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Kick in the guts

YORKE Peninsula commercial fishers say they are being discriminated against by a new fees regime that took effect this month, which has been described as a "kick in the guts" that could send them out of business.

The fees are based on a quota sys-

tem aimed at making fishers pay the full cost of government management for King George whiting, garfish and calamari, in Gulf St Vincent and Spencer Gulf only.

Yorketown commercial fisher Shane Bishop said the quotas would ultimately increase fees for fishers by more than 400 per cent and were not being applied to those species in the West Coast or South East zones.

Information from Primary Industries and Regions South Australia shows that a quota does apply in the South East zone for snapper only.

Figures provided by PIRSA to the Marine Fishers Association show management costs for whiting are \$3.06 per kilogram for GSV and \$1.27/kg in Spencer Gulf, while for garfish they are

\$1.95 and \$1.38 respectively.

"The original idea was for the whole state to go to a quota, but because only the fishers in Spencer Gulf and Gulf St Vincent are subject to quotas, we are paying the lion's share," Mr Bishop said.

"Fishing in GSV now is really tough — the costs are so high."

 Narungga MP Fraser Ellis said it

appeared the State Government was trying to force commercial fishers out of GSV.

"I think the gulf fishers have been victimised going back more than 10 years, starting with the marine parks being closed off (to fishing), through to the introduction of quotas," he said.

Scriven must 'step up' over fees

THE State Government's response to the independent cost recovery review for marine scale commercial licence fees lacks clear direction and leadership. The language is deliberatively vague and noncommittal and provides little comfort for industry.

After months and months of secrecy, the Government released its response to the review at the same time as releasing the review, without allowing industry to consider the review.

The review process was secretive, lacked transparency and was slow in nature.

Important documents such as the Heilbron Report were not made available to industry prior to their submissions to the independent panel and the report itself also lacked any information around the reasoning behind Primary Industries and Regions South Australia's cost recovery process.

This lack of transparency was a kick in the face to industry.

Timing is critical and Primary
Industries Minister Clare Scriven must
step up, show leadership and ensure her
government implements the process for
revising and resetting the cost of
compliance and research as soon as
possible to instill confidence back into the
future of the marine scale fishing
industry.

It's important to go back to when the reforms first begun, when there was industry and multipartisan support and marine scale fishers were promised economic sustainability as well as sustainability of stock.

This was promised on the basis that fishers leaving the industry equated to less license fee holders, so one could easily argue less audits and less compliance should follow for the department.

Unfortunately, under Clare Scriven, we are seeing higher license fees and fishers are rightly feeling anxious about the future of the industry.

Exciting times for working parents

THE opening of Minlaton's brand new childcare is a tremendous result for early childhood education, but also a massive step forward for working mothers in the southern Yorke Peninsula region.

The gender-pay gap in Australia is sitting at 21.7 per cent and is costing the Australian economy more than \$50 billion each year.

Many people believe the gap is only about equal wages for the same work, but it is much more complex than that.

Taking time out of a career to have children, or other caring responsibilities, is a big factor in the pay gap, with only 14 per cent of paid parental leave taken by fathers.

This means mothers are the ones taking one for the team, and are often losing years out of their professional development to raise our children.

This also adds to Australia's increasing problem with gender-based violence, leaving women incredibly vulnerable without proper financial security.

One study by industry superannuation fund HESTA has shown a woman who took last financial year off of work would have lost more

than \$6000 towards her superannuation.

When mothers do go back to work, flexibility in working hours often does not cater to caring responsibilities and damages their chances of taking on higher senior roles.

According to the 2021 Census, the YP has 476 children aged from zero to four years of age, and only about 10 per cent of their parents both worked full time hours.

Many of these issues were reflected in the project plan for the southern YP childcare centre, which asked families and business owners to advise how the lack of childcare affected their lives.

Many women, and a few men, told similar stories and said they have had to often leave the workforce all together because there was no reliable childcare.

The Minlaton childcare centre will help many mothers back into employment, but there is still obviously a lot more work that needs to go into fixing the gender-pay gap.

Another thing that needs to be mentioned is the incredible effort three local women took to make the Minlaton childcare a reality — another example of unpaid work women have had to take on.

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Felling sparks fury

TREES in a protected area just south of Moonta have been illegally chopped down, sparking outrage from a heritage body, a Narungga Elder, and others from the local community.

Northern and Yorke Landscape Board staff first saw damage to Rocky Bend Reserve late last month, informing National Trust SA heritage manager Alex Emmins, who oversees the trust's reserves.

"They saw that someone

had driven in and cut down trees for firewood," Ms Emmins said.

"The fact that some of them are still alive, so it's green wood anyway but, not only that, it's the damage to the habitat

"Even dead stuff, that's habitat for insects that echidnas eat, like termites and small ants, so removing that is reduced feed for animals," she said

"There's a flow-on effect."

Ms Emmins said human interaction with the reserve was meant to be limited to having a walk around and

immersing yourself in nature.

"It's native wildlife, so it's really disappointing that someone's done that," she said.

"Yorke Peninsula is the most cleared part of the state, so these little reserves are little havens, pockets of biodiversity for flora and fauna."

Narungga Elder Peter Turner, who has been heavily involved with environmental work in the region, including cultural burning, said he was not impressed when he heard about the vandalism.

"It's got a lot of unique plants in there, different bush foods, orchids, and to be going cutting trees down is just out there," he said.

"It's got a 'conservation reserve' sign right there."

Mr Turner said it looked as though this was not the first time the felling had happened, pointing out old cuts to tree limbs.

"Especially when all you see across the news is environmental issues, it's not as if people are blind to the problems that are happening, and they still go and do things like that," he said.

"Yorke Peninsula is part of the wheat belt and we've got very minimal reserves left. It's mostly bare paddocks.

"Buy the wood, or get permission from a farmer, rather than going to chop down the bush, especially in a reserve."

An online post about the damage also attracted an outcry from a host of community members.

National Trust SA is planning to install surveillance at Rocky Bend Reserve and Ms Emmins asked anyone who saw illegal tree felling there to report it to police.

The Native Vegetation Act states clearing native vegetation carries a maximum penalty of \$100,000.

School success

MINLATON District School ranks in the top five public high schools in the state, according to a new study.

The school finished fifth in the independent Better Education rankings, which is based on data provided by schools.

In a ranking out of 100 based on factors including performance in core subjects, Minlaton achieved 93.

The number one ranking, Glenunga International School, scored 100.

Tax petition

A STATE Liberal Party petition calling on Premier Peter Malinauskas to scrap a new GP payroll tax has attracted more than 1000 signatures since its launch at the start of the month.

The payroll tax changes were introduced on July 1, with Opposition Leader David Speirs saying some South Australians were now paying up to \$20 more to see their doctor.

Mr Speirs has vowed to abolish the tax if his party is voted in.

TB operation

THE State Government is spending more than \$15 million to help eliminate the spread of tuberculosis in Aboriginal communities.

The money will go towards "culturally informed health assessment, diagnosis and treatment", a staement reads.

The government will also work with Aboriginal communities, health care and support services to identify any new cases.

Since May 2022, there has been an increase in TB cases in Aboriginal communities, including more than 20 notifications in the past two years.

Bird flu

A WARNING has been issued by the Invasive Species Council to stay vigilant for the new H5N1 strain of bird flu.

The new strain has been prevalent overseas, and would be a major threat to native animals including native birds, seals and other marine mammals if it spreads through Australia.

The Federal Government has allocated close to \$7 million to prepare for the disease, with Australia now the last continent in the world to remain free of the H5 bird flu strain.

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There's something

Delays in planning tick

AN application to build floating apartments and a boutique gin cellar door at the Port Vincent Marina has been with authorities for more than 15 months, but there is still no word on whether planning or building approval will be given.

The Dockside Port Vincent project, which includes nine apartments near the end of Breakwater Drive, has been given the tick of approval by the Coast Protection Board, but state government body Plan SA and Yorke Peninsula Council have not yet signed off on any part of the development.

This is despite Planning Minister Nick Champion putting out a statement late last month that new planning reforms "could see houses built on development sites up to 18 months faster."

"Councils will be given strict timeframes to assess land division applications," the release stated.

They will be under pressure to assess applications faster or risk being stripped of their responsibilities, the statement read.

Master Builders SA chief executive Will Frogley said, despite the introduction of the Plan SA online portal in the past few years, planning applications were still taking too long to assess.

"The changes were meant to fix everything, but the reality is they haven't," Mr Frogley said.

"It was meant to make the approval process faster, simpler to understand, and yet you talk to builders and I don't think there's too many out there who are ecstatic with the new system.

He said more time was being taken because, when an application went to a different body to be examined, the application sometimes went back to the start again.

"We're strangling housing activity with all this additional red tape at a time when we're desperate to build more homes."

Mr Champion said South Australia's planning system was praised for its speed and efficiency, with the Business Council of Australia ranking the state's planning system first in the nation.

"South Australia is the only state or territory in Australia to have just one state-wide, userfriendly online planning system which is enabling both community and business to benefit from its ground-breaking functionality and service delivery," Mr Champion said.

"Our system is leading the country in our efficiency, consistency, certainty and transparency."

Following an extensive review, the State Government is adopting more than 100 recommendations to make the planning system more efficient and user friendly, he said.

The Dockside Port Vincent website stated the Float Port Vincent project was a "unique offering that is generating a lot of interest and once built, will be a fabulous drawcard to the region".

"Float Port Vincent will offer an absolute front-row seat to all the marina activities and lifestyles. The perfect spot to view the spectacular sunrises and sunsets," the developer stated.

New designs for Dockside

THE quiet seaside town of Port Vincent is preparing for a development boom, with multiple Dockside projects taking shape in and around the mari-

The company behind the Dockside development plan, The Lillis Group, is aiming to transform the marina into a floating community and modern tourist destination.

The main attraction of the project is Lot 1 Marina Drive, a five-storey complex filled with multiple commercial spaces and 52, primarily short-stay, apartments.

On the ground floor there is expected to be two waterfront apartments and about 800 square metres of commercial space, which will include a pool, gymnasium, and a waterfront food and beverage area.

Updated plans for the development were recently resubmitted to Yorke Peninsula Council with more parking on the second level.

Dockside development director Peter Villis said the group had responded to community feedback.

"These changes we trust demonstrate our commitment to a development that harmonises with Port Vincent's character while importantly meeting the community's needs," he

The food area, designed to stretch into the existing pontoon, will be expanded 200 square metres to allow for more outdoor dining and room for

Moving up, levels one to four will contain 50 apartments, which range from one to three bedrooms.

And on level four, there will be a rooftop function area with views looking out onto the marina and the St Vincent Gulf.


One of these views may include nine new floating homes, as well as a cafe and Flinders Gin cellar door (see separate story). Back on land, an extra eight town-

houses, and six with a waterfront view, are expected to be built on lots 3, 30, 85 and 86.

The Lillis Group said close to 180 carparks will be needed to manage the extra residents and visitors, which they will achieve by using vacant land around the site and upgrading the existing carpark next to Lot 1.

Construction is waiting on council approval, with the process after that expected to take about 18 months.

come up with any plan to repair or rectify, but seem more focused on enforcing the ban on 'commercial' use of the wharf," Mr Lehman said.

He was referring to a longrunning issue between a commercial fisher and the council relating to the use of the wharf to sell fish.

Lehman said the process began in 2022 when commercial fisher Jordan Judd decided he would dock his boat at the wharf.

"This young bloke was unloading his fish with most of it going into big boxes," Mr Lehman said.

"(He) was selling things on the wharf with locals and caravan park visitors enjoying it."

Mr Judd said last week he had communicated with the council many times about using the wharf, but to no avail.

"I offered at one point to pay some sort of yearly fee to use it, but they just don't want me using it at all," Mr Judd said.

"This stuff has gone on forever." Yorke Peninsula Council has stated that business use of the wharf was not aligned with its

community land management plan, so it was unable to approve business use such as commercial fishing.

The council also passed a bylaw that required fishers to obtain permission from the council to dock a vessel at the wharf.

YPC executive officer Andrew Cameron said a vehicle had caused damage to the wharf.

Mr Cameron said the pressure had caused severe cracking.

"It needs to stop, because

someone will get killed."

Mr Lehman said the delays in the process has stymied opportunities for the town to seek federal funding to fix the wharf, which other YP towns had recently secured.

Funds have also been allocated by the State Government for the repair of the adjacent Port Vincent fishing jetty, but not for the "more critical" town wharf, he said.

"The jetty wasn't the town's priority," he said.

Inspection of the wharf

THE inspection of the wharf was done in March 2023 by the Robert Bird Group.

RGB recommended shipping and fishing be immediately stopped as well as a strict weight


In the long term, it recommended undertaking an investigation to find the remaining capacity in each structural element, which could involve temporary removal of portions of the concrete topping.

It also recommended getting an engineer to design an upgrade, and to consider a standalone berthing and mooring structure that is independent of the wharf.

The report stated it was prepared for July 4, 2023, but was received by council on June 6, 2024.

At the June council meeting, Yorke Peninsula mayor Darren Braund said it was a shame it had taken so long to receive the report.

"I know we've been waiting for this report for a long time, and we were hoping to get to this a lot earlier."





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In court over animal cruelty

A PASKEVILLE man appeared in Kadina Magistrate's Court this week, charged with five counts of animal ill-treatment under the SA Animal Welfare Act.

Leslie James Bates, 66, appeared in the court on Monday, July 15.

He was charged by RSPCA South Australia in relation to four greyhounds found with serious medical issues that RSPCA has alleged were not taken to a veterinarian.

Two of the dogs were euthanised under veterinary advice.

The offences were alleged to have occurred between May 11, 2022 and May 6, 2024.

The matter was adjourned to September 23 at Kadina Magistrates Court.

Under the Act, the maximum penalty for animal cruelty is \$20,000 or two years imprisonment. For an aggravated cruelty offence, the maximum penalty is \$50,000 or four years imprisonment.

RSPCA SA is the state's only animal welfare charity with inspectors empowered to prosecute animal cruelty under the Act.

Members of the public who witness animal cruelty or neglect are urged to immediately call RSPCA's 24-hour cruelty report hotline on 1300 477 722.

House fire at Maitland

A house fire at Maitland caused \$250,000 worth of damage last night, Monday, July 15.

CFS was informed of the fire at about 8.30pm and five crews extinguished it by about 11.30pm, according to the SA Paging website.

The blaze is believed to have ignited in the lounge or dining room and quickly engulfed the single-storey house, causing a partial roof collapse.

The residents of the home were not present when the fire started.

Drink driver at Kadina

A man was caught drink driving in Kadina on Saturday, July 13.

Police stopped the Holden sedan on Frances Terrace and breath tested the driver just before 9.30pm.

The driver, a 23-year-old man from Paskeville, allegedly returned a blood alcohol reading of 0.176, which was more than three times the legal limit.

He was issued with a year's instant loss of licence and his vehicle was impounded.

He will be summoned to attend court at a later date.

Fishery fight

"They have had 10 years of being kicked in the guts by the government," Narungga MP Fraser Ellis said.

"The first and most important thing to do is to re-evaluate the fee structure.

"These fees are unfair — they need to be commensurate with what the fishers can make from their businesses.

'The government needs to do away with the cost-recovery model and implement the fees accordingly."

In December, fishers won a reprieve when Primary Industries Minister Clare Scriven announced a more than \$1.5 million subsidy to the quotas across the next three years.

This applies to quotas for licensed whiting, calamari, garfish and snapper fishers in Gulf St Vincent and Spencer Gulf, equating to about \$150,000 per year for each species.

All licence holders must pay the same base fee of 30 per cent, while 70 per cent of management fees would be based on quota units allocated.

MFA executive officer Pat Tripodi said PIRSA had rejected the latest MFA proposal to change to a 45/55 split between the base fee and quota fees for all species, rather than the current 70/30 split.

"This change would have provided certainty and security to licence holders, as well as allowing them to make a small profit," he said.

However, Mr Tripodi said he was encouraged by a recent letter from PIRSA which indicated the department was willing to enter into further negotiations.

PIRSA Fisheries and Aquaculture executive director Gavin Begg said quotas were applied to ensure sustainability of a species based on research of fish stocks.

He said PIRSA was open to considering other options for the licence fee structure.

"Unfortunately, the working group which was formed with all relevant stakeholders — could not reach a consensus on the licence fee structure and as a result the MFA's proposal was not successful," he said.

"The working group will be reconvened in 2024-25 to further explore the ongoing licence fee structure."

In May, Minister Scriven announced funding to develop a blueprint to foster ongoing productivity of the commercial Marine Scalefish Fishery.

A steering committee chaired by former MP Patrick Conlon, and comprising industry representatives, has been tasked with producing the blueprint by November 30.

Pushed to breaking point

CURRAMULKA fisher David Short says the state government seems determined to shut down commercial fishing in Gulf St Vincent.

"There won't be a (commercial) fisher left in Gulf St Vincent if they keep going the way they are," he said.

In 2024/25, Mr Short will have to pay \$3.065 per kilogram of King George Whiting caught in GSV and \$1.27 per kg of whiting caught in Spencer Gulf.

He said those figures would continue to rise when the current three-year offset subsidy finishes.


The unit fees for quota species were in addition to the base fee.

"Fuel, commission, transport, power, ramp fees and equipment costs are increasing while the wholesale market price for our fish has not," Mr Short said.

"The West Coast and South East zone fishers incur no additional costs, they only pay the base fee."

Veteran Stansbury fisher Paul Germein said he was being unfairly treated by PIRSA as one of the few remaining commercial fishers in Gulf St Vincent.


"Our fees are ridiculously high compared with everyone else," he said.







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Childcare set to open

MINLATON'S childcare centre is ready for business and will likely be open next week.

Local families will be contacted this week, with specific details to be announced later in the week once the licence is confirmed.

But, as long as all goes to plan, SYP parents and caregivers could be dropping their children off as early as Monday (July 22).

Yorke Peninsula Family Learning and Care managing director Michael French confirmed the centre was scheduled to open next week, but said the exact timing was up to the regulator, and that was why there was no exact date confirmed yet.

"It's not ideal to be told 'we think we are opening Monday, but we might not," Mr French said.

"But for someone who really needs it Monday, I would assume they would prefer we do that than say we are opening on the 29th."

For the parents using the service during the first week, Mr French said he would appreciate them spending a bit more time at drop-off because there will be about 32 new children who most likely will be feeling a bit anxious.

"If you've got one or two children like that, it's OK, but when you have a room of 10, it will mean parents need to perhaps be mindful," he said.

"We're just asking that everyone have some empathy with the context of what we're facing.

"You really need to build those relationships, you just can't possibly have them on day one."

Despite delays to the opening date, Minlaton has ended up with a premium centre which will service the whole community in different ways.

"We've got a consulting room in there, which is available for family focused community services, so whether that's a GP, speech therapist or psychologist to come provide a service that might have been withdrawn from the community," he said.

"If numbers aren't too full, we've also dedicated one of the play spaces to be available for community-group use."

YPFLC has been ready to operate since January 29, but the construction process has been delayed due to difficulties around completing a large regional building project.

"I know they have been struggling to get people because there is also a shortage of trades," he said.

Mr French said the community needed to understand how supportive YP Council had been during the process, and he could not have asked for more support.

"It's easy to scapegoat them because they are setting it up, but I think most of the issues have been completely outside their control,"

The council played a key part in bringing the centre to Minlaton, and secured \$2.25 million of grant money to get the service off the ground.

Mayor Darren Braund said he was incredibly proud of reaching this milestone and wished YPFLC every success.

"We thank the community for its advocacy, and it is rewarding to have delivered on an additional 120 childcare places for our region, up from 18 when this initiative started," Mayor Braund said.

BABIES and toddler can start their learning journeys at free weekly sessions at the Kadina and Moonta libraries while their parents build skills and make social connec-

It's all part of the lifetime of learning approach for Copper Coast Council libraries, which offer resources and programs to suit people at all stages of life.

They offer a range of programs held on weekday mornings - Wriggle and Giggle, Read and Rhyme, Rhyme and Play, and Book Bugs.

"It's the community that you meet here and the other parents — and the staff are beautiful with the kids," Ms Browney says.

"I wouldn't have a community of parents if I hadn't started to come here.

"It's a lovely, safe place to come with the kids."

Ms Chegwidden said making connections with other parents was vital for new mothers.

"I hope (daughter) Elsie will make lifetime friends from coming here too," she says.

Council's library and tourism coordinator Lynn Spurling said the babies and preschool sessions were developed and led by library staff who were experienced in early childhood programming.

"Early childhood is a critical time in a child's development and the program is an opportunity for kids to become engaged before they start their formal learning," she said.

South Australia's public libraries are included in the State Government's Early Learning Strategy 2021-31 as resources to help children under the age of five learn to read and to support their families.

Council listens to fierce feedback from farmers on rate rises

YORKE Peninsula councillors have voted to reduce a proposed primary producer special rate from 5 per cent to 4 per cent after receiving negative feedback from farmers during a consultation period last month.

At last Wednesday (July 11) night's full council meeting, elected members spent close to two hours vigorously debating how much extra primary producers should pay to help maintain and upgrade council-owned roads.

The original model voted on for public consultation, Model 4, included a 5 per cent "road maintenance and renewal" special rate to be collected

from farmers only.

During the public consultation period, YP Council received close to 40 responses opposed to the new rating model.

One main argument was that farmers were not the only road users, and should therefore not be the only ones to pay the extra loading.

Despite being a primary producer himself, Cr Scott Hoyle said, although they were not the only road users, they were the ones who required the most access to roads while using large, heavy equipment.

Cr Natalie Bittner said the feedback about Model 4 did not necessarily represent the entire community because there were only 39 submissions, and the majority of them were from farm-

"I could argue that a lot of the reasons for unfairness that they give, you could flip on its head and say 'well why has it been fair for residential ratepayers who pay an overwhelming amount of rates, more than their fair share, for longer than I've been on council?" Cr Bittner said.

She said that people who were in support of introducing the special rate did not necessarily write letters, so it was up to the council to use all of the information it had to make informed

"The cost-of-living crisis is real, I do get that, but by the same token we have to invest in the infrastructure we use," she said.

Cr Roger Johns said the council should listen to public feedback, regardless of how many people participated, because 98 per cent of the community which provided feedback did not agree with the model.

"The obligation of a public consultation needs to be taken seriously," Cr

A council that regarded ratepayers it represented with respect should take notice of an overwhelming response, he said.

Crs Hoyle, Bittner, Trevor Clerke, Michael O'Connell and deputy mayor Richard Carruthers voted to implement Model 4, but they were outvoted by Crs Johns, Tania Stock, Kylie Gray,

Kristin Murdock, Adam Meyer and mayor Darren Braund — who had the tie-breaking vote.

Mayor Braund said he voted against Model 4 because he was swayed by the discussions and by reading community-consultation feedback.

Following that vote, Cr Bittner moved a motion for the members to accept Model 3, which included a 4 per cent special road rate for primary producers.

Another lengthy discussion between councillors resulted in a second split vote, with Mayor Braund again given the final decision.

He opted for Model 3, saying he believed it was the most suitable outcome for the community.

PROBLEMATIC pigeons in Bute are in the firing line, with Barunga West Council taking action to address an infestation in a prominent building in the town's main street.

But resident Brenton Sutton said he was yet to see substantial improvements to the state of the vacant building on the corner of High Street and Railway Terrace.

These pigeons are far from flying the coop," he said last Wednesday (July 10), as he pointed out piles of droppings and offensive smells seeping from the building.

Locals have been complaining for at least five years about the

building, commonly known as Measday's Garage.

Mr Sutton made his most recent complaint to the council about the pigeon infestation in May.

At the full council meeting on Tuesday, July 9, he asked why he had not received any response of substance and why there had been no apparent reduction in pigeon numbers.

"What has, is, or can be, done about this problem that has existed for some time that won't solve itself?" Mr Sutton said.

BWC development and regulatory services director Trevor White said notices were issued to the building owner in early May under the Local Litter and Nuisance Control Act and

the Fire and Emergency Services Act.

Mr White said the owner had taken steps to address the building's problems by mowing weeds, which posed a fire hazard, and cleaning the outside of the building.

Monthly site visits had been scheduled between the owner and the council's compliance officer to ensure continuous progress would be made to address issues associated with the building, which was in a state of disrepair and was insanitary.

Mr White said the owner had been told he would be fined and further action would be taken if satisfactory progress did not continue.

The meeting heard the owner, who was not named, made assurances that work was underway and agreed to provide progress updates and participate in monthly inspection visits by the officer.

Mr White said the building had many holes, which allowed pigeons to get in and out.

"(The owner) informed us that new windows had been ordered and that ongoing efforts to address the building issues would continue to prevent it being a local nuisance," he said.

Councillors Grant Rowlands and Brian Lockyer asked what was being done to reduce pigeon numbers to prevent them from infesting other buildings nearby.

BWC chief executive Maree Wauchope said "the whole idea is to seal up the buildings with pigeons in it and exterminate them that way".

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FLAME dates up in the air

THE FLAME Festival may be moving, with Copper Coast councillors looking into possible alternative dates to avoid a clash with other events across the state.

The Food, Light, Art, Music, Entertainment Festival has been running biennially during May on the alternate year to the Kernewek Lowender Cornish

This year's FLAME Festival, however, clashed with the Clare Valley Gourmet Week after that event was extended to nine days.

CCC tourism coordinator Lynn Spurling said the council would consider the timing of a range of local, state and national events, as well as community feedback, to explore alternative times for FLAME.

New dates would also have to be negotiated with the South Australian Tourism Commission as part of the council's funding agreement.

The 2026 date will need to be decided by November to meet advertising

FLAME had an attendance of about 14,000 in 2024, up from 10,000 in 2022.

New councillor to be sworn in

WAKEFIELD Regional Council has a new elected member.

Brian Eime has been voted in unopposed to fill the vacant position in the North Ward, replacing former councillor Denni Agnew.

Cr Eime, of Blyth, has served on community committees and sporting groups as a volunteer, winning the 2018 Citizen of the Year award.

Mayor Rodney Reid said he was looking forward to Cr Eime becoming a part of the council.

'To see him take the next step to represent his community within the chamber is excellent for both Blyth and the North Ward," Mayor Reid said.

"We look forward to working with you." Councillor Eime will be sworn in on Wednesday, July 24.

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Spiritual cleansing for

Wallaroo Hospital

AN Aboriginal traditional healer has performed a spiritual cleansing at Wallaroo Hospital after Indigenous patients reported feeling uncomfortable while receiving health services there.

The Yorke and Northern Local Health Network invited traditional healer, or Ngangkari, Debbie Watson, from the APY Lands in northern South Australia, to help cleanse Wallaroo Hospital and the Wallaroo Community Health Building last week.

YNLHN senior Aboriginal health project officer Anthea Kemp said the move was made after comments from at least 17 different people.

"It was the result of feedback from the community that they felt uncomfortable walking into the service because they felt there were spirits around that needed to be removed," Ms Kemp said.

She said the hospital had a responsibility to provide a

"One of the things about health and healing is that, if you have a positive mindset, it aids your healing in physical aspects," she said.

"Whenever someone has that spiritual healing, they're always very happy at the end

"You can see the relief in their eyes."

Fellow YNLHN senior Aboriginal health project officer John Buckskin said five people volunteered for healing with Ms Watson after her cleansing of the buildings.

"I believe it's YNLHN's first time engaging Ngangkaris," he said.

"All the other regions, in partnership with mainstream health services, have been running Ngangkari clinics for many years, so we are hoping that this will be normal and continuing.

"It's an exceptional step forward in acknowledging the cultural history of Aboriginal people nationwide."

Ms Watson is Pitjantjatjara healer who was

taught the ancient healing practice by her father, according to the ANTAC website.

Some people they stay behind," she said.

"Some people when they die they're still here.

"But the cleansing I'm doing is removing the spirit.

"If there's bad spirit inside we know it's not cleansed."

Other measures introduced to improve Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander access to healthcare include displaying Indigenous art, running cultural training and hiring more Indigenous people.

NEW WALLAROO boat-ramp toilets have been talked about regularly since November, but now an alternative plan may be falling into place.

Rather than building permanent toilets near the ramp, Copper Coast Council has heard a proposal of moving the semi-permanent toilets currently located at Office Beach to that spot.

At this month's council meeting, a new permanent toilet block near Office Beach was announced as part of the Wallaroo Foreshore Masterplan.

Council staff had already been talking with event organisers about how they plan around toilets, and doing further research into purchase options, in order to find the most suitable solution for near the boat ramp.

At an information session last month, CCC infrastructure services director Tim Neumann presented councillors with an alternative to buying temporary toilets for the ramp area.

Mr Neumann proposed that the semi-portable toilets currently at the Office Beach foreshore be relocated to Wallaroo boat ramp.

This option would still require sewer, power and water services to be installed. "Prior to construction of the new Office Beach toilets, the existing building will require removal and relocating," Mr Neumann said.

The new toilet block at Office Beach is still in the planning stages, but a council spokesperson this month confirmed construction would be going ahead.

Active boat ramp supporter Gary Oliver said it had been an ongoing battle for boat-ramp toilets, and that this plan was a good idea.


"I would have thought if a toilet was put there, then boaties can see that there's some value out of paying their boat fees," Mr Oliver said.

Wallaroo resident Ian Shields backed the plan to build new toilets at Office Beach to support the new Wallaroo swimming jetty and move the temporary toilets to the ramp site.

"Any outcome to provide toilets for the boat ramp is great and the community and visitors will truly appreciate this improvement," Mr Shields said.

But he said the best long-term approach would be to also eventually build new boat-ramp toilets to eliminate the risk of the portable toilets becoming a permanent fixture.

"We need to remember the boatramp toilets are one of the top priorities within the Wallaroo Foreshore Masterplan," he said

Finding friends for those in need

LONELINESS is becoming more recognised as an avoidable health hazard — but Yorke Peninsula residents can do their bit to help.

Volunteers are being sought for Care in Motion's Aged Care Volunteer Visitors Scheme, with a focus on Port Broughton, Wallaroo, Kadina, Moonta, Ardrossan and Minlaton.

The Federal Government-funded scheme provides companionship for older people by matching them with a volunteer who visits regularly and becomes a friend.

experience."

It is a free program for socially isolated people receiving government-subsidised residential aged care or Home Care Packages.

The Australian Institute of Health and Welfare has found social isolation can be linked to mental illness, emotional distress, the development of dementia, premature death, poor sleep and unhealthy habits, while more frequent social contact is associated with better health.

Care in Motion coordinator Sal Allen says the visits help improve quality of life.

"Becoming an aged-care volunteer visitor can be a rewarding and life-changing experience," she says.

"You will make a friend, share stories and help someone who might be feeling isolated or lonely."

The time of the visit can be arranged to suit both parties, while the only special skills required are empathy and listening.

"During a visit, the volunteer and older person can do anything you both feel like doing, such as enjoying a chat over a cup of tea, taking a walk, or working on a joint hobby together," she says.

There are 19 volunteer visitors in the Copper Coast Council area, seven in YP Council but only three in Barunga West.

Port Broughton resident Lyn Brown has volunteered for more than 12 years and now visits an older lady who is bedridden and has no family in the region.

"I fill her in on what I'm doing for the week and she has met at least a couple of my grandchildren," Mrs Brown says.

"My granddaughter bought in her pet bearded dragon for her to meet."

Mrs Brown says volunteer visitors help fulfill the social needs of their recipients, who may otherwise only have regular contact with a carer.

"You have a friend to listen to you and share stories with, and sometimes I take along some sewing or knitting," she says.

"On Yorke Peninsula, when their families move away, all of sudden people can be quite iso-

Wallaroo home boost

MORE affordable homes are on the horizon for Wallaroo.

Housing cooperative Copper Triangle Housing Association has secured a \$100,000 private grant to put toward the development of five new homes.

The cooperative, along with its parent organisation Common Equity Housing SA, plan to build a group of two-bedroom social-housing units with communal gardens and common areas for mainly lowincome elderly people.

CEHSA chief executive Stephanie Miller said the new homes would be fully accessible.

"The target group is older members of the co-op who have said that they want to downsize and relocate to smaller, more ageappropriate accommodation," she said.

'That will release some of their larger homes for us to offer to others in housing need in the community, especially families."

CEHSA will develop the land, which it owns under an agreement with the State Government, on behalf of CTHA.

"It has had one home on that site, which we've now demolished, so we're now getting ready to submit some plans to (Copper Coast) Council for approval," Ms Miller said.

She said this was the beginning of a gradual renewal of CEHSA's housing stock across Wallaroo, Kadina and Moonta.

"Copper Triangle have about 30 properties at the moment and a lot of it is getting a bit old," she said.

"This is just the start of what we want to do in terms of improving the housing in the area."

The \$100,000 provided was given by notfor-profit organisation Homes for Homes.

This was the first one Victoria-based H4H had handed out in South Australia, chief executive Steven Persson said.

"Homes for Homes is a whole-of-community approach to one of the most critical social issues we face as a country," he said.

"We're excited to extend our funding into

"We look forward to continuing our work of providing safe, secure housing.

In dire straits

THE number of social homes in Australia grew by just 2870 from June 2022 to June 2023, while more than 184,000 households sat on a waiting list.

This is according to new Australian Institute of Health and Welfare data, which showed the proportion of households living in social housing shrunk from 4.7 per cent to 4.1 per cent from 2013-23.

Spokeswoman for Everybody's Home — a national campaign by a coalition of housing, homelessness and welfare organisations designed to help fix the housing crisis Maiy Azize said social-housing growth was failing to meet demand.



What the fog?

VAST areas of Yorke Peninsula were greeted with heavy sheets of stubborn fog early on more than one morning last week which, in some regions, returned to even affect people's drive home from work.

Extensive fog was photographed by YP locals on the mornings of Tuesday, July 9, and Wednesday, July 10, as well as in Tuesday's late afternoon.

Bureau of Meteorology senior meteorologist Simon Timcke said rainfall on the preceding weekend, followed by a high pressure ridge that caused winds to drop out, triggered the

"We had pretty light winds, a bit of moisture left over from that rainfall, and skies cleared, so they're the three things you really need," he said.

"(The fog) formed somewhere and just a bit of light wind caused it to push over other areas as well.

"We did end up with pretty extensive areas of fog over Yorke Peninsula, and because it was quite extensive areas, it takes longer to clear."

The absence of wind and a lack of heat from the sun meant the fog stuck around into the late morning and even returned as the clock ticked from afternoon to evening.

"That's very late in the day for there to be fog around," Mr Timcke said.

"As soon as the land started

to cool down, the fog could come back in off the water.

"It's harder to clear over water areas when it's an extensive area because the land does heat up more during the day compared with over the water."

Mr Timcke said the bureau does not have any visometers which measure the horizontal visibility of fog — on YP, so

does not have a way of comparing it to previous fog events.

"(But) to get fog as extensive as that over Yorke Peninsula and to last as long as it did, certainly lasting that late into the day, is pretty unusual," he said.

Mr Timcke said conditions became windier and cloudier, meaning the extensive fog did not last past Wednesday.





COPPER Coast drivers who stay too long in expired carparks should beware.

New number-plate-recognition technology is being trialled across the region, and information collected via the technology may be used to fine drivers from December.

A Copper Coast Council car, mounted with a camera that stores registration numbers and automatically checks if drivers are in expired carparks — or if they have not paid boat-ramp fees — has been patrolling the area for the past month.

The "Aero Ranger" technology uses artificial intelligence to collect data, which can then be employed to track down vehicles, issue parking fines, and provide information about parking

CCC development services director Muller Mentz said, once the trial period ended, the council would make an official decision about whether

to use the technology permanently. "No fines will be issues in this trial period to those identified by the new Aero Ranger system," he said.

"However, traditional monitoring will continue, and compliance and permits are still mandatory."

Mr Mentz said the council would not be filming or monitoring particular parties, but is gathering data in relation to permits issued and parking

Compliance officer Tim Manners said the new device, if implemented, would improve efficiency.

"It used to be a day's job going around all three towns," Mr Manners said.

Now the compliance officers can visit Kadina, Moonta and Wallaroo in the morning, attend to other business, and then return to the three towns again in the evening.

The device may also be used in the future to determine parking trends during holiday seasons.

If the system is implemented, the council would likely cut costs by doing less monitoring by inspectors of parking and boat-ramp areas.

Working mothers building a stronger community

AFTER four long years of hard work and determination, being able to walk around the new Minlaton childcare is a dream come true for working mum Amy Honner.

The centre, which is now only a week away from opening, is all thanks to a few working mothers who had had enough of the lack of services on the Southern Yorke Peninsula.

It all began in 2020 when speech pathologist Ms Honner, along with a few other local mothers, decided it was time something was done about the childcare desert affecting all aspects of their community.

There's a community need for me to be back at work, I'd be down the street on maternity leave having families come to me 'when are vou coming back?" Ms Honner says.

"I wanted to go back, but the pressure of only having one spot a week at childcare was too much."

Ms Honner is the only speech pathologist living south of Minlaton, and many families rely on her expertise to make sure their child does not get left behind.

"Early intervention is key in supporting children with any developmental needs," she says.

This is the same for the other founding members of the Southern

Peninsula Childcare Feasibility Group Anna Phasey and Katie Hughes, who work in other support services which are desperately needed on the YP.

"We got together as working mums and friends and said 'other parents in our predicament don't need to go through this again," she

"We want to attract great services for our community, including teachers and doctors, and we identified that childcare is absolutely key in making this happen.

"We knew we needed childcare,

but we needed the data."

Between March and May 2021, the group collected responses from the community about how the minimal childcare services affected their circumstances.

The study found childcare was the main barrier contributing to the YP's lower-than-average median annual income, with the region falling behind the rest of the state by about \$10,000 a year.

In turn this negatively affected the upskilling of local staff and had a great impact on local businesses' staff retention.

It also affected the region's ability to lure skilled professionals, which stopped community access to basic health-and-wellbeing services.

Yorketown parent Alexandra Buchanan is a mum who has eagerly been waiting for the centre to open, after she and her husband moved to YP for work.

"I was employed to be a teacher two days a week and we were under the impression that the childcare centre (in Minlaton) would open when we moved, which hasn't happened," Ms Buchanan says.

"We know there's been hold-ups. but that's impacted my ability to work.

"I'm a really experienced teacher of 12 years and I'm unable to provide for the community because I'm having to stay home and care for my child when the school is short staffed, especially with winter coming up, illnesses and things like that."

Ms Buchanan said being a mum is her number one job, but she wanted to get back into her career for her own professional development and mental health, and also to have a better connection to her new community.

"If you like country music, you'll love this theatre experience. If you don't like country music, you will after."



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
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

Guest speaker Mike Griffin gave an informative talk on Bromeliads, of which there are over 1500 different types.

They originated from South America and some northern areas.

In the 1800s plants were collected in Brazil and Argentina, since hybridising has taken place.

Some varieties are Neoregelia, Guzmania, Vriesea, Aechmea, Bilbergia and Tillandsia.

Some flowers stand above the

foliage, while others flower in the centre "well" of the plant.

These are resilient plants requiring minimal care, providing they are given dappled light/part shade and 70 per cent shade cloth in our hot summers, with moisture.

However, they will tolerate periods of drought. They suffer with root rot if given too much moisture.

Propagation is from the pups the mother plant produces.

Give slow-release fertiliser when repotting into a pine bark and potting soil mix. Water more in summer and less in winter

Mike had brought some plants for purchase, also donating one for the club's plant auction and one for a future raffle.

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

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Maitland GP connects with YP prostate group

YORKE Peninsula Prostate Cancer Support Group members heard from Maitland doctor Rebecca Morgan at their June meeting.

After growing up on the family farm near Maitland, Dr Morgan initially had a career in science in Australia and the UK before returning to Adelaide to start post-graduate medical studies.

She has enjoyed returning to the Maitland community where her working life has now spanned 13 years. She works in the local GP clinic and is also kept busy at Eldercare and with aged care at the Maitland hospi-

The appreciative mixed audience of 19 listened to the role of lymph nodes which are located throughout the body. They filter out harmful substances and waste products. She talked about lymphoedema, its causes and treatment options and the varying accuracy of lymph-scanning machines that are used in testing.

Dr Morgan also spoke about the role played by the McGrath Breast Cancer Nurses in supporting women with cancer.

But the main emphasis of her talk was about prostate cancer. Topics covered included treatment options, the movement in prostate specific antigen levels, attitudes within the medical profession concerning PSA testing, hormonal therapy treatment and more.

Although Australia makes up less than one per cent of the global population, it packs a punch on the international sporting stage.

In fact, Australians rank top three in cricket, swimming, tennis, hockey, netball, surfing, rugby, rowing, shooting, basketball, horse racing, cycling and motocross.

Up-and-coming motocross rider Alex Larwood, formerly of Kadina, has ambitions to continue this tradition and put himself on the international stage.

"I would like to get a Pro MX2 championship in Australia and then I either really want to go to America or Europe for either notocross or supercross.

"If I could compete in one of their series in the future that would be where I want to be. That's what I'm aiming for," Larwood says.

Larwood, 20, who started his motocross journey at Kadina Motocross Club, says he is infatuated with the sport.

"I've done it for so long now, it is in my blood," he says.

"I've got the buzz now and I don't think it's going go away any time too soon.

"I started when I was young and just progressed from there and haven't really done anything else.

"And I've got to a point where I can earn a little bit of money."

Larwood's professional status is more impressive when you consider that South Australia hasn't exactly been the breeding ground of motocross champions in recent years.

In fact, other than Kirk Gibbs in 2015, the winners have been from the eastern states.

Larwood now lives in Victoria, where he trains almost every day, after making his professional debut in 2020.

He rides in the MX2 class, as well as supercross, which begins in October. After breaking his leg this year, and missing

four weeks of racing, Larwood has returned in style, winning the most recent national ProMX2 Championship in Murray Bridge.

He made the decision to move interstate to pursue a professional career about four years ago. "It's just a little bit better over here," he

"Back home there's really no one to ride with, and no one to push me, so we sort of made that decision that I have to come over here if I want to have a hot crack at it."

Larwood says the standard of racing is much higher in the professional ranks.

"In the juniors you probably only get two to four guys that are competitive with you, but when you step up to the pro ranks, you've got about 10 to 15 guys that are on your level," he

Larwood trains with about 10 other riders in South Gippsland, with three more rounds of the Pro MX250 competition to come this year, followed by supercross.

While similar to motocross, the supercross season is shorter, races are inside, and there are more consecutive jumps.

More than 30 professional riders compete in these races.

Sam Clayson is acing achievements off the court. The regional South Australia tennis coach, formerly of Wallaroo, has been selected to go on a Tennis Australia coaching tour around the US.

Mr Clayson is one of seven coaches who has been given the opportunity to take his career to the next level, and the only one from SA.

He said he was excited to be given the once-in-alifetime opportunity.

"Professional development opportunities like this don't come around very often and this is the first tour of its kind," he says.

The tour starts in North Carolina, and I'll be going to Winston-Salem, which is a lead-up tournament for the US Open.

"Whilst there I'll be going to some tennis clubs and universities to see how their participation and performance programs are run.

"I then go to New York, where I'll be going to some universities and country clubs in the Hamptons to see how they grow their talent.

"I finish up at the US Open, where I get to spend a few days networking with high-performance coaches and players."

Spending time in New York is something Mr Clayson is most excited about, while being among world-class players in a tournament environment.

He has been playing tennis since he was a junior and began his coaching business, Clayson Tennis Academy, 10 years ago, which is based out of Clare. "The last couple of years have really accelerated

my development," he says.

"I love tennis. I love that as a player you are entirely responsible for the outcome, you can't blame your teammates. "It's tactically a very difficult game and, as coach-

es, we can make such a big impact on the outcome of a match? A Tennis Australia spokesperson said qualified

Harris and SA defeated in under 16 state championship

It was heaven and heartbreak for Mitch Harris, of Kadina, who was part of the South Australian state Under 16 squad at the AFL National Championships, which lost to Victoria Country last week.

After SA had won its second game against Victoria Metro, effectively making the last game of the championships a grand final event, the team took on the Victorian Country combination, going down by one point, in a dramatic and brutal finish.

Harris's aim, after a hamstring injury at the beginning of the program was to get back for a single game, and in an unusual step the SANFL took 24 players to Queensland for the final two matches of the championships.

Harris, after playing strongly for Woodville-West Torrens between the first two championship matches, was taking on this tour with the knowledge he was only going to play in the Friday, July 12, fixture against Victoria Metro.

"In the end it was a pretty frustrating way to finish," Harris

"From a personal perspective I just wanted to play one game.

"I was the twenty-fourth player who travelled and was always just going to play the one game on the

"I started in the back pocket, as a tall defender, and played mostly deeper in defence — we were 21 points up at the three-quarter time break.

"Victoria Country kicked a point in extra time, with the golden point rule, to win the game and the championship."

Harris said the pace of the game was fast.

"The ball moves a lot quicker than at SANFL level," he says.

"As a group we were pretty disappointed with the end result, losing the title by that golden

Coach Heath Younie said management was keen to take Harris away for the Queensland leg of the championships but didn't think he was quite right to play two games in five days.

"Our head of talent Brenton Phillips was quite supportive of this decision," Younie says.

"Harris is tall and athletic — the type of player the AFL scouts are looking for.

"There were enough glimpses in his first performance to suggest he has attributes to play at higher

Before moving to Adelaide, Harris (192cm) played with the Kadina Bloodhounds at under 14 and under 17 levels.

He will finish the remainder of the 2024 season playing both SANFL under 16s and college football.

Heinjus has also represented the North Eastern zone when playing for North Clare last year and featured in the North **Eastern Netball Association** team of the year as a defender.


Hewett says Heinjus is at the height of her career, as she is only in her mid 20s.

Some retired footballers' careers seem to get better after they have finish playing, and they are quick to remind you that football was tougher back in their day.

But Australian rules football is still very physical now.

From the fierce attack on the

required to be a good player, football is a unique sport.

As such, in an effort to reduce the number of head injuries and develop safer protocols, the SANFL has altered rules around concussion for all leagues across

Before this season, if a player was concussed during a match, they could return to play 14 days

after their last day of symptoms. Now, all amateur state leagues

must take off 21 days. AFL and AFLW players can return as soon as 12 days later, as they have the benefit of more advanced care and players can be monitored daily.

This new protocol was implemented in March after the Australian Institute of Sport released new recommendations.

Moonta man represents state in masters team

Superina, 66, will represent South Australia for the fourth time after recently being selected in the over-65s AFL Masters team.

"We always perform admirably," Superina says.

"The idea is that if we garner enough interest then Yorke Peninsula will be wanting to put a team into the competition in coming years."

"We generally always make an account of ourselves and I think the over-65s went very well last year.

"It's always an honour to represent your state."

The 2024 AFL Masters National Carnival, to be held from late September, features 11 men's grades, four women's grades, an all-stars competition and an Indigenous league.

The carnival, which started in 1983, will host more than 1500 players in Perth this year.

Superina, who is a forward, says the over-65s competition uses legitimate football rules with a few slight moderations.

"It's not too dissimilar to the footy that we played when we were younger, and now the rules even in the AFL have changed so much in terms of how much combativeness, it's pretty similar to what the AFL Masters is anyway," he says.

SA finished second in the over-

65s last year, and Superina says the team is hoping to go one better.

He says, if promoted appropriately, the masters format could be introduced to YP.

"Surely there's a lot of guys that are 40-plus that aren't playing anymore that wouldn't mind a kick and a catch every fortnight."

Superina, who moved to Moonta 18 months ago, says YP could enter a team into the AFL Masters SA competition, mainly played in Adelaide, or even develop its own league down the track.

"If you want to get something done you have to work towards an end result," he says.

"Why can't you have a competition here among yourselves, if you've got four teams within close proximity?

"It's just a way guys can keep fit and engage in the sport."

AFL Masters SA treasurer Marty Lilburne, who ran an exhibition masters match in Kadina this month, agrees.

"The idea is that if we garner enough interest then Yorke Peninsula will be wanting to put a team into the competition in coming years," Lilburne says.









He is currently playing for the Riverton Saddleworth Marrabel United Hawks in the neighbouring North Eastern Football League.


In their Sunday game against South East, the Northern side went down 9.7 (61) to 6.6 (42).

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
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Kadina keen for major carnival

Digging deep to unearth soil secrets

SECRETS of soil ecosystems are being revealed as part of a study to understand the impacts of past land management on current and future farming.

Researchers from South Research Australian and Development Institute, University of Adelaide and Flinders University have joined forces to study the soil microbiome, which comprises all living and dead microorganisms and associated matter, including genetic material.

Birchip Cropping Group in Victoria, Kalyx Australia in Western Australia and the Thomas Elder Institute are also involved in the project, entitled Past, Present and Future Drivers of Soil Change.

SARDI senior research officer agronomy Dr Andong Shi said soil biology was often ignored in comparison to traditional soil analyses, which focused on chemical and physical properties.

We hope that by learning from the past, we can harness the benefits of soil micro-organisms in sustainable farming practices to help increase soil fertility, reduce environmental footprint and maintain or enhance crop productivity," he said.

"Our management of soil has a

direct influence on shaping how the soil microbiome functions.

"Management practices alter the food source, water availability and accessibility, as well as shelter for the soil microbiome.

"As a result, the changes in these elements exert feedback on the whole soil ecosystem."

"The way we manage the soil reflects on how healthy the soil ecosystem is, how well it functions, and how productive and sustainable it will be for crop and pasture production in the future."

Soil DNA samples collected over the past 20 years from farms across southern Australia have been analysed to assess changes in the microbiome alongside the evolution of broadacre practices.

Dr Krista Sumby from University of Adelaide said the findings to date for soil DNA had revealed changes in the soil microbiome composition in the past two

'We are currently untangling if and/or how this correlates with changes in climate and broadacre cropping practices over the same time period," she said.

The project has secured more than \$3 million in funding from the Federal Government's Soil Science Challenge program.







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HOT FISHING TIPS

Wallaroo: Salmon catches from shore and rock-based fishers continues, as does the old weather as the school holidays morphed into their second week. Boat crews caught a few King George whiting from the Boiler grounds and the jetty has tommy ruffs (Australian herring) and squid.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: The on-again, off-again bloodworm run continued last week as small tinnies fished the bay for gar, squid and tommies. KG whiting appear further south from Cape Elizabeth and the Steamer channel with late afternoons being the best time for a fish. A group of scuba divers were spotted on the Moonta Bay jetty during the week

Port Victoria: Shore and jetty-based anglers caught a few salmon trout, mullet and tommies during the week as good tides helped the action. Boat crews fished at Port Victoria, Balgowan and Chinamen's Well for whiting, squid and garfish.

Point Turton: Try the local beaches from Leven's to The Pines for high-tide mullet at the moment, while the jetty has small ruffs and squid. Boat crews are returning with squid, garfish and medium KG whiting.

Stenhouse Bay/Marion Bay: Big boat kingfish well offshore when conditions permitted. The jetties have been quiet, but local shore-based anglers are reporting salmon to 1kg, flathead and mullet.

Edithburgh/Stansbury: The annual spider crab migration has commenced around The Hut and Port Vincent and will probably run well into October or so. KG whiting and squid are off the Orontes Bank, Coobowie and Klein's Point when the waters are clear. The jetties have squid, salmon trout and tommies.

Black Point/Ardrossan: Boat crews fished close to the western side of the gulf to avoid the cold north westerly winds from Black Point, Billy Goat Flat and right up to Tiddy Widdy Beach. Catches include just-legal KG whiting, garfish and squid - again when the water is clear.

Talbot under injury cloud

Just a week after being named in the Australian Opals basketball team, Stephanie Talbots Olympic campaign looks uncertain.

The Kadina export has sustained a left-foot injury while playing for the Los Angeles Sparks in the US Women's Basketball National Association.

The Paris Olympics are set to be Talbot's third.

Her last campaign in Tokyo, Japan, in 2020, was marred by injury, and in her first Olympics in Rio, Brazil, she averaged less than four minutes of game time as a 20-year-

After averaging less than 15 minutes per game at the start of the WNBL season, Talbot played 30 minutes or more in every match since late June before her injury.

In the previous four matches Talbot averaged more than 11 points, compared to less than three at the start of the season.

Fellow Opal Bec Allen, who plays for Phoenix Mercury in the WNBA, is also under an injury cloud because of an ongoing back issue.

The Opals have been impressive in the lead-up to the Olympics, beating China by 28 points in each of two practice matches this month.

Stephanie's mother Roslyn Talbot says, if all players are fit, the Opals can beat world number one the US and win gold in the Paris Olympics, which start on Friday, July 26.

"They truly believe they have an opportunity to medal," the Copper Coast mayor says.

"They obviously dream of a gold medal.

"The seven girls in the WNBA are playing against those American girls week in, week out, and they know their games, so they feel they've got a really good chance," she says.

The Opals are ranked third in the world and will play in a pool against France, Canada and Nigeria.

Their first game is against Nigeria on Monday, July 29.
