SYP boasts nation's best

YORKE Peninsula tourism experiences have received national recognition.

Point Turton Caravan Park took out top honours at the Grey Nomad Awards while the Southern Yorke Peninsula Water Tower Mural Trail was a runner-up in the Australian Street Art Awards. The park initially won the Best Grey Nomad Small Caravan Park category then took out the Best of the Best award.

The Best of the Best is handed to the nominee which impressed the judges the most, as determined by the highest cumulative score from all category winners.

"Being recognised at a national level is extremely exciting, to be awarded the

Best Grey Nomad Small Caravan Park is a great achievement," park managers Malcolm and Dani Wheadon said.

"However, we were not expecting to also take out the Best of the Best award and for the judges to be so impressed by what our park offers really demonstrates how far we have come.

"We have had incredible support from Yorke Peninsula Council in our time as managers and feel privileged to be able to share such an incredible location with so many fantastic guests."

Malcolm and Dani said the awards provide an opportunity to showcase not only the caravan park but also southern Yorke Peninsula.

Where are our SMOs?

DO the people of Narungga understand recent health and healthcare claims made by independent Fraser Ellis? I certainly don't.

Decentralisation of bureaucracy and forming the "locally" governed Yorke and Northern Local Health Network was always risky for areas like

There was always going to be a natural bias towards the largest health service in the LHN.

As a member of the Liberal Government, Mr Ellis would have known this, but supported the model without ensuring reasonable balance in service delivery across the LHN.

To excise Port Pirie Regional Health Service from the YNLHN as it stands, would create an unsustainable service without critical mass.

Carving Wallaroo from Port Pirie would mean a depleted workforce to deliver services in such a thin market.

I don't disagree Wallaroo Hospital should be the health service hub for Yorke Peninsula.

Current models of care are delivered based on a critical mass of health.

Mr Ellis has been vocal about brokering a model for salaried medical doctors. A model doesn't treat people in A&E, doctors do. The loss of local GPs in the emergency room is profound.

The government has been content to pay FIFO locums exorbitant fees (and expenses) rather than supporting local doctors who know their communities and patients.

The locum arrangement is four times more expensive than remunerating the local GP workforce and importantly, supporting those who care for our communities.

Decentralisation has taken four years to gain momentum and it's proven cumbersome and expensive.

Before the last election, the Liberal Party announced a commitment to invest \$20 million directly into country health to fill skill gaps and attract specialists. Part of that commitment was to to assist teaching and training in country hospitals, as well as doubling the number of medical interns in regional SA.

The model should provide opportunities for student doctors to rotate through regions for enrichment. Rotating student doctors is also about rotating GPs during training, as well as doctors training in hospitals (surgical trainees, ED trainees and other specialties).

As it stands, a rotation to the regions is not seen as an opportunity for enrichment because of the lack of support.

I have questions but can't find answers.

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\$250m development at The Dunes

A \$250 million development is being proposed for The Dunes, Port Hughes.

Metacap Developments and partners held an information briefing session with Copper Coast Council and members of the public to begin stage two of The Dunes on Monday, February 28.

The project could include retail, tourism and medical outlets, residential and aged-care lots, eco-camping facilities, open space including a lake, golf course and green areas, as well as maintenance and storage facilities.

Metacap Developments director Alex Jimenez said he and his team were committed to the area.

"We've identified the Copper Coast as a very interesting part of South Australia," Mr Jimenez "We are here to stay — we see a lot of potential here."

Mr Jimenez said they wanted to create an over 50s village, among other things, as part of stage two of The Dunes.

"We want to see better accommodation and commercial areas such as coffee shops develop gradually in Port Hughes," he said.

"We understand we need to co-exist with other developments in the area and make sure we are all complementing one another.

"This is our 20-year plan for stage two of The Dunes and we plan on being very transparent with the community and council for what the area and the people want and need."

Council CEO Russell Peate said he was very pleased with the development.

"The developers and investors made the effort to travel from Queensland to present their proposal to not only council but to the community in a public information session," Mr Peate said.

"It was important the community was able to see, hear and understand what is being proposed and what this major project means for the Copper Coast.

"We will continue to work with the developers regarding this major development."

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said this was a premium parcel of land and the development which was presented certainly did it justice.

"It will be a quality development providing accommodation options, particularly for the over 50s, and should complement the rest of the developments in the area," Mrs Talbot said.

"I am looking forward to seeing this progress and the opportunities it will bring."

Metacap Developments plans to lodge development approval in April and hopes to start works late this year. STAGE TWO... Mohammed Limbada, Metacap Developments director Alex Jimenez, Copper Coast Council mayor Roslyn Talbot, Nicholas Jimenez and Tim Xia are looking forward to working collaboratively to begin development on stage two of The Dunes in Port Hughes.

The driver was charged with failing to comply with a police direction and is awaiting further charges pending a forensic anal-


Watch found at Wallaroo

Narungga decides 2022

AS the 2022 state election nears, the Yorke Peninsula Country Times will pose important topics for discussion to the Narungga candidates vying for your vote. This week's topic is roads and infrastructure.

STATE and federal grant funding schemes are vital to Narungga's five local government areas.

Road safety is indelibly linked to these schemes, which include the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program and Remote Roads Upgrade

Yorke Peninsula Council alone encompasses a 3400km road network — yet those local roads siphon huge amounts of your council rates.

Much greater urgency in funding our critical commodity routes will enable produce and freight to be transported faster, better and safer.

The next state government must accept its responsibilities on all our Narungga roads, not leave us bogged in the mud of mediocrity.

There are processes in place which aid in distribution of funds to councils to help pay for roads and infrastructure.

It's ok but not perfect.

Commissioning a review is my aim.

Grant funding has helped improve many roads such as the long-awaited Bay Road at Moonta Bay.

However, urban rubble roads with no stormwater infrastructure around the Copper Coast need drastic attention.

This is mirrored throughout our electorate as seen around Point Turton along North Coast Road. Locals have waited too long!

A continued, tripartite arrangement will be an enabler for greater access to the region, supporting jobs and broader safety for locals and tourists alike.

This support for road networks would give councils breathing room to spend on other community assets used by you, like playgrounds, parks, boat ramps, jetties, sports grounds and more.

I will work tirelessly to ensure Narungga gets its fair

NARUNGGA has gone through a period of unprecedented investment in our road network, from shoulder sealing, re-surfacing and complete rebuilds of country roads to the massive Port Wakefield overpass and duplication project, with the latter a genuine nation-building one which will finally remove crash corner where multiple lives have been lost over the years.

This need was flagged for 20 years.

While I was campaigning in 2017-18, I promised to a great many locals on their doorstep I would fight to get the road up and down the middle of our leg

That has now happened, and soon the entire length of road between Arthurton and Minlaton will have been redone.

Many felt they would not see this in their lifetime. Long-neglected Bay Road in Moonta and the entrance road into Wallaroo from Kadina are finally getting the treatment they deserve as major tourism thoroughfares.

It took a petition and loud noise but it's finally

happening.

There are more roads to do — Bute to Port Broughton, Minlaton to Port Vincent and North Coast Road to name just three — and I also am advocating for a Turning Lane Fund to improve safety into tourism townships off local highways.

Other needs include boat ramp improvements and infrastructure to fix mobile black spots but with more than \$210 million invested in our roads since 2018, a good start has been made.

Narungga is finally seeing significant investment. and I am seeking re-election to continue that work.

ROADS in Narungga are in a bad state.

They've been neglected for decades. Councils can only do so much with limited

There's a huge backlog in regional road maintenance and the state government needs to

A lot of streets in Narungga communities need sealing, and our highways need a lot of work.

A good example is the Copper Coast Highway.

I'm told driving on it is like riding a roller coaster. Some upgrades have happened either side of Paskeville but the whole stretch urgently needs

A well-maintained road network is crucial for many reasons: productivity, tourism and road safety.

Rather than spending \$662 million on a new basketball stadium in Adelaide, I think Steven Marshall should put that money towards regional

Roads aren't the only infrastructure that's lacking. Public housing has been in decline for years, and with the current housing crisis it's clear we need more investment in affordable and public housing.

Another important piece of infrastructure is the hospital in Wallaroo.

It services a large area including Kadina and Moonta, and must cater for tourists as well.

It's old — so old that some local residents say they'd rather travel to an Adelaide hospital than use the one at Wallaroo.

SAFE, reliable roads represent a core infrastructure need on the Yorke Peninsula.

Their regular upkeep is paramount, as is the sealing of previously unsealed roads.

This allows freight, grain and delivery trucks better and safer access, commensurate with the increasing tourism traffic.

Moonta is a good example.

There is an established heavy traffic flow bypass

that remains unsealed, leading to large trucks going past the school and through the village.

There are the booming developments of Port Hughes and Moonta Bay, increasing traffic throughout the town, turning previously quiet streets into traffic snarls.

An obvious fix would be to seal existing, alternative routes, spreading the load, allowing for safer and smoother access to and from the school, doctors and all town amenities.

Moonta is not unique in this sense. Every town and farming community on the peninsula has similar tales to tell.

Yorke Peninsula is expanding rapidly and with this comes the need for improved roads and upkeep.

When last in government, Labor made a considerable effort in making our roads safer with safety barriers installed throughout the state.

This was a welcome initiative towards saving lives. But there is a long way to go and the rewards are clear, not only in encouraging tourism and business opportunities, but improving access for emergency vehicles, including smoother rides for ambulances.

Labor is committed to improving the carriageways, and, with the state's future in mind, recognises the need to be ahead of the game.

allaroo aquatic facility back in the spotlig

NEW plans are afloat for the Wallaroo aquatic facility.

Copper Coast Council has contracted Wallbridge Gilbert Aztec Engineers to modify and cost plans, with the project estimated to cost \$3,337,971.

Works would commence October 2022 and be completed by March 2024.

Council has lodged an application with the federal government's Building Better Regions Fund Round Six to help cover the costs of works.

CEO Russell Peate said if funding was received there would be the opportunity for further consultation with council for input on the final design and interested stakeholders. "A final design will then be com-

pleted prior to the tenders being called," Mr Peate said.

"We want the final design to stand the test of time and the weather."

Wallaroo Swimming and Aquatic Group members Jan Paull, Chris Wall and Julie Donnell said, after six years of no swimming facility, they were hopeful the day would soon come.

"We want to see a facility the whole community can use and enjoy," the

"We are pleased council is seeking this funding and they continue to be supportive of our work.

"We are positive Wallaroo will have an aquatic facility in the coming years." Federal Member for Grey Rowan

Ramsey also sent letters of support in favour of the new swimming facility. "It is very clear the Wallaroo aquatic

facility would satisfy a definite community need for a safe swimming enclosure that is easily accessed and that would enable recreational and competition swimming, and allow

instruction to the highest levels," Mr Ramsey said.

"The aquatic facility would bring enormous social and economic benefits to the Copper Coast region.

"It would certainly lift spirits of a community impacted by drought then

Mediation ongoing

The first pre-mediation conference between parties for the failed Wallaroo swimming enclosure and pontoon was held last week.

Council is seeking a commercial outcome for the project, with Mr Peate and council's solicitors working for 12 months to get to this point.

"Including council, there are five solicitors and four insurers to deal with in endeavouring to reach a commercial resolution," Mr Peate said.

"It is pleasing that finally, after many months of documentation being provided between the parties, the premediation conference has been agreed to by all parties and is progressing.

"I will continue to be vigilant in progressing as best I can a commercial outcome for council."

THE federal, state and local road network requires continual maintenance and upgrades.

Sonia's Ukrainian love

FOR Sonia Kisielecki, of Port Hughes, the current situation in Ukraine feels like history repeat-

Russia launched an invasion on its eastern neighbour earlier this month, in scenes reminiscent of those which forced Mrs Kisielecki's family to leave Europe during World War II.

Mrs Kisielecki still has ties to Ukraine, with niece Halina living in Vinnytsia, in the country's west.

With conflict looming, Halina recently reached out to her family to find a way to Australia, but has been unable to do so amid difficult international laws.

The cousin of Mrs Kisielecki's husband Mick, lives in Lviv — his two sons have been forced into "taking arms" and serving the

"In 1939 my parents had to leave their land and go elsewhere, and now 83 years later, Ukraine is under siege again from a megalomaniacal leader," she said.

"That's how sadly we feel about it, the loss of life and the loss of beautiful culture the country has, is devastating.

"The whole Ukrainian community is grieving, because there would not be one of us (Ukrainian) here who doesn't have connections over there."

Mrs Kisielecki said the distance and connection difficulties make the matter harder to deal with.

"I try to ring Ivan (Mick's cousin) on the phone so at least there's contact to know everything is okay, but no answer," she said.

"We feel very helpless over here, I mean what can we do?

'The power of prayer, vigils, getting together and talking about it is essentially all we've got at the moment."

"I hope it doesn't evolve into World War III and I hope he (Russian president Vladimir Putin) isn't going to go and take back those countries that were once (part of the USSR) and that Ukraine isn't the beginning of that domino effect.

"His own people don't want it."

Vaccine mandates ease for some sectors

VACCINE mandates for SA start of their shift, and wear a Police and healthcare workers have been replaced with a managerial direction to allow more people back into the workforce.

It will require officers who have not received two doses of an approved vaccine to undertake a rapid antigen test at the

properly fitted respirator-style mask for the duration of their

Police commissioner Grant Stevens said more than 98.5 per cent of the South Australian police force was vaccinated.

"Whilst the managerial

direction enables unvaccinated employees to return to their substantive duties, there will be some limitations regarding their ability to attend some settings such as residential aged care facilities, disability facilities and the forensic science building," he said.

"Unvaccinated healthcare

workers on a single occasion or on an infrequent and irregular basis will need to produce a negative rapid antigen test either the day of or 24 hours prior to going to work, and wear appropriate PPE.

"The change in rules allows unvaccinated officers to attend

call outs at emergency departments.

"The rules will also affect businesses such as florists or food delivery, who attend hospitals for one-off visits.

"However, unvaccinated officers will not be allowed into South Australian venues with vaccine mandates

as Adelaide Oval.

"All of those particular circumstances will be managed by their frontline supervisors."

Mr Stevens has suggested the state could be free from most Covid restrictions by the beginning of April when the state's emergency declaration expires.

EVs charging ahead on YP

YORKE Peninsula is set to receive three new fast electric vehicle charging stations.

Kadina, Ardrossan Edithburgh will benefit after the state government awarded the RAA a \$12.4 million grant to construct and operate Australia's first statewide rapid EV charging network.

The network will comprise 536 fast and rapid charging points across 140 sites in 52 rural, regional and metropolitan service locations; construction is expected to begin by midyear.

YP's three new sites will add to the 11 already in operation between Port Broughton and Marion Bay.

RAA managing director Ian Stone said the state-wide charging network was a historical moment in the transition to EVs.

"RAA believes EVs are the future of motoring, and our research shows almost 80 per cent of motorists would consider buying an electric vehicle," Mr Stone said.

"The maximum distance between charging points will be around 250-kilometres — well within the range of a typical EV battery.

"We know drivers' enthusiasm for EVs is curbed by the availability of charging points, so this new network will go a long way to allaying that range anxiety.'

RAA's future mobility senior manager Mark Borlace said the network will be a mix of super-fast and fast charging stations.

"We've been pushing for more infrastructure for EVs for some time now," Mr Borlace said.

"Any charging stations on the highways will be the superfast chargers because they'll be in places where people want to get in, get charged and then get out.

"Inside the towns, off the highway, will be slightly slower ones and they will be in places where you are likely to get out and shop for an hour or so while your car charges."

Murdock Mitsubishi principal Michael Murdock said there are still obstacles in the way for the rural use of electric vehicles.

"Until there are more rapid charging outlets where there is money to be made and the private sector get involved, it will be government and RAA charging stations, and that won't help me sell more electric cars," he said.

"I genuinely believe at this stage the plug-in hybrid is the answer for rural Australia.

"Depending on how you go about it, you can get less than two litres per 100 km fuel efficiency and nearly 60 km on electric mode per charge.

Previously GP clinics at Wallaroo, Kadina and Moonta had stepped away from the Wallaroo Hospital due to staffing pressures, with Maitland making the shift in late November.

Practice manager Michelle Nelligan said her general practitioners had been reducing their time at the hospital because of increased demands.

"Our last doctor finally made the decision they could no longer cover it either," Ms Nelligan said.

"It was a hard decision but, due to increased demands of Covid and the shortage of doctors, they felt they couldn't do it anymore."

Maitland Hospital has had its share of staffing issues in the past year, with several reports of nursing staff running the emergency department with the support of MedSTAR and SAAS paramedics when locums were unavailable.

A Yorke and Northern Local Health Network spokesperson said the hospital will continue to be staffed by locums and an Ardrossan general practitioner.

"All patients presenting to Maitland Hospital are assessed and treated according to their clinical needs, with trained nursing staff able to access SAVES when required and support from MedSTAR and SAAS paramedics," they said.

"We work with our locum providers and local general practitioners to ensure we can cover any unplanned leave.

"We continue to work closely with local medical practices and locum providers to cover the roster and source locums when needed, in line with the Enterprise Agreement, to ensure ongoing medical support for the hospital.

"Nursing staff are trained in triaging all presentations and are able to access SAVES for category three, four and five presentations.

"We thank our staff for their hard work and ongoing commitment to provide the best possible care for our patients."

This comes as SA Health is close to finalising the recruitment process for three salaried rural generalist practitioner positions to replace the locum model as recommended in the state's Rural Health Workforce plan.

"It is the first of its kind on the Copper Coast and I think other sites will be keen to explore

"Patients can self-refer to the service and brochures will be handed to them with their arrival pack.


"People can also ask their healthcare provider about the program to organise a visit."

Statement The Commitment emphasises the boards' ongoing dedication to collaborate and partner with the First Nations people of the


Previously, the boards had formed an Aboriginal Engagement Committee and facilitated Healthy Country Planning.





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Bill for cheaper home batteries

"The project is part of the ongoing transformation of South Australia into a producer of green hydrogen of global significance based on our outstanding renewable energy resources.





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



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Preparing to sell SP Hay facility

Sonny Coombs JOURNALIST

SV Partners has engaged Elders South Australia to market SP Hay Group assets, including the site near Paskeville.

Expressions of interest for the large-scale processing and storage facility site will close on Thursday, March 31.

The sale of the site, as well as another located in Western Australia, will be used to pay back NAB debt followed by

An estimated \$14.5 million is owed to creditors, which include about 70 individuals and businesses, many of which are South Australian farmers.

The company, which was owned and operated by director Stuart Price, flagged trade tensions with China as a major downfall.

This claim is disputed by farmers who have stated problems with the business started long before trade issues.

SV Partners preliminary investigations found a number of other issues played a part in the company's downfall, including:

- Involvement in numerous court actions resulting in high expenditure in legal fees and distraction of the director from running the
- Non-payment of growers leading to lack of supply of hay for processing, lack of accurate financial information due to long-running dispute with former accountant and delay in having new accountant assist in bringing accounts up to date.
- Failing to resolve a sale of assets or take action to appoint a voluntary administrator at an early enough point when illiquidity impacted the company's ability to trade.

move on, but there were plenty of mixed emotions after holidaying at North Beach for most of her life," he

"The majority of bidders had the intention to knock the home down and start again, but I think the purchaser will enjoy it for what it is and has no view of demolition."

Mr Smith acknowledged the home was in need of significant repair.

"The structure itself isn't where the value comes from, but rather the amazing outlook right on the beachfront — it's as good as it gets," he said.

"It's a great investment and I think we'll be looking back in 10 years thinking it sold extremely cheaply."





The Proof and Experimental Establishment Port Wakefield is a vital Defence test and evaluation capability that has supported Defence

These firings may require specific tidal or weather conditions, and are critical for the safety of current and new Defence capabilities. Members of the public may notice noise, vibration, flashes and/or smoke during the testing. There is no risk to the public outside of the gazetted Defence Practice Areas.

For reasons of public safety, there is a permanent exclusion zone covering land, sea and air around the Port Wakefield Establishment. Specific details on the Port Wakefield Prohibited Area can be obtained from Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No GN 26, 4 July 1990, and is shown on the diagram below. Trespassing in this Area is strictly prohibited and very dangerous due to the presence of unexploded bombs. Any person found within the Prohibited Area or on Defence land will be subject to prosecution.

Specific test and evaluation activities may also require restricting public access to the Port Wakefield Defence Practice Areas over specific periods with these areas articulated in the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No. GN 40, 7 October 1992, and also identified on the diagram below. This may affect access to the Gulf of St Vincent at Port Wakefield and Port Parham.

However, box office success isn't the only thing these films have in common — they are all very problematic.


It would be fair to say they don't just have undertones of racism, homophobia, transphobia and body shaming but are blatantly all of those things.

HOT FISHING TIPS

Recipe, Salt 'n' pepper garfish: *Ingredients* – 4-6 fillets fresh garfish, 1 green and 1 red chilli (diced), 1 bunch spring onions (diced), plain flour, salt and Preparation — dust the fish fillets with flour and cook for 2-3 mins in vegie and olive oil mix. Separately fry chillies and spring onions and sprinkle over the fish. Season with salt and pepper and serve with a glass of Colombard white wine.

Wallaroo: A grain ship was anchored well offshore when I arrived back in town on Saturday as those persistent southerly winds swept along the coast. Hopeful jetty-based anglers have tried for blue crabs, tommy ruff (Australian herring). Boat crews grabbed their chance mid to late last week and fished for gar, blueys and squid at the Magazine.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Both jetties have had reasonably large numbers of anglers as grey nomads caravan their way around Yorke Peninsula Gar, small baby squid and yellowfin whiting have come from the jetties and local beaches on the high tides. Boat crews went far and wide from Cape Elizabeth to West Light for gar, squid, blueys and

Point Turton: I spent most of last week down this neck of the woods and offshore fishing

opportunities were few and far between. Gar and sprat tommy ruff can be caught out from Point Souttar and The Pines, while the jetty has good catches of garfish before dusk. Hardwicke Bay has whiting but they are in 4m of water and only biting in the afternoon tides and sea breezes. Berley is

Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bays: Strong onshore winds continue to be part of the local fishing equation Try Gym Beach and Daly Head for salmon trout and garfish from the southern rocks at Pondalowie Bay. The two jetties have squid, tommies and salmon trout. Port Moorowie anglers

have caught fat gar at Mozzie Flat and Point Gilbert. **Edithburgh:** The broken ground at Limits and north of Troubridge Island have King George whiting to 37cm. Big snook are at Marion Reef while blue crabs are at the jetty and Coobowie.

Stansbury: Rakers continue their work off The Hut and northern beaches towards Black Point. KG whiting and snook came from the Orontes Bank again last week and there are blue crabs in the water just north of the oyster lease marker.

Ardrossan: There have been some good catches of gar and blueys but many of the blueys are undersize and need to be returned to the water. The jetty has a couple of mulloway at night, blue crabs and sauid.
