\$4 million for SYP projects

SOUTHERN Yorke Peninsula will receive a major funding injection of more than \$4 million through the Black Summer Bushfire Recovery Grants program.

Yorke Peninsula Council has been granted \$2.25 million for its SYP community childcare centre project as well as \$40,000 for bushfire preparedness signage.

Edithburgh Football Club and Sports Association will receive \$1.8 million for its multipurpose community centre project.

A roof and mural restoration project has also received \$40,000 through the program.

The SYP childcare centre project is the result of a push by local parents who discovered a lack of child care was impacting families and deterring people from moving to the peninsula.

The multipurpose community centre project aims to create a safe place for people to go in times of emergency.

Following the 2019 Yorketown fire

it was identified that a safe place for people to go, as well as for emergency services to congregate, was needed.

The grants program aims to help communities address priorities and activities for recovery and resilience after the 2019-20 bushfires.

The grants support medium-tolong-term recovery for communities to enhance and strengthen their resilience and recovery

Federal Minister for Emergency Management and National Recovery and Resilience Bridget McKenzie said the grants would help fund recovery projects within the communities.

"Part of the now \$2.2 billion National Bushfire Recovery Fund, the Black Summer Bushfire Recovery Grants program is backing projects which the affected communities have themselves identified will best support their ongoing recovery," Mrs McKenzie said. "We listened to the communities

"We listened to the communities impacted by the 2019-20 Black Summer Bushfires, and developed this program so projects submitted were of value and importance to those communities."

Candidates announced Major parties reveal nominees

THE state Liberal and Labor Parties have announced their candidates for Narungga.

Barunga Gap's Tom Michael will be running for the Liberals while Mark Paull, of Wallaroo, is Labor's option.

The pair join independents Dianah Walter and Fraser Ellis, and One Nation's Kerry White as candidates for the seat ahead of the March 19 election.

Mr Michael is a sixth generation broadacre farmer and Mr Paull is a small business owner, with both playing active roles in the community.

Cormorant call to arms!

I WELCOME the recent call to arms from representatives of the Port Vincent, Coobowie, Edithburgh and Stansbury Progress Associations for a plan of action on the cormorant issues (YPCT 1-2-22).

I have already met and spoken with a range of stakeholders whose business, amenity and lifestyle is impacted by the roosting habits of the pied cormorant populations along parts the Yorke Peninsula coast.

I understand this issue is not confined to our region.

Late last year, I commenced a plan of action which seeks to better understand what efforts to mitigate the problem have already taken place.

This is so the successes and failures can be measured and ruled out or ruled in. This includes what funding and other resources have been allocated, expended and by whom.

It is my view any potential long-term solution must be underpinned by robust research and science, and a deep understanding of animal behaviour.

It must also be both humane and pragmatic, and very much a collaborative approach.

I understand this issue has been a wicked problem for more than a decade.

It is time to now approach this in a considered and solutions-focused way.

I look forward to working closely with the communities and those who conduct business in the areas impacted, including tourism

I will be convening a small working group to oversee this process.

There is a real disconnect going on, and it continues unabated, driven by the behemoth of greed, ignorance, rage, which hijacks all that is important to our social evolution, and thrusts it back into the dark ages, which, if the truth be known, was full-lit if compared with today.



Community land revocation blocked

PORT Broughton residents have successfully prevented the revocation of two parcels of community land.

Barunga West Council sought to remove the community land classification on lot 37 Parma Street and lot 43 Capella Street so the blocks could be subdivided and redeveloped into residential allotments.

Council received 40 submissions during a public consultation period on the topic, with the consensus overwhelmingly against the initial proposal.

Following the feedback, council reaffirmed the community land status of the lots at its meeting on Tuesday, February 8.

Mayor Leonie Kerley said the feedback during the consultation period was in overwhelming support of the allotments remaining as community land in perpetuity.

"Councillors voted unanimously for the land to remain as community land and staff have been directed to ensure it is regularly maintained," Mrs Kerley said.

"I thank and acknowledge the ratepayers' efforts in writing to council and telling elected members

"I read every piece of correspondence carefully and appreciated the ideas of how this community land can be better maintained by coun-

"The community want to see it managed better in the future, including the development of tracks and provision of seating."

Council staff will work with nearby residents to develop management plans for the land considering its history and importance, a vegetation strategy, trails and seating and a regular maintenance regime.

Parma Street residents Rosalie and John Patterson said more people rallied against the revocation than they anticipated.

"It's important to have this community land put aside for people to enjoy the trees and open space," they said.

"The eucalyptus trees have been standing for more than 20 years and the number of birds has increased every year.

"It's a great space for kids to play and there could even be a bike track in the future."

Fellow residents Jenny and Ralph Luscombe said native flora spaces have significant health and wellbeing benefits on the community.

"Council has been fully supportive of our responses so we thank them for their forward thinking," they said.

Plans progressing for **Port Vincent development**

THE Lillis Group is preparing to lodge an official development application for its Port Vincent marina development.

Floating houses, waterfront townhouses and a 32-apartment complex are all part of the proposal.

The Lillis Group is now preparing the plans, in two phases, to formally lodge with Yorke Peninsula Council.

"The plans will be formally lodged in the next two-to-three weeks as a pre-development application, so that an understanding

can be reached with the council in respect to key development items including carparking and sewer serviceability," Vilis Group director Peter Vilis, who has been engaged by the Lillis Group, said.

"The group anticipates lodging the development application for approval in two-to-three months and being in a position to commence onsite development works in the third and fourth quarter of this year."

The proposal to transform the Port Vincent marina into a tourism destination has received positive feedback from residents.

About 200 people attended community consultation sessions

"We were extremely pleased with the successful and wellsupported community consultation sessions," Mr Villis said.

"We have now consulted with around 200 people and the feedback has been extremely positive for the proposed development.

"The key elements include an apartment and commercial complex, two groups of townhouses, a floating cafe and floating homes on E-Row within the marina."

Mr Villis said a number of people who attended the consultation sessions have registered their interest in purchasing property or business opportunities within the proposed developments.

"Strongly voiced suggestions were offered for the rework of the small beach adjacent to Breakwater Drive to include open space, car parking and additional boat trailer parking along with relocating the beach to the end of the small breakwater arm," Mr Villis said.

"Upgrades to the boat ramp have also been suggested and discussions have taken place with Yorke Peninsula Council on these

Management plan adopted for **Minlagawi Reserve**

A FRAMEWORK allowing the community to protect Minlagawi Gum Flat Reserve at Minlaton has been adopted by Yorke Peninsula Council.

The management plan will focus on protecting, restoring and enhancing the Nharangga cultural, environmental, agricultural, aesthetic and recreational values of the reserve.

Council and various other stakeholders have, over many years, completed works at the reserve; however, there was never an overall coordination or common

Funding from Landscape SA Northern and Yorke's Grassroots Grants Program in 2020 was used to develop the Minlagawi Gum Flat Management Plan.

Public consultation as well as two community action planning workshops helped formulate the plan.

The workshops were well attended with a range of stakeholders represented, including Nharangga people, schools, landholders, and community groups.

The reserve is Windara Country, home of the garrdi (emu) totem, and holds cultural significance as the meeting place between the Warri (west) people of the wildu (eagle) totem, the Windara (east) people of the garrdi totem, and the Dhilba (south) people of the widhadha (shark) totem.

"Over many years there have been lots of different groups work at the reserve such as SYP Landcare, Tidy Towns, Minlaton Progress Association that have done things like weed control and revegetation," environment officer Letitia Dahl-helm said.

"Six years ago, Prince Alfred College, at the request of the progress association, started visiting once a term to do restoration and work on some the infrastructure such as the trails.

'The Minlaton District Early Learning Centre also walk down and a group of the boys from the school lead them on a nature play and exploring the nature."

Mrs Dahl-helm said before now there had never been a plan so all stakeholders could achieve a common goal.

"It became obvious we needed a plan so that everyone was on the same page so the management plan gives that guide," she said.

"It doesn't matter who it is all members of the community can refer to the plan so all the work complements each other."

Camping permits pitched for Copper Coast

COPPER Coast Council has pitched the idea for sporting clubs to apply for camping permits before hosting events and carnivals.

It was decided at a recent meeting clubs needed to seek approval to camp on council land.

CEO Russell Peate said there may be occasions when camping on council land in association with an event could occur.

"As can be seen in the form, clubs are encouraged to utilise existing accommodation facilities in the town in the first instance," Mr Peate said.

"In addition, any complaints received by council from residents would ensure a review is undertaken of the issue of a camping permit in the future.

"We encourage sporting events and want people to come to the Copper Coast.

"We've tried to create a simple form to be completed and approval wouldn't be unreasonably withheld.

"This way clubs will know the requirements surrounding waste, noise and so on.

"These permits only apply to sporting clubs within town boundaries but we encourage people to use local businesses and accommodation."

Kadina Hockey Club president

Tegan Mengersen said she was disappointed a camping permit was declined last year for their annual hockey carnival but had been in talks with council about finding a solution.

"I received a call from Mr Peate who gladly accepted my disappointment and wanted to work with local clubs to find a way to hold these events and have solutions for camping," she said.

"We have some amazing sporting facilities, yet we may not have the accommodation facilities to support these (yet).

"I think in some instances it is convenient for players to be able to roll out their swag of the evening especially when we encourage sensible behaviours with consumption of alcohol, et cetera.

"Clubs should be able to offer camping to visitors for their events providing appropriate guidelines are set and amenities are available."

Mrs Mengersen said accommodation within towns usually books up quickly when an event was on.

"Our perspective is obviously we don't want large caravans all over the grass at the hockey club," she said.

"It would just be appropriate to offer those that want the chance to camp (in a tent or swag), to stay safely, enjoy the atmosphere, mingle with local club members, spend money within the town, and make them want to come back to the Copper Coast."

Narungga decides 2022

AS the 2022 state election nears, the Yorke Peninsula Country Times will pose important topics for discussion to the Narungga candidates vying for your vote. This week's topic is mining and agriculture. Both the Liberal and Labor candidates were asked to contribute this week but were unable to meet the deadline.

FARMING land on the Yorke Peninsula produces some of this state's finest grains, pulses, and legumes.

Indeed, Yorke Peninsula is widely recognised as the barley capital of the world.

Years of technological advancement from the stump-jump plough to state-of-the-art broadacre precision cropping plant and equipment; improvements in plant breeding and diversification of cultivars, have enabled us to contribute to feeding the world.

I have taken a keen interest in how legislators work to find the balance between economic outputs, be it food and fibre production or mineral resource mining and the importance of environmental conservation.

The Department for Energy and Mining has stated a commitment to ensuring South Australian resources are developed in a way which balances best practice environmental management, economics, good science, land access and stakeholder engagement.

In October 2019, The Statutes Amendment (Mineral Resources) Bill came into effect with many issues unresolved for the farming sector.

Since then, a Select Committee was formed to inquire into the laws that apply when an exploration or mining company wishes to carry out activities on land owned by a private landowner. As part of that process, recommendations were made and the final report was tabled on November 18, 2021.

If elected, I will work with stakeholders and Members of Parliament to implement the recommendations.

I strongly support an independent advisory panel, comprising members with practical understanding of agriculture, mining and other perspectives, to engage resource companies and landowners, inform decision-making and assist in dispute resolution.

AGRICULTURE is vital to our regional economy and is a sector I am proud to have stood up for on numerous occasions in the Parliament.

It is quite easy to promise the world when seeking election and another thing altogether to actually follow

In the lead up to the 2018 election I visited numerous farmers and told them that I did not believe the Mining Bill provided enough protection for farmers.

When that Bill was debated I stayed true to my word and opposed it. This meant crossing the floor and voting against my party at the time - in the face of considerable pressure and threats from within.

That is real, demonstrated independence.

I have been proud to lead the charge on the establishment of a Select Committee into Land Access which has delivered reasonable, achievable recommendations.

Man heads to court for drug driving, trafficking

A HIGHWAY patrol stopped a speeding Harley Davidson motorcycle at Yorke Highway, Clinton, on Sunday afternoon, February 13.

The motorcycle was travelling 15km/h over the speed limit and police submitted the rider to a drug test just before 3pm.

The test returned a positive result for amphetamine and the male rider was searched; about 14 grams of amphetamine were found in his possession.

He was then arrested and taken to the Kadina Police Station.

Police later searched his residence and business premises at Port Vincent, where about 135 grams of amphetamines and two gel blaster firearms were located.

The 52-year-old Port Vincent man was charged with drug trafficking and possessing a firearm without a licence.

He was granted police bail to appear in the Maitland Magistrates

He will be further summonsed to court after being reported for traffic offences including speeding, drug driving, driving disqualified and providing a false name and address.

The man's Harley Davidson was impounded for 28 days.

Multiple plants found at Yorketown home

A 79-year-old Yorketown man will appear in court after a large number of cannabis plants were found at Yorketown.

Police will allege officers searched the property and uncovered 40 cannabis plants and about one kilogram of dried cannabis at about 11.20am yesterday (Monday 14 February).

The man was reported for cultivating and possessing cannabis.

Police urge members of the public to contact Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000 if they have any information that will lead to locating and the seizure of illicit drugs.

Drug operation visits local pubs

Copper Coast police carried out a drug dog operation through six local licensed premises late on Friday afternoon, February 11.

The dog was brought from Adelaide with an intention to locate any customers in possession of drugs.

It searched through the Cornucopia and Prince Edward Hotels, plus the Coopers Alehouse in Wallaroo, and also the Kadina and Royal Exchange Hotels in Kadina.

Police were pleased to report no drugs were seized in the process, despite some people having recently used drugs before attending the

A police spokesperson said there would be an ongoing focus on stamping out local drug use.

Shack owners should consider more security

Local police have urged shack owners to shore up their security sys-

A police spokesperson said there had been a recent pattern of people breaking into vacant holiday homes.

"We really want more holiday homeowners to invest in CCTV cameras and security lighting, which can be monitored remotely," they said.

"They are also encouraged to call us at the time of alarm activation, as it is very difficult to follow up later.

"Now is a good time to invest as the holiday season nears an end and people return home."



"As a volunteer, I believe in the value of people making the most of every opportuni-


Mr Michael was also passionate about continued investment into road and network infrastructure.



Building a better region for a better future

Yorke and Mid North has experienced an average 16.8 per cent rise in property prices in the past 12 months according to Regional Australia Institute chief economist Dr Kim Houghton.

Last week, we hosted our inspirational forum on growing our regional workforce with the Regional Alliance. We took the forum online due to Covid-19 restrictions — such a disrupter, but it has made us think differently about how we can engage with our partners, alliances and communities, and has opened up new opportunities for inclusive communication.

If you didn't get an opportunity to join us, you will find all the presentations on

www.yorkeandmidnorth.com.au. There is also an excellent keynote presentation from David Rumba, partner Deloittes Access Economy — by 2030 if we continue with our current path, we estimate there will be a total of 29 million skill shortages; almost 25 per cent higher than the shortages we are already

To put that in context for our region, RDAYMN publishes a five-year investment pipeline which has a record \$11.2 billion of investment under consideration in 67 tracked projects.

Our public jobs board, published to job seekers. had 320 vacancies alone in January.

A recent analysis of 43 employers in the aged and community care sector completed by RDAYMN shows 117 vacancies across the care community which services 902 beds.

This might be our greatest opportunity to grow the region, but can we staff or accommodate the people required to deliver?

I want to temper this by the proviso the vast majority of employment, particularly in the renewable energy sector will be in construction, and the investment is not equally applied.

But to provide a quick snapshot of Port Pirie's current investment pipeline — our modelling suggests by late 2024 additional construction jobs could peak as high as 800 in that council area alone. Similar stories play out across Yorke Peninsula and Wakefield Regional Councils in mixed industry developments and into the Regional Council of Goyder where the renewable energy pipeline is the strongest.

And now we turn to our traditional areas of economic growth, alongside 15 local government authorities (Legatus) and with the Northern and Yorke Landscape Board we have also taken the lead at RDAYMN on delivering the Regional Drought Resilience Plan, designed to capitalise on our communities being ready to access the \$1b Regional Drought Fund.

Designed with PIRSA and the Commonwealth Government, the plan is for local communities to prepare for future drought and adopt management practices in line with our changing climate and environmental conditions.

We believe the development of the communityled plan will bring enormous benefits to our regional

It will look at strategies for improving access to water as well as improving social infrastructure so that communities can support each other during future drought events, build on the water re-use work being undertaken in Clare Valley.

But it will also be in collaboration Drought Innovation Hub and the work being rolled out by Ag Excellence Alliance and we look forward to hearing from you to achieve the best outcomes for our community.

Walter hosts healthcare meetings

THE region's healthcare needs were the focus of forums hosted by independent candidate for Narungga Dianah Walter at the Wallaroo Sailing Club on Tuesday, February

More than 45 people attended the two sessions and heard from guest speakers Dr Rod Pearce AM, David Boots, paramedics Sue Mann and Libby Williams, Michael White and Greg Barns SC.

Ms Walter said the region is cur-

rently facing a chronic crisis, not a Covid one.

"This crisis has its foundations in a long-term neglect, and a chronic disinvestment on the part of both the Liberal Party and the Labor Party," she said.

"Here on the Yorke Peninsula and in the Mid North we are living with the result of this systematic neglect.

"Governments of both colours have failed to make the investments that were needed to make sure we never reached this point."

As an expert in human rights, Mr

Barns spoke to his experience of independent MPs and their ability to leverage better outcomes.

Ms Mann and Ms Williams both spoke about the rough conditions paramedics face each day while Dr Pearce discussed the need for further support for local GPs.

As the chair of the SOS Copper Coast Suicide Prevention Network, Mr Boots spoke about the community's need for mental health sup-

"The audience was surprised by the data I revealed from the recent Lifeline Broken Hill Country to

Coast mental health survey across Yorke Peninsula," Mr Boots said.

"They all expressed supportive comments for the development of a Lifeline Connect Centre in our

"The concept of a free, no referral needed, drop-in counselling centre was applauded and it was pleasing Dianah said she would actively strive to get government funds to support this venture.

"Mental health issues on the YP are a key concern and our community is currently under supported in this area."

Gathering limits grow, hospitality changes

RESTRICTIONS around home gatherings, outdoor hospitality and gyms have been lifted.

Premier Steven Marshall announced the changes to caps last Thursday, February 10, with the new restrictions coming into effect on Friday.

Home gatherings caps have been lifted from 10 people to 50, including residents of the property, while outdoor hospitality requirements have increased to three people per four square metres. Standing food and beverage consumption is now permitted for outdoor hospitality only.

Fitness and recreation activities have an increased density requirement of one person per four square

ATAGI updates vaccine status

Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation has updated its advice around Covid-19 vaccination status.

"Under the new advice, a person is up to date if they have completed all the doses recommended for their age and individual health needs," Federal Minister for Health Greg Hunt said.

"ATAGI recommends that everyone aged 16 years and older receive a booster dose three months after their primary course, to maintain the best protection and an up-to-

"Further, ATAGI has advised if it has been longer than six months since a person's primary course and they haven't had a booster, they will no longer be considered up to date and instead will be considered over-

"The government has accepted this advice from ATAGI and the advice has been referred to National Cabinet for implementation."

RSLs secure Anzac funding

TWO local RSL sub-branches will share in nearly \$10,000 of state government funding.

New pipes for Willamulka

SA WATER has begun the installation of about 370 metres of new water main at Willamulka as part of the utility's \$155 million four-year water main management pro-

The new pipe, which is being beneath Wembley Boundary Road, is among 47,000m of water main going in the ground across regional South Australia over the com-

SA Water's general manager of sustainable infrastructure Amanda Lewry said the new pipe is made from PVC, which is renowned for being more resistant to soil movement compared with fibro-cement. "Continuing to invest in upgrades to our water network, like in Willamulka, is an important part of how we can deliver trusted water services for our customers," she said.

"With water mains having a lifespan of up to 100 years, these new pipes ensure we can continue to deliver clean, safe drinking water to local customers well into the future."

Construction will take around four weeks to complete, with works typically occurring between 7am and 5pm, Monday to Friday.

"For the safety of our people and the local community, we ask residents and road users to

Tributes flov

TRIBUTES have flowed for Ngadjuri, Nharangga and Ngarrindjeri man Vincent Gilbert Copley AM, since his passing in mid-January, age 85.

Copley, an Aboriginal leader and outstanding sportsman, was born in Wallaroo to Kathleen and Keith Warrior.

He lost his father when he was 1 and a half years old and had his last named changed when his mother married Allan Copley in

At age 10, his mother agreed for him to live at St Francis Anglican Home, Port Adelaide, where he met a number other significant First Nations people including Charles Perkins, Gordon Briscoe and John Moriarty.

This St Francis brotherhood would last a lifetime.

Sport was an important outlet to assimilate into the wider, predominantly Anglo-Saxon community of the 1950s, with Copley excelling at football and later cricket.

Copley played football for Port Adelaide's colts' side in his mid-

"Vince Copley, a 16-year-old Indigenous footballer who resided at the St Francis Boys Home (the site of Glanville Hall), won the

1953 Tomkins Medal for the (SANFL) 'fairest and best player' in the Senior Colts (Under 19s) competition," Port Adelaide Football Club historian Mark Shephard

"The Senior Colts won the premiership, defeating North Adelaide in the grand final by nine points, 10.6 (66) to 8.9 (57).

"Copley was Port's best player in the premiership decider and kicked four goals."

The next season he moved across to Curramulka and was immediately accepted into the community.

He dominated the football landscape in the southern Yorke Peninsula competition — playing in eight premierships and also being a regular representative player in the Croser Cup and other interleague games.

Copley's teammates have compared his style to Perth, Carlton and Glenelg champion Syd Jackson.

He became the first Aboriginal coach to lead a SYP team to success, as captain-coach of a Curramulks A grade flag and coach of the B grade in 1958.

Copley spent time at Fitzroy in the VFL living with Pastor Sir Doug Nicholls in 1956 and in

He played six games with South

Adelaide - two Advertiser Cup matches and four SANFL league games. — and was captain-coach of Yorketown for a couple of seasons in the 1960s.

"He was a quicksilver footballer, light on his feet and outstanding sportsman," life-long friend and teammate Dave Polkinghorne

"Vince was also a noted high quality ballroom dancer and a friend down in Yorketown, Francis South, said it was an honour to be asked to dance by him.

"There are similarities to Eddie Betts in his style as a footballer, being agile and elusive.

"He always spoke fondly of Curramulka and the people he met and become friends with in the community.

"Vince was a magnificent orator - he could get the hair on the back of your neck standing up with his speeches.

"As a cricketer he was a beautiful timer of the ball; he was an aggressive batsman, and also handy with the ball.

"While he would have many reasons to, there wasn't any residual bitterness in him at all."

Hit for six

Whilst on the leg, he picked up a cricket bat for the first time and developed into an accomplished player.

v for Vince Copley AM

Copley played for Port Julia in the Eastern District association and was noted as a hard-hitting left-handed bat and a handy offspin bowler.

A love of cricket elevated him to chairman of the National Indigenous Advisory Committee in 2000 where he organised national and international cricket programs.

Copley was also instrumental in bringing about the 1988 tour of England which commemorated the first Aboriginal Australian team of 1868.

His contribution is acknowledged by the Vince Copley Medal, an award which recognises the most outstanding cricketer at the annual SACA Aboriginal Cricket.

Long-term SACA cricketer and board member Andrew Sincock called Vince Copley an extraordinarv man.

"We worked together in various game development projects and he made a great account of himself," Sincock said.

"He was a fabulous help, able to get his point across in his quiet way, and was driven by a passion for his people."

Copley was a founding member of the National Indigenous Cricket Advisory Committee and became co-chair of the organisation.

"Vince never wasted his words:

was great company and was a key member of NICAC," former player and Cricket Australia board member Trevor Robertson said.

"He helped in Indigenous player development, from a totally blank

Community leader

At the South Australian Cricket Association, he was on the game development committees and a consultant for Indigenous cricket to Cricket Australia

"He was also respectful and had a great ability to get people on board," former SACA representative Grant Wyman said.

"He was instrumental into getting cricket into the APY Lands communities, along with educating us from a human perspective.

'Vince was instrumental in getting the state-wide (and national) Aboriginal tournaments started.

"He also had a happy disposition and looked at the positives in any undertaking

"A beautiful man, a quiet achiever and huge loss on some many levels.

'The world was a better place for Vince being in it."

Vince was politically active from the late 1960s and attended annual Federal Council for the Advancement of Aborigines and Torres Strait Islanders conferences in Canberra.

In the 1970s, Copley was a founding member of the Aboriginal Legal Service in Adelaide and moved to Canberra.

When the family moved, Vince worked in the Department of Aboriginal Affairs and later with Charlie Perkins in the Aboriginal Development Commission.

He returned to SA and until his retirement in 1990 after a time at the Aboriginal Affairs local office.

Copley was the inaugural chair of Tandanya, the National Aboriginal Cultural Institute, overseeing its incorporation and the opening of the initial exhibi-

Copley was appointed as a Member of Order of Australia (AM) for his long service to the Indigenous community in 2015.

As was his wish, his ashes were spread over Curramulka Oval on Wednesday, January 26.


Copley is survived by his wife Brenda and three children Kara, Vince Junior and Darran.

His sister Winne Branson, was also a noted activist.

Copley met Muhammad Ali, Nelson Mandela and the Queen, but was equally at home dining with paupers, such were his exceptional people skills.

A magnificent life in service of others, well lived.

First in Australia for uni hub engineering

EMPLOYERS in the upper Spencer Gulf are set to benefit from Australia's first universitylevel traineeship, an Associate Degree in Engineering, to be delivered by Uni Hub Spencer Gulf and partner CQUniversity.

Resource and Engineering Skills Alliance CEO Jodie Badcock said the qualification provided a defined pathway into mining, civil and electrical engineering roles, with such pathways in short supply in the upper Spencer Gulf.

"This traineeship is the result of strong collaboration between industry, regional and university partners and will fill a gap in workforce demand for upcoming projects and existing operations across the resources and infrastructure sectors," she said.

'Whilst there have been a number of pilot projects investigating the new advanced apprenticeship model, this is the first to be declared in its own right."

The traineeship is available now, with students commencing their formal studies in late February.





"Rural schools are community hubs that are at the centre of their community's daily lives so I'm really looking forward to meeting a new community, and families and learning more about Amanda Narroway.



"It was a rollercoaster game of cricket, full of twists and turns," West Torrens senior coach and former first-class cricketer Mark Harrity said.

"The game was in the balance until the final couple of overs.

"Murphy continued his outstanding season for us — his cameo with the bat and two momentumchanging wickets in his second spell were critical.

"He's also a gun in the field.

"Iames was very nervous pre-game and, along with taking the wicket of Nathan McSweeney, bowled an important over in the final

"He took the last catch at cover to give us victory.

"The boys deservingly celebrated long into evening."

West Torrens batted first, being in early trouble at 4/65, before a century stand and a handy cameo from Short.

He came to the wicket at 6/169 after the loss of successive wickets and made an important 20, helping the Eagles to a competitive total of 9/232.

Short faced 28 balls in a 39-minute stay, rotating the strike consistently and dispatching a boundary, before holing out to deep mid-on.

Reuther came in the final over and was run out for two, sacrificing his wicket.

After the break, West Torrens got off to a strong start in the field, having Glenelg at 2/12, with Australian under 19 player Isaac Higgins and Redback Liam Scott back in the shed. Reuther took the key

wicket of South Australian first-class recruit McSweeney, who was wonderfully caught by wicket keeper Warren Peters to have the Seahorses at 3/58.

With Glenelg captain Jake Winter moving towards a century, Glenelg moved to 4/162 before Murphy Short struck with the ball.

He took the wickets of middle order batters Danny Irvine and Harry Cunningham to drag the contest back into the balance at 6/181.

Glenelg lost Winter for 105 and, at 7/202, needed 31 runs from four overs.

Reuther took the final two catches of the match off the bowling of Spencer Johnson and the Eagles started riotous celebrations.

This was West Torrens' third title this century after wins in 2003-04 and 2016-17, and sixth since the competition started in 1967-68.

"It is a disappointing decision," she said.

"We're still working through what it means for our academy, we'd like for to bring our girls together for some matches and for the associations to continue to bounce ideas off each other."

Fiona Bussenschutt, former Adelaide Thunderbirds player and academy coach, said changing the pathway would reduce opportunities for regional players and coaches.

"I do understand everyone is a little emotional now about it, but there was also an outcry when they changed the age groups," she said.

"The biggest issue is the lack of consultation, they could have gone out to the academies and asked what they thought.

"As a junior, I was playing for Curramulka and SYP and I know myself I would never have gone on to trial for state or have the opportunities I did if it weren't for regionals.

"My first state league season for Contax there were five country kids playing, so they have such skills to share.

The academy will be wonderful for everyone who is able to get to trials, but it's giving girls those chances.

"Those metro kids around 14-16 are already being looked at by the top league clubs, our kids don't get that chance."

Curramulka's Callum Agnew was not out on 12 when the Eagles declared their first innings









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
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Busy time in season preparation

AFTER the recent unseasonal rains, farmers up and down Yorke Peninsula are busy spraying summer weeds, grasses and volunteer crops in preparation for the 2022 seeding.

For most of the peninsula, paddocks are a varying shade of green, looking more like May than February.

Weeds such as potato weed, mignonette, paddy melons and, in some cases, caltrop, have all germinated, raising concerns for soil moisture retention and weeds becoming established.

Minlaton farmers Tim and Dione Glazbrook, and son Angus, run a livestockfree cropping operation with lentils a big part of their rotations.

Like many others across

the peninsula, they have begun spraying summer weeds.

"We had around 50mm at our home block and closer to 100mm at our block nearer to Stansbury in the big rain a couple of weeks ago," Mr Glazbrook said.

"We're busy spaying at the moment, we tried to hold off for as long as we could, but with the voluntary wheat, barley and lentils as well as potato weed and paddy melons, all getting established, it was time.

"We're always fighting radish, and on our sandier soils it's mignonette and dog weed."

Mr Glazbrook said their 2021 harvest was a standout.

"It was one of our best years which was amazing considering the amount of rainfall we had," he said.

"It's all down to the way we farm these days and the conserving of soil moisture.

"We sort of put these recent rains down to moisture in the bank and we try and keep everything absolutely dead during the summer months to conserve soil moisture and to reduce the chances of rhizoctonia getting established in the soil."

Rhizoctonia is a widespread root disease caused by a soil-borne fungus which can lead to significant yield losses in crops.

Mr Glazbrook said he ordered his fertiliser back in October, earlier than he has ever done, to hopefully combat concerns over fertiliser and chemical supply

"I've never done that before but with the concerns over issues with China and the shipping hold ups we decided to order early," he

"The prices have been crazy but at least it's locked in and I don't have to worry."

"GPSA is incredibly excited to give farming communities the opportunity to ask their local candidates about issues important to them," Mr



He was among the first members to be appointed to the GRDC's Southern Regional Cropping Solutions Network, now known as the National Grower Network.


Dr Hollaway said he was



Trespassing in this Area is strictly prohibited and very dangerous due to the presence of unexploded bombs. Any person found within the Prohibited Area or on Defence land will be subject to prosecution.

Specific test and evaluation activities may also require restricting public access to the Port Wakefield Defence Practice Areas over specific periods with these areas articulated in the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No. GN 40, 7 October 1992, and also identified on the diagram below. This may affect access to the Gulf of St Vincent at Port Wakefield and Port Parham.

The wild story of the Puppet Master

YOU all know how much I love a crime documentary and Netflix's The Puppet Master: Hunting the Ultimate Conman, does not disappoint.

Based on a true story, this threeepisode thriller is an easy binge, with every episode about 30 minutes

I'd recommend doing it sooner rather than later as it is only a limited series.

The story follows cruel conman Robert Hendy-Freegard who masquerades as a British spy to manipulate and steal from his victims.

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HOT FISHING TIPS

Recipe, tuna carpaccio with a red wine and caper berry paste – *Ingredients:* Raw tuna, sliced 250g, lemon/lime juice, caper berries, crushed garlic. 1 chopped chilli, basil, pinot noir. olive oil, seasoning. Preparation: Plate sliced tuna and drizzle with lemon/lime juice. Prepare a paste by soaking caper berries in half-glass of pinot noir, then mixing with herbs, olive oil and seasoning. Blend and spread paste liberally over fish and enjoy with remaining wine.

Wallaroo: Those persistent on-shore winds continue to play havoc with local boat trips even now as we venture well into February. Rat kingfish are at the western side of the main shipping channel and out from Bird Reef. Garfish and blue swimmer crabs have been the main reports from Tickera to Myponie Point, while the ietty has afternoon squid and small gar.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Some big fat garfish have again been caught off Cape Elizabeth and the deeper waters here also hold King George whiting. West Light grounds have gar, squid and blueys and local shore/jetty-based

anglers are reporting gar, squid and blue crabs. Point Turton: Shore-based anglers working the early morning high tides at Pine Point have been rewarded with mullet, garfish and tommy ruff (Australian herring). The Banks have whiting and Port Rickaby is worth the run for gar and sauid.

Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: My weekly trip to this part of the world proved fruitless again as I battled strong on-shore southerlies for most of last week. Expect some long traffic delays around the Maitland-Urania road as resurfacing works continue. Snook, flathead and a few big squid have been the main reports, with tuna occasionally being caught from outside Pondalowie Bay and Seal Island. Local iettybased fishing has souid and tommy ruff.

Edithburgh/Port Vincent: Crews fishing from the Port Vincent spit to Sheoak Flat caught gar and blue crabs during the week when weather permitted. Coobowie and Port Giles have tommies, gar and blueys. Big KG whiting are off Tapley Shoals and Troubridge Island.

Ardrossan: Large snook and a few gar can be caught from as far afield as Long Spit and the Windara Reef. Blue crabs are at the jetty and off Macs Beach, with rakers also working the grounds here and around James Well on the outgoing tide.

Moving goalposts on academy hopefuls

The scrapping of regional academies will make accessing higher pathways more complex for local netballers.

Netball SA announced last month that its nine regional academies would be replaced by the Adelaide Thunderbirds Talent Academy for the 2022 season.

"This is intended to give young netballers across South Australia the chance to better connect with the elite brand and their role models," Netball SA general manager Erin Haines said.

"A united approach to the academy program will break

down the existing academy regions and instead establish key academy locations for the purposes of training.

"Academy locations will be determined based on athlete selection, with the aim to maximise availability and to minimise extreme travel where pos-

in making the academy program progress automatically to phase 2 of 17/u state trials."

Players will attend their first trial in Adelaide at the end of this month, with future training locations determined on where the players are based.

The Northern Regional Netball Academy had included Peninsula, North

Eastern, Northern Areas, Kadina and Districts, and Southern Yorke Peninsula Netball Associations.

Last year, seven YPNA players made the side, with Taylor Davies and Brooke Irlam selected for the state under 17 squad.

NRNA committee chairperson Mary Hewett said the decision had come as a surprise to
