

Outage outrage

SOUTHERN Yorke Peninsula residents are concerned about their phone coverage after being hit with a 12-day outage.

Angela Schmidt, who operates Charles Street Hair and Beauty, Yorketown, was without phone reception from Saturday, June 10 until Wednesday, June 21. The unplanned outage, which lasted the first six days, preceded a planned outage to upgrade the local 4G system for the next five days, as Telstra looks to phase out the 3G system.

"All the businesses around here were affected and contacted Telstra but would just be given the run around," she said.

"They couldn't tell us when our services would be re-established; they

were just hard to deal with."

As a result, Ms Schmidt was unable to contact clients to remind them of their appointments or accept payments via EFTPOS.

Ms Schmidt said the problem caused great confusion and frustration.

"My booking system is through an app on my iPad but I couldn't get into that, so I had no idea who was coming and going, hoping my clients would turn up," she said.

"They couldn't ring us because they had no phone signal to say they were cancelling so last week was just a nightmare."

She said she had made three attempts to gain further information from Telstra, as well as from federal Member for Grey Rowan Ramsey's office.

"I'd just get the run around from Telstra each time; 'we're sorry for the inconvenience this has caused, we understand'," she said. "The ordeal meant I lost revenue and, while I was told I would be compensated for the days it occurred, that's not really enough because it has more of a lasting effect than that."

Telstra regional general manager for South Australia Michael Patterson acknowledged the issue and said fixed line services, NBN internet connectivity and calls to 000 weren't impacted by the outage.

Closing roads?

CAN we still go fishing after Wednesday's council meeting?

Yorke Peninsula Council's elected members will decide the fate of 34 public roads on Wednesday, June 28.

As this decision could mean 34 public roads are closed to the public for the next five years, council completed a public consultation which ended on June 6.

Information provided by council during the public consultation was inadequate as the location of the roads could not be identified by the community.

In response to several requests put forward to council's administration, council was unable to provide more detailed information, like Google Maps or maps out of council's record

During the consultation process, the public was not able to determine if any of these 34 public road closures for five years will affect their daily lives.

The community is left in the dark if from Wednesday onward locked gates across public tracks could prevent access to fishing spots or other favourite places.

The community will not be opposed to the issuing of permits for public roads that have been planned in the past but never been built and that are used for cropping.

However, the community has the right of unrestricted access to public roads and tracks that are already there.

Still the agenda for Wednesday's meeting is recommending the authorisation of permits that will exclude the public from the use of 34 public roads for five years.

Wednesday night will show if the majority of elected members care for the interests of the wider community.

Locals lament lost connection

TELSTRA had scheduled a 4G upgrade to its Yorketown base station in the second half of June.

"We had planned to send out a text message notification to residents of this work on June 11," regional general manager for South Australia Michael Patterson said.

"Unfortunately, the day before we suffered an unrelated transmission issue, meaning the site couldn't connect to the broader Telstra network and went off air, meaning calls could not connect and messages could not be sent.

"Our techs combined the repair to the transmission issue and the upgrade into one activity and full services were restored on Wednesday, June 21.

"While Telstra worked to get the work done as quickly as we could, we know this extended outage had an impact on the community and for that we are sorry."

Member for Grey Rowan Ramsey said the outage was a complicated problem.

"Modern technology is a complicated thing, and everything breaks down at some point... these things do happen," he said.

"Most businesses should have alternative communication lines and the mobile phone being out doesn't take the landline or internet service out usually.

"We (electorate of Grey) got two towers from the last round of the Mobile Black Spot Program, which went almost exclusively to Labor electorates around Australia.

"There's another round open at the moment, round seven, and there's the Regional Connectivity Program as well which keeps allowing people to follow up and put better technology in place."

Rates honeymoon to attract young families to the region

FIRST home buyers will be offered a honeymoon deal on their rates in the Barunga West Council region, in a move aimed at attracting more young families to the

Council voted to offer first home buyers a \$500 rebate on their first two years of rates during a special meeting on Monday, June 19.

Councillor Rowlands proposed the motion and said it followed the state government's decision to scrap stamp duty for first home buyers purchasing new homes up to \$650,000 or vacant land up to \$400,000.

He said this would save first home buyers between \$18,000 and \$30,000 in stamp duty.

"This council has strongly advocated for the total removal of stamp duty as an incentive to encourage housing development and to make the purchasing of homes and land more affordable, particularly for first home buyers," he said.

Mr Rowlands said up to 300 new affordable housing blocks in the region would go on the market in the next few years and a rates rebate would act as an extra attraction for young people.

"Last year, this council

achieved a dramatic 2.5 per cent growth in new ratepayers and, based on our longterm financial plan, we are expecting growth of at least two per cent a year," Mr Rowlands said.

"If half of this growth is first home buyers, we could be looking at 30 properties a year, which, at a rebate of \$500, would amount to \$15,000 in rates rebated.

That amount is insignificant compared to the commercial and social benefits gained of having 30 young families move into the district to live, work and play."

Council chief executive Maree Wauchope said the rebate was unlikely to have an impact on council's rate revenue until the 2023-24 financial year, as most would apply to new homes to be built.

She said the influx of 69 new ratepayers in the 2022-23 financial year validated the council's growth strategy.

"The council is confident this growth trajectory will continue, with new subdivisions planned for Port Broughton, Bute, Tickera, and Fisherman Bay," she said.

She said council had received proposals for developments which could provide an additional 100 blocks of vacant land within the next year and the growth would help reduce financial pressure on ratepayers.



PORT Broughton Realty director Bonnie Stringer said the rates rebate on offer from Barunga West Council will add to the region's appeal for first home buyers.

"Anything that can help with finances is fantastic because everything has gotten so expensive," she said. "Rates and insurance are among the biggest bills you pay each year, after your mortgage, so every little

Mrs Stringer said her office had already received


enquiries about the rebate since it was voted on last week. She said the demographics of Port Broughton had changed since she started in the business 14 years ago.

"Before, it was just farmers retiring here — now it's a lifestyle choice. People see Port Broughton as a safe, relaxed environment for young families, older families and retirees," she said.


"Demand was crazy through Covid and we are certainly not slowing down."

MOONTA'S streets will feature two new pedestrian crossings if the next stage of the Moonta Urban Design Framework is approved.

The flat crossings would be established on George Street, between Podiatry Central and Stylish Bird Boutique, and Ellen Street, from the commercial carpark.

Planned works also include upgrading footpaths and kerbing on Robert Street, as well as the installa-

tion of an electric barbecue, additional seating, shelters and bins in Queen Square.

Copper Coast Council will investigate potential off-street parking on William, Robert and Henry Streets around Queen Square, with consideration for angle parking on Henry Street

Director infrastructure services Tim Neumann said council decided on central crossings rather than one at each intersection, like Kadina.

"Having only two crossings should be less restrictive on traffic,

but make the town more pedestrian friendly with equal access from both ends of the streets," Mr Neumann said.

"Council will be formulating a carpark design around Queen Square which will then allow us to progress footpaths, kerb and channelling on Robert Street.

"We're now deciding where to install the seating, bins and barbecue, and also considering umbrella shade on the civic corner of Queen Square (the corner of Henry and George Streets)." Moonta and District Progress Association president Matthew Stock said the projects completed so far had helped improve the whole precinct.

"The pedestrian crossing outside Drakes Moonta (on George Street) has worked well, so I'm sure the next two will be similar," Mr Stock said.

"I looking forward to seeing these projects rolled out to continue enhancing the town."

All upgrades are set to be funded through council's capital works program.

Projects completed through the Moonta Urban Design Framework so far:

- Left in, left out intersection at Drakes Moonta
- Pedestrian crossing on George Street
- Upgrade of Ellen Street carparkNew toilet facilities and access paths
- at Queen SquareGeorge Street stormwater drainage

Gov initiatives to reduce **Aboriginal incarceration**

THE state government is allocating \$25 million over four years to reduce Aboriginal incarceration rates.

Funding will be allocated to a range of programs to assist incarcerated Aboriginal people to apply for bail and address their treatment needs, give access to supported housing and rehabilitation, and provide intensive drug and alcohol treatment.

The investment will also develop an Aboriginal Justice Agreement between the state government and Aboriginal communities, continue the child diversion program which diverts Aboriginal children aged 10 to 13 who have been charged with a minor offence, and a Youth Aboriginal Community Court, Adelaide, which aims to disrupt escalation points in a young person's offend-

In South Australia, Aboriginal people are 12 times more likely to be imprisoned than the general population and over 60 per cent of Aboriginal prisoners are on remand.

This package has aimed to respond directly to recommendations made by the Advisory Commission into the Incarceration Rates of Aboriginal Peoples in South Australia.

Commission members highlighted justice agreements as an important mechanism to reduce incarceration rates and deliver improved outcomes.

Minister for Aboriginal Affairs Kyam Maher said the rates at which Aboriginal people were being imprisoned was unacceptable.

"This needs to be addressed urgently," Mr Maher

"Providing a significant investment and concentrated effort will work to achieve the transformative change that is required."

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Council fixes road flooding issues

THREE Copper Coast roads susceptible to excessive flooding have been fixed.

Two new side entry pits have been installed on Haven Road, Moonta Bay, while infiltration pits on Wandana and Spencer Streets, North Beach, will ensure decreased pooling at the streets' low sections.

Copper Coast Council director infrastructure services Tim Neumann said existing stormwater infrastructure in the area was undersized, causing flooding.

"Larger pits and pipes have

been installed to allow for better water flows," Mr Neumann said.

"New junction boxes have also been put in place to allow for future upgrades in the area.

"Now that we've upgraded the stormwater system on Bay Road, we can tie these side roads in (to the central system).

"It also means we can formalise the kerbing and paths and potentially seal these side roads.

"This gives ratepayers an improved kerb-to-kerb product which is what they should

Mr Neumann said the infiltra-

tion pits on Wandana and Spencer Streets had been installed to collect and manage stormwater.

"The pits will allow water to flow away from the surface of the road," he said.

"Storm sacks have been used to assist in removing debris from the stormwater run-off.

"In the past, there's been nowhere for the water to go and it used to pool on the side of the streets, which led to deterioration of the seal.

"With better underground water storage, the water will soak into the ground instead."

Riding for the Disabled program enters recess

RIDING for the Disabled's Yorke Peninsula centre has entered recess after calls to find a qualified coach to deliver the program were unsuccessful.

The program, which has been operating on the Copper Coast for more than 18 years, has been wholly operated by volunteers.

RDA state president Linda Taylor said the organisation had faced challenges surrounding the recruitment and retention of volunteers in an environment where individuals are balancing the time they can offer with the need for paid employment.

"The role of an RDA coach in particular brings with it a

higher level of training, compliance and responsibility and can take a significant amount of time for full coach certification to be achieved," Ms Taylor said.

This time is taken to ensure skill set alongside the ability to deliver high quality, safe riding programs for people with disability are consistently achieved.

"At the present time we do not have a qualified coach who can consistently deliver our program on Yorke Peninsula.

"Thank you to the previous YP centre coaches who are no longer available to regularly and consistently contribute the same level of time they have so generously given in the past."

Ms Taylor said the organisation was working through a process to resource the centre

"Whilst this process is worked through, the beloved equine team from Yorke Peninsula has been relocated to other centres within the state so they can continue being ridden by people with disability and maintain their accreditation as RDA program horses," Ms Taylor said.

"We emphasise this is a recess of session delivery for the centre, not a closure of the centre, and it is RDASA's intent to continue to service our regional Copper Coast community.

"While sessions are not offered on Yorke Peninsula in the short term, other options to access our programs may be available through our centres at Port Pirie and Northern Area (Globe Derby)."

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Pelvic Pain Clinic brings relief for local women and girls

WOMEN and girls on Yorke Peninsula are signing up for the region's Pelvic Pain Clinic, with 30 patients already enrolled since it started offering services on June 7.

The clinic provides multidisciplinary care for sufferers of period pain, endometriosis and chronic pelvic pain and is led by Kadina Medical Associates' GP and obstetrician Dr Anna Kearney.

It is the only clinic of its kind in South Australia and will receive more than \$700,000 in federal government funding over four years.

"The positive response from patients and practitioners alike has been overwhelming," Dr Kearney said.

"Pre-existing clients who have completed our pelvic pain management techniques reported a reduction in pain scores and improved quality of life.

"Whilst we are cognisant a perfect, pain-free outcome is not always attainable, we are honest and realistic in goal setting with our patients and value their personal pelvic pain journey.

"The historical societal norm that women should have to suffer in silence needs to change.

"In particular, this should be reinforced to women earlier in their menstrual life.

"At the Yorke Peninsula Pelvic Pain Clinic, we will continue to educate health professionals and community members alike.

"We are keen to supplement local knowledge and engage local GPs to make use of the services available."

Endometriosis affects at least one in nine Australians assigned female at birth and sufferers wait an average of seven years before diagnosis.

The aim of the clinics is to reduce diagnostic delays and promote early access to multidisciplinary care and treatment with care provided by special interest GPs, pelvic floor physiotherapist Carlin Macro and a dietician at various centres on YP.

The funding fully subsidises clinic appointments, including allied health visits.

Ms Macro said many women and girls did not realise exercises and brain training could help them to manage their pain so they could go about their lives as normal.

"They have had pain since they first got their periods, so they are in a chronic pain state," she said.

To help promote its services, the YP Pelvic Pain Clinic will have a display at the YP Field Days, Paskeville, on September 26 to 28.

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Potential reforms for food provision

ALL local hotels could soon be forced to serve meals, pending a review into the Liquor Licensing

Moonta Hotel has been the only licensed venue serving regular meals since the Black Rhino Group purchased all three hotels in Moonta last year.

Consumer Affairs and Liquor and Gambling Commissioner Dini Soulio said the holders of a general and hotel liquor licence were not currently required to serve meals as a condition of their licence.

"A number of amendments to the Liquor Licensing Act are currently being considered and this will be one area that will be reviewed," Mr Soulio said.

Copper Coast Council CEO Russell Peate has sent multiple emails to the Black Rhino Group since December 2022 enquiring about the lack of food provision, but is yet to receive a response.

"Council has been diligent in obtaining information regarding the conditions of (the group's) licensing," Mr Peate said.

"We will be liaising with the necessary parties to get a legislative reform in place as quickly as

Councillor Brent Walker said it was incredibly disappointing the group hadn't corresponded appropriately with council.

"This is a town that's been crowned SA Top Tourism Town (2021) and they (Black Rhino Group) can't even take the time to explain why they aren't serving meals," Mr Walker said.

'The town spirit has just not been the same since they took over.

"I hope this reform is pushed through as quickly as possible."

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said the lack of meal service was an issue that needed addressing.

"To have such a large, prominent tourism town with limited food options is unacceptable," Mr Ellis said.

"I'll be intrigued to see what the (Liquor Licensing Act) review recommends and I'll be open to exploring any avenues worthwhile."

YORKE Peninsula shivered through a record-breaking cold snap last week.

Temperatures plummeted to belowaverage right across Australia including YP last Wednesday and Thursday (June 21-22) when heavy rain and strong winds developed.

Despite the wintry weather, the Bureau of Meteorology is still predicting a warmer-than-average winter with the chill set to lift due to an El Nino event.

During El Nino, there is a higher chance of drier weather in eastern Australia and it is more likely to be warmer than usual for the southern twothirds of Australia.

Weatherzone senior meteorologist Brett Dutschke said Thursday (June 22) was the coldest June day in 11 years at Edithburgh, which reached a top of 11.5 degrees, as did Warooka.

"Wednesday and Thursday were the coldest pair of days in 18 years in Maitland (10.2 degrees maximum and 10.6 degrees) maximum respectively," Mr Dutschke said.

"They were also the coldest in 16 years for Edithburgh (12.3 and 11.5), eight years in Kadina (11.5 and 12.9) and two years in other centres."

Mr Dutschke said they were also the

coldest pair of June days in 34 years in Maitland and Warooka, with respective maximums of 10.2 degrees and 10.6 degrees.

Mr Dutschke said YP had also received record breaking rainfall.

"Wednesday and Thursday were the wettest pair of days in 12 years in Stenhouse Bay (51mm combined)," he said.

"Both days were the wettest for Moonta in 17 months (35mm), Kadina (35mm), Stansbury (55mm), and Yorketown (51mm).

"It was the wettest in 13 months in Minlaton (38mm) and Port Victoria (27mm), 10 months in Port Clinton (28mm), seven months in Edithburgh (40mm) and about five months for most other centres."

Wednesday and Thursday were the wettest pair of June days in 100 years for Stansbury (55mm).

"Yorketown had its wettest pair of June days in 29 years (51mm)," Mr Dutschke said.

"Minlaton (38mm) broke a 21-year record, as did Moonta (35mm) and Wallaroo (38mm) while it had been 10 years in Kadina (35mm), Warooka (44mm) and Paskeville (37mm)."

The rest of the week is forecast to have naximum temperatures in the low teens. mostly sunny, with possible scattered

INCREASED digital literacy training could soon be available on the Copper Coast.

Copper Coast Council is investigating funding opportunities to expand its Digital Literacy Program, which has been operating as a trial from the Copper Coast University Centre, Kadina, since March.

The program has provided faceto-face digital technology support with topics like cyber security, password safety, internet, transferring photos, cloud access, and linking to government services.

Every fortnightly support session has been fully booked since the program launched.

Copper Coast University Centre

campus coordinator Sue Barry said local university students and the wider community had found the program useful.

"The program is designed so people can bring in their device(s) and have Ben from Ben's IT Communications show them how to transfer files, upload photos, access additional storage, make sure passwords are safe, etcetera," she said.

"The support is consumer driven with no agenda — we just help where needed.

"(We're aiming) to bring people together in a social context while supporting people to increase their digital literacy."

Council CEO Russell Peate said additional funding was required to increase the service to three hours every week.

"The (expanded) program will seek funding to establish digital literacy training in all three towns on a flexible basis," Mr Peate said.

"At a recent Council on the Ageing meeting, the number one issue raised at the meeting was digital literacy.

"I believe it is one of the largest issues in Australia and will continue to increase."



BLAYDE Miller has been given a new set of wheels.

The Wallaroo Primary School student received an Invacare Colibri mobility scooter to help manage his neuromuscular condition, Duchenne musclar systrophy, while at school.

The terminal disorder, which causes muscle weakness, fatigue and gross motor delay, often makes Blayde tired when playing outside and transitioning between the yard and the classroom.

It is hoped the scooter will enable Blayde to move around the school more easily, helping to

conserve his energy levels throughout the day and allowing him to remain on site for longer.

The scooter was funded through a Variety SA - the Children's Charity grant program aimed at supporting children who are sick, disadvantaged or living with disability.

"We've already seen the impact the scooter has had for Blayde."

Principal Dominica Thomson said the mobility scooter had already impacted positively on Blayde's ability to get involved with activities and interact with other students.

Narungga update **June 2023**

This week's Estimates questioning and further follow up with Ministers in coming weeks will serve to provide more details about the state budget announcements and how they will impact all who live and work here in Narungga.

Under health, one welcome line in the budget papers was "increased cancer services at Wallaroo Hospital" which was great news I flagged back in February.

This funding means this four-chair chemotherapy unit is to increase its operation from one day to two days a

positives include Other investment in nine new firefighting aircraft from which regions such as ours will benefit, the abolishing of stamp duty for first home buyers purchasing a new home valued up to \$650,000 (this price point being particularly beneficial in regional areas), the establishment of the Office for Regional Housing within Renewal SA and the new Regional Skills Development Fund and the \$2.4 million snapper licence fee relief for fishermen impacted by the ongoing snapper closure.

The \$100.2m over four years for upgrades at government schools and preschools includes allocations to Wallaroo Primary and Moonta Area Schools (more details to come), and I also welcome the energy rebates for lowincome households announced last month.

It was a city-centric budget overall, with little regard for the economic value of our powerhouse agricultural industry, with its harvest farm gate in 2022-23 of \$4.4 billion.

With great frustration, the blow out alone of \$55m for the new \$135m Adelaide Aquatic Centre could have repaired one or two jetties at least, or built amazing swimming facilities in multiple regions, including in the Narungga electorate.

With last month's announced local sporting club funding of \$266,000 and a further \$220,000 for local coastal projects, I was hopeful the good news would continue with further allocations for roads and health in our patch.

Whilst there is not much known yet about what sits under the broad heading of "\$406.2m for regional roads upgrades and maintenance", it does appear road safety initiatives this time around are more about new speed cameras and audio tactile line marking than shoulder repairs or overtaking lanes.

On the topic of security at Wallaroo Hospital, last sitting week in the chamber I questioned when the entrance doors smashed in February would finally be repaired and, pleasingly, these glass panels were replaced the next day.

However, re any additional security measures for staff, we continue to await the outcome of an underway task force review.

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Clements Gap fund open for community projects

COMMUNITY groups in Port Broughton and Mundoora can apply for up to \$10,000 per project through Pacific Blue's 2023 Clements Gap Sustainable Communities Fund.

"Later this year, we'll be engaging with the community on our Clements Gap battery, as we work towards providing more renewable energy and energy security for South Australia."

Mr Capomolla said the battery project was in the planning phase and would support the longevity and sustainability of Clements Gap Wind Farm and associated community benefits, as well as creating jobs and procurement opportunities for the local community.

More bettongs land at Innes

ALMOST 80 endangered brushtailed bettongs were relocated to Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park from Western Australia last Wednesday, June 14.

The marsupials came across the border on seven commercial flights and follow previous retrievals as part of the Marna Banggara project, in a bid to restore local extinct species to Yorke Peninsula.

Representatives from Narungga Nation and a translocation team from Zoos SA, Northern and Yorke Landscape Board, Department for Environment and Water, WWF-Australia and the WA Department of Biodiversity Conservation and Attractions travelled to retrieve 49 male and 24 female bettongs.

It is the fourth and largest group of the marsupials to be released into the national park within three years.

Marna Banggara project manager Max Barr said the bettongs' previous habitat was slightly different

"The brush-tailed bettongs we're releasing... come from an area in south-west Western Australia, the Dryandra woodland area on Noongar Country," he said.

"The journey is multi-faceted, there are lots of people involved and the end result of seeing those animals released out of the bag onto Narungga Country, (makes it) worthwhile to be a part of that journey.

"The bettongs are surviving, they're breeding, they're putting on condition and the monitoring going on about how they're using the environment is really important to illustrate that story.

"It's a new space for them; they have to find shelter and we know the habitat is right for them, so once they settle... we'll go back and monitor them."

Landscape Board, the Australian Government National Landcare Program, the SA Department for Environment and Water, WWF-Australia, and Foundation for National Parks and Wildlife, in partnership with the Narungga Nation Aboriginal Corporation.

The bettongs were given health checks and many were fitted with tracking devices before travelling to Adelaide and YP.

Narungga Elder and park management board member Cyril Kartinyeri said bettongs played an important role in the local ecosystems.

"Same as every other animal, bird or reptile, they've got a purpose and that's to look after country," he said.

"Once you have a healthy country, you'll have a healthy community."

Zoos SA manager of conservation, research and welfare Mark Smith said the process of relocation was rewarding for many reasons.

"It was quite emotional seeing these little animals leaping away into a landscape where they haven't been found for generations," he

"The winter months are an important breeding time for bettongs, so we're excited to see how these new animals engage with the existing population on Yorke Peninsula

SIBLINGS Donna Larcombe and Ben Wilkinson have baked 600 cinnamon scrolls for a cause close to their hearts.

The pair sold packs of four cinna-buns for \$6, and donated \$5 from each packet to Bowel Cancer Australia, raising about \$1000 with the help of additional donations.

Mrs Larcombe, of Kadina, and Mr Wilkinson, Adelaide, were touched by bowel cancer when their father Jamie lost his battle with the disease, aged 55, in May 2019.

"We were originally looking at getting a tattoo (as a) tribute (to) Dad and looked at some (Bowel Cancer Awareness) ribbon designs and so we found out a bit more about Bowel Cancer Australia," the siblings said.

June is Bowel Cancer Awareness Month and Red Apple Day, held last Wednesday, June 21, encourages Australians to support BCA through fundraising initiatives.

Mrs Larcombe, owner of Our Cake Room, Kadina, and Mr Wilkinson, a baker at Bakers Delight, said the special occasion made for an ideal time to put their skills to good work.

'The tragedy of Dad passing really brought us closer together, and this (fundraiser) gave us another chance to bond," they

"Dad had stage 4 bowel cancer when he was diagnosed.

"He was constipated for a few weeks and when he got checked, the doctors said there was nothing wrong and he was just blocked up.

"But after testing, they found a tumour the size of an apple

core and said his life expectancy was five years... which turned out to be 18 months.

"They put a stent in him to open up his bowel and he started chemotherapy, but the stent perforated his bowel and he was given a few days to live."

Mrs Larcombe and Mr Wilkinson stressed the importance of checking for cancer.

"It (bowel cancer) can hit anyone at any time, no matter your age," they said.

"It also pays to get multiple opinions if the first doctor says there's nothing wrong.

"When Dad got constipated, we told him 'we always said you were full of shit, but when he was diagnosed it was a massive shock."

The siblings said they planned to do a larger fundraiser to mark five years since Jamie's passing in 2024.

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Bowel cancer screening rates drop

THE latest National Bowel Cancer Screening Program Report reveals screening participation has continued to linger at about 40 per cent.

The report also found colonoscopy wait times have exceeded the recommended 30 days.

Latest participation rates, recorded in 2020-21, were the same as in 2015-16, despite almost \$20 million invested by the federal government since 2019.

The wait time between a positive screening result and colonoscopy has increased in every state and territory.

Only 15.6 per cent of participants received a colonoscopy within the recommended 30-day timeframe following a positive result.

Bowel Cancer Australia CEO Julien Wiggins said the opportunity for early detection was lost if not promptly followed by a colonoscopy.

"As so few participants are receiving colonoscopies within the clinically

recommended time frame, questions need to be asked "Mr Wiggins added

Medical guidelines acknowledged wait times exceeding 120 days between the first healthcare presentation (for symptoms or a positive screening result) and colonoscopy were associated with poorer clinical outcomes.

"We need to ensure participants are not left waiting for long periods after receiving a positive screening result, not knowing if cancer is present," Mr Wiggins said.

More than 15,600 people are diagnosed with bowel cancer in Australia each year.

One in 10 new bowel cancer cases occur in people under the age of 50, who are currently ineligible to participate in the NBCSP.

Bowel cancer is Australia's second deadliest cancer, claiming more than 5300 lives each year. For more information, go to bowelcanceraustralia.org/screening

Regional Skills Advisory **Committee meets**

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Coobowie home for eastern osprey



COOBOWIE is home to the newest nesting place for native eastern osprey birds.

A new platform and artificial nest, the seventh on Yorke Peninsula, was lifted into place with the assistance of a helicopter on Monday, June 19.

Within hours of the structure being erected, it had already been visited by an eastern osprey pair, who had previously been nesting on a phone tower in Edithburgh.

The initiative is led by the Southern Yorke Peninsula Landcare Group. With the help of local volunteer organisations, the group hopes to provide the species with a safe spaces to raise their young.

Northern Yorke and Landscape Board Djulda-wawa Badja project manager Janet Moore said it had been extraordinary to see the project come to fruition.

"Back in 2014 to 2016, there was no osprey breeding on the mainland of Yorke Peninsula as they had all moved to offshore islands," Ms Moore said.

"The birds were declining in numbers and the reason they weren't having breeding success was because there aren't many suitable places for them to breed.

"When they were attempting to nest on the mainland they were nesting on the ground, making them vulnerable to predators like foxes, or they were nesting on structures like channel markers or

Ms Moore said she hoped the platforms would remove barriers to breeding success and lead to sightings of baby osprey in the future.

This has certainly been the case at some of the other platforms we've put up,"

Community collaboration forefront of nest construction

STUDENTS at Yorketown Area School flew into action to help build artificial nests for the eastern osprey nest project.

Workshops were delivered to more than 30 year 7 students who learned about the best way to support the growth of the osprey population while helping to construct new homes for the birds.

Northern Yorke and Landscape Board Djulda-wawa Badja project manager Janet Moore said the school's involvement came from the proximity of the Yorketown nesting location.

"I knew it was going to be quite a visible nest and thought it would be great to get YAS students

involved," Ms Moore said.

"We wanted to provide a tangible way to connect the school groups with the nests, as they'll grow up in the area, potentially ride past the site and be able to see the nests they helped to construct."

School principal Michael Beelitz said students learned much about sustainability and environmental awareness as part of the sessions.

"While the students engaged in learning and the practical building of nests, they have also been able to track the progress of the nests since," Mr Beelitz said.

"Everyone is excited about the potential of seeing some chicks hatch in the near future."

Now living in Nashville, USA, Kristy and Travis both hail from South Australia and are temporarily back on home soil for a string of country music performances across the nation.


Their Moonta concert is in aid of the Moonta Women's and Children's Hospital Auxiliary, and will start at 2pm on Sunday,



Pets allowed in rentals

RESIDENTIAL tenants will have the right to own a pet under reforms proposed by the state government.

As part of changes to the Residential Tenancies Act, the government will seek to include a presumption a tenant who applies to keep a pet in a rental property cannot have their request unreasonably refused. provided they comply with any reasonable conditions imposed by the landlord.



Reasonable conditions include requiring a pet to be kept outside of the rental property if it is not a type ordinarily kept inside and requiring carpets to be professionally cleaned at the end of the tenancy.

There will also be an option for the tenant to apply to South Australian Civil Administrative Tribunal if they are not satisfied conditions imposed by the landlord are reasonable or if they believe their request for a pet was unreasonably refused.

Current estimates suggest 68 per cent of South Australians have pets, but fewer than 20 per cent of rental properties are advertised as allowing pets.

According to the RSPCA, one in every five animals it receives have been surrendered because their owners are unable to find a rental property that allows pets. Renters must still seek per-

> mission from the landlord to keep a pet and they are liable if the pet causes damage.

"The number of pets being surrendered to us, because of rental stress, has tripled in the past three years," RSPCA chief executive Marcus Gehrig said.

"The impact of surrender of a much-loved family pet is tragic — for the family having to give them up, for the animal who suffers from the separation and anxiety and even for our frontline staff who are daily faced with very distressed humans and animals being separated through no fault of their

"Residential tenancy laws have not kept up in SA in the way they have in other states.

"Victoria, Queensland, the Northern Territory and the Australian Capital Territory have amended their rental regulations to help more pet owning renters find a home.

"In these states, renters must still seek permission from the landlord to have a pet and remain liable if the pet causes damage - but blanket 'no pets' clauses are prohibited."

Plan ahead before getting a pet

SO, you're thinking of getting a pet?

While having an animal as a member of your family can be rewarding, it is also a huge responsibility.

Before you welcome your new family member, the RSPCA Australia recommends you take the time to research the species or breed you are bringing home so you are positive your companion will be appropriate for your lifestyle and you are well prepared.

"Adding a companion animal to your family should never be an impulsive decision," an RSPCA spokesperson said.

"RSPCA shelters receive thousands of unwanted and abandoned animals each year and these may be the result of an ill-considered decision

"Before you make the decision to bring an animal into your family, ask yourself if you are prepared to care for the animal for its whole life, can you afford a pet, do you understand how to care for it, do you have time, is your accommodation suitable and if it will fit into your lifestyle and priorities."

There are many costs involved with having a pet, from vaccination, microchipping and desexing, to

ongoing costs like food, worming, health checks, vet bills, training and toys.

"The costs associated with your companion animal will vary depending on the type of animal and breed you choose," the spokesperson

"Remember, animals can be an expensive addition to the family.

"When you are considering adding a companion animal to your family, it is your responsibility to thoroughly research the basic requirements of your chosen

"You should do this before considering adopting/purchasing your animal and prior to bringing them home so you are well informed about the speciesspecific needs of your companion animal and so you're ready to take good care of them.

"If you are considering adoption, talk to the relevant adoption organisation and ask for information or if you are purchasing from a breeder, ask the breeder for more information such as what health problems the breed can have, breedspecific requirements and how much space and exercise is needed for the breed."

Taheny conquers France, the world

Point Turton's Hugo Taheny has brought home an impressive medal haul after representing Australia at the 2023 Virtus Global Games in Vichy, France.

The first time he has competed overseas, Taheny claimed a gold medal in shot-put and broke his own world record twice, finishing with 11.98 metres.

He also broke his own world record in discus with 32.95m to claim another gold.

The Virtus Global Games is the world's largest elite sports event for athletes with an intellectual impairment.

Taheny took home four gold medals from the Virtus Oceania Asia Games in Brisbane in November, claiming victory in the javelin, shot-put, discus and

three weeks in Europe, first at the games before taking in the sights of France and England.

Louise said first and foremost, she and husband John were in awe of their son's determination in competition.

"I think it was with his third throw (of the shot-put), he broke his world record, so there was great excitement," she said.

"He knew it was a good throw but, because he can't read or write and understand the measurement side of it, he just knew it was good.

"His previous record was about 11.45m and with this throw he got 11.62m and then with his second to last throw, he threw the 11.98m.

"On a high, he then had to race to the next event without any time off in between, also changing outfits to throw

Taheny and his mum Louise spent discus in his suit, similar to that worn by and other parents all come up to me and was brilliant, including a stop at Australia his hero Matt Denny.

"His previous best in discus was 32.93m and, after getting the crowd clapping and then throwing one into the net, he ended up beating his record by 2cm."

Taheny collapsed with heatstroke at the end, but fronted up the following day for the 4x100 relay, competing with two runners and a swimmer, finishing fourth.

Having given his all to that point so far, javelin was his final event, finishing fifth, with a throw of 19.74m.

Taheny was one of 130 athletes representing Australia, with Louise quick to point out how well he flourishes making new friends in that environment.

"Staying with the team and watching how Hugo has blossomed and the way he conducts himself was fantastic," she said.

"I had team doctors, team managers

say 'I've fallen a bit in love with him'.

"He absolutely embraces those opportunities to make friendships with kids from all over the country and they're all so proud of each other."

The travellers were greeted by supporters upon return to Adelaide Airport, and banners at home in Point Turton.

"We are so grateful for the love and support shown by our friends, family and community," Louise said.

"People rallied and put together an amazing raffle to raise the money to send Hugo to France so that was incredible

"Everyone is just always behind him and the comments online prove that; I could spend two days responding to all of those, they're just terrific."

Louise said the remainder of the trip



First ship on the horizon

T-PORTS Wallaroo is on track to ship its first load of grain by late July.

The \$70 million facility received about 100,000 tonnes of grain from 165 growers across Yorke Peninsula and the Mid North in the 2022-23 harvest, marking a successful soft launch for the terminal.

As a shallow water port, T-Ports will have the ability to to load grain for exporters via its transhipment vessel, a practice which general manager of construction Mark Antushka said was not otherwise seen in Australian grain ports.

"We load our transhipment vessel when it comes into the port, then it goes out to an anchorage point where the exporter's ship sits," Mr Antushka said.

"By loading grain in shallow water, we've been able to bring the port to the product through much lower build costs than a deep water

"We're about to load our first Panamax vessel for Hartree Partners, which holds about 60,000 tonnes (of grain), in late July.

"We've already got six grain exporters who've agreed to ship from our network, including three of the four biggest global grain traders in the world."

Mr Antushka said there were three major winners from the project.

"Local growers will enjoy an increase in grain pricing by \$10 to \$20 per tonne due to the increased market competition and service levels, which translates to about \$10m more for growers (within our catchment) per annum," he said.

"We've generated 200 local jobs during construction and there will be a further 50 once the facility is fully operational.

"Grain exporters will enjoy an additional 500,000t of shipping capacity and a new export pathway.

"T-Ports is very appreciative of Copper Coast Council's recognition of the importance of this large-scale investment in the region — it embraced the project from day one and has been fully supportive during the journey."

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said the first shipment from the new facility would be worth celebrating.

"It's been very impressive to see this significant scale of infrastructure built in a short amount of time," Mrs Talbot said.

"I'm glad the project has had little disruption on the foreshore."

The Wallaroo facility, featuring two 20,000t silos, a 500t hospital bin, 240,000t bunker site and 500-metre rock causeway, is set to be completed in the coming weeks.

T-Ports has also lodged a planning application to expand its bunker site by 100,000t.





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Resistant ryegrass challenges disc seeding systems

DISC seeding equipment is gaining popularity for its ability to handle crop residue, improved precision, faster sowing speeds, suitability for narrow row spacing and tendency to produce fewer clods when dry

These systems have an important downside, though, as very few preemergence herbicides are registered for use in conjunction with disc seeders where annual ryegrass (and other weeds) have resistance to incrop herbicides.

University of Adelaide weed management professor Dr Chris Preston said it was essential to follow the WeedSmart Big 6 tactic of mixing and rotating double knock herbicide modes of action when adding pre-emergence herbicides to a weed control program.

"Unfortunately, it is difficult to properly implement this strategy in a disc seeding system when there are so few pre-emergence herbicide options available," Dr Preston said.

"There is also a very real risk of crop damage when using preemergence herbicides in a disc seeding system, and this has a knock-on effect on the crop's ability to compete with weeds like annual ryegrass.

"Crop safety is the number one priority, the next is to avoid using single-molecule applications."

The crop safety risk arises in disc seeding systems because herbicide remains in the soil above the crop seed in a minimal disturbance envi-

In particular, single disc seeders tend to throw minimal soil from the crop seed row, increasing the risk of herbicide damage.

Modifications such as wavy coulters can increase the amount of soil throw and make registered herbicide use safer.

Another option is to use a rate from the lower end of the rate range of the riskier herbicide and mix it with a safer herbicide product, such as tri-allate in wheat, for example.

"The weakness in this approach is that most of these 'mixtures' will involve applying Group 15 [J or K] herbicides, putting considerable pressure on this single mode of action," Dr Picton said.

"An alternative is to use a weaker but safer herbicide pre-sowing

and partner it with an early postemergence herbicide."

The high proportion of standing stubble in many disc systems is disadvantageous when getting preemergence herbicides onto the soil.

"Correct application is essential to ensure maximum benefit from pre-emergence chemistry," Dr Picton said.

"Always use nozzles that produce a high percentage of large droplets to drive through stubble and onto the soil — that is, very coarse or

"Keep ground speed around 15-18 km/h to allow the boom to stay 50cm above ground level and raising the boom height above 50cm produces more smaller droplets, regardless of the nozzle size."

By implementing a diverse strategy, many growers who use disc seeders have successfully driven down the seed banks of important weeds, such as annual ryegrass, despite the limited options with registered pre-emergence herbicides.

Chronic pain in farmers explored

UNIVERSITY Australia experts are exploring what chronic pain means to Australian farmers.

The researchers are currently seeking farmers with experience of chronic pain to participate in a study.

Rural health expert, UniSA Associate Professor Kate Gunn said the study would address a serious gap in pain management among farmers.

and due to the unrelenting nature of farm work, farmers often return to work without accessing best-practice treatments, and without being aware of what this means for their long-term health and wellbeing.

"We also know farmers face multiple barriers to accessing mainstream healthcare services, including health professionals' lack of understanding

Chronic pain is a common and complex condition characterised by persistent pain experienced on most days of the week and affects almost one in five Australians.

"Despite its seriousness, only a small proportion of the population receive evidence-based information and advice about how to manage this condition," renowned neuroscientist and pain expert Professor Lorimer Moseley AO said.

"The effects of chronic pain are significant.

"It can reduce productivity, lead to increased BMI, and substantially increase the risk of numerous other conditions such as stroke, cancer, depression, multiple sclerosis, and rheumatoid arthritis.

"Rural communities are already struggling with health

"By working with farmers, we are hoping to develop realistic, appropriate and end-userinformed ways to improve the care and management of chronic pain in rural communities."





Any person found within the Prohibited Area or on Defence land will be subject to prosecution.

Specific test and evaluation activities may also require restricting public access to the Port Wakefield Defence Practice Areas over specific periods with these areas articulated in the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No. GN 40, 7 October 1992, and also identified on the diagram below. This may affect access to the Gulf of St Vincent at Port Wakefield and Port Parham.



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



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HOT FISHING TIPS

Recipe, salmon/tuna carpaccio with wasabi sauce: Ingredients — 4 pieces raw/uncooked tuna or salmon, white wine vinegar, voghurt, cream, wasabi paste, sov sauce, cilantro, cucumber, mayo, seasoning. Preparation – Whisk together wasabi, vinegar, soy sauce, yoghurt, and cream in a small bowl. Cut each piece of flattened fish into smaller pieces and fan out on plates or on a platter. Using a pastry brush, brush each piece of fish with the wasabi sauce. Then place a spoonful of a basic cucumber salad (chopped cucumber with mayo and seasoning) on each plate, garnish with shiso (Korean basil), cilantro or chervil and serve.

Wallaroo: What a week and a half of wintry weather it has been, with strong to gale-force winds and some reasonably decent rain. Tommy ruff (Australian herring) came from the jetty for the few hardy souls who tried their luck. King George whiting should be in the cork weed and boiler grounds after the blow.

Port Hughes/Moonta Bay: Boaties will be

happy winds are predicted to drop early in the week. Try West Light and Tipara Reef for whiting, garfish and squid. The jetties should have some hungry tommies and squid if the water is clear.

Point Turton: KG whiting will be in Hardwicke Bay on the drift after these storms, plus gar and squid from the Port Rickaby and Point Souttar grounds. The jetty has salmon trout and tommy ruff.

Stenhouse Bay/Marion Bay: Squid and big tommies are off Stenhouse Bay; gar and mullet are in the discoloured water near Marion Bay jetty. Mullet and salmon trout are at the Dust Hole beach, while local boat crews are planning for flathead, small tuna and red nannygai.

Edithburgh: Big tommies and a couple of salmon trout were reported from the jetty late last week. Boat crews should find KG whiting off the southern end of Tapley Shoals and in the broken grounds just south of Stansbury.

Ardrossan/Black Point: Legal mulloway were reported from the jetty over the weekend. KG whiting and squid will be here and south to Black Point, while mullet are in the shallows at Tiddy Widdy Beach.
