Take care with questions to council

ONE of Yorke Peninsula's more vocal councillors has been subject to bureaucratic slap on the wrist (Councillor suspended, YPCT 7-01-25) for asking too many questions at Yorke Peninsula Council meetings.

As a consequence of his questions being banned at meetings, he then resorted on behalf of his constituents to using emails to request answers from council management.

Apparently, senior management found this process to be distressing to the extent that psychological issues might have resulted.

Consequently, as a result of all this, the YPC mayor referred the issue to the Behavioural Standards Panel for adjudication.

After considerable delay and costly legal issues, in a 36-page finding, the panel decided to impose a small penalty as a warning to the councillor.

In those findings, the panel states that councillors are entitled to ask questions of council staff and (assumedly) receive answers but not if those questions and answers affect the "health and safety" of staff members.

So next time you enquire why your rubbish bin hasn't been collected, take care, you might upset someone and your bin collection cancelled.

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Fireworks terrifying pets

PET owners across Yorke Peninsula have been dismayed by illegal fireworks which they say have been set off between Christmas, New Year's Eve and into January.

One Moonta Bay resident said that from December 28 to January 9, there were only two nights when they did not hear illegal fireworks.

As of yesterday, January 13, they said the last illegal fireworks they heard were on January 11.

"People just do not have any respect," they said.

"When fireworks are let off randomly, you can't prepare for that."

The resident kept a log of the illegal fireworks they heard over the 15-day period, but some nights they stopped counting because it was impossible to

keep up.
"We had them (firework casings) land on our roof, in our backyard, in our neighbour's yard and they even hit and singed our shutters," they said.

The Explosives (Fireworks) Regulations 2001 states that those caught with illegal fireworks could face a maximum penalty of \$5000.

The Moonta Bay resident had to sedate their dog, 8-year-old Jasper, three times because he was so upset by the fireworks.

"He was still terrified and hid every time a firework randomly went off," they said.

"Before a firework explodes, he (Jasper) is already reacting because he has way better hearing than us.

"I know he's my dog and he's my problem, but why should he have to be put through that?"

RSPCA SA spokesperson Carolyn Jones said the sound of fireworks carried a long way, and those living close to displays needed to be especially vigilant because the noise could be deafening to animals.

Jasper's owner said that Jasper



would hide and shake repeatedly after the fireworks went off.

They said that unlike with planned events such as licensed firework displays and predicted stormy weather, pet owners could not prepare for illegal fireworks.

"When fireworks are let off randomly, you can't prepare for that," they said

On New Year's Eve, the owner gave Jasper his sedatives after they heard the first lot of illegal fireworks at 8:20pm.

By the time the end of the fireworks came around, it was 1am and Jasper's medication had worn off.

"You could hear the dogs for blocks

and blocks, just barking and barking," they said.

"There was a dog found dead on the road by the Moonta Hotel on New Year's Day, and people have said they do not know what it died from — a fair guess that it got terrified and ran off and got hit by a car."

An RSPCA SA spokesperson said it is important to be mindful of your pets and native wildlife, particularly when fireworks were going off as they could behave erratically when terrified and suddenly come onto a road.

"Domestic pets that are running loose can run in an erratic way when extremely panicked, putting them at high risk of being hit by cars," they said.

"Animals left outside are most at risk of injury or even dying when trying to escape, or once they have escaped.

"This is why we say to bring them indoors if at all possible — and if they find somewhere inside to hide, let them stay there until the fireworks are over."

Any suspicious or reckless behaviour increasing the risk of fire should be reported to police on 131 444.

Anyone wishing to surrender fireworks can contact 131 444 for assistance or take them to a local police station for safe disposal.

AUSTRALIA'S Emergency Leaders for Climate Action have issued a warning about the strain overlapping fire seasons across the globe could put on Australian resources.

The Climate Council chief executive Amanda McKenzie said her heart went out to those affected by the wildfires in Los Angeles, but the group was worried about Australian resources being sent overseas during our own fire season.

"We are worried about the ability to share aircraft and personnel now and into the future as the climate crisis worsens," McKenzie said

"Beyond the loss of life and livelihood, lack of access to the tools we need to fight fires reinforces that slashing climate pollution this decade is so critical.

"These fires are a terrifying realisation for Australians watching events unfold in California, that fire crews are coping with longer and longer fire seasons.

"We must drive down climate pollution this decade, by ramping up our switch to renewable power."

Emergency Management Minister Jenny McAllister told Sky News Australia had yet to receive

any response for assistance, but


Australia was ready to assist.

"We'll do everything we responsibly can should a request come before us," Ms McAllister said.

"And there's a long history of cooperation between our countries on firefighting.

"We actually had personnel in the US over the course of 2024, and of course, we've received great benefit from US personnel coming to Australia in years previous as

However, Ms McAllister said it would depend on the nature of the request and Australia would assess its own needs first.







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Conflict over camping ban

LOCAL residents are up in arms after the dunes at trending Yorke Peninsula camp spot, Wauraltee Beach, were left covered in rubbish and human waste.

Beach goers took to social media to complain about what they had found left on the beach by campers after New

There were multiple posts on local community group pages about discarded tents, blankets, general rubbish, gazebos and human waste left on the beach.

Wauraltee resident Rachel Twelftree said the beach had become unmanageable since it became a hit on social

Though she agreed the damage may have been caused by a few people doing the wrong thing, she said the beach could not accommodate the number of visitors it attracted.

"I can obviously understand why people want to go, it's an amazing place, but it's not really sustainable because you have these huge caravans and no toilets and facilities down there," Ms Twelftree said.

"At Easter time last year, someone did a drive and there were three kilometres of caravans all literally right next to each other."

The Twelftrees decided to give their local beach a miss these holidays because of the many campers, but Ms Twelftree said in previous years they have had to clean up a lot of rubbish.

"It's disheartening seeing how many people are down there and what is happening to the beach with the sand dunes disappearing and all the rubbish left," Ms Twelftree said.

The State Government has issued a ban on overnight camping at the popular beach, starting from February 3, to prevent disruption to the environ-

The restrictions are aimed at protecting the coastal environment and increasing visitor safety.

Large camping vehicles such as caravans, campervans, motorhomes and tent trailers will not be allowed on the beach at any time.

Daytime vehicle access will remain for boat launching and recreation only.

Ms Twelftree agreed that camping should be banned on the beach, but agreed with having designated camping spots nearby.

"If people don't have toilets in their

caravans, then they're going in the sand dunes — and a lot of them don't, so all that waste is going into the ocean," she said.

"You just can't have 1000 people on the beach, like imagine if this was down at Moana, people would be horrified, and there's actually toilets there."

The impending ban has angered many campers taking advantage of the free beachfront camping at Wauraltee.

New South Wales resident Stephanie Ramirez, who was visiting Yorke Peninsula for the first time, said she saw Wauraltee Beach on social media, and her family decided they had to stop on their way to Esperance, especially before camping was banned.

"The ban is not going to stop us from visiting, but it's just unfortunate because the beach camping is what keeps the people coming in," Ms Ramirez said.

Other campers did not have the same opinion, with a few telling the YP Country Times this would be their last visit to Wauraltee because of the ban.

Ms Ramirez said she understood frustration from the local community and suspected the issues around littering had resulted from just a few people doing the wrong thing.

She said everyone she had seen during her short visit was very respectful of the environment, and there was a great atmosphere between campers on

Camps booked out

CAMPING has been popular across Yorke Peninsula this summer, with the YP Council's 19 Bush Campgrounds completely booked out from late December to early

This was the first summer YPC's new booking system was in effect, and Mayor Darren Braund said the new system had so far been successful in making sure everyone who booked had a spot.

"The new Bush Camping booking system has significantly reduced the problem experienced in previous years of campers buying permits but being unable to fit in our campgrounds," Mayor Braund said.

"Limiting capacity at campgrounds has also had a positive effect on the environment.

"Despite our best efforts to inform people about the new booking system, many campers still arrived without permits only to discover no more were available, and we sincerely thank the Ardrossan Visitor Information Centre for fielding enquiries during this time.

"The council's ranger team did a fantastic job attending to the many issues that arise over the busy period including dealing with illegal campers."

Mayor Braund said YPC staff would review the system again after this summer, and continue managing the camps as best as possible.

"We remind everyone to please book into a campground ahead of time to avoid disappointment," he

Kadina's supergrade produces top trio

WHILE regional schools often punch above their weight when it comes to academic excellence, it is rare a school's success is concentrated into one cohort.

The 1977 Kadina Memorial High School year 12 cohort was a standout as it produced three mayors - current Copper Coast Council mayor Roslyn Talbot, former CCC mayor Paul Thomas and Wakefield Regional Council mayor Rodney Reid.

But leading a local council was not the vocation Rodney Reid was dreaming of when he finished school.

"I was a school teacher for 23 years," Mayor Reid said.

"I guess that's what happens in country towns. It is quite interesting that we were all elected and it gives us an opportunity to work together quite closely."

Mayor Reid has been mayor for 10 years and served on WRC for a total of 16 years.

Mayor Talbot was elected to her role more than six years ago, following Mr Thomas, despite having no innate desire to become mayor while at school.

"None of us had similar interests at school," she joked.

"I've always worked in retail. I went to teacher's college, but didn't particularly enjoy that so I got a job in retail and have always worked there.

"I guess the three of us have just chosen to put back into local government."

She said while she did not originally think she would ever become mayor, it was in her pedigree.

Her father, Graham Wearn,

and grandfather, William Wearn, served as mayors of the former District Council of Northern Yorke Peninsula and the former Kadina Town Corporation respectively.

Paul Thomas' father David was mayor at the former Wallaroo Town Corporation.

Mayor Talbot said this familiarity with the role and long-term friendship with both Mr Thomas and Mayor Reid made her transition into the role much easier.

"I think that our familiarity with each other has helped," she said.

"Rodney was mayor much longer than I've been mayor, so coming in as a new mayor having the familiarity with someone, it gave you confidence.

"I never had to walk into a room not knowing anybody, or if I wasn't sure about something I've always appreciated I could pick up the phone and speak to Rodney on that personal level.

"And when I was fortunate enough to be elected as mayor, we had a really good handover. If I needed any advice I could go to Paul, which was really good for me to have that sounding board."

Mayor Talbot said the \$124.5 million Port Wakefield overpass and highway duplication project, completed in January 2023, was a collaborative effort, as both she and former Mayor Thomas as well as Mayor Reid had lobbied state and federal governments for funding.

Matthew East, who also graduated with the trio, served as a councillor on CCC from 2014 to 2018.

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Fishers land cut in fees

YORKE Peninsula's commercial fishers have landed a change to State Government fees that will put them on an even keel, regardless of whether they fish in Gulf St Vincent or Spencer Gulf.

Under changes announced by Primary Industries Minister Clare Scriven in late December about the state's Marine Scale Fishery, the costs per kilogram attributed to quota species will be the same regardless of which gulf they are caught in.

Under the previous fee structure, King George Whiting quota holders for Gulf St Vincent were paying \$3.06 per kilogram (to the State Government) while quota holders for Spencer Gulf were paying \$1.27/kg — now that cost would be under \$1/kg for quotas held in either gulf.

This will mean that regardless of the species caught and what gulf it is caught in, licence holders will pay the same quota fee for all four quota species — King George whiting, southern calamari, southern garfish and for snapper, when a current ban on the species in most zones of SA waters is lifted on June 30, 2026.

In addition, commercial fishers in Gulf St Vincent and Spencer Gulf will both now pay a base fee of 45 per cent and quota unit fees of 55 per cent, replacing the current 70/30 per cent split.

Minister Scriven announced the State Government would also provide additional targeted financial assistance to licence holders, taking the total to \$1.722 million in support for licence holders over a three-year period.

"The importance of this iconic fishery to South Australia should not be underestimated," she said.

"In 2022-23, the MSF caught 2,142 tonnes of seafood for a largely local and domestic market, contributed \$41 million to gross state product and supported 339 full-time equivalent jobs, with many of those in regional communi-

Yorketown fisher Shane Bishop said the changes would help many YP fishers — particularly those fishing in Gulf St Vincent.

"It was a great relief to hear of the revised fee structure and I am pleased that the minister has worked with the MFA and fishers to produce a much fairer and more equitable structure," he said.

"This will make a significant reduction to my crippling fees — a reduction of approximately \$8680 per year.

"We look forward to PIRSA delivering on some cost reduction to further help fishers stay in business."

Marine Fishers Association executive officer Pat Tripodi said the changes been achieved after months of lobbying by industry.

"With quota fees now worked out per kilogram, this means gulf fishers, especially Gulf St Vincent fishers, will now be viable," he said.

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis welcomed the changes but warned that the State Government's full cost recovery model for commercial fishing was unsustainable.

"The state's commercial marine scale fishery is not big enough to fund the bureaucracy that is being imposed on it," he said.



Fairer future

THE last commercial line fisher in Stansbury, Paul Germein, was facing an uncertain future until the fee changes announced by the State Government.

"I was deciding what I was going to do — I feel better about it now." he said.

"I was paying nearly \$14,000 a year for my licence and quota fees, now under the restructure I will pay about \$8000.

"I felt really hard done by because my main income is from whiting and we were paying about three times as much as anyone else.

"I had to catch 2000 whiting a year just pay my fees - now I have to catch about 1100."

He said it was ironic that the fees supported a fisheries management scheme aimed at protecting

"It is supposed to protect the fish but we had to fish more to pay the fees," he said.

Mr Germein sells his fish locally and to Adelaidebased seafood traders and buys all his supplies in

"I have second generations of customers here.

"What I earn doesn't leave the community - it stays here," he said.

Dutton's Australia Day commitment

OPPOSITION leader Peter Dutton has promised to reinstate citizenship ceremonies only on Australia Day if he wins the federal election.

The rules for citizenship ceremonies were changed in 2022 by the Labor Government, giving local councils the option to hold the ceremonies on either Australia Day, or the three days before or after that date.

In response, Prime Minister Anthony Albanese said his local council still held its ceremonies on Australia Day, and he would attend a national event in Canberra this year.

EV charging etiquette over summer

A RECORD number of electric vehicles have hit the roads this summer, and the Electric Vehicle Council is calling for more etiquette around the charging sta-

Yorke Peninsula has 12 EV charging stations, including stations at Port Wakefield, Port Broughton and Marion

But with an extra 100,000 EVs on our roads this year, the EVC expected a growing demand for recharge facilities.

EVC spokesperson Aman Gaur said this summer would likely be the first time many drivers have gone on a holiday with their vehicle.

"Some of our top tips for EV charging etiquette are: don't overstay your charge, leave home with a full battery, and be courteous to your fellow EV drivers," Mr Gaur said.

Looking after the charging equipment to make sure the next person does not get stuck was another major tip.

"Put the charging equipment back as you found it to avoid damage and for the next person's ease," he said.

"If the unit is damaged or impaired, report it immediately to the charge point operator."

Many of South Australia's RAA charging stations have now been upgraded to the Ultra-Rapid DC Charger.

Charging times on these stations can vary depending on the vehicle, but the RAA said the expected charge time was between 10 and 45 minutes.

THE pontoon at Point Turton has also been saved by the local progress association.

Port Vincent Progress Association president Pam Hickman said the local pontoon had been placed in the bay each summer for nearly 60 years, and it was a piece of the town they were not willing to give up without a fight.

"Since we announced it's staying, people are just saying 'oh that's fantastic news' because it is an icon of the town," Mrs Hickman said.

"Kids look forward to jumping off, and it's also a safety platform that can be used by all age groups if they find themselves in a bit of trouble out in the water."

PVPA vice president Greg Shaw said prior to this, progress was not aware they needed insurance for the pontoon.

'The situation came about in November where it was brought to our attention that it didn't have insurance, so as a committee we decided not to put the pontoon in the water," Mr Shaw said.

"But we were very fortunate with the assistance from VACSWIM that they were able to insure it for a week period to use in their (swimming) program."

It was a race against time to get the pontoon sorted before VACSWIM finished on January 11, and if the group had not been successful the pontoon would have been removed

Mr Shaw said the process of finding an insurer to provide cover for the pontoon was very difficult, and treasurer Sue Hall had to approach four brokers until she found a company who was willing to work with them.

The PVPA would continue to pay all costs associated with the pontoon, but Mr Shaw said he hoped Yorke Peninsula Council could assist

"It would be nice to be able to negotiate with council to share the costs because we don't have an income stream, as such like other progress associations," he said.

"We rely very heavily on grants to do any improvements in and around the town, and we have a very active Tidy Towns (group) which raises money through the collection of bottles."

YPC Mayor Darren Braund said the insurance of pontoons had become a significant challenge this summer, with insurance companies refusing to provide liability cover for community groups.

"All 12 pontoons in the Yorke Peninsula Council region are owned and managed by progress associations, not council, and are typically deployed on State Government land rather than council land," Mayor Braund said.

"These unique circumstances make council's situation more complex than many other regions, requiring additional work to assist our communities.

"Council staff have been in contact with all affected progress associations, as well as other South Australian coastal councils, the Local Government Association Mutual Liability Scheme, the Royal Surf Life Saving Society, and the State Government's Department for Infrastructure and Transport.

"A report will be presented to council so elected members can make an informed decision about pontoons moving forward."

Point Turton Progress Association also had an insurance issue with its pontoon, and up until January 13, it was only going to be in the water to facilitate swimming lessons.

However, PTPA chair Joanne Forbes said she was excited to tell the community the association had just been notified they had been successful in obtaining insurance.

"Our pontoon will stay in, similar to previous years, which will be until the end of March - start of April," Ms Forbes said.

Like PVPA, Ms Forbes said she hoped to work with YPC to ensure these facilities remained in the future because insuring the pontoons took money out of the budget which could be spent elsewhere.

More fake news headed your way

EXPERTS are concerned over Meta's decision to remove independent fact checkers on Facebook and Instagram, and say this move could be significant in Australia's upcoming Federal Election.

Last week, Meta chief executive Mark Zuckerberg announced he would remove the fact checkers because there was "too much censorship".

Instead, Meta would implement a new initiative called Community Notes to be trialled in the United States.

This would allow other users to flag posts as misleading or false, which will appear after there is a majority consensus on the accuracy of the post, which could be detrimental to minority groups.

La Trobe University director of digital education doctor Alexia Maddox said these changes were concerning for Australians and could hinder them accessing verified political information before the election.

"The success of Meta's Community Notes system will depend heavily on implementation, particularly how quickly and effectively misinformation can be addressed during critical events like elections, and how they'll ensure diverse Australian perspectives are represented in the community moderation process," Dr Maddox said.

This new system could allow misinfor-

mation to spread unchecked partly because it relies on the majority's opinion, which Dr Maddox said could prevent certain groups from participating in public debate.

"In Australia, specifically, we currently have three professional fact-checking organisations working with Meta.

'The shift to a community-based system raises questions about maintaining verification standards in our market, where we already have limited fact-checking resources compared to larger markets like the US.

"Meta is framing this as expanding free speech, but the real challenge is ensuring everyone can participate meaningfully in online discourse."

Ratepayers question councillor's suspension

MEMBERS of Yorke Peninsula Ratepayers Association are considering taking action over the suspension of YP Council elected member Adam Meyer.

The Behavioural Standards Panel has suspended Cr Meyer from elected office without an allowance for one month, from January 10 to February 10

Meyer's suspension was issued by the Behavioural Standards Panel, after it found Cr Meyer committed serious misbehaviour in relation to two out of six allegations made by YPC regarding his behaviour toward a senior council officer.

A report on the matter was made public on the BSP website on January 7.

The panel is an independent statutory body that deals with complaints from South Australian councils about misbehaviour by council members.

YPRA chair Ian Markos said the association thought the BSP decision was not good for democracy, and there was a likelihood the group would pursue a political angle to counter the decision.

"The councillor was elected by the ratepayers, and now effectively those people who have voted for him are unrepresented," Mr Markos said.

He said YPRA believed there was not enough evidence submitted to the BSP to prove harm was done to the unnamed senior council officer, and there needed to be a more rigorous investigation into the matter.

"I would have thought if you are going to remove an elected

person in this country and suspend them, you better have some damn good evidence," he

Mr Markos said he thought the decision was unjust because he believed state and federal politicians were not held to the same standards.

"Any opposition or politician who is elected has the right to ask hard questions," he said.

"I'm a little bit amazed that we have laws in the state that an elected councillor can be removed, basically for asking questions that he couldn't get

"So to me that's not a democratic process, and the people who have voted for this gentleman would rightly think, 'if they're the questions we wanted asked, and he was asking them on our behalf, how do we get answers not that he is suspend-

The BSP report stated Cr Meyer was suspended due to two allegations the panel found to have constituted serious misbehaviour.

The first instance related to an email Cr Meyer sent to the senior council officer, and circulated to other council members, on July 25 2023.

This was after Cr Meyer had been alerted to the negative impact his emails had on the senior officer, and the heightened risk to the officer's health and safety.

The report said the email was written in a manner that was "accusatory, antagonistic and/or intimidating", and Cr Meyer had implied the "Senior Council Officer's... (word redacted)... would be impacted

should he fail to act as Cr Meyer requested".

The findings went on to say the email contained references to Cr Meyer being part of the panel of council members undertaking an annual review of the officer's performance.

In the second allegation, Cr Meyer was found to have used the questions on notice mechanism in public council meetings to address the senior council officer.

The panel found these questions were designed to cast aspersions on the integrity of the officer, and imply they had not adequately performed their

The panel found Cr Meyer attempted to publicly air grievances and circumvent the reasonable directions in place to protect the senior council officer's health and safety with this action.

YPC Mayor Darren Braund said he referred the series of allegations of serious misbehaviour concerning Cr Meyer to the panel, as a part of his role as the responsible person under Section 75G of the Local Government Act 1999.

"I support the existence of an independent statutory body to consider such allegations, and the findings made by the panel that Cr Meyer has engaged in multiple incidents of serious misbehaviour," Mayor Braund

"This matter has been addressed by the Panel, as an independent statutory body."

The YP Country Times reached out to Cr Adam Meyer, however he declined to com-

paper mosaic technique to surround them, so they all "move."

"My process is instinctual and explorative," she says.

"I don't have barriers that inhabit where the work wants to go.

'The ultimate aim is to make artwork with a narrative that allows dialogue between the artist and the viewer — highlighting the seen and unseen."

Ms Seater, who began working as a full-time artist five years ago when she moved to Wallaroo, says she does not like to limit herself to one medium.

"I have a roving perspective everyday life throws ideas at me and I can catch them or leave them to roam in my consciousness," she says.

"Eventually, they need to emerge and develop.

"Having several concepts on the go is exciting and vital to encourage the work to speak."

Ms Seater's mediums can include large canvases or wood, discarded house paint, line work on paper, illustration, reverse glass painting, Ms Seater says she then used a reverse glass paper mosaic, paper mosaic, 3D assemblage with found objects, upcycling items with paint

She has previously won the 2023 Kernewek Lowender acquisitive art prize and has successfully received grants for her work from a 2023 Country Arts funding round.

Since 1985, Ms Seater has held exhibitions on Yorke Peninsula including at Edithburgh, Kadina and Moonta and at other locations across Australia.

Ms Seater will be hosting a free, invite only exhibition in the Moonta Gallery of the Arts on February 8.

This exhibition, titled Outsider In, will display 37 of Ms Seater's art-

"The exhibited work will show a diversity of mediums and processes which will highlight a fluidity of being," Ms Seater says. "I see myself as an outsider artist

with an unorthodox perspective, enjoying freedoms that a conventional artist may not. "I don't consider the work to be

decorative, but experiential and an immersion into a secretive world."

Her exhibition will include medi-

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Wakefield Regional Council faces opposition to waste reduction plan

The battle of the bins

A RECENT Wakefield Regional Council initiative to reduce landfill has been met with online controversy amongst some ratepayers.

WRC made the decision last year that from February 4, red (general rubbish) and yellow (recyclable waste) bins will be collected fortnightly rather than weekly.

Collection of green bins, for green waste such as food scraps or lawn clippings, will be increased from monthly to fortnightly.

WRC mayor Rodney Reid said the decision was made to reduce the amount of rubbish going to landfill.

"Regional councils pay a fee for every tonne that goes to landfill and that fee is \$80.50 a tonne, so our aim is to reduce that," he said.

"In theory, that's more money for us to then spend on other things benefitting out communities."

He said during the past fiscal year WRC spent about \$96,000 in landfill levies, paid to the State Government.

"It then costs us to get it there (from homes to landfill), it costs us staff time, machinery, all of that on top of that levy.

"So that's the key behind the thinking, to reduce our waste going to landfill, and then in the process hopefully redirecting the money we spend on waste."

Mayor Reid said 20 years ago the levy was about \$5 a tonne for regional councils but it had now increased to \$80.50 a tonne and \$161 for metropolitan councils.

He said the initiative could also have a positive impact on the environment.

'The mentality of people has changed and will go on changing," he said.

"Increasing the green bin to fortnightly (collections) will allow people to put more food scraps in. "Some people were a bit reluctant to put food scraps in the bin knowing it was only going to get emptied once a month, so I'm hoping we'll see a much greater uptake using the green



bin for what it's designed for.

"It's a change we believe is for the best and that's why we are implementing it," he said.

WRC has three waste transfer stations, which are free for ratepayers, located at Owen, Port Wakefield and Everard Central, and open three days a week.

Mayor Reid said he thought it was unlikely illegal dumping would significantly increase because of the service provided by the waste transfer stations.

Red rubbish bins are collected fortnightly in Copper Coast, Clare and Gilbert Valley Council's and are generally collected fortnightly in Barunga West Council, with some extra collections through the year.

Red bins are collected weekly in Yorke Peninsula Council.

Disconnect in regional housing market

RESEARCH by the Regional Australia Institute shows that the number of citydwellers looking to relocate to the country has doubled over the past 18 months.

The results of a nation-wide survey showed 40 per cent of capital city residents are considering a move to regional Australia, up from 20 per cent in May,

RAI chief executive Liz Ritchie said amid an ongoing societal transformation, the regions were also embarking on major economic transformation, resulting in increasing demand and need for services and infrastructure.

"Despite this, regional Australia has gone backwards when it comes to regional housing, education and migration over the last 12 months," she said.

The regional rental vacancy rate

dropped to 1.3 per cent in 2024, and regional building approvals declined by 9.4 per cent.

The regional school attainment rate had also declined, and the proportion of overseas arrivals settling in the regions had fallen according to Ms Ritchie.

"The disconnect between these two realities needs action, and now," she said.

Ms Ritchie said without improvements in regional housing, education and migration, regional Australia would stall.


They are vitally important building blocks for ensuring the regions can participate in our nation's future," she said.

"In 2025, a federal election year, regional Australia has the potential to land a leading role, shaping the discussion and vision of what our nation will look like into the future."

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SA surpasses one million Covid-19 cases

Covid-19 have been recorded in South Australia, almost five years since the first case was detected in the state.

SA Health reported 390 new infections in the seven days to January 10, according to the Australian Medical Association in South Australia.

This has taken the total number of confirmed cases since February 1, 2020 to 1,000,364.

There have been 1938 deaths linked to Covid-19 during this

AMA SA president Dr John Williams said the figures only told part of a story.

"We know a lot of people no longer report Covid-19 cases or even get tested," he said.

"The reality is, SA surpassed one million cases some time ago.

"What this milestone does is remind us that while we've learnt to live with Covid-19, we certainly cannot become complacent to the risks — especially the risks to atrisk groups like the elderly."

Dr Williams encouraged everyone to talk to their GP about getting a Covid-19 booster, especially vulnerable people.

He also said State and Federal Governments should continue to recognise the ramifications of Covid-19 for the health system and the economy.

"High rates of Covid-19 among health workers contributed to the extended Code Yellow in the state's hospitals in mid-2024," Dr Williams said.

"As we witnessed, that had a major and prolonged impact on patients who were forced to wait often in pain or discomfort for essential surgery."

New research in the Medical Journal of Australia suggests one in seven Covid-positive patients had at least one persistent symptom three months after their initial infection.

One in five of those with clinical long Covid reported at least moderate impairment 12 months after their infection.

Dr Williams said patients with long Covid often required ongoing medical care and, in severe cases, that could include hospital care.

'This adds to the burden on the healthcare system, exacerbating problems like bed-block and ambulance ramping," he said.

He also said setting up a national Centre for Disease Control (CDC) must be a priority.

"Australia is the only OECD country without a CDC or an equivalent," Dr Williams said. 'Without a functional CDC, we

cannot be sure that we're ready to confront the next pandemic. "The Federal Government has

promised to invest \$250 million to establish Australia's CDC.

"AMA is calling in all state and territory governments to support this important endeavour."

Students missing out

THE Australian Council of Social Service is calling for Youth Allowance and Austudy to be indexed every six months to help combat cost-of-living pressures.

As of January 1, Youth Allowance for a single person living away from home went up by \$1.70 a day, which lifts Youth Allowance and Austudy to \$47 a day, and is just 36 per cent of the minimum wage.

ACOSS chief executive doctor Cassandra Goldie said an extra \$1.70 a day would not cover a loaf of bread, and people on income support were being left behind.

"Young people are forced to wait 12 months before seeing an indexation increase in their payments — by the time it comes they may no longer be eligible for student payments and miss out on income that should have helped keep their heads above water during their studies," Dr Goldie said.

"A system that leaves students living in poverty is setting them up to fail before they even start."

Dr Goldie said the rate of income support must be lifted to at least \$82 a day, in line with the Age Pension.

She also said the Youth Allowance and Austudy payment should be indexed every six months, instead of every year.

"The way to end poverty is simple: raise the rate," she said.

"Anything less is a choice to keep people hungry, sick and struggling."

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Help save Warooka's heritage

WAROOKA has a deep and significant history on Yorke Peninsula, but many of its historical artefacts are at risk of falling into disrepair if no one is willing to help the local museum care for them.

It is easy to drive straight past Warooka and District Museum without noticing its presence, but those who do are missing out on a rich experience of the small town's not-so-small history.

Museum president Nola Murdock said people could be a big help by simply stopping by to visit, but she would happily welcome anyone who would like to give up some of their precious time to help.

There are a range of roles that need to be filled, from maintaining the grounds and collections to guiding people around the museum.

Mrs Murdock said she understood life was very difficult for families today, but if the community wanted to protect this precious asset, the few aging volunteers needed a little help.

"There's only seven of us and we're all around 80 years," Mrs Murdock said.

The museum first started in the 1980s, and was filled with local family heirlooms brought in by community members who had nowhere to house their beloved items from generations past.

Today it is packed to the brim with one-of-a-kind irreplaceable historical artefacts from past businesses and families who built the town and district of Warooka.

One of the most important rooms is the first to the right when you enter, the Reading Room.

It holds many of these donated heir-

looms and has pictures of Warooka's pioneers lining the walls.

"And we've got the original books from the pub that was here in 1881 — Charles on the wall here obviously liked his drink, but he did get hay for his horse too," Mrs Murdock said, laughing as she pointed at the record log.

Mrs Murdock said the record books were her favourite part of the museum because they had given her snippets of people's history that would be hard to find anywhere else — perhaps even some century-old gossip.

"The pub wasn't just a pub because people would borrow money there and all parcels were sent there," she said.

'There's a log that says 'your horses is jumping the fence and I'm losing my feed' and that was about this fellow who was obviously renting there."

These books led her to a forgotten Warooka character called The Goose Man or Goosey Robinson, who presumably lived out in the sticks and wore kangaroo skins on his feet.

"He would come to the pub once a month or whatever to get his food, and then went back off down the south coast," she said.

"He was just a lone man.

"He must have been a bit of a character because we also have a recap of this other fellow's life and he actually mentions Goosey Robinson, and that's how I know he wore kangaroo skins on his feet."

Without the museum preserving work like this, the story of people such as Goosey Robinson would be lost.

Mrs Murdock encouraged the community to visit and use the reading room to find out more about the people who made Warooka.

Goodbye and farewell to a veteran volunteer

THE Yorke Peninsula has said goodbye to one of its best, YP Council elected member, Port Clinton resident and volunteer extraordinaire, Alan Headon.

Sadly, Alan unexpectedly passed away last November, leaving behind his wife Pam, daughter Gail and grandson Cooper who all miss him dearly.

Originally from Adelaide, Alan and Pam made the peninsula and the community of Port Clinton their home in 2006.

Alan began his working life delivering newspapers on his push bike, but once he reached adulthood, he decided it was time for an upgrade and joined the police force.

"He joined because it was the only way his mother wouldn't be able to stop him from riding a motorbike," Pam said.

Around this time Alan also met Pam, and they hit it off right away.

"I thought 'gee he's tall' and he was cheeky because, you know, he always had plenty to say," she said.

"And he had a car, so that was good fun."

Both Alan and Pam knew early on they had found their person, and married a few years later, in 1967, and in 1970 Pam gave birth to their only child, Gail.

In 2000 Alan retired from the police force, and after only six months of retirement, a common occurrence in Alan's life happened: he got itchy feet.

"He was looking for something to do and he came across this post office in Wirrabarra, and so we bought the post office up there," Pam said.

"His mind would just sort of click — we'll do this and we'll do that, and I just went along with

Urgent call for blood donors

AUSTRALIAN Red Cross Lifeblood has issued an urgent call for blood donors after a record number of planned donations were cancelled across Australia last week, putting pressure on blood supplies.

More than 6500 people cancelled their donation appointments last week, which is the highest number of New Year week cancellations in three years.

A further 14,000 people either rescheduled or did not attend their appointment.

This means an extra 12,000 people are now urgently needed to book a donation this week to replenish low blood stocks.

Yorke Peninsula residents were not part of the thousands who cancelled, but it is now time to donate with Lifeblood visiting Kadina this week until Thursday 16 to collect blood, following its visit to Minlaton last week.

Lifeblood spokesperson Zoe Ross thanked the YP community for their generosity and said every donation was truly appreci-

She said people in the region had a strong desire to help those who need blood.

In 2024, 432 donors rolled up a sleeve and gave 756 donations in Kadina, and Lifeblood welcomed 95 new donors to the life-saving team.

Collectively, they helped saved as many as 2268 lives last year.

And in Minlaton, 79 locals also rolled up a sleeve and gave 104 donations with Lifeblood welcoming three new donors - collectively helping save as many as 312 lives last year.

Donations made at both towns collectively saved as many as 2580 lives in 2024.

Ms Ross said each donation could save up to three lives.

"The need for blood never stops —in fact, demand rose 3 per cent last year and is expected to continue to increase as our population grows," she said.

One in three people will need blood or blood products in their

Recipients can include people having cancer treatment, people with blood disorders, surgery patients and pregnant people in childbirth.

Ms Ross said you never know when you or someone you love may need blood.

"I encourage people who donated in 2024 to keep coming back to impact even more lives, she said.

"I also urge other people in the community, who have not donated before, to follow their lead if they can.

"Let's see what Kadina residents

can achieve together in 2025."





Put health at the top of your 2025 list

AUSTRALIANS should put their health and mental wellbeing first on their list of 2025 New Year resolutions and take small steps to achieve health and happi-

That's the call from the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners president Michael Wright.

He says there are a few simple things to put on your list that could save your life.

"We are in the middle of another hot summer, so start by remembering to be sun smart," Dr Wright said.

"Aside from making sure you slip, slop, slap, this might also mean seeing your GP for a skin check.

"With over 18,000 people diagnosed with melanomas each year, making that appointment could be lifesaving."

Dr Wright said twothirds of Australians were obese or overweight, and this was another leading risk factor for disease.

The 2024 Australian Burden of Disease Study found Australians had an estimated 5.9 million years of healthy life taken from them, which was due to premature death from disease.

Obesity or overweight

health issues accounted for 8.3 per cent of these lost years, which surpassed disease from the use of tobacco at 7.6 per cent.

"Your GP can provide a safe space to discuss your health needs and take the steps necessary to improve your health and wellbeing, beyond just watching the scales," he said.

"Making small, sustainable changes to your diet and exercise routine is a much more effective approach."

Other steps included taking care of mental health, which is listed in the RACGP's 2024 Health of the Nation survey as one of top three reasons to visit a

But Dr Wright said one of the most important steps for 2025 should be finding a regular GP who knows your history, however he acknowledged this was easier said than done in many areas of the country.

"We have a record number of GPs training in 2025, 20 per cent more than 2024, and with the help of government funding we will continue to train more GPs to ensure every community has access to care," he said.

Sustainable path forward

A BREAK over the holidays and a brand new year often drives us into self-reflection, which leads to the ambition of a personal reset via a New Year's resolutions list.

This mental fresh start at the beginning of a new year helps some people draw a line through their "old self", which allows for a clean slate to adopt a new self.

But University of New South Wales professor Peter Heslin said resolutions often failed because the excitement of setting goals soon faded, then people were hit with a lingering sense of failure.

He said a prime reason for this was that people had set goals that were too ambitious.

"For instance, someone might resolve to go to the gym every day, overlooking the practical challenges of time, energy, and habit-building," Dr Heslin said.

"When overly ambitious resolutions become unmanageable, people feel discouraged and often abandon their efforts entirely."

A study in the National Library of Medicine tracking self-change attempts from New Year's resolutions found that 77 per cent of people maintained their pledges for just one week, and only 19 per cent managed to stick it out for the two-year study.

Dr Heslin said if people wanted to make some tweaks to themselves in the new year, they should set more promising, sustainable and fun alternatives.

"Recognise and resist the perilous, often subconscious trap of assuming you can only feel good about yourself and happy once you have achieved certain goals or become your desired self," he said.

"Reflect with pride on all you have already done and accomplished and try to enjoy the unfolding journey of your career and life.

"Focus on relaxation over the January period, marked by rich recovery experiences that fully disconnect you from the stresses of 2024, to leave you more reinvigorated for whatever you tackle in 2025."






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

A SMALL and dedicated group of volunteers has undertaken the transformation of our seaside town by revitalizing the existing parks and gardens and planning future plantings and tourist friendly infrastructure.

This was part of the original planned route of the Walk the Yorke concept fifteen years ago.


The plant survey by the couple updated the existing plant list along this stretch and we were delighted to find many native species previously not recorded.

Friends of Walk the Yorke had planned their monthly walk for the day after our collaborative exploration, which was, by coincidence, from Port Arthur to Port Wakefield.



This enabled the members who had walked from Kadina to complete the whole Kadina to Port Wakefield sec-

Over the three days, we spoke with several long term Yorke Peninsula residents who could remember the old railway being in operation, and some who had used the train on a regular basis.

Like us, they are hoping this exploratory walk will be the beginning of a new purpose for the iconic railway

The ACCCC also supported the community by taking gift and hamper requests at Christmas time.


The gift and hampers are an annual tradition, and this year, demand increased by 25 per cent compared to the previous year.

The current Kennett's of Kadina Hardware on Digby Street has no affiliation with Max and Keith.





PREPARE FOR A SMOOTH TRANSITION TO SCHOOL



It's time to start getting ready for the start of the new school year and the friendly staff at the Ardrossan, Moonta and Kadina newsagencies are ready to help with all your back-to-school needs. The staff at Podiatry Central in Kadina can fit your children with school shoes designed by podiatrists to meet the needs of growing and active young learners.

PREPARATION is the key to helping your child make a comfortable transition from preschool to school.

The Raising Children network advises that parents start early, by enrolling their children in transition programs if available or taking their children to the school to help them become familiar with the environment.

The network suggests getting your child to get familiar with the school environment in the weeks and months before starting school, including classrooms, toilets, and playgrounds.

They should also become familiar with daily routines and rules about things like uniforms, hats, sunscreen, and classroom and playground behaviour, and why those rules are important.

Harvest Christian College at Kadina provides a program, Little Sprouts, to help preschoolers become familiar with "big school" while they are still attending kindergarten.

Head of Primary Tyson Hartley, says the program is designed to make the transition to school as smooth and comfortable as possible, helping children build confidence, and a sense of belonging.

The program is held weekly on

Wednesday during each school term and gives children the opportunity to learn school routines and take part in structured experiences, such as the welcome to the day, literacy and numeracy learning, story time, and fruit break.

The new students are paired up with more experienced Foundation students as buddies and have access to facilities such as the library and outdoor play areas.

Little Sprouts teacher Caroline Ayoub says the play-based program helps children transition to school over six months and to feel more comfortable in their new environment.

"It also allows educators to support each child where they are at developmentally and emotionally, and also pick up on children that may need extra support once they've started school," Mrs Ayoub says.

"Some come to us with difficulties separating from their parent/caregiver or take a longer time to develop their social skills, which are common issues when children transition to a new environment.

"Children who have attended Little Sprouts are happy and confident to slot straight into school, having already begun to develop friendships and find their way around the college."

GET READY for BIG SCHOOL

THE Raising Children network has some practical tips on how you can help those big first days at school go as smoothly as possible for preschoolers making the transition to primary school:

- Get your child to try on the uniform and shoes before the first day to make sure everything fits. Have your child wear new school shoes for a few days before school starts and practise doing up laces or buckles.
- Make sure your child has a hat. Hats are compulsory in most schools for at least the first and last term each

- year and all year round in many schools.
- Choose a lunch box and drink bottle that have easy-toopen lids. Your child can practice using them at preschool, or during a picnic lunch at home or in the park.
- Check whether the school has a healthy eating policy and a ban on foods that cause allergies and plan ahead on the lunches and recess snacks you will provide.
- Make sure your child knows where they will be picked up from after school and who will do it.
- Find out whether your child needs any extra items, such as an art smock, library bag, pencils, markers, crayons and so on.
- If your child needs medicine at school, make sure you authorise teachers to administer it under strict auidelines.

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GET AHEAD on LUNCH PREP

THERE'S nothing quite like the early morning rush of getting kids to school. Between clean uniforms, teeth brushing and getting school bags packed, it can be a whirlwind.

On top of that, there's school lunches. Deciding what to pack for fussy little eaters can be the straw that breaks the camel's back.

But battling school lunchboxes doesn't need to be a, well, battle. In fact, with a little planning, creating healthy and nutritious meals can be a relatively painless process the whole family can enjoy.

The CSIRO has provided these top tips for keeping everyone healthy for this new school year:

- · Get the kids involved: work with your kids to come up with veggie-filled sandwich or wrap ideas. Why not pitch it as a mini sandwich bar, complete with mini sandwich artists?
- When wholegrain bread is a grind: if your kids struggle with wholegrain bread try high-fibre low GI white bread or rolls instead.

- Watch out for the soggy factor: make sure you put tomato and cucumber in between lettuce and protein (think cheese, ham, chicken or egg) to prevent dreaded soggy sandwiches. Grate some carrot for extra crunch.
- No more boring sandwiches: rice paper rolls with shredded roast chicken, grated carrot, shredded lettuce, a cucumber stick and a dash of hoisin sauce don't take much longer to put together than regular sandwiches and will delight little ones. Add mint and coriander if they are extra adventurous.
- Salads and bowls can make a great lunch for kids too: try something different like brown rice with tuna and corn or a chicken noodle salad with a rainbow slaw.
- Put some crunch in recess: veggie sticks with houmous or other dips are perfect for a healthy recess.
- Plan for the week ahead: save time in the mornings and look for healthy recipes you can make ahead of time for an easy, grab-and-go lunchbox meal.



MIX IT UP... Keep school lunches interesting by providing alternatives to sandwiches, such as rice paper rolls or salads.



THIS recipe from the CSIRO makes a lunchbox hero from the humble zucchini, which grows so prolifically in many home gardens at this time of year. You can make a double batch and freeze it for lunches or dinner. This recipe includes three types of vegetables, serves four hungry humans and takes 40 minutes to make.

Ingredients

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 2 medium zucchinis, grated
- 1 medium brown onion, finely diced
- 1 medium carrot, grated
- 5 eggs, whisked
- 1 cup self-raising flour
- 1 cup cheddar cheese, grated

Method

Preheat oven to 180°C and line a 30x20cm pan with baking paper. Heat oil in a pan over medium heat and fry onion for 2-3 minutes until

In a large bowl, combine grated zucchini, grated carrot, grated cheddar, onion, whisked eggs and self-raising flour and mix until combined. Pour into lined baking tray and bake for 30 minutes or until cooked through and golden on top. Serve with a green salad.

CCSLC urges parents to make the most of sports vouchers

A new sports and active recreation voucher program is now open to encourage children to get off their screens.

The Sports Voucher Plus program is an expansion of a 2015 State Government sports voucher initiative, and offers SA children two \$100 sports vouchers every calendar year. Both vouchers can be used with the same provider.

The vouchers are available to students from reception to year nine, which means the child would have been born between 2010 and 2020

Previously, children were only entitled to one \$100 voucher each.

This will be the first year where music lessons and active recreation will be included in the program.

Copper Coast Sport and Leisure Centre venue manager Giles Ellis said he was pleased the program had been expanded, and wanted families to be aware of the opportunities available to kids.

"This wonderful initiative gives families \$200 extra in their back pocket per child, to ensure their kids are staying active," Ellis said.

"When it comes to swimming lessons in particular, this activity is an absolute non-negotiable, so using the sports vouchers to ensure kids are staying in lessons year-round will go a long way to keeping them safe in and around the water."

Ellis said as well as offering swimming programs including GOswim and water safety programs, CCSLC also accepted sports vouchers for its Aussie Hoops program.

She bowled 7.1 overs across the tournament.

"Mackenzee (McCauley) maybe didn't quite have the tournament we were hoping," said Frick, who has coached the side since the ACCC's inception.

"She had some good moments, but consistently landing the ball is an issue she needs to work on.

"At this level, bad balls get hit for four.

"Mackenzee has real talent as a leg spinner and if she can work on her agility in the field and running between wickets she can go a long way in the game.

"Zali (Kerley) learnt a lot from the experience and listened to the advice from the senior players.

"She did a good job in the field and bowled a few handy overs."

Victoria Country and Queensland Country played in the final on Friday afternoon, with Victoria winning the decider by 59 runs.

It was confirmed the 2026 ACCC women's event will return to Barossa Valley, but will be a separate event to the men's championships.







Free help to get through tough times

FORMER Lochiel farmer Judy Wilkinson is one of 15 mentors based around regional South Australia who can provide free counselling to farmers and those in other rural businesses doing it tough after one of the driest years on record.

Judy, now based in Clare, provides independent and confidential counselling for the Yorke and Northern region through the Families and Business Mentors scheme, run by Primary Industries and Regions SA.

The service is free for primary producers, their families, and associated businesses impacted by adverse events, including drought, bushfires and severe

"The challenge so far has been the high input costs and then the dry year (2024) and a lot of people are looking for support for how they can manage their finances to get a crop in this year," she says.

"People are looking at going into debt to get a crop in.

"When the finances are in the red, it's very hard to be positive.

"But we can be positive about a situation that looks very negative

- we help people to find hope." Clients can talk to FaB mentors on the phone or they can request that mentors visit them for face-to-face visits.

Judy says she can provide a sounding board for people who are feeling overwhelmed and

connect them with services such as Rural Financial Counselling and mental health counsellors.

"It's about getting your thoughts out to someone else which can sometimes clarify what you are thinking," she says.

"There are some real benefits to chatting to people.

"Sometimes someone will ring me up in tears and after they will say 'this has been really helpful"

Judy says the pressures of running a family business can be exemplified during hard finan-

"Often there are two or three generations involved with different priorities and different ways of operating," she says.

'The older generation will say 'just pull your belt in' and they are very good at that, but the younger generation will say 'we need to farm ahead for 10 years'.

"As farming mentors, we are well equipped to work through that with you."

Judy says farmers under pressure can find it hard to motivate themselves to leave the farm or do anything other than work.

"They are often reluctant to get out and out be social and they are feeling flat," she says.

"I suggest to people to find something they will enjoy — to treat themselves or get some

"Or you could do something for someone else and get out into a different environment."

She also advises clients to think about organising activities they can enjoy with their partners and children, such as a picnic.

"Don't overlook your children," she savs.

"Often when things are tough, the children are watching us.

"You need to separate yourself from your business for your children's sake.

"It's good for children to see their parents away from their

In addition to growing up on a farm and continuing to farm with her family, Judy has a business which facilitates transition and succession planning for farming families and consults on business continuance.

Judy says all the FaB mentors understand the realities of farm-

We have been there before and we understand the situation they (clients) are in," she says.

We understand what it is to have a season without income and what it's like to live and work with family."

Update to re-energise state's producers for 2025

SOUTH Australian grain growers, advisers, researchers and consultants can start 2025 with an opportunity to compare notes and catch up on recent research, development and extension outcomes in February, when the GRDC Grains Research Updates return to Adelaide.

Registrations are now open for the forum, which will be held as a hybrid in person and online event on Tuesday, February 4, and Wednesday, February 5.

The event will feature a diverse range of presentations, with speakers covering everything from new tactics for minimising frost damage to community trust in food production.

There will also be networking opportunities and a social banquet for in-person attendees.

Online participation will be delivered as a free livestream of presentations from the main hall, with the opportunity for registered participants to submit questions during the presentations.

Southern Panel chair Andrew Russell said he strongly believed attending in-person was the most comprehensive and rewarding option for growers, agronomists, advisers, researchers and students.

"I've been attending updates for 20odd years and I always get enormous value from going in-person," Mr Russell said.

"Beyond catching up on the latest research outcomes and advice, there are numerous opportunities to discuss the information with peers, to gain



different perspectives on the practical application and potential value of the findings.

"There is a wealth of information and experience that gets exchanged during these conversations, whether you're just starting in the sector or you've been at it for decades.

"Plus, attending updates is the best excuse to get off the farm and talk with other farmers about the challenges and opportunities we face together while doing what we love. That's hard to beat."

Topics covered at the GRDC updates include those from RD&E investments generated from the National Grower Network.

Research Updates completing the circle by providing science-based advice back to industry.

GRDC Grower Relations Manager South Tim Bateman said the emphasis on local concerns would be highlighted by a panel discussion on key learnings from 2024's dry season, to be hosted by Josh Hollitt of Hollitt Consulting, Port Lincoln; Felicity Turner of Turner Agribusiness, Meningie; and CSIRO farming systems researcher Dr Kenton Porker.

"This is a unique opportunity for growers and advisers to hear how the dry 2024 season impacted others, how some growers achieved a respectable harvest despite decile one rainfall, and how we can all use the learnings to better manage similar seasons in the future," Mr Bateman said.

"Another very relevant session for younger agronomists, given the tough season, will be the plenary on looking after your health and your clients with Steph Schmidt from Farm Life Psych.

"For me, those topics highlight how the planning committee is able to cherry-pick relevant information from everything that is going on across GRDC and beyond and deliver an event that provides direct relevance and value for the grains industry."

Other highlights of the Adelaide

program will include:

- Converting our worst soils to our best — amelioration of sandy soils, with Therese McBeath, CSIRO, and Chris Saunders, University of South Australia.
- Unlocking yield potential in challenging seasons maximising rainfall conversion to grain, presented by Kenton Porker, CSIRO.
- Nitrogen banking performance in contrasting seasons with Professor James Hunt, University of Melbourne.
- Digging deeper Valuing plant and soil testing information for agronomic decisions with Rick Llewellyn, CSIRO.

Mr Bateman said the GRDC Grains Research Update in Adelaide was likely to attract 400 or more attendees, offering plenty of opportunities for learning, asking questions and building personal networks.


"The updates attract a great mix of people from early-career researchers and agronomists to GRDC representatives and everyone is there to discuss, learn and share," he said.



The six-part series is being broadcast live at 8pm on Tuesdays and started January 7, or it can be streamed on iView.



Future episodes will feature South Australia's own Haigh's Chocolates, Bega Cheese, Allen's lollies, Kookaburra cricket balls and Bundaberg Ginger Beer.

Dr Karl explains every step, from sourcing the raw materials to rolling the final product off the production line, dramatised by a cinematic score.

Dr Karl's trademark curiosity and unquenchable enthusiasm brings out the best in his interview subjects, who relish the chance to explain the mysteries of their industries.

Dr Karl's 40-year television career began when he hosted the inaugural season of ABC's pre-



Catalyst science series, Quantum.

He answers weird and wonderful questions from members of the public on his talkback radio show on Triple J, which has been airing since 1981.

He has seemingly infinite knowledge about everything under the sun and beyond, has been gleaned from a career in physics and medicine, plus working many and varied stints as a roadie for Slim Dusty, a TV weatherman, a taxi driver, and a professional four-wheel drive tester and more.

The only child of two Holocaust survivors, Dr Karl has conducted his life like a lifelong experiment and has chronicled some of his extraordinary journey in his 48th book, A Periodic Tale - My Sciencey Memoir, which was released in September, 2024.

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HOT FISHING TIPS

Wallaroo: Warm weather has accompanied late afternoon sea breezes up to 25 knots, forcing boat crews to run out early mornings for their seafood attempts. Blue crabs, garfish and squid have been the main reports, while jetty fishers went long and hard for blueys and the occasional tommy ruff (Australian herring) in the evenings.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: A few King George whiting came from the southern end of Steamer channel during the week, along with blue crabs and garfish at the Tiparra Reef. Shore-based anglers tried for yellowfin whiting from local beaches, with high tides working best, and a few blueys were caught at the

Point Turton: Large numbers of visitors replaced holiday-makers here for the Christmas/New Year break, ensuring long lines at the boat ramp and a packed carpark. Garfish, flathead and a few isolated early morning whiting were the main reports. The jetty has

been busy but quiet.

Marion/Stenhouse Bays: Big red nannygai, flathead, whiting and rat kingfish have come from the deep water drops about two to three kilometres east of Marion Bay. The two jetties have squid, leather jackets and overnight tommies, while huge numbers of shore-based anglers have been at Richards and Brown's beach fishing for mullet, flathead and salmon

Edithburgh/Stansbury: Locals reported heavy boat ramp traffic last week as crews ran out for snook, garfish, squid and blue crabs. Pesky small snapper are off the back of Tapley Shoals (to be returned to the water immediately), along with gurnards, an occasional thumper KG whiting and leather jackets. Jetty-based fishers are catching a couple of blueys and the odd squid.

Ardrossan: Catches of nice-sized blueys continue for boat crews, jetty netters and rakers alike, plus gar and snook for the boat anglers fishing over at Windara Reef and Gus Shoal. Mulloway are still in the night-time shallows here as they migrate north to the Mosquito Point mangroves to breed.
