

CITY LIMITS FOR COPPER COAST

COPPER Coast Council is considering its second name change in six years.

The council is seeking comment on a proposal to change its name to City of Copper Coast, or similar to reflect its city status.

Council changed its name from

District Council of the Copper Coast to Copper Coast Council during its 2017 elector representation review.

CEO Russell Peate said the population of Yorke Peninsula was expected to reach 30,640 by 2026, with Kadina, Moonta, Wallaroo, Moonta Bay and Port Hughes housing a significant proportion of this growth.

"We've overgrown nearby cities such

as Port Lincoln (14,404) and Port Augusta (13,829), and it is considered state and federal governments view a city more favourably for the provision of services and funding," Mr Peate said.

"There are a number of developments which have recently been completed or are progressing in the Copper Coast, including T-Ports grain export terminal, Hawsons Iron deep water port and jetty at Myponie Point, Wallaroo Shores development and large subdivisions in Port Hughes and

"These will all contribute to sustained population growth and development on the Copper Coast."

Councillors discussed the proposal during their first meeting for the year last Wednesday, January 11.

"I've looked at the advantages and disadvantages and, at first, it did seem a little grandiose but I liked it the more I thought about it," Councillor Brent Walker said.

"It could give us more avenues for funding but it's just an idea going out for consultation and we will be guided by the community."

Jetty response

IT is important to provide correct information on the swimming enclosure at Wallaroo.

The Wallaroo Foreshore master plan proposed is not just for the swimming enclosure, but for the whole of the Wallaroo foreshore.

The Wallaroo Foreshore master plan extends from the Liberator Way entrance (Heritage Drive) to the Wallaroo Jetty car park (Jetty Road).

There are 17 areas highlighted in five zones to receive feedback on in designing a better foreshore for residents and tourists.

Zone one, point three states: "Incorporate design of new swimming enclosure..." which is a reference to the new aquatic facility and design we have been working on with the Wallaroo Swimming and Aquatics Group.

We submitted a funding application to the Building Better Regions Fund Round 5 for a new facility. We were not successful.

We engaged JPE to complete consultation on four projects — Stately Way (Wallaroo), McCauley Park and Queen Square (Moonta) and the Wallaroo Swimming Enclosure.

There were two rounds of community consultation from November 20, 2020 to January 14, 2021 and March 23, 2021 to April 23, 2021, with drop-in sessions on December 11 and 12, 2020 and March 24 and 25, 2021.

The consultation report, concept report and costings produced for the four projects were received at the June 2, 2021 council meeting.

It was referred to the CEO to provide a proposed works plan for each of the four projects over the next five years, taking into account council's budget, long-term financial plan and resources to achieve the various aspects of the four projects for further consideration by council.

We submitted a further application to the Building Better Regions Fund Round 6 for a new aquatic facility highlighting this consultation and design.

A copy of the application was provided to the Wallaroo Swimming and Aquatics Group.

The new federal government decided to not progress consideration of any projects under this funding program. They established a new funding program called the Growing Regions Program.

We will submit an application when the guidelines and criteria are available.

We have and continue to work with engineers regarding the design of a new aquatic facility at Wallaroo. We have and continue to consult the Wallaroo Swimming and Aquatics Group.

We all want the best foreshore possible, including an aquatic facility.

Last year, Wallaroo was named the Small Top Tourist Town in the state.

We wish for the Wallaroo foreshore to be even better for residents and tourists to reflect this award. Russell Peate, CEO, Copper Coast Council

Disturbing scooter trend

LATELY, I have become very concerned with a trend amongst users of mobility scooters to ride down the middle of lanes on roads on the peninsula, impeding traffic.

I have noticed this across a couple of towns in the northern Yorke Peninsula and the Copper

While I support the use of mobility scooters, I feel at no time should they be driven in the middle of a traffic lane with traffic queued behind them.

Worse still is driving in an 80km/h zone, rounding a corner to find a mobility scooter in the middle of the lane and you cannot pass due to an unbroken centre-line requiring you to brake rapidly to avoid a collision; such mobility scooter use is clearly dangerous and just plain

The verge, a bike path, or the very side of the road allowing cars and trucks to pass should be where mobility scooters are ridden and they should not impede traffic.

The discourteous use of mobility scooters on footpaths is another issue and, while concerning, this does not carry the inherent dangers of mobility scooters in traffic.

If you use a mobility scooter, please do not use it on roads blocking traffic, and if on the footpath, please be courteous to pedestrians, travel at walking pace and to one side of the footpath allowing pram users and others to pass where possible.

Further, if you have your dog with you on a lead, keep the dog close to you and not at full lead extension blocking the entire footpath.

Unity in a name

CAN a change in name really unite four very different towns?

Copper Coast Council is exploring the possibility of changing its name to the City of Copper Coast, or something equivalent.

The reasoning, in part, is to potentially open up doors for federal and state funding, with more weight perhaps given to a city instead of a council.

Council believes it has the figures behind it to support the argument, with the area growing and the demand on services exceeding that created by the four main towns of the region.

It's an argument council has made before — successfully lobbying to be in a later stage of the Planning and Development Code rollout, alongside regional centres, due to its size and the number of applications it receives.

The other thought behind the potential move is to change the perspective within and of council, to be more focused on the wider area instead of the towns themselves.

There is a fierce sense of pride in towns across Yorke Peninsula, which is beneficial on a sporting field, but can be detrimental for cohesive growth within a region.

Despite there not being any town councillors or wards any more, it's incredibly common to hear people refer to certain elected members as the councillor from the town in which they live.

Councillors are elected by the entire region, not just individual towns, and are therefore charged to make decisions to benefit the whole area.

When I explain the glorious Copper Coast to people from outside the area, I often use Adelaide as an example.

Kadina is the CBD as the service centre of the three while Wallaroo and Moonta are kind of a mix of beachside suburbs and boutique lifestyle experiences.

The towns are all incredibly different, but are so incredibly important to the function of the others.

If elected members, and the community, believe a shift in name could change the mindset and provide an overall view for the area, then why not?

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Warm start to 2023

PEOPLE from all stretches of Yorke Peninsula can expect cooler temperatures from tomorrow (Wednesday, January 18), following the hottest start to a summer since 2019.

According to the Bureau of Meteorology, Saturday, January 14 was only the second time temperatures had exceeded 40 degrees since New Year's Eve 2021.

The maximum daily temperature has already exceeded 35 degrees on 13 separate occasions across YP since the beginning of December

The 2021-22 summer (December to February) only had nine days over 35 degrees, while the 2020-21 summer recorded 14.

According to Weatherzone meteors

According to Weatherzone meteorologist Brett Dutschke, climate drivers from the Indian Ocean have reached a near neutral dipole, causing temperatures to reach more typical summer heights than previous years.

"The past few years have seen La Niña weather events during summer," Mr Dutschke said.

"The increased rainfall from the

negative dipoles and the La Niña events have caused a significant drop in temperature compared to what Australia is used to.

"People can expect either an extended low intensity heatwave with several days ranging between 33 and 38 degrees for the rest of the summer and most of March, or a short, high intensity heatwave with several days rising above 40 degrees but with significant drops in temperature soon after.

"The pattern of warmer weather started just before Christmas, with wet climate weather events dissipating earlier than previous years, causing a more neutral and familiar climate.

"There has been a harsh rise in

temperature in the past fortnight however. "Despite the hotter days, people

can expect a cooler spell starting in the middle of this week."

Rainfall has also dropped off sig-

nificantly with only a couple of millimetres recorded to start the year.
Stenhouse Bay and Maitland,

Stenhouse Bay and Maitland, which received record rainfall in October and November, are yet to record any rainfall in 2023.

Stenhouse Bay also recorded a record 66.4mm of rain in January 2022, while Maitland received 66.5mm, including a record day of 60.2mm.

"The lack of rain this January compared to 2022 and 2021, is due to the La Niña season clearing earlier compared to the past two years," Mr Dutschke said.

"Although there are showers expected in some parts of the peninsula later this week, it is more typical of a South Australian summer compared to the downpours of the past two years."





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Mental health workforce woes

THE federal government's decision to cut the number of consultations per patient under the Better Access for Mental Health program could open up appointments for more people, but will do nothing to ease the mental health workforce shortage in country

That is the response from Rural Doctors' Association of South Australia president Dr Peter Rischbieth to the decision to reduce the number of subsidised consultations available under the program from 20 per person to 10.

Better Access for Mental Health funds services are provided by GPs, psychiatrists and psychologists.

Minister for Health and Aged Care Mark Butler recently announced the program's first comprehensive review in more than 10 years.

It originally provided for 10 visits per person but increased to 20 at the height of Covid lockdowns, with the funding ending at the end of 2022.

The review found all the additional services went to existing patients, and the number of new patients able to access services declined by seven per cent.

It was also revealed the extra 10 consultations aggravated existing waitlists and barriers to access, particularly for country people and those on lower incomes.

Dr Rischbieth said 20 visits per person seems a lot when some people could not access any visits at all.

"A cut in the number of visits might open up the program for newer patients," he said.

The introduction of telehealth consultations with mental health service providers had helped to ease the shortages of services in country areas but was not the be all and end all to solve the problem, Dr Rischbieth said.

"As we know, mental health problems are more common in rural areas, partly because of isolation and there is higher per capita consumption of alcohol, cigarettes and illicit drugs," he said.

"It's all about increasing and retaining the workforce, including nurses, midwives, GPs, psychologists and other health care professionals."

Dr Rischbieth said the Higher Education Loan Program debt reduction scheme for rural doctors and nurse practitioners should be expanded to include psychologists.

Under HELP, doctors and nurse practitioners can eliminate all or part of their student debt if they work in rural and remote areas.

Southern Yorke Peninsula is classified as remote while the remainder of YP is classified as small rural towns.

Minlaton-based psychologist Sally Emery has provided bulkbilled mental health services on YP for the past 17 years but is winding up her local practice.

She agreed the HELP scheme should be extended to psychologists and said there was scope for psychologists to be affiliated with regional general practices to help overcome professional isolation.

Australian Psychological Society APS president Dr Catriona Davis-McCabe said the federal government was meeting only 35 per cent of its psychology workforce target.

"Demand for services continues to break records, with one in three psychologists unable to take on new patients," she said.

"Before the (Covid) pandemic only one in 100 of us had closed

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Calling for candidates

COPPER Coast Council is hoping to fill its one elected member vacancy in the upcoming supplementary local government election.

The Copper Coast is one of 10 local government areas across the state holding another election after falling short of nominations in November's state-wide process.

Potential candidates now have until noon, Friday, January 27, to lodge their nomination via the online portal.

Keen community members must meet certain criteria, including being over an Australian Citizen over 18 years old.

Candidates need to supply a 1000-character candidate profile and recent image, which is sent to all eligible electors as part of their ballot pack.

"These supplementary elections are a second chance for anyone looking for an opportunity to shape the future of their local community," Minister for Local Government Geoff Brock

"A council which can advocate for and represent its community is particularly important in regional areas, as they often provide critical leadership on important issues such as attracting essential workers, aged care, child care and local economic development.

"It is important these values are represented by the best our great communities can offer."

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said

she encouraged residents to take this opportunity.

"I was really disappointed with the lack of nominations for council in November and I believe the system has a part to play in that," she said.

"Hopefully people now see it as a chance.

"We want people to be interested in their community and to be part of change, which is a good thing.

"I'm looking forward to having a number of nominations and welcoming our new coun-

Voting packs will be sent out to eligible electors between February 14 and 21, with voting closing at noon on Tuesday,

COPPER Coast Council mayor Roslyn Talbot said, at this stage, the change was merely a concept and the public would have six weeks to offer comment.

"Kadina, Moonta and Wallaroo are all in close proximity and service thousands of people as the three largest urban towns in the Yorke Peninsula," she said.

"They already act as a city to our region and this process will help unite the Copper Coast community.

"This rebranding encourages people to not think of our towns individually, but the Copper Coast as a whole.

"We want the Copper Coast to be known across the state, the nation and internationally for the infrastructure, services and facilities the community provides not council."

Mrs Talbot said, while the four main towns of the Copper Coast, Kadina, Moonta, Paskeville and Wallaroo, were all different, they complemented each other.

"You have to look at what's great for the area, not just for specific towns," she said.

"We see this as a way of breaking down those town barriers, so while we have individual master plans for stormwater for each town now, we will in time have a whole Copper Coast plan.

"It also brings back the focus to our community, they are the people who make the Copper Coast great.

"We're currently living up to our tagline Lifestyle Location of Choice, with back-toback wins in the South Australian Top Tourism Town Awards, more than 500,000 visitors per year and have the 11th fastest growing local government area in the state."

Local nature tourism bolstered

TWO Yorke Peninsula businesses have been awarded grants from the South Australian Tourism Commission's \$2 million Experience Nature Tourism Fund.

Based at Corny Point, Neptunes Surf Coaching received a \$29,870 grant to purchase new equipment and grow its marketing capabilities.

Neptunes owner and head instructor Max Tooze said more people are searching for naturebased tourism activities on Yorke Peninsula.

"Without the grant we would not be able to meet the demand we are currently seeing," he said.

"Through this project we will now offer one and two-person kayaks, see-through kayaks, paddleboards and snorkelling equip-

"This is in addition to the current services we provide, (such as) surf lessons, surfboard hire, wetsuit hire.

"It's important we receive this funding as it will diversify the SYP's adventure tourism offering and do it at a scale which will meet demand.

"All our employees are local instructors and through this project we'll be able to employ more local people and give more work to our current staff."

Brindabella Sailing operates sailing charters along the state's coastline, including on YP.

The business received \$18,424 to purchase new equipment so it can operate new day and overnight journeys between marine parks.

Brindabella owner and operator Brigid Dighton said the grant gave the business the opportunity to broaden its sailing adventures.

"We can now offer passengers the unique opportunity of accessing and exploring these magnificent parks from the water via the iconic maxi yacht, Brindabella," she said.

'Visitors can enjoy a true blue water sail across Gulf St Vincent to the likes of lower Yorke Peninsula's Point Davenport... jump in for a swim or kayak through the estuaries, learn about the parks' biodiversity and First Nations' significance, all while enjoying the creature comforts of a hot shower, fine SA food and wine, and a stunning sunset and sunrise on Brindabella's deck.

"This grant will also feature the addition of a much-needed tender vessel and an electronic shark shield to increase the safety of our operation and everyone on board."

Minister for Tourism Zoe Bettison said it's fantastic to be starting the New Year with a key boost for tourism.

"These new tourism experiences will highlight the important natural and cultural assets that are our state's national parks and will enable operators to attract visitors from interstate and overseas, as we support the industry to recover from the impacts of the pandemic," she said.

Motorists fork out for speeding fines

SOUTH Australia Police issued 8231 speeding fines at a total value of \$4,271,311 from the fixed point to point cameras between Two Wells and Port Wakefield across the past five years.

Latest police data shows 51,884 speeding offences were detected by six sets of cameras in the state in the past five financial years at a total cost of more than \$26.5 million in fines.

Both "safety camera ahead" and "average speed safety camera zone" warning signs are displayed at the start and end and at intervals throughout the average speed detection area to alert drivers of their presence.

The cameras calculate the average speed of a vehicle between two points, as well as the vehicle's actual speed at each camera location.

More than 50 per cent the speeding offences were detected at an individual camera site while 46 per cent were detected between the cameras.

RAA senior manager safety and Infrastructure Charles Mountain said the number of motorists caught speeding despite the prominent warning signs was disconcerting.

"Maybe these drivers also have an issue with distraction,"

"Motorists must remember they risk much more than a fine if they exceed the speed limit.

"Speeding — especially on roads with limits of 90km/h to 110km/h — can put you, your loved ones, and other roads users at increased risk of death or serious injury."

Mr Mountain said the road safety message was timely given the current summer school holidays and festive season, during which many South Australians have enjoyed driving across the

"However, we always urge drivers to be focused, remain vigilant and be aware of changing conditions and exercise caution when travelling on regional roads," he said.

"Fatigue is the enemy of longdistance driving so ensure you plan in breaks every couple of hours to refresh and enable you to maintain concentration.

"Tragically, more lives are lost from crashes on regional roads each year than those in metropolitan areas."

No complacency over road toll

THE RAA is asking South Australians to reflect on the number of lives lost and serious injuries suffered on local roads in 2022.

While SA recorded a lower number of lives lost in 2022. 70 down from 97 in 2021 and 90 in 2020, the RAA believes one life lost is one too many.

RAA senior manager of safety and infrastructure Charles Mountain said SA was one of only two Australian states where there was a reduction in road crash fatalities in 2022.

"Nationally, we've seen a 6.2 per cent increase in road

crash fatalities between November 2021 and November 2022 compared with the previous year," Mr Mountain said.

"While it's good news we've lost fewer people on South Australian roads in 2022, we can't afford to be complacent.

"Factors such as distraction and fatigue are major contributors to crashes, so it is essential we're well rested, calm and focused when driving or riding."

In addition to those killed on our roads, 688 people suffered a serious injury, many of whom may never fully recover.

There have already been six fatalities on SA roads in 2023.

Car theft on the rise

NEW RAA Insurance claims data shows car theft rose by 16 per cent in 2022, prompting a warning for drivers to keep their vehicles secure.

RAA insurance claims spokesperson Kimberley Bolton said car thefts initially decreased when Covid-19 first spread and people were staying at home.

"However, the easing of restrictions means more people are heading out to sporting and cultural events, resulting in more cars being left in car parks and on the street," she said.


"As South Australians flock to our regions during the holiday period and potentially leave the second family vehicle behind, we're encouraging them to take a number of precautions." Ms Bolton said the claims data

also showed the most popular makes of car stolen were Toyota, Holden, Ford, Mitsubishi and Mazda, which reflected the most common makes of cars on our roads.

To best prevent your vehicle being stolen, the RAA recommends you park your vehicle in a garage or carport, if possible, install sensor lights in your driveway and, if you must park on the road, leave your vehicle in a well-lit area, keep it locked at all times and remove valuables from the inside.

RAA Insurance data also showed the cars most popular with criminals were four door sedans and wagons.

THE Welcome to Yorke Peninsula roadside sign at Port Wakefield has officially been scrapped.

Wakefield Regional Council decided in August to remove the sign with works, at an estimated cost of \$3000, occurring starting last month.

"Council is currently scoping a new site for tourism information displays in Port Wakefield," WRC acting CEO Muhammad Jawad said

"We are looking at options to better inform tourists stopping in Port Wakefield by utilising a mix of modern technology and traditional static signage."

However, it's expected the replacement sign will no longer promote just Yorke Peninsula, rather the many regions with links to Port Wakefield.

The sign was built by the now defunct Southern Yorke Peninsula Tourism Board more than 30 years ago and discussions between nearby councils about potential removal were last had in 2016.

"We have contacted 25 councils north and west of Port Wakefield to gauge their interest in promoting their region from the popular rest point, with 22 responding positively to the con-

cept," Mr Jawad said.

"Council has also been workshopping the idea with the South Australian Tourism Commission in its bid to reposition Port Wakefield as a point of arrival and departure for travellers heading to the state's world class tourist regions, one of the key strategies outlined in Wakefield 2030, council's 10-year community plan."

Sections of the sign were salvaged and taken to the Moonta Mines Museum where National Trust of SA Moonta branch chairperson Stephen Stock said they would eventually be put on display.

"The sign (Moonta Mines sec-

tions) was made by Ken Dunning who was running the Moonta Tramways at the time and back about 25 to 30 years ago he put the sign up," he said.

"The Wakefield Regional Council contacted us about the removal of the sign and whether we'd be interested in having it... and so I went down and picked it up.

"The intention is to refurbish the sign and place it somewhere here on the Moonta Mines site.

"In it's time, it did (bring people to the town); it's quirky, and especially the cartoon character pointing in the right direction towards Moonta Mines, which was done by Oswald Pryor."

Winged warriors combat mozzies

EXTRA visitors have swarmed to Yorke Peninsula this summer, and some of them have wings.

Dragonflies have bred up after high rainfall in central Australia and many have migrated south, spotted in swarms on YP and other parts of South Australia, including metropolitan Adelaide.

Invertebrate ecologist and science communicator Dr Kristen Messenger of Bugs 'n' Slugs said the dragonflies had made the long trip south across multiple generations.

Damselflies and dragonflies belong to a group of insects which specifically target mosquitoes and other flying insects.

Adult dragonflies hunt mosquitoes on the wing, while their waterborne young, known as nymphs, feast on mosquito larvae, making them a natural weapon for tackling booming mozzie populations.

Dr Messenger described dragonflies as the kings and queens of insect aviation.

"They can fly forwards or backwards, they can hover and easily change direction and can achieve something like a 90th percentile of accuracy when hunting," she said.

"Dragonlies can surpass the fastest fliers of the insect world, at an average of 42 kilometres an hour but some have been clocked at 90 km/h.

"There has been a lot of biomimicry based on dragonflies in the development of technology such as drones."

Mosquitoes and dragonflies both prefer to breed in relatively still water, such as ponds and farm dams.

They can also breed in lower quality, brackish water. Dragonfly eggs are laid in water, then the nymph develops through several stages over about a year, although this can vary in response to conditions.

Once a nymph sheds its exoskeleton and develops wings, it only returns to the water to lay eggs.

Dr Messenger said adult dragonflies lived for only six to eight weeks.

A bloody scare causes thanks

PASKEVILLE'S Dylan Clogg was rocked by severe blood loss and low haemoglobin levels two days before New Year's Eve and believes he wouldn't be here today if it wasn't for the staff at Wallaroo Hospital.

Eight days, three bags of blood, a Royal Flying Doctor Service flight to Adelaide and numerous tests later and the reason for Dylan's poor health is still unknown; however, he's feeling much better.

He initially thought he might've contracted Covid-19 when he began to feel unwell so took himself to get tested at Kadina Respiratory Clinic.

When a staff member told him his face was extremely pale and it might be worth a trip to Wallaroo Hospital, he obliged.

"They told me at the hospital they needed to get me in straight away, that I essentially had no blood in my body and I'd suffered from severe blood loss," he said.

"From that point, they stuck a catheter in me and brought along a bag of blood to hook me up with; they worked out my blood type was AB+ which meant I could take any blood type, which was good.

"To be honest, I was just thinking about how much blood I was losing, where on earth it was going and why it was happening.

"Then they said my haemoglobin levels were 38; the average male's levels are 130 to 150 or something like that, so I was like, 'well hang on a sec, that's a lot of blood (I've lost)."

Dylan said it was an extremely nervous time.

"There were a few times I was contemplating being faced with my own mortality which is espe-



cially confronting when you're only 38 years old," he said.

"You have time in the hospital to do that as well, for better or for worse.

"You do get scared and wonder what's happening to your body, especially when you're fit."

After he was transferred to the Royal Adelaide Hospital, Dylan was tested for a variety of viruses and diseases, but to no avail.

He was discharged from the RAH as his blood levels restored closer to normal, but must return

later this month for more testing.

Dylan said he couldn't be more grateful for the support he was offered by the staff at the RFDS as well as at Wallaroo and Royal Adelaide Hospitals.

"Firstly, there was the doctor at Wallaroo who initially came to me and told me everything, he was good about it, because he must have seen the fear instantly come to my face," he said.

"At one point, he just put his hand on my knee and said, 'don't worry, man, we're going to make sure you are okay, and so that just gave me that bit of comfort.

"But then also to all the nurses and other doctors across both hospitals, they were all incredible and I'm forever grateful to them.

"The RFDS staff actually diverted to come pick me up because they wanted to see the guy who had a haemoglobin level of 38 so that was cool too, they had great energy.

"It just makes the experience much more pleasant, and I can't thank them all enough."





A good start to 2023

The news in the first week of January that the state government had doubled the Patient Assistance Transport Scheme fuel subsidy was brilliant.

It comes as a great relief for locals financially struggling to fill up at the bowser to travel outside of the region for health appointments not available locally.

The rate now available is 32 cents per kilometre, and the next change to the PATS scheme I'd like to see is more autonomy on choosing the specialists rural people can use for treatment.

So often PATS claims are denied because locals are deemed to have bypassed an available service when the reason they've done so is because the waiting list to see the visiting specialist they need is months and they fear waiting for treatment will threaten their health.

It is a very difficult choice to make; the fact there are long waiting lists must be taken into consideration by PATS assessment teams in my view.

Thriving Communities Program and E-vouchers for Live Music

Welcome news last week was the state government opening a new grants program dedicated to strengthening regional communities — the Thriving Communities Program.

This fund offers grants from \$20,000 to \$50,000 for community groups and nonprofit organisations in regional communities with projects intended to improve quality of life and strengthen regional economies.

Projects can include physical infrastructure, plant and equipment, events to enhance community wellbeing and engagement, or community training initiatives such as First Aid, Mental Health First Aid, Child Safe, cultural awareness and inclusion.

Applications close when the \$600,000 dedicated to the program is fully allocated, or at 5pm on June 30, whichever occurs first.



Citizen of the Year

Sarah Pridham, of Kadina, is the 2023 Copper Coast Council Citizen of the Year.

Since the unexpected loss of her son Jasper at birth, in 2017, Sarah has been a huge advocate for supporting and encouraging other bereaved parents, not only within the region, but across the country.

"Sarah believes in sharing her story, with the hope it will continue to break the taboo society still holds around the topic of baby loss, and she hopes by having the courage to be vulnerable, it will help encourage other local bereaved parents to feel comfortable to do so as well," her nomination read.

She has organised and planned six fundraisers within the community, raising \$24,617.20 for charities including Still Aware, Royal Flying Doctor Service, Cancer Council SA, Bears of Hope, Kadina CFS, Kangaroo Island Wildlife Park, and Heartfelt Photography.

Sarah has also donated cuddle cots, jaundice meters and keepsake books, support books, angel gowns and more to local hospitals and funeral homes across South Australia.

"In November 2021, Sarah created and went live with the Forever Young program, which is Australia-wide and currently features 101 businesses focusing on the mental, physical and emotional health and wellbeing of bereaved parents," the nomination read.

"Sarah decided to create this program after realising her own emotional, physical and mental health, and wellbeing were the last of her focus following her loss and, at 27 years old, did not expect to have the additional financial burden associated with a funeral, headstone and wake.

"She hopes, by providing bereaved parents with discounted offers, it will encourage them to look after their health and wellbeing during such a challenging time."

Sarah has shared her story through radio and print media, and has been part of five book col-

"If you ask her why she has done and continues to do these things, she will tell you during the early months after her loss, she realised she can continue to create a legacy in memory of Jasper and she wants his memory to be a positive one," the nomination read.

Community Event of the Year

Copper Coast Council's Community Event of the Year is the Catwalk for Cancer.

The fundraising event was organised by a committee of 13 and held at Moonta Garden and Landscape Supplies on Sunday, October 23.

"The committee worked tirelessly together to bring this event to life," co-organiser Leanne Hopkins said.

KWM Band is a mainstay of many social events in the Copper Coast, including Anzac and Australia Day commemorations, donating their time for free to local nursing homes as well.


"The Kadina and Wallaroo Band amalgamated when numbers were low and late on Moonta joined in," the nomination read.

"During that 160 years, the band has performed continuously in the three towns and is the only brass band still operating on Yorke


"Bandmaster Linda Kinch pulled the band back to life with strong guidance and a wealth of knowledge due to her many years of being a professional musician.

Support builds for festival of iconic fish

SUPPORT is building for the annual Gynburra 2023 at Port Victoria on Friday and Saturday, January 27 and 28.

Organisers believe this could be the biggest event yet.

Gynburra, also known as butterfish or dusky morwong, are central to the culture of the Narungga people of Guuranda (Yorke Peninsula).

Gynburra were traditionally hunted with harpoons on reefs with the incoming tide.

Men would wade in the water and often make slight movements with their feet to stir sand which would attract the inquisitive and somewhat docile fish.

As the fish circled and ventured closer, the men would harpoon them with spears.

This tradition has been celebrated for the past 50 years through the Clem Graham Senior Memorial Butterfish Competition for Narungga men and boys, which recently opened up to the broader community and is now the major attraction of the annual Gynburra festival.

Festival organiser Garry Goldsmith of Wiri Miya Aboriginal Corporation said the Gynburra provided food security, communal and medicinal health, wellbeing and cultural identity for Narungga

Mr Goldsmith said support for the festival had been building amongst the broader community on YP.

"People can see a huge benefit for their own businesses but also for building their own knowledge of Narungga cul-

"It's an opportunity for people to learn at their own pace at a casual and social event."

Mr Goldsmith said numbers would also be boosted by the extra tourists this summer, who have chosen to holiday in this region partly due to flooding in the Riverland.

Gynburra 2023 will feature cultural performances, children's entertainment, food stalls, an open-air movie night, the Women's Pamper Day, fireworks display and more.


Fishers will compete to be named the Butterfish King or Butterfish Prince and win a share of more than \$1000 prize

Registrations are now open across three age groups under 18 years of age, open, and the newly introduced over 55 years category.





A guiding light for 50 years

WHILE all Girl Guides must promise to do their best and serve their communities, there would be very few like Annie Hyland who can solemnly swear they have kept that promise for 50 years.

Annie was 12 years old when she made her promise in November 1972 at the Richmond Girl Guides in suburban Adelaide.

Since then, she has served the Girl Guide movement as the leader of the Kadina unit for 37 years, trained adult leaders, helped to run numerous state camps and even served as South Australian state manager of Girl Guides Australia.

She has attended Girl Guide events in New Zealand, the United Kingdom, India, Hong Kong, Singapore and China and was recently awarded the Asia Pacific Leadership Award.

In recognition of her outstanding service, Annie was treated to a recent surprise gathering of 20 family and friends, including her Guide Leader from 50 years ago, Janet Simmons, and her Ranger Guide Leader Fiona Thomson.

At the gathering, Annie was presented with gold membership of the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts Friends of the Asia Pacific Region and given a framed pictorial souvenir of her years a young guide.

Janet, who is a life member of Girl Guides SA, said Annie embodied the values underpinning the Girl Guide movement.

"She has been an inspiring influence to many girls and leaders, encouraging them to become self-confident and discover their potential as leaders in their world," Janet

Despite the accolades, Annie said the greatest satisfaction for her is to see young girls develop their potential.

"I love anything to do with helping other people and doing your best, just as we promise to do," she said.

"We provide a safe, welcoming space for girls to just be themselves, to share their thoughts and ideas with each other, and to reflect on where they are at that particular time in their lives.

"I remember when I was a young guide, we would go on camps and just chat for what seemed like the entire night."

Annie fondly remembers doing voluntary work at her local library and Meals on Wheels kitchen and trolley service at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, when she took snacks, drinks and magazines around the wards and talked to the patients.

Annie is passionate about providing opportunities for all young girls, particularly those who are struggling with social isolation.

"There are a lot of opportunities for girls to pursue sport in country towns but Girl Guides provides a niche for girls who would like to explore other interests, get involved in their community and develop

friendships," she said.

Annie's voluntary work is complemented by her career as an early childhood educator, which has included serving as teacher and director of the Kadina Pre School Centre for 15 years and as director of the Maitland Children's Centre for 10 years.

Annie now teaches part time at the Wallaroo Pre School Centre and is a partner in Wallaroo Treats and Treasures Cafe.

On the precise day of Annie's 50th anniversary in Girl Guides, the Kadina guides completed a series of activities just as Annie had in her Pre-Promise Challenge all those years ago.

They learned tracking signs, tried interrunning, compared original and current Girl Guide world flags, made a beaded counter to record each day when they do a good turn to help someone, and looked at the wording of the promise Annie made and compared it with their own promises.

"Being involved in the Girl Guides has given me the opportunity to develop my confidence and leadership and to challenge myself in lots of different avenues, such as travelling and taking part in international events," she said.

"Being in the Girl Guides has an impact on every girl that comes through, in particular on their self-esteem and their confidence to take on new challenges."





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








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

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BACK TO SCHOOL

Avoid back-to-school asthma spike

PARENTS and carers of children with asthma are encouraged to book in an asthma check-up to avoid the back-toschool asthma spike.

National Asthma Council Australia Guidelines Committee member and paediatric respiratory physician Dr Louisa Owens said right now is a great time to help get children asthma-ready for the school year ahead.

"Going back to school should be an exciting time for kids and the last thing they want is an asthma flare-up that might see them end up in hospital or missing out on fun activities," Dr Owens said.

"Good asthma control is key to a healthy and safe start to the school year for the one in nine Australian children living with asthma."

Dr Owens said Covid-19 case numbers are expected to surge following Christmas and holiday celebrations and it was important for children with asthma to be vaccinated, if possible, before the start of the school year.

"If parents are unsure about getting

their child with asthma vaccinated, then we encourage them to have a discussion with their GP before their child starts the 2023 school year," she said.

"January is an ideal time to have a full asthma check-up with your GP including a review of your child's Written Asthma Action Plan, medications and inhaler technique for relievers and preventers ahead of the February back-to-school asthma spike."

The sharp rise in children being admitted to hospital with asthma in February each year is thought to be due to a change of environment or allergens, sharing a new set of bugs with classmates, which can trigger colds and respiratory infections and possibly missing preventer doses over the holidays.

NAC also suggests parents share a copy of the up-to-date action plans with school staff and after-school carers, while also making sure children know to tell school staff when they have asthma symptoms.





GRAIN Producers SA is investigating options for the reuse and recycling of grain silo bags in South Australia.

The organisation received a \$60,000 grant though Green Industries SA's Circular Economy Market Development Grant to enable the research.

GPSA will complete a feasibility study to better understand the challenges and opportunities in repurposing and reducing waste of grain silo bags.

CEO Brad Perry said grain producers had increasingly raised the problem of used silo bags and lack of recycling avenues available.

"There is currently a successful recycling stewardship scheme for plastic chemical containers called DrumMuster

as well as pilots for plastic seed and fertiliser bags with BagMuster; however, there is a gap when it comes to used grain silo bags," Mr Perry said.

"Through the Grain Silo Bag Circular Economy Feasibility Study we are seeking to understand the scale of silo bag waste on grain farms in South Australia, what recycling avenues currently exist, and what investment strategies can be developed to provide industry participation and circular solutions for used silo bags.

"Grain producers want to harvest their crops as quickly as possible and are increasingly utilising temporary plastic grain silo bags as a convenient storage solution.

"These silo bags are single use and once finished with, they are stored on farm or producers try to find alternate

"As use of silo bags grows, the amount of plastic waste generated on farms is increasing, as is awareness of the associated waste management responsibilities.

"It's hoped this feasibility study will lead to potentially innovative recycling solutions to this problem if no existing recycling avenues are identified as feasible."

GPSA will work with a consultant to develop the study and will also develop an awareness campaign to educate key stakeholders identified in the study on grain silo bag recycling, avenues for recycling, innovative uses, and circular economy best practices.



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

Wallaroo: Warm weath winds dominated much of last week as boat crews struggled to string together consecutive days of good fishing. Jettybased anglers tried for blue crabs, squid and yellowfin whiting, with blueys in the bay and down at Bird Reef.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes/Port Victoria: Snook and a few garfish have come from up at Warburto Point and off West Light grounds. King George whiting are on and off at Cape Elizabeth and south of the Steamer Channel with scattered reports of gar and squid from Moonta Bay and Rifle Butts Beach. The jetties have the odd bluey.

Point Turton: Garfish were the go-to species for boat crews fishing Hardwicke Bay, Port Rickaby, The Pines and Point Souttar. An occasional yellowfin whiting was caught from the shore off Minlacowie and

Point Souttar on the high tide and squid from the jetties.

Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: A few gummy sharks were the target at Stenhouse Bay jetty, plus tommy ruff (Australia herring) and squid at night. Boat crews reported big but isolated KG whiting, flathead and squid. Shore-based anglers were all across the Bottom End chasing salmon trout, mullet and overnight mulloway

Edithburgh/Stansbury: Locals and tourists fished for night-time rat kingfish from the local jetties here, and at Port Giles and Klein Point. Tommies, blueys and squid were about at times, while boat crews caught KG whiting from Marion Reef and Tapley Shoals and gar out from Sultana Point.

Ardrossan: Squid can be caught from Windara Reef on the drift and there are blueys and gar out from Price and Sheoak Flat. The local ietty had a couple of cruising soapie mulloway on late Friday evening.
