FRASER Ellis has again been elected to represent the seat of Narungga.

Mr Ellis received 32 per cent of the first preference votes in Saturday's state election, leading the Liberal candidate Tom Michael on 28.1 per cent.

Preferences have worked in favour of the incumbent also, opening up a two-candidate preferred lead of 58.9 per cent to 41.1 per cent.

Mr Ellis is the first non-Liberal member for the region since Keith Russack was elected to the seat of Goyder in 1977.

While pre-poll and postal results are still to be counted, Mr Ellis was cautious but thankful voters had shown faith in him.

"It's a good indication for the work we've done over the past four years and I think ultimately people were able to use their votes based on my track record of getting things done for the area, most notably roads and health," Mr Ellis said. "Hopefully we can continue doing that because there's been significant appreciation for what we have managed to do during the past four years."

One Nation, Family First and Labor all showed how-to-vote preferences to Mr Ellis.

Mr Ellis said he is especially proud of the work done on the region's roads.

"Our roads right up and down the middle, from Arthurton right down to Minlaton, Mines Road, now Wallaroo entrance road amongst others," he said. "Port Wakefield is also one I'm most proud of, so overall, I think we've done a lot to fix up our long-ignored and long-overdue road network."

Mr Michael, from Barunga Gap, controlled first preference votes at polling booths in the district's north such as Balaklava and Blyth while Mr Ellis polled strongly in his hometown of Kadina, as well as Wallaroo and Maitland, amongst others.



# Sand replenishment on the forefront

IT is all sands on deck for Port Broughton's beach shelter

The footings of the shelter, located at the southern side of the jetty, have again eroded due to tidal movement in the bay.

Works to replenish the sand levels underneath the shelter lasted less than two months before tidal movements re-exposed the footings.

At council's March meeting, elected members were presented with options in dealing with the shelter including its removal from the beach or a sand replenishment program over the next 12 months.

This would require the replenishment of sand up to four times during the year at a cost of \$36,000.

Mayor Leonie Kerley said council needed to understand the ongoing impact of adding sand to the ecosystem before moving forward.

"Council has requested advice from leading South Australian coastalmanagement firm Delta Environmental on how an intense program of beach nourishment can be implemented to mitigate this ongoing issue in an acceptable timeframe," Mrs Kerley said.

"Council has already been working with Delta Environmental to establish a long-term beach nourishment program along our coastline, designed to protect property owners from erosion in the future.

"Beach nourishment is the process of adding sand to the beach system to absorb wave energy, to provide amenity in the form of a beach and to provide an erosion buffer.

"This is a gradual process usually undertaken over several years."

Council received \$30,000 from the state government's Regional Coast Protection Grant program last year for a small-scale pilot project in front of Dalling Street.

"This project can be built upon in the future and implemented along the length of the beach from Port Broughton to Fisherman Bay," Mrs Kerley said.

"A natural solution is much more amenable to council and its ratepayers.

"We are mindful of the intricate and delicate coastal ecosystem which is important to our natural environment and must be able to be maintained and supported through all aspects of our work on the foreshore."

Council will soon enter into a grant agreement with the Department for Environment and Water and works on the ground will follow.

# Cultural tour gets grant

DHILBA Guuranda-Innes National Park is trailing ahead with walking tours.

Big Heart Adventures recently received more than \$70,000 in state government funding to support its five-day cultural walking tour of Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park led by Traditional Owners.

The funding will be used to purchase a vehicle and a waterproof trailer, which will support expansion and improvement of the operator's current services.

Big Heart Adventures chief adventurer Lisa Murphy said the funding meant they could bring more people to experience Nharangga culture while walking on stunning coastal trails.

"Having a purpose built vehicle offers a more comfortable journey from Adelaide and

while exploring the region," she said.

"The coastline is spectacular and few interstate or overseas tourists get the opportunity to experience it with Nharangga people.

"We see this as an opportunity for cultural and adventure tourism as well as local employment and training opportuni-

"We can only see growth for travel to this region in the cooler months when those seeking to connect with nature will experience a different side of Yorke Peninsula — on foot."

The five-day Nharangga Yorke Peninsula Cultural Walking Tour will partner with Narungga Nation Aboriginal Corporation and Yorke Peninsula Council.

The total project cost is

YPC mayor Darren Braund said Big Heart Adventures was a private company which was keen to use part of Walk the Yorke as a 'hero walk'.

Mr Braund said the company would provide guided tours for sections from Foul Bay to Gym Beach, which included parts of the national park (Dhilba Guuranda).

"They plan to value-add to our walk by working with Narungga Nation Aboriginal Corporation, hoping to eventually engage Nharangga guides," Mr Braund said.

"The company have been planning this for some time and had meetings with Regional Development Australia, YP Tourism, NNAC and YPC as part of their preparations.

"The Nharangga aspect is very exciting and will help bring employment to the area as well as providing a vehicle for the traditional owners to educate walkers and raise awareness of their history and traditions."

# Shared path trailing along smoothly

THE Wallaroo to Moonta shared path is moving forward.

Construction on the 14.4kilometre walking/cycling/ running trail began in October with works progressing to begin bituminising sections of the path in the coming weeks.

The path will link existing paths from Wallaroo to Kadina and Moonta to Port Hughes.

Director of infrastructure and services Tim Neumann said he was happy with how the trail works were progress-

ing.
"We've completed about 6.7km of the path with 5km ready to be bituminised which we will look at tying in with our reseal program," Mr Neumann said.

"The final stages of completing the path will be in the Moonta township and the National Trust area to coincide with their existing paths and

"The project should be com-

pleted by September, dependent on weather, but overall there have been no issues to

"The community can continue to expect to see works on the path throughout the coming months."

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said it was a very scenic trail with lots of natural vegetation.

'This path is a great way of connecting the peninsula's three largest urban centres of Kadina, Moonta and Wallaroo in a way where residents and

tourists can safely explore the area in a recreational way," Mrs Talbot said.

"Bikes can be hired which gives people even more of an opportunity to explore the Copper Coast in a different

About one kilometre of the road, between Upper Yorke Road and Green Road, has been resurfaced and widened to address safety issues associated with rutting and surface failure.

Shoulder sealing has also been completed along more than five kilometres of the road.

Barunga West Council secured a \$588,247 grant through the Local Government Infrastructure Partnership Program, which has funded \$2,566,227 of works across Yorke Peninsula.

Council manager for assets and infrastructure Steve Davey said the road accommodates close to 1200 vehicles per

freight and tourist route for those travelling from Top of the Yorke to the Clare Valley," Mr Davey said.

"It is also the only Port Wakefield bypass route available for those travelling from Yorke Peninsula to Adelaide.

"For council this is one of the largest grants we have secured and it is great to see the work will be finished on time and within bud-

# Stay safe on rural roads

MORE than 80 per cent of lives lost this year in vehicle accidents have been on rural roads.

Assistant Commissioner Ian Parrott said fine weather and easing of Covid-19 restrictions would attract visitors to the regions and increased foot traffic in metropolitan areas.

SA Police again held the state-wide Operation Safe Long weekend to focus on preventing vehicle accidents and with more long weekends coming up next month, officers are encouraging safe behaviour.

"Our neighbours, colleagues, families and friends are the people dying on our roads," Asst Comm Parrott said.

"We have to stop taking unnecessary risks and endangering lives.

"People must plan ahead to ensure a safe return home.

"This includes planning for any possible delays in arranging for ride shares and checking the Department for Infrastructure and Transport website for any road works that could bring stress and panic behind the wheel which could lead to catastrophic consequences.

"It's not just the visitors who need to take care, two out of three lives lost on regional roads are people who live in regional communities.

"Most people do the right thing but police have been appalled at the recent high incidence of dangerous and selfish behaviours on our region's roads, such as drink driving.".

Mr Ellis said the possibility of him rejoining the Liberal Party was on the backburner


"I'll cross that bridge when I get to it," he said.

# Fire lit for the fallen

POLITICS is far from over for several unsuccessful candidates in the seat of Narungga.

Independent Dianah Walter, the Liberal's Tom Michael and Labor's Mark Paull all had mixed results in Saturday's poll, but have said it has "lit a fire" within them.

Mr Michael said he was happy with what he achieved, given his short campaign time.

"To be at this stage, 600odd votes behind Fraser, I'm pleased with that, especially with the way the whole state has gone," he said.

"I'm a farm boy from Barunga Gap and I've been thrown into the deep end with a state election campaign which has just been phenomenal."

Mr Michael said the Liberal Party's result all across the state has been a great shame.

"The whole demise of the Liberal Party in South Australia is incredibly disappointing but what I've learnt in the last couple of months, is I've got a passion to make the place better," he said.

"I want to give the people who are successful their chance to steer the state into a better place.

"I've now got to go and cut down some corflutes, but once that's done it'll be time to get back to some farming."

Ms Walter finished with a first preference vote of 8.6 per cent, a result with which she was pleased.

"The standout is me enabling and empowering people to become involved in democracy in a way they never thought is possible,"

"It's a bit of a cliché, but there hasn't been a day that I haven't learnt something, but on the other side of that coin, I've actually had the privilege

of teaching other people.

"I will come back and have another go at this and whether that's running again for the seat of Narungga or elsewhere, politics is never not on the cards for me."

Labor's Mark Paull currently holds a 4 per cent increase on the party's local result four years ago.

"I'm pleased there was a slight increase in the amount of Labor votes, compared to last time, which is good, so it wasn't a totally negative result," he said.

"Probably the main reason for that would be having a local Labor candidate, because Labor don't normally have one, so that's possibly what's contributed.

"I'm actually really keen to educate myself more on politics and so if the opportunity comes I would probably be way ahead of the game than I was this time."


"So, to have a successful sale after years and years of planning is very rewarding.

# Civic upgrade for square

INITIAL plans for a new Civic Square in Port Broughton have been unveiled by Barunga West Council.

The square's revitalisation is set to transform the area into a modern familyfriendly space.

Water jets and feature lights will give children the chance to splash in a new Blue Space, positioned behind a memorial wall and three new flagpoles which will improve the Port Broughton War Memorial.

The design also includes the potential for an archway created by the water jets to become a regular backdrop for Anzac and Remembrance Day ser-

Increased seating areas and a garden have also been proposed for the square.

This redevelopment is the first of several projects set to be rolled out by council as part of its mainstreets master plan this financial year.

Council has planned to

consult residents regarding various aspects of the square, such as public art, landscaping, flagpoles and how the town's Nharangga heritage can be acknowledged.

Mayor Leonie Kerley said the concept would be a place for reflection, gentle movement and joy.

"We are seeking feedback from the community about what sort of flag-flying they would like to see, in addition to types of landscaping, public art and Indigenous content at the square," Mrs Kerley said.

Ratepayers are set to be engaged with the project through a series of surveys and information sessions up until the end of April.

"I have asked staff to write to all ratepayers about this important project so they can hear (about the square) firsthand and have an opportunity to provide input," Mrs Kerley said.

Council is seeking tenders on the initial concept of the Civic Square, with the successful contractor to be engaged in detailed design following community feedback.

# Facilitating an outcome for community land

DISCUSSIONS are ongoing around a portion of community land at Moonta.

Copper Coast Lifestyle Village owners Auscare had previously proposed to purchase 23-39 Hills Road, North Moonta, to extend the village.

The proposal was rejected by Copper Coast Council elected members and a new proposal — the purchase of 1000 square metres — was raised.

In January, Auscare made a third proposal asking to acquire a 55m slice of the land or 6100 square metres.

Council CEO Russell Peate said there were differing views from the lifestyle village management, village residents and nearby community members as to the best use of the land.

"We think there is a potential outcome that will suit all parties," Mr Peate

"To do this we need to engage an independent, experienced facilitator to have a discussion individually first with the lifestyle village, the people who live at the village and then the people who live in the area.

"We would then bring all

parties together and see if there could be an agreed out-

"Whether this is to develop some of the land while retaining some (of the land) which could meet the needs of everyone — we hope this could happen within the next few months."

Mr Peate said while there was potential for there not to be an agreement between the parties he thought it would be worthwhile to engage such a facilitator to potentially progress an agreed outcome between everyone.

Councillor Brent Walker said he was not in favour of the latest proposal.

"We've been down this road before and they (Auscare) keep changing how much land they want," he said.

"The ratepayers were against the first proposal and I think our decision should reflect the views of the com-

Before any consultation is commenced, Auscare has been requested to submit a detailed plan, with dimensions, showing which part of the land they wish to pur-

Once a plan has been received, a report will be brought back to council for consideration.



# **Public consultation on Gulf** St Vincent Prawn Fishery

PUBLIC consultation is now open on the draft management plan for the Gulf St Vincent Prawn Fishery.

The plan includes changes to help ensure the environmental and economic sustainability of the fishery into the future.

It will also replace the current plan, which came into effect on July 1, 2017 and will expire on June 30, 2022.

Following a review of the current plan, the Department of Primary Industries and Regions has developed a draft management plan with feedback from the Gulf St Vincent Prawn Fishery Management Advisory

"Significant changes proposed in the draft management plan include an updated framework which guides the maximum allowable fishing nights in a fishing season and in the pre-Christmas period," a PIRSA spokesper-

"The changes to this framework use new

information from a revised bio-economic model for the fishery.

"Changes also include improved performance indicators for monitoring fishery performance and increasing the number of fishery-independent surveys to two per year to monitor the performance of the fishery.

"The changes in the draft management plan have been considered by the GSVPF-MAC and reviewed by a world-renowned independent fisheries scientist.

"They are considered to be appropriate to maintain prawn stocks in Gulf St Vincent at sustainable levels, while also allowing for appropriate growth of the fishing sector, and move the fishery toward better economic performance."

# **CWMS** expansion in **Port Broughton**

WORKS on the \$3 million expansion of the Port Broughton Community Wastewater Management System have begun.

Contractors have been on site since February, with works so far including construction of an additional storage lagoon, two new concrete treatment tanks and approximately two kilometres of a planned three kilometre rising main which will connect Fisherman Bay residents to the upgraded treatment plant.

Barunga West Council mayor Leonie Kerley said the existing Port Broughton treatment plant was nearing capacity and required an upgrade to cater for the future development of Port Broughton. "The expansion is an integral part of allowing the freeholding of 400 properties at nearby Fisherman Bay that required connection to wastewater treatment as part of the development approval," she

"The expansion was identified as a key project with funding provided by the Local Government CWMS scheme as it allowed 400 properties access to essential wastewater treatment.

'The augmentation of the Fisherman Bay residents into the scheme will also provide additional reclaimed water in the future which will be utilised by the Port Broughton Golf Club and town oval as an additional benefit to our ratepayers."

Manager assets and infrastructure Steve Davey said the project was currently progressing as planned with expectations for it to be completed during July this year.

# **Light horses riding into Kadina**

THE Barossa Light Horse Historical Association will ride down the main street of Kadina on Sunday, March 27.

Acting as a training run for Anzac Day, April 25, the group will arrive in Kadina a day earlier and practise at a private property first.

The "dress rehearsal" down the main street will allow the group to adorn themselves in full uniform and towards the Soldiers Memorial Arch.

The group is named after the 23rd Light Horse Regiment, established in 1912 and disbanded in 1942, comprising troops from Adelaide, Tea Tree Gully, Gawler and Kapunda.

BLHA president Andrew Mepham said a local connection through member Steve Papps, Kadina, was behind the decision to come to the peninsula.

"Not many people in Kadina would have seen a mounted Lighthorse section and it is a great chance for Steve to show his dedication to his home town," Mr Mepham said.

"Kadina offers us an opportunity to train riding through the street to further familiarise our horses, who spend most of their lives as pampered paddock pets, with the sights and sounds of urban environment, traffic and spectators, before Anzac

Getting the opportunity to parade in such a fashion is a proud moment, according to Mr Mepham.

"It's a proud moment to ride in full uniform information down any street representing the Lighthorse," he said.

"It's a mixture of sombre reflection and respect for those who we are representing."

The association began operating in 1985 with 14



"They'd thought of everything, it really is amazing what they do there.

"So many (rural) people rely on the lodges for support, I don't know what we would have done without

The \$30 million project has been supported by a \$10 million state government grant; construction started in January 2021.

"We do not routinely visit nest sites simply for interest's sake and photographs," a group member explained.

"Photos of colour banded birds are formally logged as sightings and sent to the Australian Bird Banding Scheme in Canberra, which makes it an effective way to monitor osprey movements in addition to satellite tracking."

## Frequently asked questions

1. What is advance care planning?

Advance care planning is an on-going process of shared planning for current and future healthcare. It involves talking about a person's values, beliefs and preferences so they can guide decision making when the person cannot make or communicate their decisions. This program is supported by funding from the Australian Government.

- 2. Who needs to do advance care planning? Everyone should consider advance care planning, regardless of their age or health. It can be particularly important to individuals with an advanced chronic illness, a lifelimiting illness, aged 75-plus or at risk of losing competence.
- 3. When is an Advance Care Directive used? These are only used if a person is unable to

make or communicate their decisions. The directive would then be used to guide the decisions made by the medical staff in consultation with an appointed substitute decision maker if one has been nominated, and family.

#### 4. Why is it helpful to make an Advance Care Directive?

Completing an Advance Care Directive often reassures individuals and their families as they have a clear idea of what is desired by the person in the event of illness or injury.

#### 5. What happens if a person does not have an advance care plan?

In the event of serious illness, doctors will make treatment decisions based on their assessment of the best interests of the person. This may include treatments that the person would not want.

The first five ducks were retrieved before canoeists Michael Ellis and Matt


Durdin rescued the others from heading out to sea when the tide turned.







# Summer weed control in a high input cost year

WEEDSMART is still encouraging farmers to spray their summer weeds despite the high cost of glyphosate.

Western extension agronomist Peter Newman said spraying summer weeds is one of the greatest returns on investment in modern agriculture - preserving soil nitrogen and moisture reserves for the following crop.

"As Dr James Hunt's research at La Trobe University, Victoria showed, the top foot of soil will dry out over summer, regardless of how much stubble is on the soil surface, but transpiration by summer weeds is the only mechanism that can remove water from below 30 centimetres," Mr Newman said.

"I believe it will still be worthwhile because summer spraying preserves soil nitrogen, which is also very expensive, and the outlook for high grain prices is strong.

"In 2010 to 2012, Colin McMaster from NSW DPI did some great research which showed the measurable benefit of summer weed control was \$7.20 per dollar invested, at a time when both herbicide costs and grain prices were lower than they are today.

"If we double the 2010-12 cost of a summer herbicide spray program and use the 2010-12 grain prices of \$240/t wheat and \$500/t canola, the return on investment drops from \$7.20 per dollar spent on spraying, to about \$3.50.

'If we then increase the wheat price to \$360/t and canola to \$750/t, and keep the chemical costs high, the benefit cost increases to about \$5.50 per dollar spent — still a worthwhile return on investment when considering just the benefit of the conserved soil moisture."

The second big benefit to flow from summer weed control is increased soil nitrogen, Mr Newman

"The WeedSmart Big 6 promotes tactics to keep weed numbers low because that is the best way to tackle herbicide resistance and grow more crop," he said.

"The double-knock tactic is a highly effective tool that is worth considering, even at higher chemical costs currently affecting growers."







For reasons of public safety, there is a permanent exclusion zone covering land, sea and air around the Port Wakefield Establishment. Specific details on the Port Wakefield Prohibited Area can be obtained from Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No GN 26, 4 July 1990, and is shown on the diagram below. Trespassing in this Area is strictly prohibited and very dangerous due to the presence of unexploded bombs. Any person found within the Prohibited Area or on Defence land will be subject to prosecution.

Specific test and evaluation activities may also require restricting public access to the Port Wakefield Defence Practice Areas over specific periods with these areas articulated in the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No. GN 40, 7 October 1992, and also identified on the diagram below. **Seafood recipe,** sweet chilli salmon with a mango salad: *Ingredients* — 300g Atlantic salmon (pieces), 2 mangoes, 1 sliced red onion, half chopped capsicum, 1 grated carrot, vegetable oil, mirin wine, sweet chilli sauce, Preparation prepare a tossed green mango salad with all ingredients other than fish and add a splash of mirin wine. Cut salmon into cubes, coat with sauce, season well, fry in a hot pan and cook for 2 mins, turning once. Serve with a glass of dry white

Wallaroo: Jetty traffic has decreased in the past week but there are some nice tommy ruff (Australian herring) to be caught in the late evenings. Blue crabs and garfish have been the goto species off The Magazine and around the ferry markers about 2km offshore. Riley Shoal has a few squid and garfish.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Jetty-based fishing has been on the quiet side but canny locals fishing from the shore on the northern side of the car park have been catching a couple of yellowfin whiting from here and Barker Rocks (south). Boat crews are reporting gar, snook, squid and blue crabs from

the West Light grounds and a few King George whiting from the Steamer Channel.

Point Turton: Gar have been caught from the jetty, Minlacowie and Point Souttar in the past week. KG whiting are also out from The Pines and

the Banks. Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: Salmon trout and mullet reports have improved from the Dust Hole and Berry Bay and these fish should also start appearing at Hillocks Drive and Mozzie Flat in coming weeks. Big ruff are at Stenhouse Bay jetty and boat crews caught KG whiting, flathead, snook and red nannygai out from Marion Bay over the weekend.

Edithburgh: Try the jetty for late afternoon tommy ruff and squid. Boat crews have fished Troubridge Light for blue morwong, whiting and snook at Marion Reef on the way home.

Stansbury/Ardrossan: Yellowfin whiting have staged a minor resurgence off The Hut, Port Vincent and Pine Point, with fresh bloodworms working well as bait of choice. The Stansbury and Ardrossan jetties have the odd blue crab, while boat crews have reported KG whiting from the Orontes Bank and Gus Shoal. Windara Reef has sauid on the drift.
