\$3.04 million secured for boat ramp upgrade

MARION Bay will get its long soughtafter boat ramp upgrade after Yorke Peninsula Council received \$3.04 million through the state government's South Australian Boating Facilities Fund.

Local stakeholders and community members welcomed the news after it was announced yesterday (Monday, July 10)

Concept plans for the ramp were endorsed by council members in

October, but only approved by the Department for Infrastructure and Transport last week.

YPC CEO Andrew Cameron said the \$3.8m project would be built this financial year.

"It's been a long journey, and we've had to come up with a compromised solution to get here, but it's a good one and an amazing outcome for everyone associated with it," he said.

"We'll now be going to tender as soon as possible, at least within the next two months, and have a target of electing a tenderer by November." Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Tom Koutsantonis said he was delighted the project would finally come to fruition.

"I'm pleased to approve the Yorke Peninsula Council's funding application for \$3.04m for the construction of a new boat ramp at Marion Bay," he said.

"This project will improve safety for all who use the boat ramp.

"I'd also like to acknowledge Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis for his long and tireless advocacy for this outcome on behalf of his community." The plans, developed with Magryn and Associates engineers, include a six metre wide ramp for large boats, a four metre ramp for small to medium boats, new carpark, walkway and wave calming infrastructure.



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Extension for \$7.5 million Wallaroo Shores repayment

COPPER Coast Council will assist Copper Coast Investments (Monopoly Property Group) to find a purchaser for the Wallaroo Shores development.

MPG still owes council more than \$7.5 million for the construction of Liberator Way, which passes through the undeveloped 13.85 hectare site, a six-year debt that was due to be paid by June 30.

A separate rate repayment of \$1,876,796 has been made to council as a result of the allotments sold to date.

Council will now have direct involvement in any sale process, which will allow MPG to repay the separate rate when a purchaser is found.

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said council was taking a proactive step to become a major stakeholder of Copper Coast Investments.

"This agreement establishes formal oversight and greater transparency for council over all dealings of the property owner and involving the land," Mrs Talbot said.

"It preserves the value and orderly development of this project that is very important for the future of Wallaroo's foreshore precinct and region as a

Mrs Talbot said council was not able to take ownership of the land, but only demand payment when MPG failed to pay its separate rate.

"On the sale of land, rates are paid before any other creditor and, consequently, it is important to work with Monopoly Property Group to have successful sales," she said.

"We believe this agreement is a better way forward, placing the developer in the best position to repay the debt in full.

"All outstanding debts will be recouped through this process.

"The community will receive a return on their investment and a development we will all be proud of."

As part of the agreement, the outstanding debt for the road and associated infrastructure must be paid before any other liability on the sale of Wallaroo Shores land.

Trial for 24/7 guards at Wallaroo Hospital

SECURITY guards will be trialled at Wallaroo Hospital following a vigorous campaign by the Australian Nursing and Midwifery Foundation SA Branch and the local community.

State Health Minister Chris Picton announced yesterday (Monday, July 10) the Yorke and Northern Local Health Network board had decided to trial the use of 24/7 guards for six months at the Wallaroo and Port Pirie Hospitals, starting as soon as possible.

This follows recent terrifying incidents at both hospitals.

Police had to taser a man four times when he smashed through two sets of

entry doors at Wallaroo Hospital and attacked the back of an ambulance in mid-February.

There were two violent incidents at

Port Pirie in June, with four nurses and three doctors assaulted. Mr Picton said the trial would be

assessed by the Security Working Group, made up of executives and staff; union representatives would be invited to join.

YNLHN chief executive Roger Kirchner said the group had improved security measures across all sites in recent months, including better deescalation training, duress alarms and improved CCTV.

Our staff have told us security guards will further enhance safety and we're listening," he said.

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Security guards were introduced at the Whyalla and Port Augusta Hospitals in 2021 and at the Mount Gambier and Port Lincoln Hospitals in 2022.

A YNLHN spokesperson said the review of the service at Port Augusta Hospital had included assessing the number of worker incidents, staff incidents, code blacks (threats to personal safety) and incidents requiring security assistance and surveying staff and key partners, including SA Police.

"We will be undertaking a similar review at both Wallaroo and Port Pirie six months after implementation," the spokesperson said.

ANMF chief executive Professor Elizabeth Dabars said the decision was a tremendous win and thanked staff and local communities for backing the branch's campaign.

This included an online petition which attracted 2300 signatures, while more than 100 businesses displayed posters and members wore purple scrubs at work.

"We look forward to working with the security group to ensure this is a solution which remains in place long term" Ms Dabars said.

She said a review of the use of security guards at the Whyalla and Port Augusta Hospitals had found a decrease in the number of violent incidents and psychological injuries reported by staff.

This included a 52 per cent decrease in reports of staff being hit by a moving object or person.

"We are confident that stationing 24/7 security guards at Port Pirie and Wallaroo will have a positive impact in improving safety and in turn positively benefiting patient care," Ms Dabars said.

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis welcomed the announcement as wonderful news for the safety of hospital staff and patients.

"I will be chasing up with the minister at the conclusion of the trial to find out how it went and what the results were," he said.

"This is a good decision for the safety of day and night hospital staff who deserve the full support of the department and community in providing essential front-line health care at our busy hospitals."

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Funding lines questioned at estimates

BUDGET estimate committees have revealed the state government is keen to make further investment at Wallaroo Hospital and that councils will need to contribute financially to any works undertaken on jetties through the new funding.

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis attended estimate committee sessions about the recently released 2023-24 budget on Friday, June 30.

Mr Ellis asked Minister for Health Chris Picton and Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Tom Koutsantonis about issues which pertain to the state of Yorke Peninsula's health and road networks, as well as jetty infrastructure.

Mr Picton acknowledged plans to upgrade the Wallaroo Hospital had been drawn up during the previous government's tenure, but didn't comment on their future.

"I think there clearly will need to be investment in that hospital in the future," he said.

There has already been some investment made... in relation to establishing rehabilitation services at that hospital, which I think is very much welcomed by the community.

"There is not a new allocation of funding in this budget in relation to capital upgrades at Wallaroo Hospital, but it is something which will be under active consideration, I am sure, in relation to future budgets and future health infrastructure discussions."

In response to a question about the allocation of funding for jetty restorations, Mr Koutsantonis said he expected councils would need to con-

The government announced \$20 million would be spent across five years, available for any jetty owned by the state but leased to a council, for which an application is made.

"Some councils have a greater capacity to pay, some councils have done a lot of exceptional work trying to maintain jetties, but it just gets beyond them and their rate base, so I am pretty sympathetic to that," Mr Koutsantonis said.

"I would especially encourage the Member for Narungga, if he feels that there are jetties in his area that have a priority, I am very keen to look at them.

"We have been doing our own body of work through a pilot program at Port Germein, Tumby Bay, Edithburgh, Kingston and Rapid Bay.

'The five draft business cases are now underway by the department, so we are working on those.

"We want to see some longterm management of these jetties, we want to see actual results for our work, but in some cases some councils are reluctant because they do not have the rate base."

Mr Koutsantonis said the government had also identified roads on Yorke Peninsula which were being considered for upgrades, but couldn't name them.

"I was pleased to have on the record that an upgrade for Wallaroo Hospital is in the planning," Mr Ellis said.

"Estimates is a good opportunity to question the full government machine, ministers and bureaucrats all being in the one place.

"Ultimately, having to share the time with the entire parliament and being limited to questioning specific budget lines, one does not have free rein to question everything.

"For some topics we found resolutions and others we found that more lobbying will be required."

"We think it is equally as exciting the new boat ramp will make launching and retrieving more accessible and safer for all.

Funding options for Port Hughes jetty

COPPER Coast Council will seek state funding to repair the Port Hughes jetty.

The structure is one of about 40 state government-owned jetties eligible for a portion of the \$20 million allocated for jetties' upkeep by the government across the next five years.

Council engaged divers to inspect the condition of the Port Hughes jetty in 2020 following severe storms.

The inspection found 10 timber piles to be in extremely poor condition, with repair works estimated at \$756,530.

Council requested the government share the costs of the repairs; the government announced it would complete its own underwater pile inspection earlier this year.

Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Tom Koutsantonis said the outcomes from the assessment would inform both the government and council of accurate costings and the required refurbishment.

The Port Hughes jetty has been leased to council since 2000, but council will have the option of reviewing the lease in

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said the Port Hughes jetty was a

major tourist attraction for the Copper Coast.

'It's good the state government has recognised a need for (jetty) funding but what they've allocated is a tip of the iceberg," Mrs Talbot said.

"It shouldn't be the responsibility of the ratepayers to maintain a government asset."

"Council is reaching out to see if we can obtain some of the funding.

"It shouldn't be the responsibility of the ratepayers to maintain a government asset."

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said he had been lobbying hard for jetty repairs across his electorate.

"Jetties are significant imposts for councils and expensive to maintain," Mr Ellis said.

"If it's beyond the means of councils to maintain them, they'll likely be handed back to the government at the end of their leases and the government will be left with a much larger (repair) bill."

Vaping blitz targets illegal sales

AN eight-week enforcement blitz targeting the illegal sale of nicotine vapes began in South Australia yesterday (Monday, July 10).

The blitz coincides with new state government licence conditions aimed to crack down on the vaping scourge.

SA Health compliance officers will visit businesses selling vapes, including convenience stores, service stations and barber shops, to check licence holders are meeting the new conditions, which require vaping products sold to be nicotine free.

The first wave of inspections will focus on ensuring businesses understand the new conditions.

Follow-up inspections will target businesses to check they have the required evidence their products do not contain nicotine.

Retailers also need to provide information about their e-cigarette suppliers, importers or manufacturers to enable products to be traced.

Enforcement blitzes over the past year have resulted in the seizure of about 15,000 illegal nicotine vapes, 17 fines issued and three licences cancelled.

Businesses found to have breached the new licence conditions may be subject to a warning, expiation notices, seizures of their products or prosecution, depending on the circumstances.

Information packs outlining the new conditions have been sent to about 1800 current and former licence holders.

Any licensed retailer found breaching the conditions risks penalties of up to \$10,000.

Any person or retailer found selling or supplying e-cigarette products or tobacco without a licence faces penalties of up to \$20,000.

New vaping sale rules

TO ensure vaping products are nicotine-free, licence holders must:

- Immediately cease selling, supplying, possessing or storing nicotine vaping products.
- Maintain proof from suppliers that vaping products are
- Arrange laboratory testing if their supplier cannot provide written documentation confirming the vapes do not contain nicotine.
- Maintain relevant documentation of the supplier, importer or manufacturer that enables their products to be traced.
- Train staff and provide adequate supervision re requirements of the Tobacco and E-Cigarette Products Act and other relevant legislation.
- Display their TEP Act licence, including the conditions in a visible place on the premises.



New inspector for SAPOL Yorke and Mid North

THERE Is a new inspector in SA Police's Yorke and Mid North Local Service Area.

Inspector Caroline Jacobs assumed the role earlier this year after spending the first 36 years of her SAPOL career based in Adelaide.

"I graduated (from the police academy) in 1987 and was metropolitan-based ever since," Ms Jacobs said.

"I've progressed up in the ranks and $\,$ attained commissioned officer rank in 2017, worked as a district duty inspector in a couple of metropolitan local service areas and then applied to be transferred up here."

Having never previously worked in a regional area, Insp Jacobs said she jumped at the opportunity.

"What more of a beautiful place could you work in than the Copper Coast?" she said.

"Everyone that I've met has been very friendly and just wants to have a chat."

Insp Jacobs covers an area of more than 35,000 square kilometres from Yunta to Marion Bay.

"Every morning, the superintendent (Mark Syrus), the Crime Investigation Branch, Family Violence, intel section, patrol sergeant and myself meet and go through every crime that's occurred in the past 24 hours," she said.

"We scrutinise them (the crimes) to see if there's a trend or pattern.

"My day consists of discussing operational matters with the management team, patrols, attending the tactical group meeting and tending to all operational matters in the LSA, including high-risk events.

"It is also important to get out from behind my desk to see first hands what is happening in our area.

"We also really rely on the community — if you know something, say something."

Ms Jacobs said she's been pleased to see a downward trend in crime on the Copper Coast recently.

"Police are out and about more now our car is a mobile office," she said.

"We use our intelligence information to zone in on what's actually happening — we've got a very good idea of who's doing what and where because we have many programs which point us to what's happening.

"Policing is easy once you know where your crime is."

Insp Jacobs said every day as a police officer is different.

"Being a police officer who lives in the community, it's in my best interest to make sure it's safe," she said.

"I just want to see people happy — I think it's really important to be kind to people because you never know what's going on behind closed doors.

"My work ethics and morals are very high, but I like to have a laugh as much as everyone else."

Weather event on high alert

AUSTRALIA has not declared an El Niño but the country is on high

The United Nations officially announced the major weather change last week, saying it could lead to "supercharged temperatures" across Australia, but the Bureau of Meteorology has siad it had not reached that level yet.

BOM stated there was now a 70 per cent chance of El Niño forming, according to its methodology.

"The models show it's very likely the tropical Pacific Ocean temperatures will reach El Niño levels during winter, (and) we have seen some movement in the atmosphere towards El Niño conditions," senior climatologist Catherine Ganter said.

"While our El Niño Alert criteria have been met, these changes will need to strengthen and sustain themselves over a longer period for us to consider an El Niño event."

Weatherzone senior meteorologist Brett Dutschke said El Niño would reduce the chances of receiving above-average rainfall and increase the chances of it being a warmerthan-average season.

"For Yorke Peninsula, the chances of exceeding average seasonal rainfall are only about 30 per cent and the chances of exceeding the seasonal average temperature are about 80 per cent," Mr Dutschke said.

"Compared with an average winter, we can expect shorter and fewer cold spells (both day and night), shorter and fewer frosty outbreaks, and longer dry spells and warm spells for the remainder of this season.

"There is the potential for significant warming and drying in late winter and into spring."

The Bureau's criteria for an El Niño Alert have been developed as part of a staged system to alert Australians to the increased likelihood of El Niño.

El Niño describes changes in the Pacific Ocean trade winds that affect global weather, an event which occurs on average every three to five years.

During El Niño, there is a higher chance of drier weather in eastern Australia and it's more likely to be warmer than usual in the southern two-thirds of Australia.

Splashing out at Port Broughton

CONTRACTORS have been announced for a water play feature which will become the centrepiece of Port Broughton's upgraded Civic Square.

Civil construction company Hamlyn Wilson has been awarded the contract and will work with partners including water feature installer Pumptech and M&I Concrete.

Barunga West Council CEO Maree Wauchope said the contractors had

extensive experience and an understanding of recurrent maintenance challenges, especially for water play areas near beaches.

She said Pumptech would commission the water feature and electrical components nine weeks after procurement of the equipment.

"Council has chosen a concept design which eliminates the future need for relocation of the pumping and filtration system," Ms Wauchope said.

"Demolition of the existing Civic Square will begin in the coming

months, with construction expected to be complete by Christmas, subject to

"This is a promising first step towards turbocharging tourism in the Top of the Yorke.

'This addition to our array of events, facilities and attractions will encourage young families to take a detour from the highway for a stopover.

"It will certainly also boost the appeal of Port Broughton as a destination."

Ms Wauchope said the water play feature would also be a boon for locals.

"This free water play area will notably enhance the region's appeal for our youth, families, and visitors to Port Broughton, recently awarded the 2023 SA Tiny Tourism Town Award," she said.

The Civic Square upgrade project may also include enhancing and possibly relocating the local Visitor Information Centre.

Ms Wauchope said the upgrade was initially delayed due to planning issues surrounding the water feature design.

"Previous plans necessitated future

relocation of the pumping and filtration system, raising concerns about potential costs," she said.

"However, council's project team developed an alternative which eliminates the need for future relocation, aligning the project with its budget."

BWC's draft annual business plan for 2023-24 states council is aiming to complete the Civic Square upgrade by the end of 2023.

The project began in 2021-22 and has an approved total budget of \$916,850 over three years.

More jabs at local pharmacies

GETTING vaccinated is now easier than ever, as the state government has expanded the range of vaccinations provided by community pharmacists to help alleviate pressure on GPs.

Pharmacists are now able to administer 10 more vaccines including for chickenpox, measles, meningococcal, hepatitis and shingles.

They can also give a further three vaccines to a broader group of South Australians, making them available to more young people and families.

These include the measles, mumps and rubella vaccine, the diphtheria, pertussis and tetanus vaccine and the diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus and polio vaccine.

More pharmacists are also able to administer the Japanese encephalitis virus vaccine for people aged 5 years and over.

Chief public health officer Professor Nicola Spurrier said the expanded range of pharmacist-administered vaccinations would help increase uptake of additional vaccines, providing greater protection to the community.

"During the busy winter months and beyond, this will help ease demand on GPs and help alleviate pressure on our health services," she said.

Stansbury pharmacist George Kokar said the initiative made it much easier for local people to get a range of vaccinations.

By getting vaccinations at a pharmacy, they would not

have to get an initial GP consultation for the prescription, go to a pharmacy to get the prescription, then have another booking at the GP clinic for the vaccination to be administered, he said.

Mr Kokar said if patients booked ahead, in many cases he could get the vaccine delivered the next day.

"To get an appointment with a doctor here is at least a two-week wait," he said.

Mr Kokar said getting vaccinations done at a pharmacy could also be cheaper, depending on the type of vaccination and the patient, as the only charge was for the price of the vaccine.

"I suggest people have a conversation with their pharmacists about where it's cheaper to get vaccinations done," he said.

Builders Felmeri Homes scrambling to save face

FELMERI Homes was given two weeks to finalise a repayment plan when a second meeting with creditors was held on June 26.

The company went into voluntary administration in May, with debts owed to up to 35 organisations, including Wallaroo Shores site developer Copper Coast Investments (Monopoly Property Group), which is owed more than \$1.1 million, and Mobil Kadina, which is chasing just over \$2000.

Administrator Leigh Prior first met with creditors on May 31, when it was revealed Felmeri's debts were estimated at \$10m but could reach to upwards of \$20m.

The second meeting was adjourned while Felmeri directors look to save the company from liquidation.

The administrator was advised a large, national building group (with expertise in commercial and residential construction) together with Felmeri, sought to propose a Deed of Company Arrangement. The DOCA builder required additional time to complete necessary due diligence prior to finalising a proposal.

Mr Prior said the directors had until July 10 (yesterday) to submit their DOCA proposal before reviewing the terms and issuing a recommendation to creditors ahead of a rescheduled meeting on July 17.

"It is unfortunate a DOCA proposal was not provided to me prior to the Administrator's Report to Creditors being sent on June 16," Mr Prior said.

While the terms of the DOCA proposal are yet to be confirmed, they are likely to include an upfront payment to creditors, excluding those related to the company's directors.

The DOCA builder would take over the majority of residential property builds, there would be reimbursement to insurer QBE for payments made pursuant to the Builders Indemnity Insurance and certain non-profitable builds would be excluded.

If a DOCA is approved by creditors, control of the company will return to its directors.

Otherwise, the company could be placed into liquidation, with its assets sold off in a bid to recover funds.

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YPC rate feedback received

YORKE Peninsula Council will adopt its 2023-24 annual business plan and budget at its July meeting after receiving one spoken and 11 written submissions during the public consultation period.

The financial year's budget includes an overall rate rise of eight per cent, with a further three per cent to be paid by primary producers.

Of the 11 submissions, four were critical of the rate rise.

Ratepayer Kay Klopp rejected the proposed rating model in her written submission.

"Residential and primary production land values have increased significantly over

very recent times. This in itself has had the effect of increasing our rates substantially," she said.

"The proposed... is a huge 'double dipping windfall' by Yorke Peninsula Council.

"If this council has to live within its means and have a smaller operating surplus, then so be it."

Roger Hogben, also a ratepayer, took the opportunity to speak at council's monthly meeting on Wednesday, June 28.

He urged elected members to continue raising rates.

"It worries me that this council isn't raising its rates," he said.

"If we don't pay more rates, our money won't be spent here, but with the taxes we're paying to the state and federal governments going up, it's spent where

they want it.

"If I pay more rates here, it is spent here; I'm more than happy to pay more in rates to get my road fixed.

Council CEO Andrew Cameron said it was gratifying to receive several feedback sub-

'This is the most we've received during the past few years, so that's pleasing to see," he said.

"It has only happened once or twice in the past decade I've been in this role where someone has attended the allotted time for public engagement on the draft plan.

"We'll now take the annual business plan to the meeting next month for its adoption, having just received the final valuations from the Valuer-General."

indicated the need for better defined beach access.


"Lots of the pathways (along North Beach) are just not usable if you're in a wheelchair or trying to pull a kayak through," Mr Coutts said.





Moonta Area School held its annual Cultural Day on Wednesday following other NAIDOC Week celebrations throughout the week — including a visit from native animal demonstrator Australian Bush Buddies.

Students participated in a smoking ceremony led by Nharangga man Peter Turner before delving into bracelet making, face painting, boomerang decorating colouring-in projects.

The event was attended by representatives from Sonder, Australian Red Cross and Newchurch Family

Aboriginal education teacher Bella Congdon said the school had embedded Nharangga culture and history throughout the learning experience of its students.

"We have 50 ATSI students who come from all different language groups across Australia," Ms Congdon said.

"It is important to engage and celebrate a week like NAIDOC Week to allow our students to involve themselves in their culture and share this with the whole school community."

Ms Congdon said students engaged in a variety of workshops by Nharangga Elders.

"This included a workshop with Nggarrindjeri, Ngadjuri, Nharangga, Wirangu Elder woman Sonya Rankine who talked about the dreaming story Thukeri and how these stories teach students life lessons," Ms Congdon said.

"She then worked with the students to weave a scale for a larger Thukeri (bream) to be displayed at the 'Our Mobs' exhibitions.

"The students also listened to Shane Warrior who shared his knowledge and experience of the Nharangga land and showed students how to throw a boomerang.

"And the students are still talking about the Australian Bush Buddies visit — the excitement was evident on their faces and their reactions to the animals."

Central Yorke School hosted its own event at its Maitland campus last Thursday.

A Nharangga Elder, Mr Warrior led a whole school smoking ceremony before invited guests attended an Elders lunch led by South Australian Aboriginal Secondary Training Academy students.

"We were so lucky to have Shane Warrior conduct the smoking ceremony and it was great to see how respectfully engaged students were throughout this process," assistant principal Chelsea Schmidt said.

The students from Warooka


Primary School presented a compelling design which took a health and wellbeing approach to creating an environment to support children living in off-Earth communities," Ms Close said.

MOOSE'S Marrow Mob is still making a difference.

"We're always looking for people who can put their hands up and help for a couple of hours during the show to either sell bags for the ag discovery trail, or be a presence in the ag learning centre."




"We are so proud of the people who give up their precious time to serve South Australian regional communities."

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

Trevor said the Indonesian people have a loving and helpful nature. He and his team of about 300 people rejuvenated a disused tin mine, with many locals learning how to work it.


Ray thanked Trevor for his informative talk and many questions were asked.

"I have added 13 resting spots along this journey to symbolise each year level," she said.

"This pattern and these colours remind me of the rainbow serpent, a Dreamtime story, which tells the importance of life-giving water and the cycles of the seasons."



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Elders to age with dignity on Country

AN Aboriginal aged care provider is calling for more opportunities for Elders to age with dignity on Country.

Aboriginal Community Services CEO Graham Aitken said this year's NAIDOC Week theme, For Our Elders, emphasised the importance of having them in our communities.

"They are the cultural knowledge holders, teachers, leaders and survivors of our communities," he said.

"We should celebrate and honour our Elders every day and ensure they can age with dignity and respect in their home where they can be connected to culture and Country.

Mr Aitken said too many Elders were unaware they were entitled to aged care services at home or were unable to access them in regional and remote communities.

First Nations people make up 3.2 per cent of all Australians needing access to aged care services, but in South Australia only 1.5 per cent of Home Care recipients are Elders.

ACS opened a regional base in Whyalla earlier this year to respond to unmet need in Aboriginal communities across Yorke Peninsula, Eyre Peninsula, Far North, Flinders Ranges, Lower North and Barossa

ACS senior coordinator of regional services Glen Wanganeen said ACS coordinated the provision of home care and support packages for more than 850 First Nations Elders throughout metropolitan, regional and remote South Australia, including at Point Pearce and Port Victoria.

As part of the crackdown, an automatic free kick and 25 metre penalty will be paid for any form of abuse while second-time offenders will receive an instant yellow card, a ree kick and 25m penalty awarded

YPFL umpire coordinator Rob

"Written complaints have been received by the SANFL MRO (match review officer) and the YPFL about continual umpire abuse," Rankine said.

"It is unfortunate the abuse to umpires, whether it be a central, boundary, or goal, has significantly increased and needs to be addressed from an association and club level.

"Club members are reluctant to put their hands up (to umpire) due to the ongoing abuse experienced from players and spectators.

"We've had some horrible encounters this year, including an npire being approached by a club member in a threatening manner after a game."

No nonsense on netball courts

Yorke Peninsula Netball Association president Sue Brown said there had not been many issues with abuse towards netball officials in 2023

"We don't allow for any backchat, and when there is, the ball is advanced as a penalty," Brown said.

"It (the lack of abuse) is because each club supplies one umpire a game and everyone takes their turn to hold the whistle.

"It's important players learn to play to the whistle — some umpires have a short three second rule and for others it's longer."

- All yellow cards or reports given will be followed with a free kick and 25 metre penalty.
- Boundary umpires are to be reminded by clubs any abuse given by players or team staff is to be immediately reported to a central umpire during a stoppage (goal scored).
- Abuse heard from the interchange area will result in a free kick and/or 25m penalty.
- Any training or medical staff heard abusing an umpire will be instantly ordered off the field, followed by a free kick and 25m penalty.
- Spectators around the grounds are the responsibility of both the home and away teams. If a spectator or member of your club is found to be abusing an umpire, we hope the club will deal with the situation accordingly.






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Cracking the code for better barley crops

UNIVERSITY of Adelaide researchers have identified several genes in barley which could eventually lead to crops with increased yields.

The research at the Waite Research Institute used genetic techniques and molecular biology to examine several historical multiovary barley mutants and determine which genes boosted fertility and made the plants more receptive to cross-pollination.

"Although the mutant varieties appeared to be quite similar when grown in the glasshouse, we found one type was more fertile than the others and was capable of producing up to three times the number of seeds than the other plants.

"The genes in that mutant variety of barley could hold the key to increasing the yield of cereal crops," lead researcher Dr Caterina Selva said.

The mutant varieties, which were discovered in the 1980s, produce extra female reproductive organs in each single flower.

This is the first time the genes responsible for increasing fertility have been identified.

Dr Selva said these gene sequences could be used to modify the flower structure of conventional barley, making it more receptive to hybrid breeding.

"By mixing the mutant with other varieties of barley, we can create stronger, more resilient crops which produce higher yields in even the most challenging of environments," she said.

Associate Professor Matthew Tucker said barriers to cross pollination could be overcome by using the more fertile, mutated plants.

"This is even more important in the face of rapid urbanisation, volatile international markets, and extreme weather conditions, which are making growing barley more challenging," he said.

The research was published in the Journal of Experimental Botany.



"Not only does Andrew have lived experience on his family farm but he also brings a wealth of advice around governance being a current councillor and compassion through his work as a rural counsellor.



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HOT FISHING TIPS

Welcome to the column with all the hot tips for fishing around Yorke Peninsula; contact Greg by email at greg@gregjamesfishing.com.au.

Wallaroo: Last week's strong to galeforce winds made for cold, almost impossible fishing conditions. King George whiting, flathead and tommy ruff (Australian herring) should be off the Bird Island reefs and Point Riley to Myponie Point. The jetty has tommies and squid at night.

Port Hughes/Moonta Bay: As the weather clears, try the local blue lines for sauid (close to the bottom). KG whiting, red mullet and flathead. Garfish should be in Moonta Bay as the winds turn north-westerly midweek. The jetties will have a few squid and tommy ruff, again overnight fishing is best.

Point Turton: Boat crews fishing on the drift in Hardwicke Bay should find a few whiting and even large leather jackets. Garfish will start to school off Port Rickaby and Point Souttar, along

with squid and green mackerel. Jettybased fishers should target tommies, mullet and squid.

Stenhouse Bay/Marion Bay: Mullet and salmon to 1kg have been the main reports for shore-based fishing from Corny Point to Hillocks, Tuna, red nannygai, flathead and KG whiting are out from Sturt Bay and Seal Island drops. Big squid are inside the small bay at Port Moorowie. Local jetty fishing has tommies.

Edithburgh/Stansburv: Good catches of medium-sized KG whiting can be had from Rocky Gully and out past Tapley Shoals, plus tommies, squid and a few garfish from Port Giles and Stansbury. The jetties have tommies and salmon trout.

Ardrossan: Boat crews should see an improvement running out to Gus Shoal and Windara Reef. The jetty has tommies and mullet, but it is cold work so take a thermos!
