# **Ramsey nearing re-election**

LIBERAL Member for Grey Rowan Ramsey is firming to win his seat for the sixth time, following the federal election on Saturday, May 21.

However, a Liberal win in the expansive outback seat had little bearing on the nationwide result, with

All polling booths in Grey have returned their first preference results, with Mr Ramsey receiving 37,900 votes (44.9 per cent) and his nearest rival, Labor's Julie Watson, 18,309.

I rang the person responsible for the staff but didn't get a response so I left a voice message and a text, but no reply.

I then spoke to another member of council and asked what the council's policy regarding plants or trees which had been affected by

overspray was and he said he didn't know. Out of frustration, I texted the CEO and asked him if council has a replacement policy

on damaged plants. He replied that he didn't know but would get

back to me and told me I would hear from council within the next couple of days.

That was weeks ago and I am still waiting. What I don't understand is that if I have a fire in my backyard, a council inspector will come to my property and threaten me with a fine if I don't put it out because I am zoned residential.

If I cut a tree down on council land, I will be threatened with a fine if I haven't got a permit, yet council can spray people's gardens and not be responsible; plant trees on footpaths and when they blow over and cause damage they are not responsible and even get flooded because of poor stormwater design and council still won't wear the blame.

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# Rallying together for Broughton child care

BARUNGA West Council has taken a step closer to securing a childcare service.

Council has collaborated with Regional Development Australia to develop a business case, and recently helped establish a working party, to continue lobbying for a childcare facility in Port Broughton.

The influx of activity has come after several young families expressed their concern over the absence of services.

The facility is expected to cost up to

\$1.9 million, in addition to ongoing operational costs in the vicinity of \$300,000 per year.

CEO Maree Wauchope said a minimum of 40 children enrolled five days per week would be required for the facility to be feasible.

"A childcare facility is going to take a significant investment and we will need to work with state and/or federal governments to make this feasible," Ms Wauchope said.

"We have looked at what was behind Yorke Peninsula Council's recent success in securing \$2.25 million towards child care and it was evident they had a group of strong-minded representatives to secure the facility."

Council's business case has been bolstered by the support of a working party, including local parents Jess Winen, Jess Hewett and Kristy Trask.

Mrs Winen said the group has been gathering as much evidence as possible to support the case.

"We're now in the process of figuring out which days a week everyone is available and the ages of all our potential children," she said.

"I've come up with at least 50 children who need child care in Port Broughton now, as well as seven who will need it in the near future. "Numbers are probably the biggest

thing for us now." Mrs Winen said she was confident in council's plan to continue building the case, with the help of a knowledgeable group of reps.

"It's great that we're already in the limelight for future funding," she said.

"This will either grow into a bigger problem or, if we secure a facility, will draw more families to the region."

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said he has received several calls from parents in need of accessible and convenient child care on Yorke Peninsula. "This is not just about providing parents with childcare services, but also giving country kids the same opportunities for early learning as city kids," Mr Ellis said.

"Families on YP are travelling further and further to access early learning, and where we have service providers, we also have long waiting lists.

"I have raised the topic with the new Labor Government and also plan to reach out to the Australian Children's Education and Quality Authority for assistance and advice that results in improved access to child care."



# Grants available for day care providers

A CALL has been put out for local family day care providers.

Barunga West Council has offered grants of up to \$2000 per applicant to fund training for people interested in becoming day care providers.

"Anyone interested in providing day care should collect grant application forms available from our office or online," CEO Maree Wauchope said.

"The training takes up to 12 months and council is willing to support those in the community, with the ultimate goal of seeing them set up family day care in their own homes as early as next year.

"I want to work with those educators and the Department for Education to try and find a way forward.

"Family day care services in Port Broughton will provide an immediate solution for some of our community members in desperate need of child care."

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### New Covid-19 laws set to pass in SA

NEW laws designed to handle South Australia's Covid-19 management for the second half of this year are set to pass parliament.

Under the laws — which will allow the Emergency Declaration to be scrapped by June 30 — a maximum penalty for pandemic breaches is two years' jail or a \$75,000 fine for businesses and \$20,000 for an individual.

The government made a deal with the Greens and SA Best in the Legislative Council, incorporating some crossbench amendments to the bill which passed the lower house earlier in the month.

The amendments include the creation of a Covid oversight committee for the next six months to assess any new restrictions put in place for people with the virus or close contacts.

Premier Peter Malinauskas said the changes would help end the Emergency Declaration at the end of June.

"We are now on track to realise that ambition, working closely with the Chief Public Health Officer and the Police Commissioner and now the whole parliament to see the passage of legislation that will enable that to occur," he said.

"I continue to acknowledge and absolutely thank the work of both the Police Commissioner and Professor Nicola Spurrier in seeing the state through the events of Covid using that emergency management declaration.

"But clearly we are coming to a period where that time is over and we start to restore the ordinary functioning of government in a traditional way."

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# **Kyam Maher visits Point Pearce**

ATTORNEY-General and Aboriginal Affairs Minister Kyam Maher visited Yorke Peninsula on Friday, May 20.

Mr Maher stopped at Maitland to speak to Yorke Peninsula Council before travelling to Point Pearce to speak with community members.

"It was an opportunity to visit on country at Point Pearce, speak to local people connected with and a part of the community and talk issues which affect day-to-day life, such as education, health and housing," he said.

Mr Maher said he was impressed with the work council was putting into the Point Pearce community.

"From a council point of view, it was great to talk to them about the partnerships they're building with local Aboriginal corporations and those at Point Pearce, and it's actually been really pleasing to see what council have been up to in that area," he said.

"From a high level, the fact they're communicating with stakeholders and local Aboriginal people to work through this, is simply impressive."

Mr Maher revealed a draft of 20 projects had been compiled by YPC to improve facilities in the town.

"So it's focuses such as refurbishing the youth centre, developing Wardang Island, the war memorial and sports centre are all things which are currently being looked at," he said.

"I'd like to pay tribute to that, because I think it's a brilliant initiative by the council and really it's useful for all levels of government to get an understanding of what is

## **SafeWork SA review**

THE adequacy of SafeWork SA's investigation into the death of Stansbury's Gayle Woodford is set to be reviewed by former federal court judge John Mansfield AM QC.

Mrs Woodford was employed as nurse in the APY Lands community of Fregon for the Nganampa Health Council when she was raped and murdered by Dudley Davey in March 2016.

Mr Davey was sentenced to life in prison the following year.

SafeWork SA launched an investigation into possible breaches of the Work Health and Safety Act 2012 by NHC after the Deputy Coroner delivered his findings and recommendations into Mrs Woodford's death.

But last month, SafeWork SA determined not to proceed with a prosecution against NHC on the basis there was no reasonable prospect of conviction.

independent legal advice from a senior barrister and experienced criminal prosecutor.

Attorney-General Kyam Maher said the review will also look at the agency's engagement with the Woodford family during the investigation.

The review is set to be completed by July 2022, and will be made publicly available. "No review or inquiry can make up for

the loss of Mrs Woodford, but I want to ensure her loved ones' views are heard," Mr Maher said.

"I have spoken with those supporting the Woodford family and I thank them for their time and for representing the family's concerns

"My thoughts are with the Woodford family. "I know personally how much Gayle was appreciated by those members of the Fregon community who she worked with and cared for."

allows him to be absent from his home between 9am and noon each Friday for the pur-

pose of attending Bunnings. He is also permitted to be absent (from his home) each Sunday for the purpose of religious worship.

Ms Gerente Ogar was flown to the Royal Adelaide Hospital with life-threatening head injuries, allegedly inflicted by her husband Mr Ogar, on Monday, July 26.

She passed away on Wednesday, July 28.

At his initial court hearing, Mr Ogar claimed Ms Gerente Ogar fell backwards and hit her head on the floor after she attacked him whilst drunk.

Mr Ogar will next appear in court at 2.15pm on Wednesday, June 29.

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# Task group to examine freight paths

A NEW task group is focusing on the development of new freight routes in the Copper Coast.

Local farmers, with local, state and federal government representatives, have formed the Copper Coast Agricultural Freight Task Group.

The group features Regional Development Australia Yorke and Mid North's Jo-anne Buchanan; local famers Craig Ayles, Matthew Chapman, Andrew Mill, Mark Schilling and John Kennett; CCC mayor Roslyn Talbot, CEO Russell Peate, director infrastructure services Tim Neumann and elected members Peter Sims, Dean Rodda and Bruce Schmidt; Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis and Member for Grey Rowan Ramsey.

Representatives are also being sought from Barunga West and YP Councils, T-Ports and Viterra, transport operators and the Department for Infrastructure and Transport, when required.

CEO Russell Peate and MsBuchanan presented the idea at Copper Coast Council's last information session.

Mr Peate said the need for the group was highlighted when the federal government called for applications under the Remote Roads funding program some months ago.

"An existing small farmer group, which had previously met with council regarding the state of rural roads, met a few times to see whether there was an opportunity to submit an application," he said.

"Unfortunately, the data and information required for the application could not be produced within the timeframe for the application to be submitted.

"Subsequent to this, the group and RDA suggested the possibility of forming a Copper Coast Agricultural Freight Task Group, particularly given the establishment of the export grain terminal by T-Ports."

Ms Buchanan said a medium to long-term strategic approach to freight route infrastructure improvements was needed in the region.

"We want to minimise, where possible, the interface between truck movements in townships, in particular where issues of safety are of concern and to consider domestic and tourism traffic interface issues," she said.

"Port Road, Kadina, and Blanche Terrace, Moonta, are two key roads of concern regarding truck movements and interaction with traffic activity, businesses, schools and tourism."

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said, while it was early days, she thought the group comprised a good mix of views.

"I think we will work well together to figure out some solutions," she said.

"Council will need to cooperate funding assistance and this group gives us the best chance to do so."

# Progress more difficult in opposition

WHILE the final makeup of this federal parliament is still to be decided, the Greens look to have gained two extra members in the House of Representatives and a swathe of six independents backed by activist group Climate 200 have been elected.

As many voters turned their backs on the big two parties, the crossbench has gone from seating eight members to 15.

Member for Grey Rowan Ramsey said he understands it may be harder to get things done for the region in opposition.

"I've had two terms in opposition before so it's not as though I don't know what I'm doing," he said.

"The Labor Party has made a commitment on roads in South Australia and I'll be making sure as a part of that, funding

is received for the Augusta Highway project." He said the overall party result

could be traced back to a select few issues, but also believes there were factors out of their control.

"I'm obviously very disappointed and surprised but the overall result is very skewed by what happened in Western Australia, which was a big swing to the ALP," Mr Ramsey said.

"That said, there are national reasons and there are also local reasons; now it becomes about listening and understanding what people most want.

"I think there were long-term savage attacks on the Prime Minister and his character from certain sections of the media which really weren't based on anything in particular.

"But the leadership had taken

# **Budget discussed at public meeting**

COPPER Coast Council's draft Annual Business Plan was discussed at a public meeting last Wednesday, May 18.

The 2022-23 plan is currently out for public consultation and council encourages the community to have their submissions in by Wednesday, June 1.

Council is planning a two per cent rate increase, in line with its longterm planning.

More than 30 submissions have been received so far, with the public expressing what they would like to see done over the next financial year. Submissions included upgrading stormwater, grass in the Kadina Dog Park, public toilets, creating more green spaces, cliff erosion, footpaths, North Beach sand management and more.

Acting CEO Katrina Borlace said specific objectives proposed for the 2022-23 year were consistent with council's Long Term Financial Plan and Asset Management Plans to ensure the long-term sustainability of council's financial performance and position.

"Council's 2022-23 revenue is budgeted to be \$32,501,770, of which approximately \$20,076,000 will be raised from general rates (excluding the landscape levy and CWMS service charges)," Mrs Borlace said.

"Council works to spread the rate burden fairly across all ratepayers offering flexible options for payment of rates for those who need them."

Council has budgeted for an operating deficit of \$449,400 in 2022-23. "The operating surplus/deficit

measures the difference between operating revenue and expenses for the period and council's long-term financial sustainability is dependent on ensuring that, on average over time, its expenses are less than its revenue," Mrs Borlace said.

Council noted a number of significant factors influenced the draft Annual Business Plan and budget including the increase in the Consumer Price Index and the impact of the pandemic.

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"At the end of the day, volunteers are the backbone of our local sporting clubs," he said.

# **Main street rejuvenation**

A PLAN to revitalise Robert Street, Maitland, has Yorke Peninsula Council excited.

Council engaged WAX Design to create a concept design for the main street, which was released to the public for consultation in April.

Mayor Darren Braund said he was pleased with the feedback from the public.

The concept deals with issues regarding the plane trees lining the street, creating a vibrant and welcoming town centre and improving pedestrian movement and public parking.

"It's been something council has

been talking about for a long time, particularly in regard to the plane trees which can cause issues to the pavements and the drainage system," Mr Braund said.

"The leaves can get caught up in the drainpipes which essentially causes localised flooding and is something we'd like to avoid.

"The root systems under the streets and footpaths, in some cases, wreak havoc for the concrete and pavement that's been laid."

Community consultation on the development was first held last October, with 24 key objectives developed.

The plan recommends gradually replacing the plane trees with others such as gum trees, tuckeroos and

hackberries, increasing the number of plants from 46 to 110 in the long term. A complete lack of event spaces in

the public realm has also been identified as a space for improvement. Mr Braund said it was a plan to

make the town more usable. "From a development point of view, we'd love for it to become a more attractive hub for people to come to," he said.

"Within that, we want to improve things such as accessibility for those who require it and increase parking so locals and those travelling through can stop easier.

"It's been an important town on the peninsula for decades but, with the way tourism works, it's quite often overlooked by those looking for a place to eat, stay and spend time at in favour of those on the beaches.

"The plan has been finalised and now we'll navigate through the steps to deal with the project piece by piece moving forward."

The report indicates that, if approved by council, projects will be developed over the next 10 years, implemented in terms of priority.

# **Up-to-date Fisherman Bay facilities in sight**

CONSTRUCTION is set to officially begin at Fisherman Bay this month.

Adelaide-based tender Bardavcol Pty Ltd has been appointed by Fisherman's Bay Management to commence work on a range of infrastructure projects.

Among the improvements will be new wastewater collection and stormwater systems, road upgrades, coastal protection measures and a widened boat ramp.

The \$23 million redevelopment comes after an agreement which allows Barunga West Council to secure funds through the sales of allotments from FBM.

More than 100 of the 400 land titles have so far been issued to owners as part of the freeholding process, FBM chair David Hosking said.

"Five of the 17 freeholding stages have now been completed — we're working at about one stage per month, but this should gradually speed up," Mr Hosking said.

"Everyone is really happy to be receiving their titles, as what seemed like was a never-ending process is finally coming to fruition.

"The purpose of the development is so the shack owners have more security of their tenure with up-to-date infrastructure."

Mr Hosking said the township has served the surrounding community well since being established in the late 1920s.

"It's now time to move forward with a new development and invest in 21st-century amenities for



the town," he said.

"We're looking forward to delivering on infrastructure which is now a requirement on FBM to construct for council.

"It's important we make it as viable as possible for council to maintain over its lifetime."

Mr Hosking said Bardavcol plans to engage with the community during its works. "(Once Bardavcol has

mobilised) it will review the works program and be in a position to give information to the community as to the timing of various works in the different parts of Fisherman Bay," he said. "The program of infrastructure works will take about 12 months from the time of commencement, with completion expected by the middle of 2023."

Council CEO Maree Wauchope praised the appointment.

"They (Bardavcol) are good at keeping dust down, dealing with ratepayer concerns and having an interface with the community," Ms Wauchope said.

"I'm really excited to see how they work with our community and ratepayers." Stage six of the freeholding process is expected to be set-

#### Residents warned to watch stamp duty

Barunga West Council has urged Fisherman Bay residents to check what they are paying in stamp duty.

Numerous ratepayers have expressed concerns about paying stamp duty on the value of existing improvements on their land.

In any typical purchase, stamp duty would apply to the entire property value, but with purchasers already owning existing improvements, council has secured an exemption to avoid residents paying extra. CEO Maree Wauchope said

it was important to ensure

purchasers would not be paying excessive stamp duty when acquiring freehold land.

"Residents who have paid or are required to pay stamp duty on the value of their existing improvements should contact council or Fisherman's Bay Management, as we would consider that to be an unfair outcome," Ms Wauchope said.

"Calculating the land value at Fisherman Bay is simple it is the purchase price of the freehold land as specified in the sale contract.

"It is important purchasers' conveyancers are aware of this resolution so they can ensure the stamp duty is not based on a higher valuation." ON THE HORIZON... #### SAPN rate proposed for Fisherman Bay

A SEPARATE rate has been proposed for residents of Whiting Road, Fisherman Bay.

The rate would cover the cost of the relocation of SA Power Networks infrastructure along 22-88 Whiting Road.

Potential landmark developments in the township have meant existing SA Power Networks overhead electricity mains are positioned above private allotments.

Barunga West Council recently identified 38 properties which could be impacted by associated power poles and wires.

Concerned residents had been in contact with council, which later discussed with SAPN the potential for the infrastructure to be shifted.

This led SAPN to prioritise pole and wire upgrades on Whiting Road on the basis works would be completed as part of a shared cost arrangement.

Council has proposed to recoup the separate rate payments for the SAPN relocation works which would later benefit the affected property owners.

The proposal is out for public consultation until Monday, June 20.

BEWS Square, Wallaroo, is under reconstruction.

Copper Coast Council director infrastructure services Tim Neumann said the upgrade to the square, on Owen Terrace, would also include works at the lighthouse and the Wallaroo Heritage and Nautical Museum.

"We began in April (after Easter)

with the retaining wall and paving around the monument," Mr Neumann said.

"Works will also include reshaping the mounds, installing retaining walls and increasing the vegetation to further enhance this underutilised open space.

"Bews Square is another four weeks from completion and the lighthouse/museum upgrade is estimated to take a further three to four weeks after that." Mr Neumann said an initial retaining wall and paving were placed around the monument in order for works to raise the ground level.

"Following that, the existing lawn and soil were removed and new soil has been imported for the new lawn and garden area," he said.

"A further retaining wall will be going in and once this is complete irrigation can be installed before the seeding of lawn — planting and mulching will complete the job."

Mr Neumann said the museum works included concrete paths and an entrance area featuring garden beds and plantings, lawn and the installation of a new water meter.

"This piece of work is the final stage to these current works which have been completed in the 2021-22 budget," he said.

"There are still many future projects to come as we continue our commitment to improve our region and make it our lifestyle location of choice."

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said it was nice to see Bews Square being looked after to create a cohesive feel throughout the town.

"It will be really good when it's finalised. It was a significant part of the Wallaroo main street and it will be great to see it back to its former glory," Mrs Talbot said.

"I think these last upgrades will finish off the whole area and tie it all in nicely together."





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# **Council strategy** coasting ahead

YORKE Peninsula Council has adopted its Coastal Management Strategy, featuring community-supported actions to protect the region's coastline into the future.

A drafting process, which began in late 2018, was finally confirmed at the council's meeting on Wednesday, May 11.

Coastline within the council region was split into three sections — Hickeys Point to Corny Point, Corny Point to The Gap and Federation Park to Hickeys Point — to best develop a framework for management.

The council's 485 kilometres of coast are a major attraction, encompassing cliffs, surf, rocky reefs and long low-energy beaches.

Mayor Darren Braund said it was an important step in the long-term preservation of the area.

"The Coastal Management Strategy provides direction to council and other land managers and stakeholders, by developing a framework for the management of coastal council

land," he said.

"The strategy will be used as a basis for assigning and applying for funding to undertake priority works over council land and infrastructure.

"Our coastline is there for us all and we must get a long-term plan in place so we can all continue to enjoy our coast for many, many years to come."

The strategy addresses matters of unauthorised vehicle access, vegetation damage and dune drift as the area faces increasing pressures of development, agriculture, tourism, fishing and recreation.

The zone contains significant Nharangga Aboriginal heritage and is home to an array of marine and terrestrial flora and fauna.

State government departments, community groups, local Aboriginal corporations and progress associations were sought for engagement throughout the process.

Formby Bay Environmental Action Group chairperson Geoff Rogers said the strategy provides guidance for groups working with council on relevant issues.

FBEAG volunteers work reg-

ularly on coastal projects at and around Corny Point, such as protecting sand dunes along the beach.

"We recently discussed the need for action at several vulnerable sites because rising sea levels and extremes of weather will mean remnant dunes are vulnerable," Mr Rogers said.

"Recent predictions are that mean high tides will be a metre higher in the year 2100 than they are at present so low lying properties will be subject to inundation when there are storm surges.

"Saving these dunes is vital as they are a buffer zone."

There's no better time to answer the call and take control in an emergency, to help save the lives of others.





# Fertiliser focal point at **Copper Coast Garden Club**

After his presentation, Paul distributed samples of GoGo Juice and Seamungus.

# Yorke Peninsula's institute buildings

THERE are more than 350 institute buildings across South Australia. Joelie Hancock and husband Ken

have created a website with the history, photos and stories of every building — including those on Yorke Peninsula.

"Before Covid-19 halted our travels, we drove around Yorke Peninsula in May 2019 tracking

down institutes," Joelie said. "Our quest was to discover and document as many as we could find.

"To help us I had an appointment with Robyn Knight at the Moonta Family History Resource Centre, a map, and a list of 20 towns where I had read Institutes had been.

"Our trip was successful and fascinating, we found evidence of 20 institutes — with all but two still there.

"In a few cases we had to do some

detective work to find the original stone structure behind a new addition on the front. "Some towns had installed value

"Some towns had installed valuable history information signs for their buildings."

All the YP institutes were erected in the 1800s, except for those in Price and Port Vincent.

"Some of them added a projection box and were the place to go for Saturday night picture shows; many added rooms to the front of their buildings dedicated as war memorials; Moonta Town Hall was built as the fourth of a succession of institute buildings in the town, while Minlaton, Yorketown, Ardrossan and Kadina Institutes were also eventually transformed into the impressive Town Hall complexes we have today," Joelie said.

Wehr, whose father Gary is from Bute and mother Nadene is from Maitland, with the family now living in Kadina, was one of several changes brought about by new GWS senior coach Mark McVeigh.

GWS outclassed the undermanned and struggling Eagles from the start, giving McVeigh the best possible start as interim coach and Wehr a substantial win on debut, enjoying a 21.12 (138) to 13.8 (86) victory.

"It was good fun," Wehr said. "Everyone played their role and it

was good to have a win. "It was special to have my girlfriend and family here."

Wehr hit the scoreboard with his first major at the 17-minute mark of the third quarter.

After starting on the interchange bench, Wehr had a strong 13 disposal game.

Wehr's journey to AFL ranks has been one of perseverance and commitment.

In 2019, he was in the Woodville-West Torrens Eagles reserves side,



and spent a game playing with the Balaklava Peckers in the Adelaide Plains competition, after being dropped from the seconds.

He was a member of the Eagles reserves grand final side that lost to Norwood in the same year.

After contemplating his future, he decided to give the SANFL one more go in 2020 at the urging of his father. Wehr produced a breakout season at SANFL league level in 2020, including a strong 19-disposal performance in the triumphant grand final victory against North Adelaide. The Giants chose Wehr with the very last pick in the 2020 draft and he spent the disjointed 2021 season

playing for the Giants in the VFL.

## **Tackle your Feelings set to visit Kadina**

SANFL will bring its Tackle your Feelings workshop to Kadina next Monday, May 30.

The free session is set to be delivered as part of a state-wide program aimed at developing tools to understand, recognise and respond to signs of mental ill-health within community football clubs.

Beginning with an interactive workshop with psychologist and former CMS Crows netballer Kylie Agnew, the session will conclude with some online learning.

SANFL coach development coordinator Rian Nelson said the session has been aimed at coaches and leadership group members within clubs, but is open to all.

"Hopefully the session gives people some better skills to respond if someone comes to you and says they're struggling," Nelson said.

"The psych workshop is all about identifying unusual signs, like if someone goes missing from training for a week or just seems a little bit off.

"It's all about giving people confidence to respond if someone says they're not okay because, realistically, they're probably not going to be okay without the right assistance.

"We're looking to break down the stigma and show people you don't have to hide from mental health."

The SANFL has invited people from all local clubs to register for the workshop at the Kadina Football and Netball Club, beginning at 7pm.

"It really feels like it will be an even contest amongst the five leagues which often means good footy to watch."





# **Bloods prove place amongst big boys**





### **Encipher smashes Globe Derby Track record**

Outstanding 3-year-old pacing filly Encipher added to her already impressive résumé with a dazzling display of pure speed at Globe Derby Park on Saturday, May 14.

Bred and owned in Kadina by Tyson Linke, Encipher thrashed her rivals in the South Australian Oaks (1800 metres) obliterating the track record in the process.

The filly rated a sizzling 1:52.4 to better the previous best of 1:53.9 set by quality open class pacer Mark Dennis in 2016.

Encipher, which has won six of her 12 starts, with five seconds, already had the scalps of the Allwood, Southern Cross and Breeders Crown for 2 year olds on her belt, and the SA Oaks was expected to be a soft snap and so it proved.

She was also 2021 Australian (and Victorian) 2vo pacing filly of the year.

Trained in Victoria by Emma Stewart, Encipher was driven to the Globe Derby record by veteran driver Gaita Pullicino.

Starting \$1.10 favourite in the field of six, she came from the outside gate but was quickly in front and never challenged.

Pullicino said Stewart had told her to "open her up with 600 metres to go".

Encipher, already 10m clear of her rivals, flew up the home straight and won the Oaks by an amazing 54.5m from Flirting (\$7.80) which had chased her throughout, with Honeybun (\$7.60), a short-half-head away in third.

Now in her 60s, Pullicino said it had been a "buzz" to drive Encipher.

"She flew and I did what Emma asked and she went even quicker," Pullicino said.

"I thank Emma and Tyson for giving me the opportunity to drive her - she is one special filly." As everyone was gasping at the incredible winning margin, they were left speechless when her

mile rate of 1:54.4 came up on the results board. The times showed the flying filly had got progressively quicker through each section of the

race. Her time for the first 400m of the last 1600 was a "sedate" 30.2 seconds, quickening to 28.8 for the next 400, improving again to 27.8 for the third, then clocked a sizzling 26.2 for the final 400.

Linke was left speechless by the time and ease of victory

"I didn't think she would go that quickly," he said.

"It was her first run since December 31, and I thought she would be improved by the race.

"Looking at her post-race, you could see she was blowing and would take benefit.

"I'm not sure what Emma has planned for her, but I would think the Southern Cross and Breeders Crown, which she won as a 2 year old, would be on her agenda in the 3-year-old fillies divisions.

'There is also the Victoria Oaks."

Linke still has Encipher's dam Our Cavort and sold a half-sister by the stallion Betting Line at a yearling sale in Melbourne earlier this year.

"I'm pleased the purchasers of the filly have sent her to Emma to be trained," he said. Our Cavort is in foal again to

Captaintreacherous, the sire of Encipher, and is booked to go the stallion again next season.

## **Farmers urged to keep watch** amid rise in powerline accidents

THERE have already been 13 incidents this year of farm machinery colliding with powerlines in South Australia since March 11.

In 2021, there were just three incidents, according to SA Power Networks corporate affairs head Paul Roberts.

Mr Roberts said the electricity distributor is frustrated by the number of potentially life-threatening incidents on farms in 2022.

"No job is more important than the safety of everyone on the farm," he said.

"Many farmers are getting it right, but the number and type of incidents this year are disturbing. "In broad daylight, a tractor

runs straight up the middle of a Stobie pole. "Other times a pole is hit dur-

ing a turning manoeuvre.

"A clear problem is farmers are using GPS to guide farm machinery but not programming electricity into the GPS and potentially also not paying as much attention as they should because they are relying on the GPS.

SA Power Networks hopes its Look Up and Live campaign targeting farmers will help reduce the number of incidents in the future.

"We have invested significantly in regional advertising to bring this issue to the attention of farmers, their families and communities," Mr Roberts said.

"It is disheartening when our crews keep having to attend incidents that could easily have been avoided.

"I have said it many times, while seeding is a positive time on farms, an accident would make it disastrous."

Farmers can access GPS maps of the state's electricity distribution infrastructure via the free Look Up and Live app and website.

"There may have been some change to the configuration of powerlines on the property and, with farm machinery getting taller and wider, everyone needs to know powerline clearances before undertaking work," Mr Roberts said.

"Powerlines also can be difficult to see, especially in dusty conditions, so confirming their location before you start work could avoid serious injury or even save a life."

## Survey shows optimism for upcoming season

ABOUT 90 per cent of South Australian grain producers are anticipating an average or above average season, according to a survey by Grain Producers SA.

GPSA CEO Brad Perry said the survey showed almost 29 per cent of grain producers were waiting for opening rains before they started to sow. "Traditionally, Anzac Day

marks the start of seeding, but more producers are sowing earlier to spread risk and allow for timely completion of seeding programs, regardless of the rain forecast," Mr Perry said.

'Statewide reports indicate highly variable sub-soil moisture levels but, as always around this time of year, more rain is required to encourage germination.

"The optimism for an above average crop this season is tempered by concerns about the rising costs and supply of chemicals, diesel, fertiliser and other inputs."

The survey also revealed seven per cent are planting GM canola for the first time while 38 per cent are interested in doing so the future.



AUSTRALIAN journalism lost groundbreaking broadcaster Caroline Jones this week.

Caroline passed away at age 84 and spent more than 50 years working in the media.

She was the first female reporter on the ABC's current affairs show, This Day Tonight, the first to anchor Four Corners and has been associated with Australian Story since it began in 1996

I was lucky enough to meet Caroline Jones in 2017, when I applied for an award created in her honour by Women In Media Australia.

I'd been unsuccessful in my entry, which would have earned me a trip to Canberra for a week, so I wrote back to thank her for taking the time to look at my work.

Months later, she called me out of the blue to invite me to the first Women In Media conference on the Gold Coast.

There were four other young journalists whom she had helped get to the conference as well, such was her care for the next generation.

While there she introduced us to other leaders in the field and asked us about our communities and our drive to cover them.

But for her willingness to help and support those around her.


In one of my first emails to her, I asked an incredibly asinine question about the dress code for the conference.





Port Broughton: There are some good schools of mullet and a few tommy ruff (Australian herring) in the channel and northwards towards the grounds out from wider than previously and a great surface to drive on! Tommies, garfish, rat kingies and squid have been in Hardwicke Bay and KG whiting from The Banks.

Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: Tommies colour the fishing landscape at both jetties, along with late afternoon squid and green mackerel. In almost perfect weather on Sunday afternoon, crews scrambled for a couple of hours catching KG whiting, squid, flathead and red nannygai offshore. Edithburgh: Boat crews that made the run around to Troubridge Point last week returned with KG whiting, blue morwong and big snook from Marion Reef. The jetty has ruff and salmon trout and there are migrating schools of mullet in Sultana Passage. Stansbury/Port Vincent: The jetty and wharf have tommies and a few mullet respectively. Boat crews have been travelling far and wide for whiting, small gar, tommies and squid. Crews fishing on the drift out from Point Julia reported KG whiting and squid. Ardrossan: Soapie mulloway are still being sighted from the town jetty and mullet catches now run from Rogues Point and north to Port Clinton. Boat crews are catching whiting, squid and a few ruff in the late afternoons.
