COPPER Coast is set to become the first regional area in South Australia to host a 24-hour ambulance crew.

A team of 12 SA Ambulance Service career paramedics will begin operating from Moonta from Monday, July 14, before relocating to the Wallaroo Ambulance Station later this year once major upgrades at that site are complete.

The new crew will deliver 24/7 frontline care, working alongside existing volunteer and Regional Medical Transfer Service crews.

This enhancement of local ambulance coverage is part of a broader rollout of additional paramedics across Yorke Peninsula and the Upper Spencer Gulf

Testing times

REGARDING 'Ridiculous' wait times for blood THE decision to ban the use of generators in tests on SYP (YP Country Times 1-7-25), I worked for 7.5 years with Australian Clinical Labs in Minlaton doing the blood tests and there were never any long wait times.

I was there from 8am to noon, Monday to Friday.

I live local and never got the chance to apply when they changed over to SA Pathology; I have tried to contact SA Pathology to ask about working there but don't seem to get anywhere.

I have many locals still asking when am I coming back because of them only being open three days a week.

Government inaction on algae bloom

THE environment minister recently stated that we can do nothing about the unfolding algal crisis in our marine environment except hope for a change in the weather.

She also referenced a small algal bloom near Coffin Bay in 2014, thinking it will go away as happened then. That bloom involved around three kilometres of coastline and lasted no more than two weeks.

At the time, the government immediately mobilised a team of researchers to do extensive underwater surveys, water sampling and other tests to understand the impacts - particularly on nearby commercial diving and aquaculture operations.

In contrast, this current algal bloom has involved over 400km of South Australia's coastline and continues three months on, with habitat destruction many kilometres out to sea.

I have personally observed the death of thousands of razorfish, sponges and associated weed beds, with affected areas potentially spanning thousands of square kilometres.

Given the scale of this unprecedented event, why hasn't the government instructed its research teams to do comprehensive water sampling, document the extent of damage and investigate what is killing our marine life?

While the reasons for not doing so are unclear, one thing I can say with certainty, without a full understanding of this algal disaster, and extent of benthic habitat destruction, there will be no way to save or properly manage what's left of our aquatic environment.

'Tough cookie' masters walk

AN 84-year-old Sydneysider has taken on the Walk the Yorke trail unassisted and completed all 500 kilometres in just 29 days, including seven rest days.

Don Andrews started in Port Wakefield on June 4 and walked along the eastern and western coasts of Yorke Peninsula via all 10 stages of the trail to arrive in Moonta Bay on July 2.

He carried his supplies, tent and bedding on his back, and camped along the trail most nights, interspersed with some overnight stays and rest days at caravan parks.

Supplies of dehydrated food were mailed to him and he collected them from post offices along the way.

Mr Andrews averaged 23km a day, and his final stint, from The Gap to Moonta Bay, was 31km. Speaking the day after he com-

pleted the walk, Mr Andrews said he was feeling fine, apart from having sore calves.

"People might think doing 31km when you're 84 is ridiculous but I certainly got a buzz when I finished the whole thing," he said.

"The scenery is great and there are some beautiful beaches.

"The highlights were seeing the red cliffs around Ardrossan and Balgowan.

"All the people I met along the track and the managers of the caravan parks were most helpful."

Mr Andrews said there was adequate water available to him in towns and from the tanks provided along the trail but people planning to undertake its entire length in summer should check with Yorke Peninsula Council first about water levels in the tanks.

A lifelong bushwalker, he keeps fit by walking four to five kilometres every day and has completed 55 designated walks around Australia.

They include South Australia's 1200km Heysen Trail from Cape Jervis to Parachilna, which he completed in stages.

"I'm not going to do another one this long again," Mr Andrews said.

He praised the scenic design of the trail, which was led by former Yorke Peninsula Council operations manager Stephen Goldsworthy.

The trail was officially opened 10 years ago and Mr Goldsworthy said most walkers who took on the entire length of the trail in one stint were assisted by support crew in vehicles.

"He (Mr Andrews) is one tough cookie," he said.

"As far as I know, he is the oldest person to take on the entire trail unassisted."

Mr Andrews was presented with a Walk the Yorke certificate of completion by current YPC operations manager Ian Yarrow at a dinner in Ardrossan on July 3.

Mr Goldsworthy said he would love to see Walk the Yorke become as well known as the Heysen Trail and for more people to enjoy its unique coastal scenery.

Friends of Walk the Yorke holds regular walks along sections of the trail and can be contacted on Facebook.

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Council adopts 5.5 per cent general rate rise, decreases differential and fixed rates

AT its ordinary meeting on July 2, Copper Coast Council approved a 5.5 per cent increase in general rates income, along with the adoption of the 2025-2035 Long Term Financial Plan and the 2024-25 Annual Business Plan.

The 5.5 per cent increase also applies to related service and fixed charges.

In response to rising property valuations and community feedback, the differential rate in the dollar has been reduced.

Residential properties will receive a 2.2 per cent decrease, while marina berths, industrial and commercial, primary production and vacant land will each receive a 3 per cent decrease.

The fixed charge has been reduced by \$53 and is now set at \$475. The overall 2025-26 annual

budget for council projects has an operating income of \$41.92 million and an operating expenses budget of \$41.59 million, which gives a surplus of \$334,583, before capital grants and estimated asset sales.

Rate income will contribute \$31.17 million to council's operating income.

Council has also continued specific separate rates to fund local initiatives, including \$829 per property for the Port Hughes golf course (Copperclub, The Dunes) and has funded \$30,000 for planning and marketing the

Kadina CBD.

The Riley Cove Community Corporation will contribute \$265 per property for internal road maintenance.

In a statement to the YP Country Times, a council spokesperson said this year's budget reflected a significant shift in economic indicators.

They said the shift was shown by the Local Government Price Index being at 2.3 per cent (down from 4.4 per cent in December, 2023) and Adelaide All Groups CPI at 2.2 per cent in March 2025 (down from 2.4 per cent).

The spokesperson also said this year's budget outlined substantial investment in infrastructure and community services, aligning with the recently adopted 2025-2035 Strategic Plan.

Chief executive Dylan Strong said the adopted plans prioritised long-term financial sustainability while addressing the evolving needs of the region's growing population.

"Council has taken a balanced approach to rate adjustments, minimised the impact of high capital value increase and made significant but measured and well-researched capital investments in crucial infrastructure," Mr Strong said.

The 2025-2035 LTFP and ABP can be viewed on the council's website or at the council office.

Major project priorities for 2025-26

- Roads and infrastructure: Delivery of the final year of the current five-year road transport, footpath and stormwater plans, including the Wallaroo Entrance Road Project (stages 1, 2B and 2C) and the completion of the shared path between Moonta Bay and Port Hughes.
- Wastewater management: Improvements to community wastewater management systems, including expansion of the Port Hughes treatment plant and completion of the Kadina wastewater lagoon upgrades.
- Community facilities: Continuing with the Wallaroo Foreshore Master Plan, including the Wallaroo aquatic facility and commencement of the Moonta Town Hall Master Plan and upgrades to the Moonta CBD.
- Stormwater management: Completion of the Stormwater Management Plan for Wallaroo and the West Terrace Stormwater upgrade in Kadina.
- Other projects: Delivery of the Port Hughes jetty upgrade, Stately Way Reserve upgrade and the McCauley Park stormwater management and biodiversity upgrade.
- **Community support:** Allocation of a budget to support and progress the World Heritage Recognition process and advocate for new childcare facilities in Kadina and Moonta.

SEA Rescue vessels will no longer be launched from the Marion Bay boat ramp, amid widespread concerns about the new facility.

Sea Rescue Edithburgh Flotilla leader Brian Klingberg is among those who have spoken out about the ramp, completed in April by Yorke Peninsula Council for \$3.5 million.

He said he would no longer allow the flotilla's vessel to launch from the ramp, citing safety risks to both the crew and the vessel.

"I do not consider that the ramp is suitable to launch as it would put the boat or any of our members in danger," Mr Klingberg said.

"I've spent 27 years as a commercial fisherman fishing these waters, and I've spent 25 years as a member of Sea Rescue, so I've got a little bit of experience under my belt."

Mr Klingberg said his decision was supported by the SA Sea Rescue Squadron commodore.

Not being able to launch at Marion Bay would add extra hours to rescue efforts for incidents south of Edithburgh around the southern coast of Yorke Peninsula to Port Victoria on the west coast, including the Althorpe Islands, he said.

"I would like to see the new ramp completely removed and go back (to using) the old ramp as it's closer to the jetty and not impacted by the

swells," Mr Klingberg said. "The council should have had

more input from the local people who have lived here all their lives."

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis, speaking in SA Parliament on June 26, said the flotilla's decision had dangerous implications for marine safety in a large area off the southern YP coastline.

"I commend the Edithburgh flotilla for having the courage to make a stand and say that they are not going to put their membership in harm's way, but it leaves us in a very short spot," he said.

Mr Ellis called for accountability from the consultant engineers for the project.

The new ramp was "not fit for purpose" and condemnation of it was widespread.

"We now need to look at what we can do to make it better and more usable," he said.

Mr Ellis said ramp users' major concern was that the four rows of pylons created an unsafe environment.

"It is a relatively unprotected ramp, with swells rising quite often and boaties finding themselves battered up against those poles in between their boats, leaving them in quite a dangerous situation," he said.

Mr Ellis said the old ramp at Marion Bay should be made available for use while works were done to make the new ramp more usable.

Marion Bay fisher Romeo Ljubicic said he and his wife, Sarah Meins, were able to launch their 7 metre

long, 3.5 tonne boat from the old ramp without any problems.

"On most days, we are in fear of launching at the new ramp," he said.

"It's created an energy vortex the tide, the wind, the current, and the swell all combine to create and magnify very dangerous conditions for people and their boats."


Marion Bay resident Brett Davies, who manages 45 local holiday properties, said the safety concerns and algal bloom crisis were having a drastic effect on holiday bookings.

"Our bookings are down 60 per cent compared with the same time last year," he said.

Marion Bay resident Craig Thompson said he was disappointed council had spent money on a facility that would have to be "pulled to bits".

He said he had seen boats pushed into the back of cars or the walkway by the force of the swell and the ramp was dangerous even on calm days.

They have to build a groyne (to protect the ramp) — there's no other way out of it," Mr Thompson said.

vessels and users, and there have been many instances in which this has already occurred.

"The width of both laneways is far from adequate, and the small vessel lane is almost completely avoided by all users.

"Even the wide lane allows for minimal error."

He said strong south-westerly and westerly winds made vessel control difficult within the pylons, especially in winter, and that the wave attenuator had done little to reduce swell surges.

"Instead, along with the walkways and pylons, these devices have restricted the natural flow of water, causing seaweed and sand to build up," he said.

This had blocked access to the nearby old ramp and created a bogging hazard.

Countless vehicles, tractors and trailers have been stranded and put all users at further risk using recovery equipment and congesting the launching area."

Mr Valente also criticised the walkway's design.

"It doesn't align with boat gunwale height regardless of the tide and offers no protection to vessels."

He said the Marion Bay community strongly supported removing all pylons and the walkway.

Nowhere else has an installation of this current type been successful in an open water setting such as Marion Bay," he said.

"The community will not be satisfied with any other outcome, and we see this as the only way to make launching vessels safe again."

Mr Valente welcomed council's move to consider changes at its meeting on Wednesday, July 9.

He urged councillors to go further than the current recommendation and commit to fully removing the pylons and improving community consultation.

YP Council considers action to rectify ramp

YORKE Peninsula Council will consider options to address safety concerns about the Marion Bay boat ramp during its meeting on Wednesday, July 9.

The new \$3.5 million ramp, completed in April, was built in response to community demand for a replacement to the town's old ramp.

However, it has drawn criticism from users for creating hazardous launching and retrieval conditions, and causing sand and seaweed to build up.

Councillors will vote on a recommendation to remove the ramp's outer pylons and wave attenuation structure.

They will also consider completing a review with peak user groups and the Department for Infrastructure and Transport regarding the walkway between the two ramps - specifically, whether to increase its height or remove it entirely along with the pylons.

The recommendation includes reopening the old ramp while any modifications are made, and formally recognising challenges faced by ramp users.

A council spokesperson said \$303,861 remained from the original \$3.8 million budget.

Council contributed \$760,000 to the project -20 per cent of the total cost.

According to a report prepared by YPC's assets and infrastructure team, the Marion Bay coastline is exposed to ocean swells, wind and waves.

The ramp is not considered an alltidal or all-weather facility, the report said.

Council staff and DIT have met onsite and consulted with users. Feedback indicated the outer pylons do not provide benefits beyond marking the ramp and supporting attenuation panels. Instead, they restrict manoeuvrability and hinder users from retrieval attempts.

The feedback indicates the southern wave attenuator is also disrupting natural sand and seaweed movement. While two attenuation screens have already been removed, the remaining panels appear ineffective at reducing wave energy, the YPC report said.

Users also raised concerns that the walkway is too low and narrow, making it difficult to board or hold boats. The 5 metre spacing between pylons is considered unsafe, especially for longer vessels, increasing the risk of injury.

Construction kicks off

CONSTRUCTION has begun at Lots 32, 34 and 35, Frances Terrace, Kadina.

The site is confirmed to host fast food chain KFC and potentially BCF and Supercheap Auto.

As reported in last week's edition (YPCT 1-7-25) fencing company Guardian Temporary Fencing hinted at BFC and Supercheap Auto being built on the site via hashtags on a Facebook post on June 12.

Copper Coast Council granted development approval for Lots 32, 34 and 35 Frances Terrace on May 27, according to the Plan SA website.

The commercial development will include one shop (restaurant), two bulky goods outlets (shops) and verandah advertising signage, along with car parking and landscaping.

The application was lodged in June 2023, and the project is still a confidential item in council meetings.

At council's July 2 ordinary meeting, it was recommended that Lot 32 be kept confidential for another 12 months, ending on August 2, 2026, or a lesser period if determined by the chief executive officer.

The YP Country Times contacted Super Retail Group, the parent company of Supercheap Auto and BCF, but did not receive a response before publication deadline.



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Drivers lose licences

A DRINK driver with a blood alcohol reading more than two times the legal limit was caught in Ardrossan.

Just after 8pm on Tuesday, July 1, Yorke Mid North Highway Patrol stopped a Mazda sedan on West Terrace for a mobile driver test.

The driver, a 54-year-old man from Medindie, recorded reading of 0.128.

He was reported for drink driving and issued a six-month instant loss of licence.

He will be summonsed to appear in the Maitland Magistrates Court.

At Bute, just after 8pm on Wednesday, July 2, a driver was stopped on Railway Terrace by a Yorke Mid North highway patrol.

The 45-year-old Bute man was behind the wheel of a Toyota utility and recorded a blood alcohol reading of 0.086; he was reported for drink driving and issued with a six-month instant loss of licence. He will be summonsed to appear in the Kadina Magistrates Court.

Yorke Mid North officers also detected two drink drivers on Saturday afternoon, July 5.

Just after 7pm, patrols stopped a Holden sedan on Bookyanna Road at Point Pearce and submitted the driver to a breath test. The 35-year-old Maitland man returned a result of 0.199, nearly four times the legal limit.

The man was reported for drink driving and breaching his provisional licence conditions, and issued with a 12-month instant loss of licence.

At about 11pm, patrols stopped a Mazda SUV on Brentwood Road at Stansbury and the driver, a 23-year-old woman from West Lakes, returned

a result of 0.056 from a breath test. She was issued with an expiation notice of \$980 and four demerit points.

Motorcyclist dies

A motorcycle rider died after a fatal crash at Two Wells on Wednesday, July 2.

At about 5.30pm, police were called to Mallala Road and Port Wakefield Highway, Two Wells, after reports of a crash between a Kawasaki motorcycle and a Mazda SUV.

Sadly, the rider of the motorbike, a 36-yearold man from Korunye, died at the scene.

The driver of the Mazda, a 60-year-old from James Well, was taken to hospital for the treatment of minor injuries and mandatory drug and alcohol testing; he was not physically injured.

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Anyone who witnessed the crash or may have dashcam footage is asked to call Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000.

The rider was the 39th person, and the fifth motorcyclist, to die on South Australian roads in 2025.

AFTER three attempts, Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis says he is "disappointed" his efforts to alert the South Australian Government to the need for improved safety at the intersection of Mines and Thrington roads in North Yelta, Moonta, have fallen on deaf ears.

Mr Ellis first raised the issue with the SA Government in August and followed up in January and June.

He said local councillors, CFS representatives, real estate firms, residents and holidaymakers had contacted him, all expressing concern over "near misses" at the intersection.

Despite this, the Department for Infrastructure and Transport has continued to advise Mr Ellis that the intersection has a "low crash history", making any improvements "unwarranted".

"This is a busy intersection that carries tourism and local traffic coming to and from Port Hughes and Moonta from Adelaide and the Copper Coast Highway, and multiple constituents have advised the urgent need for a merge lane or updated alignment," Mr Ellis said.

"It is frustrating that local experience is not more highly valued."

Mr Ellis said that, on July 2, DIT advised him they had ruled out any works to make the traffic flow safer or replace the give way sign with a stop sign.

However, they agreed to extend the existing 80 kilometres per hour speed limit zone past the intersection, he said.

"As stated in parliament back in February when I addressed this topic in the chamber, Moonta, Moonta Bay and Port Hughes are experiencing significant growth in local housing and popularity as tourist destinations and an upgrade of this intersection is needed to accommodate the associated higher traffic flow," Mr Ellis said.

"I will continue to advocate the need for a redesign to proactively prevent future crashes."

Copper Coast Council elected member Brent Walker, who initially proposed implementing a stop sign at the intersection in November, said he was pleased DIT had implemented the speed change.

"I am very pleased, working in consultation with Fraser (Ellis) and the council and DIT, that a satisfactory solution has been achieved - the solution being the 80km/h speed limit extended out to that intersection," Councillor Walker said.

At a council meeting in January, a report receive from DIT said it did not support council's request for a stop sign at the Thrington and Mines roads intersection.

DIT gave similar reasons to those provided to Mr Ellis on July 2.

"Given the low crash history, this intersection is not highlighted as requiring an upgrade on safety grounds, when compared to other locations across South Australia," the report read.

"As such, the Department considers that this intersection is operating satisfactorily in its existing layout and there are no proposed upgrades planned at this time."

In the report, DIT said it had investigated the intersection, including an analysis of the road layout, traffic volumes, sight distance and crash statistics.



SA's first regional all-hours ambo crew

THESE enhancements will be supported by a 90-square-metre extension to the existing facility. There will be no disruption to ambulance services during the upgrade period.

As well as the new 24-hour crew operating from Moonta, Wallaroo crews will be based at the SAAS Kadina Station and RMTS staff will continue to work from Wallaroo Hospital.

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis welcomed the announcement, noting that the current volunteer-based ambulance model in regional areas was under significant strain.

"The 12 new paramedics will make an enormous difference in the Copper Coast region and beyond," Mr Ellis said.

'It will ease the burden on volunteers and provide improved care to those in desperate need of emergency care."

Minister for Health Chris Picton said the deployment of a 24/7 career paramedic crew to Wallaroo and surrounding communities marked a first for regional South Australia and, with the backing of the region's existing RMTS and volunteer crews, would help ensure faster, more responsive care in the area.

SA Ambulance Service executive director of country operations Robert Tolson said the new staff would improve patient care and regional emergency capacity.

These recruitments are a major milestone for the SA Ambulance Service," Mr Tolson said.

"I want to thank our dedicated teams for their extraordinary effort in managing this expansion alongside our daily operations and ongoing projects."

Wallaroo ambulance crews have responded to nearly 2000 incidents in 2024.

New community paramedic for YP

A new community paramedic will be deployed to Yorke Peninsula this month, providing local health and wellbeing support across the region from 9am to 5pm on weekdays.

Mr Tolson said the role would build on similar programs already in place in other regional towns.

"I'm particularly excited about the new community paramedic role for Yorke Peninsula," Mr Tolson said.

"This role extends beyond emergency response to provide proactive healthcare offering wellness checks, chronic disease management and health education.

'We've successfully implemented this program in Robe and Ceduna, and the positive impact on those communities has been remarkable.



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Council receives grants

COPPER Coast Council has secured several grants recently, as noted in the agenda of its July 2 ordinary meeting.

These include \$364,000 from the Stormwater Management Authority for flood mitigation at West Terrace, Kadina, and \$72,000 for the Wallaroo Stormwater Management Plan.

An additional \$26,898 was secured through Green Industries South Australia to implement sustainable and efficient food waste recycling systems for 8966 households at a cost of \$3 per property.

Through the Department of Primary Industries and Regions SA Connecting Communities Events Grants program, \$5000 was received to host a community screening of the film Just A Farmer and a panel discussion on August 10.

A further \$10,000 was granted through the Landscape SA Grassroot Grants to remove declared plants from Moonta Mines.

Grants up to \$20k for rural mental health

COMMUNITY and not-for-profit groups can now apply for grants of up to \$20,000 for projects supporting mental health and wellbeing in farming and regional communities.

Round 10 of the In a Good Place Program, run by the Foundation for Rural Regional Renewal, will provide up to \$240,000 in funding for community-led initiatives.

Projects can focus on mental health education, reducing stigma, building social connections, and supporting local non-clinical services.

FRRR head of granting Jill Karena said the grants were designed to strengthen local capacity. "Resilience is about using what you have

in your toolbox to tackle a challenge - it doesn't mean you have to battle things on your own," she said.

"These grants help local organisations build the knowledge, skills and networks needed to support community wellbeing."

She said regional organisations understood the specific pressures locals face and were filling the gaps in mental health services through practical support - such as mental health first aid courses, community events, guest speakers or safe spaces for open conversations.

Grants are available for wellbeing projects across remote, rural and regional areas, including those specifically targeting farming communities.

A Jamestown-based group, sHedway, was among 19 round nine recipients, announced in June. The group aims to support the shearing industry by developing a mental health advocate network.

Applications close at 5pm AEST on Thursday, August 14; successful applicants will be announced in late November.

power was disconnected and internal structural bracing, support works and asbestos removal were completed to allow the project to proceed, the Copper Coast Council July 2 agenda said.

The works temporarily affected two car parks on Hallett Street, as well as the car park between the Telstra Shop and The Office Shop on Taylor Street. These car parks were expected to remain closed until June 24.

The demolition is scheduled to be completed during the week starting July 21, according to a council spokesperson.

In a report released on April 3, 2024, the council made public Confidential Item 13.3, which

detailed the \$239,000 purchase of 10-12 Hallett Street, Kadina.

That item also referred to a confidential report presented to council on December 6, 2023, which said a site inspection had

been done to assess the structure at 10 Hallett Street.

It also stated that costs associated with the demolition and treatment or removal of contamination at 10 Hallett Street totalled

\$44,000 and that chief executive Dylan Strong made the offer to Wardle Co. Real Estate once the property was deemed suitable to purchase.

Another released confidential item, from November 29, 2023, said council had been contacted by real estate company Wardle Co. Real Estate before 10-12 Hallett Street was listed on the open market.

The motion stated that the agent considered the close proximity of the parcel of land in relation to council's existing parking allotment on 30 Taylor Street, creating an opportunity to increase parking within the CBD.

While a conceptual design was included in the reports, a council spokesperson confirmed that there are currently no development plans or budget allocated for the project.

Algal bloom needs national disaster declaration: Greens

GREENS Senator for South Australia Sarah Hanson-Young says she has written to the prime minister to urge for a national response to the algae bloom that has devastated SA waters for months.

"So far, most of the response has been led by the local community, without any formal government support," she said.

Just last week we learned that senior members of the federal government were not even aware of the disaster unfolding on our beaches.

"If there were dead fish washing up on Bondi Beach every day, there would be a national outcry and response."

Ms Hanson-Young said the federal government had a responsibility to manage climate change events, such as the algal bloom.

"A declaration of a national disaster is important to ensure that there are significant resources available to conduct the science that is desperately needed and support the communities and industries that are bearing the brunt of this crisis," she said.

"Our fishing and tourism industries are being decimated by this disaster.

"The scientists tell us that we could be facing another 18 months with this toxic algal bloom.

"To protect our important industries we need a proper support package."

Additionally, the SA Greens have called on the SA Government to take action on the algal bloom by scrapping fossil fuel subsidies, making gas companies pay for the clean-up and compensation to impacted industries, having a parliamentary inquiry into the bloom, and placing a moratorium on new oil and gas projects in SA.

SA Water visits Copper Coast growth sites

SA Water met with Copper Coast Council representatives on June 20 to see the many developments across the region in person.

At council's July 2 ordinary meeting, Mayor Roslyn Talbot reported that council representatives had shown SA Water the proposed Metacap housing development at Port Hughes and other developments across the Copper Coast.

Mayor Talbot said the SA Water chief executive, manager of growth, and manager of YP water toured with the group.

This followed a YP Country Times report earlier this year, which stated that at least 1000 proposed homes across Yorke Peninsula were being delayed due to a lack of infrastructure within the SA Water network (Homes on hold, 27-5-25).

Council chief executive Dylan Strong said in May the issue was not unique to the Copper Coast and delays in SA Water's trunk upgrades were affecting local developments.

He said the matter would be addressed in SA Water's 2028-2032 budget.

"It was a really good opportunity to show them, visibly, the development that is occurring on the Copper Coast and we sort of strategically drove through some high growth areas," Mayor Talbot said.

"It really highlighted how fast the Copper Coast is growing and what a premier destination we are and it helped with our profile in their eyes.

"Not sure if it helped get any money towards those developments, but it certainly will help when we are at the table arguing for money."

Councillor Brent Walker asked if the issue of water availability for the developments had changed at all.

Mayor Talbot said SA Water would be doing its budgeting for the next four-year cycle (2028-2032) soon.


"I think it's important to know what the thresholds are and how much water there is for the development that's occurring and the need for that water supply to be increased," she said.

"We're anxious that when they do their next budget cycle we can be considered, so that is why we were keen to make sure they were fully aware of our needs and the importance of those requirements."

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

ADDITIONAL country specialists are now regularly scheduled at Wallaroo and Minlaton to provide face-to-face palliative care clinics and home visits for regional South Australia.

This follows a \$10 million investment by the South Australian Government in additional country specialists, which also includes services in Clare and Port Pirie. Weekly telehealth sessions are also available to Yorke and Northern Local Health Network patients, a SA Government spokesperson said.

This has been made possible through an agreement between the Northern Adelaide Local Health Network and (the) Yorke and Northern Local Health Network, enabling specialist palliative care physicians from NALHN to regularly visit the YNLHN," the spokesperson said.

"As part of the agreement between LHNs, the YNLHN is also building its local community palliative care team's capacity through the support of visiting palliative care physicians, who are providing weekly education sessions.

"The needs of palliative care patients in the Yorke and Northern areas are discussed at a fortnightly multidisciplinary team meeting involving specialist palliative care physicians and nurses.

"Local general practitioners are also receiving palliative care education from the visiting palliative care physicians, further injecting specialist palliative care knowledge into the Yorke and Northern general practitioner communities."

Since 2022, specialist palliative care physician access for YNLHN patients has increased from 0.2 FTE to 0.45 FTE.

New tourism plan for South Australia

A REFRESHED South Aust-ralian Tourism Plan 2030 has been released, confirming an ambitious goal to grow the state's visitor economy to \$12.8 billion and support a further 4400 jobs by 2030.

Developed with input from more than 400 industry stakeholders across all 12 tourism regions, the plan maps a way forward for the industry — including leveraging the new state tourism brand and campaign Celebrate the Simple Pleasures.

The state's current visitor economy is currently worth \$9.8b, comprises more than 20,000 businesses and employs more than 41,600 people this is equivalent to one in 25 workers, which is three times that of the mining industry.

Car club grants now open

MOTORSPORT enthusiasts can shift their aspirations up a gear, with car club grant applications now open, accelerating regional, female and young driver participation and boosting safety.

A record 75 initiatives across 64 clubs shared \$500,000 under the previous funding round, helping purchase defibrillators, rejuvenate clubrooms, improve operations and put on popular events.

Eligible clubs must be a not-forprofit organisation operating for 12 months or longer.

Trainee doctors at three-year peak in regional SA

REGIONAL South Australia has recorded a three-year high in General Practitioner training numbers, with 196 second-, third- and fourth-year registrars completing GP and rural generalist placements in 2024.

Regional GPs and generalists deliver primary care, along with aged care, emergency care and acute services in rural hospitals.

To attract and support trainees,

the South Australian Government has expanded the Single Employer Model, which offers certainty around work locations, income and employment conditions such as hours, on-call obligations and leave entitlements.

It also helps ensure patients have more consistent access to primary healthcare.

The SEM was first trialled in

2023 by the Riverland Academy of Clinical Excellence, operating within the Riverland Mallee Coorong Local Health Network. Hosting up to 20 generalist trainees at a time, the model received strong support from both general practices and participants.

A new four-year SEM trial has commenced across all regional Local Health Networks, with capacity to support up to 60 GP and rural generalist trainees.

So far, 57 GP practices have been approved to participate in the expanded trial across the five regional LHNs. Eleven trainee doctors have joined this year, with two more expected by the end of August.

The hope is that the model will encourage more trainees to remain in regional areas long-term, strengthening healthcare access and continuity for rural communities.

The SEM offers GP and rural generalist trainees the option of stable employment and the potential to build longer-term connections in regional communities.

Applications are now open for next year's SEM intake.

In 2023, 123 training doctors were based in regional SA.



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Fishers' plea for lifeline

COMMERCIAL fishers are calling for the South Australian Government to waive licence and quota fees as they continue to struggle with low catches amid the devastating impact of the prolonged toxic algal bloom on marine life.

Marine Fishers The Association has written to Primary Industries and Regional Development Minister Clare Scriven requesting fees be waived until licence holders can catch fish again after the algal bloom disperses.

Minister Scriven said the SA Government was working with the MFA and the SA Professional Fishers Association to determine which licence holders had been impacted by the algal bloom, the extent of the impact and the support needed.

"This work is progressing as we speak, and support will be provided as appropriate to those impacted," she said.

Support measures already available for affected fishing and

aquaculture licence holders include a rural support grant of up to \$1500 for essential household expenses, Rural Business Services financial counselling, and business and wellbeing advice from the Family and Business Support program.

Marine Fishers Association chief executive Pat Tripodi said abalone fishers in the state's southeast have had their licence fees fully waived for 2024-26 after the outbreak of Abalone Viral Ganglioneuritis.

"We view the harmful algal bloom as a similar circumstance, although this is impacting a larger number of fishing licences as well as the aquaculture industry, and is affecting multiple species almost entire ecosystems - not just a single species," he said.

"The harmful algal bloom is absolutely devastating my members.

"It has had a severe and ongoing impact on commercial fishers, particularly those based on Kangaroo Island and Yorke Peninsula, as well as the aquaculture industry."

Mr Tripodi said, for many, the situation was dire — income had dropped to zero over the past two months due to impact of the HAB, with no alternative sources of revenue available.

"What we need is support for the industry that supplies fresh

fish to consumers and a monitoring program to measure the impact of the HAB and a plan for recovery," he said.

"With the few (weather) fronts that have come through over the past month, it has only served to impact more of the state and more fishers.

"I think the government is beginning to wake up to the fact that a stiff breeze isn't going to fix the problem."

Mr Tripodi said the MFA had also asked Minister Scriven to lobby the Australian Government to make fishers eligible for the Farm Household Allowance, a payment available to drought-affected farmers.

Waiver a matter of urgency

PRIMARY industries opposition spokesperson Dr Nicola Centofanti said the government should fully waiver fishing licence and quota fees as a matter of urgency.

"When boats cannot go out and catches cannot be made, it is unjustifiable to expect businesses to pay fees that are normally based on active commercial use," Dr Centofanti said.

"We have grave concerns that, without immediate action to address cost recovery pressures and urgent cash flow support, many licensed fishers may be forced out of the industry permanently."

Dr Centofanti said the situation posed a devastating loss - not only for the families and communities who relied on the industry, but also for the long-term viability of South Australia's commercial fishing sector.

"We have grave concerns that, without immediate action to address cost recovery pressures and urgent cash flow support, many licensed fishers may be forced out of the industry permanently," she said.

"This would be a devastating loss — not just to the families and communities who rely on this industry, but to the future capacity of SA's commercial fishing sector.

We urge the state government to act swiftly and in partnership with the federal government to ensure this industry survives the current crisis and is positioned to recover when environmental conditions allow."

Dr Centofanti said fishing households should be eligible for the Farm Household Allowance and called for additional support measures - including low or no-interest loans - to be extended to businesses reliant on the state's billion-dollar seafood industry.



Empty tubs, – uncertain future

STANSBURY commercial fisher Paul Germein, 66, says he is being forced to live off his retirement savings since the algal bloom started killing off marine life in Gulf St Vincent.

He has not caught any fish for seven weeks and is facing fees of \$10,000 for 2025-26.

"There is no fish here and the water is still green," Mr Germein said.

"If the fish come back and we start catching fish again I'm quite prepared to start to pay it but if the fish don't come back, I don't want to pay it at all."

Mr Germein said it was difficult to make decisions about his future because the ongoing impact of the algal bloom was unknown.

"All the farmers need is rain and it (their production) will come back, but us as primary producers from the sea, we just don't know," he said.

"There are species in the water that may never, ever re-grow."

Yorketown fisher Shane Bishop is facing fees of over \$20,000 and has not been able to land a decent catch for more than two months.

He said the bloom had initially affected Gulf St Vincent but was now spreading to Spencer Gulf.

"We're still catching a few whiting in Spencer Gulf, but the squid are gone completely — you can't even catch one for bait," he said.

Mr Bishop said a fee waiver would provide financial relief to fishers and support the recovery of the marine environment following the devastation caused by the algal bloom.

"I think we need to be given the opportunity to put our licences on the shelf," he said.

"The stocks are under extreme duress — we shouldn't be out there even trying to catch them."

Mr Bishop said commercial and recreational fishing should be shut down in all areas affected by the algal boom to help fish stocks recover.

Algae indicators up around YP

SATELLITE imagery shows levels of chlorophyll a, an indicator of algae concentrations, have increased across most of Gulf St Vincent and along Yorke Peninsula's western coast. That was among the news

presented to an algal bloom meeting held in Adelaide on July 4 to update fishing, tourism and local council representatives about the crisis.

Deputy Premier, and Climate, Environment and Water Minister Susan Close said elevated chlorophyll a levels had been recorded across Gulf St Vincent, at Troubridge Point south of Edithburgh, and the area from Coobowie to Port Wakefield, as well as in Spencer Gulf between Hardwicke Bay and Wallaroo.

Other areas with elevated levels included West Lakes, Port Lincoln to Arno Bay, and along the Limestone Coast from Meningie to Robe.

"Latest statewide observations show sea surface temperatures have continued to decrease in shallow coastal and gulf waters," she said.

"However, deeper continental shelf waters, including around Kangaroo Island and southern Yorke Peninsula, continue to experience moderate to strong marine heatwave conditions of one to two degrees Celsius above average."

Minister Close said government agencies were taking weekly water samples at 14 sites across West Lakes, the Port River and from the end of four jetties at Largs Bay, Grange, Glenelg and Port Noarlunga.

Preliminary water samples from West Lakes had confirmed the presence of Karenia mikimotoi, the species of algae first detected on Fleurieu Peninsula in March.

"Test results indicate that Karenia has been found in low numbers near the West Lakes inlet but has not been detected at the three other testing sites within West Lakes," she said.

West Lakes," she said. "There have been multiple reports of fish deaths along the metropolitan coastline — North Haven between the river mouth and marina breakwater, Tennyson Beach, north of Grange jetty and south of Christies Beach Surf Life Saving Club — and Port Broughton after the June 24 storm.

"Testing of water in the Coorong North Lagoon has confirmed the presence of Karenia between Seven Mile Basin and Long Point.


"Experts believe the algae flowed through the Murray Mouth and into the lagoon during a strong cold front, including a storm on May 26 and high tide on May 27.

"The algal bloom is a dynamic situation.

"Its movement depends on weather and water conditions, and therefore makes the effect on people and wildlife unpredictable."

The meeting also addressed future research priorities associated with the bloom to better

understand how to mitigate future outbreaks.

Minister Close said the South Australian Government was working on a recovery plan for coastal environments which would be put into action when the toxic algal bloom receded.

State Cabinet would be briefed about the bloom and

the recovery plan this week and funding assistance could be sought from the Australian Government, she said.

A working group of SA Government agencies had been meeting weekly for several months to monitor the bloom and begin preparations to assist recovery, Minister Close said.

Driving change across Mid North

MINLATON-based not-for-profit organisation Care in Motion will take over the delivery of community transport services across the Mid Northern region, following a competitive state contract tender process.

The organisation, well regarded for its community transport work across regional South Australia, will replace four local councils -Clare and Gilbert Valleys, Goyder, Wakefield, and Adelaide Plains - as the new operator of the Mid North Community Passenger Network.

The transition is occurring in two stages, with services for residents aged over 65 having commenced on July 1 and services for those under 65 scheduled to begin on September 1.

"Care in Motion is honoured to take on the responsibility of continuing this essential service, ensuring its ongoing availability to those who rely on it," chief executive David McDonald said.

The change marks a significant milestone for the MNCPN, which has been hosted at the Clare and Gilbert Valleys Council for more than 20 years.

Council staff and volunteers have long played a key role in providing accessible, reliable transport for residents throughout the region.

To ensure continuity for clients, Care in Motion will lease the existing fleet of vehicles from Clare and

Gilbert Valleys Council and retain many of the dedicated volunteers who have supported the service.

Council staff member Lol Hill will oversee services for clients under 65 during the interim period.

Clare and Gilbert Valleys mayor Allan Aughey OAM said the shift to a new provider reflected a commitment to long-term sustainability and improved services.

"We're incredibly proud of the role we've played in supporting this vital service," Mr Aughey said.

"The decision to transition the service has been made with the community's best interests in mind.

'We're confident the region will benefit from the expanded expertise and renewed energy that Care in Motion brings."

Care in Motion currently operates the Northern Passenger Transport Network and recently expanded its services into the Mid North.

The organisation's selection aligns with the South Australian Government's broader restructure of community transport programs.

Clare and Gilbert Valleys Council expressed its gratitude to the staff, volunteers and community members who have supported the MNCPN over the years and confirmed it would work closely with Care in Motion to ensure a smooth transition.

Smooth transition to Care in Motion

CHIEF executive David McDonald says the expansion to the Clare and Gilbert Valleys, Adelaide Plains, Goyder and the Wakefield region reflects Care in Motion's strategic and sustainable approach to growth over the past five years

Alongside its core community transport services, Care in Motion also delivers programs such as the Aged Care Volunteer Visitors Scheme.


These services, Mr McDonald said, were central to the organisation's continued success.

Heroes for Heartkids

DRAKES employees in Ardrossan and Moonta dressed as superheroes last month to raise money for HeartKids Australia.

Among them were the Litchfield family, who have taken part in the annual HeartKids fundraiser for the past four years.

Lauren and Jake Litchfield attended the Ardrossan store with their daughters, Eleanor and Madeline.

Madeline, 3, is a HeartKid and was born with transposition of the great arteries and a ventricular septal defect.

Ms Litchfield said she learned of Madeline's condition during a routine prenatal scan at Wallaroo Hospital.

"I'd had a 20-week scan at Wallaroo and they found a hole in her heart," Ms Litchfield said.

"Sometimes there's a reason for it, but I know for us, personally, we still don't know - it just happened and that's what the doctor said.

"She is perfectly normal in every other way, that is just how it is which seems incredibly unfair, but you know, we don't get a choice."

She said their family was fortunate in some ways, as their care plan remained consistent throughout.

"We were always going to be induced in Adelaide, we were always going to go to Melbourne, we were always going to have open heart surgery and it was always going to happen within the first few weeks — and that is how it happened," she said.

"There are so many different things that can go wrong or the plans can change. "You never know how the child is

going to be born (or) whether they're strong enough to withstand that."

Ms Litchfield said if she could support even one family through fundraising, it would be worth it.

"That is why we do this, every year,

even if we just get dressed up and have a little fun," she said.

"HeartKids themselves as an organisation are the only one of its kind that helps children - and not just children, but the siblings and the family. "It's bigger than people realise."

Ms Litchfield said, with Madeline approaching her fourth birthday, she did not fully understand why the family was involved with the Heartkids fundraisers every year.

"We still have her check-ups, so she goes every year still for a special visit to the doctor and they do special pictures of her heart," she said.

"She does have a scar, so she's aware of that.

"In terms of HeartKids, she's aware of the logo, aware of what they do and she is aware that we get involved."

Drakes Supermarkets offers a \$2 donation with every purchase during the fundraising period, which goes directly to HeartKids Australia.

Ms Litchfield said Drakes had sup-

ported HeartKids for seven or eight years, with around half a dozen families within the company on Yorke Peninsula affected.

"There's actually quite a few families around that have some involvement in some way and have been impacted in some way," she said.

Although she could not host a large event this year, Ms Litchfield said raising awareness remained vital.

Childhood-onset heart disease affects 250,000 people in Australia, according to HeartKids, a national charity offering lifelong support, resources and advocacy.

'There are some families out there... that have these conditions in their families and they don't even know about HeartKids," Ms Litchfield said.

"Until you talk about it, you don't know how many people around are also affected by it."

Between the Ardrossan and Moonta stores, about \$2000 was raised for Heartkids.





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Regional news is the canary in the coal mine

THIS week, I step up as president of Country Press Australia, ostensibly to represent the best interests of independent regional newspaper publishers.

But the responsibility is far greater than that.

The future of regional news publishing is inextricably linked to whether regional communities will continue to have a say in shaping the future of regional Australia.

In fact, regional newspapers are the metaphorical canary in the coal mine — their health signals the health of the voice of the communities they serve.

And both are under threat.

The toxic combination of ever-expanding corporations and surging city populations dominating our politics is reducing regional communities to branch office status, with their futures determined by powerful elites in our CBDs.

With every small business that's bought out and "rolled up" into a corporate machine — or shut down to make way for a big-box competitor — a local business owner is replaced by a corporate manager.

The profits are siphoned off in the first electronic transfer back to the city, and a small part of the soul of our communities dies.

As our capital cities grow, the weight of our democracy and decision-making drifts further away from the regions — away from where much of our nation's wealth is generated, by the way.

Even local government is losing its voice. Many locally elected councillors now fear speaking out on behalf of their communities, worried they'll be reported by bureaucratic staff to increasingly powerful, city-based governance bodies. When this happens, our democracy is weakened. That's why regional newspapers promote local communities and give those doing the heavy lifting a voice.

We unapologetically champion independent regional businesses — the ones who make, grow, and fix things. The ones who only sell what they believe in and are proud of.

We're also here for the bush cops and single-teacher schools, the nurses and doctors who are always on duty, and the junior sports coaches who drive the bus three hours each way so kids can get a game on the weekend.

We're up for the fight. But it's getting harder.

A decade ago, regional newspapers were thriving. Classifieds, display ads, and community notices funded large local

Regional news publishers are among the last lines of defence against these forces. At our best, we rally and amplify the

collective voice of our communities. We stand up to power and fight for a fair go. There's a saying that the squeaky wheel gets the grease — but in regional Australia, it's mostly the silent, hardworking wheels that keep the whole country moving. newsrooms filled with trained journalists.

But the landscape has changed. When news went online — and we're online too — global tech giants like Facebook quickly came to dominate the advertising market, using their monopolistic power to take an overwhelming share of digital ad revenue. Yet these platforms don't produce news. They don't employ journalists.

And they certainly don't hire anyone in regional communities where they glean enormous profits from the attention of local people while contributing nothing back to local newsrooms or communities.

In fact, they profit from our content, created by local journalists, without paying fairly for it — undermining the very business model that sustains local news.

And big box retail corporations making huge profits from our regional communities are now choosing to advertise with these global tech giants, not with local publishers.

Like frogs in warming water, too many Australians are unaware of the growing danger of letting corporatism control our communities — and the new media platforms and AI systems that (mis)inform them.

My top priority as president of CPA is to fight for the publishers who, in turn, are fighting for their communities.


We'll be wearing out the boot leather lobbying governments to protect our people from exploitation by tech platforms that profit from harmful content and put our children and democracy at risk.

We'll push back against bureaucracy that strips power from local leaders.

We'll shine a light on the creeping reach of corporatism.

We're proud to take on these battles. All we ask in return is that you keep buying your local paper — or subscribe online — and support the local businesses that advertise with us.

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Fabric for art's sake

VIVID abstract patterns created by a Tiddy Widdy artist that look just as good on the wall or clothing are on display in Kadina this month.

Art Attack at Ascot Gallery offers canvases, fabric hangings, garment, cosmetic purses and even a camping chair, all featuring striking patterns created by Wayne Barrie.

Mr Barrie applies acrylic paint to canvases using a variety of techniques, such as throwing the paint or using a substrate of oil.

He feeds photographs of the initial images into a digital program which creates the pattern templates that are provided to a company in Sydney for printing onto fabric.

"The computer can't duplicate what I do on the canvas — I'm only using the computer to finish it off," he said.

"It's very much an individualised and personalised style."

Mr Barrie started to dabble in art during the Covid lockdowns.

"I can't do portraits, landscapes or still lifes, as I haven't got the patience for the detail, and I'm terrible at formal abstracts.

"But colour, shape and movement are exciting so I go down this informal abstract path and it's much more fun and people like it."

The free Art Attack exhibition is on display at the Ascot Gallery, Kadina from 10am to 3.30pm weekdays throughout July.

Open for field days business

LONG-AWAITED new office facilities for Yorke Peninsula Field Days were officially opened last week at an event attended by about 100 representatives of sponsors, field days life members and volunteers.

The new complex at the Paskeville site replaces the temporary office used by committee members and staff since the permanent building was destroyed by arson in 2019, causing \$150,000 in damage.

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis cut the ribbon at the opening on Wednesday, July 2.

"It has been a real triumph of perseverance for the YPFD committee and all the Agricultural Bureaus that support them to get this (office) in place," Mr Ellis said.

"It is a truly special thing to drive past and see it take pride of place at the site."


He said the biennial field days event delivered significant economic benefits to Yorke Peninsula and it held a special place in the region's social calendar.

Prominently located at the YPFD site, the new complex fronts Copper Coast Highway and includes an office, boardroom and separate toilets.

Constructed from corrugated metal silos, the building design reflects the importance and success of the grain industry on Yorke Peninsula.

Built for \$672,000, the office is the first stage of a major expansion project at the site.

Support for the project included a \$20,000 donation from Australian Grain Technologies in 2022, along with contributions from numerous businesses and local farmers through a sponsorship program launched earlier this year.

Sponsorship levels ranged from \$1000 to \$10,000.

Stage two of the project begins this month after the recent announcement of a \$400,000 Enabling Infrastructure Program grant from the South Australian Government. Plans for the second stage include a function centre, commercial kitchen, covered walkway and enclosed courtyard, all connected to the new office via a hallway.

Estimated to cost about \$680,000, it will match the first

stage in design, using the same silo structures from SA company Ahrens.

Construction is expected to be completed in time for this year's event, scheduled for Tuesday, September 29, to Thursday, October 1, although internal fitouts may not be finished.

Yorke Peninsula Country Times managing director Michael Ellis said he was pleased the company had been selected as the major sponsor for the 2025 event.

"Our involvement is recog-

nition of the pre-eminence of farming for our region's economy, and the broad appeal of the field days to locals and visitors alike," he said.

"We are very proud to sponsor our fourth consecutive YP Field Days event."

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
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


the Roberts family. Both Jeff and Val expressed their gratitude, touched by the band's gesture and the joy it brought.

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

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


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

Lincoln Bruhn celebrates 350 games as club mascot

In local communities, sporting clubs are often the heartbeat of the town. And within every sporting club, there's usually someone who embodies that spirit. At the Moonta Football Club, that person is Lincoln Bruhn.

Living in Minlaton, Lincoln reached an incredible milestone in round 11 - his 350th game as a club mascot - leading the Moonta Demons out against Ardrossan at home. And round 12 made it 351 at Kadina on July 5.

But his journey didn't begin at Moonta.

"I started at CMS Crows, where my brother Henry played," Lincoln said.

"Michael Cook came to me about the idea of becoming the mascot back in 2007.

"I thought he was joking at first, but he was serious."

Bruhn also had a long stint with the Banks Bulldogs in the Northern Territory, spending more than a decade leading the team out each week.

"I have also had some one-off appearances for a few teams," he said.

"In 2012, I did a game for the NT Thunder, which Brad Vassell organised.

"I ran out for Woodville-West Torrens, organised by Matt Goldsworthy and my brother, Henry, and during COVID I ran out for Plympton in Adelaide, which was the semifinal."

Due to medical conditions, Lincoln isn't able to play football, but said being involved in a footy club was the next best thing.

Ricki Bruhn, Lincoln's dad, said his son had always inspired every team he had been part of. "His medical background

every team he had been part of. "His medical background doesn't allow him to play football." Ricki said.

"He had a brain tumour at 14 months and required surgery. "During the operation, he experienced a stroke and now has paralysis on one side of his body and can't see out of one eye. geries to make sure everything is going smoothly."

But that hasn't stopped Lincoln from living his passion. "I actually ran out in a grand final in the Northern Territory

final in the Northern Territory after surgery one year, which I probably shouldn't have done, but it was impossible to stop me," Lincoln said.

"It is the highlight of my week, every single week."

Along the way, Lincoln has met some incredible people including a few big names in the AFL world.

"In 2012, I was granted a Make-A-Wish and met my hero growing up, Shane Crawford.

"I got to be involved with the Sunday Footy Show and attend a Hawks game in Melbourne, an amazing experience."

To give back, he organised a local 'Slowdown' match between the older players of the CMS Crows and Southern Eagles, raising more than \$2000 for the Make-A-Wish Foundation.

In 2006, Lincoln met one of his best mates — former Crow and Swan Ryan 'Fitzy' Fitzgerald.

"He has been a great person to have around. He always makes time for me and we have a great friendship," Lincoln said. "When I was in Melbourne for my Make-A-Wish, Fitzy heard about it and invited me to the Before the Game TV show." Six months ago, Fitzy was MC at Bruhn's 30th birthday in Adelaide.

YPFL rule interpretations spark debate

Yorke Peninsula Football League round 11 A grade matches, played on Saturday, June marked by large winning 28 mere margins in three of the four. The exception was a thrilling contest between Paskeville and Kadina at Paskeville — one of the games of the season. The match delivered a dramatic final quarter, featuring multiple lead changes, clutch goals and high-pressure moments — the stuff footy is built on. For most, it was a fantastic game with a fittingly close finish. But, for some, umpiring decisions perceived as incorrect cast a shadow over the result. One key moment came when the officiating umpire noted that Paskeville had not set up in the 6-6-6 formation required for centre bounces at the start of each

quarter and after a goal is scored. In the AFL, a warning is usually given before a free kick is awarded for repeat offences, the

backwards across the boundary line, leaving the crowd perplexed. The YPFL does apply the st-touch rule — a free

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YPFL has taken a different approach this season.

"We as a league believed the rule had been in place long enough to the point we no longer need a warning," YPFL umpire co-ordinator Rob Rankine said.

"We figured, we don't give out warnings for high tackles or pushes in the back, so why the 6-6-6 rule?

"It can also be used as a tactic to slow the game down, which is another reason we decided to scrap it."

Another incident that drew attention was a deliberate out-ofbounds call — later overturned by another umpire — after a player was tackled and stepped

awarded when the ball crosses the boundary after a kick or handball. However, in this case, the ball was neither kicked nor handballed, causing confusion.

A third correct decision that baffled the crowd occurred during a kick-in when an umpire observed a team's runner inside the 50 metre arc, which is a rule breach.

A free kick was awarded to the opposing team.

The penalty depends on which team commits the offence. If it is the team kicking in, the penalty is harsher, such as a 25m penalty. If it is the defending team, a free kick is awarded instead.

Cougars had a big win over Ardrossan. They're another tough team to read, with injuries and regulars in and out.


The ladder says they're fifth, but with a draw and a bye, they're still a genuine top three threat.







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Harvest hanging on more rain

SOUTH Australian farmers are estimated have sown 3.9 million hectares to grain crops for the 2025-26 harvest — in line with the 10-year average despite extended dry conditions across the state.

The latest Crop and Pasture Report, released by Primary Industries and Regions SA on July 2, forecasts a potential harvest of 8.2 million tonnes, based on the assumption that yields will be close to the 10-year average.

The report says yield outcomes will depend on rainfall during the growing season, the severity of weather events such as heat shocks or frost, and the timing of crop germination and establishment.

It highlights that limited stored soil moisture will make winter rainfall critical to this year's harvest.

"This preliminary estimate of cropped area for this growing season is higher than the previous season based on the assumption that less crop will be cut for hay but if dry conditions persist the total crop may reduce significantly from this initial estimate," the report says.

"Concerns over late season opening rains and carryover of residues of some herbicides is likely to result in less canola, beans, chickpeas and durum being sown, leading to increased areas for wheat and barley.

"Lentils are also forecast to increase by an additional five per cent across the state."

The report also notes that minimal stubble and no pasture growth during autumn have left livestock in below-average condition, prompting producers to provide supplementary feeding and begin destocking to protect animal health and soil condition.

The report says Bureau of Meteorology modelling indicates the El Nino-Southern Oscillation is currently neutral and is likely to remain so until at least November.

"The current forecast outlook is for average winter conditions, with no strong signals for either significantly wetter or drier weather," the report says. BOM data shows that all districts on Yorke Peninsula recorded either the lowest rainfall on record or rainfall very much below average for the 12 months from May 1, 2024, to April 30, 2025.

Primary Industries and Regional Development Minister Clare Scriven said recent rainfall in some areas had provided optimism, but the outlook remained uncertain for many producers.

"I continue to listen to farmers across the state about the current situation and closely monitor the rollout of support and ongoing seasonal conditions," she said.

Grain Producers SA chief executive Brad Perry echoed the uncertainty, saying it was too early to offer accurate predictions.

"Although recent rainfall has been enough to trigger the start of the season in parts of SA, albeit very late, the drought is by no means over," he said.

"Following one of SA's driest growing seasons on record in 2024, grain producers still require significant rainfall to replenish soil moisture and support strong crop germination in 2025."

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GPSA needs help to update grain industry blueprint

GRAIN producers are being invited to have their say on an updated blueprint that will help shape the industry through to 2035.

Grain Producers South Australia has released a draft of the updated South Australian Grain Industry Blueprint 2025-2035 for public consultation.

GPSA chief executive Brad Perry said the revised document built on the original strategy released in 2020, which helped guide coordinated growth across the value chain.

"With the sector surpassing its original target of \$6 billion gross food revenue years ahead of schedule, the refreshed blueprint aims to cement SA as a national leader in fostering a trusted, sustainable and highly productive grain industry," he said.

Developed by consultant Hudson-Howells with input from growers, researchers, exporters and supply chain partners, the draft now needs broader industry feedback to help shape the final version.

"This draft has been built through wide-rang-

ing consultation and now it's over to grain producers and industry stakeholders to provide input that will ensure it's practical, relevant and forward-looking," Mr Perry said.

"The blueprint draft is just the starting point. "We're now inviting all voices across the industry to help us finalise a blueprint that truly

reflects where industry needs to head for the next decade. "The blueprint sets out clear strategic priorities around production sustainability, market alignment and innovation adoption — all

ket alignment and innovation adoption — all grounded in real-world conditions faced by SA grain producers." The updated blueprint focuses on three stra-

tegic pillars: secure and sustainable production systems; trusted markets and market alignment; and innovation, adoption and adaptability.

Mr Perry said these pillars were underpinned by a core principle that supported leadership, advocacy and collaboration across the grain value chain. The project was supported with funding from the South Australian Government.

Primary Industries and Regional Development Minister Clare Scriven said the revised blueprint would help the sector navigate emerging challenges, embrace innovation and strengthen South Australia's global reputation for quality and sustainability.

"This draft blueprint reflects the increasing importance of innovation, sustainability, and global competitiveness in the grains sector," she said.

"I commend GPSA for leading this work and welcome the contribution of growers to ensure it delivers practical outcomes on the ground.

"The grains industry is a cornerstone of South Australia's economy and a vital part of our regional communities."



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



Antoinette Lattouf: Journalist

Antoinette Lattouf has been awarded at least \$70,000 after the Federal Court found she was unlawfully terminated by the ABC. The case was brought on after Lattouf was taken off air in December 2023 following her sharing of a Human Rights Watch post about the war in Gaza. The judge found the ABC's decision to fire Lattouf was made to appease pro-Israel lobbyists.

Mushroom murder: Victorian woman Erin Patterson has been found guilty of three counts of murder and one count of attempted murder. She had pleaded not guilty to killing three relatives by serving them beef Wellingtons containing death cap mushrooms in July 2023. Her parents-in-law and mother-in-law's sister died as a result.

Celebrity death: Australian TV chef Peter Russell-Clarke has died aged 89 after complications from a stroke. He was the host of 1980s cooking show Come and Get It, and authored almost 40 recipe books.

July 8, 1963: Margaret Court became the first Australian woman to win the Women's Singles tennis championship at Wimbledon.




But, I will say, I don't know if his costume was beastly enough.



Stenhouse Bay/Marion Bay: A few fat tommy ruff (Australian herring) came from the SB jetty on Saturday and Sunday evening in the cool but relatively calm conditions. Crews in big boat are targeting tuna, red nannygai and kingfish well offshore. There are reports of mullet at several local beaches.

Edithburgh/Stansbury/Black Point/

Ardrossan: I received correspondence and calls from YPCT readers and ABC Radio listeners during the week about the damage from the algal bloom. The lack of any positive action from the authorities and/or SA Government is shameful. Despite what we are told, there are solutions both from Australia and overseas. There are a few mullet along local shorelines where the pollution is less and scattered whiting in the deeper water where strong tides have moved some of the contamination away. We, as citizens and taxpayers of The Leg, deserve way better.
