YORKE Peninsula Council elected member Adam Meyer will be suspended from elected office for one month without an allowance for his behaviour towards a senior council officer.

The suspension was issued by statutory body, the Behavioural Standards Panel, after it found Cr Meyer committed serious misbehaviour in relation to two out of six allegations made by YPC.

The panel's website states the suspension will

apply from January 10 to February 10.

Cr Meyer, who recently marked his 10-year anniversary in local government, is now required to reimburse YPC \$300 for a portion of the costs of dealing with the complaints.

Cr Meyer will also be removed from an unnamed YPC working party for the entirety of the current term of council.

The decision was made after the panel reviewed emails sent from Cr Meyer to a senior council officer from September 2023 to February 2024.

The first allegation of serious misbehaviour

against Cr Meyer concerned three emails sent to all members of council.

YPC alleged these were "inappropriate, accusatory, and/or antagonistic" against the senior council officer, and adversely affected the staff member's health and safety.

The sixth allegation accused Cr Meyer of using the questions on notice mechanism during council meetings to publicly address the senior council officer.

It was alleged the questions were designed to cast aspersions on the integrity of the staff member which implied they had not adequate-

ly been performing their role.

The report shows that Cr Meyer responded to the initial findings on July 2, 2024, and said the financial penalty of \$300 combined with the suspension of his allowance would amount to a penalty of \$1759.92, which was excessive and amounted to more than some penalties for criminal offences.

Cr Meyer also raised concerns that his employer could decide to withdraw his secondary employment approval allowing him to be an elected member, which would further impact him financially. MORE PAGE 4

More needed to make families safe in 2025

FOR victim-survivors of family violence, the first hours of 2025 could be the most dangerous for experiencing senseless and preventable family violence.

Police data across the nation shows family violence rates soar by up to 150 per cent on January 1 and it is known most family violence goes unreported.

My New Year's resolution for Australians is for each of us to say no to violence — always.

Family and domestic violence is complex as it is different for every individual. It can include threatening, coercive, dominating, controlling or abusive behaviour and it can be financial, emotional or physical.

Some regional areas endured a 150 per cent increase in reported family violence in the past year and the frontline sector cannot meet demand, so prevention is crucial to prevent escalation to crisis.

In places most needing help, the Albanese Government remains behind schedule in employing the 500 workers promised at the 2022 election.

In the Northern Territory, just seven of the promised 20 were employed by November 30 (the responsible Commonwealth department will not provide another update until February 3).

Rallies across the nation were told by the Prime Minister urgent action was needed, so he instigated Rapid Review but put a handbrake on the flow to money until after July 1.

All Australians deserve better. Commitment to an urgent response should have delivered swift action — not announcements.

Council backing memorial walk

REGARDING the Vietnam War Memorial Walk article in YPCT 17-8-24, Yorke Peninsula Council is the developer and manager of this nationally significant memorial.

The elected members have twice provided unanimous support for the development of this project and have approved council staff to work with John Edwards and myself to bring it to fruition on the condition that we achieved the desired outcomes without council having to input unbudgeted funds into the project.

YPC applied for the Saluting Their Service Commemorative Grant and we were successful in gaining \$150,000, leaving a shortfall which John and I are now working to raise through donations and sponsorships.

Funds raised are being held by the Edithburgh Progress Association and will be used to complete the project.

YPC mayor Darren Braund is currently working toward having an eminent Australian to officially open the walk on August 18 (Vietnam Veterans Day) which will mean national press coverage if he is successful.

Following the official opening there will be a special John Schumann and The Vagabond Crew theatrical concert, Behind The Lines, in the Light Church Auditorium. Local group Cruizn Blues will be performing in support. Tickets for the concert will be available in early March.

With council management and local support, this memorial to all who served, both military and civilian, will be an important historical record of Australian involvement in that conflict. Creating change

IT IS no surprise that rural and regional areas across Australia, including Yorke Peninsula, are disproportionately impacted by shortages of doctors and other health professionals.

But various initiatives are emerging which could help ease these shortages in our region.

I was lucky to have the opportunity to attend a morning tea at Wallaroo Hospital on January 6 to welcome four new interns as part of the brand-new Rural Doctor Program.

This program has a special connection to YP, as it is headed by Arthurton local Dr Eleanor Daniel.

The interns have been offered five-year contracts and it is hoped they will stay for the entire duration.

Initially, they will work across YNLHN for the next year — so please say hi if you are lucky to meet Zakaria, Mevis, Mahum or Ryan.

In December, a new cadetship program was launched by YNLHN and UniHub to encourage aspiring allied-health professionals to complete their degrees in the regions.

It offers allied-health and nursing cadetships, which means students can complete their placements locally rather than pay to travel and live in metropolitan areas.

These initiatives follow last year's announcement of the Single Employer Model, a joint scheme by the State and Federal governments which aims to attract and retain more doctors in the regions.

This scheme lets trainees have one employer (SA Health) which, in turn, ensures their entitlements such as sick and parental leave are retained no matter where they train and work.

In addition, there are community-based groups such as the Healthy Ardrossan Action Group, SOS Yorkes, the YP Health Foundation and many more working to secure and improve health services in their local areas.

And as residents in the Narungga electorate, we have the opportunity to make a submission to the parliamentary inquiry into health services in our region, with submissions closing on February 7.

Let's hope this focus on health continues throughout 2025 and beyond, and we can soon reap the benefits of improved health care. Joanna Tucker, Journalist

Former KMS student launches \$500k lawsuit

A FORMER student has claimed that Kadina Memorial School failed to act on warnings about grooming by former teacher and convicted paedophile Thomas Robert Ackland, and is suing the State Government for \$500,000 over the abuse he experienced.

The now-adult student, who cannot be named, is one of 11 victims of Ackland.

In a claim filed in the District Court, the former student has alleged that, despite KMS being told in April or May 2018 that Ackland was having sexually explicit conversations with students on social media, the school took no action.

He alleged this lack of action had left him vulnerable to being contact-

ed by Ackland in December of that vear, and abused by Ackland throughout 2019, 2020 and 2021.

In his statement of claim, the former student alleged Ackland invited him to secretly add him on Snapchat in December 2018, then Ackland sent him naked photographs.

He alleged Ackland subsequently demanded naked images from him, Ackland exposed himself in class and pressured him to get his driver's licence so they could have sex at his home.

"(KMS) counselled Ackland in relation to the inappropriate communication he had and continued to have ... (but) continued to employ him," he alleged.

The abuse committed by Mr Ackland, post the school's knowledge of the inappropriate messages, was foreseeable and preventable."

Speaking to the YPCT, the applicant's lawyer, Alice Taylor, said that while Mr Ackland had been convicted, in her view KMS had not yet been held to account.

"The school failed to take reasonable care to ensure the safety of the students and stop the abuse immediately," she alleged.

"Numerous students came forward and were turned away when they needed someone to listen, believe and help them.

"Where the school and education department have let these students down, we must now step in to ensure this does not happen again and to ensure all parties are held to account."

Ms Taylor said it was imperative the Department for Education ensured reports were fully investigated.

"They are responsible for the eco-

nomic losses the brave victim survivors have suffered due to being abused during their formative years," she alleged.

"Instead of hiding behind applications and adversarial litigation, we hope for recognition and change from the school and department.

"We know there are other students who were groomed and abused by Mr Ackland that are yet to come forward to claim for their injuries suffered.

"We would like to invite them to do so when ready."

The Minister for Education and Department for Education were contacted for comment.

A spokesperson said the minister was unable to comment due to being on leave, and the department was unable to comment due to an ongoing court case related to the matter.

In December 2023, Mr Ackland was sentenced to 14 years in jail on 13 counts of aggravated communicating with the intention of making a child amenable to sexual activity and one of sexual abuse of a child.

The events, which are the subject of the charges, spanned from 2017 to just a week before his arrest in March 2021.

In his sentencing, Judge Paul Muscat said Mr Ackland's communication with students via social media first came to the attention of a staff member in 2018.

The staff member had spoken to Mr Ackland about the safety protocols around communicating with students on social media.

In 2020, police received a Crime Stoppers report about Mr Ackland communicating inappropriately with students.

Disqualified drink driver caught

A 26-year-old Eyre Peninsula man returned a positive reading of 0.144 when he was breath tested in Yorketown on January 3.

While conducting driver testing, Edithburgh police stopped a Nissan ute with a young child passenger.

The driver was reported for drink driving, breaching licence conditions, not carrying his driver's licence and inappropriate use of high beam.

The man was issued a six-month loss of licence and will appear in court later.

The Kadina man was pulled over by police. It was discovered the man did not have a driver's licence and he returned a positive breath test result of 0.097.

Both men were reported for drink driving and issued with six-month licence disqualification notices.

Panel suspends councillor

SENIOR associate Kevin Raison from Tindall Gask Bentley Lawyers, representing Cr Meyer, asked the panel to review their assessment and to consider the allegations were on the lower end of seriousness.

Mr Raison said his client never had any intention to cause adverse health effects to the unnamed YPC employee, and his client denied that he has committed misbehaviour.

However, the BSP found Cr Meyer's responses to the allegations did not persuade the panel, and the panel maintained he did commit serious misbehaviours in two out of the six allegations.

The panel stated in the report that it was of the view that Cr Meyer had received notice from Mayor Braund that his behaviour was affecting the senior council officer's psychological health.

The panel stated that Cr Meyer should have been "even more mindful" of his duty to take reasonable care in his actions toward the senior council officer's health and safety, but failed to do so.

The findings said Cr Meyer should have modified his actions after he was made aware about the risk to

the senior officer's health, and chose to send a further email that was "inappropriate, accusatory and/or antagonistic", and all other council members were copied into the email.

The BSP said it found Cr Meyer then sought to direct questions personally towards the senior council officer through the questions on notice mechanism, which he knew would be published to the public on the YPC meeting agenda.

The findings said the questions on notice mechanism may have been another attempt by Cr Meyer to circumvent Mayor Braund's directions, and the overall behaviour was not a one-off incident. The panel said Cr Meyer had not demonstrated any awareness of the adverse impacts his behaviour has caused, and had not provided an apology or shown any remorse.

In the report, Mayor Braund responded to the initial findings on June 26 2024, and raised concerns that a one-month suspension could create the perception Cr Meyers' behaviour was not considered to be serious.

Mayor Braund requested the BSP consider a longer period of suspension.

Help smoke out illicit tobacco stores

THE State Government is encouraging South Australians to report stores selling illicit tobacco and vapes as part of a crackdown on the trade.

This crackdown aims to eradicate illegal vapes and tobacco in South Australia, with penalties up to \$1.5 million now in place.

The State Government said most of these illicit cigarettes and vapes at stores were imported from overseas.

Australian Border Force also estimates about 75 per cent of the illegal tobacco market is controlled by organised crime.

Minister for Consumer and Business Affairs Andrea Michaels said this government crackdown was set to continue over the coming months.

"It is increasingly organised crime behind these illegal tobacco shops and we are going to continue to raid these businesses, get these products off the streets and shut these stores down," Ms Michaels said.

New junior doctors begin their internships on Yorke Peninsula

THE first cohort of interns for the new Rural Doctor Program has been welcomed to the Yorke and Northern Local Health Network at Wallaroo Hospital.

The RDP is designed to support and encourage junior doctors to pursue generalist training pathways and medical careers within Yorke Peninsula.

A crucial initiative in rural health care, the program aims to equip doctors with essential skills for rural practice.

It involves locations in Port Pirie, Crystal Brook, Jamestown, Clare, Wallaroo, Kadina, Point Pearce, Maitland and Ardrossan.

YNLHN director of clinical training Dr Eleanor Daniel, of Arthurton, welcomed the four interns during a morning tea in Wallaroo Hospital foyer yesterday (Monday, January 6).

She said the program had been in planning for the entirety of 2024 to prepare for the year ahead.

"Throughout this year, the YNLHN will have trainees spread across the region in various teams," Dr Daniel said.

"The RDP aims to provide junior doctors with excellent teaching and training opportunities, second-tonone supervision, a supportive learning environment and opportunity to make the most of the lifestyle available in our beautiful region."

New intern Zakaria Shinwari said he was excited for the opportunity to work in the YNLHN.

"I'm looking forward to it — it's very exciting to be able to learn from the mentors and nurses here," Mr Shinwari said.

He said he completed medical school in Fiji and had undertaken rural rotations.

Mevis Mbeki, who also started her internship on January 6, said she was excited to work for the YNLHN.

"I am happy to be here today, I've been looking forward to it," she said.

"I love working in regional areas — it is where I have worked all of my career."

Another intern, Mahum Ikram, said she enjoyed working with tight-knit regional communities.

"Everyone is super nice, it feels like a bunch of mates if I am honest," she said.

Ryan Ton, who previously lived in Orroroo, said he was also excited to begin his internship as one of the first interns for the RDP.

"I am a bit nervous, but very excited," he said.

"I have been living rurally for the past seven years, so that is why I applied for this job."

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis also welcomed the new interns.

"Of all the opportunities for improvement we have in our regional health system, increasing the supply of doctors will make the biggest difference," he said.

"That seems to be the most difficult thing — attracting health professionals.

"This is a wonderful step in the right direction toward training more doctors locally, and hopefully retaining them and increasing the number we have to service our community."

Royal Australian College of



General Practitioners deputy chair Dr Clare Keogh said there had been excellent growth in the number of GPs training in 2025, with a 20 per cent increase nationally compared with 2024.

"General practice is a truly rewarding career," she said.

"No other medical speciality offers the same opportunities to build trust and relationships with patients over a lifetime.

"We've shown we can train more in both Adelaide and South Australia's rural communities — we just need the funding to sustain this growth."

AUTOMATED External Defibrillators became mandatory in relevant State Government owned buildings, facilities and emergency service vehicles from January 1.

Under the Automated External Defibrillator Act 2022, this includes public primary and secondary schools and libraries in South Australia.

More than 2000 additional AEDs have been ordered to ensure compliance with this legislation, which aims to increase community access to AEDs in the event of a sudden cardiac arrest.

Signage will be installed near the AED and outside the building to ensure the community is aware the device is available.

AEDs require no training and can be used by anyone who recognises the signs of a cardiac event.

Regional First Aid's Jane Purdie who is based in Kadina and volunteers with the SA Ambulance Service - said she thought the legislation was a great idea; however, she recommends community members should at least watch a video tutorial to ensure they know how to use an AED when needed.

"No one wants to try and sort it out in an emergency - even if it is a selftaught thing," Ms Purdie said.

"You need to have a little bit of an understanding."

When someone suffers a cardiac arrest, they collapse and can stop breathing normally as the heart is no long efficiently pumping blood to vital organs in the body.

This is where a community member may need to use an AED.

For every minute that defibrillation with an AED is delayed, the chances of the person surviving a cardiac arrest decreases by 10 per cent.

Early use of a defibrillator by members of the public can significantly

There are also a range of AEDs installed, in community buildings, such as sporting clubs, across Yorke Peninsula.

increase a person's chances of survival. Ms Purdie said it was also important to continually monitor your AED, especially the battery and pads.

"You generally have to replace the battery and pads every four years," she said.

"If people buy an AED, and they find out the brand and look it up on YouTube, they can follow a tutorial to find out how to put it together and how it actually works."

The pads on an AED also need to be replaced after every use.

Ms Purdie said, when she teaches people how to use an AED, she often asks them to bring out their own AED - and then finds they are flat or not turned on.

"There are so many different types of AEDs out there," she said.

"Unfortunately they are all different, so we just have to hope people are paying attention to them."

Ms Purdie regularly explains and teaches how to use an AED at local sporting clubs, and will be completing a session at the Kadina Bowling Club this Thursday night (January 9).

These sessions are to ensure communities are up-to-date on their knowledge around AEDs, and do not require you to complete a qualification. Councils across Yorke Peninsula each have their own AEDs installed in council-owned buildings.

Barunga West Council has six defibrillators current installed in its buildings, and a BWC spokesperson said they play a vital role in emergencies.

"Early access to these life-saving devices, especially in public places and workplaces, significantly increases the chances of survival while waiting for professional medical assistance," they said

"Ensuring public safety remains a key priority for the council."

Following a successful LGA submission, the AED Grants Program has been expanded to include some councilowned buildings.

The Copper Coast Council has received a \$7000 grant to assist with the purchase of seven AEDs.

"Council currently hs eight AEDs installed within council-owned buildings," the spokesperson said.

Port Broughton marine rescue boost

A NEW \$130,000 vessel has boosted the marine rescue capability of Port Broughton's South Australian State Emergency Service Unit.

The 5.5 metre rigid hull inflatable boat is powered by twin 60hp outboard engines and fitted with the latest electronics to assist safe navigation and search and rescue operations.

The vessel, which was formally handed to the Port Broughton SES on December 16, will better equip volunteers to respond to diverse marine risks.

It has replaced a 20-year-old boat which had also previously served the Port Lincoln SES Unit.

Emergency Services Minister Dan Cregan said the new boat would ensure Port Broughton personnel were better equipped to respond to marine emergencies across YP. "The efforts of volunteers and staff to secure the brand new vessel will help keep the community safe," Mr Cregan said.

SES Chief Officer Chris Beattie said the arrival of the new vessel was a significant occasion for the Port Broughton SES.

"It is a new state-of-the-art vessel that will provide an enhanced marine rescue capability for the Port Broughton unit and its community," Chief Officer Beattie said.

"The new vessel is fitting recognition of the valuable contribution that SES volunteers make towards community safety, and I'm sure I speak for all in extending our best wishes to the Port Broughton Unit on the arrival of the new rescue vessel.

"We hope that it will keep all of the volunteer's safe as they respond, as well as those that they seek to assist."

KADINA'S SA Metropolitan Fire Service station has received a refurbished truck as part of a South Australian Government initiative to improve regional firefighting capabilities.

Kadina is one of three stations across the state to receive a refurbished truck.

Wallaroo MFS could expect one soon, an MFS spokesperson said.

Leighton Giles, who was promoted to be the Kadina MFS Station Officer on December 17, said the brigade's newly acquired it came to Kadina and would hopefully last the station more than 10 years.

State MFS Chief Officer Jeff Swan said the new trucks at Wallaroo and Kadina followed an overall SA Government initiative to upgrade country stations.

"The MFS has a large capital works project underway within the regions that is focused on replacing and improving stations and appliances to create safer working environments for our staff," Chief Officer Swan said.

"[It] is an important objective for the MFS in ensuring our response capability and staff are recognised and supported in the important service they provide to their regional communities." Moonta and Kadina are also two of nine MFS stations due to have upgrades start in the 2025-26 financial year, while works are almost complete at Wallaroo.

The upgrades at Moonta and Kadina stations will include improved Personal Protective Equipment storage and facilities.

Emergency Services Minister Dan Cregan said, while a \$1.25 million SA Government investment to deliver these upgrades to regional stations was useful, it was important to be continually proactive.

"The work underway to support regional firefighting operations must continue and expand," Mr Cregan said.

Planning changes to fast track developments

CHANGES to the code amendment process which could reduce assessment timeframes by up to 10 weeks are being introduced to South Australia's planning system.

The system will now enable developers to concurrently run a code amendment and a development application, in the form of an outline consent.

Outline consent is where specific elements of a proposed development can be assessed early before the developer has committed substantial time, energy and resources into a project. It can be sought for specific project details such as building height, density, access, land use and open space requirements.

Previously, outline consent wasn't able to be granted until after a code amendment has been approved.

Housing and Urban Development Minister Nick Champion said the change had the potential to reduce the assessment timeframes for planning application from 70 business days to less than 20 business days, an estimated saving of up to 10 weeks.

"Earlier assessments for outline consent will provide greater certainty to the development industry and stimulate more building projects," he said.

He said new planning reforms developed by the State Government, through the Housing Roadmap could see houses built on development sites up to 18 months faster.

The revised timeframe to turn an empty block of land into a housing development is now expected to be just 36—63 months, compared with 54—75 months under the former system.

"This change has the potential to save developers and the state's planners a lot of time and money by providing early approvals for what's allowed.

"The aim is to reduce the overall assessment time needed to receive development approval.

"These changes will enable developers to start building homes sooner, to help tackle the housing supply crisis."

Urban Development Institute of

Australia chief executive Liam Golding said bringing forward policies such as outline consent and enabling it to run in parallel with the code amendment process had the potential to save significant amounts of time for the industry.

"This change will reduce risk providing progressive certainty for developments and giving communities a better indication of what a code amendment means for key details of a project like height and open space," he said.



Succession laws

SUCCESSION laws have been reformed this new year, with the State Government aiming to make them simpler and more modern via the new Succession Act.

Changes to the laws include:

• Ensuring the wishes of a testator (person who has made the will) are the primary consideration of the court when deciding claims for family provision.

• Tightening the rules around who is automatically entitled to make a claim against an estate.

• Allowing the court to replace an executor or administrator who is not fulfilling their duties, and to order an executor or administrator to compensate an estate that has suffered loss due to a failure of the executor or administrator in their duties.

• Allowing the court to require a legally binding undertaking from an executor or administrator as to how the estate will be administered.

• Introducing simpler, modern language around the laws governing will-making that enshrine the rights of certain people to inspect the will.

Legal Services Commission chief executive Annmarie Lumsden said now was an opportune time for South Australians to ensure they had a will in place, as well as power of attorney, and an advance care directive, and to make their wishes known to loved ones.

"While Legal Services recommends seeing a private lawyer to make a will, we are able to provide free legal education, information and general advice about wills and estates," she said.

"Our end-of-life planning checklist is a useful tool to record important details and to ensure your wishes and choices can be known and respected by your family."

Abalone disease

SIGNS encouraging boat hygiene to prevent the spread of abalone disease have appeared at Port Wakefield and Wallaroo, among other locations.

A Primary Industries and Regions South Australia spokesperson said Abalone Viral Ganglioneuritis remains had been detected in South East waters near Port MacDonnell, where abalone fishing was prohibited.

"Following the detection of AVG in Port MacDonnell waters in February 2024, VMS (electronic) signs have been located in key areas in the state's South East, as well as at Port Wakefield, Port Augusta, Tailem Bend, Cape Jervis and Wallaroo," the spokesperson said.

"The signs are part of a risk mitigation strategy to prevent any further spread of the virus and to protect the central and western abalone zones by reminding all fishers of the importance of ensuring they are regularly undertaking boat hygiene and their biosecurity practices are up to date."

Commercial and recreational fishers cannot move equipment that has come into contact with the sea floor in the southern zone to other waters without full decontamination.

Childcare workers receive wage increase

EARLY Childhood Education and Care workers across Australia received a wage increase of 10 per cent in December as part of a \$3.6 billion investment by the Federal Government.

It is part of a two-year plan that was passed by Parliament in November to deliver a total 15 per cent wage increase for ECEC educators.

The other 5 per cent increase will be delivered in December this year.

This means a typical ECEC educator paid at the award rate has received a pay rise of at least \$103 per week, which will increase to at least \$155 per week from December 2025.

A typical early childhood teacher would have received an additional \$166 per week and will receive a total increase of \$249 from December 2025.

The investment aims to help retain existing early childhood educators, who are predominately women, and help attract new employees.

The wage increase also applies to workers in outside school hours care services.

To be eligible for the wage increase, childcare centres had to agree not to increase their fees by more than 4.4 per cent since August 2024, and this will stay in place for a year.

After that year, they will not be able to increase fees by more than 4.2 per cent for another 12 months.

This wage increase payment from the government will run for two years.

In Australia, workers in the education and training industry earns significantly less than other industries according to data collected in January 2024 from the Australian Bureau of Statistics.

Total cash earnings in education and training were an average weekly wage of \$1,444.30 in 2024.

The highest earning industry was mining with an average weekly wage of \$3,008.20 and the lowest was accommodation and food services with an average \$750.50 cash earnings per week.

The YP Country Times anonymously interviewed ECEC educators across Yorke Peninsula, and all

said this wage increase was a positive step forward.

"It is well overdue that ECEC workers receive a pay rise," one educator said.

"I feel that workers have been undervalued in this profession for a very long time — I hope this will be the start of ECEC workers being acknowledged on how important their role is in providing education to young children compared to other sectors."

They also said the wage increase will not be enough to attract people to work in the childcare industry or retain staff who were leaving, both contributing factors to staff shortages within the industry.

Another childcare educator on YP said more had to be done for ECEC educators.

'The first 1000 days of a child's life are so important," they said.

"We are a part of the foundation

to ensuring a child is provided with the best possible start in their development and wellbeing."

A third ECEC educator said they will not rely on this wage increase as it is a grant childcare centres must apply for, and it will only last two years.

"The increase would be appropriate if it was permanent — it tells us we are worth it but not enough to make it part of the award," they said.

"It needs to be across the board." Minister for Early Childhood Education Dr Anne Aly said the increases were a wonderful outcome for a highly feminised workforce that had been neglected and taken for granted.

"A quality early childhood education sector is necessary to support children's learning and development as well as workforce participation in the broader economy," she said.

Gender pay gap in feminised sectors

IN 2024, the gender pay gap was at its lowest point ever at 11.5 per cent according to a report by the Australian Council of Trade Unions.

However, from November 19 until the end of 2024, women were effectively turning up to their jobs and "working for free" for 42 days of the year because of the gender pay gap.

This report also highlights that work rights and higher wages are working towards closing the gender pay gap, but equal pay has still not been achieved in Australia.

Since 2022, the gender pay gap has been closing at a rate of 1.3 per cent per year, compared to 0.4 per cent in previous years.

The report also said the Federal Government's commitment to fund a 15 per cent pay increase for early childhood education and care workers was expected to further shrink the gender pay imbalance.

An anonymous ECEC educator on Yorke Peninsula said this was a positive step forward.

"I believe that the pay rate does not equate to the responsibilities and the role we hold," they said.

"I am not really surprised by these statistics."

ACTU president Michele O'Neil said Government politics have a direct effect on the underpayment of women workers and the gender pay gap.

"Whether it's looking after our kids in early childhood education or caring for our parents and grandparents in aged care, the union campaigns and the Federal Government's support for pay rises are life-changing for these workers, and they have gone a long way in closing Australia's gender pay gap," she said.

"More needs to be done to completely close the gender pay gap and nobody can ignore the fact that women work an extra 42 days a year to earn the same as men."

The future of free

LOCAL volunteers are hopeful the State Government's recently

refreshed volunteering strategy will help grow volunteer numbers to meet future needs.

More than 950,000 South Australians volunteered their time and skills in 2023, equating to over 223 million hours of unpaid work and more than \$36 million in social and economic benefit to the state, according to the State Government.

For Moonta's Kym Hall, one of the most memorable moments from his prolific volunteering includes 20 years of membership with the CFS, which began with being commandeered.

"I was living in Blyth and I was just walking down the street, and next thing the fire truck came screaming behind me and they just said 'right, we're going to comman-

deer you'," he said.

There was a serious accident, a bloke I knew had been knocked off his motorbike, and they have to go out with at least four people.

"That's how I became a member of the CFS."

Mr Hall said he went on to fight fires in Victoria and drug lab explosions in sometimes 30-hour weeks; his volunteering also included tamer pursuits such as tree planting with school children.

"I saw one of the boys (later in life), and he said 'I come back every year and I look at the trees, and he said he quite often drives past and knows which trees he put in," he said. "I'd like to see younger kids getting

more involved with volunteering. "It's really hard to get that sort of

age sort of group involved and to understand volunteering is very rewarding."

Mr Hall said he believed most groups would welcome new ideas

from younger generations; however, Lyndsey Jackson, another Moonta volunteer, said sometimes established attitudes and procedures in groups could be off-putting to newcomers.

"It's not necessarily because people don't think the work is important or the work has impact or benefits the community - it's often because the expectations are just unrealistic in a place where people are contributing their free time for collective benefit," she said.

She also said young people were less able to volunteer in the way older generations had, with changes such as the cost of living and the number of working women having an impact.

"There are expectations that are placed on people in the country that we will volunteer and do things whereas people in the city just expect that someone will pay for those services," she said.

"There are roles that get done within regional communities that are critical - we need to look at paying people for them."


Ms Jackson said the opportunity for skills development and support for new ideas and demographics would encourage young people to invest in volunteering.

"I really like local grassroots groups because I haven't always had the time to do really structured volunteering," she said.

"The timing is flexible around them, but they open up different opportunities to be involved in different organisations at different levels that I wouldn't have been able to (take up) if I was relying on just employment alone."

The updated strategy's priorities include inclusive practices; culturally relevant opportunities; emphasis on celebrating, promoting, recruiting and retaining volunteers; and better governance.


Disability inclusivity

A HISTORICAL gravesite with links to the Tipara Lighthouse has been restored.

When preparing for the 2021 Kernewek Lowender, Dressing the Graves committee members noticed an untidy and vandalised grave in the older section of the Moonta Cemetery.

This heritage grave belongs to two children of Uriah C. W. Marshall, a former head keeper of the Tipara Lightship (which preceded the lighthouse); both children died in 1872.

Ernest Alfred died aged 3 years and 10 months on January 24 from hydrocephalus, and Mary Louisa died aged 13 months on June 6 from convulsions.

Upon noting the state of the grave, Carolyn McCartney (a descendant of the Marshall fam-

ily) proposed replacing the fence surrounding the site, which had collapsed.

This has now been completed, with the help of Moonta Men's Shed and Moonta and District Progress Association members, who replicated the new fence using the old one as a template.

Shaun Mercer from Goerecke Memorials brought the original headstone, which had been broken into several pieces, back to life using stainless steel pins and a sheet of marble as backing.

Graham Hancock, National Trust of South Australia Moonta branch chair, said Copper Coast Council waived fees usually charged for cemetery maintenance, and the cost of the work was covered by donations from Moonta Lions Club, NTSA Moonta branch, Copper Coast Residents and Ratepayers Association, and members of the public. Mr Hancock said the project was a community-driven "positive approach to maintaining our all-important historic landmarks".

"The Marshall children's gravesite links an important maritime history of the ports of Hughes, Moonta Bay and Wallaroo to the Tipara Lighthouse which was constructed in 1877," he said.

The lighthouse remained operational until 1995 when it was replaced by a light tower at Warburto Point.

"The lighthouse was dismantled with the (light) tower section being relocated to Wallaroo (in 2001) and (it) now stands adjacent to the Wallaroo Nautical Museum," Mr Hancock said.

"The land-based home of the lighthouse keepers still stands at Rossiters Point, Moonta Bay."

More than salt and ships

THE EDITHBURGH Museum holds one of the best maritime displays outside of the South Australian Maritime Museum in Port Adelaide, but there's a lot more than shipping and salt to this old port town.

When entering the museum, visitors are immediately faced with remnants of two of the biggest industries of Edithburgh's past: shipping and salt production.

Museum chair Keryn Dawes said the museum had come a long way in the last decade and he was proud the town's bustling past had been preserved.

A big drawcard to the museum is the shipwreck displays, however, Mr Dawes said there was still unfinished business involving the Clan Ranald shipwreck, which sank in 1909, claiming 40 lives.

The museum has a large collection of artefacts from the wreck, but Mr Dawes said they really wanted the heart of the ship back.

"We're still struggling and fighting for the bell," he said.

The bell is sitting in the South Australian Museum storage facility, but Mr Dawes said the Edithburgh Museum team was working to get it returned to the town permanently.

The main attractions are exciting to look at, but tucked away at the back of the property lies one of the most extensive and well-cared-for collections of historical medical equipment.

The display is interactive and set out like a hospital isolation room, with strange gadgets which make you feel as though you are walking into the scene of a horror movie.

In fact, many of the items are so old, museum staff said they have had visiting doctors who could not work out what they were.

This special display has been curated by museum vice-chair Malcolm Stanton because of his near 40-year history working in the ambulance service.

"Everything in here works, and I know because I've used a lot of this stuff," Mr Stanton said.

The surgical theatre lights set up above the display patient's bed are from the Yorketown Hospital and are over 100 years old.

"A lot of people say to me 'they can't be 100 years old because they look too good'," he said.

The collection boasts many invaluable items, such as a precursor machine to today's Transcutaneous Electrical Nerve Stimulation machine, which Mr Stanton

said was found on a local farm.

This machine was very mysterious when it arrived at the museum covered in dirt, and Mr Stanton said he originally thought it was a case full of illicit paraphernalia that could be used for smoking.

Another unique item is a hospital bed used at Yorketown Hospital until the mid-1980s that could turn patients around like a rotisserie chicken with the turn of a crank.

"I've had a lot of nurses come through here and say to me, 'why haven't we got these in aged care?'," he said.

"There's more problems with the new battery operated ones — they had to put harnesses around the people and then hook them on and lift them up, but with this anyone could do it.

"Even many doctors haven't seen this it wasn't rare, it was just people never bought them."

And if you happen to be at the museum when Mr Stanton is there, he will happily show you how it is done.

A walk down memory lane – Price path preserves history

PRICE Progress Association has just completed another project in the town's recreational precinct, with a special pathway dedicated to past and present members of the Price community.

The new path, which features the names of people who have built Price's community, has created a link from the existing playground to the new playground.

Price Progress Association secretary Karen Newbold said the pavers represented a good mix of the present and the past, and were a great way to preserve history.

"We've got some groups who used to exist in Price, like the football club and cricket club, and we wanted all those represented because a lot of people don't know that we used to have those clubs," Ms Newbold said.

"We've also got past residents who have passed away or who have moved somewhere else, shopkeepers from back when we had shops and residents who are currently living here."

The new path leads to a recently installed all-inclusive playground, where children of all abilities can have fun and share experiences with their peers.

A unique feature is a special board with cartoon pictures of all the pieces of equipment in the Price playground; this removes language and communication barriers and allows people to point at what they would like to do at the park.

Ms Newbold said, when she saw this feature at the new \$2.5 million Thorndon Park playground in Paradise, she immediately knew

Price needed one too.

"Children who are non-verbal or have some communication issues can use it because we are trying to make the playground more inclusive," she said.

"There is a QR code, so they can have it on their iPad and walk around with it too.

"We've had lots of parents who are really thankful."

The playground also features a trampoline designed specifically

for wheelchairs, and a community library filled with books for people who would prefer to get away and go read in the fairy garden.

The precinct is almost completed, but Ms Newbold said there was still a giant xylophone to come, and a possible plan to incorporate the old cricket pitch into the play area.

"We want people to come and enjoy our town, but we also want to attract more families to the area," she said.







Newbold said while the club had applied for a series of grants to upgrade their facilities, none were successful, so the Minlaton District Community and Sports

Newbold praised community support for the fundraising.

"The fundraising has just been amazing ... I never thought we'd see that kind of sup

MDCSC committee member Khani Newbold said the first hit, held on December 20, were an enjoyable celebration of these fundraising efforts.

"It was a celebration of the communityfunded space," Newbold said.

"It was a really good night - life members of the tennis club had the first hit, and then our senior and junior players and then it was open to everyone.

"We then had a barbecue which was really well attended; we had 142 meals."

Newbold said in combination with the court's first hit, a T20 cricket match was also played on Minlaton's oval.

Before establishing the new courts, MTC had moved twice - most recently using Minlaton District School courts (since 2017).

Centre took on the project as an upgrade of the entire centre.

"The previous tennis courts were located at the new childcare centre and they were basically unplayable, so the tennis club had to use the school courts," she said.

"We were just struggling because it's hard to get grants if you don't have massive numbers.

"We had tried three years in a row and we just weren't successful (for grants from the South Australian Government).

"When we got a quote (to upgrade the courts) in 2020-21 it was \$250,000 to do everything including the lights and it nearly doubled, so we just decided 'right we're going to go for it!""

A modern country sporting champion

When discussing South Australian country sporting stars of the early 21st century, few are as revered as Stansbury's own James Moss.

Continuing a string of selections for Yorke Peninsula in the SA Cricket Association Men's Senior Country Cup, after a decade absent, Moss will captain the side in the centenary carnival, from February 3 to 7.

In the summer tradition of leather and willow, he continues to play in the Lower Yorke Peninsula Cricket Association.

He first represented the state 20 years ago, in the 2005 School Sport Australia Under 15 Boys National Cricket Championship in Tasmania, as a wicketkeeper-batter and was mentored by the legendary Michael Weatherald.

Moss played SACA B grade for Northern Districts from the age of 14 in this role.

After moving to YP, he became a regular member of the Stansbury A grade team, which dominated the LYP competition, winning 12 premierships during a golden era for the club.

He was first selected in the YP Senior Country Cup team in 2012; he made a handy 37 runs in the final, helping YP to a seven-run win to claim the Harry Meyer Cup.

In 2013, Moss played a key role, winning the Cec Starr Medal as player of the tournament after scoring a brilliant 68 for YP against Fleurieu and Districts Red to secure a berth in the grand final.

To claim the 2013 championship, YP defeated Upper North by seven wickets. Moss contributed with an unbeaten 45 and impressive bowling figures of 3/14.

YP's 2014 Harry Meyer Cup grand final win was an even more dramatic contest.

Defending just 139, the reigning champions were looking down the

barrel when Upper North passed 100 runs with eight wickets in hand.

Moss and Ryan Darling, with some help from Matthew Goldsworthy, helped bowl the side to a two-run victory; Moss took 3/25 from his full allotment.

He also had two seasons of league cricket in England, playing for Wiseton Cricket Club in the Bassetlaw and District Cricket League in 2011 and 2013.

During the northern summer of 2011, Moss scored 748 runs at an average of 49.97, including two centuries and a highest score of 131. With the ball, he claimed 40 wickets at an average of 15.58, featuring three five-wicket hauls and a best of 6/17.

That same season, he produced a remarkable innings of 274 runs during a Sunday League game for Wiseton.

"James is a unique cricketing champion of Yorke Peninsula," YP Senior Country Cup coach Ian Ravenscroft said.

"Noted for his on-field leadership and abundance of natural talent in the three outstanding components of the game, he's an aggressive top order bat, brilliant fielder and wicket-taking seam bowler.

"While still being a great bloke, he's a confident sporting talent who backs his ability and leads by example."

Moss was also a member of the SA Outbacks team that claimed the state's first Australian Men's Country Cricket Championships title in 2016, which is till SA's only win since the tournament began in 1984.

In season one (2012) of the reality television series, Cricket Superstar, Moss finished third overall, and he served as a community rookie for the Adelaide Strikers.

Fabulous footballer

Moss's football career was equally accomplished.

His first club was Eastern Park, and he played a pivotal role in the

Willaston senior colts' premierships in 2006 and 2007.

AFL clubs began to take notice, and Moss was rookie-listed by the Adelaide Football Club at the end of 2007.

The following year, he won a SANFL premiership with Central District, defeating Glenelg in the 2008 league grand final.

Unfortunately, injuries hindered his ability to cope with the rigours of elite football, leading to his delisting by Adelaide after a couple of seasons.

However, Moss continued to excel in country football, achieving more premiership success. In 2012, he famously kicked 12 goals in CMS Crows' premiership victory over Kadina.

Moss later played for Mypolonga, contributing to two premierships.

The first came in 2017 after the club rebounded from a wooden spoon the previous year.

He delivered a best-on-ground performance in the 2019 grand final before returning to YP.

Teammate Adam Pitt described Moss as "the Tony Modra of country football", highlighting his versatility.

"He is a multi-dimensional footballer, with the ability to beat opponents on the lead or by taking hangers.

"James also has elite football IQ.

"I know he started in SANFL League footy as a half back, but if his body had allowed it, I believe he would have been an outstanding forward at the top level of the game." In 2021, Moss cemented his legacy

in country football during the YPFL grand final at Yorketown Oval.

CMS went in as underdogs against Moonta, but Moss displayed his renowned "footy brain".

In the final minute of the last quarter, he earned a free kick from a ruck contest and kicked the matchwinning goal, securing a dramatic victory for the CMS Crows by the narrowest of margins.

Surfs up for YP juniors

After modest participation rates last year, Yorkes Junior Surf Club will host its first session of 2025 at 10am at Berry Bay on January 19.

YJSC president Brian "Squizzy" Taylor said YJSC teaches kids aged 5 to 16 water safety as well as surfing skills, taking into account the fact there are no surf lifesaving clubs on Yorke Peninsula.

"[The club] was established in 2010 by a group of volunteers, surfers and likeminded community people who just wanted to help local YP kids and families develop some surfing skills and surf safety

"There's some great surfing beaches on Yorke Peninsula so it's about having the knowledge of how to use them safely.

"There's so many families on YP that would love to use the resources we have but there's no patrolled beaches."

Since the club's inception in 2010, Taylor said it would normally attract about 50 participants each year but last year numbers dropped to about 25 participants. This followed a fatal shark attack at Ethel Beach on southern YP in December 2023.

Taylor explained the club was important because instructors educated participants on how to identify dangers at the beach, including rip currents and terrain, plus surfing in crowds, sun safety, wiping out safely and water control.

"Yorke Peninsula has great surfing beaches, we just feel lots of local people on the peninsula or around the area don't tap into it because they are probably a little scared of it or just don't have the skills.

"We're just giving people a pathway and encouragement to come down the beach and learn some skills and be safe." He also praised the club for preparing its members for future surf competitions like the Berry Bay Surf Jam — the largest junior surf competition in South Australia. "We provide a pathway for young people to experience competition and we've got kids from YJSC that have gone on to be state champions, state junior champions, Yorkes Classic winners and compete in the World Qualifying Series.

"It's a stepping stone for young kids and then if they want to follow that surfing dream it helps them from the start."

Success for new tennis program in Yorketown

A new tennis program hosted by Yorketown Tennis Club, which was launched late last year, has been labelled a success by event organisers.

The initiative, Cardio Tennis, was the first program of its kind in South Australia and attracted eight participants, with a focus on developing tennis skills and fitness.

Cardio Tennis Yorketown organiser Anna Eldridge said the initiative was well received among the players.

"There were so many laughs from the people that got involved and it was a good group of people that just wanted to have some fun and a bit of fitness: there wasn't really that many tennis skills needed," Eldridge said.

"It was all about just getting people into tennis.

"It was a great experience. I think everyone that came along to it left feeling really good."

Eldridge said players competed in a series of fun games and exercises including squats, running and using a training ladder, to

encourage them to play tennis.

The program was established after Tennis Australia and Tennis South Australia proposed the idea of Cardio Tennis to YTC. Eldridge said, while the program only went

for four weeks, she hoped it would run again because of the positive response she had received. "I think all the participants absolutely loved

it," she said. "A few people said 'oh you're missing out'

but I'm like, nah, I'm having so much fun watching, and just watching everyone laugh and seeing skills actually develop.

"One of them was a mum who only comes to tennis because her kids play and I said, 'you should come out to Cardio Tennis'.

"From the start to the finish, she was cracking the ball back in that last session so just seeing her develop was really cool.

"I'd really love to kick it off a bit more but we'll see what we hear back."

YTC is now waiting on feedback from Tennis SA and Australia to determine whether it can run Cardio Tennis again next season.

Strong performances by Glazbrook at Country Cricket Championships

In a first for the Australian Country Cricket Championships — Male Division, the SA Outbacks and Queensland Brahman Bulls played a 50-over one-day match at Adelaide Oval on Saturday, January 4.

Minlaton's Angus Glazbrook had one of his most productive days, batting at ninth and making an important 34 (42 deliveries), before being the final Outbacks player dismissed.

South Australia batted first and made a competitive total of 209.

In their run chase, Queensland got off to a flying start, before Glazbrook's took three top order wickets, putting the game in the balance with the Queenslanders going from 0-62 to 3-71.

The game remained tight with Queensland at 5/126 before Bulls' opener Josh Nelson and player of the match, Marcus Berryman, ensured victory with an undefeated fifth wicket association.

Glazbrook finished with the SA Outbacks' best figures for the day - 3/41 from 7.1 overs.

"I felt it was the best performance I've produced at the championships," Glazbrook said.

"I have been a little up-and-down with the ball previously but felt they came out of the hand really well and I had an impact at an important time which brought us back into the game. At the official post-game presentations, Yorke Peninsula's veteran country cricket coach Ian Ravenscroft and Queensland country cricket stalwart Kevin Maher helped present the Maher-Ravenscroft Trophy to Queensland captain Sam Lowry.

This performance followed SA's opening game against Victoria at Angaston Oval.

In this match on January 3, Glazbrook came to the crease when SA was in trouble at 8/86.

Fortunately for the Outbacks, he and Berri's Evan Gregoric produced a matchwinning 128-run unbroken stand for the ninth wicket. This propelled SA to 8/214.

While his partner made a brilliant 95, Glazbrook was equally important at the other end, producing an undefeated 33 off 65 deliveries.

"The partnership certainly changed the course of the game," SA Outbacks coach Paul Pasculli said.

"Both players batted smartly and waited until the 46th over to start pushing the run rate up.

"This gave a solid total to defend.

"Angus played his role in that association with Evan, rotating the strike consistently." In reply, Victoria was bowled out for 147.

This is the third year Glazbrook has been in the SA Outbacks squad, and along with his batting acumen, he is a crafty offspinner and one of the most athletic fielders in the team.

The ACCC in the Barossa Valley will conclude this Friday, January 10.

Stansbury sails ahead

"Diamond Duck" REPORT BY

After a contested start to the season, the gap between the top sides has become clearer. Stansbury leads the Lower Yorke Peninsula competition, having only lost against Maitland. While James Moss (averaging 104) and Zachary Bertoldi (averaging 34.4) give the side batting depth, the side's bowling has stood out. Stansbury have conceded the least amount of runs in the LYPCA this season and have been impressive with ball in hand through Moss and Henry Johnson.

In no great surprise, Minlaton are second. Captain Kai Newbold has been impressive with bat and ball, as has the experienced Tim Walsh and Todd Hoyle. The Coote brothers, Angus and Henry, give the side youth, while their older cousin Max has chipped in with the ball but has struggled to better his career batting average of 10.2.

Despite a period at the top of the ladder, Sunbury have slipped to third. While Simon Schupelius, and Jacob and Dylan Gutsche have proven themselves at various stages with bat and ball, the club has been reliant on Blake Gutsche. Blake is averaging 122 with the bat and 8.4 with the ball.

Warooka are close behind with a 6:4 win-loss ratio. Nathan Allen and George

Bond have been the club's two main performers, while Bernard Taheny has chipped in with useful runs. Jamie Ball has also been handy with the ball. However, like Sunbury, I am concerned about their depth as Bond and Allen have scored 42 per cent of its runs this season.

Yorketown and Eastern District are also in the finals hunt (one win behind Sunbury and Warooka). Trov Goldsworthy is one of the region's best batters and, if he is supported by Ned Watters with the bat and Andrew Parsons with the ball, Eastern District could challenge for the flag. They rarely miss out on finals and, while they are currently sixth, a late run into the top four would come as little surprise. Yorketown are fifth and have been consistent. They have one of the most well-rounded teams in the competition with multiple players in their top five surpassing scores of 30 or more on several occasions this season.

Maitland is below these teams and are likely to be out of the finals race. Nonetheless, they have had multiple upset wins already this season including victories against Stansbury and Yorketown.

Corny Point and Port Victoria have both been disappointing and lack depth. These sides have shown glimpses of brilliance, but have not maintained the pressure required to win at this level.



Warning on fungus resistance in canola

CANOLA growers have been advised to take steps to reduce fungicide resistance developing following detection of resistance in blackleg fungus samples taken from Eyre Peninsula.

University of Melbourne senior research fellow Dr Angela Van de Wouw said it was the first time resistance had been detected in blackleg fungus in Australia and no field failures had been reported yet.

The University of Melbourne identified the issue as part of routine monitoring and surveillance for the emergence of fungicide resistance.

Resistance had not been detected at other canola growing regions outside of Eyre Peninsula, Dr Van de Wouw said.

Growers are advised to use management strategies to minimise disease pressure, where possible, including: · Selecting cultivars with high

blackleg rating for your region to

reduce reliance on fungicide. • Isolating this year's canola crop at least 500m away from last year's canola stubble.

• In areas where resistant isolates have been detected, if using a SDHI as a seed treatment or foliar application, use an effective fertiliser/in-furrow treatment combination, tank mix or co-formulation with an alternate mode of action that includes a DMI (Group 3) or QoI (Group 11) fungicide.

• If a SDHI seed treatment has been used with a foliar application to control blackleg, the seedling fungicide application at 4-6 leaf stage targeting blackleg should not contain a SDHI.

• Do not apply more than two applications containing SDHI fungicides per growing season.

• If fungicides are required, minimise the number of applications.

• If putting on multiple applications in a season, rotate chemical groups as well as specific actives, where possible.

• If applying fungicides for Sclerotinia, be aware these sprays will also put selection pressure on the blackleg pathogen even if you not targeting to control blackleg.

• Monitor crops to ensure fungicides are working efficiently. Potentially leave unsprayed strips for comparison.

Dr Van de Wouw said two different kinds of isolates (individuals in a population of blackleg spores) showed resistance to the SDHI actives pydiflumetofen, fluopyram, fluxapyroxad and bixafen.

One type of isolate was completely resistant to all SDHI actives tested. The other type had increased toler-

ance to the SDHI actives pydiflumetofen and fluxapyroxad, but not to fluopyram.

"Neither of these isolate types showed any resistance towards the DMI or QoI actives; however, there was reduced efficacy towards fludioxonil (Group 12)," Dr Van de Wouw said.

"Isolates with increased tolerance to the DMI fungicides have continued to be detected from most regions across Australia.

"These isolates have increased tolerance, meaning the fungicides have reduced efficacy, rather than complete loss, towards these isolates?

Isolates susceptible to fungicide could not cause disease on the DMI-treated or SDHI-treated canola seedlings and the fungicides remained effective.

In comparison, the SDHI-resistant isolate can cause complete disease on the SDHI-treated seedlings. However, these SDHI-resistant isolates are still completely sensitive to the DMI fungicides," Dr Van de Wouw said.

"The DMI-resistant isolate can cause partial disease on the DMItreated seedlings but no disease on the SDHI-treated seedlings."

The work is a co-investment of the Australian Research Council Industry Fellowship, Syngenta and GRDC.





Quality outback horror

"SHOULD we watch a horror film?" is arguably my least favourite sentence anyone could mutter.

"No, we should not," is always my rebuttal. And for those of you reading and thinking I'm just a scared softy, well yes, I am.

In spite of my opposition to such films, which are a recipe for paranoia and poor sleep schedule, I put my personal preferences aside, and went on a Wolf Creek binge fest.

First Wolf Creek, then Wolf Creek 2, then Wolf Creek season 1 and then Wolf Creek season 2. And I can confidently report I am still not a fan of horror.

However, I can appreciate they are quality productions, particularly the two series.

Unlike the second film, which is unrealistic at stages and incredibly graphic, the television series, while still violent, is more thriller than horror.

The series follows antagonist Mick Taylor, played by John Jarratt. Taylor is an Australian serial killer who lives in the heart of the Australian outback near Wolf Creek in Western Australia

Despite the graphic nature of the series. Jarratt embodies the persona of a friendly Aussie bushman, typified by Paul Hogan, but he is an evil psychopath.

The first series follows protagonist Eve, whose American family is murdered by Taylor. The second series is centred around a primarily foreign tour





group who are travelling into the outback.

Both protagonists are targeted by Taylor. While the movie and series are fictional, Jarratt's character is loosely based on Australian serial killer Ivan Milat

The movies and the series were partly filmed in the Flinders Ranges and Port Wakefield, so for South Australians the familiarity of the scenery makes them more frightening.

While I would not recommend this series to people under the age of 18 or those like myself, who aren't huge horror fans, quality acting, setting and unpredictability makes the series bingeable.

Trophy holders: Australia has defeated India to claim the Border-Gavaskar Trophy for the first time in more than 10 years. 





Wallaroo: The boat ramp had gueues at 5am! KG whiting were caught in the early mornings from the edges of the Spencer Gulf Searoad ferry channel and there are garfish and blue crabs at Bird Reef. The jetty had many anglers all trying for blue crabs, garfish and squid.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Late afternoon jetty fishers had blueys, gar and squid at times. Boat crews ran out for gar, souid and blue crabs to as far afield as Cape Elizabeth, West Light and Warburto Point

Point Turton: Gar are schooling north of Hardwicke Bay and there are large but isolated

Marion/Stenhouse Bays: Shore-based fishers have been out in large numbers, putting in the time to try for mullet, salmon trout and soapies, and mulloways overnight. Boat crews have timed their runs out for red nannygai. KG whiting, flathead and even the occasional 10kg tuna. The jetties have souid and a few tommies

Edithburgh/Stansbury: KG whiting to 38cm are off the back of both the Tapley Shoals and the Orontes Bank, plus garfish and snook are out from Coobowie. Squid catches are light but there are a few from Klein Point and Wattle Bay/Point. The jetties have the odd blue crab and afternoon squid.

Ardrossan: Blue swimmer crabs are here and well up along the coast to Price and Port Clinton for boat crews and rakers alike. The other main reports are for garfish and squid out from Tiddy Widdy Beach and then well south to Billy Goat Flat.

New Minlaton courts a big hit

Minlaton Tennis Club has celebrated the establishment of its new courts with the first official hit on the surface on December 20.

The courts, which were completed late last year, were supported by more than \$375,000 of funding.

This included a \$100,000 Yorke Peninsula Council grant, more than \$75,000 from Minlaton District Community and Sports Centre, \$37,500 from MTC, \$139,700 from community donations and fundraising, and \$25,000 from Tennis Australia.

The courts are part of a major upgrade of Minlaton District Community and Sports Centre, which includes a new community centre, commercial kitchen, changerooms and refurbished football facilities.
