LONG-AWAITED works on North Coast Road, Point Turton, officially began yesterday (Monday, January 30).

The first 1.82 kilometres

the unsealed section of road, starting from Point Turton, will be sealed as part of the first stage of the project.

Yorke Peninsula Council received \$1,141,000 for works through the Special Local Roads Program's

Supplementary Local Road Funding.

The total cost of the first stage, to be completed by contractor Downer, is estimated at \$1,711,500, with council contributing \$570,000.



Demise of Flaherty's Beach

I WHOLEHEARTEDLY concur with Roger O'Brien (YPCT 10-1-23).

Flaherty's Beach has been a popular destination for our family and friends for more than 30 years and it is sad to see its demise as a family friendly and safe destination at the hands of the growing number of users who don't seem to appreciate it.

The sandhills area midway between Point Turton and Hardwicke Bay is no longer a standout feature.

It used to be very noticeable from both land and sea but I would estimate in the past three to five years, it has been reduced by approximately one quarter to one third of its previous height and now blends in with the surrounds.

Countless attempts by four-wheel drivers to scale this dune, mostly unsuccessful, have led to this destruction.

I have even witnessed one 4WD ute and camper trailer camped for several nights on the very top of this dune.

Community support

I NOTE a local commercial fisherman has been threatened with a \$5000 fine if he continues to utilise the Port Vincent wharf to unload his catch.

This is contrary to the best interest of residents, visitors and the local economy.

Unloading at Port Adelaide, as has been suggested by Yorke Peninsula Council, is not feasible, counterproductive and discouraging to local enterprise.

If the issue is one of occupational health and safety, then provisions could be made. If it is policy, then it needs to be changed.

As a matter of reference, the beachfront at Port Vincent is already utilised for other than pure recreational usage and includes council-owned business premises and caravan park.

Noting the Department for Infrastructure and Transport has expressed written support for both recreational and commercial use of such facilities, our community would like to know the background leading to this decision.

Namely, under what provision has this threat been made, and what gives a local council the right to impose such a fine contrary to the express intent of the state government?

Finally, has there been any attempt to negotiate an amicable settlement of this issue?

Candidates galore

IT is wonderful to see so many people put up their hands to fill the single vacancy on the Copper Coast Council.

In the lead up to the close of voting, we will give these 11 community-minded individuals a platform to explain why you should give them your vote.

I commend them for putting their hands up as I was honestly worried we might have a similar situation to last year, when there weren't enough candidates.

Whether it was the constant text messages advising of the close of nominations, or the need for a supplementary election in itself, the call has been answered.

I do know a couple of people slightly missed the deadline for last year's election, but you have to wonder if knowing there was one vacancy pushed others to sign up.

This feeds perfectly well into the point made by councils, that the nomination process should be public.

Mayor Roslyn Talbot is taking a motion along a similar line to the Local Government Association AGM in a couple of months

Meanwhile, City of Norwood Payneham and St Peters councillors are calling for a complete shift in local government elections.

They are proposing there be at least two years between state and local voting, to eliminate voter fatigue.

We did have three elections in one year, the first time since 2010 this has happened.

I wonder too if voter fatigue was also a contributing factor to the lack of nominations for councils.

But, all 10 councils which were required to hold a supplementary election received enough nominations, although some only attracted the same number of vacancies it possessed, meaning they don't have to have an election.

There's still more to be done to try and create more interest in local government and its importance in our communities.

Maybe changing the voting calendar is a way to do that.


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

Stage one works begin on North Coast Road

EARTHWORKS, sealing, stormwater management road delineation and the installation of traffic control devices will all be completed as part of the project.

"Council is excited to see works finally underway on this popular tourist route which connects to stunning beaches and our popular bush camping sites," YPC mayor Darren Braund said.

"The stretch of road is also home to about 150 residential properties and, in recent times due to increased road use, tourists and residents have complained about the road's deteriorating condition.

"This project will enhance road safety, improve the road standard, reduce the dust nuisance and impact on residents, improve access to a popular tourist destination, and improve the driving experience for locals and visitors." Downer project manager Leigh Schiller said they looked forward to working closely with YPC.

"(This work) will significantly upgrade the road with pavement improvements and sealing to help ensure safe, efficient and reliable journeys," he said. "This project will also alleviate the dust issues locals have experienced living on an unsealed road.

"We are proud to support the communities we operate in, and will look to create opportunities for local service providers and suppliers." Works are expected to be completed between April and May, weather permitting.

Stage two is expected to include a similar seal length to the first stage while stage three won't include sealing but will create a better surface for the remainder of the road.

Swimming enclosure to hit Supreme Court

COPPER Coast Council is taking the contractors of its failed Wallaroo swimming enclosure to court.

Council lodged a statement of claim in the Supreme Court against contractor SeaSlip and three subcontractors to the value of \$1.6 million after mediation between the parties failed. SeaSlip constructed a floating

swimming facility in 2017 after storms the previous year destroyed the jetty structure.

But the pontoon system had a series of failures and legal proceedings began with mediation in October 2019.

It comes as dozens of residents gathered last Thursday, January 26 to call for a new swimming jetty at the Wallaroo foreshore.

Wallaroo Swimming and Aquatic Group members Jan Paull, Chris Wall and Julie Donnell organised the gathering and were pleased with the turnout.

"We wanted to make the general public aware that we're still trying to get something back in action and we've been trying for more than two years," Ms Wall said "Council found out what people want through consultation but nothing has happened, no engineers have been up to visit."

Ms Paull said she acknowledged the work done by council CEO Russell Peate on the matter.

"But that work has been around getting funding, which isn't our issue," she said.

"An engineering report has been done, but they haven't actually been up here to look at the site, and we haven't met with them.

"Now council is saying it's doing more consultation around the foreshore, but we don't know where the swimming jetty fits into that.

"How can the project be shovel ready if we're still doing consultation, if the engineers haven't actually been on site?

"We're not disputing the hard work of council; we just want to be ready when money is available."

Mr Peate also attended the rally, which led to a terse interaction with the group.

Attendees asked Mr Peate for details around a future facility's location, to which he replied that the information had been made available to them.

"This group is the most unappreciative, ungrateful and entitled group I have dealt with (during) more than four years in dealing with numerous community groups," he said. 'There was a volume of work done and information in the (now defunct) Building Better

Regions Fund Round 6 application — the JPE consultation was used and will be used again for the new Growing Regions Program.

"The WGA engineers' plans, engineering details, location and detailed costing will be used again.

"The Hudson Howell economic assessment will be reworked and used again, the previous Round 6 application will be reworked and used again.

"I have met 17 times with the swimming and aquatic group, I have sent all funding applications to them, especially the Round 6 application with all of the information."

Council requested \$1.6m from the federal government, which Mr Peate said was about six per cent of council's total rates.

"Our five-year transport plan for roads, footpaths and stormwater is worth \$26,142,856," he said.

"I believe it's incumbent on council to do its best to obtain \$1.6m in federal funding for a new aquatic facility when the criteria and guidelines (for the Regions Growing new Program) are released. "The same amount of money (from council's budget) could undertake some much-needed footpaths, stormwater and roads."

COMMERCIAL fisherman Jordan Judd has been told by Yorke Peninsula Council he's not permitted to utilise the Port Vincent wharf to load and unload his boat, leaving him bereft of options to conduct his business.

Mr Judd, who recently purchased a Minlaton shopfront asset for his business JDF Seafood, was told it was unsafe to utilise trucks and forklifts on the wharf but was shown no proof when this was requested.

However, YPC CEO Andrew Cameron has maintained the major issue has always been about the structural integrity of the wharf and safety of the community.

Mr Judd said he had been fishing in Yorke Peninsula waters for 10 years and, having now invested locally, going to Adelaide regularly instead as recommended, wasn't viable.

"I started using the wharf in April 2021 when I got a bigger boat and they (YPC) basically said, we've had some complaints from people who don't want you using it," Mr Judd said.

"I said, I invested in my business here on Yorke Peninsula, and they said 'well, you should've thought of this before you invested in the business' and then I was told to go to Adelaide.

"From there I got a few cautions from council and they threatened to fine us \$5000 if we used it (the wharf) again for anything." Mr Judd said he put together a safety management plan for using the wharf and an application to use his vehicles, but it was denied on January 6, 2023. Bollards and railings had been installed around the entrance to the wharf to ensure vehicles could no longer gain access. Mr Judd said instead of just selling his fish in a storefront or sending it off to Adelaide and Melbourne, the community had shown interest in buying it at the wharf. "We'd pull up to unload ... and then we'd have people come up and ask to buy fish... so we decided to get a float and a PayWave set up. "During the last one we did about 53 sales within the hour, but we only did it while unloading; as soon as we were done, we'd pack up and leave.

was just a big community feeling around it." Boat ramps and other local facilities are unable to be used because Mr Judd's boat, 12 metres

long, is too large. Mr Judd said he hoped YPC would see the community supported what he was doing and change its decision, even if it brought with it a fee.

Mr Cameron said council became aware Mr Judd was accessing the Port Vincent wharf to load, unload and refuel to avoid traveling to Port Adelaide, where his vessel had been operating from, in 2021.

"Everyone in the community loved it; there

wharf is not in a good enough structural condition to have vehicles driving on it, and yet Mr Judd has continued to use cars, trailers, a forklift, and even had a fuel tanker back onto the wharf to fill his boat until we installed bollards to stop that activity," he said.

"Mr Judd first enquired about accessing either the Edithburgh or Marion Bay jetties in 2019 after purchasing a larger boat."

Mr Cameron said council recommended using the Edithburgh jetty; however, due to no load ratings on the jetty for vehicles, hand trollevs were proposed to load and unload.

"Alternatively, council suggested if Mr Judd wanted to pursue the use of vehicle loading and unloading on the Edithburgh jetty that he seek engineer certification," he said.

Take caution in school zones

RAA has urged motorists to take extra care on the roads as most of South Australia's 280,000 students return to school this week (from Monday, January 30).

Between 2016 and 2021, 208 pedestrians and cyclists aged 18 and under were injured, with one losing their life, in road crashes during the typical morning and afternoon school drop-off and pick-up period.

RAA senior traffic engineer Matthew Vertudaches said motorists needed to take extra care as students returned to footpaths, bike lanes and roads.

"Pedestrians – especially young children - are among the most vulnerable road users," Mr Vertudaches said.

"Young children aren't as familiar with the road rules as drivers, so

there is a shared responsibility to help keep them safe.

"We're urging motorists to observe the 25km/h limit when students are present in school zones.

"Drivers should be alert for children at these locations and be ready to stop to avoid a collision it's important to remember school zones still apply, even outside school hours.

"If you have to drop off your children at school on the way to work, remember to do the right thing – encourage them to exit on the left side of the vehicle.

"Traffic also increases significantly with the return to school, so all commuters should allow some additional travel time if they've been leaving later over the past couple of weeks."


The Lightning, took the court in their yellow kit for the THINK! Road Safety Round against Southside Flyers on Saturday, January 28.



VAD laws take effect from today

COUNTRY South Australians have been reassured they will be able to access voluntary assisted dying measures.

Residents with terminal illnesses can make a first request to access VAD as of today (Tuesday, January 31).

If granted, the patient will be assessed for eligibility by a trained coordinating medical practitioner and a second independently trained consulting practitioner.

The patient is required to make three separate requests for VAD — one of which will need to be a written and witnessed request.

A final review is required before applying for the permit, to ensure the application complies with the safeguards in the legislation.

Once granted, the patient will be able to obtain medication for self-administration or, in certain cases, administration via a medical practitioner.

An SA Health spokesper-

son said all South Australians would have access to VAD, no matter where they lived.

She said a dedicated VAD liaison nurse had been appointed for regional SA to connect patients with doctors and ensure appropriate support is provided throughout the process.

"Telehealth can also be used to conduct appointments during the assessment stage of the process," the spokesperson said.

"The South Australian VAD Pharmacy Service will deliver the VAD medication to eligible people anywhere in South Australia.

"Training continues to be available to doctors and we encourage local doctors who want to participate in voluntary assisted dying to register."

Patients and medical practitioners would be supported along the VAD pathway by dedicated teams including pharmacists, care navigators and the VAD Review Board.

The state government has committed more than \$18 million over five years to

support safe access to VAD. More than 70 doctors have now registered and are completing mandatory training required to conduct eligibility assessments for VAD, including 30 doctors who have completed the training and are ready to provide assessments from today.

An interim nursing director has been appointed to oversee five care navigators, comprising nurses and allied health professionals.

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis cautiously welcomed the introduction of VAD as a positive step for terminally ill people who qualified for the scheme.

However, he said he had genuine fears about safeguards to ensure people at the end of their lives did not suffer foul play.

Mr Ellis invited constituents with questions about VAD to contact his office.

Relief for local campaigner

THE landmark introduction of voluntary assisted dying in South Australia today (Tuesday, January 31) follows many years of community advocacy, including a campaign led by Kadina local Bec Rowan.

A petition created by Mrs Rowan attracted more than 700 signatures.

Mrs Rowan watched her father, Greg Schultz, die in prolonged agony and fear after two long years.

She was also motivated to campaign for VAD by the death of her uncle Robert "Dusty" Miller, who was allergic to pain medication and suffered greatly before dying in Wallaroo Hospital in 2018.

"We are incredibly relieved people can now have access to VAD," Mrs Rowan said. "It will mean a lot to the people who are suffering and it will reduce the trauma for them and for their family and friends." However, Mrs Rowan said she was

concerned about barriers to access VAD for people in country SA.

She said the SA Voluntary Assisted Dying Implementation Taskforce chairperson Dr Chris Moy had expressed concerns about Commonwealth legal constraints on the use of a carriage service (including telephone or internet) to "counsel,

promote or provide instruction on suicide". "I sincerely hope there is a vast increase in the number of doctors registered for VAD in SA in the near future, especially in regional areas, and any barriers hindering use of telehealth to assist patients to carry out VAD can be overcome swiftly," Mrs Rowan said.

Country Cabinet booked in for Wallaroo

THE state government's Yorke Peninsula Country Cabinet will be held at the Wallaroo Community Sports Club, on Wednesday, February 15.

Premier Peter Malinauskas, state government ministers and senior department executives will be on hand to chat with the community at a barbecue from 5pm, before a forum begins at 6pm.

The Country Cabinet meeting is just one part of a two-day trip to the region with stops at various locations around the peninsula expected on Wednesday and Thursday, February 16.

"Country Cabinet is an excellent opportunity for our ministers and depart-

ments to hear from local communities across our great state about what is important to them," Mr Malinauskas said.

"The Yorke Peninsula is an important contributor to South Australia's economy, and I'm looking forward to coming back for another visit."

Initially established by Labor following the 2014 election, but scrapped by the previous Liberal government in 2018, Country Cabinet meetings provide a chance for the government to hear from the regions.

Due to limited capacity, registration for attendance is required, and can be done at https://www.dpc.sa.gov.au/ responsibilities/cabinet-and-executivecouncil/country-cabinet, or by scanning the QR code pictured.

Soaring interest for final Copper Coast councillor

A FIELD of 11 candidates will vie for the final seat on the Copper Coast Council.

Just eight people nominated for nine positions during the state-wide local government elections last year, triggering a supplementary election.

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said she was pleased to see so many people interested, yet disappointed it took a second election to reach this number of nominations.

"Council could've at least had all nine positions filled by now if nominations were public (in the main election)," Mrs Talbot said.

"However, we've had a nice number of nominations this time and the range of different people will give residents a choice.

"I don't think people realised how much opportunity there was (to be on council) before.

"I'm sure all candidates have great community interest, so no doubt they're all worthy of the position.

"Public voting (which begins from February 15) is important because it's an opportunity to have a say on the decision makers of your community."

An Electoral Commission of South Australia spokesperson said it was encouraging to see the number of people who wanted to make a difference on the Copper Coast.

"ECSA and the councils worked together to ensure all members of the community were aware of the upcoming supplementary elections and the role councillors play in their local communities," the spokesperson said.

"This coordinated campaign encouraged people to stand up and have their say."



Platfarm has invested in Open AgMaps, an open mapping platform which works with viticulture and fixed row crop growers to create digital smart maps of their farms.

Mapping can be used for compliance and accreditation, and when done at scale can also help to improve regional data.

"As a regional woman myself, it's fantastic to see the five finalists are accomplished women, doing great things for their local communities and for South Australia's regions," Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven said.

"The Government of South Australia is proud to support initiatives that recognise and celebrate the efforts, influence, and diversity of women in regional and rural areas."

The state winner will be announced in May and will receive a \$15,000 Westpac grant to help progress their winning project, as well as access to professional development opportunities and alumni networks.

South Australia's winner will represent the state at the national awards later this year.

"In 2016, Letitia and her committee coordinated the first Adelaide Silver Style event raising \$75,000 in support of the Ovarian Cancer Research Foundation," an awards spokesperson said.

"Determined to build on her daughter's work, Madelyn and her supportive committee members staged successful fundraising gala events across 2018 and 2019.

"Madelyn then went on to establish the not for profit, South Australian based charity, Letitia Linke Research Foundation Inc.

"The foundation aims to increase overall community awareness of the signs and symptoms of ovarian cancer and to raise funds that supports research to find an early detection test and more directed and personalised treatment for women with ovarian cancer.

"Drawing on her background as a senior healthcare manager in pathology, Madelyn leads a team of dedicated volunteers.

The Letitia Linke Research Foundation is currently funding two research projects at the University of South Australia, one working on an early detection test and the other focused on patient-specific treatment.

Minister for Women Katrine Hildyard congratulated Madelyn and other winners on their awards.

"And I thank them for their remarkable and tireless work - work which makes an important difference in the lives of others, strengthens our community, breaks down barriers and advances the rights, wellbeing and engagement of girls and women," she said.

Story behind Corny's anchor rises from depths

THE mystery appearance of a large anchor at Corny Point caused much confusion last week, but the men behind its raising simply wanted to add to the town's history.

Almost as soon as the anchor appeared on Monday, January 23, it was gone, with no sign of it the following morning, Tuesday, January 24.

Local fishermen Murray Williams, Ryan Taylor and Tim Piller had raised the anchor from where Mr Williams had been aware of its presence for decades.

"As a commercial fisherman, I first saw it while I was looking for squid, just going around on a calm day and you could see it on the bottom," he said.

"It was a spur of the moment thing, we'd talked about it for years but never got around to doing anything, but Ryan had a hooking apparatus for diving and we took it from there.

"My only intention was bringing it up and donating it to the community and putting it on show at Dunn Point.

"We left it there (on the beach) for the day before we saw the huge local speculation it had caused so we thought we had better go and get it again."

The anchor has been offered to the Corny Point Progress Association to be added to the town's historical collection; however, a decision on accepting the offer hasn't been made yet.

"Murray offered it to us

because he thought we would like it, which we would; however, we're aware it's going to cost us an arm and a leg," progress association secretary Trevor Tiller said.

"They're going to pass it on for free, but it's known relics like this will deteriorate rapidly if not treated in the correct manner, which will come at a cost.

"The first step in the process would be to submerge it in salt water until treatment can begin; information about the recommended process is being provided and businesses which specialise in this work will be contacted."

Department of Environment and Water senior maritime heritage officer Mark Polzer said there were no legal issues with what had happened.

"It certainly appears to be a historic anchor, a large, iron admiralty anchor with an iron stock," he said.

"It probably weighs around 500 kilograms and would have come from a large vessel.

"The State's Historic Shipwrecks Act 1981 only protects historic shipwrecks and associated artefacts/relics (and) the anchor and any other underwater cultural heritage would be protected if it came from Commonwealth waters."

Federal grant enriches STEM education

EXTRA funding from the federal government will help Flinders University support hundreds of female year 9 students in South Australia and the Northern Territory to build their future education and career opportunities

The Flinders University science, technology, engineering and mathematics enrichment academy received the \$996,144 grant through the latest round of the Women in STEM and Entrepreneurship program.

It will ramp up the successful academy's outreach in regional and suburban schools, to target a further 1000 schoolgirls through specially adapted STEM enhancement courses, as well as supporting a new diploma course for up to 150 secondary school STEM teachers.

"We are aiming to engage thousands of girls by giving them and their teachers real world insights into the career and education pathways possible via STEM studies," Flinders University's STEM Enrichment Academy director and lead chief investigator Professor of Physics Maria Parappilly said.

"We hope to increase the gender balance in occupations such as engineering, mathematics and other career pathways by equipping female students with fresh insights into the potential and excitement of STEM subjects, including with industry placements and hands-on skills enrichment."

More than 90 per cent of female participants in the first year of the program have gone on to study advanced STEM subjects in their senior years of high school education.

"We want to make sure more women find lasting, rewarding and successful careers in STEM fields, regardless of their background," Federal Minister for Industry and Science Ed Husic said.

Flinders University has hosted more than 500 year 9 schoolgirls and their teachers at STEM conferences, enrichment days and a technology series since 2018.

Harvest Christian College, Kadina, attended last year's STEM Academy conference and teacher James Snudden said the conferences inspired him to promote STEM careers and tertiary pathways to his students.

"All four of the year 9 students who attended the 2019 conference are now studying physics and specialist mathematics as year 11 students," he said.

"I have also attended the dedicated teacher professional development sessions which have given me training and access to resources that have helped improve my classroom delivery of STEM content."









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Praise for YP fire response

YORKE Peninsula grain growers have been praised for their ongoing co-operative response to tackling grass fires during harvest and urged to make further adaptations to the new system for calculating fire danger conditions.

During summer 2022-23, South Australia's voluntary Harvest Code of Practice was transitioned from the state-based Grasslands Fire Danger Index to the new national Fire Behaviour Index, so growers could make their calculations based on either index during this harvest.

Yorke Valley CFS Group Officer and Agery grain grower Andrew Cadd said the new system was working well and he was confident about next harvest.

"The Harvest Code of Practice is a balance between potential financial losses for the farmer and community safety," he said.

"Prior to this new system being put into practice, there was some concern we would lose more days for harvesting."

The FBI was introduced on September 1 as part of the new Australian Fire Danger Rating System, changing the calculation methodology and key cut-off value for grain harvest to cease at FBI 40; previously, the index and cut-off value was stipulated as GFDI 35.

The FBI is a combination of chart and requires users to feed temperature, relative humidity and wind speed measurements.

If all of these factors produce a rating of 40 or more, conditions are considered too dangerous to harvest.

Mr Cadd said the code was not designed to eliminate all fires at harvest time, but to identify conditions which meant that, if a fire did break out, it could be brought under reasonable control with nearby equipment.

"We are working on actual weather conditions on the ground, on our properties, not the (Bureau of Meteorology) forecast and that is the beauty of the Harvest Code of Practice," he said.

However, Mr Cadd encouraged growers to invest in weather stations and use the online app linked to the FBI to ensure their calculations of fire danger were more accurate.

Weather stations should be installed at a height to measure wind speed at 10 metres above ground level, whereas hand-held meters take wind speed measurements at roughly 2m above ground level. Under the FBI, measurements taken at 2m must be fed into the AURORA Landgate app, which then converts that measurement into a 10m equivalent.

Unlike the old formula, the FBI cannot be calculated by a simple

their readings into the app, which is linked to CFS and Grain Producers SA.

"Once a fire starts, fire behaviour is greatly affected by the speed and direction of wind at 10m above ground level," Mr Cadd said.

Mr Cadd said the Harvest Code of Practice had been designed to be simple to use when it was introduced more than 20 years ago.

"We didn't have a vast array of technology then and it was all designed around a hand-held meter, which was held 2m above the ground, depending on how tall you are," he said.

Mr Cadd said Yorke Peninsula farmers were well equipped and responsive to fires and had repeatedly demonstrated their willingness to help out neighbours.

"It's not unusual to have 20 to 30 farm fire units turn up to help put out a harvest fire," he said.

"I don't care if it's a CFS truck, a pink truck or a white truck.

"We work together pretty well here on the peninsula."

Grain Producers SA CEO Brad Perry said GPSA would seek input into the comparison between the FBI and the FDI.

"We are looking to achieve the right numbers that both farmers and the public can have confidence in," he said.

GrainGrowers calls for federal budget support

GRAINGROWERS has called on the federal government to use the next budget to invest in the grains sector to enable job creation and support strong rural and regional communities.

GrainGrowers has used its pre-budget submission to detail funding across areas ranging from farm inputs, infrastructure, trade and market access to biosecurity, taxation, and sustainability.

GrainGrowers chairperson Rhys Turton said funding initiatives to improve the operating environment for Australian grain growers would meet the government's focus on building economic capacity and resilience.

The submission details a range of hoped-for investments, such as a significant upgrade in funding for freight networks and regional roads, including \$1 billion over four years through the Regional Infrastructure Recovery program, and additional trade and market access funding of \$85.9 million for the Agri-Business Expansion Initiative.

GrainGrowers is also calling for increased opportunities for domestic manufacture of fertiliser, chemicals, fuel, and spare parts and the development of fitfor-purpose visa arrangements, inclusive of the skills requirements of the grains sector, and the allocation of funds for programs and infrastructure to

deliver better safety outcomes for the grains sector.

Mr Turton said the value of the grains industry to the Australian economy delivered real value to future government investment.

"As an industry, we are a powerhouse of regional Australia with 22,500 farm businesses directly employing 34,000 workers each season and thousands more employed across the supply chain," he said.


"From an estimated 31 million hectares, we grow 65 million tonnes of grains, oilseeds and pulses each year, contributing over \$20 billion gross value of production to the Australian economy."

"In short, grain growers significantly contribute to the wellbeing of our regions and the national economy.

Mr Turton said the prebudget submission identified a range of opportunities that could make a difference to the growers and wider industry.

"Ongoing investment in the specified areas will allow grain growers to continue to adapt to current challenges and opportunities and to reliably provide high-quality grains, oilseeds and pulses to Australia and the world," he said.

"From a government perspective, this funding also represents the potential for a significant return on this investment," Mr Turton said.

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Don't drift off — think before spraying

WITH the wet spring, and ongoing cooler heading into summer, growers are reminded to consider not only their immediate neighbours but the potential for spray drift damage well away from their properties when planning spraying operations in coming weeks.

With a wet 2021-22 summer leading to spray drift impacts, the Department of Primary Industries and Regions is again emphasising the need for growers to ensure they are following label directions, best practice advice and closely monitoring conditions.

PIRSA warned it would pursue any instances of deliberate or negligent use of chemicals in contravention of label instructions.

Offences carry a maximum penalty of \$35,000, reflecting the seriousness of not following mandatory label instructions.

PIRSA will also be proactive with auditing to identify any poor spraying practices this season. "Without proper consideration and planning, chemical spraying comes with significant risks, particularly in regard to spray drift which can impact sensitive neighbouring crops, environments and even rural communities," a PIRSA spokesperson said.

Information to assist growers is available through the Chemical Best Practice page on the PIRSA website and Grain Producers SA's Keep your droplets to yourself campaign.

PIRSA Plant and Food Standards general manager Dr Ross Meffin said absolute diligence was required when planning and applying sprayed chemicals to avoid drift.

"Even now, with improved information and resources available – including new weather station technology – and the implementation of larger droplet size requirements on labels, chemical users still need to pay attention to the details of their spray activities, including having the right chemical required for the job and being up to date on potential weather conditions," he said. "It is of critical importance no spraying should occur under hazardous inversion conditions which generally exist from late evenings, right through the night until early morning.

"If a hazardous inversion is present or likely to occur, then the advice is do not spray."

Grain Producers SA CEO Brad Perry said chemical application standards and practices had significantly improved in recent years and were followed by most growers.

"It only takes the actions of a minority of poor operators to cause significant damage, and threaten major markets with residue detections from spray drift," he said.

He urged growers to adhere to the industry-endorsed Code of Practice for Summer Weed Control and encouraged communities of growers to work together through the Keep your droplets to yourself campaign to further minimise spray drift risks.

Annual grain survey highlights long-term industry confidence

MORE than 80 per cent of grain producers who participated in the Grain Producers SA Annual Grain Producer Survey are positive about the longterm future of the industry.

The GPSA Annual Grain Producer Survey Insight Report 2022, released late last year, provides a unique perspective of the major challenges and opportunities as seen by grain producers in South Australia.

GPSA CEO Brad Perry said the annual survey found operating costs were by far the biggest challenge in 2022.

Wallaroo: Anglers fishing the old artificial tyre reef and south of the Magazine grounds before the weekend rains caught squid, snook, blueys and garfish with Riley Shoals also producing gar, snook and squid. Jetty anglers landed blue crabs, overnight tommy ruff (Australian herring) and squid as the jetty lights appeared.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Big garfish were caught at Cape Elizabeth, West Light and Tipara Reef, while anglers in smaller tinnies fished off Coopers and Rifle Butts Beaches for yellowfin whiting, garfish and blueys. Jetty-based fishing produced late-afternoon yellowfin whiting, tommies the blue line at Burners Beach.

Edithburgh/Stansbury: The deep water grounds off Troubridge Island and the Orontes Bank produced large whiting, blue morwong and gummy sharks. Snook took lures out from Sultana Passage, Wattle Bay and around at Port Moorowie when conditions permitted. Rocky Gully had small KG whiting and the jetties had blue crabs, squid and tommy ruff.

Ardrossan/Black Point: Rakers were sighted at many local beaches as the school holidays drew to a close. Big boat crews running to the northern end of Gus Shoal and Long Spit picked up KG whiting, snook and a few blueys. There were reasonable catches of gar and squid south of the old town boat ramp. The jetty had yellowfin whiting and mullet.

Aussies clinch quad series

THE Australian Diamonds are Quad Series champions, winning all matches during the championship in Cape Town. South Africa, Australia, England and New Zealand contested the title across January 21 to 25.

Yorketown's Sarah Klau started as goal keeper for Australia in match one against England, helping her side to a 65-55 win. Klau was responsible for one rebound

and was penalised twice. The Diamonds played New Zealand on day two, with Klau working hard to stop the damage Grace Nweke was causing and helping Australia to a 59-57 win.

Klau was important in game three against South Africa, recording two gains and an intercept in the second quarter alone.

Australia won 65-48, earning the right to play New Zealand again in the final.
