Progression push as kside hits hiccu

A YORKE Peninsula Council elected member has hit out at a lack of progress by the elected body in reference to the Dockside development at Port Vincent.

Councillors opted not to pursue a reclassification of Lot 72 Marina Drive to be used for car parking within the project for a second time, at council's meeting last Wednesday, January 17.

The issue cannot be readdressed for at least a year after this decision, but developers were offered some consolation later in the meeting when elected members decided to seek ministerial approval for changes to headleases on two other associated allotments.

Cr Naomi Bittner said the decision not to reclassify Lot 72 flew in the face of numerous council objectives. She said the council-created and endorsed Economic and Tourism Development Strategy stipulated the

area's key limitation of supply shortage, such as food and drink and highend accommodation options.

"To be clear, we are not voting in support or approval of the Dockside development, as the approval of the development rests with the council assessment panel," Dr Bittner said. "However, not to vote for a change in classification of Lot 72 from Reserve to Public and Community Facilities flies in the face of our own

current endorsed Economic and

Tourism Development Strategy.

"It is not the role of councillors to approve or reject the development application... it is, however, the role of council to consider our prior and current efforts in developing the economic robustness of our region.

"Our decisions tonight are not explicitly to approve the Dockside development, but they are decisions which can confirm our commitment to supporting innovative, large-scale housing, tourism and employment opportunities for our region that line up with our own strategic plans."

Mayor Darren Braund said there was healthy debate around the land's reclassification.

"I think the issue is still about using community land, because many are extremely supportive of the project as a whole, just not necessarily that aspect," he said.

"I think Cr Bittner put some great points across the table, and for me, I think it's a project which could be incredibly beneficial to the region."

For 20 odd years, my family and friends spent many enjoyable and happy moments at Cape Elizabeth where we fished, swam and had barbecue lunches and teas, but always made sure we left the area clean.

I have not been back there for many years as my children have grown up and I spend most time when not travelling around Yorke Peninsula fishing in the Spencer Gulf.

I appreciate the council complaining they do not have the resources to manage the Cape Elizabeth area adequately.

Perhaps they should be seeking funds from the government to do that based on assisting the management of the historical heritage of the area for the Narungga people, and the tourist attraction it offers visitors.

A suggestion worth considering is that those people entering the area, before travelling on any of the council's land parcels or unalienated roads, pay a small visitors' fee for admittance.

These fees could be paid at the council's offices or any of the YP tourist offices.

From time to time, council officers could check if those at the area had purchased a ticket.

These funds could go towards the continued conservation of Cape Elizabeth and for resources to manage the area; they could also be used to market YP and what it has to offer visitors.

It is not only the management of Cape Elizabeth that has to be taken to another level but having recreational facilities placed there such as barbecues and playgrounds.

Visitors who abuse the Cape Elizabeth area or present without a visitation ticket should be subject to heavy penalties.

If positive action is not taken now, the Cape Elizabeth land will deteriorate to the degree we will lose one of Yorke Peninsula's finest assets forever.

It is time to act.

Not an exact science

THE Bureau of Meteorology has been criticised lately for the accuracy of its short and long-term weather forecasts.

Predicting the weather is not an exact science, even with computers.

The Great Australian Bight has more influence on our weather than most people think.

How many times have people said "It's 42 in Perth today, we will cop that in a couple of days"? Sometimes they are correct but they are usually wrong.

At the Elliston Post Office from 1977 to 1982, I did five comprehensive weather reports every day, 365 days a year.

The reports were a lot of five-figured numbers coded and sent to the bureau on a Telex machine.

One morning when I did the 3am report, there was no significant drop in barometric pressure on the "yard of mercury" barometer or the barograph (pen on paper, much like a seismograph).

At around 5.30am, torrential rain started. I looked in the half light and there were huge cumulonimbus clouds to the west-south-west.

The 9am report measured over five inches (125mm) of rain in a matter of a few hours and

the barometric pressure had dropped to around 990 millibars (now referred to as hectopascals). Shortly after 9am the bureau rang me to

confirm the five inches and I told them the type. direction and height of the clouds.

The streets of Elliston had water over the footpaths but no buildings were affected.

They then rang the local policeman and he told them he'd never seen rain like it.

Wasted chances

IN my (former) role as the YP expert rubbish reporter for the YP Country Times, I learned a lot about waste.

Luckily, my knowledge hasn't waned after hanging up my fluoro vest for the editor's trench coat.

Yorke Peninsula Council has now officially scrapped the idea of having a food organic green organic system as part of its waste collection, despite both Copper Coast and Barunga West Councils rolling it out in recent years.

YPC has been investigating the system for several years but, ultimately, councillors' concerns about its cost and effectiveness outweighed any potential benefits a FOGO service may have had.

One of the advantages of FOGO is believed to be green and food matter being diverted from landfill, broken down and turned into other products.

However, as Mayor Darren Braund said, councillors were also concerned about the impact of FOGO having to be taken from YP to other areas for treatment.

Do the challenges then outweigh the benefits?

I know from watching the CCC and BWC rollouts, it is important to have strong educational campaigns in the lead up to the changes.


Personally, it seems a shame to not have a FOGO system in place because it I find it easy to remember what things go in each bin, and it definitely reduces the amount of rubbish I'm sending to landfill each week.

Waste collection is one of the hardest things councils have to deal with, as we look to CCC which has been offering ratepayers three free trips a year to its resource recovery centre, with less than 20 per cent uptake for both hard and green waste.

Again, there are logical reasons like awareness and transportation which make it harder for people to take their trash out, but it feels like there's more we could do.

Broughton boaties not 'appy

THE trial of app-only payment for boat ramp fees at Port Broughton could be abandoned by Barunga West Council.

This follows complaints by angry boaties who have had difficulties using the EasyPark app.

Council will consider the future of the app at a public information session at 5pm in the Port Broughton chambers tonight (Tuesday, January 23).

The six-month trial began in September in response to persistent vandalism of permit machines, their high maintenance costs and the end of the 3G network in Australia.

The daily fee via the EasyPark app is \$8.80 or an annual recreational launch permit can be purchased from council for \$95.

Staff at council's Port Broughton office can also provide an \$8 daily ticket for boaties.

However, there is no sign at the boat ramp to inform people about this service, which is only available during office hours.

Development and regulatory services director Trevor White tabled a report about the trial at council's meeting on Tuesday, January 16.

"In the week prior to the Christmas break, council staff were confronted by 10 angry boat ramp users who just wanted to be able to launch their boat and go fishing," Mr White said.

"The common theme was council had not considered the ageing population when the decision was made to remove the ticket machines. "Many did not have access to a smartphone, with some stating they did not wish to have credit card details on an app."

Councillor David Eason said the income council received from the boat ramp is not worth the effort and angst of collecting the fees.

"It's my firm belief we should waive it (the fees)," he said.

"We should take the (existing) signs down and put one up that says 'free boat ramp'.

"There were some poor people down there today (January 16) and they just could not get it (the app) on their phone.

"They were angry and I don't blame them."

After costs, income from the ramp between 2018-19 and 2021-22 totalled \$27,602.07.

Cr Grant Rowlands said BWC would gain huge positive publicity from dropping the fee, given prominent media coverage of fees at various South Australian boat ramps.

"It (the fee) only raises minimal money but it does affect the bottom line, so we could start the new approach in the new (financial) year," he said.

Keen fishers Barry Hitch, Brian Graham and Karen Graham, all of Fisherman Bay, have bought annual boat ramp permits and said the app causes difficulty for some boaties.

"If my dad (Mr Hitch) had to rely on the app, then he wouldn't be able to go fishing," Ms Graham said.

However, Mr Hitch said if the boat ramp fee was dropped, he would be concerned council would try to make up for the lost income by raising rates on his home.

YORKE Peninsula Council will proceed with John Edwards and Roger Hogben's proposed Vietnam War Memorial Walk project between Coobowie and Edithburgh, beginning with a grant application.

Initially proposed to reach each town, the memorial will run along the Walk the Yorke trail and begin and end within the Edithburgh golf course and just south of the causeway into Coobowie.

Respondents to a recent public consultation process were concerned about the safety of those walking across the causeway, and if proposed archways and honour roll boards would block coastal views.

The signage proposed for the project includes 10 boards, each 1.8 metres high, detailing all units involved in the Vietnam War, as well as 15 smaller boards and six bench seats.

An application will be submitted for a federal government Saluting Their Service Commemorative Grant worth \$150,000, almost covering the project's entire cost of an estimated \$172,000.

Council noted there are options available to reduce the costs if required, such as having local business sponsors, reducing the number of bench seats, or seeking other

contributions.

Mr Hogben said he is extremely happy with the result, albeit a little exhausted following the efforts put in so far.

"It's a win, and we will get this memorial walk up, that's the main thing," he said.

"With the national support we've got, including from the Australian War Memorial, our feeling is we stand a very good chance to get the grant.

"This now becomes a council project, for them to handle, but it's not coming out of council's budget, like a lot of people think, and even if we need more funds to get it done, John and I will work on that. "The whole aim of this is to tell a story; it's not celebrating war, it's not a memorial for any one individual, but it is for the whole story."

Mr Edwards said he'd already heard from a family interested in purchasing a seat along the walk to help fund the project.

"It's nothing to get overly excited about yet, because we've got to get the job done, but we've made a few positive steps in the right direction," he said.

"In life when you're dealing with these things, you need good leadership, and we've led the way as good as we could've and we need good managers, and council have done that." YPC mayor Darren Braund said there are many positive factors which will make the walk worthwhile.

"I think everyone was supportive of this project, albeit there were a few things which needed to be worked out, especially with the fact it can be funded through a grant," he said.

"This is something which would be very meaningful for those connected with the Vietnam War, and I think there's a tourism factor as well; this will be incredibly unique."

The deadline to apply for grant funding is Tuesday, February 6, with hopes to complete the project in time for Vietnam Veterans' Day, August 18, 2025.

TWO more sinkholes have opened up in Randolph Street, Port Hughes, in line with the sewer main trench.

They appeared in mid-January and are located on the southern side of the street, close to West Terrace and the foreshore section of the caravan park.

The new holes align with an earlier sinkhole, which appeared after intense rainfall on January 6 and extends for some distance underneath the intact bitumen.

A Copper Coast Council spokesperson said Peninsula Plumbing has been engaged to use cameras to inspect the sewerage main from Charles Street to West Terrace.

"Once we can confirm there has been no damage to the main, the road will be saw-cut, old material will be removed and replaced with new rubble, and then compacted and sealed," the spokesperson said.

"Depending on the condition of the sewerage main, this process can take up to a month to complete."

Randolph Street and West Terrace, amongst other Port Hughes streets, are covered in council's Moonta Stormwater Plan, Management the spokesperson said.

This stage of stormwater infrastructure improvements will start at the corner of West Terrace and Randolph Street, extending along West Terrace to the southern end of the caravan park and down to the sea.

"This is the first stage of stormwater upgrades in the area, which will eventually continue down Randolph Street to the intersection with Charles Street," he said.

"This highlights the importance of stormwater management plans and the proactive approach both council and the Stormwater Management Authority adopt when it comes to stormwater flood mitigation."

A council letter dated January 17 was sent to Randolph Street residents, advising them of the investigation and repair works.

The letter suggests those who have trouble accessing their properties because of repair works or damage can ask the contractors for assistance.

Safety bunting has been placed around the sinkholes but residents are concerned it is inadequate protection, given many children access Randolph Street.

Homeowner Raylene Evans said it was not unusual for groups of holidaymakers from the caravan park to walk and cycle along the street.

She said council should install temporary fencing around the sinkholes.

"This (bunting) won't stop anyone - it's pretty average," she said.

"It's a danger because they (small children) get inquisitive and they want to have a look."

Notice issued pursuant to section 85(1) of the Constitution Act 1934

Pursuant to section 82(1) of the Constitution Act 1934 the South Australian Electoral Districts Boundaries Commission ("the Commission") is about to commence proceedings for the purpose of an electoral redistribution of South Australia into House of Assembly electoral districts.

What is the basis of the redistribution?

Whenever an electoral redistribution is made, the number of electors in each electoral district must not vary from the electoral quota by more than 10 per cent. The electoral quota is obtained by dividing the total number of electors for the House of Assembly as at a specified date, being a date not earlier than six months before the date of the Commission's order, by the number of electoral districts.

What is the task of the Commission?

- In making an electoral redistribution, the Commission is required to:
- have regard, as far as practicable, to
 - the desirability of making the electoral redistribution so as to reflect communities of a) interest of an economic, social, regional or other kind;
 - b) the population of each proposed electoral district;
 - the topography of areas within which new electoral boundaries will be drawn; C)
 - the feasibility of communication between electors affected by the redistribution and their d) parliamentary representative in the House of Assembly;
 - the nature of substantial demographic changes that the Commission considers likely e) to take place in proposed electoral districts between the conclusion of its present proceedings and the date of expiry of the present term of the House of Assembly.

The Commission is also authorised to have regard to any other matter it thinks relevant.

Can you make a submission?

The Commission invites representations from any person in relation to the proposed electoral redistribution.

Police search for black ute

POLICE are searching for a vehicle believed to be involved in an aggravated robbery in Whyalla and a petrol drive-off.

A man had his electric bicycle stolen from a shopping centre on Nicolson Avenue, Whyalla Norrie, at about 1.50am last Wednesday, January 17.

The man was uninjured while a black ute drove away from the scene. The vehicle was later found to be a black Great Wall ute, with Western Australian registration of 1EJA123. About 8.40pm on the same day, the vehicle was involved in a petrol driveoff at a service station in Port Augusta.

Police saw the ute at about 11am in Bute on Friday, January 19, and utilised PolAir to search for the vehicle.

The ute was last seen in Port Pirie

with a piece of wire coming out of the back.

Anyone who sees the vehicle in the Yorke Peninsula area is advised not to approach it, but call the Police Assistance Line immediately on 131 444.

Children, pets locked in cars in worrying numbers

RAA is urging drivers to be extra careful with their car keys this summer, as road service data reveals a worrying rise in the number of children and animals needing to be rescued from locked cars in South Australia.

RAA callout data shows 663 kids and pets needed to be freed from locked vehicles by RAA patrols in 2023, a 29 per cent increase on 2022.

Of the 663 callouts, 308 were children and 355 were pets, equating to almost two loved ones being rescued each day.

RAA senior traffic engineer Matt Vertudaches said cars can quickly heat up to more than double the outside temperature.

"You shouldn't be tempted under any circumstances to leave children or animals unattended in a parked vehicle, but especially not in warm weather like we're experiencing now," Mr Vertudaches said.

"In a lot of these instances it's simply because someone has

accidentally locked their keys in their car, which can be easy to do now that many modern cars have keyless entry and ignition.

"We're pleading with drivers to make sure they're aware of where their keys are at all times, to avoid accidentally leaving them in the vehicle with a loved one.

"When the weather is warm this is even more vital because the temperature inside a locked car will climb to dangerous levels within minutes, and the consequences of leaving a loved one in there could be catastrophic." In-car cabin temperatures can rise to more than 80 degrees Celsius within 20 minutes when left in the sun, according to a recent experiment by RAA.

The experiment also showed white cars — often considered to attract less heat than darker vehicles — still rose to more than 70 degrees in the same period.

"No child or pet should be exposed to those sorts of temperatures, and parking in the shade or winding down windows doesn't make much difference either," Mr Vertudaches said.

"If you do find yourself in a situation with a child or pet in a locked car, do your best to remain calm so you don't distress your child or pet.

"Act quickly and call RAA, or SA Police in an emergency."

RAA provides priority service and dispatches two patrol vans to any callout involving a child or animal locked in a vehicle for all South Australians, not just RAA members.

Khai Cowley farewelled at beach funeral service

HUNDREDS of family members and friends gathered to farewell young surfer Khai Cowley at a Seaford beach funeral service held at the Bowl yesterday (Monday, January 22).

The 15 year old, from Maslin Beach, tragically lost his life when he was attacked by a white shark at Ethel Beach in the Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park on Thursday, December 28.

People who attended were encouraged to wear their surf club shirts or casual beach attire in a show of support.

"If you can take something from Khai's passing, live like Khai, truly love with all your heart, don't waste a moment, don't sweat the small stuff and laugh with your mates.

"We love you mate, forever and ever."

Slow uptake of free waste disposal

COPPER Coast Council is encouraging residents to utilise its free waste disposal voucher system.

Council introduced a free delivery of up to 175 kilograms of hard waste at the Resource Recovery Centre, Wallaroo for residents in 2022, adding to the two free green waste vouchers, of up to 175kg each, already available as part of the scheme.

In the past financial year, only 12 per cent of ratepayers utilised their free hard waste disposal and 19 per cent their green waste vouchers.

> It was hoped the initiative would contribute to a reduction in illegal dumping across the region; however, council recorded an increase compared with the previous financial year.

> Director development services Muller Mentz said these figures underscore the importance of people

utilising the waste voucher program.

"Illegal dumping is recorded when delivered at the Resource Recovery Centre (Wallaroo), and while not a fail-safe system, it can give us a good indication (on such activities)," he said.

"In the 2021-22 financial year, just more than 16 tonnes of illegal waste were dumped while, in 2022-23, roughly 23 tonnes were dumped.

"Like all councils, we would like to see our community embrace measures aimed at ensuring waste is composted, recycled or discarded sensibly, such as by using the green and hard waste voucher program.

"Council is keen to maximise the uptake of this important scheme and will explore different ways of promoting the vouchers in the coming year."

Mr Mentz said, despite expecting a better uptake of the vouchers after their implementation last year, council is still confident the program will be a success in the longer term.

"Effectively dealing with green and hard waste is an issue all councils have to address, and we realise Copper Coast residents and ratepayers want to do the right thing and dispose of their waste sensibly," he said.

Residents are required to present a current rates notice or rental statement, along with their driver's licence, to Resource Recovery Centre staff when disposing of their materials to claim the vouchers.

"We knew right from the beginning, the information used by the consultants was generic and didn't apply to Coobowie specifically," he said.

"Our argument will be forever the same, if you want to totally obliterate that beach, then you need to be sure of your data; come here and collect data, and show people there are rising sea levels.

"We thought after our presentation (in December), no one in their right mind could vote for it."

Mr Hooper offered his thanks to council staff and elected members for hearing the concerns of town residents.

"CEO Andrew Cameron and Mayor Darren Braund have been very good to work with, and we thank them both, in particular for their efforts throughout the process," he said.

Fellow member Joylene Hooper said the campaign created a new productive group in the town, and new friendships.

"We're grateful for the support of the community, and to council for being receptive to the argument put forward," she said.

"It's been great to see the community get behind this, because Coobowie can sometimes be a lost town; we're not an Edithburgh and we're not a Stansbury, and people here tend to do their own thing.

"But this has really united the town and suddenly we know everyone who lives in the houses along the foreshore, we didn't know everyone like

that before this.

"We've turned it from being something the community was very worried about, to something which has unified us, and can be cause for positivity going forward."

The group is set to continue, working in conjunction with the Coobowie Progress Association for the continued betterment of the town.

Council will continue exploring coastal defence structures in Foul Bay, Port Clinton, James Well and Pine Point.

Resident supports council decision



FOGO thrown out for good

PLANS for the implementation of a food organics green organics service in the Yorke Peninsula Council region have been unceremoniously dumped.

Elected members have voted not to take up the waste management collection service, citing concerns with costs, potential uptake and effectiveness.

The collection model featured the introduction of fortnightly collection for FOGO, recycling bins and general waste bins for residential homes, while rural/residential properties would have their general waste collected once a week. "I understand why we've investigated it; the costs just don't stack up and also the reduction in services for some of our residents (don't either)," she said.

"I had the opportunity to participate in this (FOGO) when I was in a council in the city and I chose not to (use it) in the end, I was fortunate enough to have a little bit of space so I could compost.

"The system I found didn't work, the kitchen caddies provided for this would liquefy within two to three days, and caused a few issues with bugs inside the home." updated in 2022 after a meeting of state and federal environment ministers, to stipulate all metropolitan households and businesses must have a FOGO service introduced by 2030.

Copper Coast and Barunga West Councils have already introduced FOGO programs, where all three bins are collected fortnightly (for residents only in CCC).

Mayor Darren Braund said it is expected the topic will be brought up again in years to come. PORT Vincent marina resident Charmaine Kimber backed Yorke Peninsula Council's decision not to reclassify the land for car parking.

Ms Kimber said approving a car park on Lot 72 would be nothing short of disastrous and chaotic.

"If a developer can't meet the car parking requirements with their own land, we should not have to give them community land, it's that simple," she said. "The council and individual

Port Vincent marina resident Charmaine Kimber is outraged at the idea of Lot 72 being used for car parking. councillors will lose the faith and trust of the community if this decision is overturned and it would only reinforce what many in the community already think about politics and those elected to represent them.

"Once that community reserve is lost for a car park it will never revert to being a reserve, that land should be there for the benefit of the community and kept as community land for the benefit of future generations."

Dockside project director Peter Villis said the developer Lillis Group remains steadfast in pursuit of its vision for a vibrant and unparalleled regional tourism hub.

"While we are focused on our ongoing development goals, it is with sincere disappointment Lot 72 will not reach its full potential as a public and community space, forming a more compelling landscape statement at the marina entry," he said.

"Numerous marina residents and homeowners have expressed their enthusiastic support for our envisioned contribution to the community land, including community car parking, and emphasising the significance of highlighting the Narungga Well on Lot 72.

"Although the current circumstances are disheartening, we remain committed to our broader vision for Dockside and will continue to explore opportunities to enhance our development's positive impact on the community and the marina's overall landscape."



Currently, general waste bins are collected weekly, yellow recycling bins fortnightly and green organic waste monthly.

It was estimated the introduction of a FOGO system would cost council \$286,321.

Councillor Kylie Gray proposed the motion and said, all things considered, she couldn't endorse the service as presented. Council had been exploring the possibility of implementing the service for some time, and voted in May to defer a decision on the matter until now, pending further information. Justin Lang, of Green Industries SA, and Adam Norsworthy, of Veolia (council's waste contractor), spoke to council about rollouts elsewhere and potential implications, in December.

The issue is complicated by way of the National Waste Policy Action Plan, which was "We've done a lot of investigation on it and I think, while there are many positives, councillors are not convinced it stacks up in two ways," he said. "One is how cost effective it is, but also the environmental factors, such as what it would mean to take organic waste from somewhere on southern Yorke Peninsula to a site outside council's area.

"I know some people have been concerned about the idea, and what it would mean for them, and I think this was reflected in the way councillors voted."

Local projects in line for art awards

THREE recent additions to Yorke Peninsula's large-scale art scene have been nominated for the 2023 Australian Street Art Awards.

Projects at water tanks in Minlacowie and Wool Bay, both completed in the first half of last year, are nominated for Best Mega Mural and Best Rural Art respectively.

The site at Wool Bay features the original town port through to modern day, including local flora and fauna as well as the town's lime kiln, and was completed by Sam Brooks and Harley Hall, with the assistance of Mark Harding, Rachelle Plazeriano and Gary Nowlan.

Minlacowie's tank was completed in just nine days by Mike Makatron, Conrad Bizjak, Dylan Butler and Narungga artist Harley Hall, and displays the four Narungga totems - the Garrdi (emu), Wawi (female red kangaroo), Widhadha (shark) and Wildu (eagle).

"It is an incredible honour that the murals at Minlacowie and Wool Bay have been named as finalists in the Australian Street Art Awards," Yorke Peninsula Council mayor Darren Braund said.

"These murals are captivating with vibrant colours and beautiful artwork and, importantly, both include significant acknowledgement of Narungga history and culture.

"This recognition is a testament to the hard work and dedication of not only the artists but also council staff, elected members and the community which came together to make this project a reality.

"The support from the community and the talented artists involved have been the driving forces behind its success."

Bute's striking silo art is also in the running, with a nomination in the Best Mega Mural category; the work won gold in the Best Rural Art and silver in the Best Mega Mural categories last vear.

Seven years in the making, the Bute artwork was a group effort by the local community, Barunga West Council, and artists Scott Nagy and KrimsOne and the Juddy Roller network.

Mayor Leonie Kerley said the design represents country women and girls, local agriculture, and native plants and birds, while the proud rooster is a nod to Bute sporting clubs.

"It has become a must-visit destination for art enthusiasts, and travellers, especially as it has tapped into a popular national trend of silo art," she said.

"The artwork provides a good reason for tourists on road trips to divert to Bute and discover a charming little town they might not have otherwise seen.

"The artwork provides another drawcard for people to explore the region and helps to boost the local economy.

"It definitely does help to attract people to take the journey and visit our region and what we have to offer."

Mrs Kerley said work has begun to improve accessibility through the parking facilities and walking paths at the silos, with plans in place for a viewing platform.

National gold, silver and bronze winners, as well as each state champion, will be announced at a gala dinner celebration as part of the Art of Sunshine Coast on Friday, March 8.

JUST NET GOOD ENOUGH Safety fears after nets replaced

WALLAROO Swimming and Aquatics Committee members are growing increasingly worried new safety nets installed at the town's swimming enclosure do not adequately protect swimmers.

Copper Coast Council replaced safety netting at the existing Wallaroo Swimming Enclosure as part of its routine maintenance program in early December; however, the nets do not secure the entire length of the facility.

Swimmers said they have seen dol-

phins and a seal in the enclosure in recent times and fear, with increasing shark sightings across the state, it is only a matter of time before one enters the area.

Council has progressed an application for development approval for a new jetty and swimming enclosure, along with an application to the federal government's Growing Regions Program for up to 50 per cent of the estimated \$4.4 million construction cost.

In the interim, council is committed to maintaining the existing infrastructure to ensure the existing enclosure remains a viable facility for locals and visitors to use, a council spokesperson said.

"The (current) swimming enclosure is fixed to the seabed, and while potential repositioning of the enclosure closer to the shoreline is still being assessed by engineers, this would result in a shallower swimming area.

"Council understands this would not be favoured by the community."

WSAC spokesperson Ian Shields said the committee and the community are excited about the progress of council's applications.

"I thank the council in this regard, as these opportunities take considerable time," Mr Shields said.

"Unfortunately, we currently have a safety issue which needs to be rectified."

Mr Shields said he had been in contact with council regarding appropriate solutions to ensure the ongoing safety of swimmers at the facility.

"The community is concerned the new safety net around the wave attenuators, installed in early December, does not secure the swimming enclosure," Mr Shields said.

"It seems like a half effort - the gaps between the attenuators and the foreshore allow access for dolphins, seals and possibly sharks.

"(Fixing the problem) is not a lot to ask for, considering there are sufficient funds available in the swimming enclosure maintenance fund."

The council spokesperson said the facility continues to be well used and reassured the public that the likelihood of any sea life posing a risk to swimmers entering the area is very low.

"The current swimming enclosure provides a general barrier between swimmers, wave action and sea life," the spokesperson said.

"There are no physical shark nets or drum lines in place anywhere along South Australia's coastline.

An udderly fantastic initiative

HAVE you ever wanted to relive the days when milk came in glass bottles?

Partnering with the SAbased Fleurieu Milk Company, Taste the Yorke at Moonta is helping rewind the clock by providing consumers with a sustainable way to purchase milk.

The initiative is made possible thanks to the company's partnership with Tasmanian company The Udder Way, which developed 18 litre kegs capable of safely storing and dispensing milk at individual retail sites.

Customers can make a one-off purchase of an approved glass bottle and fill it at any of Fleurieu Milk Company's 17 supply points across the state.

General manager Nick Hutchinson said the company is excited to be leading the industry in bringing something new to the market.

"We have been trying to work out a way to bring back the glass bottle and create a more sustainable way of processing for quite a few years," Mr Hutchinson said.

"We are very proud to be launching this circular economy project as part of our business model, where customers can play a role in conserving resources and reducing waste.

"You hear a lot of stories about how families used to have glass milk bottles delivered, and the glass milk bottles for breakfast at school,

but obviously the world moves forward."

Taste the Yorke owner Jo Gibbons said she has received a very positive response since launching the program just over four weeks ago.

"It is top of mind for customers these days about how they can be more sustainable, and perhaps the people who know milk used to come in glass bottles are even more excited about the initiative," Ms Gibbons said.

"We're already doing about 20 to 30 litres of milk in glass bottles to our consumers a day.

"That is 20 to 30 customers who have made a conscious decision to buy a bottle, fill it up and bring it back."

Golden farewell for council stalwart

YORKE Peninsula Council operations manager Stephen Goldsworthy has retired amid huge praise, following more than 30 years' service to local government in the region.

Affectionately referred to by most as "Goldy", Mr Goldsworthy's final day was last Thursday, January 18.

He joined the District Council of Central Yorke Peninsula as a gardener in 1992, having started his career in the same position at Woodville Council 12 years earlier, in 1980.

Plea for puppy raisers

COPPER Coast residents have the opportunity to become the first in regional South Australia to help raise guide dogs of the future.

Guide South Dogs Australia/Northern Territory is hoping to recruit 10 puppy raisers from Wallaroo, Moonta, Port Hughes, Kadina and surrounding areas to nurture its next generation of Labrador puppies.

The puppies will be assessed and trained as potential guide dogs for people with low vision or blindness, or as assistance dogs for people with other specialised needs.

Guide Dogs SA/NT dog services operations manager Cindy Chewter said all puppy raisers have been based in Adelaide until now to ensure handlers are able to bring the puppies to the organisation's city offices for regular training and development.

"Now regular training will be provid-

ed on Yorke Peninsula, and we will connect our puppy raisers with an adviser, ensuring we can expand our program and reach a wider group of volunteers across SA," Ms Chewter said.

"This program will also help us to raise awareness of the services which are available to the community, and how we can help people to live their best lives."

Ms Chewter said puppy raisers must integrate a puppy into their daily routine and introduce them to new experiences and environments.

"The aim is to nurture each puppy to become well socialised, confident and focused before they embark on their formal training program," she said.

Puppies begin training from 8 to 10 weeks of age and it lasts for at least a year before they are assessed for suitability for more intensive training.

Ms Chewter said potential puppy raisers must be at aged over 18, have a driver's licence and be strong enough to handle the dogs, which will grow to weigh more than 30 kilograms.

"You must also be able to socialise the puppy in public environments, attend local training sessions, and ensure puppies are not left alone for more than four hours," she said.

"Homes also need to fit certain criteria, including having a secure yard with adequate fencing and you must ensure the puppy can sleep inside."

Kadina resident Neil Cundy got the first of his three guide dogs in 2013 and he said they have been invaluable in helping him retain his independence as his sight deteriorated.

He encourages local people to put their hand up to raise puppies.

"This area offers almost every type of environment and situation needed to train the puppies, except for public transport," he said.

"There are many younger retirees around here who could do a beautiful job of raising a guide dog puppy."

Tourists left wanting more

A POLICY restricting food trucks in Port Broughton to special events could be reassessed by Barunga West Council.

It comes amid concerns local bricks and mortar businesses cannot adequately cater for the summer tourism peak.

Council introduced the policy, which requires food trucks to apply for permits to trade in the tourist precinct of the town's foreshore close to businesses, in December 2022.

BWC chief executive Maree Wauchope said the policy was adopted after reviewing concerns from business owners who had long complained food trucks were stealing business.

A letter from resident Kylie Fielding was tabled at council's January 16 meeting.

She wrote she was pleased to see many visitors in Port Broughton over the Christmas break, enjoying the foreshore, playgrounds and Christmas display.

"Can something please be done by council to assist the local shop-owners during busy holiday periods, so people aren't being turned away and want to come back and spend money in the town?" Ms Fielding wrote.

Ms Fielding said she was also disappointed by the limited opening hours of one cafe and the fact another had recently closed.

Councillor Kim Gregory said the effective ban on food trucks could be revisited to address the challenge of catering for the summer peak of tourists.

"If our shops are not able to keep up, then maybe we have a look at how we can support them and not take anything away," she said.

"When people's eyes are on here more than any other time of the year, we need to make sure that all visitors have been looked after."

Mayor Leonie Kerley said she agreed more food options were needed.

Elected members will discuss the policy at an information session to be held in the Port Broughton council chambers tonight (Tuesday, January 23). Members of the public are welcome.

The festival is named after the Gynburra fish, also known as butterfish or dusky morwong, which has cultural significance and was an important food source for the Narungga people.

This fishing tradition is acknowledged by the Clem Graham Memorial Fishing Competition to be held on Saturday.

Event director Garry Goldsmith said the Gynburra Festival is a celebration of the Narungga people and it recognises their ancestors and relationship to their country.

"We encourage the wider Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal communities to celebrate our wonderful culture over two eventful days," he said.

Festivities start at 11am on Friday, which is designated as Family Fun Day, and will include children's entertainment, food and

art stalls, and live music until 5pm.

Acts will include Torres Strait Islander musician Eddie Peters and dance group Kuma Kaaru, Sonya Rankine and Phil Noel performing as Kuko, Caleb Raymond of Ardrossan, and Sonia Smith.

Family movie, The Snail and the Whale, will be screened in the Port Victoria Memorial Hall from 6.30pm.

Entertainment and attractions will continue on Saturday, which will also offer pampering treats such as hairdressing and a women's yoga session from 10am.

The musical line-up will feature Rikki Wilson and Kirsty Williams, Adelaide singer/songwriter Nancy Bates, Leeroy Johnson and Aimee Volkofsky, international touring singer/songwriter Glenn Skuthorpe, APY Lands hip hop artists DEM MOB, and DJ Sarz.

Presentations for the fishing competition winners will be held from 6.30pm, and the festival will culminate in fireworks from the Port Victoria jetty at 9pm.

Citizen of the Year

Dean Rodda, of Kadina, is the 2024 Copper Coast Council Citizen of the Year.

As a born and bred local, Dean has committed himself to the community in more ways than one.

The former Copper Coast Council councillor and deputy mayor is an active member of Meals on Wheels and the president of the Kadina Croquet Club and Copper Coast Flying Group.

He has also been a dedicated member of the Kadina CFS brigade for almost 50 years.

"Through this, he has served the community by attending house fires, business fires, road accidents, crop fires and bushfires," his nomination read. "Dean has helped save countless properties and lives, including the lives of two young women when he was first on scene at a severe car accident near the Barossa.

"He worked tirelessly on his own to resuscitate and keep them both breathing until the ambulance arrived, then as he left the scene to travel home, he realised he may never know whether either of the girls would live.

"They both sustained life-changing injuries and it was a very close call for them both; however, they survived thanks to him being there."

Dean and his wife Helen are also responsible for the beloved Camelot Garden Stroll tourist attraction, a picturesque garden developed on their acre of land in Kadina.

They opened the garden to the public as a fundraising avenue which supported local charity groups for more than a decade — before its closure last year and raised more than \$150,000 in the process.

"Whatever Dean does, he is committed to it more than 100 per cent, especially when it comes to volunteer work and supporting this community," the nomination read.

"He is an outstanding citizen who prefers to be behind the scenes, but the betterment of our community is always at the forefront of his mind.

"In all roles, with the exception of business and being on council, Dean has been a volunteer, selflessly donating his time, skills and knowledge without any thought of reward, only gaining satisfaction knowing he has helped the community and given his absolute best."

Community Event of the Year

Copper Coast Council's Community Event of the Year is the 2023 Kernewek Lowender Copper Coast Cornish Festival.

The biennial festival, held from Monday to Sunday, May 15 to 21, brought 30,000 visitors to the region to enjoy one or more of the 61 events celebrating the region's traditional Cornish heritage.

"Aside from its tourism value, the festival bolsters community spirit and pride by encouraging local involvement and active participation from all aspects, including preschools, schools, sporting and community clubs, town associations and individuals," the nomination read.

The accolade recognises the role Chloe played as May Queen in the Kernewek Lowender Copper Coast Cornish Festival as well as the work she does for the community in professional and volunteer capacities.

"Showing a maturity beyond her years, she was an integral member of the festival team and worked with people of all ages to showcase and promote all the Kernewek Lowender had to offer," her nomination read.


"As a young woman, she has been a positive role model for future generations and has helped educate the younger generation to understand this wonderful festival and its historical components.



Former Maitland student is Victoria's Aussie of the Year

FORMER Point Pearce local Dr Janine Mohamed (nee Milera) is the 2024 Australian of the Year for Victoria.

The Indigenous health proponent has been recognised for her leadership skills and dedication to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health and wellbeing.

A Narungga Kaurna woman, Dr Mohamed attended Maitland Lutheran School until she was 13 years old, when she was awarded a scholarship to attend Concordia College in Adelaide.

She initially studied nursing at the University of South Australia — where she's now an Adjunct Professor working as a nurse for four years before moving into advocacy and leadership.

Dr Mohamed has been chief executive officer of the Lowitja Institute — Australia's only national institute for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health research — since 2019.

Her accolades include an honorary doctorate in nursing from the Perthbased Edith Cowan University in 2020, and a Distinguished Fellowship from the George Institute for Global Health Australia in 2021.

Dr Mohamed said she was honoured to receive the Australian of the Year Award for Victoria.

"Growing up in my community, there were too many funerals and too many preventable deaths," Dr Mohamed said.

"People like my nanna and mum didn't receive the health care they deserved. "Through this award I will continue to advocate to transform the health system and shine a light on racism and its impacts on our health and wellbeing

"I urge non-Indigenous Australians to reflect on cultural safety in the home, workplace and social settings.

"Challenge your own assumptions, listen to our voices, and support Aboriginal-led decision making because we know what is best for our peoples' health and wellbeing."

Lowitja Institute chairperson Selwyn Button said Dr Mohamed works tirelessly to advocate for justice in health care.

"We are immensely proud she has been recognised for this work," he said.

"The recent (Voice) referendum campaign highlights how important it is to close the gap in health outcomes for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, dismantling racism and embedding cultural safety across our health systems."

Among other roles in her distinguished career, Dr Mohamed served as Congress of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Nurses and Midwives chief executive for five years and has twice been a delegate at the United Nations' Permanent Forum on Indigenous Issues.

She is a regular spokesperson on key topics in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health such as cultural safety, the social and cultural determinants of health, workforce and Indigenous data sovereignty.

"The six players who enjoyed their first experience last championships have been joined by rookies Dillon Branford (Paskeville), Matt Drewer (Yorketown), George



Twenty-year anniversary of Pitt's performance

Highly decorated Stansbury sportsman Adam Pitt was selected by officials as the Arch Grosvenor Outstanding Wicketkeeper Trophy recipient at the 2004 South Australian Cricket Association Country Cricket Championships, the Harry Meyer Cup.

This was Pitt's first trip to the SACA competition as a member of the Yorke Peninsula side, with his performances as a keeper later earning him an SA Outbacks cap at the Australian Country Cricket Champonships.

"The first time I went with the Outbacks was as a keeper to Lismore in 2005," Pitt said.

"I turned up at Stansbury and played for the CMS Crows about a

successive title wins from 2011.

Pitt was a regular member of the side from the summer of 2003-04 until the 2016-17 campaign and was noted for his competitiveness and leadership skills.

He also won the SACA Country Championships fielding trophy at the 2013 tournament.

In the lower Yorke Peninsula cricket competition, Pitt has been a key component of the dominant Stansbury team since the start of the century, playing in 14 titles.

"The club has played in 20 successive grand finals for 16 premierships," Pitt said.

"I've been lucky enough to play in 14 of them, but I did come back to watch the other two wins, whilst travelling around Australia."





Summer weeds spray warning

GRAIN producers have again been prompted to follow best practice and use weather monitoring programs before they spray summer weeds.

Primary Industries and Regions SA issued the reminder as part of its multi-pronged approach to tackle off-target damage from agricultural chemicals.

PIRSA biosecurity investigations and operations manager Michael McManus said producers should ensure they are not spraying during inversion conditions.

He said producers should consider not only their immediate neighbours, but also the potential for spray drift damage further afield when planning to spray.

"Without proper consideration and planning, chemical spraying comes with significant risks, particularly in regard to spray drift which can impact sensitive neighbouring crops, environments and even rural communities," Mr McManus said.

He said there had been a number of instances of damage to growing tips of vines and young vines in the Clare Valley region since early January, which could indicate spray drift damage.

"The department is pleased the public has been active in alerting them to suspected spray drift issues and is currently following up on these reports, including the collection of samples to understand which chemicals caused the damage and whether the alleged spray drift may have been caused by spraying during a hazardous inversion," he said.

"While to date no individual producers have been identified as responsible for the reported

damage, PIRSA will conduct audits on growers in the area where reports have been received to ensure label directions are being followed.

"Given the potential for spray drift impacts to occur quite some distance away from the original spray application site, spray applicators cannot afford to overlook spray drift risks, no matter how far they are from a sensitive crop or neighbouring town," Mr McManus said.

Mr McManus said it is critically important spraying does not take place in inversion conditions, which generally occur from late in the evening and through the night until early morning. "If a hazardous inversion is present or likely to occur, then the advice is 'do not spray," he said.

In 2023, PIRSA investigated 26 reports of off-target impacts by the pre-emergent herbicide Overwatch on Yorke Peninsula in addition to reports from the Mid North.

Anyone can report suspected spray drift incidents to the Agricultural and Veterinary Chemicals Hotline on 1300 799 684.

Reports can be made anonymously, although people are encouraged to share their details so reports can be followed up if necessary. Information about spray operation planning and best practice chemical use, including the industry-endorsed Code of Practice for Summer Weed Control, is available at pir.sa.gov.au/chemical-bestpractice.

The forum is free for members of Grain Producers SA and will feature a range of speakers, including internationally renowned expert in spray drift management, Dr Andrew Hewitt, and weeds expert, Professor Chris Preston.

GPSA chief executive Brad Perry said the forum will provide a comprehensive full-day program of expert speakers and discussions.

"Grain producers can come together to hear from worldrenowned experts and have the important discussions that need to be had on agrichemical application," he said.

"It is positive to see a targeted focus on best spray practices with workshops on the Yorke Peninsula, Mid North, Murraylands and Fleurieu in the coming months and we want to build on that momentum by holding the spray forum.

"GPSA is taking leadership in spray application through our campaign with the tagline 'Don't Spray Your Dollars Away', reminding producers that off-target spray doesn't just impact livelihoods and communities, it can cost that farmer financially."

The forum will cover education and awareness through topics such as social licence, droplets and nozzles, market access, optimising spray effectiveness, hazardous inversions, weather stations and boom sprays.

The one-day forum will be held at the Freeling Agriculture, Recreation & Multi-use Centre on Thursday, March 7.

GRDC working to combat Septoria tritici blotch

GRAINS Research and Development Corporation is working with the NSW Department of Primary Industries and the Australian National University to reduce the impact of the wheat disease Septoria tritici blotch.

Three projects will work to understand the cause of STB, along with identifying genes and testing gene combinations for STB resistance.

If left unmanaged, STB can reduce yields by up to 50 per cent.

Traditional control by fungicides is estimated to cost the Australian wheat industry \$121 million per year; however, it is evolving resistance to some common fungicides including triazoles and strobilurin.

"We are seeking to understand plant pathogen interactions, identify novel resistance genes and optimal combinations of adult plant resistance genes," GRDC genetic technologies officer Prameela Vanambathina said.

"Most wheat varieties are susceptible to STB, leading to increased use of fungicides to control the disease.

"There's a growing fungicide resistance problem, and the identification of new seed sources resistant to Australian pathotypes is crucial.

"We hope these three pro-

jects will provide tools and knowledge essential to reduce the impact of the disease for Australian grain growers.

"Previous GRDC investment with NSW DPI and ANU has already identified genes that can contribute to adult plant resistance to STB," Ms Vanambathina said.

For the first project, Professor Peter Solomon from the ANU will work with colleagues at Birmingham University in the UK to dissect the interaction between key pathogen proteins responsible for virulence and their corresponding host resistance genes in progressing disease.

"The outcomes will significantly advance our understanding of how the fungus Zymoseptoria tritici causes STB," Prof. Solomon said.

"The data generated will be used to develop an approach for screening disease-resistant cultivars."

Project number two aims to discover and transfer novel adult plant resistance genes for STB resistance into wheat breeding programs.

Dr Andrew Milgate from NSW DPI hopes to identify STB-resistant genes under Australian environments.

His objectives include identifying and characterising novel sources of adult plant resistance from international and Australian germplasm pools, validating these genes and transferring the genetic potential into elite Australian wheat lines.

The focus of the third project is testing optimal combinations of STB-resistant genes to identify the best ones, and a smaller number of genes for stable adult plant resistance, Dr Milgate said.

Combining these highquality genes should provide added, more stable protection and ensure the genes continue to be effective against STB, which can evolve new virulence rapidly.

"For breeders to efficiently use the resistance genes we also need to provide them with molecular markers that can be used to track the genes in their breeding programs," Dr Milgate said.

Having molecular markers makes it much faster and more accurate to breed wheat with the desirable resistance genes, meaning new wheat with improved STB resistance can be delivered to growers sooner.

"This is another important component of the projects, to find where the genes are located on the wheat genome and what DNA sequence changes can be used as markers," Dr Millgate said.


Test and evaluation activities involving static firings and/or firings of naval and artillery weapons are conducted at the Proof and Experimental Establishment Port Wakefield throughout the year. The Proof and Experimental Establishment Port Wakefield is a vital Defence test and evaluation capability that has supported Defence since 1929.

These firings may require specific tidal or weather conditions, and are critical for the safety of current and new Defence capabilities. Members of the public may notice noise, vibration, flashes and/or smoke during the testing. There is no risk to the public outside of the gazetted Defence Practice Areas.

For reasons of public safety, there is a permanent exclusion zone covering land, sea and air around the Port Wakefield Establishment. Specific details on the Port Wakefield Prohibited Area can be obtained from Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No GN 26. 4 July 1990, and is shown on the diagram below. Trespassing in this Area is strictly prohibited and very dangerous due to the presence of unexploded bombs. Any person found within the Prohibited Area or on Defence land will be subject to prosecution.

Specific test and evaluation activities may also require restricting public access to the Port Wakefield Defence Practice Areas over specific periods with these areas articulated in the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No. GN 40, 7 October 1992, and also identified on the diagram below. This may affect access to the Gulf of St Vincent at Port Wakefield and Port Parham.





Tax cut speculation: Prime Minister Anthony Albanese has given the strongest hint yet that controversial Stage Three tax cuts will be expanded to help lower-income earners. 

Point Turton: Garfish are schooling from Port Rickaby to Minlacowie and around at Point Souttar and Magazine Bay. Small but just legal King George whiting have been caught from the deep water drops at Corny Point, while the jetty has a few ruff and salmon trout.

Wednesday, January 24: Blue Balesteir departs Wallaroo at 2am.

DAILY: Accolade II arrives at Kelin Point at 7.30am and departs at 12.15pm.

Preparation — clean and devein cooked prawns/scallops and mix gently into a warm garlic sauce, adding salt. Season the steaks and sliced onion and cook on high for 2 mins, turning once. Plate steak, pour over garlic prawns/scallops and serve with a glass of Australian pinot noir.

Wallaroo: Strong south to south-east winds kept blowing along this part of the coast for much of last week. Anglers in small tinnies fished for blueys in the bay, garfish and squid at Myponie Point and just south of the jetty. There is a grain ship at the jetty and another offshore waiting to load. Jetty anglers caught a few night-time tommy ruff (Australian herring) and squid.

Port Hughes/Moonta Bay: Garfish were caught from the jetty at Port Hughes and then from the broken grounds at Rifle Butt Beach and Cape Elizabeth. Blueys and gar came from West Light and Moonta Bay.

Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: Samson fish brightened up the local fishers' days last week, along with sweep, red nannygai and flathead. Squid are in the shallow water around at Sturt Bay, with mullet and 1kg salmon at Daly Head and Pondalowie Bay.

Edithburgh/Stansbury: Large numbers of boat crews fished up and down this part of YP last week as they sheltered from the incessant southerly winds. Gar, squid and blue crabs were caught north of the island, Coobowie and Stansbury to Port Vincent out from The Hut. Local jetties have after-dark gar and squid.

Ardrossan: Rakers are hitting local beaches from Black Point to Tiddy Widdy Beach almost daily as they chase a feed of blueys. Garfish and blueys have been the main reports for boat crews and the town jetty has blueys and squid on occasion.
