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Bay Road upgrade hit by delays

WORKS on Bay Road, Moonta Bay, have been delayed by up to five months.

Sand collapsing in stormwater drainage trenches, Covid-19 lockdowns and outbreaks, inclement weather and rock excavation have all contributed to the delay of works.

Recent rain also affected the setup for kerb and channel, which now has to be reestablished.

The timeline for the completion of upgrades and the reopening of the road to the public has been pushed back to July.

Copper Coast Council mayor Roslyn Talbot said Bay Road was such an important road and major upgrade it had to be done

right. "Unfortunately, in Covid times delays can't be helped and the weather event was something we couldn't foresee," Mrs Talbot said.

"We can guarantee it (Bay Road) will be worth the wait

and it will have the finish the main thoroughfare deserves to the premier beaches and of course Splash Town.

"We appreciate it is inconvenient for the residents on Bay Road and surrounds, and we are thankful for their patience and hope they can continue to be patient."

Initial plans had the works completed by December 2021 but the timeline was pushed to March last September.

THE recent significant rain event caused widespread flooding across the Copper Coast.

Copper Coast Council CEO Russell Peate said stormwater drainage was in the forefront of council's mind.

"In the Moonta/Moonta Bay area there was about 70mm in 13 hours

and a further 20mm the following morning," Mr Peate said.

"This caused some flooding of roads and in some cases some residences.

"The Moonta Lifestyle Village had some inundation to a few units, as I understand it.

"The cost of flooding damage is still being determined." Mr Peate said it would still take a

few weeks until the water subsided

from the unsealed roads affected and repairs could be undertaken.

"Council does have a five-year stormwater management plan as part of the five-year transport plan," he said.

"We have done some works in Paulson Street, Olive Parade and Mines Road, Kadina, East Terrace, Bay Road, and Trelawney Street, Moonta Bay, with works scheduled in George Street and Moonta Road, Moonta this calendar year.

"We have received funding from the State Stormwater Management Authority for both of these projects.

"It is suggested the director infrastructure services provide a report on urgent stormwater drainage works to be completed to alleviate or overcome flooding and inundation of houses for the future."

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said there were stormwater works happening in

Moonta that were highly needed.

"Some homes were flooded in one area and I feel for those people but most flooding occurred on roads," Mrs Talbot said.

"We have significant plans and it is important work, it's just not finished yet, but as it grows it will get better and better.

"Kadina and Moonta both have stormwater plans with Wallaroo's currently in the works."

WORK has officially started on the \$260 million Augusta Highway duplication project.

The project, which will include the duplication of the highway from just north of the Copper Coast overpass to Lochiel, is jointly funded by the state and federal governments.

South Australian premier Steven Marshall, Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Corey Wingard and Member for Sturt Dan van Holst Pellekaan were on site to officially turn the first sod today (Tuesday, February 8).

"We're building what matters for South Australians and that includes investing heavily in our regional roads," Mr Marshall said.

"This is a vital project which will drastically improve safety but also support hundreds of jobs for the state and specifically the local region.

"South Australia is the fastest growing economy in the country and our unemployment rate is at its lowest level ever, it is projects like this one helping get people into jobs."

Mr Wingard said the Augusta Highway is a key road

corridor which forms part of the National Land Transport Network.

"We know this is a popular route for holiday makers and travellers heading out to and from the north of the state, which can lead to high traffic volumes on holidays such as long weekends," Mr Wingard said.

"That's why we're getting on with delivering this project which will provide dual, twolane carriageways along 28 kilometres of the Augusta Highway."

Deputy Prime Minister Barnaby Joyce said the Australian Government is investing in the infrastructure South Australia needs.

"The August Highway duplication project is an investment in regional South Australia that will drive this region into the future," Mr Joyce said.

"Once completed, the duplicated highway will ensure faster, safer travel for families and freight, while boosting economic growth and supporting 330 jobs during constructions."

Works will start just north of the overpass and move progressively along the highway with completion expected in 2024.

Government, doctors strike hospital pay deal

A NEW deal between rural doctors and SA Health is set to create a more sustainable workforce, according to negotiators.

The Australian Medical Association South Australia and Rural Doctors' Association of SA have been in negotiations for 18 months with SA Health's Rural Support Service around a new renumeration agreement for doctors who work in rural hospitals.

RDASA president Dr Peter Rischbieth said it was an extreme relief to get to this point.

"Maintaining a local rural doctor workforce in a regional area is the difference between medical services being available and entire services shutting down, resulting in significant travel times for the members of these communities as well as poorer health outcomes," Dr Rischbieth said.

"We are extremely pleased the agreement gives rural doctors more attractive options to negotiate their employment contracts, with terms that better suit them.

"It increases their remuneration and includes bonuses for doctors who choose to work in the most remote locations in the state — areas that have been very difficult to recruit to.

"It also recognises GP visiting medical officers have been working off-contract and provides reasonable back-pay in the form of a sign-on fee.

"It's a huge relief for the doctors serving rural South Australia to now have options to remain providing care to their communities, and boosts their ability to attract the next generation of doctors to their towns."

The government has promised to invest about \$188 million over two years to attract and retain GPs in rural areas.

"This investment is a generational change for regional health in South Australia, with the total value of the payments under the agreement projected to increase by over 20 per cent," Premier Steven Marshall said.

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis welcomed the announcement as recognition of the role and effort of rural doctors.

"More needs to be done to increase the overall size of the regional pool of doctors but this new agreement is a good start," he said.

"As stated when I released my

Regional Health Plan in early December, regional health care is the biggest issue facing the Narungga electorate and it is not an exaggeration to say South Australia's regional health care system has been in crisis due to the dire shortage of doctors willing to come to the country and, once they get here, stay for any length of time.

"And who could blame them? Working around the clock 24/7 for less pay than metro colleagues and fly in and fly out locums can't be attractive and has been an impossible sell.

"It is hoped the new agreement reached will translate to sustainable inpatient and surgical and post-operative services in local hospitals and accident and emergency units that are so crucial to rural communities."

Key agreement measures

- A sign-up bonus of \$50,000 for a doctor to work in the more remote areas of the state
- The ability for a doctor to choose either a new sessional (hourly) rate for hospital work or remain with the current feefor-service structure
- A previously unavailable process that allows a GP to dispute their offer from their Local Health Network and seek modification through a formal process

TWO YEARS ON – is there an end in sight?

NO one could have predicted a pandemic would hit two years ago. Covid-19 cases grew rapidly throughout 2020 and hard lock-downs and restrictions were imposed.

A year flew by and, while the virus didn't slow down, by 2021 the world had more tools at its disposal.

People want to see the light at the end of the tunnel now but flickers of hope through vaccinations get crushed over and over again by more restrictions.

For two years, businesses have fought an uphill battle — in particular the hospitality sector.

It comes as more food and bever-

age vans pop up on Yorke Peninsula, benefiting from being able to sell to the masses without as many restrictions.

Cracked Pepper Cafe, Kadina, owner Janine Mercer said she didn't see an end in sight to pandemic conditions.

"We've just had to adapt and modify to keep up," she said.

"It's still an ongoing challenge two years on so, as a business, we decided to redo things to make people feel more comfortable by opening up in the indoor space, creating more outdoor dining options and even putting in a coffee collection window.

"Ultimately we've had to do these things to stay in survival mode and there's nothing else we can do but to make it work." Mrs Mercer said she believed the focus should be learning to live with the virus.

"There's no point getting worked up over it and we have staff to think about," she said.

"We'll just keep moving the goal posts if we have to — we've found if we stay positive other people do too."

Mobile vendors soaring ahead

Chunky Boy's Kitchen owners Tim Nadich and Chelsea Seddon have had their battles throughout pandemic but believe opening a mobile business has been beneficial.

"Although we still have some (restrictions) we must abide by and enforce, we're lucky we are not capped to limited numbers or seating," they said.

"We have survived by changing the way we do things, but we have also supported a lot of fixed venues throughout Covid and tried to work together to keep small local businesses alive."

Chunky Boy's Kitchen opened three months before the pandemic hit, causing plenty of challenges for the couple.

"Just simple things like supplies being low and fewer tourism events to cater," they said

"At times we couldn't travel and support other local businesses.

Rules continue to change

MORE Covid-19 restrictions could ease as early as Friday.

Premier Steven Marshall announced considerations were likely around home gathering caps and gym and hospitality restrictions.

It comes as changes have been made to close contact testing requirements.

Previously, close contacts only needed to take two rapid antigen tests but that has been increased to at least four tests.

"To improve the sensitivity of the RAT, close contacts without symptoms who choose rapid testing will be provided with a pack of four to five RATs instead of the previous two," chief health officer Professor Nicola Spurrier said.

"People should now be looking to rapid rest on days one, three, five and seven.

"We know RATs are more likely to pick up the disease during the most infectious middle period of the disease.

"RATs can be a great tool for regular surveillance testing; however, PCR tests remain the gold standard test."

SA Health modelling showed cases would remain in the hundreds each day into April as restrictions were eased through mid-March.

However, the forecast, produced by the University of Adelaide and South Australian Health and Medical Research Institute did not show a new spike in cases.

International borders partially open

AUSTRALIA will reopen international borders to double vaccinated people from February 21.

Prime Minister Scott Morrison made the announcement yesterday (Monday, February 8)

"If you are double vaccinated, we look forward to welcoming you back to Australia," Mr Morrison said.

"I hope the international borders will open to tourists soon after the success of partial openings to students, backpackers and skilled migrants, particularly given many of the states have now passed their peaks in Covid-19 infections.

"The key issue we have been examining, and I have asked for advice from our health officials now over recent weeks, is how that decision could impact on our hospitals, which has been our primary consideration."

Abalone poachers under investigation

POLICE seized a commercial quantity of abalone at Port Minlacowie on Monday, January 31.

Yorke Mid North police received information from the public in relation to suspicious fishing behaviour and was able to collaborate with Fisheries in a joint operation.

The matter was later referred to the Department of Primary Industries and Regions, Yorketown Fisheries Office for further investigation.

Police and Fisheries officers intercepted four men and located 851 abalone, 806 of which were under the legal-size limit, at Port Minlacowie boat ramp at about 4pm.

The abalone, fishing equipment and a boat were

all seized by officers as part of the prosecution process.

A 21 year old from Maitland, 38 year old from Port Victoria, 32 year old from Clearview and 47 year old from Port Lincoln were interviewed by Fisheries for offences under the Fisheries Act.

Investigations are set to continue.

P-plater fined for drug driving

A provisional driver has been fined for drug driving following a crash at Marion Bay last year.

Yorketown police were called to a single-vehicle rollover on the Yorke Highway at about 2.15pm on Thursday, December 30.

The P-plate driver was treated for minor injuries at hospital and was issued a \$205 on-the-spot fine for failing to keep on sealed surface.

Police have since received the results of the driver's blood sample taken at the hospital, which indicated the driver had THC (cannabis) in his blood at the time of the crash.

The 17-year-old man from

Eden Hills has been issued with a second on-the-spot fine totalling \$1344 for drug driving and breaching his Provisional Licence conditions.

Missing kayaker found near Port Vic

Port Victoria police were informed of a missing person off the coast of Wauraltee Beach at about 11am yesterday, Monday, February 7.

An Adelaide man in his mid-50s had been missing for about three hours after launching his kayak whilst camping with his partner on the beach.

Police notified Royal Volunteer Coastal Patrol, Point Turton, of the missing person, before he was located about one kilometre off the coast.

It was believed he was pulled out to sea by a strong current and windy conditions.

The man was found to be without a life jacket.

Police reminded those venturing out to sea to ensure they are carrying the correct safety equipment to avoid unnecessary danger.

When we care for our environment we reap a healthier economy.

The Marna Banggara project is a fine example of a community's appetite for species and habitat preservation.

I believe in real action on our changing climate.

That means working with communities to prepare for the extremes of a changing climate, such as coastal inundation, bushfires, floods, and heatwaves.

Climate-ready communities are safer communities.

My experience in community engagement is significant.

I understand the importance of supporting communities to be stronger through shared responsibilities, education and preparedness.

Primary producers are known to be some of the first adopters of new technologies to improve efficiencies in caring for the land.

In reviewing the evolution over the past century it is easy to see that by adapting practices and building climate resilience into farming systems, it has paid dividends.

I will work closely with Narungga communities to ensure there is adequate investment in R&D that supports structural changes to farms and the potential for new diversified income streams.

NARUNGGA has some of the most beautiful examples of natural environment anywhere in South Australia.

It was an honour to play a role in perhaps the greatest conservation initiative in our state, the rewilding project, Marna Banggara on southern Yorke Peninsula.

We've seen the release of a number of brush-tailed bettongs with more native species to follow and have been pleased to see significant investment in Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park.

Elsewhere in the electorate I have done significant work on sand drift and retention issues, including hosting the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Environment, Resources and Development.

We reformed NRM Boards into Landscape SA so it became a local, grassroots, democratically elected board - a move which is already paying dividends.

I ensured Narungga received more than \$10.8 million for flood and erosion projects and heritage, recycling, stormwater management and waste recovery initiatives.

This is an unprecedented investment. Moving forward we have issues to confront concerning over abundant species - particularly with cormorants that breed on Troubridge Island.

I have been able to assist the Yorke Peninsula Council obtain meetings with Landscape SA who are now working on a solution - but it needs to come quicker.

We need to ensure our coastal communities have their voices heard on issues of 4WD beach access and coastal protection, and more needs to be done to ensure fish stocks remain healthy.

It was exciting to release snapper fingerlings into each gulf and more on-shore breeding programs would help

A POTENTIAL environmental disaster is unfolding in South Australia.

It's right on Narungga's doorstep, our tax dollars are funding it, and the Marshall Government is just letting it happen with not a word of protest.

I'm talking about the proposed radioactive waste dump the Morrison Government plans to build at Napandee, west of Kimba, on the traditional lands of the Bungala people.

While the residents of Kimba were given a say about a dump in their backyard, the rest of us in South Australia, including the traditional owners, were not.

While I'm conscious of the need for a long-term solution for management of radioactive waste, I am also very concerned about the risks to Narungga communities and South Australia. Not just from possible leaks of contaminated material at the facility, but also accidents incurred in transporting the radioactive material by land from all over Australia.

I was a little girl when the Australian Government allowed British nuclear weapon tests at Maralinga, leaving a toxic legacy of contaminated land which is still unsafe for humans today.

- I was there.
- I survived.

Many people didn't, and many who did suffered cancers and other diseases.

The tragedy of Maralinga is not something I want to see repeated, yet I am very concerned the government is doing just that by building this radioactive waste dump on our doorstep.

Ensuring real time data is accessible is a priority for planning and I support a co-funded approach to have Mesonet Weather Stations installed here on Yorke Peninsula.

One Nation opposes this dump on our doorstep, and I will always fight to protect this community and the environment in which we live.



WORKS on the \$7.8 million upgrade of Bay Road, Moonta Bay, began on April 27, 2021.

Copper Coast Council CEO Russell Peate said contracts were signed in December 2020 and indicated the project would begin in February and completed by December 2021.

"The delay in works commencing was due to contract negotiations to award the contract to two companies, which ensured significant savings, and material delivery delays due to Covid-19," he said.

"We were optimistic this could be achieved and are disappointed that an extension is necessary."

Mr Peate said, while the project had been delayed, he would rather take the time to have it completed properly.

"Tonkin Engineering was appointed to make sure every work activity undertaken, so every hold point of the project is inspected, so the work is done in accordance with the contract and relevant standards," he said.

"They have approved extensions of time for the work for 82 days, plus an estimated additional 15 days with the recent rain event.

"The expected completion date for all of the works is by the end of July this year," he said.

"I have appreciated residents and the public's patience and understanding whilst the works have been ongoing.

"We apologise for the delay and thank everyone for their continued patience."

The total cost of the project is \$7,826,449.

"However, plans are in place to install vegetation at both the Kadina and Moonta cemeteries to further complement both areas.

RAA grant gives heart

STANSBURY Dalrymple Lions Club has been awarded an RAA Regional Safety Grant to put towards much-needed community projects.

The \$4000 received will go towards funding muchneeded, state-of-the-art stethoscopes for the Yorketown volunteer station of the South Australian Ambulance Service, allowing for each of the regular volunteers to have their own stethoscope.

Lions secretary Chris Duncan said 10 stethoscopes costing around \$6000 would be delivered in the coming days.

days. "The Yorketown SAAS Station was looking for some fairly high-tech stethoscopes and quite expensive ones," Mrs Duncan said.

"We receive an amount of money from Viterra each year which comes from the sample bin at the Port Giles facility which we put towards a community project.

"So, we applied for a \$4000 RAA grant to supplement our grain money from Viterra to buy the 10 stethoscopes and were fortunate to get one."

SAAS Yorketown volunteer team leader Sandy Gutsche

said the donation was a fantastic gesture and a game changer for the volunteer officers.

The brand newelectronic stethoscopes feature noise cancelling technology and can be digitally linked to a device such as a smart phone, allowing for information from the stethoscopes to be sent to ER doctors instantly from the scene.

"We have six fully qualified ambulance officers and four students, and the students will each get a stethoscope once they have graduated," Ms Gutsche said.

"It's not only the use of these new stethoscopes that is going to be fantastic, it's the support from the community. "We are all volunteers and

we do it because we love it and to help the community.

"So to have the community support us is just fantastic, and we really appreciate it.

"It will just increase our diagnostic abilities and sometimes it's really hard to hear a blood pressure or to hear the breathing and these stethoscopes could actually increase our longevity in the job.

"The Lions club has supported us a couple of times now and I haven't chased them for support, they've chased me and offered their support.

"They've been fantastic."

Domestic violence support increasing – but not locally

ALMOST 300,000 Australians received specialist homelessness services assistance during 2020-21.

More than 116,000 of these were people who had experienced family and domestic violence, according to a new report from the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare.

The Specialist Homelessness Services annual report 2020-21 includes information from 1698 agencies which received government funding to help Australians who were experiencing homelessness, or at risk of homelessness.

AIHW spokesperson Dr Gabrielle Phillips said one of the largest groups of clients assisted (42 per cent, or 116,200) was people who had experienced family and domestic violence.

"More than three-quarters of clients who had experienced family and domestic violence were female (77 per cent or 88,900) and 27,300 were male (23 per cent)," she said.

The state government committed to opening 10 new safety hubs across regional South Australia after a series of roundtables in 2018.

Hubs are now open in Berri, Gawler, Mount Barker, Mount Gambier, Murray Bridge, Port Augusta, and Whyalla, with Goolwa, Port Pirie and Port Lincoln to launch early this year. A Department for Human Services spokesperson said the safety and wellbeing of women and children across South Australia was a priority for the Department of Human Services.

"That's why the state government has invested a record \$21 million — and counting — on a range of new domestic violence initiatives to support women in South Australia, including the state-wide 24/7 Domestic Violence Crisis Line, the state-first Domestic

Violence Disclosure Scheme and potentially lifesaving DV mobile phone app," the spokesperson said.

"For at-risk women living in the Yorke Peninsula, the state government funds Uniting Country SA's Yorke and Mid North Domestic Violence, including Kadina.

"Any woman at risk in the Yorke Peninsula who needs support is urged to call the 24/7 DV Crisis Line and, in an emergency, call 000."

Uniting Country SA execu-

tive manager services Tracy Holden said UCSA continued to support women, children and families experiencing Domestic and Family Violence across the Yorke and Mid North.

"We have staff based in our office in Digby Street, Kadina," she said.

Electric trucks in gear

AUSTRALIAN Trucking Association and the Electric Vehicle Council are collaborating to drive the haulage industry towards electrification.

The raft of policy reforms for federal government consideration have been developed to help Australia meet its net zero emissions target and to ensure the industry remains competitive.

According to a report released by the EVC and ATA, only 14 of the 58 electric truck models available in North America, Europe and China are available to the Australian market.

EVC CEO Behyad Jafari said the emissions target could not be met without decarbonising the transport sector.

"Why should Australia be dependent on China and the Middle East to keep itself moving when we could be using home-grown power?" he said.

"Being able to power our supply chains with local electricity is surely a national sovereignty imperative."

ATA chairperson David Smith said he thinks electric power will be a game changer for the industry.

"It costs about \$117 to fuel a diesel truck for 300 kilometres, but just \$18 for an electric truck," Mr Smith said.

"If Australia gets left

behind on the transition to electric and zero-emission trucks, we risk our supply chains and exporters getting stuck with high, globally uncompetitive per kilometre freight costs."

Reform proposals include curfew-free operations in metro areas, increases in vehicle width standards, tightening emissions standards for new heavy vehicles, investment in public charging infrastructure and exemptions from sales tax for e-trucks.

Ardrossan trucking operator Gavin Wheare thinks the electrification of larger B-doubles is unlikely for now. "I can see electrification becoming a reality in urban, small delivery trucks where they spend a lot of time idling in traffic jams but I think we're a long way off seeing anyone going out into the middle of Australia with a stock crate and heading up the Tanami with an e-truck," Mr Wheare said. "This country is fairly unique and, in my opinion, the only way we'll see it affect long-distance haulage will be with a hybrid system.

"I think it will evolve starting with metro, then city to city but there will be diesel trucks for a long, long time running north and west."

Kadina Freightís Brenton

March said there were questions which needed to be answered around how far the vehicles would last without a charge, where that would happen and who would pay.

"I believe we will be going electric but there is a long way to go before we get there," he said.

"Many would know Red through his time growing up in the local area and his long association with the Broughton-Mundoora Football Club," a spokesperson said.

"Red is currently facing a difficult struggle after suffering a severe spinal cord compression in October 2021, which required emergency surgery.

"As a result of the compression, Red lost all feeling in the lower half of his body, the ability to walk and live his normal day-to-day life."

Red has been at the Hampstead Rehabilitation Centre since November.


"Probably none more than Karen, who has been travelling more than 900 kilometres between Kimba and Adelaide each week to spend time with Red, whilst trying to balance work and family.

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

Local young achievers recognised

MOONTA'S Rhys O'Donohue, along with Sophie Dolling, formerly of Port Broughton, are nominees in the 7News Young Achiever Awards.

Mr O'Donohue has been nominated for the Worldwide Small Business Achiever Award and Miss Dolling the University of Adelaide STEM Award.

Mr O'Donohue grew up in Mundoora and commenced a school-based apprenticeship in meat processing, working at a butcher shop for three years of high school.

He moved to Adelaide to study engineering and returned to Port Broughton after several years working in an Adelaide butcher shop.

"I felt my future was being a business owner, I spent every spare minute searching business sales online hopefully finding something I want," he said.

"I found a few opportunities but I didn't have the funds to cover the asking price."

In September 2019, Mr O'Donohue bought his first shop in Moonta with the help of his family and then 11 months later purchased his second store in Kadina.

"I currently have 12 staff working for me, three of whom are apprentices," he said.

"I have hired staff from employment agencies, some which have worked and some which haven't. "I have given three people their

first ever job, two of them with disabilities; this I am very proud of."

Mr O'Donohue sponsors more than 20 sporting clubs and endeavours to purchase meat from local farmers.

Miss Dolling is currently end-

ing her second year of a PhD program researching the chemical and physical presence of microplastic pollution in the seafood industry.

"This research is completed using a combination of ecology and analytical chemistry," her nomination read.

"Aiming to better understand the chemical impacts of microplastics pollution, Sophie is developing a method to better detect a range of chemical pollutants in fish species.

"Sophie has identified a number of chemical pollutants of concern from across a range of classes including pharmaceuticals, pesticides, plasticising agents and polyfluoroalkyl substances, a major contaminant of concern in Port River as identified by the South Australian Environment Protection Authority.

"As well as Sophie's research endeavours, she has also been a Project Officer and STEM Communicator for the STEM Academy program at the University of Adelaide since the beginning of 2020.

⁴STEM Academy is an outreach program for South Australian high school students aimed at getting them interested and excited about STEM careers.

"Sophie is also currently the Scientist in Residence at Saint Peter's Girls' School in Stonyfell where she facilitates a range of STEM activities and events for girls of all ages at the school.

"The aim of this program is to give the students of the school the opportunity to apply their learning, as well as better understand the diverse career of a scientist." Winners will be announced at a

gala presentation on May 6.

Minister for Agriculture and Northern Australia David Littleproud said the program was a way to give show societies a much-needed cash injection after the disruptions caused by the Covid-19 pandemic.

"Not only are they essential for business, agricultural shows and field days provide a way for people to show off their latest innovations and technology, increasing productivity and profitability for all involved in the agriculture sector," Mr Littleproud said.

Groups can apply for between \$10,000 and \$70,000 to cover events cancelled in 2021 while small shows and field days which hosted up to 1999 people in previous years can apply for up to \$10,000.

Applications open on January 28 and close February 17.







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A 70-year love affair

NOT many marriages last 70 years, but for Minlaton couple, Bob and Audrey Edwards it has been a walk in the park.

Well not exactly, there were some tough times in the early days.

But through thick and thin, droughts and tough farming years, the couple has endured and maintained their deep love for each other.

Together they have responded to every challenge mother nature, the economy, and circumstance have thrown their way with resilience, hard work and diversification.

And what's the secret to their success?

"You count to maybe 100 sometimes, instead of 10," Audrey said.

For 91-year-old Bob, his anniversary milestone is another record as no other Edwards male in the district has lived past 68.

He was born into a farming family in the Minlaton district and had to take on many responsibilities early after his two brothers went off to war.

Audrey was born at Maitland, left school at 14 and became a hairdresser after a two-year apprenticeship at Jamestown.

When Audrey's mother telephoned to say she had bought a salon in Minlaton, and that Audrey was needed to run it, Audrey returned to the peninsula.

The couple first laid eyes on each other at one of the many dances held at the Minlaton Town Hall.

'The balls or dances were the big thing in our day for entertainment," Audrey said.

"If there was a ball at say Warooka, you had to get a ride and everyone filled their cars, nobody thought of leaving an empty seat without seeing if somebody would like to go."

Bob and Audrey's first encounter at a Minlaton ball didn't go all that well.

It was a Canadian barn dance where you would change partners every 10 steps.

"As she came to me, I said Welcome to Minlaton' and she just turned away giggling which I thought was very rude," Bob said.

"That was all that happened that night, but hairdressers and nurses were always looking for a ride to dances.

"I was driving to another dance, Audrey was in the back seat and she had won a box of chocolates.

"She reached over my right shoulder and started feeding me chocolates and a spark was lit."

Bob and Audrey tied the knot on February 22, 1952, and have been inseparable ever since.

The couple welcomed three children, Vicki, David and Candice, and now have seven grandchildren and five greatgrandchildren.

When times became tough on the farm, after several poor harvests, the couple bought a gift shop in Minlaton and turned it into a delicatessen, selling cappuccinos, hot chickens and takeaway food as well as being a TAB agency.

"It was a time when the government was paying farmers to shoot young sheep because there were too many of them," Bob said.

"It was absolutely hopeless."

The deli enabled the couple to stay on the farm and in the district but just about killed them with holidays and travel somewhat of a pipedream.

But eventually Bob and Audrey discovered a love affair with Broome in northwest Western Australia, spending large chunks of the winter months there every year from the late 1990s until the past year or two.

The couple still live together in the family home and love having their family around, especially the grandkids and great-grandkids.

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St Mary MacKillop opens to secondary students

ST Mary MacKillop School, Wallaroo, has embarked on a new chapter.

The Catholic school has expanded to offer education to students in year 8, with plans to offer year 9 in 2023.

Principal Michelle Miller said there was enough evidence to confirm the need for Catholic education to expand on the Copper Coast.

"We want to be able to offer an

excellent Catholic education pathway to families for as long as possible into the child's years of school-

ing," she said. "The pedagogy and structure of our middle school will provide a seamless transition for students from primary to secondary school, we will provide a learning environment which will be studentcentred, leading to more effective learning, positive experiences in adolescence and a desire for lifelong learning."

The expansion included the construction of a purpose-built facility to house the secondary students.

"The facility has a large open area for science, food technology and digital technology," Ms Miller said.

'There are three general learning areas (classrooms) which will be set up for specific subject areas so students will move rooms for subjects and there are withdrawal spaces for quiet individual work, small group work or meetings.

"An outside, partially enclosed space will be used for technology such as woodwork and metalwork. "The space is well lit by natural light and connects to outdoors."

Ms Miller said there were no plans to extend St Mary MacKillop School past year 9 yet.

"As much as we would love to expand further to become an R-12 school, there is no definite plan to expand our school to include the senior secondary years of 10-12," Ms Miller said.

"Senior secondary requires very specialised teaching and facilities; however, students will leave us very well prepared for senior secondary school and we encourage this and do what we can to enable this to be within the Catholic school system."

Yorke Peninsula's 2022 SACA Men's Senior Country Cup cricket championships performance was a mixed bag.

After a poor first day, the YP cricketers bounced back on day two and halfway through the third game, were still in the hunt for a grand final berth.

But, by the end of the following day YP had finished with just a single victory at the bottom of the pack.

The competition was reduced to six teams as Covid restrictions prevented the participation of teams from Murray Districts-Barrier and Alice Springs.

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

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

Edithburgh's winners were Les Diprose 28-16 against Craig Norgren and Chris Tatchell 27-16 against Stewart Germaine.


For Minlaton, Jamie Baker accounted for Dion Heidenreich 21-17 and Shane Warrior defeated Michael Davies 25-17.



Girls footy a go on the peninsula

Patrick Goldsmith REPORT BY

Organisers are hoping to get a season of girls' football up and running on the peninsula this year.

It is feared the region will be left behind if participation doesn't pick up, with the number of teams growing rapidly since the inaugural AFLW season in 2017.

Across 2016-17, there were 50-60 registered female teams in the state, compared with 330 in 2021.

Organisers are keen to establish a local season, but not to the detriment of other sports.

"We want it as accessible as possible, and for those who play netball it means making it known they don't have to choose one or the other, but we also want those who don't play netball to come out," Yorke and Mid North SANFL game development coordinator Will Schultz said.

"Currently there's no local pathway after under 14 level for girls and that's something we want to change, but it doesn't happen without community support.

The 2022 program was originally set up with teams aligned to each existing Yorke Peninsula Football League club, but just 20 players have registered so far.

"Prior to Covid, we had really strong community involvement in girls' footy, both by those who wanted to play and those who decided to volunteer and help out," Schultz said.

"But now - following two years of interrupted or no options at all it's proving quite difficult to build on what we had.

'If it doesn't go ahead because of a lack in numbers required for a competition, then we'll put something in place, so there's still that option this year."



Profitable predictions for 2022

THE gross value of Australian agricultural production is on track for a fourth consecutive year of growth, according to a new Rabobank report.

A stellar 2021 has positioned the industry for a strong year ahead, the Australian Agribusiness Outlook for 2022 revealed.

"Australia's second year of great pricing and mostly exceptional production conditions in 2021 means the Australian agriculture industry is well placed to take on the challenges of 2022," the report said.

"More importantly, it means the industry can prepare for the time when the sun is not shining so brightly in its favour."

RaboResearch senior commodities analyst Cheryl Kalisch Gordon said while there will be some pressure on farming margins in 2022 compared with 2021 — with some heat forecast to come out of a range of commodity prices, a mixed production outlook and supply chain challenges — another favourable year.

"There was a combination of drought and adverse weather in key cropping regions around the world, strong stockpiling demand in the face of potential food shortages along with Covidinduced labour shortages which impacted intensivelyproduced agri products and transport," Dr Kalisch Gordon said.

"This delivered clouds to agriculture sectors in many regions of the world and a silver lining for Australian agriculture.

"This second straight year of increasing commodity prices coincided with again favourable to very-favourable Australian production conditions.

"And for those commodity sectors where production has

been lower, high pricing still delivered strongly profitable positions."

Dr Kalisch Gordon said the year ahead would also bring less pronounced opportunities due to food supply chain pressure and disruption

"We also expect some of the heat to come out of prices for a number of commodities in 2022 as supplies are renewed globally, stock levels are increased and demand tempers," she said.

"However, we expect prices to remain at levels above the five-year average for our main agricultural commodities."

Dr Kalisch Gordon said the outlook was mixed for agriculture production.

"Very favourable seasonal conditions in 2021 — and in some cases record rainfall have provided a beneficial start to 2022 for cropping and pasture prospects, due to good soil moisture" she said.

GRDC guide helps with machinery decision-making

machinery has resulted in the creation of a comprehensive investment guide for Australian grain growers.

Grains Research and Development Corporation's two-year project, Machinery Investment Options in the Australian Cropping Regions, investigated/evaluated machinery investment and replacement costs and options to support growers make more informed purchasing decisions.

Kondinin Group was involved in the creation of the guide and research manager Ben White said it provides a snapshot of the machinery ownership levels of more than 450 growers nationally and would help growers compare their position when it comes to industry averages for similar farming operations.

"Growers are typically presented with conflicting opinions when it comes to machinery purchases and the decisions around big-ticket investments can be stressful," he said.

"This guide provides a range of tools to help growers make

NEW research into farm more informed purchasing decisions."

> Amongst the tools is a new benchmarking formula, which allows growers to calculate their machinery investment levels relative to their overall farm profit.

The Machinery Investment Ratio formula requires growers to calculate their total plant, labour, maintenance and contracting costs relative to their total gross farm income.

This ratio indicates the efficiency of owning and operating machinery.

Using this formula, the GRDC found the average level of national machinery investment was 34 cents in every dollar of farm income generated (a machinery investment ratio of 0.34).

Mr White said, while this ratio can vary regionally, businesses with a ratio of less than 0.34 are typically more efficient with their machinery investments.

"The benchmarking data provides growers with a critical starting point to compare their own machinery investment strategies and could help deter-

mine whether they are over or underspending in comparison to industry averages," he said.

"Growers can then analyse their own machinery utilisation, fleet management practices, repair and maintenance costs, and labour levels to better manage their investment in machinery.

"It's important to note that there is no one-size-fits-all strategy and growers need to determine the levels of machinery investment or a contracting approach suitable for their farm business."

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Optimal time to spray summer grasses

DECLARED invasive summer grasses which impact grazing profitability and outcompete native vegetation are now active across the Northern and Yorke region.

The Northern and Yorke Landscape Board is effecting strategic roadside control of several declared summer grass species and encourages land managers to help stop their spread.

"Now is the best time to identify and control some of our region's most concerning summer grasses, like African lovegrass, buffel grass, Coolatai grass and innocent weed," Northern and Yorke Landscape officer Janet Moore said.

"We are working to restrict their spread through targeted roadside control and surveying for new infestations, but landholders can also play a key role in keeping these persistent weeds at bay.

"As some declared grasses look similar to native species,



can first appear along transport corridors such as roads and railways, as they can be carried long distances and quickly germinate on road reserves.

They can also form dense swards if they infest pastures, presenting costly problems for graziers.

"Most declared summer grasses are unpalatable to livestock and tend to increase in abundance under grazing," Ms Moore said.

"They make efficient use of any available water in the summer months and outcompete native and pasture species.

"If this happens, the carrying capacity of an affected area can be reduced, which has a direct impact on a farm's productivity."

Following careful hygiene practices is another way farmers can prevent declared summer grasses from spreading, according to Roseworthy Rural senior agronomist Chris Butler. Mr Butler suggested keeping incoming livestock in a designated area and hand feeding them for a couple of days to manage any weed seeds they

may have ingested. "It's also a good idea to clean your vehicle and boots before you return to your property if you've been somewhere that is infected with these weeds," he said.





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

Ange living it up at Celtic

I HAVE my uncle to thank, but half a decade ago I found my second sporting love (a certain SANFL club will always be my first) in the Celtic Football Club, in Glasgow, Scotland.

It took time, but eventually I fell in love with tuning into matches at 4am and spending money on different versions of the same green and whitehooped sporting jersey each season.

It felt closer to home when Australia's Ange Postecoglou was appointed manager in July.

Last Thursday morning (Wednesday evening, Glasgow time), Postecoglou's Celtic registered its most stirring victory thus far, dismantling a lacklustre Glasgow Rangers team 3-0 to go top of the premiership table.

For those not clued in, the Celtic-Rangers rivalry is widely regarded as one of the fiercest in world football, and certainly the most in Great Britain.

Weirdly, it spans religion and politics yet bragging rights are assigned on how many times a ball goes into the back of a net.

No other club has won the Scottish top division since the mid-1980s (a fact even the staunchest fan would probably like changed) and Celtic has just come off arguably its most successful decade ever, winning nine titles in a row before Rangers won last year.

It was a shambolic season for Celtic and at the end of it Postecoglou, the former Australian National Team manager from Melbourne, took the helm.


Slowly but surely he's converted them all on "angeball".



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

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Good catches of garfish have come from West Light and Cape Elizabeth in recent days. The steamer channel has whiting and an occasional rat kingfish with some snook and blueys at Balgowan and Chinaman Wells. Local jetties have blueys and squid at night.

Point Turton: Local beaches around Port Rickaby, Hardwicke Bay and The Pines have been fished for yellowfin whiting and flathead in recent days, with local knowledge finding hard-bodied lures working well. The jetties at Point Turton and Marion Bay around The Althorpes have improved, but crews really had a lean time weather-wise. Salmon trout are at Browns and Butler Beaches, and the Stenhouse Bay jetty had tommy ruff (Australian herring) at times

Edithburgh/Stansbury: Blue swimmer crabs were at both ietties and, for boaties at Klein Point and around The Hut. Crews fishing the grounds off Wattle Point caught the odd whiting, snook and squid. Orontes Bank's northern end has snook, whiting and big blueys.

Ardrossan: Blue crabs and medium garfish were the main reports from the Windara Reef area and south of Mosquito Point. The town jetty has blueys and tommy ruffs.

A KEY part of the Adelaide Crows success in the first five rounds of its 2022 AFLW campaign has been the form of its second tier players.
