RATs descend on peninsula

RAPID antigen test collection points are now open in Wallaroo and Maitland.

Both locations are integrated with the hospitals' Covid-19 PCR testing sites and are open seven days a week.

Tests can be collected from Wallaroo between 1.30pm and 2.30pm, while the Maitland point will be open from 9.30am to noon, and 1pm to 3pm.

Times may vary, with any changes to be posted on the Yorke and Northern Local Health Network Facebook page.

If you are a close contact, you can

access a kit of two free rapid antigen tests from a collection point but it is still strongly encouraged to get a PCR test if you have symptoms.

"You must register before collecting your kits from the RAT collection point," an SA Health spokesperson said.

"If you are not a close contact, rapid antigen tests are sold commercially in supermarkets and pharmacies. "You should get a PCR test as soon as you develop any Covid-19 symptoms and are not a close contact."

The openings come as the 2022 school year officially began for children of essential workers yesterday (Monday, January 31).

About 76 per cent of Australian Education Union SA branch members voted last week to postpone proposed industrial action planned to coincide with the return to school.

Preschool, reception, and years 1, 7, 8 and 12 students will be returning to classrooms tomorrow (Wednesday, February 2).

All other students will learn from home for two weeks with the aim to return all to the classroom by Monday, February 14.



Gamesmanship or rudeness?

I'VE spent the past two weeks being very athletic.

You can still say you're athletic if all you're doing is living through other people's sporting endeavours, right?

Like many across the country, I've had a few late nights watching the tennis.

I think all sporting landscapes are better if we engage with participants and feel like we learn more about them each time they speak, and that they can show their personalities.

It adds to the engagement of the crowd and attracts new viewers, there's no denying it.

Rightly or wrongly, I associate tennis as a mostly polite sport.

A hush rolls over the crowd as the player gets ready to serve, tempered clapping and cheering erupts after the point has been won and the process repeats.

It's not all the crowds — the players have also acted up at times.

But the jeering between serves, the applauding of double faults and general rattiness really got on my nerves.

You don't need to like or support the opposition player/team in a contest, I am fully aware that is not how it works.

The players feed off the electricity of the crowd, but I think at times it descended from gamesmanship to a lack of respect.

How do we encourage engagement without harming the players' own enjoyment of the match too?

Rapid testing at Wallaroo, Maitland

PEOPLE who test positive using a rapid antigen test must report their results within 24 hours.

"You must report your positive result if you get your test through a designated RAT Collection Point, from a retail outlet or through any other means," a SA Health spokesperson said.

"Report your result using the online form on the SA Health website.

"If you don't have a mobile phone with internet access, you can report your result by calling the SA Covid-19 Information Line on 1800 253 787.

"You can also report negative and invalid test results using the online form to help provide a full picture of rates of Covid-19 testing in the state."

To collect your free RAT kit, you must register on the SA Health website at www.sahealth. sa.gov.au/COVIDRapidAntigenTesting.

Rules ease slightly

Some restrictions, including around density requirements in hospitality venues, were eased last week.

The restoration of paediatric elective surgery and easing of requirements for QR codes in retail premises were also amongst the changes flagged by Premier Steven Marshall.

Mr Marshall said hospitality density restrictions would now be boosted to 50 per cent indoors and outdoor seated dining and drinking, up from 25 per cent.

"Easing of restrictions has been planned for mid-February but had been brought forward," he said.

"QR codes are still required for gyms and hospitality, and settings like aged care and hospitals.

"The fitness sector will now be considered for

some easing of restrictions."

The government looked at new modelling

The government looked at new modelling which showed it would not produce a second wave or overload hospitals.

"QR codes are being kept because they (SA Health) do declare transmission sites from time to time (so) to be able to send a message as quickly as possible, the QR codes are still useful," Mr Marshall said.

"But the modellers tell us there will be no second peak here in South Australia coming from the changes in restrictions we have put in place."

Mr Marshall said there was a continued push towards vaccination, particularly for 5 to 11 year olds.



Ambos funding boost promised

THE state opposition has pledged an investment of \$2.2 million to increase ambulance coverage on Yorke Peninsula

Labor's election promise includes a new 24/7 emergency crew and new community paramedic in Wallaroo, despite not having a candidate for

It's hoped a community paramedic will provide health support across YP while a new emergency crew based at Wallaroo will ease the pressure on the Upper Spencer Gulf, opposition leader Peter Malinauskas said.

Overall, the state Labor Party has pledged to invest \$33.1 million in healthcare in the region, should it win the general election on March 19.

Labor candidate for Stuart, covering much of the Upper Spencer Gulf, Andrew Wright, said an upgrade of this nature was long overdue.

"For too long resources across the Port Pirie area have been stretched, with an emergency on the Yorke Peninsula leaving other areas exposed," he said.

"Delivering a 24/7 emergency crew based at Wallaroo will ensure Port Pirie's resources are not stretched so far."

Independent candidate for Narungga Dianah Walter announced her support for local ambulance crews before the Labor funding reveal.

"From a truly local perspective, given the distance and geographical areas required to be covered, there should be consideration given to Yorke Peninsula being resourced with at least two community paramedics, one based in the southern half and one in the northern half," Ms Walter said.

"There are systemic failures, and the system is haemorrhaging.

"This is not the time to apportion blame for what should have been done, it's time for collaboration, compassion and for working together."

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said, if re-elected, he'll push to see money repurposed for the Wallaroo Hospital and ensure Port Pirie is removed from the local health net-

Mr Ellis commended the plans by Labor, but lamented the fact it was "ostensibly to ease the burden on the Port Pirie services".

"Wallaroo Hospital desperately needs an upgrade — I have been lobbying the Liberal Government for some time and I will now begin trying to convince the Labor Party of the

"I'm tired of Port Pirie being considered the central location for all of our health services.

"Wallaroo Hospital should be the health services hub on the Yorke Peninsula and if I am re-elected that is what I will be unashamedly pushing for just like I have been doing for the past four years."

Women arrested over stolen car on Yorke Peninsula

TWO women were arrested after a police pursuit of a stolen car at Kadina in the early hours of Sunday, January 30.

At about 2am, police received a report of two women stealing items at a service station on Frances Terrace.

They left in a red Suzuki Swift and checks on the registration number revealed the car had been stolen during a break-in at Elizabeth South on Friday morning, January

Kadina patrols spotted the car on Graves Street and pursued the vehicle to the Bute Road after the driver refused to stop.

Police lost contact with the car as it approached Bute.

Patrols searched the area and located the vehicle abandoned at the corner of School Corner and Barunga Gap Roads at Barunga Gap just before 3am.

Police Dog Operations responded from Adelaide to help patrols find the two women.

After an extensive search, Police Dog Stoic located one of the women in a paddock where she was arrested at about 5.40am.

Police then received a call from a resident on Barunga Top Road at about 9.15am advising the second woman was at her property.

Officers attended and she was subsequently arrested.

A 31-year-old woman from Elizabeth South was charged with theft, illegal use of a motor vehicle, dangerous driving to cause police pursuit and driving unlicensed.

She was refused bail and will appear in


A 30-year-old Tonsley woman was charged with theft and illegal use of a motor vehicle.

Ogar granted home detention

ANTONY Ogar has been granted home detention bail.

Mr Ogar was charged with one count of murder following the death of his 37-year-old wife Cherry Gerente Ogar at port Hughes in July.

The 58-year-old Port Hughes man appeared in the Adelaide Magistrates Court before Magistrate Smart yesterday (Monday, January 31).

Ms Gerente Ogar was flown to the Royal Adelaide Hospital with life-threatening head injuries, allegedly inflicted by Mr Ogar, on Monday, July 26.

She passed away Wednesday, July 28.

At his initial court hearing, Mr

Ogar claimed Ms Gerente Ogar fell backwards and hit her head on the floor after she attacked him whilst drunk.

Mr Ogar will next appear in court at 10am on Tuesday, February 22.

Monika Milka banned again

GAWLER massage therapist and homeopath Monika Milka has been banned from giving advice about Covid-19 and vaccination.

Ms Milka was issued an interim prohibition order against practising in August by the Health and Community Services Complaints Commissioner.

That order was revoked late last month after the conclusion of an investigation into her conduct.

HCSCC Associate Professor Grant Davies received a complaint concerning false statements being published on Monika's Entity Massage Therapy Facebook page about Covid-19 and vaccines.

The investigation found Ms Milka breached clauses 3(1), 3(2)(b) and 11(1) of the Code of Conduct for Certain Health Care Workers.


Ms Milka is now banned from providing health services in respect of health education and/or the provision of information relating to Covid-19 and vaccines and providing advice in relation to the provision of the specified health service of vaccination.

Associate Professor Davies said this was the second prohibition order placed on Ms Milka for providing misleading information on her social media page.

"In February 2016, Ms Milka was also prohibited from suggesting her tonics were able to cure cancer," he said.

"Anyone given treatment information by Ms Milka should know she is required to substantiate the efficacy of any treatments, tonics or services she provides.

"My primary concern will always be ensuring the health and safety of South Australians."

Narungga decides 2022

AS the 2022 South Australian general election nears, the Yorke Peninsula Country Times will pose important topics for discussion to the Narungga candidates vying for your vote. This week's topic is the housing and rental crisis.

OUR healthcare system is in dire straits and, for many, a place to call home is simply out of reach. In the blink of an eye, any one of us is at risk of homelessness.

Think job loss, serious injury or a decline in health, this is not someone else's problem; it's our problem.

Peak bodies such as the SA Council of Social Service, Shelter SA and Council on the Ageing SA do much of the heavy lifting for government.

It's time they, the government, listened! We need big investments in new public housing, including in regions like ours.

Extra public housing will create jobs and help keep rents down across the market — giving more people money to spend in the local economy.

It's also time for minimum energy efficiency standards and a mandatory disclosure scheme for all rentals.

Even if people have housing, the cost of heating or cooling can still be crippling.

Our community is ageing.

I support the establishment of a specialised advocacy and housing service to assist vulnerable older people, living in housing stress, to secure ongoing accommodation.

South Australia has the highest stamp duty in Australia. It should be replaced with a broad, equitable land tax. If elected, my 100 per cent commitment to Narungga is I will fight for you and hold the incoming government to account for all the promises it makes including housing and rental affordability, just in the way I will hold them to account for commitments made about health.

DURING the past four years, I've personally advocated for many locals with housing issues to help find them a safe

Alarmingly, the issue of housing affordability and availability is an escalating one, compounded with property sale figures at their highest levels in years and a shortage of private rental stock.

Waiting lists for Housing SA properties remain very concerning, and the bottom line is we need to increase our public housing stock.

We also need to improve the turn-around times of vacancies as too often houses are empty for too long due to awaiting maintenance.

I am aware in 2020-21 we had 414 public housing properties within Narungga (367 managed by Housing SA and 47 by Aboriginal Housing) and at any given time an estimated five per cent are empty.

I also advise the number of Housing SA properties across the electorate has not varied greatly for 10 years, despite increased need and regional growth.

For example, in 2011 there were 381 properties; and

During my term in office I've shared in collective brainstorming with local councils, the SA Housing Authority and RDA Yorke and Mid North in efforts to combat homelessness, a substantial gap between supply of services and community need remains.

We need to continue to support public housing residents so they can aspire to a private rental or

It's imperative people are not permanently stuck in Housing SA properties, and they have the opportunity to access private housing in the future.

HOME ownership is an integral part of the Australian dream, but it's falling out of reach for increasing numbers

Securing rental accommodation has also become much harder.

Housing supply is very short and prices are high, and this has been exacerbated by labour and material shortages in part due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

Another important factor impacting housing affordability in South Australia is stamp duty — it's a major impediment to home ownership because it adds significantly to the cost of homes.

The impact of the housing crisis is keenly felt in regional communities like Narungga.

On Yorke Peninsula, only 0.15 per cent of housing stock is available for rent. How do you get skilled people to fill regional jobs going begging when they have nowhere for their families to live?

One Nation's policy for housing aims to increase supply, reduce demand and reduce costs in South

We'll ban foreign ownership of residential property to increase supply, reduce immigration to sustainable levels to reduce demand, and introduce stamp duty concessions to reduce costs: no stamp duty up to a value of \$600,000 for first home buyers, and no stamp duty up to a value of \$400,000 for people seeking to

This will also allow for more Australians to invest in residential property with no overseas competition, increasing the availability of rental accommodation.

Home ownership or secure rental accommodation provide economic security and family stability, and One Nation believes it should be within reach of every Australian.

Storm moves across northern YP

A SLOW-moving thunderstorm moved over parts of northern Yorke Peninsula yesterday evening (Monday, January 31).

Thunderstorms developed over Eyre Peninsula on Monday afternoon and then moved over northern Yorke Peninsula during the evening after sunset.

The Kadina weather station recorded 2mm of rainfall from the storm as well as wind gusts

of 72km/h.

These storms developed in association with high levels of surface moisture and heat as well as a trough of low pressure that extended across South Australia from a low-pressure centre over the Kimberley, in northern Western Australia.

Port Augusta experienced significant rainfall, recording 51.6mm in one hour between 8pm and 9pm.

Call for shag solution

YORKE Peninsula progress associations are calling on state election candidates to put forward a plan to address the ongoing cormorant problem.

A petition to address the ongoing cormorant, more commonly known as shags, issues at Port Vincent and Stansbury was submitted to the state parliament in late 2021.

The issue has been ongoing for decades with cormorants wreaking havoc by roosting in the Norfolk Island pines.

Local businesses and residents are left with a daily clean-up and stench, and motorists returning to find their cars repainted with excrement.

The petition asked the state government to develop a multifaceted strategy to manage the impact of the cormorants.

Representatives from Ardrossan, Port Vincent, Coobowie, Stansbury and Edithburgh met last week to discuss the growing issue and want a plan of action from parliamentary candidates and the state government.

"The department's position has been to issue permits (to cull) and to monitor the population but the monitoring phase has never ended," Stansbury Progress Association chairperson Don McPhee said.

"We would like the candidates to commit to a proper study of the ecological issues to form the basis for an ongoing strategy to address the problem long term.

"In addition to that we could ask the government to outline what progress they have made in terms of monitoring and ecological study."

Mr McPhee said a culling program is no longer effective due to the explosion in the population size and restrictions on cull numbers.

"For many years a strategic culling program has been maintained in Stansbury and Port Vincent ... recent explosions in the number of shags and the extended tourist season have compromised the effectiveness of this program," Mr McPhee said.

"It now needs to be supported by a more sophisticated multifaceted strategy.

"Any measure that does not address directly the breeding activity on Troubridge Island can now only be categorised as treating the symptom rather than the





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SUPPLY issues caused by Covid-19 are continuing to hit the automotive industry.

"A car being delayed by a year can actually be beneficial as it means you have an extra year to save money, which gives you a bigger deposit," he said.

"The prices of trade-ins and used cars have also gone up immensely in the past two years, so if you think you need to move now to make sure you get a good price, they're also only going to increase.

"Used cars are going to be worth more in 12 months. "People just need to be patient and forward

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

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

New life for local osprey

OSPREY at Price have flourished thanks to a new artificial platform.

The platform was installed just before breeding season in July and has reaped rewards as adult birds produced two offspring

A satellite tracker was fitted to one of the adult birds in December, providing more opportunities to gain understanding.

Field ornithologist Ian Falkenberg said the newly introduced technology allowed authorities to better track the spread of the birds.

"The problem was, although we knew some information, it was hard sometimes to figure out what they got up to," he

"But in saying that, they're doing what we expect them to do, going up and down the coast a lot but they do spend time inland too.

"We know more about them than previously." Mr Falkenberg said the plat-

forms were necessary due to loss of habitat which is the biggest threat to osprey.

'They're continuously losing suitable habitat and that's thanks to human development or that of housing and tourism," he said.


"But they also struggle in extreme heat events or with lurking foxes, Pacific gulls or

crows, which will swoop in and take their eggs."







The Proof and Experimental Establishment Port Wakefield is a vital Defence test and evaluation capability that has supported Defence since 1929.

These firings may require specific tidal or weather conditions, and are critical for the safety of current and new Defence capabilities. Members of the public may notice noise, vibration, flashes and/or smoke during the testing. There is no risk to the public outside of the $\,$ gazetted Defence Practice Areas.

For reasons of public safety, there is a permanent exclusion zone covering land, sea and air around the Port Wakefield Establishment. Specific details on the Port Wakefield Prohibited Area can be obtained from Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No GN 26, 4 July 1990, and is shown on the diagram below. Trespassing in this Area is strictly prohibited and very dangerous due to the presence of unexploded bombs. Any person found within the Prohibited Area or on Defence land will be subject to prosecution.

Specific test and evaluation activities may also require restricting public access to the Port Wakefield Defence Practice Areas over specific periods with these areas articulated in the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No. GN 40, 7 October 1992, and also identified on the diagram below. This may affect access to the Gulf of St Vincent at Port Wakefield and Port Parham.

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

Wallaroo: The weather was warm for the last weekend of the summer school holidays, with Sunday being the standout day fishing-wise. Blue swimmer crahs and small squid were caught by boat crews fishing far and wide from the Riley Shoals, The Magazine and Bird Reef. One grain ship is anchored off the coast as the jetty enjoys a run of squid, blueys and tommy ruff (Australian herring).

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Large numbers of anglers made the most of the weekend's good weather to fish long and hard for blueys, squid and garfish from both jetties. Local beaches are worth a try for yellowfin whiting on the high tides, while boat crews have reported gar, blueys, squid and whiting from West Light and Warburto Point.

Point Turton: A school of rat kingfish made for a couple of fun hook-ups at the jetty last week as they hunted gar and sprat tommy ruff. Boat crews tried for King

George whiting at The Banks and out from The Pines. A couple of red nannygai were caught about 2km west of the Corny Point lighthouse midweek. Snook are cruising the shallows of Hardwicke Bay at the moment.

Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: Both jetties have night-time snook, tommy ruff and squid. Gar are in the have around Penguin and Yorke Points. Shore-based fishing has salmon trout and flathead being targeted at Hillocks Beach and Foul Bay.

Edithburgh/Stansbury: Catches of tommies are hit and miss from the jetties here, but a few blueys and larger salmon are also about. Coobowie and Port Giles have gar and squid and KG whiting can be caught from the northern end of Tapley

Black Point/Ardrossan: Garfish, blueys and squid came from several local drops off Black Point and Ardrossan in the past week. Rakers again worked the shallows at Billy Goat Flat, Pavy Gully and Tiddy Widdy Beach. Ardrossan jetty has a few blue crabs, while the wharf at Pine Point is worth a try for yellowfin whiting.
