Attention finally for Wallaroo roads

WALLAROO'S entrance road is finally set to state government to swap control of the road receive some much-needed attention.

Pavement rehabilitation and resurfacing works on a section of the Copper Coast Highway between Bowman Road and Athena Drive are planned to begin this financial year.

The works will be the first stage of a joint project between Copper Coast Council and the Department for Infrastructure and Transport.

Planning and reconstruction works are also planned for several other arterial roads over the next two financial years.

Copper Coast Council has been lobbying the

since about 2013.

In 2019, council proposed it take control of a 5.4 kilometre section of the Copper Coast Highway as well as part of the Spencer Highway, Victoria Street, May's Crossing, Hughes Street and Irwine Street.

In exchange, it would hand Bowman, Sharples and Magazine Roads to the government.

Council also asked for \$1.4 million — based on an independent assessment of the condition of the roads — but it was denied.

Last year, Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis

and council lodged a petition in parliament, calling for immediate attention to the road.

Council also floated a revised plan in which the state would take the heavy vehicle routes from council in exchange for sections of the Copper Coast Highway, Victoria Street, May's Crossing and Hughes Street.

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said she was pleased the government was prioritising the much-needed

"The Copper Coast Highway is one of the most utilised roads in our region," she said.

"The state government has heard our voices

and we are grateful DIT has come on board to make this project a reality.

"Great things can be achieved when the different tiers of government work together and this will be another example of a good outcome from a collaborative approach between state and local government.

"This road has not been of standard for quite a number of years and we thank Fraser, residents and visitors for their persistence in lobbying to help fix this road, giving the town of Wallaroo the beautiful and safe entrance it deserves."

Electric trucks

I FOUND the article Electric trucks in gear (YPCT 8-2-22) very interesting, and agree with what Gavin Wheare had to say

I have been involved in the transport industry for more than 55 years, firstly as an operator of tray-top trucks, semitrailers and road trains mostly in outback areas, then as part of a heavy vehicle repair business.

When the subject of electric trucks first came up, I could see they had a place in large city areas as delivery vehicles, but as for long distance haulage in Australia especially in isolated places like we used to go, they would be a total disaster.

Recently an acquaintance of mine had to take a three-trailer road train from Darwin to Kununurra, a distance of 827 kilometres.

His gross weight would be around 125 tonnes or a little more.

A friend of mine who is a retired electrical engineer worked out for me what size battery would be required.

His answer was the battery would weigh around 27 tonnes and after 450-500km the driver would need to stop for at least six hours to have the unit recharged as apparently very large batteries don't take kindly to fast charging.

Heavy diesel trucks will never become extinct in Australia.

Works due to begin in weeks

The club will commission Dylan Butler, who worked on the Stansbury water tower project, to create an eye-catching


"We had a mural on the wall but with the fire we had ash damage which meant it wouldn't last much longer," Mr Tatchell

Multi-million dollar boost for child care

SOUTHERN Yorke Peninsula's lack of child care will soon be addressed thanks to \$2.25 million in federal grant funding.

Yorke Peninsula Council received the grant for its SYP community childcare centre project in Minlaton through the Black Summer Bushfire Recovery grants.

The project is the result of a push by local parents who discovered a lack of child care was impacting families and deterring people from moving to the peninsula.

Southern Yorke Peninsula Childcare Feasibility Group members presented the findings of two surveys to council in August last year.

Of the 175 families who completed the survey, only 32 per cent were able to access formal childcare options on southern YP.

About half stated they relied solely on friends and family to provide child care and 18 per cent stated they had no access to any form of child care.

"We are overjoyed, overwhelmed and quite frankly speechless," SYP Childcare Feasibility Group member Katie Hughes said.

"Two years ago, over coffee a small group of us were lamenting the lack of care options, and wondering what we could do to change the circumstances for young families in our community.

"We could see the impact that a lack of child care was having not only on young families, but upon service provision in the wider community."

Mrs Hughes said so many skilled workers are not able to engage in employment as there are little to no options for child care.

"We wondered how single parents or families on low income could possibly live above the poverty line and make ends meet with such severe childcare shortages impacting their earning capacity," she said.

"After two years of work behind the scenes, to achieve this goal, words just can't describe the elation we feel.

"We are so grateful to the team at YP Council who went above and beyond to get the application in."

Edithburgh oval to become emergency hub

EDITHBURGH will soon have a purpose-built place of refuge when disaster strikes.

The Edithburgh Football Club and Sports Association has been allocated \$1.8 million for a multipurpose community centre through the Black Summer Bushfire Recovery Grants program

A need for a safe place for people and emergency services to congregate was identified after the 2019 Yorketown fire.

The funding is part of the association's broader plan to

transform the town oval and clubrooms into a safe haven during emergencies.

The upgrade will include installing light towers for trainings and night sporting games as well as light up the areas around the Country Fire Service and SA Sea Rescue sheds directly adjacent to the oval.

Unisex toilets and shower blocks for all abilities, storage areas and multi-use changerooms will also be built.

"The changerooms will be used by emergency service people, volunteers, tourists and local residents affected by a disaster or emergency situation, individual toileting and showering for all genders and abilities," association member Kay Barlow said.

"Break-out rooms will be multi-purpose areas, office space during events such as sporting days, music events and meetings.

"These could also be utilised for first aid areas and consulting rooms, extra change areas for sporting teams, with the advantage of sliding doors to open up for large or close down for smaller spaces."

Mrs Barlow said the facilities will provide a safe, welcoming and up-to-date centre with many purposes.

"This redevelopment will help

to reduce the heightened anxiety which exists for people in the area during an extreme fire danger day and will give them the opportunity when asked to evacuate somewhere safe to go that is set up for this purpose," she said.

"After the fire that devastated our area in November 2019, there was an emotional rollercoaster to deal with from varied people.

"This project will enhance the town and region by providing a community-owned venue, known by the district as Southern Yorke Peninsula Multi-purpose Community Centre."







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

Cliff safety concerns

CONCERNS have been raised about the stability of cliffs at Wool Bay after recent heavy rainfall.

Towns across the Yorke Peninsula received recordbreaking rains on Sunday, January 23, which led to part of the cliff at Wool Bay washing away.

Nearby Edithburgh recorded nearly 65mm of rain over the weekend from January 23-25.

Resident Rob Wollacott is concerned about the safety of public steps, located on the cliff, which connect the Walk The Yorke trail to the jetty and boat ramp.

"There is a lot of loose fill, there is a dugout from the kiln ... so it is all unstable and has slid down the cliff," he said.

"The heavy rain has done a lot of damage, all the water from the carpark and walking trail cascades across the cliff and steps.

"I'm not a qualified geologist but when I saw the water coming down shedding sheets of clay, I thought it was getting close to the steps."

Mr Wollacott said the steps are popular amongst residents and

"The steps are well utilised because the lime kiln (also at the top of the cliffs) is a tourist attraction and people like to see it from the steps," he said.

"We would like to see the cliffs secured and have the area cleaned up with regulation approved

"Every so often parts of the cliff will slide down and you quite often see rocks rolling down into the car park."

Voting with confidence

COVID-positive South Australians will still be able to vote in the March 19 state

The Electoral Commission of South Australia released its Covid-safe voting measures earlier this month.

Those who are Covid positive, deemed a close contact or displaying symptoms will be able to get a ballot pack ahead of, and on the day of, the poll.

People will be able to register online and pick up their packs at 22 PCR or RAT collection sites across the state between Thursday and Saturday, March 17 to 19.

They will be able to leave isolation to collect ballot papers and to post completed forms.

"ECSA has been working in partnership with SA Health, SA Pathology, SAFECOM and SA Police to ensure we conduct a safe election in which everyone can take part," Electoral Commissioner Mick Sherry said.

"We have every confidence South Australians can vote safely in the 2022 state election.

"Allowing PCR and RAT sites to double as voting pack collection points will allow South Australians who are in isolation or have Covid-19 the opportunity to safely cast their vote this state election."

Mr Sherry said those voting in person should be confident polling booths will

"We have created a safe voting environment, following many of the Covid safety measures voters will have become used to seeing over the past two years," he

"All polling booths will have socially distanced queues, sanitisation stations, mandatory mask-wearing, single-use pencils, fully vaccinated electoral officials and hygiene and density control officers in place."

Candidates call for votes

The state opposition and crossbenchers including Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis - convened in the lower house of parliament to protest the government's inaction on voting rights on Wednesday, February 9.

Mr Ellis said he supported a return to parliament, which didn't officially eventuate, as it's important every vote is counted.

"I have written to every constituent and posted out postal vote application forms so they can be prepared for a postal vote option should this prove to be an option for them," he said.

"I also advise the pre-poll voting centre in Graves Street, Kadina, which I expect will be another popular option will be open from Monday, March 7.

"It is very important the vote of every constituent can be validly cast and counted, despite the ongoing pandemic."

Independent candidate Dianah Walter said both sides of politics should be accountable for making the voting process more difficult.

"The effort to recall parliament this week was labelled a stunt by the Liberal government, citing it was too late for ECSA to implement any new measures if brought in," Ms Walter said.

"We may not know the result of the March 19 election for weeks and that is totally unacceptable."

One Nation candidate Kerry White said she was appalled by the prospect of people being unable to vote.

"The government and the Electoral Commission of South Australia must do absolutely everything to ensure every South Australian, without exception, is able to exercise their right to vote at this election," she said.

Greedy fishers pay the price

More than 150 South Australians were fined for recreational fishing offences across the summer holiday period.

There were 165 expiations issued to fishers, 114 of which were in relation to blue swimmer crabs, worth more than \$83,000, between December and January.

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development David Basham reminded people the best intel received is often from responsible fishers.

'The majority of fishers follow the rules to ensure the long-term sustainability of our fish stocks," Mr Basham

"This blatant disregard by a minority of people infuriates everyone and risks the sustainability of our fisheries.

"More than two-thirds of people caught doing the wrong thing were fishing for blue swimmer crabs and most offenders caught with undersized crabs had a measuring device with them.

"The increased expiation penalties responds to years of pleas from responsible fishers.

"On-the-spot fines can now range from \$217 to \$717 depending on the nature of the offence.

"If you see anyone breaking the rules, please report it through the 24-hour FISHWATCH number on 1800 065 522, or via the SA Recreational Fishing App."

Labor promises mental health boost

THE state Labor Party has promised a boost to mental health support should it form government on Saturday, March 19.

"This includes the biggest investment in mental health in more than a decade as part of our plan to fix health — and fix the ambulance ramping crisis," he said.

It is hoped the additional hospital beds will free up blocked emergency departments, enabling flow of patients through hospitals, allowing paramedics to transfer patients into emergency departments as soon as they arrive at hospitals.

'We've all seen the images of countless ambulances parked outside of emergency departments with patients stuck in the back of the ambulance because EDs are full," Mr Malinauskas said.

"This is a cruel and inhumane experience for the patients - who are often elderly and many with mental health issues — and deeply frustrating and upsetting the hamstrung paramedics.

"To fix the ramping crisis, we need to address the mental health crisis."

Works progressing at Fisherman Bay

FISHERMAN Bay's freeholding process is well underway.

The expansion and upgrade of the Port Broughton Community Wastewater Treatment System is in progress after commencing in November.

A rising main is set to connect the system to the Fisherman Bay township, with works starting earlier this month. Contract negotiations for major construction works are also close to being finalised by Barunga West Council and Fisherman's Bay Management.

Designs for the township's new wastewater collection and stormwater systems, road upgrades and coastal protection measures have been completed, with FBM now in final contract negotiation stages.

FBM chairperson David Hosking said a full timeline for works would be released following final negotiations.

"The first works at Fisherman Bay will involve stormwater basins on the farmland," Mr Hosking said.

"We will be notifying residents in the near future when final contracts are awarded and a timeline for construction is in place."

BWC CEO Maree Wauchope said council couldn't wait to see construction commence.

"These major projects will shape the future of Fisherman Bay and see it receive the essential infrastructure it needs," Ms Wauchope said.

"We look forward to sharing a final construction timeline with residents once FBM finalises construction contracts."

A total of 60 freehold titles have now been issued to Fisherman Bay residents as part of the first three stages.

There are 15 more freeholding stages still to be delivered, with stage four of title issuing underway.

Power issues for residents

PLANS for power upgrades at Fisherman Bay have been released by Barunga West Council.

Potential landmark developments in the township have meant existing SA Power Networks overhead electricity mains are positioned above numerous of private allotments at Whiting Road.

Council has identified 38 properties which could be impacted by associated power poles and wires.

CEO Maree Wauchope said several Whiting Road property owners had approached council with concerns about an inability to build homes due to the distances from power services.

"We first approached SA Power Networks last year and they agreed to work with council and residents to upgrade and relocate poles," Ms Wauchope said.

"While SAPN will pay to upgrade the poles and wires, relocation is for the benefit of individual land owners and therefore relocation costs will need to be covered by those land owners.

"There's no doubt the development potential and amenity of these properties will be improved as a result."


Ms Wauchope said council had received complaints from residents who were opposed to paying for the relocation or against works altogether.


"Pleasingly, SAPN has indicated the costs may not be as much as initially estimated." she said.

"They are still finalising designs and associated costs, but if we relocate one pole, we may need to relocate all of them.

"Once we have this information, council staff will meet with affected residents and discuss what is involved."

Revised plans for foreshore centre

BARUNGA West Council has approved a revised design for a \$1.2 million Top of the Yorke Tourism Centre.

The centre, on the Port Broughton foreshore, was initially proposed in council's 2021-22 Annual Business Plan and was set to include public toilets, a visitor information lounge, plus staff and volunteer facilities.

Council was unsuccessful in securing funding through Round 5 of the federal government's Building Better Regions Fund, but CEO Maree Wauchope said she was optimistic of council's Round 6

Since its first application, council's refined design includes a separate lockable visinformation centre, kitchen, tourism and events space, plus a shopfront display to engage with the town square.

The building scope has also been moved towards the seawall and lifted to mitigate sea

Its total size has increased from 85 square metres to 175sqm, in addition to decking and roofed paved areas.

Studio S2 Architects has been engaged to provide a detailed design of the project, while Mosel Surveyors, Kadina, has surveyed the site to ensure to cost just \$600,000 - which will now be matched by council if the latest funding application is approved.

Ms Wauchope said the building would allow people to access a tourism centre, rather than just a visitor information centre.

"The revised building would include more equipment and elements that enable it to become a much more flexible space," she said.

"It would not only be a gateway to the Yorke Peninsula, but also to the Mid North and Flinders Ranges.

"I think it will fit perfectly on our foreshore - it is something the community deserves."

Calming traffic in Port Julia, Rogues Point

YORKE Peninsula Council will look at ways to reduce speeding in the Port Julia and Rogues Point townships.

At the recent elected members information and briefing session, director of assets and infrastructure services Andre Kompler presented speed data from both townships.

"This was done on the back of complaints we have received about speed compliance into these townships," Mr Kompler said.

"The maximum speed observed (in Port Julia) in 2021 was 106km/h in the 50km/h zone so there is a trend occurring.

"(Rogues Point) has a speed limit of 30km/h and what we found was more than 92 per cent of the people going past the speed sign were doing more than the speed limit.

'We found there were 34 occurrences in the 90km/h to 130km/h range and this was over a six-week period."

Mr Kompler said reducing the speed or having step-down speed signage would not have any effect and traffic calming measures should be investigated.

"The reality is people need to observe the speed limits and if they don't council needs to look at traffic

calming," he said.

"It is something done by many councils ... they may use roundabouts, chicanes, or speed humps.

"It is my suggestion and recommendation that going forward we trial speed bumps at these two

Grants secured for Wakefield's heritage

Council has helped secure almost \$80,000 in state government grants for major restoration projects.

New Wakefield rating model considered

WAKEFIELD Regional Council is reviewing its process of rate setting in a bid to ease the burden on ratepayers and achieve the community's vision for the region.

Council will consider releasing its Rating Consultation Paper and draft Rating Policy at its meeting tomorrow, Wednesday, February 23.

The approach would address a rating distortion which has, over time, meant vacant land, commercial and industrial properties pay a rate in the dollar well above residential

A rate rebate of up to 100 per cent for up to 10 years would also be on offer to attract new businesses and industries, encouraging investment in the area.

Mayor Rodney Reid said a new independently verified mathematical model which would be adjusted each year based on property valuations - is a key part of the

"Property valuations fluctuate over time and we know from experience that, in some cases, land uses such as primary production have taken a big hit," Mr Reid said.

'To help protect ratepayers, the new model employs a safety net.

"When the overall average rate adjustment for a land use category reaches five per cent above that year's general rate rise set by council, a rate redistribution to other land use categories will occur, shielding the ratepayers from a large annual increase."

Mr Reid said the potential for changes in rates complements the direction of the council.

"Our Wakefield 2030 Community Plan includes strategies to develop residential land and grow our economy, with the vision for Wakefield as a great place to do business and a great place to belong," he said.

"The rate-in-the-dollar distortion poses a potential barrier to our objectives of attracting new businesses, industries and residential developers."

An additional separate cap is being considered which would apply for individual ratepayers whose annual rate increase exceeds seven per cent above that year's general rate rise as set by council.

Mr Reid said the mathematical model had been developed in-house but was tested by an independent chartered accountancy

The documents do not detail council's rating decision for the 2022-23 year as it will be determined by council as part of its budget process, most likely in July, and only once capital valuation changes for the year are known.

The documents will be available for review and comment, subject to council endorsing their release, on the council's website or the Balaklava office on Thursday, February 24.

Submissions close at 6pm on Thursday, March 17.

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Infrastructure funded at CCC

COPPER Coast Council has distributed funding received as part of the federal government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program.

Council received \$824,398 last July, allocating \$400,000 to rural road resheeting and maintenance, \$240,000 for the Kadina CWMS effluent lagoons, \$169,398 towards the Wallaroo to Moonta Cycling and Walking Trail and \$15,000 for lighting at the Ascot Gallery,

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said the funding could not have come at a better time for the Copper Coast community.

'We have long been pushing to improve our roads and the recent floods experienced on the Copper Coast were further evidence of the works required as a number of roads had to be closed," Mrs Talbot said.

"We have spent a lot of time on our Five-Year Transport and Stormwater Management Plans, and this funding for rural roads re-sheeting and maintenance will help us put these into action and continue improving these roads, so family and friends can safely arrive at their destinations.

"The Community Wastewater Management Systems were also under stress with the downpour, and the \$240,000 dedicated to upgrading of the Kadina CWMS effluent lagoons will ensure we continue to comply with the Environmental Improvement Plan we have with the South Australian Environment Protection Authority."

Mrs Talbot said she was also thrilled the new cycling and walking trail had now been fully financed.

"This path is a great way of connecting the peninsula's three largest urban centres of Kadina, Moonta and Wallaroo so residents and tourists can safely explore the area in a recreational way," she said.

"The Copper Coast Art Group has created some fantastic art over the years, but the use of house lamps to exhibit these instalments takes away from the beauty of the pieces and council agreed a lighting upgrade is required."

Member for Grey Rowan Ramsey congratulated council for electing to split the allocation of funds.

"The diversity of works is a demonstration of the wide range of demands that come on councils who have constant calls to allocate resources for any number of projects across their geographical area," Mr Ramsey said.

"The LRCI grants demonstrate the confidence the federal government has in local government and acknowledge the importance of rural and regional communities."

Club construction begin

WORK has begun on Minlaton's multi-purpose sports and community club at the town oval.

Earthworks have been completed and plumbing is being laid with construction expected to start shortly.

Minlaton District Community and Sports Centre received \$445,400 - which will be matched dollar-for-dollar from the SA Recreation and Sport Grassroots Facilities Program last year.

A committee comprising representatives from the show society and football, netball, cricket, tennis and hockey clubs was formed to build a community and sport centre in Minlaton in

"Once the slab is down, they will start on the build of the community club and we are thinking it will take about six weeks before we can lock it up," committee representative Chris Litster said.

'With any build we are at the mercy of tradespeople and materials but at this stage everything is going to plan.

"We don't think the commu-

nity club will be operational for the football season because there will be a lot to do inside which will be done by volunteers."

Work has also started on refurbishing the existing changerooms to meet SANFL standards.

"The refurbishment and redevelopment of the changerooms should be done and be up and running by the first game at Minlaton on July 9," Mr Litster said.

The changerooms will be up SANFL standard which allows us to host carnivals and there is a focus on women's football and making provisions for that.


"At the back of the community club there will be provisions for netballers to shower and change which is great."

Mr Litster said the committee is looking to keep costs down wherever it can.

"We are really relying on inkind work; we have a lot of great volunteers led by David Newbold who has been inspirational," he said.

"He has been up at the site every day; he really has been the mastermind but everyone does have a part to play."

IT started as a search for a lost ball, but it turned into six days of collecting rubbish.

Holiday-goers Cherie and David Kerin, of Adelaide, embarked on a journey to retrieve their 4-year-old grandson's ball which had been lost not long before.

While they never found the ball, they did cover more than 15 kilometres of beach between Stansbury and Port Vincent collecting rubbish.

The couple covered a different section each day and ended up with a substantial amount of washed and blown away litter.

Mrs Kerin said people don't often come across the rubbish

because a lot of the beach is isolated.

"There are only four access points along that stretch so you can see why a lot of this goes unnoticed, and that point also made it difficult for us when collecting," she said.

"We'd cover a section of the beach walking one way, before walking back towards the car and picking everything up."

The Kerins found five other balls, 11 crates and an inflatable giraffe during their clean up

"We ended up with so much plastic, about 67 pieces, and it seems a lot of it washed ashore after falling off of boats, which can happen," Mrs Kerin said.

"But if it's in the ocean it then poses a significant threat to

"We found an expensive pair of sunglasses as well as so many lost hats and shoes, it roughly equated to three pieces (of rubbish) every kilometre."

It was a timely reminder for the family about the need to be smart with non-biodegradable

"It's such a gorgeous and beautiful part of the world, I think the message is just for people to be a little smarter and be more aware," Mrs Kerin said.

ROMA Bryan was set to celebrate her 100th birthday with a large gathering of friends and family. While Covid caused the party to be cancelled, Roma still marked the occasion with her three children Dene, Brenda and Jennifer and their partners on Monday, January 31.

Born Roma Gladys Price to Mark and Lucy Price in 1922, Roma grew up on the family farm a few kilometres out of Paskeville.

Working hard outside on the farm alongside her father was her way of life. Milking cows, riding horses, sewing grain bags and collecting bones for sale were just a few of her chores.

Being the eldest of three children, Roma was often expected to work outside doing the physically hard

Attending school at Pasky meant riding her Shetland pony which would often buck her off and run home — leaving Roma to walk the rest of the way home.

Sympathy didn't await her once she made it home. Generally, she was rewarded with a "whack on the bum" from her father "for falling off".

She got on a lot better with Fan, the big draught horse she moved onto after the little "shit-land".

Fan had lots of patience with the little girl — she never ran off and would automatically back into a fence to enable young Roma to climb up the fence to mount the big horse after she fell off.

Roma didn't attend high school as her father deemed it unnecessary and an expense they couldn't afford as it would have meant boarding away from home.

She worked on the farm alongside her father until she was 15 when she became Paskeville's telephonist.

Later Roma met the love of her life, Barry Bryan.

Barry soon proposed asking, "light of my life, will you marry me?" Together they raised their family Dene, Brenda and Jennifer.

Roma enjoyed many things, in particular bowling for the Paskeville Bowling Club (of which she was a founding member and at the age of 99, retired from her role as patroness) and playing tennis.

She also enjoyed cards, attending Church at St Margaret's Anglican Church in Paskeville, watching the Australian Open tennis, knitting slippers for soldiers sent to war, and crocheting knee rugs for "the oldies".

Roma has faced her fair share of medical issues including a diagnosis of brain cancer in her 70s and subsequent brain surgery as well as skin cancer.

But most of all, Roma has enjoyed being actively involved in her family's lives.

eight grandsons and one granddaughter, 21 great-grandchildren (one in heaven) and one greatgreat-grandson.

Roma now resides at Star of the Sea, Wallaroo, where she had volunteered since the early days of the retirement home.

She has an amazing memory and enjoys reminiscing about the old days, having a joke, and talking to

Roma was "tickled pink" to receive all the official congratulatory messages from the "important" people in Australia and from the Queen; however, she was most pleased to be able to see and spend time with her family who were able to visit her during her birthday week.

Anthea to chop hair for blood cancer research

WALLAROO's Anthea Kemp plans to shave off her hair for World's Greatest Shave 2022 next month.

Anthea's sister Gemma will pick up the clippers when she takes a leap of faith in front of her family, friends and those who donated on Sunday, March 20.

"I've always had long hair — I usually get upset when it gets cut to shoulder length so I'm sure there'll be some tears," Anthea

"I got the idea (to shave) about five years ago, but having two young children has meant I haven't had time to do it."

Anthea said she felt an urge to the support Leukaemia Foundation through her work with Country SA PHN.

"Blood cancer is well on the rise, particularly myeloma and lymphoma which are both very prevalent," she said.

"My father-in-law has lymphoma and I also have coworkers with cousins and friends who've passed away with blood cancer.

"More 100,000 than Australians currently suffer from blood cancer — that's 18,000 every year and one person every 30 minutes.

"It became very apparent I needed to do something, even if it's something small like shaving

Anthea has already raised more

than \$1800 since beginning her fundraiser late last month.

"All the money I raise will go Leukaemia towards the Foundation, which provides emotional support and assists with travel for country-based patients, as well as research grants to find a cure for blood cancer," she said.

"I've set shave targets, so if I raise \$5000, I'll get a number two (shave) and a number one for \$10,000.

"There's been lots of people donating already — I've put up posters with QR codes at Drakes (Wallaroo) and a few local pubs."

A private Facebook group was created by Anthea which comprises all of her donors so far.

"The group is a space for people to share why the cause is close to them," she said.

"It also involves some coping strategies for sufferers and people close to the sufferers.

"The more information available to friends and family, the more confident they are to show their support."

Anthea said she planned to donate her chopped hair to Sustainable Salons, which makes wigs and gives them to people with cancer.

"I'm super proud of everyone who's donated and how much money I've raised," she said.

"I was a member of the Jim Shipley combo and later formed my own band, Southern Gold.


"We played in Knoxville and Nashville for many

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Looking out at Dhilba Gurranda-Innes National Park

Guuranda-Innes National Park's newest lookout was officially opened earlier this

The Gulawulgawi Ngunda Nhagu — Cape Spencer Lookout provides visitors with spectacular 360-degree views of Investigator Strait and the Althorpe Island group, as well as Kangaroo Island in the dis-

Works were completed as part of the state government's \$3 million investment in the park, with additional picnic areas, toilet facilities and carparks under construction at Stenhouse Bay and Shell Beach.

"Dhilba Gurranda-Innes National Park is a spectacular part of our state with its beautiful coastline and beaches and this new, accessible lookout will

further enhance its reputation as a must-visit destination," Minister for Environment and Water David Speirs said.

"It's wonderful to have been able to come and open the lookout, and see just how spectacular it is.

"The works will greatly improve visitor experiences, at Stenhouse Bay there will be an improved campground design and new and upgraded visitor facilities, while works at popular Shell Beach will include an upgrade to the existing carpark and construction of a new toilet facility."

The name Gulawulgawi Ngunda Nhagu (pronounced Goo-lu-wool-gowie Ngoondah Nha-koo) comes from the Nharangga word Gulawulgawi being the place name for the Cape Spencer area, and Ngunda Nhagu meaning lookout.

The Department Environment and Water's National Parks and Wildlife Service is working with the park's co-management board, traditional owners and friends of parks volunteer groups to ensure the best outcome in creating new visitor facilities at the iconic park.

NPWS is working closely with traditional owners to establish the new lookout as a major interpretive site and share Nharangga stories that relate to the landscape of the

Additional signage will help to share these stories with visi-

Upgrades are expected to be complete by June 2022.

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Age Friendly SA Grants awarded

YORKE Peninsula community groups have been granted more than \$5000 through the state government's Age Friendly SA Grants pro-

More than 30 projects across the state received funding to enhance the wellbeing of older South Australians.

The Price Progress Association received \$4200 for a cinema for seniors' program in the Price Soldiers Memorial Hall while the University of the Third Age Yorke Peninsula received \$850 to purchase card tables for mahjong.

"The Soldiers Memorial Hall at Price is 96 years old and was starting to look a bit worse for wear, so in 2021 a new committee was formed and we have spent a considerable amount of money on repairs and maintenance," association member Karen Newbold said.

"It was then decided after spending all that money, the hall needed to be used so the idea of scone time, where we hold a monthly morning tea in the hall, came around.

"It was during one of these morn-

ing teas some of the older residents were reminiscing about when pictures used to be shown at the hall and said they would love to have that again."

Mrs Newbold said a lot of older residents don't drive and the nearest cinema is about an hour away.

"At first, we borrowed an inflatable screen and projector from Yorke Peninsula Council but the noise from the blower was too loud inside and it wouldn't fit on the stage," she said.

"We decided to apply for a grant to purchase our own screen which can be attached to the stage and pulled down when required as well as a pro-

"Our aim is to hold a regular movie session at minimal cost to attendees in the hope of reducing social isolation and strengthening community connection."

University of the Third Age Yorke Peninsula president Heather Simpson said funding will allow the group to provide better facilities to its members.

"The U3AYP offers all sorts of

courses for semi-retired people," Mrs Simpson said

'Mahjong was introduced in 2014 and it was something people were looking for.



Unearthing insects at Wallaroo Mines

WALLAROO Mines Primary School, Kadina, is one of 50 sites across the country investigating insects in a South Australian Museum program.

The Insect Investigators science project aims to connect regional students with researchers in a bid to get kids discovering new insects in their area.

WMPS year 3/4 teacher Morgan Dabinett said her students were hoping to discover and name unknown insects.

"Through doing the program we are hoping students will gain an understanding of how science is used in the real world," she said.

'We will be collecting insects, sending off samples and we will be provided with regular updates about the progress of samples and what is happening in the lab.

"The students are going to be exposed to new learning opportunities such as virtual sessions with scientists and they've already shown great interest in the investigation, as they have been collecting insects during their playtimes."


The school has set up a malaise trap — a tent-like structure which catches flying insects — and students will monitor their findings for four weeks.

Project manager and honorary researcher at the South Australian Museum Dr Erinn Fagan-Jeffries said nearly 200 schools applied for the program.



The next meeting of the YP Polocrosse Club is on Saturday,







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

Following a semifinal century for Paskeville/Boors Plains the day before, Luke Harrop was swinging the ball around corners and closed with figures of 2/12.


Cameron Harris and Toby Glasson also combined for a strong bowling partnership in the middle overs to put YP in the box seat.







Payments for farmers' private soil data

THE federal government has launched a program for farmers and other land managers to receive payment in exchange for sharing historical soil test data.

Minister for Agriculture and Northern Australia David Littleproud said \$21 million would be available to land managers wanting to contribute their soil data to a national database.

"The Historical Soil Data Capture Payments Program is part of the National Soil Strategy which aims to build

knowledge for land managers to benchmark their soil against regional or type averages," Mr Littleproud said.

"We know there is a lot of privately held soil data captured for agricultural management and other purposes.

"This program aims to gather and preserve soil data and make it centrally and publicly available for others to use."

Mr Littleproud said better soil data will lead to improved research, technology, policy outcomes and will benefit all Australians.

"The Australian Government is seeking suitably qualified service providers to act as data brokers to help deliver the program," he said.

"Once selected, data brokers will work with land managers to source soil data that has been collected and tested using approved testing methods in a laboratory."

Growers armed with triple threat against weeds

SOUTHERN growers could change their weed management practices after results from nearly five yearsof trials indicated a triple-threat strategy could produce optimal results.

Grains Research and Development Corporation has released a video summarising results from trials by the University of Adelaide on weed management across the southern grain growing region.

This GRDC investment investigated the most effective ways to minimise the impact of weeds on crop yields in varying rainfall zones and suppress weeds throughout the growing season to reduce their seedset.

University of Adelaide's Associate Professor of Agronomy and Weed Science Dr Gurjeet Gill said one of the most interesting results showed the current weed populations can cause more damage to crop yields if sowing is delayed, which has been a common management practice for weed control across the southern grain growing region.

"Commonly, southern growers have opted to delay sowing allowing a knockdown spray but our trial results have emphasised that this can backfire," he said.

"Weeds have evolved to have later dormancy, meaning there could be very minimal weed growth at sowing and more weeds emerging anywhere from a month to six weeks after rains.

"These later emerging weeds can compete more aggressively with late sown crops as their vigour slows down in the cooler months and significantly impact yields."

Dr Gill said the trials revealed a higher seeding rate paired with optimal herbicide management also proved most effective when developing good crop competition against weeds and suppressing their seedbank throughout the season.

"Our results showed when you double the crop seed density from 100 to 200 plants per square metre, you can potentially halve the seed set of ryegrass," he said.

"Even for growers in lower rainfall zones, who traditionally worry about higher seed rates impacting the quality of grain, results showed that the denser seed rates didn't have a negative impact on yield or quality."

Dr Gill said, in both wheat and canola trials, results showed the nonchemical approaches to weed management of timely sowing and denser crop populations, paired with effective herbicide application was the triple strategy to managing weeds.

"These cultural practices proved to be extremely valuable in preserving yields when integrated with effective pre-emergent herbicides," he said.

Seed of Light for respected leader

ONE of the grains industry's most entertaining and engaging extension figures has been recognised for his efforts to support and inform growers in the southern cropping

Dale Grey, a respected seasonal risk agronomist and communicator Agriculture Victoria, has been presented with the Grains Research and Development Corporation 2022 southern Seed of Light Award.

The award was voted upon by the GRDC Southern Region Panel and acknowledges outstanding effort in the extension of outcomes from GRDC investments.

Mr Grey has worked for Agriculture Victoria for 27 years and currently provides agronomy, climate and weather analysis for farmers, agribusiness, government and the media across south eastern Australia.

GRDC Southern Region Panel member Michael Treloar said Mr Grey used a variety of approaches to make his information both entertaining and informative.

"Seasonal climate forecasting can be a very dry topic, but Dale's engaging presentation style — usually involving a Hawaiian shirt and a ukulele - brings colour and energy to what he delivers," he said.

Mr Grey has been interpreting climate models from around the world every month since 2008 and converting these insights into growerfriendly resources.

"Dale is the author of the Fast Break climate newsletters for Victoria, South Australia, Tasmania and southern New South Wales, and he produces a monthly YouTube climate update, the Very Fast Break, which is an entertaining series that breaks down climate concepts relative to the season, using easy to understand analogies," Mr Treloar said.

"For the past three years, he has also worked alongside GRDC as part of a large multidisciplinary team on the national Forewarned is Forearmed project, gathering insights on hot, cold, wet and dry extreme forecasts from the new BoM ACCESS-S model and searching for improved ways to communicate these forecasts for farmers.

"Dale enthusiastically shares his climate and forecasting knowledge with farmers and advisers and has presented at hundreds of rural events and forums to improve how we all understand what drives our seasonal rainfall.

"He has been a pioneer of digital communications (his enewsletters have been in circulation for more than a decade), he is an avid supporter of early career extension professionals, and is well versed in topics right across grain production, including frost and statistics."

Mr Grey said the award was an incredible surprise.

He paid tribute to his colleagues, supervisors and managers who he said have given him the freedom to do interesting work and allowed him to be himself.

Mr Grey also thanked those individuals who had inspired him with their good ideas, as well as the GRDC Southern Panel members who nominated him for the award.

"Over the past 17 years, climate and weather has been a fascinating space for me to work in because theres always something going on - new findings in the science, new information to extend and new understandings," Mr Grey said.

"It's been a fun career; it doesn't really feel like work."

APPLICATION FOR AUTHORISATIONS UNDER SECTIONS 23 AND 29(1)(B) OF THE ABORIGINAL HERITAGE ACT 1988 (SA)

The Premier of South Australia, who is responsible for the Aboriginal Heritage Act 1988 (SA) (Act), has received an application for authorisations under sections 23 and 29(1)(b) of the Act from Mr Adrian Mollenmans, Professor Amy Roberts (Flinders University) and Professor Lester Irabinna Rigney (University of South Australia) (Applicants). Section 23 of the Act makes it an offence to damage, disturb or interfere with any Aboriginal site, object or ancestral remains (Aboriginal heritage) without authorisation under the Act, while section 29(1)(b) of the Act makes it an offence to remove an Aboriginal object from the state without authorisation under the Act.

The Applicants propose to undertake a research project involving the recording of Aboriginal sites on the Yorke Peninsula, and the collection and analysis of archaeological samples (Research Proposal). The Research Proposal would be undertaken at Aboriginal sites located within 14 separate research zones on the Yorke Peninsula/Guuranda and adjacent islands, approximately 180 km northwest of Adelaide.

The Research Proposal, if authorised, would be undertaken in collaboration with Narungga Traditional Owners, via the Narungga Nation Aboriginal Corporation and the Point Pearce Aboriginal Corporation.

Consultation and Submissions

Prior to considering whether to grant any authorisation under the Act, the Premier must consult with Traditional Owners, as well as other Aboriginal parties that he thinks may have an interest in the matter. Accordingly, verbal and written submissions are now invited from Aboriginal people and organisations who meet these requirements. The closing date for submissions is **Thursday 17 March 2022**. In order to minimise the potential spread of COVID-19, no public meeting is scheduled for the application. 
Test and evaluation activities involving static firings and/or firings of naval and artillery weapons are conducted at the Proof and Experimental Establishment Port Wakefield throughout the year. The Proof and Experimental Establishment Port Wakefield is a vital Defence test and evaluation capability that has supported Defence

These firings may require specific tidal or weather conditions, and are critical for the safety of current and new Defence capabilities. Members of the public may notice noise, vibration, flashes and/or smoke during the testing. There is no risk to the public outside of the gazetted Defence Practice Areas.

For reasons of public safety, there is a permanent exclusion zone covering land, sea and air around the Port Wakefield Establishment. Specific details on the Port Wakefield Prohibited Area can be obtained from Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No GN 26, 4 July 1990, and is shown on the diagram below. Trespassing in this Area is strictly prohibited and very dangerous due to the presence of unexploded bombs. Any person found within the Prohibited Area or on Defence land will be subject to prosecution.

Specific test and evaluation activities may also require restricting public access to the Port Wakefield Defence Practice Areas over specific periods with these areas articulated in the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No. GN 40, 7 October 1992, and also identified on the diagram below. This may affect access to the Gulf of St Vincent at Port Wakefield and Port Parham.







HOT FISHING TIPS

Wallaroo: Colleagues from the War Vets Fishing Group caught King George whiting and blue swimmer crabs during their recent visit to Myponie Point, along with garfish and a couple of squid. The gar schools run intermittently all the way north to Tickera, Kanaka and Port Davis. Local jetty-based fishing has blueys and squid.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Anglers enjoyed great tide movement last weekend, with more than two metres on the change recorded. KG whiting came from Steamer Channel and the grounds west of Tipara Reef. Big fat garfish are off Cape Elizabeth and Coopers Beach on the high tides. Blue crabs and gar are also out from Warburto Point. Try the jetties for blueys and squid.

Point Turton: Large numbers of anglers came and went through lower Yorke Peninsula in the past week, the four wheel drive and upmarket caravan traffic is amazing! Whiting are at The Banks and Corny Point, while nice garfish have been reported from Barker Rocks and Port Rickaby. The jetty has been quiet.

Marion Bay: A generous colleague caught some lovely garfish and tommy ruff (Australian herring) off the beach at Point Gilbert on Sunday morning before the winds picked up and cool weather resulted. Boat crews fishing off Marion Bay for red nannygai, sweep, flathead and garfish. Gym and Browns Beaches have salmon trout and small gar at times.

Edithburgh: Strong south to south-east winds have been pretty much a daily occurrence along this section of our coast in recent days. Tommies and gar can be caught from the jetty, while boat crews have fished for KG whiting at Tapley Shoals and the Troubridge Light. Gar and squid can be caught also from Coobowie, Klein Point and Port Giles. Rakers are also enjoyed a run of bluevs at The Hut.

Black Point/Ardrossan: Small tinnies sheltered in the bay around Black and Pine Point, their occupants targeting gar, blueys and sprat tommies last week, Rakers worked the grounds from Billy Goat Flat to Pavy Gully using the massive outgoing tides to pick up a nice feed. A few gar are off Ardrossan and Windara Reef and blue crabs are also at the town jetty. Tight lines and see you next week!



YPFL announces penalty system

Yorke Peninsula Football League is introducing a penalty points system ahead of the 2022

Clubs will be forced to pay a fine if they accrue a certain number of penalty points during a single sea-

A yellow card is worth three points, a report and reprimand is five and a suspension by the tribunal is worth 10 points.

Once a club reaches 40 points it will be fined \$500; at 70 the fine jumps to \$1000 and at 100 points

Every club's points tally will reset at the beginning of a new sea-

The system was adopted by the Adelaide Plains Football League last year, while North Eastern Football League has used a similar one across recent seasons.

YPFL secretary Phil Brand said the system was encouraged by the Central Zone committee for a consistency across the involved leagues.

'The aim of the system is to take action against players consistently causing grief," Brand said.

"Obviously clubs don't want to

pay fines, so this puts pressure back on them to stamp out poor behaviour."

Brand said it would be uncommon for a club to reach any of the three fine thresholds.

"I don't believe any (penalty points) fines would've been handed out in the past 10 years if we had this system," he said.

"Money raised by fines under the PPS will be used to fund the YPFL's representative teams and towards junior development.

"Clubs will be notified when they are within 10 points of a fine limit and, once over, an invoice payable in 14 days will be issued."





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
