Bay Road finished

Fin Hansen REPORT BY

A NEW-LOOK Bay Road, Moonta Bay, has reopened to the public.

Asphalt sealing marked one of the final stages of Copper Coast Council's major infrastructure

upgrade, which included road widening, new central turning lanes, additional kerbing and median strips, as well as stormwater rectification.

The roadworks were completed at a cost of almost \$6 million, which was helped by \$2.19m from the state government and some federal funding.

Director infrastructure services Tim Neumann said the closing stages included side road tie-ins, median islands, as well as concrete and loam infills.

'The continuing SA Water upgrade (along Milne Terrace) postponed the completion of (the section near) Kitto Road and a section of the shared path,"

Mr Neumann said.

"Reinstatement works and sealing of the section were completed after we were forced to complete a third asphalt mobilisation, which we didn't plan for due to the SA Water works.

"Final works behind the kerb and up to property boundaries are com-

plete, including stormwater drainage, crusher fines placement and shared path installation.

"Final touches were additional works to Hughes Avenue, the Kitto Road tie-in, line marking, signage and landscaping the loamed-filled median islands."

Jetty questions

WE read the article Planning for an upgraded Wallaroo foreshore (YPCT 20-12-22) with frustration and disappointment as the Copper Coast Council engages yet another designer, Hatch Design, to prepare a plan for the swimming enclosure.

JPE Design Studio had already been engaged by council to have public consultation and to generate a concept, including the jetty pool enclosure, and other stages, through to the Office Beach.

Engaging another will be another expense, money council apparently does not have.

Our group, Wallaroo Swimming and Aquatics, has been working with the mayor and CEO for the resurrection of the Wallaroo swimming jetty for more than two years now.

In March 2021, councillors passed unanimously that Wallaroo Swimming Enclosure proceed with a Prudential Review undertaken. This information was forwarded to Adam

Bolton, Maritime Constructions, for their thoughts. Adam suggested council contact WGA

Engineers to discuss a potential design. Members of our group, together with council CEO Russell Peate, had a video conference with David McKay from WGA Engineers on December 17, 2021.

Following this, Mr Peate was to meet with David, who would come up to Wallaroo to assess the area prior to drawing up the plans.

Worst roads

IMAGINE you are travelling along a country road, and you're jolted as your car tyre lurches in and out of a deep pothole.

It's unfortunately an all too familiar experience for many across regional South Australia.

Now imagine you are in a truck loaded with grain and your tyre dips in and out of that same pothole.

Not only does that hole get bigger, but the safety of the truck driver (and others on the road), as well as his load of grain is potentially at risk.

For far too long, the South Australian grain industry, which is expected to contribute almost \$4.5 billion to the state's economy from the 2022-23 harvest, has been forgotten when it comes to road maintenance, repair and upgrade.

For this reason, Grain Producers SA held the Worst Grain Road campaign to find the route in the poorest condition in the state.

Almost 60 different roads across the state were nominated; however, it was the Upper Yorke Road on Yorke Peninsula, Nine Mile Road in the Murraylands and Worlds End Highway in the Mid North which were voted the top three Worst Grain Roads.

Comments from grain producers and truck drivers to go with the submissions should have decision makers immediately concerned and, in fact, I'd be worried if they weren't already concerned.

As one grain producer put it when commenting on the Upper Yorke Road, "It's a prime agricultural area which is producing millions of dollars in grain and sheep, yet we've got a third-class road to travel on".

During the campaign we heard some heavy vehicle drivers are having to veer onto the opposite side of the road to avoid bumps, potholes and undulating surfaces.

These roads are key freight routes for South Australian grain producers which transport significant volumes of produce, ultimately providing a return to the state's economy.

The lack of investment into our federal, state and local government run roads, results in grain producers losing productivity, as well as putting themselves and the safety of other road users at risk due to the poor conditions of these roads.

The total road maintenance backlog in South Australia was estimated to be at almost \$800 million in 2020 and growing by \$100m every year.

It's high time that improvements are made, so GPSA is calling on immediate investment into the top 10 Worst Grain Roads in South Australia. Brad Perry,



Bay Road completed

THE Bay Road, Moonta Bay, minus a few final touches and additional works on Hughes Avenue and Kitto Road.

It's been quite some time since the idea of upgrading the tourist thoroughfare was floated, with Copper Coast Council allocating money to the project across a number of years.

This was boosted by state and federal funding for various components, helping the almost \$6 million project to finally go ahead.

Unfortunately, it's not been smooth sailing.

Despite several rounds of consultation, people remain unhappy with the design of the road.

Three initial ideas were put out for comment, with the community at the time highlighting needs for bike lanes, walking paths, upgraded gutters and underground powerlines.

Councillors endorsed plans in 2019 with works, including the trial and ultimate closure of Frances Terrace beginning in 2020.

While council would be happy to have delivered on such a big project, the timeline for works did blowout.

In some instances, this couldn't have been helped as works were dependent on other organisations.

I know some people still have concerns about the road, particularly about the median strips and width of the lanes.

This was always going to happen. I realise some people no longer can

simply access their driveways from the road and that will be an inconvenience.

While it's not a matter of aesthetics over usability, it is nice to now have a safe drive down to one of the Copper Coast's finest spots.

PBS medicines now cheaper for many

FOR the first time in 75 years, the copayment for Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme listed medicines has dropped.

The federal government announced its decision to lower the maximum copayment of medicines by \$12.50 to \$30 per prescription from January 1.

This means the maximum nonconcessional patients, known as general patients, will co-pay for medicines listed on the PBS fell from \$42.50 to \$30.

The drop applies to all Australian residents who hold a current Medicare card, but who are not entitled to any concessions, including a Health Care Card.

Visitors from countries with which Australia has a Reciprocal Health Care Agreement can also access the PBS.

Newbery Chemist managing director and member of the Pharmacy Guild of Australia Tim Gross welcomed the change.

"It's fantastic news, especially when the cost of living has gone through the roof," Mr Gross said.

"Any change the federal government can bring about to make medicines more affordable is a positive move. "The biggest group of people who will benefit from this change will be non-concessional patients who need to take regular medicines on an ongoing basis, such as those to treat diabetes, cholesterol and high blood pressure.

"Once you start on those medicines, you have to keep going."

A national survey commissioned by the Pharmacy Guild in 2022 revealed the affordability of health care was the biggest hip pocket concern among polled voters.

The co-payment reduction was an election promise by the Labor government.

Pharmacy Guild of Australia national president Professor Trent Twomey said it would be a big help to some 19 million patients, especially those struggling to afford their medicines.

"In 2019-20 we learnt 900,000 Australian patients did not get a script filled because they could not afford it," Professor Twomey said.

"As health professionals, this disturbed us immensely and led to our Affordable Medicines Now campaign which pressured both parties to commit to lowering the cost of PBS medicines in the lead up to the last election.

"It's a credit to our politicians they listened to those concerns and gave a bi-partisan commitment to lower the maximum co-payment for PBS-listed medicines after the election."

Professor Twomey said the guild would push to further lower the nonconcessional payment to to \$19.

The current concessional co-payment amount of \$6.80 increased to \$7.30, in line with annual CPI increase.

Concessional patients are already receiving benefits from reductions to the PBS Safety Net thresholds on July 1, 2022.

General and concessional co-payments will continue to be adjusted on January 1 each year in line with the CPI.

Bute silo art nominated for street art awards

BUTE'S silo art is a nominee in the Best Mega Mural and Best Rural Artwork categories of the 2022 Australian Street Art Awards.

The artwork by Blue Mountains artists Scott Nagy and Janne Birkner (also known as Krimsone) took three weeks to complete in April.

Members of the Bute 2000 Onwards committee worked with Barunga West Council and urban art curator Juddy Roller for many years to bring the Bute "Beaut" Silo Art Project to fruition.

Committee member David Rose said the mural had sparked the interest of tourists.

"People have come from everywhere to check out the silo," Mr Rose said.

"It was quite a brilliant project and everyone who was involved in getting it done is quite proud of the result.

"We have heard a bit of feedback and there hasn't been a bad word yet, there have been a lot of positives.

"The two artists we worked with were brilliant.

"I believe this was their first artwork of this size but they were complete professionals.

"There are quite a lot of identifiable elements which are quite recognisable to Bute.

"One of the more prominent parts of the artwork is the Bute rooster, which is a reference to all of our sporting clubs.

"You can also see the railway track, which provides a bit of history about Bute, in the back you can also see the Barunga Range that surrounds Bute."

The silo art also features flora and fauna from the region such as the rainbow bee eaters and blue wren.

Illuminart's Constellation Stories on The Light Trail silo light art show, which was held at multiple locations including Wallaroo, was nominated for Best Street Art Festival or Event.

Australian Street Art Awards finalists will be announced in mid-January.





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Premier, cabinet coming to town

PREMIER Peter Malinauskas, state government ministers and senior department executives will visit Yorke Peninsula for Country Cabinet in February.

While the itinerary is still to be finalised, the Premier and ministers will tour parts of the region and host a town hall meeting on Wednesday, February 15, before travelling across the peninsula on Thursday, February 16.

Initially established by Labor following the 2014 election, but scrapped by the previous Liberal government in 2018, Country Cabinet meetings provide a chance for the government to hear from the regions.

Yorke Peninsula is just the third region to host the event since Labor's election victory last year.

"Country Cabinet is an excellent opportunity for our ministers and departments to hear from local communities across our great state about what is important to them," Mr Malinauskas said.

"The Yorke Peninsula is an important contributor to South Australia's economy, and I'm looking forward to coming back for another visit.

"Hearing directly from those who live, work and play in the region is a vital part of ensuring our regions aren't just growing but thriving."

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said he was pleased to hear a Country Cabinet had been announced for Yorke Peninsula.

"It's often said the state government thinks the state ends at Gepps Cross," Mr Ellis said.

"I've been working to hold a local Country Cabinet for some time, so I'm thrilled to be hosting one in February.

"I look forward to sharing local issues in the timeframe provided and encourage people to get in touch with any local issues they they'd like to be addressed."

Members of the public are invited to attend the town hall meeting once details are finalised.

Father and daughter found safe after national alert

THE Australian Federal Police found a 2-year-old girl and her 23-year-old father after issuing a national missing persons alert on Sunday, January 1.

A'methyst Warrior - the daughter of Charlene Warrior, who was found dead at Bute in October 2021 - and her father D'Rel Smith had previously last been seen in Bute on Thursday, December 22.

The alert was followed by an update later that afternoon announcing the duo had been found and no further comment would be made by AFP.

Paddle boarders rescued at Moonta Bay

Six stand-up paddle boarders were rescued after being swept out to sea at Moonta Bay on Monday, December 26.

Copper Coast police responded to reports a group of paddle boarders had become stranded at about 7.30pm.

When patrols arrived, they received information from the Water Operations Unit and the

Sea Rescue Squadron that a passing boat had managed to collect the six people about two kilometres offshore.

One of the swimmers had ingested a large quantity of saltwater and was taken to the Wallaroo Hospital for further treatment. Drink driver caught in Kadina

A woman was caught drink driving in Kadina on Monday, January 2.

Copper Coast police held a driver testing station on Copper Coast Highway and stopped the woman at 10.15am.

She submitted to a breath test and returned an alleged reading of 0.118.

The woman was issued with an instant six-month loss of licence, reported for drink driving and will appear in court at a later date.

Another life lost

A man has died in hospital after a crash at Lochiel last year.

Emergency services were called to the Augusta Highway after a car travelling north left the road and crashed into a tree at 7.30pm on Tuesday, December 27.

The driver, a 19-year-old man, and rear passenger, a 17-year-old girl, both from Port Pirie, died at the scene.

The front passenger, a 46year-old Port Pirie man, was airlifted to Royal Adelaide Hospital with serious injuries and died on Sunday, January 1.

His was the 71st life lost on South Australian roads in 2022, compared with 99 in 2021.

Police urge fire safety for farmers

YORKE Mid North police remind farmers to remain vigilant this fire danger season following six recent fires.

Between Friday and Sunday, December 16 and 18, six fires occurred within the Yorke Mid North area, all caused by farming equipment.

Although some resulted in only minimal damage, a police spokesperson said in each case the outcome could have been far worse.

"Harvesting during dangerous conditions or failing to maintain and service equipment can quickly start a bushfire," they said.

"Help keep everyone safe by ensuring you have a shovel or rake and portable water spray at hand, ensuring all engine exhaust gases exit through the exhaust system to prevent the escape of burning material, preventing heated parts of the system from coming into contact with flammable material or vegetation and ensuring the system is in good working order.

"If a stationary motor is used to auger a crop, a minimum space of four metres around and above it must be cleared or a person who is able to control the engine must be present at all times it is in operation.

"It is strongly recommended you follow the Grain Harvesting Code of Practice."

They said deliberately, recklessly or negligently starting a bushfire is a serious offence and would result in criminal proceedings.

Free welfare checks for **South Aussies** in need

SOUTH Australians at risk from extreme heat are being urged to register for a free welfare check through the Australian Red Cross Telecross REDi service.

On days of extreme heat, trained volunteers will call registered participants up to three times a day for a welfare check and, when needed, will call an ambulance for anyone experiencing heat-related health issues.

Those most at risk include people with disability, the elderly or frail, those who live alone or are unable to leave their homes, and people with a range of health concerns.

"I encourage those who live alone, and who experience circumstances that could create social isolation, to register for the free Telecross REDi service," Minister for Human Services Nat Cook said.

"This is a fantastic - and potentially life-saving — service staffed by trained Red Cross volunteers, who provide a friendly welfare check as well as advice and tips on how to keep cool, stay hydrated and stay safe during periods of hot weather."


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Convenient dump point for RV users

MOONTA RV Park visitors can now dispose of their wastewater in a more convenient location.

The town's dump point has been relocated from McCauley Park to the RV park entrance on Clayton Road.

Copper Coast Residents and Ratepayers Association chairperson Neil Windsor said the relocation was timely ahead of the free park's busy period.

"We had a few complaints from people using McCauley Park as well as nearby neighbours, and it probably wasn't a great look for people going there to eat lunch," Mr Windsor said.

"We thank (Copper Coast) council for completing a new sewerage line off Blyth Terrace to help bring the dump point to a more convenient spot."

Mr Windsor said the RV park has shifted to the western side of Clayton Road since association began managing the space in May.

"Having the main park on this side (between Clayton Road and Crutchett Road) gives people more room to move and more protection and privacy from the trees along Blyth Terrace," he said.

"Hopefully this move and the dump point relocation will satisfy tourists this summer."

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First aid recognised as best aid

ST COLUMBA'S Memorial School, Yorketown, was recently honoured at the Resilient Australia Awards.

The Australian Institute for Disaster Resilience hosted its awards in Hobart during December, when St Columba's was recognised with a highly commended award in the school category for its SYP First Aid for Kids initiative, run in 2021.

The program, facilitated by Karyn Hindle from Head2Toe First Aid, delivered ageappropriate first aid, disaster resilience and wellbeing sessions for more than 350 primary school aged children and teachers.

More than 20 sessions were held during a week, with the program funded by Wellbeing SA's Strengthening Community Wellbeing after Bushfires Grant Program.

St Columba's chaplain Katie Hughes said it was surreal to be recognised at a national level.

"For little St Columba's Memorial School on southern Yorke Peninsula, with fewer than 100 students, to be recognised on a national level like this, was fantastic," she said.

"It was also really good to have conversations (at the awards event) with other organisations which have facilitated disaster response and wellbeing programs, to learn from each other."

Warooka Primary, Minlaton District, Yorketown Area and Stansbury Primary Schools were all involved in the delivery of the program.

Mrs Hughes said it was incredibly important children have an understanding of what to do in any given emergency.

"Karyn incorporated a specific focus on caring for our wellbeing after an emergency event at the end of each session," she said.

"This set the sessions apart from other first aid programs and was an important step to be able to start conversations about looking after ourselves after an emergency at a young age.

"Children are capable of so much, and to a real highlight for Karyn and me."

Neigh reason not to follow your passion

FORMER Ardrossan resident Julia McMillan has spent her whole life alongside animals and has recently started an equine assisted therapy business, allowing her to work with horses every day.

While Heard in the Herd at Willunga combines her love for animals with more than 20 years working in mental health, it was in Ardrossan her passions were originally fostered.

Julia said she realised early on the impact animals can have on an individual.

"There were two very special dogs, Midge and Rusty, who, at various stages of my childhood, taught me patience, unconditional love and consistency are invaluable ingredients for a lasting relationship, for humans as well as animals," she said.

"I begged my parents for a horse as soon as I could talk and finally, when I was 5 (and after endless beseeching), along came a little black pony named Smokey, who was loaned to me by the Crowell family.

"I regularly caught the school bus to Dowlingville to Brian and Marj Hill's farm where we kept Smokey, and where the Hill family taught me to ride him.

"Smokey was very young and I couldn't ride, so we learned together, the hard way!

"When I fell off, Marj picked me up, dusted me off, dried my tears, straightened my helmet, and put me back in the saddle."

Julia left Ardrossan to study teaching in Adelaide in 1986, before later transferring to a bachelors degree in psychology.

She spent more than 20 years as a case worker in mental health practices, in both government and non-government roles.

"I was fortunate enough to work with some outstanding human beings who helped me to understand emotional distress is not an illness," she said.

"People often experience trauma which leads to different ways of coping, and all that behaviour has meaning, even if we sometimes don't understand that behaviour.

"Offering time, space and opportunities for people to be heard can make all the difference, particularly when they are feeling powerless and afraid."

Julia said she always dreamt of combining her love for horses with innovative ways to support people.

"I realised I wasn't getting any younger, so I resigned from my government role in December 2021, and Heard in the Herd was born," she said.

"I advertised locally for an art therapist, and was fortunate to meet someone with significant experience, who is gentle and compassionate.

"Our team has expanded to include a social worker with outdoor adventure expertise, a registered counsellor and psychotherapist and a social work student who will assist us with our horse powered reading program.

"Each session is tailor made, depending on how the person is feeling when they arrive, and what they'd like to achieve.

"I love that horses intuitively understand people. "They don't judge, they're not interested

in what you're wearing, how educated you are, or what you ate for breakfast; they accept you, just as you are."



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
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



Point Turton star hits Brisbane gold rush

Point Turton's Hugo Taheny finished 2022 with five big victories, taking home four gold medals from the Virtus Oceania Asia Games in Brisbane and winning Sport SA Para Athlete of the Year.

The Virtus Games were held across a week in November and provided a platform for elite athletes with an intellectual impairment to shine on the big stage.

Hugo claimed victory in javelin, shot-put, discus and 4x100 relay.

His mum Louise said the competition was an amazing experience which far exceeded everyone's expectations.

"It started with the opening ceremony; there were 25 nations competing and a large Australian team," she said.

"Hugo stayed with the team which was an incredible step up for his independence and, because he has represented Australia previously at the Global Games in 2019, he was almost well known.

"The first thing he competed in was the javelin, which isn't something he's competed in much in recent years, but he qualified quite easily.

"He happened to win gold in that, so that was a great start to the week, and then he had discus the next day and did a sensational job and won gold again."

His discus throw was close to his personal best, which also happens to be the world record.

Louise said, as the days went on, Hugo became more inspired and loved meeting other athletes from across the world.

"The next day was his shot-put where he threw 11.07 metres, won gold and was strong right from the start," she said.

"He was able to wear a body suit, which is what (Commonwealth Games gold medallist) Matt Denny wears and he was absolutely beside himself to be able to do that, and it really lifted him as well.

"Steve Larsson, Hugo's coach from Kadina, came with us to Brisbane and he organised for Hugo to meet Matt which was just incredible."

The week finished with Hugo stepping up as part of the relay team and, despite not being a trained runner, played his role in securing a victory and his third current world record.

Just two weeks later, Hugo was in Adelaide collecting another accolade, perhaps his finest yet, being named SA Para Athlete of the Year.

Louise said, although she was unable to attend due to Covid-19, a large group of supporters was

alongside athletic royalty, like Jess Stenson, was incredible.

"We just couldn't be prouder and when I was told he had won, I was in tears too."

The award is granted on what an athlete has achieved for the previous 12 months, but also what they've given back to the community.

Louise said it was inspiring to see Hugo's selfesteem grow having found a passion which he has proudly made his own.

"He takes it all in his stride and knows the importance of representing your country and competing on the world stage," she said.

"You wouldn't know it, but he trains really hard and really values and loves the whole athletic community."

While he keeps breaking new boundaries, there is always another challenge just around the corner, or even on the other side of the world.

"The team hasn't been announced yet, but Hugo will go to Vichy, France, in June for the Virtus Global Games, which is exciting for all of

there to witness the moment.

"I was told there wasn't a dry eye in the house and there was only one person who owned the room that night and it was Hugo," she said. "To win that award is just amazing, and to be us," Louise said.

"A lot of people don't realise it's all self-funded because Hugo isn't a pathway athlete, so we're beginning to look at ways to raise money to get there. "But it should be another great experience."

Reuther happy with nationals

James Reuther, of Coobowie, has confirmed his position as a bowling allrounder after his performance at the Cricket Australia Under 19 Male National Cricket Championships, which ended on Thursday, December 22.

South Australia finished with four wins from its six 50-over (one-day) encounters. After a trio of victories in the opening

three games, the Redbacks fell just one wicket short in a low scoring and thrilling quarterfinal with Victorian Metro at Prospect Oval.

Reuther showed his mettle with the bat, arriving at the crease at 6/47, and recording the top score of 43 from 83 balls.

His 44-run eighth-wicket association with Nick Stathoris (22 not out) helped SA to a modestly competitive 8/139.

SA bounced back in the semifinal against New South Wales Country, winning by five wickets, chasing down 187 in 45.3 overs.

One of SA's four fast bowlers in this

game, Reuther bowled second change and finished with 1/25 from eight overs. Reuther's fast balls reached speeds of 135 km/h early in the tournament.

On the final day, Reuther made an enterprising 37 from 50 deliveries.

His 58-minute stay included three boundaries and he was involved in a 61-run sixth wicket partnership with opener Reghard Els for a team total 8/203, but it wasn't enough with WA winning by eight wickets.

Reuther finished the championship highly respectable average score of 34.75, making 139 runs in the middle order.

"I was happy, especially with my batting," he said. "I felt I bowled reasonably well, but would

have liked to have taken a few more wickets. "Due to my batting performances, I

played in all six games. "By the end of the tournament, I was pretty sore and tired.

Two of Yorke Peninsula's greatest cricket exports, Andrea McCauley and Daniel Harris, are now members of the South Australian Cricket Association Board of Control.

While McCauley has been on the board since 2019, Harris joined in September.

Brought up at Maitland, McCauley's success on the field included one Test match for Australia and captaincy of South Australian cricket's most successful era, skippering the SA Scorpions to three national titles in four years from 1990.

McCauley was also the first full time coach for the SA women's side and has played a key role in the growth of current stars including Megan Schutt, Tahlia McGrath, Amanda-Jade Wellington and Bridget Patterson.

With fellow YP talent Lauren Ebsary as her skipper, McCauley coached SA to its first ever Women's National Cricket League title in 2014-15.

She was also the Strikers' first coach in the Women's Big Bash League.

A self-employed mortgage broker, McCauley chairs SACA's high performance and honorary nominations and naming committees and is a member of the strategic cricket committee.

Harris started his cricketing career at Sunbury and was an Australian Under 19s cricketer, who played first class cricket along with his demanding work career as medical practitioner.

His highlights include captaining the SA Sheffield Shield team and playing in domestic one-day and Twenty20 competition-winning teams.

Playing a pivotal role in helping the Redbacks win the 2010-11 KFC T20 Big Bash, his outstanding season was rewarded as he was named the Australian Cricketers Association's Twenty20 Player of the Year.

He also played in various T20 leagues including the Big Bash, Indian Premier League and competitions in New Zealand and Asia.

Harris played for Woodville for more 20 years and is a life member of the club.

Harris works as an emergency consultant at the Royal Adelaide and Queen Elizabeth Hospitals, and a Medical Retrieval Consultant for SAAS MedSTAR.

Harris is also a member of SACA's premier cricket and high performance committees.

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
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
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Mobile app for on-farm testing

AN app developed in South Australia is empowering growers to assess their grain onfarm.

GoMicro, is based at the Tonsley innovation district, has developed an app for lentils, with another for wheat to be released early this year.

Company chief executive Dr Sivam Krish said the GoMicro Assessor could help reduce some of the stress associated with determining grain quality for both growers and receival companies, and empower growers to make better informed trading decisions.

The app is based on visual machine learning via artificial intelligence and assesses lentil samples for visual qualities such as colour, size, breaks or wrinkles in the seed coat, and the presence of contaminants such as snails and weed seeds.

"The GoMicro Assessor can accurately assess thousands of lentil seeds in about a minute with an accuracy of more than 95 per cent," Dr Krish said.

Dr Krish said the difference between GoMicro and other grain assessment technology in development around the world was its use of an associated patent pending device which created studio-quality lighting at all locations, including outdoors on farms.

The device removes shadows and distracting backgrounds, eliminating the need for expensive machinery, industrial cameras and grain feeders to separate the grain before it is photographed.

"We are putting this technology in the hands of farmers, who have traditionally been price-takers," he said.

"A lot of farmers are now using on-farm storage, so the app will empower them to assess their grain themselves and make decisions on when to sell."

Walco Seed Cleaning at Halbury, near Balaklava, Long Seed and Grain at Leasingham, and three SA grain receival sites are currently trialling the app.

Their input about local weed seeds and other quality issues is being incorporated to expand the visual memory of the AI behind the app.

Kurt Walter from Walco Seed Cleaning said the GoMicro Assessor was a game changer for growers.

"It will provide them with convenience and the confidence of knowing the grade of their grain before it's even loaded on the truck," he said.

"It will also be a big help to growers who store on-farm, so they can keep closer track of their grain quality through the vear."

Long Seed and Grain's David Long said the app was easy to use and it demonstrated the enormous scope for AI technology in the grain industry.

"We are only just on the edge of how AI can be used," he said.

"For example, the same technology could be used to do seed counts so you can adjust seeding rates and to check germination rates and new versions of the app could be developed to monitor for diseases."

GPSA launches new spraying campaign

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Producers SA is stressing the importance of safe summer spraying practices to avoid spray drift.

GPSA recently launched a new campaign titled Keep Your Droplets to Yourself, to remind grain producers about the importance of responsible spray application.

Together with key industry stakeholders and experts, GPSA created a fact sheet featuring 11 tips to be aware of when spraying, including monitoring weather, leaving buffers, avoiding high spray speed, recording, reporting and more. CEO Brad Perry said it was

spray safely to avoid drift.

"GPSA has previously run the Hit Your Target approach and we've built on and strength-

ened it for the Keep Your Droplets to Yourself campaign," Mr Perry said.

"Most grain producers in SA do the right thing when it comes to spraying; however, we need the industry to be fully adherent.

'The new campaign is the first step in the grain industry in SA providing a new offensive on spray drift to ensure, as a sector, we are doing the right thing.

"The use of pesticides has had, and continues to have, a

"But to maintain the use of these important chemicals, we all need to ensure we are doing the right thing when we spray.

"Producers need to understand how to spot hazardous temperature inversions, choose the right nozzle size and what speed they should be spraying at.

"If they're not certain, they shouldn't be spraying and should instead be on the phone to their local agronomist."

HOT FISHING TIPS

Welcome again to the fishing column with all the hot tips for fishing Yorke Peninsula; contact Greg by email at greg@gregjamesfishing.com.au.

Recipe, spicy fish kebabs: Ingredients – white fish fillets (cubed), chopped mint, coriander, parsley, red chillies, peanut oil, lemon juice. Preparation – combine fish pieces with herbs and gently mix with oil. Skewer fish and cook on a hot plate until done (two to **Point Turton**: Plenty of holiday makers arrived for the seasonal break and hugged the shore-line in their boats at Hardwicke Bay and Point Souttar/The Pines — all trying for gar, squid and tommy ruffs. Small pan-sized snapper are also about but the extended ban means they need to be returned to the water immediately. Try the jetty for gar at dusk.

Marion/Stenhouse Bays: Four-wheel drives and caravans of every persuasion have arrived in massive numbers to fish the beaches at Corny Point, Brown's and Pondalowie Bay with mixed success, mullet and salmon trout the main reports. Boat crews fishing the deep waters off Marion Bay have found a couple of 10-15 kg tuna, red nannygai and sweep. Some big snook are out from main reef at Foul Bay. Edithburgh/Stansbury: Try the jetties for blue swimmer crabs and tommy ruffs at the moment. KG whiting are at Tapley Shoals and the Orontes Bank, while gar and squid are off Coobowie Bay and Port Giles. Pine Point/Ardrossan: Blue crab rakers are at it right along this section of the coast when I checked between Christmas and New Year. Yellowfin whiting are off the wharf at Pine Point and Tiddy Widdy Beach north of Ardrossan. Boat crews have reported garfish, squid and snook, plus a few blue crabs. Tight lines and see you next week!

Port Victoria: Boat crews are catching KG whiting off the north western end of Wardang Island when the winds permit and also at Balgowan and Chinaman's Well, plus gar and squid. The jetty has a few blue swimmer crabs and not much else.
