

Housing support expanded for SYP

COMMUNITY housing support services will be expanded on southern Yorke Peninsula.

From the start of July, Southern Yorke Peninsula Community Housing Association Inc. transferred 34 community housing assets to Uniting Country Housing.

The two organisations are partnering together with the aim of increasing housing support.

Uniting Country Housing provides tenancy management through dedicated tenancy officers and associated Uniting Country SA social programs as part of its South Australian regional community housing portfolio.

Outgoing SYP Community Housing chairperson Robyn Miller said, after discussions with several other community housing providers, they decided Uniting Country Housing was the best fit with their values and with the needs of their tenants and rural communities.

We then commenced a thorough due diligence and negotiation process with United Country Housing," Ms Miller said.

"It was important to the board we made sure no tenant would be disadvantaged as a result of the transfer and all our legal responsibilities would be fully met.

"At a special general meeting (in April), our members voted for the move so we can now all look forward to a strong, viable supply of quality community housing on southern Yorke Peninsula for many years to come."

Uniting Country SA and Uniting Country Housing CEO Dr Harry Randhawa said, during discussions, it was clear SYPCHA had provided much-needed services to vulnerable members of the community.

"We congratulate SYP Community Housing on its contribution and look forward to continuing their legacy in the Yorke Peninsula community, Dr Randhawa said.

Housing organisations on southern Yorke Peninsula have been instrumental in the region for more than 47 years with Minlaton District and Centenary Cottage Homes working closely with Masonic Lodge, Lions and RSL.

In 2010, SYP Community Housing secured funding for purpose-built homes for people with disabilities in Minlaton, Yorketown and Ardrossan.

Whilst achieving registration in 2015, in 2018 it was determined continued management with a voluntary board and one employee was proving untenable given the registration complexities.

Walk a mile in our shoes

I WRITE regarding the cover piece in the YPCT 28-6-22 edition — Rental crisis deepens.

My family has been renting on Yorke Peninsula since 2012.

Of course we would love a house (mortgage) to call our own.

However circumstances have meant that dream is all but unattainable — circumstances that could impact any one of us at any time.

We are all but a moment in time away from an accident, medical episode, a shift in our employment status, or any other twist of fate that could leave us in a state of instability or homelessness.

My family has experienced, first hand, what adverse circumstances can deliver.

I am now a full-time carer for my partner and our (non-biological) son.

Recently we were advised our lease would not be renewed, not because of our tenancy record (it's exemplary) but rather the owner of the property was going to accommodate their friends in that dwelling.

We implored them for more time to find alternative accommodation but we had to accept that was not to be.

I am sharing my experience in the hope the stigma and perceptions, by others, of people who rent may be dispelled.

We respected and treated the property like it was our own home.

I understand not all do, but we did, and the end of that tenancy (we believed to be longterm) was just a cold business transaction.

I ask that, when circumstances call for it, kindness and compassion are the foundation of all interactions and conversations.

Times are tough, no question.

Now more than ever I ask for empathy and understanding to be applied in good measure by landlords.

You, like us, are but a heartbeat away from a change in circumstances.

Not having the security of shelter, a fundamental human right, places us in the most vulnerable of circumstances.

Trying to curb the crisis

IT feels as though we have been covering the housing crisis since the beginning of the pandemic but little to nothing has been done to alleviate the issue.

Affordability and availability continues to be a major issue across Yorke Peninsula.

If you own your home that's great and it gives you some stability, for now, but if you rent in this current climate the chance of being moved on and left to find alternative accommodation last minute is increasingly becoming the norm.

In light of the situation, Uniting Country Housing and Southern Yorke Peninsula Community Housing Association Inc. are partnering together with the aim of increasing housing support on southern Yorke Peninsula. For the bottom of the peninsula this means Uniting Country Housing will now provide tenancy management through dedicated tenancy officers and associated Uniting Country SA social programs as part of their 262 South Australian regional community housing portfolio.

Southern Yorke Peninsula Community Housing Association Inc. has transferred 34 community housing assets to Uniting Country Housing.

On the Copper Coast, Parkview Aged Care in Moonta has been looking at alternative ways to provide housing support to its staff and is investigating the addition of six transportable tiny houses near its facility.

The housing would provide accommodation not only for Parkview staff, but potentially other professionals moving to the Copper Coast who can't find anything other than holiday rentals, which are short-term and costly.

Both are great initiatives in their own right.

It is initiatives such as these that make me wonder why we haven't looked into such options sooner or if there is more that could be done at a higher level to try and curb the crisis.

Works to sink in this month

WORKS to repair sinkhole damage on Verran Terrace, Moonta Mines, should begin by the end of the month.

Part of the road have been closed to the public since the hole. which is a few metres wide and deep, appeared near the corner of Shepherdson Road

between Thursday and Friday, June 9-10. It is believed a water main

break led to the sinkhole. Early information from SA Water indicated the cause of the break was the collapse of an underground mine drive below the pipe

after heavy rains. Copper Coast Council director infrastructure services Tim Neumann said engineers had been onsite and provided a report including rectification requirements.

"Council is looking to team up with a contractor to have two groups working on reconstruct," the Mr Neumann said.

"Team one will work from the east of the sinkhole and team two will work from the west.

"A plan has been devised from using the report and further investigating the site conditions."

Council, along with the contractor, is working on contingency plans, Work Health and Safety, and quality assurance measures.

"This is to continue over the next few weeks and is designed to assist in eliminating possible project hold points that could have a financial or timing impact," Mr Neumann said.

"Works onsite are scheduled to begin in the last week of July, a completion date has not been estimated due to the complexity of the unknowns underground.

"Council reminds people the ground is unstable and urges anyone visiting to remain behind the fencedoff area."

Detours are currently in place to navigate around the sinkhole.

Freezing temps tip records

EXTRA cold weather has set in for Yorke Peninsula

Several towns have already felt record lows and unusually thick fog. Edithburgh recorded its coldest minimum temperature in two years, dropping to 1.1 degrees last

Wednesday, July 6. Kadina also dropped to -0.9, Minlaton 2.3 and Warooka 4.9 on Wednesday, the coldest day for each of the towns since last winter.

Stenhouse Bay felt the prolonged cold snap late last week, recording a 4.6-degree minimum on Sunday, July 10, the town's lowest temp since winter 2021.

Weatherzone senior meteorologist Brett Dutschke said the amount of fog observed late in the morning at some local towns was unusual.

'This fog has been a result of a build-up in humidity from persistent southerly winds due to a stubborn high to the south of the state," Mr Dutschke said.

"During the nights and early mornings, the high has caused cloud to partially clear and for wind to calm, allowing it to become cold and for the humid air to form into fog. "On some days (last week),

wind stayed so light that it was unable to mix the air and burn off the fog until after lunchtime."

Mr Dutschke said he expected the next few nights and mornings to be cooler than average.

'The best chance of frost is this Thursday morning (July 14) but any frost would most likely be light," he said.

"It's unlikely to be colder than last week in most areas."

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Testing station catches drink and drug drivers

THREE drink and drug drivers were detected at Kadina on Friday night, July 8.

Yorke Mid North Highway and Copper Coast patrols conducted a driver testing station between 7pm and 8pm on the Copper Coast Highway. A 57-year-old man from Bute was caught drink driving with a blood alcohol reading of 0.109.

His car was impounded and he was issued an instant six-month loss of licence. A 46-year-old woman from Kadina

returned a blood alcohol reading of 0.128. Her car was impounded and she was issued an instant six-month loss of licence. Both the man and woman drink drivers

were reported and summonsed to appear in court at a later date. A 32-year-old man from Elizabeth was

detected drug driving and returned a positive result for methamphetamine.

He may face charges pending forensic analysis results.

Traffic operation kicks off school holidays

SOUTH Australia Police caught 54 people driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs in a 24-hour blitz beginning on Friday morning, July 8.

The state-wide Operation Stop Drink Drug Drive resulted in 6254 alcotests and 242 drug tests.

Of those tested, 31 drivers were detected drink driving and 22 for drug-related offences.

Sixteen drivers had their vehicles impounded and 19 were issued immediate losses of licence.

Superintendent Bob Gray said there had been drivers making poor choices. "This operation was timed to coincide

with the start of school holidays and the anticipated increase in people on roads across the state," he said.

"It should be no surprise to drink and drug drivers to be caught by police as we will continue to run these operations to protect other road users."

During the previous operation in June, 30 drivers were detected committing either an alcohol or drug driving offence.

Child sex offenders set to face tougher punishments

MAJOR changes to child sex offender laws will mean predators spend more time behind bars.

The Statutes Amendment (Child Sex Offences) Bill 2022 is set to better protect children and empower authorities to crack down on abuse after passing through state parliament last Thursday, July 7.

Among the changes, the maximum penalty for gross indecency with or in the presence of a child has increased from five to 15 years in prison, while those caught in possession of a child sex doll could face more than a decade behind bars.

Online predators who download, share or create heinous child abuse material are also being targeted.

The bill amended Carly's Law to help police hunt predators who use the internet to lie about their age and attempt to meet with children.

Offenders, who previously would have faced a lesser penalty when the age of their victim was unknown, can also now be penalised more harshly.

SA Attorney-General Kyam Maher said passing this bill means SA is among the toughest states in the nation when it

comes to protecting kids and punishing predators.

"The penalties imposed on predators now better reflect the lifelong impacts left on their victims," Mr Maher said. "The government has listened to survivors of child sex abuse and their families, and we are proud to deliver tough new laws that will appropriately punish predators."

Port Broughton gets sand renourishment

SAND replenishment works have begun on Port Broughton's

Located on the southern side of the township, the stretch was renourished with sand at a depth of about 750 centimetres on the beach side of the street's shacks.

Stage one of the sand replenishment and vegetation program has been delivered by local contractor Aitchison Earthmoving after being enabled by \$30,000 from the Coast Protection

Barunga West Council initiated the project after learning of the significant sand erosion which has occurred along the

Port Broughton foreshore in recent years.

Manager for assets and infrastructure Steve Davey said the project would be a gamechanger for long-term coastal protection in Port Broughton.

"We're very excited to be delivering this project for the benefit of residents and the environment," Mr Davey said.

"Council understands the somewhat alarming condition of the beach and how concerning that is if you live on the bayfront and have seen the erosion that has occurred over recent years.

"This is a substantial project that will protect both public and private property from future coastal erosion issues."

The project also involves

monitoring of sand levels at intervals along the beach before works are completed, as well as regular monitoring afterwards.

'The intent is to build up the profile of the beach and provide protection from future erosion and storm events," Mr Davey said.

"This is the first step in council's long-term coastal protection program.

'We encourage residents who are interested to snap a photo of the Dalling Street beach at different stages to help us gauge how the tides are moving the sand."

Sand replenishment is set to be repeated annually until the beach is stable enough to provide erosion protection for beachfront properties.




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Moonta tiny homes out for consultation

PARKVIEW Aged Care, Moonta, is investigating the addition of six transportable tiny houses near its facility.

The proposal, which was put to Copper Coast Council last week, would feature the installation of twobedroom rentals on council-owned Allotment 2, 1 Majors Road.

These homes would be rented by new Parkview staff.

Council is now seeking public comment on the potential development.

Parkview general manager Alison Clare said if the project was approved, Parkview would fully fund the first three 6.4-metre x 5.85m units, with potential for another three to be installed further in the future.

"There is a clear need for rentals on the Copper Coast and this housing crisis has stopped us from recruiting staff to our region," she said.

"The housing would provide accommodation not only for Parkview staff, but potentially other professionals moving to the Copper Coast.

"Our staff can't find anything other than holiday rentals, which aren't sustainable due to costs.

"We've gone from having 104 staff to 122 in the past six months and I cannot see this growth stopping anytime soon."

Council has not yet allocated funding to assist in installing the tiny homes.

The proposal has been released for public consultation with a decision to be made at council's ordinary meeting in September.



Barunga West Council aligning rates with increased capital values

BARUNGA West Council has released its draft Rating Policy for 2022-23.

A five per cent increase in total rate revenue has been approved to cover council's service and proiect costs.

The increase includes an annual fixed charge of \$394 for rateable property, commencing from Friday, July 1.

The new charge is \$19 more than the \$375 paid in 2020-21, and will generate an extra \$241,000.

Council has also proposed a decreased differential rate model, which is applied to the land use capital valuation of each property.

Manager for corporate and community services Michael Oertel said, without amending the differential rate, council would have had a significant increase in general rates this year, due to a 23.3 per cent capital value increase.

"In decreasing the differential rate, we offset the increase in capital value of properties to get the fixed increase council is seeking to achieve," Mr Oertel said.

"By increasing the fixed fee, we are decreasing the rates we need to collect from the differential rate.

"We saw primary producers have had a far greater increase in capital value than residential ratepayers, so we felt it was appropriate to decrease percentage paid by primary producers."

The differential rate is set to increase by an average of 3.59 per cent for residential properties; however, Mr Oertel emphasised it wouldn't be the same across the entire region.

"People's properties have different capital values — some people's values haven't increased and, with a reduction of cents in the dollar, their rates will go down," he said.

"Whereas someone else's rates, (whose property value has) gone

up by higher than average, will see an increase.

"We're dealing with the total of the ratepayer base and there will be fluctuations within that."

CEO Maree Wauchope said the current financial year is set to be difficult for council staff, who will have to balance a minimal general rate rise despite sharp increases in operating costs.

"Council is under the same

pressures as small businesses and every ratepayer dealing with higher costs," Ms Wauchope said.

"We will have to absorb operational cost increases and continue implementing fiscal management measures.

"Council will keep working to secure supplementary funding so rates are not the only revenue we have to fund vital projects and services"

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Tucking into plastic alternatives

GREEN Industry South Australia's latest report has shown the community is keen to remove a new wave of singleuse plastics.

The report, Turning the Tide, calls for items such as single use plastic cups, containers, bowls, and plates to be the next products taken out of circulation, with items such as cotton tips and confetti to also be phased out sooner rather than later."

"It is abundantly clear the public wants action on singleuse plastic and we will continue to engage with business, including the hospitality sector, about the best way forward," Deputy Premier Susan Close said.

More than 3500 South Australians participated in the report, with an overwhelming 97 per cent supporting the change to more renewable items.

The Smelter, Wallaroo, owner David Wreford said the business had made the transition to renewable items 12 months prior to the mandate.

"Customers have been more than happy to make the switch," he said.

"Apart from the extra cost there have been no problems. "We have to do what's right

for the environment." Café Capella's, Moonta, owner Kirby Carter said the phasing out of plastic containers throughout the café had been straight forward. "We haven't really had an issue apart from the extra financial wear which comes with the new products," Mrs Carter said.

"It hasn't really been an issue for customers either, food travels easier in carboard and keeps it warm without getting soggy, so there haven't been too many complaints."

Manager at the Kadina Hotel, Brett Bateson also said there had been no real complaints from customers.


"There is not too much more to phase out for food venues as paper straws and cardboard containers have become pretty common," he said.

Mr Bateson said it had become impossible for him to purchase plastic items even if he wanted.

Expanded polystyrene cups, bowls, plates and clamshell containers have been prohibited from sale, supply or distribution in South Australia since March 1, 2022, with more changes to come in the near future.

"With nominations opening on Tuesday, August 23, and closing on Tuesday, September 6, it's time now to think about nominating as a candidate and planning a campaign."

COMMUNITY groups and businesses in Maitland are busy preparing for the town's 150th birthday celebrations in August.

A number of activities have been planned by the town progress association across the weekend of Saturday and Sunday, August 13-14.

Among the featured events is a celebration dinner at Barley Stacks Winery on Saturday and a sack truck race on Sunday, both of which are open to the community.

Limited edition port and Maitland 150 special ale will be sold by Barley Stacks and Watsacowie respectively while a Maitland pie featuring lamb and lentils will be on offer from the Maitland Bakery.

Maitland Progress Association president Emma Leonard said the effort involved was befitting of the town's history.

"The first day is very much about history and getting together and to have a big celebratory dinner which will feature a fashion show full of older clothing and live entertainment," she said.

"Capacity for that event is limited and it's selling fast so we encourage people to get their tickets, which are priced at \$95, and come along.

"On Saturday morning, Steve Thomas (progress association) and Beryl Neumann (National Trust Maitland branch) will be taking guided town history walks which they've put a lot of work into and should be fantastic."

Maitland was proclaimed on August 22, 1872 and sits in the third location chosen for the town after public opposition and floods put a stop to the first two.

Ms Leonard said Sunday would be a family fun day with something to suit everyone.

"We're hoping to have about 60-70 people involved in the sack truck race so that should be really good fun and over in Pioneer Park there'll be oldfashioned family and kids' games to have some fun with," she said.

"We've got a celebration of old motor vehicles on Sunday morning, and the Maitland Markets will be open with food, drink and live music, and this is where people will be able to buy the port or beer as well."

She said it's fantastic so many people are excited to share the town's history and become involved.

"There's been a lot of energy put in by a lot of different people and groups so it's been fantastic to come together for this one, big event," Ms Leonard said.

"The program for the weekend has been designed to celebrate this huge milestone with a range of events for diverse interests that reflect the past, present and future of the community.

"The town history walk, opening of the native garden trail, celebration dinner and sack truck relay all require an RSVP by Friday, August 5, so make sure to get in as early as possible."



Ryder, a golden retriever, and Bundy, German shepherd, are the newest visitors to Estia Health Kadina and Parkview Aged Care, Moonta.

The dogs are part of Therapeutic

Dog Services SA's trained pet therapy teams, which visit more than 90 facilities across the state.

A therapy dog provides comfort, companionship and emotional support to individuals, families and residents of the facilities.

Residents are able to interact physically with the dogs and engage with them one on one.

Tyla and Ryder have been making monthly visits to Parkview while Lois and Bundy visit Estia Health fortnightly.

"The residents here love it," Parkview senior lifestyle coordinator Amanda Weger said.

"Every time they hear that Tyla and Ryder are coming they get so excited."

Both Tyla and Lois enjoy their therapy visits, with the dogs always welcomed by residents and staff.

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



"Work defines you in many ways and if you're not involved in the community, work is very important," she said.

"Country Home Services is like a family, and I have some really strong bonds through work.

"My passion is about improving people's lives."

Barb encourages mature age workers who feel as if they can still work, to look for flexible employment options in their local communities.

"You don't have to be highly skilled or have a tertiary education, it's so much more about the interpersonal skills," she said.

"Of our contracting workforce, the average age is around 60.

"You don't need any formal form of qualification unless it's a personal care role, you just need to be a caring person."

Graham has been growing orchids for 37 years and previously owned Valley Orchids.

He said, if you grow orchids in shade houses, it's best to use 50 per cent black cloth and use a fogger to assist with watering.

A medium of 65 per cent chunky pine bark, 30 per cent coir fibre and five per cent marble chips makes the ideal potting mix, Graham recommended, as well as fertilising every two weeks with a quality product such as Go Go Juice or Seamungus.

He also had a beautiful display of plants for sale.

Rex then walked members through his droughtresistant garden before touring Jenny's garden and feeding her alpacas.

The initial eight-month agreement reflects funding changes at state and federal government levels and it is expected this will be extended once these changes are implemented, Care in Motion CEO David McDonald explained.

"We are thrilled by the opportunity granted by the District Council of Mount Remarkable to take on the operations of the NPTN," Mr McDonald said.

"We consider Lyn to be an asset to the service, and the tremendous volunteer network is priceless.

"I am extremely proud Care in Motion was approached to operate the NPTN and to support transport disadvantaged people in these communities."

Care in Motion's recent restructure means it can effectively set up satellite operations run by local people, Mr McDonald said.

"Implementing consistent best practice allows for support from any of Care in Motion's locations."

Mount Remarkable council CEO Sam Johnson said council was satisfied to enter into the agreement with Care in Motion, a respected community transport provider which has a proven track record of service delivery.

"We are looking forward to a long and healthy working relationship to continue providing this valuable service to multiple communities," Mr Johnson said.

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



Eleventh heaven for Pro

An 11-goal performance from spearhead full forward Nick Prokopec has spurred Moonta to a 121-point thumping of Wallaroo.

With just five minor rounds to go, the win keeps the Demons in touch with top position on the ladder, and resigned Wallaroo to seventh, two wins behind all-important fifth spot.

Prokopec nailed seven goals by threequarter time and four missed chances in the last quarter looked likely to derail his ambitions of double figures.

But with teammates looking for him at every opportunity, his 10th came through a set shot 25 minutes into the quarter, followed by another four minutes later.

The visitors were in a positive mood early, when key forward Matthew Altmann received a handball on the run from teammate Alex Elsworthy and slotted truly.

Functioning soundly alongside their forward line, Moonta's midfield was as clinical as ever as Malcolm Karpany and Ryley Maitland delivered ball after ball to the hands of goalkickers.

Moonta coach Luke Pridham said it was really important his side bounced back after falling to ladder-leaders Kadina.

"We really needed to show something this week after Kadina got a hold of us (before the bye) two weeks ago," he said.

"We haven't been too far off it I think, we've just been ravaged by injury and Covid, which can hit any team, so it was pleasing to get it done, but get it done in such a way."

Tom Hancocks nailed another for Moonta and when Prokopec kicked his fourth and fifth for the day before halftime, the margin was 67-points.

In another fruitless quarter for Wallaroo, the goals flowed at the other end to Prokopec, Altmann, Kieran Yakas, Turner, Harrison Hatcher and Prokopec again.

"We're lucky to have both Nick (Prokopec) and Matt (Altmann) because they can both play the full forward role well and on Saturday it was Nick who had a day out," Pridham said.

"As a team, we need to keep working and knuckle down, Central Yorke are going to be a really big test again this week but we know what we need to work on."

Wallaroo coach Ben Abela said there wasn't much that could be done to combat Prokopec's influence on the contest.

"I think I tried about three different opponents on him throughout the course of the contest and full credit to him he's put a lot into his game over the past year to get back into shape and form," he said.

"We took a lot out of the game from a learning perspective, picking up how Moonta play, but its players were on from the first minute and they kicked six goals in every quarter so they were in no mood to let up."

Prokopec kicked his eighth within a minute of the last quarter beginning, before Ben Russell, one of Wallaroo's best performers for the day, got his side's second goal for the contest.

It was the catalyst for a quick flurry of goals, which featured back-to-back goals to Scott Weger. Harry Williams got on the end of his second before Prokopec finished his day with three in a row.







I mean, CMS Crows are sitting two games clear of CY Cougars, so the top two are all but confirmed.

However, Bute, Kadina and Paskeville are all

sitting on 14 points.

All three have a bye in the next five weeks, with Paskeville potentially having a slightly easier run as Bute and Kadina both come up against CMS Crows, and Kadina also has CY Cougars.

Round 17's Paskeville v Kadina match could be a real nailbiter.

Moonta could also cause a few upsets, having gotten stronger as the year has gone on.

Further down the ladder, I'm tipping Ardrossan to get its first win of the year against Wallaroo in round 15. I'll leave you to my thoughts - enjoy the break and we'll see you next week.



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



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Paddock-to-beverage tracing project brewing

GRAIN growers across the state will participate in an exciting new collaboration where barley will be tracked and traced from paddock to beverage.

The project is funded through the state government's AgTech Growth Fund, with Coopers Brewery, Grain Producers SA and AgTech company Trust Provenance working together on the plan.

Growers will work with Trust Provenance's software to capture data points along the barley's journey, then link into Coopers' software to enable a full paddock-to-beverage traceability platform.

GPSA CEO Brad Perry said it's a unique opportunity for South Australian malting barley growers to take part in an innovative paddockto-beverage traceability pilot project.

"Many of our grain producers already supply high-quality malting barley to Coopers Brewery; in this project, they will be following barley through the many stages to the end product — a high-quality beer," Mr Perry said.

"As part of the traceability program, engagement will occur with a number of growers directly and with grain trading company ADM, to cover all critical tracking events and understand the practical and commercial requirements of all stakeholders.

"The growing global trend for realtime and transparent proof of claim is finding its way into procurement programs for food manufacturers and retailers.

"Making sure South Australian grain producers are future-proofed against evolving supply chain demands is an important part of this program."

Trust Provenance CEO Andrew Grant said data will be viewable through a unique QR code for each batch of barley.

"This allows for real-time monitoring, management and feedback and allows grain producers and Coopers to provide a new level of trust on quality and sustainability and align with consumers' demand for greater transparency on the beverages they are consuming," Mr Grant said.

Coopers Brewery malting manager Doug Stewart said the traceability of the project will demonstrate the qualities and provenance of the grains used.

Weather extremes offer reasons to diversify

A NEW study has found the agricultural sector will increasingly need to adapt to overcome weather extremes.

The international research, which includes input from Flinders University, considers the reliance of many countries on a narrow band of agricultural practices which exposes landowners and the economy to fluctuations controlled by weather, trade and other external or global factors.

The economic geography study published in Regional Studies, Regional Science (Taylor and Francis Online) looks at OECD areas such as the Netherlands, which has great uniformity and varying degrees of diversification in its farming regions.

"This study has some timely messages for the Australian agricultural industry, particularly in light of the massive rainfall flooding large areas of farming land at present," Flinders University lecturer in international business Dr Sharif Rasel said.

Dr Rasel said another recent study found climate change would increase the risk of more regular floods in Australia, leaving intensive farming regions on the eastern seaboard more vulnerable to crop losses, and affect both national food market supplies and farm income.

"Therefore, diversification on farmland will help farmers to reduce their income uncertainty, and can include even nonagricultural activities such as tourism," Dr Rasel said.

"Our study shows the concentration of non-agricultural activities in close proximity can motivate farmers to become more entrepreneurial.

"For example, in South Australia, based on local industries and business environment, I see opportunities for local agricultural areas to expand business in aged care, disability care and farm tourism."

Findings from the Netherlands show the higher the concentration of entrepreneurial diversification in a region, the greater the likelihood a farmer undertakes entrepreneurship on the farm.

It's estimated only about six per cent of a total 57,000 Dutch farms support sideline businesses, including secondary food production, processing or packaging, eco-tourism, care farming and daycare services alongside their regular agricultural activities.

The report states the concentration of regional or local entrepreneurial activities can give farmers incentives to discover and explore entrepreneurial opportunities and to find technological and financial incentives to integrate these supporting activities into their farming business.





Wallaroo: School holidays arrived as the southerly winds shifted to cold northerlies over the weekend, making any fishing effort a wintry challenge. King George whiting are out from Tickera, Wallaroo Ballast grounds and Bird Reef. The jetty has a few squid. Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Steady catches of whiting are in the Steamer Channel with smaller just-legal fish also in the bay and then west of the light. Red-beak gar and tommy ruff (Australian herring) can also be caught in the bay and from both jetties. Point Turton: Sunday morning came with a feels-like minus 2 degrees Celsius, with north to north-east winds as a few hardy boat crews drifted in Hardwicke Bay for squid and whiting. Port Rickaby jetty had some gar over the weekend as did The Pines and Point Souttar. Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: Salmon to 2kg are at many of the bottom-end beaches, plus mullet and flathead around Hillockys

Beach. Large samson fish have been caught offshore from Marion Bay, along with KG whiting, flathead and snook.

Edithburgh: Good catches of whiting to 38cm have come from Tapley Shoals and the deep waters off Troubridge Light. Marion Reef and Sultana Passage have snook, mulle and garfish. Try the jetties here and Port Giles at dusk for tommies and squid. Stansbury: Garfish and KG whiting remain the go-to species for the first week of the holidays for boat crews as they launched for northward runs out to The Hut and Port Vincent for small gar, squid and whiting. The jetty has been quiet but the beach at the town foreshore is worth a try for winter mullet. Ardrossan: There was no escaping the cold in this neck of the woods and the enthusiasm for fishing-based activities waned a little as the week went by. Gar, KG whiting and a few squid have been the main reports for boaties and tommies from the town jetty.

Five local footballers have been selected to represent Central Zone at the Think! Road Safety SA Country Football Championships in Whyalla this Saturday and Sunday, July 16-17.

The reduced squad of 31 includes CMS Crows trio Murphy Short, Shaun McNeilly and Ben Edwards, as well as Kadina's Giles Ellis and Ryley Maitland, Moonta.

McNeilly was selected as one of eight under 21-aged players in the squad, six of whom are required as part of the final 24-man team which will be announced after training tomorrow night (Wednesday, July 13).

Broughton-Mundoora had zero selections in the reduced Northern Zone team after four were picked in the initial squad.

At least 4000 spectators are expected to attend across the weekend, according to head of SANFL community football Lisa Faraci.
