YORKE Peninsula Council will relinquish control and responsibility for the Port Vincent wharf and jetty, as well as the Point Turton jetty, to the state government in November, contingent on financial support.

The decision, made by elected members on Wednesday, March 8, comes amid growing concerns regarding the structural safety of the majority of the 12 jetties the government has leased to council.

YPC will not proceed with the return of the jetties if the state government commits to a sustainable maintenance funding arrangement which does not result in an increase of its own budgeted annual mainte-

nance expenditure of \$200,000.

Twelve jetties across the YPC area – including at Ardrossan, Marion Bay and Edithburgh – were leased to council under 50-year agreements made in 1998 and 2000.

However, a clause in the agreements allows YPC to hand back all 12 jetties to the government after 25 years if advised by engineers the structural integrity of the jetties has deteriorated at a greater rate than otherwise expected.


Ardrossan jetty, regarded as the jetty in the worst condition, contains 325 piles, 200 of which having a remaining life expectancy of 25 per cent or less.

According to a recent tender, it would cost \$18,000 to repair each pile, totalling \$3.6 million.

### **Port Vincent wharf** and jetty

AT last Wednesday's Yorke Peninsula Council meeting a resolution was passed to seek Port Vincent community consultation to allow for "commercial use" of its 120-year-old heritage town wharf and jetty. This seems to be in response to banning access to a local commercial fisherman.

Why is "commercialisation" necessary? A petition to allow the fisherman access in the public interest has already been circulated in Port Vincent and signed by several hundred locals and visitors.

As of last week, part of the Port Vincent jetty has been closed to the public on structural safety grounds. It has now been revealed the South Australian Government is working on a business case for the refurbishment of SA's jetties. Five specific jetties throughout the state are being evaluated. Despite the fact part of Port Vincent's jetty and wharf have now been closed to the public, as well as the local fisherman, and despite the need for urgent action, Port Vincent is not included in these test cases.

# Locals get behind push for 24/7 hospital guards

LOCAL residents and businesses are backing a campaign urging the state government to employ 24-hour restraint-trained security guards at Wallaroo Hospital.

The call comes after police had to taser a man four times when he smashed through two sets of entry doors at the hospital and attacked the back of an ambulance in mid-February.

More than 1500 people have signed a petition run by the Australian Nursing and Midwifery Federation and 18 businesses in Wallaroo are supporting it by displaying posters and leaflets.

The petition also calls for guards to be employed at the Port Pirie Hospital.

Last week, ANMF representatives, nurses and midwives walked around Wallaroo (and Port Pirie) handing out flyers to local businesses to promote the campaign.

Sonbern Lodge, Wallaroo, manager David Woodforde is showing his support.

"It should be mandatory for the government to provide adequate security to protect staff and people who visit the hospital," Mr Woodforde said.

"The government has a duty of care, just as all employers do."

A statement issued by Yorke and Northern Local Health Network said it had undertaken safety measures at Wallaroo Hospital "within hours" of the February incident, including adjusting security cameras to cover all outdoor areas and installing "strong, temporary doors".

"We're looking forward to the doors being upgraded soon with customised strengthened safety glass and aluminium frames, which have been on priority order since February," the statement said.

YNLHN said it was working with SA Health on a Ten-Point Plan to End Violence and Aggression and a review of safety at Wallaroo Hospital was continuing.

ANMF SA branch chief executive Associate Professor Elizabeth Dabars said the introduction of 24/7 restrainttrained security guards at other regional hospitals in South Australia had resulted in positive outcomes.

A June 2022 review into the impact of 24/7 security guards at Whyalla and Port Augusta Hospitals in 2021 found there had been a 52 per cent decrease in reports of staff being hit by a moving object or person and a 62.5 per cent decrease in incidents resulting in an injury to a worker.

There had also been a 23 per cent decrease in workers reporting mental stress due to challenging behaviours.


Ms Dabars said the response from the Wallaroo (and Port Pirie) communities to the ANMF campaign was heartening.


"Many people in those communities were unaware of the lack of on-site security at their hospitals — they had just assumed there was security," she said.

"The lack of on-site security presents a real danger not just to hospital staff but to patients and visitors."



# New housing unlocked for Copper Coast's key workers

LOCAL teachers, police and healthcare workers will soon have access to more stable housing.

This comes after the state government committed to delivering 30 houses across five regions, including the Copper Coast, as part of a Regional Key Worker Housing scheme announced last month.

Kadina Memorial School teacher Henry Bruce, who moved to the Copper Coast at the beginning of the 2023 school year, said stable housing would be a massive help for workers like himself.

"I understand rentals are scarce everywhere at the moment, however the Copper Coast is seriously lacking (in availability)," Mr Bruce said.

"There's only a handful of rentals available with so many applicants looking."

Mr Bruce said he was lucky to secure a Department for Education home.

"There is a big need for teachers everywhere, particularly in country areas," he said.

"It (the housing scheme) would be a driving incentive for teachers to make the move to the area."

A newly established Office for Regional Housing, operated by Renewal SA, is set to help accelerate the scheme.

Office for Regional Housing director Matthew Hunt presented to the Copper Coast Council to inform elected members of the scheme's objectives on Wednesday, March 15.

Mr Hunt said the scheme's pilot project would deliver a portion of the initial 30 houses on the Copper Coast.

"The houses will be leased on a long-term basis (10-plus years) to the Government Employee Housing program, operated by the Department for Infrastructure and Transport, and used to provide housing for regional government workers," Mr Hunt said.

"Ultimately, the Office for Regional Housing will look to sell the houses, with the leases attached, to private investors."

Mr Hunt said the Copper Coast had been identified by multiple government agencies as a priority region for additional housing to support critical government services.

"The Office for Regional Housing is looking to finalise the number, type and exact location of the houses in the pilot project in the coming weeks, with a view to approach the market for builders in the middle of 2023," Mr Hunt said.

"The office is currently recruiting staff to help facilitate the increase in housing supply.

"In addition, the office is exploring variations of the Key Worker Housing Scheme model that may enable houses to be built for other organisations that can underwrite long-term demand for significant numbers of houses.

"This could include major regional employers, councils or community housing providers."

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said there was a serious need to attract professionals which are vital to the region.

"Hopefully, this (scheme) means we can kill two birds with one stone and see an increase in government workers whilst building more housing where it's needed," Mr Ellis said.

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said council was now working with the government to identify potential parcels of land to build on.

"It's important we're able to not only attract, but retain these key workers, of which there is clearly a shortage in the area," Mrs Talbot said.

### Freehold milestone for Fisherman Bay

A MILESTONE has been reached in the freeholding of Fisherman Bay properties, with 65 settled for a total value of \$3.7 million during the project's final major freeholding stage.

Barunga West Council CEO Maree Wauchope conveyed this information to elected members as part of her project status report at council's monthly meeting on Tuesday, March 14.

"The long-awaited dream of freeholding land and delivering key infrastructure at Fisherman Bay is now a reality," Ms Wauchope said.

"The project has exceeded expectations, providing a significant boost to the local economy while progressing important infrastructure projects."

Ms Wauchope also reported the cumulative number of Fisherman Bay property settlements to the end of February was 365 sites with a total value of \$26.8m, and the sum held in the project's secured bank account was \$16.2m.

"All purchased titles have been issued and Fisherman Bay Management is now working to resolve the remaining six noncontracted sites," she said.

"The key risk of failing to achieve forecast sales revenue has been mitigated with the last major (freeholding) stage now set-

"Construction cost risk has also reduced now work has progressed.

"To date, there have only been minor cost variations, but council is aware of a potential significant claim on the wastewater collection element of the works."

Ms Wauchope said the key construction risks were the potential impact of groundwater and the cost and time of resolving clashes with services, including SA Power Networks, NBN and Telstra, but work was continuing to resolve those

"FBM paid the final instalment of its \$700,000 Open Space Contribution in February," she said.

Infrastructure construction was generally progressing satisfactorily, with minor cost variations of \$175,000, Ms Wauchope reported.

Community feedback has been received by council on key planning issues for Fisherman Bay, including beach access, traffic management, road access and amenities.

A report will be presented at council's April meeting.

### Separate plumbing rate proposed

A SEPARATE rate to pay for plumbing connections at Fisherman Bay is being considered by Barunga West Council.

The rate would cover the full cost of the connections and be levied on each landowner at Fisherman Bay, with the amount to vary depending on the requirements for each

The plumbing will connect homes at Fisherman Bay to the new wastewater collection system, which is being installed as part of the Fisherman Bay freeholding project.

At its meeting last week, council voted for public consultation on the proposed separate rate.

If the separate rate is approved, a works contract with a preferred plumbing contractor to deliver the Fisherman Bay plumbing connections works will be presented to council for approval after a community information session.



### Structural concerns for YP jetties

YORKE Peninsula Council CEO Andrew Cameron said the issue needed to be addressed.

"We presented at the Country Cabinet session in Maitland a few weeks ago and the Premier (Peter Malinauskas) said the government was aware it needed to do something about the jetties," he said.

"The council decision mandates the beginning of future discussions regarding the future custodianship of all of the relevant jetties in council's area.

"I'll be writing directly to Mr Malinauskas soon to begin discussions about the best way forward."

A state government spokesperson said future options for the jetties would be considered as part of a broader strategy during the usual budget processes.

"The Department for Infrastructure and Transport met with representatives from YPC on Friday for a briefing on what council resolved at its recent meeting," the spokesperson said.

"This will be the first discussion on this matter since the vote was taken so it is too early to respond in detail as to the government's response."

However, YPC plans to improve access safety at the Edithburgh jetty by extending the southern steps for divers/swimmers, as well as the removal of the northern steps, on

Thursday, March 23.

#### Fisherman's push progresses

Local fisherman Jordan Judd will have his desire to use the Port Vincent wharf for commercial purposes explored further.

In a completely separate decision to the lease arrangements, YPC elected members voted to proceed with a community engagement process to amend the wharf's Community Land Management Plans to reclassify the land for commercial uses.

The land is currently classified as dedicated for public and community facilities, to encourage, promote and facilitate recreational and social activities.

Mr Judd raised concerns in January, after he claimed council had told him he could no longer use the wharf to load and unload his commercial fishing boat, and was threatened with a \$5000 fine if use continued.

He said it was pleasing to see the first steps made.

"If it all goes through and they do go with it once the consultation is in, I'm happy but I'm concerned they won't go with it and just ignore the feedback," he said.

"There are a lot of people who are supportive of what I'm doing and I think will step up to have their say during the consultation period." However, a visual report grading the wharf's structural piles (on a 1-7 scale, seven being the worst) was completed in 2021 and detailed the 25 timber piles (which support the wharf) were rated between five and seven.

At least four of the crosshead beams which transfer deck load were deemed to have at most 15 per cent capacity remaining.

None of the jetties leased to council are load rated, meaning heavy works must be completed by barge, hampering the possibility of further maintenance and renewal.

With council potentially handing back control of the wharf to the state government, decisions about how it is used could be made at the discretion of the government instead of council.

Jetties which are owned and controlled by the state government cannot be visited by boats for longer than four hours a day.

"If it's good and safe enough for public use, it's good enough for what I'm doing," Mr Judd said.

"I question the validity of structural reports made two years ago, but I do agree if new reports suggest it's not structurally safe then there should be no heavy loads on it."

Members of the public can submit feedback submissions to council until 5pm, Monday, April 17.



### **Body found in water at Port Hughes**

POLICE are preparing a report for the State Coroner following a suspected drowning at Port Hughes last Wednesday, March 15.

Local patrols and paramedics were called to the foreshore opposite Dowling Drive after a member of the public reported a body in shallow water.

The body of an 83-year-old man from the Copper Coast was discovered just after

Police said there were no suspicious circumstances.

#### Man caught speeding 62km over limit

A Moonta Bay man has been charged after being caught driving 62 kilometres over the speed limit on Friday, March

Police detected a grey Toyota Kluger travelling at 162km/h in a 100km/h zone on the Augusta Highway just out of Port Pirie.

Officers attempted to stop the vehicle, which was travelling south at about 4.17pm, but the pursuit was terminated after the driver engaged in dangerous driving including overtaking dangerously at speeds in excess of 180km/h.

Other patrols later saw the Kluger travel north along Church Road, Warnertown.

Police stopped the vehicle soon after and arrested the driver, a 42-year-old man from Moonta Bay.

He was charged with driving at excessive speed, aggravated engage in a pursuit with police and drive at a speed and manner dangerous.

He also tested positive to cannabis and could face further charges once his drug sample has been forensically analysed.

The man was bailed to appear in the Port Pirie Magistrates Court on May 8.

He was issued with an immediate six-month loss of licence and had his vehicle impounded for 28 days.

### State government's plan to improve road safety

STRONG measures to reduce deaths and serious injuries have headlined South Australia's Road Safety Action Plan 2023-2025.

The plan has identified measures which will contribute a targeted 50 per cent reduction in lives lost and 30 per cent reduction in serious injuries on SA roads by 2031.

Poor driving behaviours, including drink and drug driving, speeding, distraction and incorrect use of seatbelts, will be targeted.

The state government has endorsed a national vision of zero lives lost and zero serious injuries by 2050.

Road safety infrastructure and other measures for safer school precincts underscore the government's focus on improving safety around schools.

Improved outcomes for Aboriginal road users are also a focus, including better data collection and exploring opportunities to expand the successful On the Right Track (licensing) program.

Minister for Police Joe Szakacs said the Road Safety Action Plan 2023-2025 was integral to the government's aim of reducing deaths and serious injuries on SA roads.

"This plan will further protect vulnerable road users including those around our schools," Mr Szakacs said.

"The plan provides strong accountability

### Members back in the chairs

TWO Yorke Peninsula elected members will resume their roles this week after the state government fast-tracked laws through parliament to reinstate almost 50 councillors caught up in a recent election donations issue.

Deputy mayor Richard Carruthers and elected member Kristin Murdock both declined to comment but confirmed they had resumed their

roles and would attend tomorrow's elected member briefing.

The duo failed to submit their second donations return lodgements at the conclusion of last year's council elections, and were ejected from council in February.

The government introduced the Local Government (Casual Vacancies) Amendment Bill 2023 earlier this month, providing affected members with a

further 10 days to submit their returns upon its passing.

It meant, in total, councillors were provided with 12 reminders, two deadlines a month apart and an extra 10 days to complete the administration requirement.

Councils were also assured any decisions made during the time between the election and when the vacancies were announced were valid.

### Stock to sit in final CCC seat

The Moonta resident also received 949 of 3822 (24.8 per cent) first preference votes, leading Ms Thomson's 14.5 per cent.

Copper Coast's supplementary election, one of seven completed in South Australia this month, has ensured a full table of 10 elected members for the 2023-27 term.

Mr Stock said he was in disbelief when he discovered the election's result.

"I would've been happy with a topthree finish," Mr Stock said.

"Being someone who people feel is approachable may have contributed (to being voted in)."

At 32 years old, Mr Stock is set to be the youngest Copper Coast Council elected member this term.


"I believe I can provide a unique perspective lens for the council," he said.

"I have a good level of local knowledge which I think can add value to the current team."

Mr Stock said he looked forward to helping council tackle local issues and watching projects progress.

"A lack of local housing seems to be something that constantly pops up, among other issues," he said.

"There are lots of things that need to



be addressed but just as many exciting opportunities, such as masterplans and the potential World Heritage status of Moonta Mines.

"I thank everyone who voted for me and look forward to contributing to council's good work."

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said she was pleased to see the community decide on a suitable candidate.

"It'll be nice to have a councillor with a younger set of eyes and who has lived on the Copper Coast for their whole life," Mrs Talbot said.

"All nominees were worthy candidates and I thank them all for nominating — it can take a great deal of courage to put your hand up."

Mr Stock will be officially inducted as a councillor prior to CCC's April meeting.

"During my hydrotherapy after losing my leg, I realised I didn't do too badly at backstroke,"

"I can actually barrel roll in the pool quite easily because my body tends to turn to one side naturally.

"I want to show people anyone can have a go if they put their mind to it, regardless of what's happened in the past.

"I'm aiming for a personal best in these games and then continue improving my time from there.

"If I can positively affect one person during the process (of competing) it would be a success."

Masters Games chair Lynn Spurling said the games would give everyone the opportunity to participate regardless of age, ability or experience.

"With so many sports to compete

in, there is something for everyone — the more mainstream like tennis, basketball and softball, and others like croquet, archery and radio controlled boats," she said.

"We have participants registered from all over SA and also quite a large number of interstate competitors too.

"The games give opportunities for mature-aged sports people to compete and be physically active.



Competitor and committee member John Cornwill said he expected the event would attract more than 50 com-

"At least 85 per cent (of competitors) will come from across South Australia and even some from Western Australia and Victoria," Mr Cornwill said.

"We only have four motorsport venues in SA, and one is closed at the moment, so there's a been a huge demand for more motorsport."

The club had leased its land from president Paul "Wick" Dayman and began constructing its sand drag track in January.

'The sand drag event is a way to bring new people to the sport and draw as many eyes as possible," Mr Cornwill

"It will be a huge boost for local accommodation, food and fuel busi-

"We're hoping to establish a perma-

nent track and host multiple rounds of interstate competition every year."

Secretary Linda Stuart said the club had leased its land for about three years before any physical progress was made to the site.

"It's been a long process driven solely by club volunteers," she said.

"We've got to chip away bit by bit, but we won't be able to get the financial support we need until people see how the event goes."

Copper Coast Council director development services Muller Mentz said, as the sand drag event was set to be held on private land, no council permit was required.

"The only concern would be the potential impact on the amenity of the locality in which the event is to be held," he said.

"The potential nuisances (defined by the Local Nuisance and Litter Control Act 2016) which may result as a consequence of the sand drag event are those caused by noise, smoke and fumes, or unsanitary conditions that unreasonably interfere with the enjoyment of the

"MasterPlan Town and Country Planners (on behalf of the motorsports club) applied for an exemption which sets out precautionary measures to mitigate the potential nuisances identified.

'The application was granted subject to the provision of amenity facilities, potential noise, dust nuisance and traffic issues be addressed; the owners of properties that may be affected by the event be notified; and complaints be

### **Building towards a motorsports park**

COPPER Coast Motorsports wants to create a motorsport park on its Wallaroo site, featuring a drag strip, burnout pad and onsite camping.

The committee has lodged a development application for the project and hope to raise \$10,000 from its April sand drag event to help fund the construction of its new multi-purpose facility.

Copper Coast Council director development services Muller Mentz said the State Planning Commission would make a decision on the proposed development, which the club prepared with assistance from MasterPlan Town and Country Planners.

"Considering the scale of the proposed development, it will be lodged as a major project," Mr Mentz said.

"The establishment of the motorsports park will come at significant cost to the applicant due to the support information required, such as acoustic, traffic and noise reports, which will have to be prepared by expert consultants."

Copper Coast Motorsports is seeking local businesses to sponsor the sand drag event.

### **BWC** wastewater project granted \$155,000 boost

BARUNGA West Council has received \$155,000 from the Local Government Association to finish expansions on its Port Broughton Community Wastewater Management System.

Development on the system began last year, with two storage lagoons, concrete treatment tanks and a three kilometre main line connecting Fisherman Bay to the developed management plant.

The additional funding, provided by the LGA in January, brings the subsidy agreement between BWC and the LGA to approximately \$3.155 million.

Mayor Leonie Kerley said the upgrades were necessary, as the existing plant was nearing capacity and required future development.

"The expansion project was a key aspect of allowing the freeholding of 400 properties at Fisherman Bay, as they required connection to wastewater treatment as part of development approval," Mrs Kerley said.

The project not only provides these properties with essential wastewater treatment but also offers additional reclaimed water for use by the Port Broughton Golf Club and town oval, providing an added benefit to local ratepayers.

'The Port Broughton Community Wastewater Management System expansion project is a crucial step in ensuring the sustainability and growth of the Port Broughton area for years to come.

Our community is grateful for the support shown by stakeholders, including the Local Government Association.

### 50-year feat at leg's end hospital

IN a feat we may never see again, Yorketown doctor George Kokar is celebrating 50 years of service to the Northern and Yorke Local Health Network at the Yorketown Medical Practice and Hospital.

At a time when a large portion of the local healthcare workforce drive in and out at the drop of a hat, Dr Kokar's longevity in the GP role began with a stint as a locum at Yorketown in 1972.

The son of Polish parents who survived labour camps during World War II, he grew up in Adelaide but was enticed to Yorketown by a friend who was living on southern Yorke

He said, had he not been on a few weekends away with friends to Corny Point as a young man, he wouldn't have known about the town, but has come to love it.

"I was training in Adelaide, but I was a little sick of it," Dr Kokar said.

"I had a mate from medical school here and he said they were looking for someone so I thought I'd see what it was like.

"My wife thought it was only going to be six months; it didn't quite happen like that. She then said, by the time our second child was going to school, we would move back to Adelaide and that didn't happen

Dr Kokar said, of all the things he'd done while at the practice and hospital, he had got the most satisfaction from obstetrics, a service which is no longer available.

"Most babies used to be delivered by general practice, but now you wouldn't find a general practice delivering a baby in the metropolitan area at all — it's not that hard really," he

"Obstetrics is one of the only parts of medicine where people love the product (babies).

"Most of the time you tell people about heart attacks and cancers, deaths and palliative care and most people don't want that, but they like babies."

He said the lack of willingness from many within the industry to take the leap and work in a regional landscape comes from not understanding what country life is all about.

"You tend to be your own master, in a place like this," Dr Kokar said.

"You get a lot more independence here and you tend to deal with stuff that in the city you wouldn't deal with.

"In my era it all started to change in the metropolitan area with the growth of specialists.

"During my training I spent three months learning how to do everything with the eyes, but now there are five specialists for an eye."

Dr Kokar was presented with a certificate of recognition for his service to the local health network by Minister for Health Chris Picton in February.

He said friends and colleagues living in Adelaide had often said it's less enjoyable there than in the country.


"The only reason I don't (move back to Adelaide) is that I've met several people over the years who had worked as medical professionals in the country and then moved to Adelaide and hated it," Dr Kokar said.


"So, I thought well if it's going to be like that, why would I want to go back there?"

Executive officer and director of nursing and midwifery of Southern Yorke Peninsula Health Service Tracy Carroll offered her appreciation to Dr

"I'd like to thank Dr Kokar for providing medical services to not only the local health network but the wider community over the past 50 years here in Yorketown," she said.

HALF A CENTURY... George Kokar in his office at the Yorketown Medical Practice.

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

### Move, reflect and connect the key message from Brett Burton

FORMER Adelaide Crows footballer Brett Burton joined the Fat Farmers group to discuss all things mental health at the Copper Coast Sport and Leisure Centre, Kadina last Wednesday, March 15.

Now a wellbeing facilitator, Mr Burton centred his speech on emotional wellbeing and encouraged the 50-strong audience to focus on three key pillars — movement, reflection and connection — to improve their emotional health.

Mr Burton told the group about his own experience as the Adelaide Crows' head of football and how losing what he thought was an unlosable grand final (in 2017) changed the course of his career.

He attributed his recovery from being dismissed from his position with the Crows to the high performance sport training strategies he has developed, but admitted he went through a period of grief.

"I encourage everyone to get active to improve mental health and work through their own hardships by finding a form of physical activity that works for them," he

"What we often don't think about is the psychological benefits of movement.

"From a physical point of view, 20 minutes of moderate exercise will put you in a good mood for up to 12 hours.

"When it comes to exercise, we have got to do what's enjoyable and what's repeatable."

Mr Burton acknowledged the difficulty in disconnecting from an ever-increasing online world and said it was important we continued to connect with others, as humans, and rely on social interactions to maintain wellbeing.

"The power of social interaction is as powerful from a positive perspective as cigarettes and alcohol are from a negative perspective,"

"(Yet) when things aren't going well we tend to become reclusive.

"Country people help each other (through these times) better than anyone else in my experience.

"We all have those people who provide us with good energy."

Mr Burton helped the Kadina Fat Farmers group put these strategies into action the following day during a 6.30am fitness session.



"SOS Yorkes is all about providing the first port of call for local people who may be struggling and suffering in silence in regards to their mental health," she said.


"We work towards a greater awareness of mental health issues and suicide prevention, but we want to steer people in the right direction for further help after they come to us.







"They were drawing on their own knowledge of symbols as well as learnabout the West Adelaide Football Club's connection to the Riverland and Kaurna country.

"The flowing water across the front of the jumper explains our Riverland connection.

"The stars are for the linking of our people to their ancestors and each other; this includes all people involved at the Bloods — our staff, players, supporters and volunteers.

There is a Swan totem signifying the connection with Hisense Stadium (Richmond Oval) which is a meeting

place where we all come together.

"We also incorporated the Kaurna Shield on the back of the jumper to indicate we're going into battle."

The Bloods took on Sturt in the First Nations Round, losing 5. 5 (35) to 6. 6

Although the inaugural First Nations time all eight SANFLW teams wore Indigenous-designed jumpers.




# **Wallaroo Sailing Club**

### Are we gaining ground against herbicide resistant weeds?

THERE'S no doubt weed management is a numbers game, first and foremost. Overlooking this fact is the underlying cause of herbicide resistance

Dr Ken Flower, director of the Australian Herbicide Resistance Initiative, said random weed surveys in Australia since 2003 showed an upward trajectory in the percentage of samples registered as resistant or developed resistance to a suite of common herbicides.

"In Western Australia, for example, in 2020, random surveys conducted by AHRI's Dr Mechelle Owen found more than 70 per cent of wild radish samples had some level of resistance to diflufenican and 2,4-D," Dr Flower said.

"In annual ryegrass, more than 90 per cent of samples were resistant or developing resistance to diclofop.

"Between 2015 and 2020, glyphosate resistance in annual ryegrass has jumped from one per cent to about 12 per cent."

The jump in glyphosate resistance is likely due to increased applications of glyphosate in herbicide-tolerant canola hybrids and in summer fallow spraying programs.

"Herbicides are by far the most efficient weed control tactic to apply over large tracts of land, and, understandably, growers rely heavily on herbicides," Dr Flower said.


"Unfortunately, this is how herbicide resistance gains a foothold.

"Rather than just looking for new broadacre herbicides or technological fixes, we need to get better at locating and mapping the weeds that escape the main control

"Treat weed patches in the current crop to stop seed set and strategically in future crops."

Herbicides work more effectively when crop competition does the heavy lifting to suppress weed germination and seed set.

The WeedSmart Big 6 is built on robust and diverse crop rotations where each crop provides opportunities to drive down the weed seed bank. Monitoring and managing individual weeds or small patches is essential in an effective control



# Significant savings for regional home buyers

LOWER minimum deposits for regional homes financed through HomeStart are set to wipe tens of thousands of dollars off upfront

Eligible borrowers will only be required to have a minimum five per cent deposit for a standard HomeStart Home Loan, in line with metropolitan borrowers.

Based on the median house price of \$350,000 in major regional towns, this could reduce the upfront deposit needed by more than \$50,000, based on a standard 20 per cent deposit.

Regional buyers will also have greater access to the Graduate Loan, which requires just a two per cent deposit for people with a

Certificate III or higher.

The state government move is designed to help ease the pressure on rentals.

The vacancy rate in regional areas is historically low, ranging from 0.2 per cent to just under one per cent.

The median house price in SA's major non-metropolitan towns hit \$350,000 in December, an 18.6 per cent rise in 12 months, and 25 per cent increase since December

Treasurer Stephen Mullighan said owning a home was the great Australian dream.

"We know there are many pressure points in housing right now, and regional areas are doing it particularly tough," Mr Mullighan said.

"This change, in addition to further support for regional housing, will help more people get into their own homes sooner."

HomeStart chief executive Andrew Mills said reductions in deposit requirements and expanding the Graduate Loan scheme provided additional support for regional homebuyers.

These initiatives are aimed at supporting regional buyers faced with the dual challenges of rising house prices and interest rates," Mr Mills said.

"They underscore HomeStart's ongoing commitment to making sure owning a home is a reality for more South Australians."

### Fast track for cladding upgrades

SOUTH Australians can now access government support to help fast track the replacement of combustible panel cladding on private buildings.

The Combustible Aluminium, Composite Panel Cladding Limited Loan Scheme will provide building owners with financial assistance to replace cladding with extreme or high risk ratings, Minister for Small and Family Business Andrea Michaels said.

The scheme will offer concessional loans with



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a fixed interest rate and terms of up to 10 years with no application fee.

The scheme's guidelines include: remediation to be completed within five years of the scheme's commencement, loan funds to be drawn down in full within 24 months, repayment beginning when work is completed, and loans only being used for works needed to meet national standards.

Loans of up to \$15 million will be available to community and strata corporations.

An amendment allows remedial works with the support from 75 per cent of lot owners.

Previously, community title groups needed to secure unanimous agreement amongst residents to remove cladding where the cost exceeded \$5000 per apartment.

Ms Michaels said securing unanimous approval in a community title group can be challenging at the best of times.

"When works are mandatory, and designed to address potential safety concerns, it's essential works can be approved and commence in a timely manner."





These firings may require specific tidal or weather conditions, and are critical for the safety of current and new Defence capabilities. Members of the public may notice noise, vibration, flashes and/or smoke during the testing. There is no risk to the public outside of the gazetted Defence Practice Areas

For reasons of public safety, there is a permanent exclusion zone covering land, sea and air around the Port Wakefield Establishment. Specific details on the Port Wakefield Prohibited Area can be obtained from Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No GN 26, 4 July 1990, and is shown on the diagram below. Trespassing in this Area is strictly prohibited and very dangerous due to the presence of unexploded bombs. Any person found within the Prohibited Area or on Defence land will be subject to prosecution.

Specific test and evaluation activities may also require restricting public access to the Port Wakefield Defence Practice Areas over specific periods with these areas articulated in the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No. GN 40, 7 October 1992, and also identified on the diagram below. This may affect access to the Gulf of St Vincent at Port Wakefield and Port Parham.

## **Adelaide Fringe 2023** delivers on all fronts

THE 2023 Adelaide Fringe Festival has drawn to a close after an incredibly successful season.

I've spent my fair share of time in the city but nothing makes Adelaide come alive more than the scale of the Fringe.

The biggest drawcard is always the sheer volume of things to do.

It is freeing being able to walk down Rundle Street, usually packed with commuter traffic, and be able to sit in the middle of the roadway at one of many pop-up restaurants.

And then, just across the road is the Garden of Unearthly Delights and Gluttony, which are remarkable to stroll through.

At one point I watched a few friends get their portraits sketched by a street artist and the results were incredible. This doesn't include the countless street performers, live shows, food stalls, pop-up bars and everything in between that are scattered across the city for the entirety of the month.

When else can you casually stroll around and watch a circus-type performance in the middle of the street or walk through a maze of mirrors?

Not only that, but the ability to be able to pop

down to Adelaide over the entire month is liberating as a country resident, knowing you're not going to miss out on being involved.

Fringe organisers are rightfully celebrating the accomplishment of being the first Australian festival to sell more than one million tickets, with the millionth being sold at 10.01pm on the last night of the event.

I think this is an incredible and well-deserved accolade, especially for Adelaide, and should be a sign of the wide-reaching appeal and future longevity of the festival for years to come.

The roughly \$23 million that will be paid to box office artists from ticket sales is only the tip of the iceberg when it comes to the financial benefit our state receives from the Fringe, especially hospitality and accommodation businesses.




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

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#### **HOT FISHING TIPS**

Wallaroo: Blue swimmer crabs have been consistent catches from Myponie Point all the week. Strong winds picked up late on Saturday after boat crews returned with blueys, squid and garfish. Jetty-based fishing produced blue crabs and tommy ruff (Australian herring) after dusk.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: The caravan and tinny traffic here had to be seen to be believed straight after the March long weekend. Crews fished far and wide for garfish, squid, tommies, snook and even a couple of King George whiting. Good catches of garfish can be made at Cape Flizabeth

Port Victoria: Some fairly decent tidal movements have been experienced here over the past two weeks or so as crab rakers worked local beaches south of the Port Vic jetty. Boat crews fished Wardang Island for KG whiting, gar and squid. Balgowan crews launched for garfish and tommy ruff.

Point Turton: Garfish central was the word at the Point Turton boat ramp during the week as great weather made for sometimes ideal conditions up at Minlacowie, Port Rickaby and

then west to The Pines and Corny Point. Rat kingfish are back at the jetty at Turton, chasing small, gar, squid and tommies.

Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: The tuna run continued, perhaps at a slightly lesser pace than caught fish to 8kg, plus red nannygai, trevalley and kingfish. Browns Beach has mullet, as do Gvm Beach and the Dust Bowl, Jetty-based fishing has tommies, garfish and squid at times.

Edithburgh/Stansbury: Crews fishing the Orontes Bank, Troubridge Light grounds and south of the island caught isolated big KG whiting last week, along with morwong, flathead and snook on the way home, especially near Marion Reef. The ietties are worth a try for tommies and blue crabs.

Ardrossan: Mid last week provided the best fishing conditions before those dreaded onshore southerlies decided to again visit this side of YP. Blue crabs, garfish and snook are all along the coast from Price to Pine Point and the salmon trout run is on again as these little champs swim north to lay their eggs around the Mozzie Point and Port Arthur mangroves. The jetty has a few blue crabs and is worth a try for a mulloway after dusk.
