SHORT SUPPLY

SOUTH Australians now have another month to get a free flu vaccination but local supply is falling short.

The program's extension until the end of July is in response to this winter's unique dual challenge of Covid-19 and influenza, which has placed further pressure on a hospital system already facing significant demand.

Around 798,000 flu vaccines have been administered in South Australia so far this year, compared with 701,000 at the same time last year, and 787,000 doses in total for 2021.

Kadina Medical Associates nurse manager Gavin Woods said Premier Peter Malinauskas announced the program would not be extended past June 30 and then it all suddenly changed.

"We must purchase the vaccines for

eligible patients and then seek reimbursement from the state government," Mr Woods said.

"Our supplies were dovetailed to meet demand up until the most recent announcement and our suppliers currently have no stock.

"This will hopefully be rectified by the end of this week, at which time we will offer appointments for the vaccine.

"We will not open appointments "We have, just this past week, been

until we receive the vaccine, therefore patients should delay contacting us until this Friday (July 8)."

Newbery Chemists general manager Tim Gross said they had been left with no supply for the past three

"We have had enough to honour those patients booked in (for the free program), but no more," Mr Gross

able to secure a little more supply but this, too, may not last long.

"We will continue trying to source more (of the vaccine) to help all our patients; however, there are times when we have had to say we are all out and can't always predict if or when supply may become available.

Keep vigilant for varroa outbreak

THE increasing prevalence of biosecurity threats and incursions emphasises how important it is we, as a state, remain alert and vigilant.

As we continue to fight outbreaks of fruit fly in the Riverland, highly contagious foot and mouth and lumpy skin diseases are sweeping Indonesia putting our livestock industry on

Varroa mite has now reached Australia's shores, threatening our beekeepers and the broader agricultural sector.

The effects of a varroa outbreak have the potential to be devastating.

Not only would it directly impact our beekeepers, but bees are also essential pollination services for the agriculture sector more broadly.

Department of Primary Industries and Regions South Australia has estimated the value of pollinated crops in SA is \$1.7 billion from honeybee pollination, and in 2014 estimated the impact to the state of a varroa mite incursion could be up to \$410m, with some facilities closed and inevitable job losses.

That represents close to \$490m in 2022

In addition, the impact to our agricultural sector would subsequently flow through to the cost of food production, placing unwelcomed pressure on the cost of living, which is already a key issue for many households.

The opening of Australia's borders post-Covid and the resulting increased movement of people, goods and produce, has heightened the risk of transporting hazardous biosecurity threats into our country.

Whilst we shouldn't be alarmed, we must be alert and vigilant.

It is critical we all contribute to keeping our precious primary industries safe.

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Surge in homelessness reaches a new height

HOMELESSNESS has continued to spiral across Yorke Peninsula in recent months.

A rental vacancy rate of about 0.3 per cent (according to InvestorKit) has forced many local people to be without permanent residences.

Rental prices have also increased by about 9.3 per cent which means the few available vacancies are becoming increasingly unaffordable for some locals.

Disability pensioner David Burbidge, of Port Victoria, has applied for more than 30 rental properties between Port Wakefield and Port Augusta.

"I moved from Elizabeth (to Yorke Peninsula) after being told I would have some home security in a place at Port Victoria," Mr Burbidge said.

"It took me two and a half years to find this rental property and two years later my landlord cancelled its lease, which was about eight weeks ago now.

"However, I've got a couple weeks' extension so I'm able to keep looking for a while."

Mr Burbidge said vacant Airbnb properties had been hurting rental seekers significantly.

"There are so many people choosing to leave their houses empty during the week and only have weekend (Airbnb) guests," he said.

"I estimate there are about 100 empty places in Moonta alone which are usually mostly occupied on the weekends — more people need to rent homes out for permanent residents.

"There's lots of people in the same boat as me now.

"I understand you should be allowed to make money, but when you've got people sleeping in cars every night the problem is far too extreme."

MOTHER-daughter duo Maggie McKie and Daisy Woodhouse have embarked on a Walk the Yorke journey to raise money for abandoned dogs in Ukraine.

They began the trip at Port Wakefield on Saturday, July 2 and plan to finish at Moonta Bay on Wednesday, July 20.

They're fundraising for the International Fund for Animal Welfare Australia, and have spent days collecting money in Moonta, Port Pirie, Port Augusta and Roxby Downs.

Ms McKie said their love for dogs is what inspired them.

"We're animal lovers and we're concerned about all the abandoned dogs in Ukraine, because the refugees have had to just leave their dogs and there are thousands starving in the streets," she said.

"Charity workers are picking them up but they need feeding and money's short so, for the many places which are taking them in, I think in particular in Poland, they need the money to keep the dogs alive."

Ms McKie is from Scotland, but is visiting family, including Ms Woodhouse who lives in Maitland.

"I'm actually going to adopt a couple of Ukrainian dogs when I get home," Ms McKie said.

"I felt like we needed a challenge as well, you know the people in Ukraine are suffering and yes we've got a home to go to but I think it'll be a challenge."

The pair are walking the majority of the journey alone, with family and friends scheduled to help at various stages along the way.

They admitted they didn't know as much as they should about the route they've embarked on.

"We know it is 500 kilometres, it'll take us about 17 days and it's going to be quite cold, especially at night, but we will do it," Ms Woodhouse said.

"I wasn't too prepared for it to be so isolated, there are parts where there's no shops and it's pretty wild.

"It's going to be beautiful to see all the wildlife and the Aboriginal burial sites which will be a great experience too."

Tax scam time again

SOUTH Australia Police has warned the public tax scams are on the rise.

A SAPOL spokesperson said these scams had many variations.

"It (the scam) normally starts with a robo-call from a mobile number claiming your Tax File Number has been used illegally and if you don't press 1 you will be arrested," the spokesperson said.

"Alternatively, the recorded message may claim your TFN has been suspended and you need to transfer your money to the ATO for safekeeping.

"Scammers can also manipulate incoming caller ID and text messages to mimic local police stations, tax agents and the ATO to reel you in - do not engage, just hang up!"

The spokesperson said

payment methods have also been demanded through card-less cash ATM withdrawals, retail gift cards and even via courier services to collect cash.

"The police, ATO and government agencies will never request payment by these means or request sensitive information via phone, text or email," they said.

"Confirm by calling the ATO yourself, but do not send any money or purchase any gift cards.

"It is recommended you log into MyGov to view official ATO correspondence.'

New EPA process for certificates of title

ENVIRONMENT Protection Authority has moved to record an interest in certificates of title.

The move comes in an attempt to strengthen the information available about legacy contamination in assessment areas where the EPA

holds an environmental assessment report.

This follows a recent Supreme Court judgement which considered the interpretation of information should be flagged on titles beyond those directly relating to specific

titles of land.

EPA director policy, assessment and finance Kathryn Bellette said the change would require a positive response to one of the 23 questions EPA must respond to within the environmental particulars in the

Land and Business Regulations.

"This will ensure future potential purchasers are aware of what is happening in relation to preliminary EPA assessments in the local area, in addition to assessments undertaken on the land relating to the property

title," she said.

The additional information does not change the risk assessment or priority of the assessment being undertaken by the EPA, as it already engages with residents in existing assessment areas

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FOGO collection nears for BWC

BARUNGA West Council's new-look kerbside collection program is set to begin in September.

Residents will transition to a fortnightly collection of one 140-litre red-lidded landfill bin on Mondays, as well as a 240L yellow-lidded recycling and 240L lime green-lidded, Food Organic and Green Organic bin fortnightly on Fridays.

Collection of the dark green-lidded paper and cardboard bin will cease when the program commences.

A new 8L kitchen caddy and 150 compostable bin liners will be provided to each household free of charge after council received \$17,000 in funding through Green Industries SA's Kerbside Performance Plus Food Organics Incentives Program.

The transition will enable residents to utilise the 240L FOGO bins to dispose of paper, cardboard, green organics and all food scraps, with detailed guides to be printed on each lime green lid.

Manager for assets and infrastructure Steve Davey said he was confident residents would embrace the new waste collection program given its long-term

"This might initially feel like a big change for some households, but experience from across the state shows people quickly adapt and reap the benefits," Mr Davey said.

"Reducing our waste is important as landfills are filling up and the costs, which are passed on directly to ratepayers, are rising.

"We believe the majority of households will use our FOGO waste service to turn their food waste, otherwise destined for landfill, into compost."

CEO Maree Wauchope said council was committed to using fewer natural resources and smarter ways to create a sustainable environment.

"We are seeking practical and effective ways to enhance our unique environment, and strengthen our resilience to climate change," Ms Wauchope said.

"Council is striving towards more efficient use of resources, reduction in energy and water use, conservation of biodiversity, and reduction in waste."

Council has implemented exceptional circumstance conditions to meet the needs of large families, those with children in nappies or living with a medical condition which produces extra waste.

Applications for exceptional circumstance waivers can be made at a council office, where any member of the public can discuss the new fortnightly rollout.

Iconic shed revived for centenary celebrations

PORT Julia's iconic red shed has received a much-needed facelift just in time for its 100-year celebrations in October.

Yorke Peninsula Council received funding through a stimulus grant to upgrade the shed, with works officially beginning in early June.

The shed was built in 1920 to

replace a former open-ended grain shed which was built in 1906 and was used as a goods shed while the town was still a busy port.

Port Julia Progress Association member Graham Ward said the shed had held host to a number of the town's best moments.

"There's a lot of history in here (the red shed) because it's been used for many things," Mr Ward said.

"Back in the day it was used for

flammable fluid, wool or grain storage, but everyone would also come down and use the shed for barbecues and parties.

"Now I believe it's one of the last two of its kind on the peninsula, which is special."

The port was still used by ships until the last load of barley and wheat was taken in 1967.

Mr Ward said it's the town's key icon and was worthy of repairs for its centenary celebrations.

"It's very well known all around the place, from here to Adelaide, we get a lot of people coming in to see the shed and on a hot day people can come here and sit down for their lunch, he

"The celebration, on October long weekend, will be good fun and it'll be good to christen it being here for another 100 years — it really is a great thing."

YPC operations coordinator Nick Hoskin said it was pleasing to see the shed in much better condition.

"We began proper works there two to three weeks ago, and while there's a little bit left to do, the bulk of the work, such as the cladding, has been completed," he said.

"It certainly looks a lot better now it's had a facelift, especially with the 100year anniversary approaching, it was the perfect time to get something done."



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Lew b-ute-y Road name requested to honour local

COPPER Coast Council has denied a request to rename Bay Road, Moonta Bay, after a Moonta local who designed the ute.

Moonta resident Adam Moss, who enjoys history, wrote a letter to council wanting to change the road's name to Lew Bandt Drive in honour of Lew Bandt, who was born in Moonta in 1910.

"Lew became a designer with Ford in Geelong and designed the car Henry Ford himself dubbed 'the kangaroo chaser," Mr Moss said.

"Renaming Bay Road to Lew Bandt Drive has endless possibilities.

"The ute is nationally and internationally recognised and there could, ultimately, be tourism possibilities for the area with a gathering of utes and bring a meaningful focus and drawcard to the Copper Coast.

I also thought with the upgrades to Bay Road, it could be timely to rename it with some meaning behind it, and this way it could be a permanent honour to Lew Bandt."

While councillors didn't agree to the name change, they did agree to explore a way to suitably recognise Mr Bandt's achievements.

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said she believed people in the community of significant note should be celebrated.

"I think we need to find a suitable way to celebrate him and his achievements in a way he deserves," Mrs Talbot

"If we were to put Lew on the road names list it could take many years.

"If we think of a different

way to honour him now, it could also spark community interest and make people aware of who he is so we can educate and celebrate at the same time."

Councillor Peter Oswald supported the idea for a meeting to come up with a way to celebrate.

"I think it is an excellent idea we recognise Lew Bandt but changing the name of Bay Road isn't the way to do

"Maybe we can come up with a new event such as a ute muster.

"It's really important our youth see how people in the area contributed to history."

CEO Russell Peate said it was unlikely the 144 ratepayers along Bay Road would like to change their street name, although it did not detract from the importance of the suggestion.

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Deputy mayor tables rates concerns following plan consultation

YORKE Peninsula Council elected members have received and considered the public's submissions about the 2022-23 draft Annual Business Plan, budget and fees and

Three suggestions were submitted when the plan went out for public consultation last month.

The rating model for the upcoming financial year includes a 2.5 per cent rate rise for all ratepayers and an extra 2.5 per cent for those who own primary production land.

Deputy Mayor Tania Stock correspondence she received from financial counsellors, Rural Business Support, outlining the toll this would place on some farmers at a special council meeting last Wednesday, June 29.

"I was also contacted by farmers who have received available regional investment corporation loans, which are approved for a period of five years and offer a discounted interest rate for farmers who are experiencing financial hardship," Mrs Stock said.

"As we've discussed before, it's not a one-size-fits-all policy, or it shouldn't be, in terms of the rate increases - not everyone has the

same set of circumstances and we can't assume people will necessarily have the capacity to pay.

"What I would be seeking is an exemption for a discount in their rates if they've been able to prove they've been eligible for a reduction in interest rates, this way it's not just delaying their payment, but acknowledging they don't have the capacity to pay the extra rate rise for that period of time."

Mrs Stock urged council to take on board the correspondence

"It's all very well to receive the feedback, but if we have a suggestion (from the public) on what we should do and we just ignore it, then what is the purpose of going out to public consultation?" she

CEO Andrew Cameron said council does have a rates hardship policy in place, but it would need to be amended following further research and development to accommodate this request.

"We do have a rates hardship policy which any ratepayer can apply for and access and we have those measures in place for exemptions, they (ratepayers) just need to go through the process," he said.

The feedback was received but it's not a part of the current policy framework, so right now, there's not much we can do.

"We don't quite understand the ramifications of what you (Mrs Stock) are saying financially for council; if we workshop it, then we can look at it down the track."

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National Heart Failure Awareness Week

NATIONAL Heart Failure Awareness Week was June 27 to July 3.

Charity Hearts4heart launched the week with the aim of reducing the impacts of heart failure through raising awareness of the risk of heart failure, recognising symptoms, and educating caregivers and health professionals around patient care.

With one in 50 Australians affected by heart failure, it is a pressing health concern that claims eight lives every day and poses an ever-growing risk to the population, especially those over 65 years of age, preventative cardiologist Dr Warrick



Bishop said.

Dr Bishop, who heads the national Health Heart Network, said the low levels of awareness about heart failure were leaving Australians vulnerable to this condition.

"As a nation, we really need to take a preventative approach to curb these numbers and save lives," Dr Bishop said.

"Sadly, preventative health

testing does currently not focus sufficiently on heart health and it needs to change.

"We are still largely taking a tow-truck approach, managing heart disease, heart attacks and heart failure once they occur, which often is too late.

"It is pressingly important to not disregard such seemingly small symptoms, best yet, to go get your heart health checked."

Early symptoms of heart failure range from shortness of breath after just a little exercise, irregular heartbeat or palpitations, swelling of legs, feet, or stomach, and extreme tiredness, low or no energy, among

"Council values input and we know these murals will attract visitors and be something of which the community will be proud."


Port Vincent was the first town to initiate a water tower mural after Port Vincent Progress Association received \$54,000 through federal government funding in June 2020.

A road well-travelled for May

BASED southwest Yorketown, 100-year-old May Eichner lives quietly now but once lived a life of fashion, travel and free spirit.

Born and raised in Warooka, Mrs Eichner turned 100 Wednesday, June 29 and celebrated in Yorketown surrounded by family and friends.

Professionally, she was taken to the far-flung beaches of Western Australia and to Melbourne, as a seamstress for the rich and famous, including billionaire Rupert Murdoch's mother Elisabeth.

She and her two brothers were born to a young English woman, Violet Hendry, and Scottish-Australian man Trevor Ramsay, and can still recall the hours spent outdoors on the farm near Flaherty's Corner.

"Dad used to ride his pushbike everywhere and he heard there was a young girl working at Point Turton, so he decided to go down and have a look and he was absolutely besotted with her," Mrs Eichner said.

"He had a brother coming back from the war, and he thought if he saw her, he would try to marry her and because he had enough money saved, he got in first."

Mrs Eichner's mother died when she was just 9 and although she doesn't remember much about her, she can still remember her bright, sparkling

"I had two brothers (Maurice and Ken), I was the only girl,

and when an aunty asked my father to adopt me out, he said no he wanted to keep us as a

Mrs Eichner finished school in grade 8 at Warooka Primary and took to life thereafter at the bottom of the peninsula.

"I just did odd jobs around home and helped Dad with his work, I also loved spending time in the garden — tending roses has been something I have enjoyed throughout my life," Mrs Eichner said.

"When I was younger, I would ride my bike from Warooka to Corny Point because, without a horse, that was the only way to get around, but I enjoyed it a lot."

Mrs Eichner moved to Melbourne during World War II and built a reputation as a passionate dressmaker.

"I worked at a place called George's in Melbourne and I sewed for mannequin parades and the store in Collins Street, loving every bit of it, having an opportunity to work under a Paris-trained designer," she said.

"I remember sewing for a lady who I was frightened of, and I had to show her what work I had done.

"She wanted pins handed up, which I did facing the wrong way, and I was so scared of accidentally hurting her.

"She swore at me and I had never been sworn at before so I made sure I never did that

May married husband Lav in 1954 and had two children, Leith and Diane.

Lay died in 1979 and in the aftermath, Mrs Eichner took to travelling with the Australian family and that's how we Friendship Force and other close companions.

A passion for travel evolved, taking her all over the world and a love for painting has captured every moment of the jour-

'When I first went overseas, I didn't have a camera with me, so everywhere I went I took a small paint book and set of paints with me and would paint what I saw," she said.

Since then, the family has flourished with her current count at seven grandchildren, nine great-grandchildren and two great-great-grandchildren.

Mrs Eichner was still driving three years ago, and looks back increasingly impressed on the changes she has witnessed in mechanisation and technology.

"I enjoyed travelling the world because you get to see so many things different from your own life, and making many friends along the way, looking back, is probably the most special aspect of it," she said.

"Even just the other day, for my birthday, I was receiving phone calls from friends I made in Canada wishing me a happy birthday, which is really special."

Mrs Eichner said she never thought she'd live past 85 and plans to tackle her 101st year just like every other before.

"I was raised in a Christian home, which has always been something I hold near to me and am grateful to have lived an amazing blessed life."





Key focus areas for tax time in 2022

AUSTRALIAN Taxation Office has announced four key focus areas for tax time 2022.

These priority areas are recordkeeping, work-related expenses, rental property income and deductions, and capital gains from crypto assets, property and shares.

By targeting common tax return mistakes, the ATO ensures there is an appropriate level of scrutiny on correct reporting of deductions and income, so Australia continues to have a strong tax system that can support the Australian community, ATO

assistant commissioner Tim Loh said.

'Taxpayers can take steps to lodge right the first time," Mr Loh said.

"We often see lots of mistakes in July as people rush to lodge their tax returns and forget to include interest from banks, dividend income, payments from other government agencies and private health insurers.

"For most people, this information will be automatically pre-filled in their tax return by the end of July.

"This will make the tax return process smoother, save you time, and get your tax return right.

"If you want to lodge earlier, you must take extra time to manually add all your income."

Mr Loh said it was important to rethink your claims and ensure you can satisfy the three golden rules.

"You must have spent the money yourself and weren't reimbursed," he said.

"If the expense is for a mix of income producing and private use, you can only claim the portion that relates to producing income.

"You must have a record to prove it." For more information go online to www.ato.gov.au/.

Take the risk out of tax time

A RECENT survey by the Tax Practitioners Board indicated consumers place an exceptionally high level of confidence in their registered tax practitioner.

The results showed 89 per cent of consumers have trust in tax practitioners and 66 per cent of consumers rate the experience they receive from their tax practitioner as excellent.

However, the TPB is warning the public to be extra vigilant of scams aiming to lure unsuspecting honest consumers into using the tax services of unregistered preparers.

Unregistered preparers operate outside of the law, often making money by skimming a portion of their clients' refunds and charging inflated fees for return preparation services. They attract new clients by promising large refunds.

Some will encourage filing fraudulent claims for refunds on items their clients aren't entitled to. while others will obtain myGov sign in details from clients, putting their personal information at risk.

TPB chair Ian Klug AM said the clear majority of tax practitioners act in the best interests of their clients and earn their trust, unregistered preparers can take advantage of uninformed consumers.

"We've put together a list of tips for taxpayers to follow this tax time to make sure they don't become victims of bad advice," Mr Klug said.

"If you see a tax practitioner making unexpected promises or an unregistered preparer offering tax services, it pays to be alert and a bit sceptical."

Tax time for small business

THE Australian Taxation Office has released a tax time toolkit to help small businesses and their tax professionals nail their income tax returns.

It has also flagged what it will be focusing on for small business tax returns for 2021-22.

This includes deductions that are private in nature and not related to business income, as well as over claiming of business expenses (especially for taxpayers running a home-based business); omission of business income, for example income from the sharing economy or new business ventures; and recordkeeping - including insufficient or non-existent records that are needed to substantiate claims.

ATO assistant commissioner Andrew Watson said they know most small businesses do their best to meet their tax obligations and get it right.

"The majority lodge their tax returns through a registered tax professional, but we know that some (particularly sole traders) like to DIY," Mr Watson said.

"So, if you're going to give it a go yourself, we recommend you take a look at our guides, to help you nail it."

Mr Watson said it had been a tough couple of years for many small business owners, and tax obligations may not be at the top of their list.

"So, if you need a hand, I encourage you to contact your registered tax professional or the ATO," Mr Watson said.

"If you're feeling overwhelmed or getting behind with your tax, let us know as early as possible so we can work with you to find a solution.

"No matter what your situation is, it's never too late to ask for help."

Assistant Commissioner Tim Loh said the ATO sees more mistakes in early July as people rush to get their tax returns done.

You can lodge on July 1, but you are punting with your tax return by risking delays to any refund you are owed," Mr Loh said.

'If you forget to include everything, you may end up answering questions from the tax office.

"We pre-fill some of the information in your tax return to help you to get it right the first time such as your wages, health insurance and interest from banks, this process is usually finalised by late July.

"I was shocked and ecstatic at the same time," she said.

Pitching concerns to YPFL

Yorke Peninsula Football League has addressed recent playing surface concerns.

The safety of Wallaroo Cricket Club's artificial pitch covering was raised as an issue by Paskeville Football Club when it played on the surface two months ago.

A layer of rubber pellets has covered the WCC pitch to soften the impact felt by players during recent YPFL seasons.

League secretary Phil Brand said the initial complaint was made in regards to the slipperiness of the small rubber pellets.

"This has been more of a perceived problem this year because there's been no injuries so far, although some think there could be," Brand said.

"Since the complaint, teams visiting Wallaroo have been required to inspect the pitch and make a playing decision by the Wednesday (prior to competi**Competition guidelines**

- Prior to competition, visiting YPFL clubs must answer yes to: • Are the playing surfaces satisfactory for play to commence?
- Has all visible debris, that may affect player safety, been removed?
- Are the game formats and ground markings in line with the AFL Laws of the Game?
- Are all sprinkler covers intact and level with the playing field?
- Are the perimeter fences and/or signs free from visible

Bute, Central Yorke and Kadina Football Clubs all agreed to contest minor round matches since the issue was raised.

Brand said Southern Eagles and Ardrossan (Football Clubs) had also been using similar artificial pitch coverings during football season.

"Eagles shift their covering between venues (Yorketown, Edithburgh and Warooka) and had to make a few repairs after moving it recently," he said.

"Other than that, there haven't been too many issues at

If clubs are unsatisfied with the condition of the host's playing surface, they can agree to postpone the match or have the pitch covered with sand.

The YPFL is set to make a decision on whether it will allow artificial pitch coverings in future seasons at a meeting in October.

"I decided to move across to Port after playing one (league) game in 2020 (for Woodville-West Torrens).


"I played 18 games last season and this was my third game this year.

"It was a tough day at the office, with a number of players on Covid protocols and a bigger group that travelled to Perth; we certainly weren't able




SANFL... Jake Westbrook has notched up 50 SANFL league games for Port Adelaide.

"To top off a modest day, I needed a couple of stiches in my left wrist after being



The home side got the first goal 11 minutes into the contest when Jack Tape kicked the ball off the deck from five metres out.





Discover new ways to reduce crop disease

A CURTIN University research centre will continue to discover new ways to reduce the economic impact of crop disease for Australian growers, with a further five-year investment of \$30 million by the Grains Research and Development Corporation.

Established in 2014, the Curtin-based Centre for Crop and Disease Management is a major initiative involving alignment of strategic objectives and co-investment of resources and human capability by Curtin University and the GRDC.

The centre's discoveries include identification of globally significant cases of fungicide resistance among barley diseases and finding the 'master gene' responsible for regulating infection by common wheat pathogens, and by generating germplasm and genetic tools that help growers breed disease-resistant wheat, barley, canola and pulses.

Curtin University vice-chancellor Professor Harlene Hayne said it was evidence the centre's research outcomes were making a significant difference in the Australian grains industry.

"Whether that be in detecting fungicide resistance cases, or advances in pre-breeding genetic resistance, or even through improving farming systems management, our relationship with GRDC keeps us on top of the research needs of industry, and acting on them through genuine partnership to deliver results in a rapid manner," Prof. Hayne said.

GRDC chairman John Woods said research at CCDM played a vital role in reducing the economic impact of diseases for wheat, barley, canola and pulse growers across the country.

"We started this partnership with Curtin University in 2014 and in that time we have seen targeted, world-class expertise deliver outcomes that address disease issues facing Australian growers," Mr Woods said.

"For example, CCDM has done outstanding work identifying, developing and delivering barley germplasm that is resistant to powdery mildew with a total cost of research of \$5.91m, but representing a total benefit to the grains industry of \$54.8m.

"The centre has also made significant achievements in improving genetic resistance to canola diseases, through the identification of novel sources of resistance to sclerotinia stem rot and working with Australian canola breeders on the application of genomic selection for sclerotinia resistance breeding."

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Grain legume initiative to close the yield gap

MANAGEMENT options for grain legume crops and their economic impacts are the subject of a geographically broad, collaborative South Australian initiative.

A total of 33 trials are being sown in 2022 for the grain legume project, funded by the Grains Research and Development Corporation.

Titled 'Development and extension to close the economic yield gap and maximise farming systems benefits from grain legume production in SA, the project aims to address the current 40 per cent yield gap between average grain legume yields and water-limited yield potential by supporting growers with extension of best practice grain legume agronomy.

Project research coordinator Sarah Day, of SARDI, said trials are located near Tooligie, Hart and Loxton, along with Millicent, Lameroo, Melrose, Riverton, Maitland, Bute, Pinnaroo, Kimba and Wangary.

"This year's trials program is looking at the economic impact of various management options for grain legume crops, including diseases, weeds and herbicide use," Ms Day said.

"Other areas of focus are soil amelioration - including deep ripping — and reducing pod

"There are also some lentil and field pea variety trials going into some locations to increase the understanding of how these cultivars are adapted to expanding areas."

Ms Day said most of the trials involve lentils; however, chickpeas, faba beans, field peas and vetch are also represented, as well as cereals for benchmarking purposes.

"The trials are very region-specific and have been designed to answer questions being asked by growers at that local level," she said.

"GRDC invested in this project for that particular reason — to address the need for more refined grain legume crop management approaches for different regions."



HOT FISHING TIPS

Wallaroo: Those cold northerly winds slowly became cold east to southeasterlies late last week and into the weekend as boat crews launched for King George whiting, squid and red-beaked garfish. Jetty-based fishing was also cold work with squid and tommy ruff (Australian herring) being the main reports.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Catches of gar, squid and whiting were made from Cape Elizabeth grounds to the Tipara Reef, while local beaches had mullet and an occasional salmon trout. Try the jetties for late-afternoon gar and tommy ruff.

Point Turton: KG whiting are at The Banks and over west towards Corny Point. Gar and a few small squid have again been

caught by crews fishing the northern part of Hardwicke Bay, while the jetty has the odd garfish and sprat tommy ruff.

Edithburgh: Some good tommy ruff action was the news from the town jetty last week, with gents and small plastic working well. A steady berley trail was essential. Boat crews caught whiting from Tapley Shoals and Troubridge Point.

Stansbury: Red-beaked garfish were off the grounds east of the old boat ramp and north of the main oyster marker. Squid and snook were northwards towards the Orontes Bank, while jetty-based fishing produced squid on occasions.

Ardrossan: Boat crews enjoyed much calmer conditions over the weekend and caught whiting from Long Spit and just east of Windara Reef. Gar and squid were the other main reports. Try the jetty in the late afternoons for squid and mullet.

At the time, Michael said he had been enjoying a Moonta Mines Tourist Railway

"I got a phone call from my sister-inlaw Eloise Guest, who had just finished playing netball for Bute, asking if I could fly over to pick up Delany's mum," Michael said.

"As a parent, I can only imagine what it'd be like to hear news like that, so I was very happy to help out."
