been excellent and are getting ready to roll out (our resources)," he said.

The new premises are set to include two dispensary benches and two service counters and are on track to be near-fully operational by Christmas.

The store is also scheduled to have a full shop fit-out installed by next March.



#### **Forever Newbery family history**

NEWBERY Chemists, Wallaroo, has been part of Wallaroo's history for more than a century.

The Owen Terrace site was built in the early 1900s by Ernest Ford Newbery, grandfather of current owner Kent Newbery, and started trading as E.F. Newbery Chemist.

Ownership of the business and premises transferred to one of E.F. Newbery's sons John Newbery, Kent's uncle, in the 1940s.

"(The chemist) was also Dad's family home — he often recalled how he would sleep out on the balcony on hot summer nights," Kent said.

The business briefly left the family when it was sold to Alex and Jill Flower in the early 1970s, before being purchased by Kent and his late father Don in 1982.

"Dad and I were business partners until he retired and I took over," Kent said. "One of our biggest milestones was purchasing (the chemist) back into the family.

"I also became the property owner when he died about 15 years ago — Tim (Gross) also joined the team at about the same time."

Kent said he was in a state of shock for about 24 hours after the fire last week.

"We had to front insurance assessors on Tuesday who classified it as a total write off," he said.

"We're now in the process of organising a demolition clean-up. "It's my sole intention to have the site cleaned up and to rebuild as a pharmacy again."

Kent said the old building would always be a big part of his family's history

"We've always had a solid team to service the Wallaroo community," he said

"Julie (Weight) has been working here since we bought the building back more than 40 years ago.

"We've had lots of wonderful staff and great community support in my time.
"I have no doubt Tim and his team will

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












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## No workers cheer on Christmas

SOUTH Australian workers will be the only ones in the country not receiving penalty rates on Christmas Day.

Both the Liberal and Labor Parties blamed each other for the breakdown in Act amendments

Treasurer Rob Lucas has claimed, despite weeks of public protests by Labor and opposition leader Peter Malinauskas, when the opportunity presented itself, it was turned down in a "remarkable act of stubbornness".

Independent MP Troy Bell tabled a compromise to amend the Holidays Act 1910 which would have resulted in time and a half pay on Christmas Day, and instead remove penalty rates on Christmas Eve.

However, it was knocked back. "Ultimately, Mr Malinauskas and Labor have nobody to blame but themselves for refusing to support a reasonable compromise by independent MP Troy Bell which was supported by the government," Mr Lucas said.

"The last thing small businesses need, particularly those in tourism and hospitality, after more than 18 months of COVID, is to be hit with having to pay 250 per cent penalty rates for fourand-a-half days in a row over Christmas was untenable."

Shadow Minister for Industrial Relations Kvam Maher said South Australian workers deserved to be compensated.

"Our essential frontline workers, such as retail workers, nurses, ambos and police officers, have been the heroes of the COVID-19 pandemic," he said.

"So how does Steven Marshall thank them? He votes against a bill which would have given them the penalty rates they deserve."

#### **Wallaroo Shores evolving**

THE development of Wallaroo Shores continues to evolve.

Copper Coast Council mayor Roslyn Talbot said Wallaroo Shores was a major development within the Copper Coast.

"The development will have significant benefits to the region providing facilities and housing options for all to enjoy," Mrs Talbot said.

"Council has worked with the developer to ensure infrastructure that council will ultimately own is constructed to a high standard.

"I am looking forward to watching this development evolve to its full potential.

"As the development continues, the benefit to the community will be realised and the financial commitment to the CCC will be finalised."

The planned development will result in about 600 residential dwellings, a lifestyle village, retail precinct, medical centre and a four-star resort operated by Wyndham Hotels and Resorts.

The resort will contain 100 dwellings (mainly townhouses) and a function centre consisting of a restaurant and café, catered function rooms, meeting rooms and offices and a gymnasium and resort services.

CCC CEO Russell Peate said the \$220 million project would be an important asset to the Copper Coast.

"In July 2017, council adopted a separate rate to enable the construction of the Liberator Way road, enable other critical infrastructure and local economic development initiatives for the Copper Coast," Mr Peate said.

The separate rate levy in 2017 was set at \$7m, with the separate rate to be paid to council with the prescribed interest applicable under the Local Government Act 1999, on the formal sale and settlement of allotments as they occurred.

"The majority of the dwellings in the resort have been sold and continue to be sold and, therefore, some payments have been made to

"The full amount payable to council, including accumulated interest on the separate rate balance, is due by June 30, 2023."

Council will review payments made by Copper Coast Investments to council in February 2023, after a new council has been elected (in November 2022).

CCC continues to work cooperatively with Copper Coast Investments, the developer of Wallaroo Shores, and its project manager Monopoly Property Group.

### Search on for rightful owners

A GROUP of amateur detectives is on a mission to find the rightful owner of a set of World War I medals.

The medals belonged to Private Samuel Burns Roberts, the son of William Roberts, of Wallaroo, and was born in 1893.

He enlisted in Kadina and was deployed to Gallipoli on March 13, 1916, as a part of the 27th Infantry Battalion, and was discharged following exposure to a poisonous gas shell in Belgium in 1918.

Adelaide's Julie Ford, without having any connection to Samuel or the Copper Coast, came across two of Private Roberts' medals when they were given to her parents in Port Lincoln by their neighbours Ren and Kit Ashneade.

"We (my sister and I) were just kids at the time, but when we moved to Adelaide, the box of stuff they'd been given came

up (in conversation)," Mrs Ford said.

"My mother was told not to give any of it to anyone else, but really, there was nothing valuable in there anyway, it's just a few bits and pieces.

"But that's another mystery as well, we've got no idea of the connection between him (Samuel) and this couple who lived next door to us."

After years of feeling guilty about being in possession of two medals that weren't hers, Mrs Ford — along with her brother-in-law Paul Rebbeck and their respective spouses Ken Ford and Susanne Rebbeck — decided to search for the rightful owner.

The quartet has slowly been putting Private Roberts' story together thanks to online databases.

They have two of the three medals he was awarded, the Victory Medal and the British War Medal, however the third, the 1914-15 Star, is nowhere to

The three medals were given

to anyone who served in conflict for the Commonwealth at

The group believes there is a chance Private Roberts came back to Kadina after he was discharged but they have hit a road block in finding the medal's home.

"They don't belong to us, but there is a family out there missing a part of their history," Mr Rebbeck said.

"I don't really think we've got anywhere else in particular to go so we'd love it if anyone would come forward and claim what is theirs.

"They're no good just sitting in a box."

Scribbled notes say Samuel died on January 1, 1987.

The medals are not valuable and the group would appreciate if only those who really think they're related to Samuel come forward.

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# **Skin Cancer Screening Unit at Stansbury**

MORE than 120 people booked in for skin checks with the Lions Club Skin Cancer Screening Unit at Stansbury during

Volunteers from the unit travelled from as far away as Peterborough and the Adelaide Hills for the weekend.

"If we can save a few lives and make people more aware of the dangers of skin cancers, it's worth the effort," Stansbury-Dalrymple Lions Club president Jeff Brundell said.

"When you're standing there looking in the mirror having a shave or something and you think 'what's that mark?', you've got the opportunity to get it checked out."

Mr Brundell lost his father to cancer and wants to help the community avoid potentially unnecessary pain and anguish.

The screening unit concept began in Western Australia during 2002 and has been running in South Australia for about eight or nine years.

The unit covers all of South Australia and the Northern Territory as well as Mildura and Broken Hill.

The Stansbury trip was the first time the unit had returned to the peninsula since the Yorke Peninsula Field Days.

On average, about 16 per cent of people screen have lesions in need of referral - at the field days it was more than 20 per cent.

Volunteer dermoscopist Carol Barnes, a retired nurse, said every clinic turns up some form of skin cancer.

"From the more minor forms such as basal cell cancers through to the more serious melanoma, it would be quite rare for us not to find at least one melanoma per day," she

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



# Strengthening aged care industry

AGED and Community Services Australia is offering a program to strengthen the aged care and disability industries.

The organisation is being funded by the South Australian Government's Skilling South Australia program to deliver an industry-led initiative called the SA Universal Worker Project for the Eyre Peninsula, Yorke and Mid North.

The project will introduce aged care and disability competencies via a traineeship pathway.

"It will create a right fit and quality trained universal worker who will be capable of working in both the care and disability support services," Yorke Peninsula and Mid North Universal Worker Project workforce and industry development officer Aimie O'Brien said.

"The program has been successfully rolled out in Tasmania," Mrs O'Brien said.

"As we know aged care is struggling to get qualified workers and traineeships are a great way to train the staff and utilise them at the same time.

"This ensures service providers bring a trainee on, train them in a way that they need for their workforce and then it's likely they will keep the trainee on when they are quali-

"The good thing is it is a dual qualification so in the time someone would normally get a Certificate III in individual support they can get that as well as disability at the same

Mrs O'Brien said the dual qualification will give people the flexibility to pick up hours in both aged care and disability support.

"It gives them flexibility and if aged care homes have NDIS patients they can also utilise those people with the disability support qualifications," she said.

We are hoping to keep some of the younger generation employed in the region rather than them going to Adelaide

"It's a long-term career, it's really rewarding and it's a platform for people who want to go into nursing, social work or those types of industries."

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# Volunteers retire after 25 years

GORDON and Margaret White have called time on their volunteer work after 25 years of tireless service as Friends of Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park.

The Whites have sold their Marion Bay house and are moving north to a Moonta Bay retirement village to be closer to essential services.

Gordon, 81, said he first fell in love with the bottom end a year after he arrived in Australia during a 1957 fishing trip to Browns Beach.

After this first taste, Gordon and Margaret would travel to Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park on regular camping trips before buying land at Marion Bay in 1986.

By the mid '90s, the couple had built a house and signed up to volunteer for the Friends of Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park group.

During their 25-year commitment to volunteering at the park, Margaret and Gordon have propagated tens of thousands of native plants from collected seeds for revegetation work.

The Whites' volunteering also extended to working on the nearby Allthorpe and Troubridge Islands.

'The biggest project we ever did was on Troubridge Island," Margaret, 77, said.

"As well as the propagation and revegetation work, we had to sandbag the lighthouse to protect it from storm surges and shifting sand."

They have also done countless hours of survey work, restoration work on some of the heritage stone buildings, as well as trail maintenance and much

Park ranger Mark Davison said he and his staff rely heavily on the work of volunteers like the Whites.

"The contribution from Gordon and Margaret has been incredible," Mark

"Even if we got funding for revegetation work in the park, with Gordon and Margaret here, we were able to expand the size of the project, but also, when the funding ceased, these two continued on which has been immeasurable."

One of the more tedious tasks done by the friends of the park volunteers is viewing thousands of images taken by autonomous motion detection cameras, dotted around the park to check for cats, foxes and the numbers of native fauna.

Through those images we were able to capture evidence of the bush stonecurlew which hadn't been seen in the park for 40-plus years," Mark said.

Mark said the work done by the Friends of Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park was almost impossible to

"The volunteers' contribution, over thousands of unpaid hours, would equate to over a million dollars of wages if you were to put a monetary value on it," he said.

"Gordon and Margaret will be sorely missed, but they deserve a rest."

BEING active is one of the most important ways Australians of all ages can improve their health and wellbeing.

Walking for an average of 30 minutes a day can lower the risk of heart disease, stroke and diabetes by 30 to 40 per cent and it will help you manage heart disease risk factors such as blood pressure, cholesterol and your weight.

It is also associated with stronger muscles and bones, fewer injuries and falls and can reduce the risk of developing some cancers.

Despite its benefits, 84 per cent of South Australians do not do enough physical activity to maintain good health.

We should aim to incorporate 30 minutes of walking into our daily lives.

But if you think you can't fit it into your daily schedule, you can break it up into smaller sessions. Three 10minute sessions are just as beneficial as one longer walk.

It can be as easy as getting off the bus two stops early on your commute and walking the rest of the way or going for a stroll when you are on the phone.

Heart Foundation Walking Groups are a great way to meet and socialise with new people. You can join an existing group or start vour own.

Some people find it challenging to schedule regular physical activity into their day but find they are more likely to do it if they can walk with other people.

You can also sign up for a Heart Foundation Personal Walking Plan.

This is a free, six-week program that provides a walking plan tailored to your current activity levels. Once you have signed up, you will receive weekly emails and text messages to keep you motivated and achieve your



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#### **Contribution of the Cornish to Australia**

REVEREND June Ladner talked about the contribution of the Cornish to Australia at the Cornish Association of South Australia, Yorke Peninsula branch's October meeting in Moonta.

When the local copper mines closed in 1923 about 10,000 people left the area; however, their impact on Australia was just as important as when the mines were operating, June said.

Politics was one field of influence, with a state MP Richard Hooper as early as 1892.

Three state premiers and four senators came from the Moonta Mines Methodist congregation, including local preacher John Verran who was SA's first Labour premier.

Miners were involved in the beginnings of the trade union movement and Cornish women were active campaigners for the Temperance Union in Adelaide.

Prominent mines shareholders invested in the state; Walter Watson Hughes, Barr-Smith and Elder were benefactors in the beginnings of the Adelaide University, hospitals, et cetera.

Culture and religion were important to Cornish families; as was music, with bands, parades, choirs, concerts, etc.

Moonta lays claim to the first Carols by Candlelight, as the men emerged from the mines on Christmas Eve with the candles on their helmets and joined in singing carols.

From there they went with their

families to the "sand park" (Victoria Park) for more carols, where again the only lighting was candles.

Sunday School anniversaries at the Moonta Mines church attracted large numbers for three services on consecutive Sundays.

In the 1870s, the church was filled for revival meetings; it was even reported a circus in town on one of those occasions had a poor attendance.

Mines church Sunday School superintendent Henry Lipson Hancock wrote a 1910 book "The Modern Sunday School", which influenced the way Sunday Schools were set up in SA, and his "Rainbow" system was used all over Australia and in western USA,

England, Cornwall and Germany. Sunday School picnics were also highlights; the raspberry cordial provided could be the only flavoured drink a child had for the whole year.

The 1891 Census revealed 90 per cent of residents were either born in Cornwall or their parents had been; of those, 90 per cent registered as Methodist.

One of the "sons" of the area, Sir Richard Williams, was honoured as the "father" of the RAAF as it celebrated its centenary recently.

Branch president Liz Coole thanked June for her talk.

The branch's final gathering for the year was its Christmas lunch in November.

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

# Young ones' reading through the roof

**Patrick Goldsmith** REPORT BY

THE literacy of year 1 students in South Australia is constantly improving, according to results from the 2021 phonics screening check.

For the third consecutive year, results derived from a five-minute phonics test indicated a rise in ability, now delivering a 24 per cent increase since its inception in 2018.

Results in 2021 revealed 67 per cent of students met or exceeded the expected achievement by correctly decoding 28 words out of 40.

Kadina Memorial School principal Alistair Williams said the results were a really good sign for the future.

"It's been positive because we've noticed it through a significant jump in our year 3

results for NAPLAN testing," he said.

"That only happens with significant improvement in both reception and year 1."

Improvements recorded across both regional and metropolitan schools, indicating an important parity between schools.

"An improvement of 24 percentage points over three years is a fantastic result and shows that public schools and preschools are implementing the right measures and practices to lift literacy among our state's children," Minister for Education John Gardner said.

"We'll continue to work with the schools and teachers to ensure they have the right support to push the highachieving students further and ensure even more targeted support for students who aren't meeting the standard."

#### **Nutrition and eye** floaters

The study showed a reduction in floater suffering as well as improvements in visual function after a six-month dietary intervention.

The intervention formulation comprised 125mg I-lysine, 40mg vitamin C, 26.3mg Vitis vinifera extract, 5mg zinc, and 100mg Citrus

Researchers said the study provided evidence to support the use of antioxidative and antiglycation micronutrients can improve

A large percentage of patients (77 per cent) on the active supplement demonstrated a reduction in vitreous floaters and associated improvements in vision-related quality of life was seen in 67 per cent of patients.


Acknowledging not all participants experienced improvements, the researchers strongly advised patients to seek advice from a qualified eye-care professional.

# Yorke Peninsula's victory over SAFA

One of the most legendary performances by a Yorke Peninsula football team was achieved against a combined South Australian Football Association side on Monday, September 1, 1902.

YP Football Association secretary Robert John Hughes had requested a match against the SAFA (precursor to the SANFL) and, in the city association's wisdom, they selected a collection of players from the bottom two sides — West Adelaide and Sturt.

The side still had a number of highly credentialed footballers including Sturt's Hendrick Stanbury "Taffy" Waye, 1903 Medalist; James Magarev Magarey Tierney, 1908

Medalist and part of West's premiership sides before World

JD Daly, an Australian Football Hall of Famer, was captain of West Adelaide at the time while LL Hill (Lionel Laughton) Hill, originally from Maitland, played in this contest for the City team and was state Premier from 1930 to 1933.

The combined Yorke Peninsula side was captained by W Williams, with J Slee as the team's vice-captain.

Other members of this victorious YP side that travelled down to Adelaide included J Abraham, J Bailey, H Bell, J Bray, W Hawes, A Hayes, E Jones, A Kinnell, A Lennell, J Ross, L Roberts, A Slee, W Symons, T Thomas, W Whennan, S Worrall, with three emergencies being F Cawte, W

Bryden and J Thomas.

The SAFA team was in front at the quarter time and halftime intervals, leading 5.5 to 2.3 at the main break.

YPFA charged back into the ontest with three unanswered goal in the third term.

After a seesawing final stanza, the Yorke Peninsula team held on for an outstanding victory, defeating the SAFA team, 5.9 (39) to 5.7 (37).

It should be noted there were discrepancies between papers of the final score — as a couple of reports had YP winning 6.9 (45) to 6.7 (43) — but all had the YP side victorious.

The report in the Adelaide Register Newspaper, "Yorke Peninsular v West Adelaide and Sturt Combined", on Tuesday, September 2 read: "An interesting football match was played

on Adelaide Oval on Monday morning between a team chosen from the Yorke's Peninsula association and 18 from West Adelaide and Sturt.

"The country body asked the ty association for a match and would have been a greater compliment to them if a side selected from all the clubs not in engaged that day had been

"The game proved so enjoyable that it is hoped that the Peninsula men will pay an annual visit to the city and next time they come the association should take care to let a combination thoroughly representative of the city meet them.

"The country men won the match by two points but, in circumstances to which they were accustomed, they would have inflicted as severe defeat on the

home team.

"First of all, the ground was against them - it was too soft but above all they met what to them was a new interpretation of the rules.

umpire) carried out his duties exceedingly satisfactorily from the point of view of the Adelaide reading of the rules, but to the country association, they had a much stricter administration.

"It would be a treat in Adelaide to have few of the umpires to have taught the Peninsula men to play such a strict, fair game.

"During the first half they gave one of the fairest exhibitions seen for many years.

"In fact, it was too fair.

"They went straight for the ball and when they had occa-

sion to catch a man they held him for a second, then unclenched, and were amazed to see their opponent running away with the ball.

"When they in turn were caught in possession, they discarded the leather at once.

"All these things told against them, but after the interval they suited themselves to local decisions and played the Adelaide game."

According to the Register's report, Abraham, Hawes, A Slee, Williams, Rees, Thomas, Kissell and J Slee were the best

For the hosts, future Premier Hill was their best, followed by Hay, Daly and Sugg.

A Slee and Jones kicked two goals each for the Yorke Peninsula side, while Bailey chimed in with one.

### YPFL switches to 25m penalty

Local football umpires will be able to issue 25-metre penalties to players in 2022.

The new ruling was proposed by Kadina Football Club and passed at Yorke Peninsula Football League's November board meeting.

Umpires will no longer have the power to enforce 50metre penalties, with the reduced distance minimising the penalty for minor infringements.

YPFL secretary Phil Brand said the ruling was suggested to align with Adelaide Plains and North Eastern Football Leagues, as well as Northern Areas Football Association, which had all previously introduced it.

"SANFL also uses (the penalty) and it seems to work pretty well in other leagues," Brand said.

"Every umpire's interpretation is different anyway, but hopefully this helps get all leagues and umpires on the same page.

"This way when leagues get to association footy (carnivals), they've already been playing under the same rules."

Brand said 50 metres was a significant price to pay for very minor acts.

"Fifty-metre penalties can be very frustrating for players and spectators," he said.

"If we can minimise the penalty for little infringements like entering the protected area and over-stepping the mark, it should make for a better game."







### **Foot fault rule**

When delivering a bowl, at the time the bowl leaves the hand, at least one foot shall be on or over the mat in order to avoid a foot

I have seen a large number of players breaking this rule in all SYPBA divisions over the past few weeks.

Players seen to break this rule should be warned the umpire of the day will watch for a problem. That is okay; however, even if found not to be breaking the rule, it will cause concern for the player being watched and they will be distracted with future bowls.



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## Record lentil delivery on YP

YORKE Peninsula growers have delivered record numbers of lentils to Viterra this season.

More than \$16 million worth or about 16,400 tonnes were delivered to Ardrossan on Wednesday, November 17.

The delivery was the most in a day in the history of Viterra and the state.

It comes as the first export shipment of new season grain crop for international markets left Outer Harbor earlier this month.

The 66,000 tonne cargo of South Australian barley kicks off a schedule of 4.5 million tonnes of forward shipping bookings for 13 exporters in the Viterra system.

It was closely followed by another 67,000 tonnes of barley loaded at Viterra's Port Lincoln terminal last week.

Viterra chief operations officer James Murray said there are 40 buyers in the Viterra network ready to purchase new season grain from growers to supply to domestic and international markets.

"This is a great outcome for local growers delivering to Viterra," he said.

"It reflects the strong demand for South Australian and western Victorian grain delivered to the Viterra network and represents greater options for growers when they choose to sell their grain."

Mr Murray said the records were a testament to growers

and employees.

"It is an outstanding milestone achieved by growers and is great news for them with grain being a key commodity in our state's economy," he said.

"We're pleased to support

growers by helping get their grain into storage as quickly as possible, and then connecting them with local and international markets.

"It's also a huge credit to our employees who are a critical part of our business.

"It demonstrates their hard work and preparation to make sure our sites are running efficiently, in addition to our new digital delivery advice we've introduced to speed up the

delivery process."

Across Viterra's sites, growers have already been delivering barley, wheat, lentils and peas, with canola and faba beans starting to come through.

"We work with growers year around and we will continue to do that during harvest with a continued focus of providing a valuable service during one of their busiest times of year," Mr Murray said.

### Fox bounty hits target

ALMOST 2500 fox scalps have been collected from South Australian farmers in the wake of the Marshall Liberal Government's

The government announced a \$10 payment would be given for each fox destroyed to help cull the pest and further support drought affected farmers.

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development David Basham said the first round of scalp collections across nine regional centres netted almost 2500

"Foxes prey on newborn lambs, calves, kid goats and poultry and every pest fox which we can remove is a preventative measure for our farmers," he said.

"In total there were 2429 scalps brought in from a total of 33 claimants for the first round and we expect the numbers to grow when officers hold more collections across

"The feedback in most areas was many people are collecting scalps and we expect to see a strong return across the state at the next round of collection days.

"The Marshall Liberal Government recog-

nises the importance of biosecurity, including feral pest control, and that's why we are running multi-faceted programs to bring down populations of foxes."

Upcoming collection days are planned for field days in Lucindale and Karoonda in March and April.

Livestock producers who have a Property Identification Code are eligible to claim the bounty

for each scalp taken to a collection point. A minimum of 10 scalps and a maximum of 100 scalps per property can be claimed per

collection day. Each property may claim up to a maximum of 300 scalps per year.

Farmers may enter into their own arrangements with professional and recreational shooters, but the person who claims the bounty at the collection day must be the holder of a PIC.


The fox bounty, which is running in addition to baiting programs to combat the feral pest, will be available for two years, or until the funding runs out.



### Time to get back with the Beatles

THERE'S no musical group quite like The Beatles, and in the last week I've learned there's no album of theirs quite like Let It Be.

For this, I have the new three episode docu-series directed by Peter Jackson, The Beatles: Get Back to thank.

Get Back, currently streaming on Disney+, provides viewers with complete inside access to the workings of Paul McCartney, John Lennon, George Harrison and Ringo Starr - as well as drop-in keyboard player Billy Preston the likes of which we've never seen before

It chronicles the month-long journey the group went through in January 1969 to plan and record their next album live.

Unsurprisingly, a month of intense song writing and album planning throws up emotional, creative, and energy-busting challenges for Liverpool's fab four.

But how dare we be surprised they'd pull through under pressure.

We get to watch the spellbinding process of how songs like Let It Be and I've Got a Feeling germinate from a mere thought in McCartney's mind to the masterpieces we hear today.

By the end we get an understanding of the enormity of their last ever live performance, of nine tracks on top the Apple Corps building in London, which brought people at work and on the roads four storeys below to a standstill.

On the surface and at its core, it can be likened to a home video of four best mates having fun but it's so much more








Wallaroo: Anglers made the most of a reasonably calm day to fish for blue swimmer crabs, garfish, King George whiting and squid on Friday. Scattered small tinnies generally fished south of th jetty and regularly shifted their spot to avoid puffers and trumpeters.

Port Hughes: Garfish have been the goto fish for crews fishing from Cape Elizabeth out to the grounds just west of Tipara Reef. Jetty fishing has a few blueys and squid being caught. Yellowfin whiting again have been targeted at several local beaches on the incoming tides.

Port Victoria/Balgowan: KG whiting were targeted when crews managed to launch last week with fish up to 37cm caught from Wardang Island, Polly's Reef and the Songvaar wreck grounds. Balgowan anglers also did well on whiting

Point Turton: Garfish and squid were the main catches from here, Port Rickaby and The Pines, as anglers sought shelter

from the south-easterlies for much of the weekend and early week. The jetty has a few tommy ruff (Australian herring) and

Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: Big squid again were landed at Marion Bay jetty in recent days, as fishers also targeted tommies and flathead. Boat crews are fishing for KG whiting, snook, red nannyga and squid.

Edithburgh/Stansbury: Blueys have been a welcome addition to the catch-bags at Stansbury jetty and the Port Vincent wharf. Yellowfin whiting are off The Hut and Sultana Passage with fresh bloodworms being good bait. Boat crews are reporting a few whiting, garfish and

Black Point/Ardrossan: Shore-based anglers were sighted all up along the coast when I checked over the weekend as south-easterly winds made boat launching a challenge. Squid and yellowfin whiting are also being caught from local beaches, rocky headlands and jetties. Rakers are targeting blueys from Pine Point, James Well and Tiddy Widdy Beach.

## **Talbot picked for World Cup**

Kadina's Stephanie Talbot is set to suit up in the FIBA Women's Basketball World Cup on home soil next year.

Talbot was selected as part of the 24-player Australian Opals

squad which will travel to Belgrade, Serbia, for the Qualifying Tournaments stage, beginning February 10.

The Opals will face Brazil, Serbia and Korea across the fourday qualifying stage.

Australia has automatic qualification for the group phase of the tournament as host nation, with matches to be played in Sydney from September 22.

Talbot will be aiming to go one better than her debut world cup in Spain, 2018, when she walked away with a silver medal.

She will play alongside fellow South Australians Tess Madgen and Cayla George.

However, the squad announcement did not include WNBA superstar Liz Cambage, who has again decided to opt out of national commitments after also pulling out of the Tokyo 2020 Olympics.

Opals coach Sandy Brondello said she was looking forward to getting the squad together.

"I was particularly excited by some of the performances from the younger players in the Asia Cup post the Olympics," she said.

'There will be opportunities for those who work hard and make the most of their opportunities throughout the upcoming WNBL competition.

"Our goal over the next 300 days is to continue to grow, develop and be better as individuals and as group so we can (get back on the podium)."

Australia currently sits third in the FIBA World Rankings, below the USA and Spain.
