Housing hopes rise

FARMING land on the eastern edge of Kadina is expected to be transformed into hundreds of homes with "generous block sizes" in coming years after rezoning was finalised by the state government last week. Town planners URPS first approached Copper Coast Council in 2022 with a project to transform the block on Daddow Court, situated on the road to Bute. State Planning Minister Nick Champion said on Wednesday, May 1, the privately led rezoning — the about 28 hectare land parcel has been owned by a company called Lasopail since 1996 — will help the town grow in a considered and

measured way.

"There's a real desire to increase the housing supply in growing areas of our state, including Kadina, which is an important hub on the Yorke Peninsula," Mr Champion said. "This rezoning extends the surrounding residential streets, transforming a small area of farming land into more than 200 low-density homes on generous block sizes."

No end to our housing crisis

WE LIVE in one of the fastest growing regional areas in the state and now Yorke Peninsula's population is about to grow even bigger with the announcement of more than 200 housing blocks to be released in Kadina.

Cashed-up sea changers and baby boomers are clearly keen to experience more of our beautiful beach walks, sunsets and sunrises.

But the news that Australia's average home rent is now more than \$650 per week casts a shadow on the property boom for the havenots who are being left behind.

Local real estate agents report that up to 100 people apply for a single rental when it goes on the market in towns such as Moonta, Wallaroo and Kadina, putting further upward pressure on prices.

Shortages of building materials, and skills and labour, also mean we may struggle to build those 200 extra houses on time and on budget, plus others needed to keep up with population growth.

Where it will all end is anyone's guess, but at least the state government is starting to make some of the right noises when it comes to taking these housing and cost-of-living crises seriously, with the responsible minister Nick Champion announcing a host of new land releases lately.


But what of the feds? Can they break out of their

Canberra bubble for long enough to see how much some of our more vulnerable people are suffering?

Cougars cry for courts

NETBALL on central Yorke Peninsula is facing an uncertain future unless the Central Yorke Netball Club can find more than \$350,000 to resurface its courts.

Following a Yorke Peninsula Netball Association directive earlier this year that the courts may be unsafe, the Cougars repainted them and filled in cracks, allowing two of four to be used this season.

Cougars netball club president Sam Holmes said, however, the repairs were only temporary and would likely only last one year.

The other two courts had multiple cracks and were uneven in sections.

Pleas to the state government for grant funding had so far been unsuccessful, leaving the club reliant on community fundraising efforts.

In the past two years the club has applied for four grants, none of which had been successful.

Mr Holmes said he believed this was because some country clubs were being overlooked due to smaller populations.

"I think we often get neglected," Mr Holmes said. "We miss out because we're small and not seen from the

city-centric process. "And because we don't have

huge numbers to draw from, I think we often struggle to be seen and heard," he said.

For a club to receive grant funding, the state Office for

Recreation, Sport and Racing assesses applications based on the project need, participation and utilisation, quality infrastructure, strategic justification and project delivery.

Mr Holmes, however, said these criteria were unreasonable for some country clubs.

"When you fail on a grant you get the opportunity to get feedback," he said.

"We think we've been improving, and they now say all our criteria are above aver-

"But because there's such a small amount of funding for the number of people applying, we can't get to another level."

In 2023-24, more than \$5.5 million was available through the Community Recreation and Sports Facilities Program.

The Cougars currently have more than 100 playing members, including Brianna Schwartz.

Ms Schwartz said prioritising sport in regional centres was a necessity due to the benefit it had on community and mental health.

"It's hard enough to get a doctor's appointment in regional areas, and country sporting clubs provide both that mental and physical outlet," she said.

"Country sport is truly something special."

Ms Schwartz also said that, due to the club's central location, it often hosted association tennis and country championship trials and train-

ings and the courts were also used by schools.

To resurface the courts, the club will need to raise more than \$360,000.

So far more than \$2000 has been raised through an online charity site.

> State Sports Minister Katrine Hildyard encouraged the Cougars to continue applying for grants.

"It can be frustrating when clubs apply for grants and are unsuccessful," she said.

"(The state government) recognises that the development of sporting clubs and recreation facilities is important in helping people to participate in the sport or recreation they love."

PFAS probe

A NEW national study is aiming to find out more about the prevalence of harmful chemicals in farm livestock.

The University of Adelaide is trying to understand how many perand polyfluoroalkyl substances, or PFAS, are in farm animals.

Researchers are looking for farmers who have previously applied biosolids as fertiliser to be part of the project.

PFAS have previously been observed in Australian livestock, with higher rates found in areas where PFAS concentrations in the environment are elevated.

Defib push

THE state government is offering help for more community, cultural or sporting organisations to buy defibrillators to assist in saving lives in the event of a cardiac emergency.

The South Australian Automated External Defibrillator Grants Program offers \$1000 for not-forprofit organisations to help buy the machines.

The \$3 million program includes four rounds of funding and the AEDs must be installed by January 2026 to meet the funding requirements.

Lock sheds

POLICE are urging rural property owners to be vigilant about security after at least two recent farm thefts in the region.

A motor and other farming equipment were stolen from a Bute property some time between Friday, April 26, and Saturday, April 27.

The thieves took a Honda 13 horsepower motor and an agricultural tubulator fuel tank.

Growers hit

POLICE will be given the power to destroy hydroponics gear seized during drug busts under new laws passed last week in state parliament.

Under the new laws, the equipment can be destroyed as soon as it is seized, which Governor-General Kyam Maher said would save time, transport and storage costs.

Hundreds of pallets containing tens of thousands of such items were stored by SA Police, will also be destroyed.

Housing hopes rise

"AS a government, we are pulling every lever at our disposal to address the housing crisis and streamlining the planning process is an important way we can get more supply into the market as soon as possible," Mr Chapman said.

Narungga MP Fraser Ellis said the land release was necessary to address a shortage of housing in the region.

"This land has been through the rigorous planning process to determine if it is fit to host more residential dwellings and, given its proximity to a built-up residential area, has been deemed to be a logical area for expansion," Mr Ellis said.

"It has been zoned deferred urban for some time and, as such, has clearly long been earmarked as the next area to expand."

Copper Coast Council chief executive Dylan Strong said Mr Champion's decision was received at the council's Wednesday, May 1, meeting.

"The neighbourhood zoning makes way for residential development to support Copper Coast's growing population and demand for residential development in the region," he said.

Mr Strong said, however, that no development had yet been approved by CCC.

Property consultancy business Mosel Surveyors director Michael Liebelt said the company was in the process of preparing a development application on behalf of Lasopail to go before the council.

A spokesperson for the Copper Triangle Housing Association, which provides housing for lowincome renters, said they hoped any eventual development would consider those demographics.

"There's such a severe shortage of rentals," the spokesperson said. "We could rent 10, 20 houses

overnight. Part of the agreement should be

that they include some social housing, they said.

"Make it affordable for everyone, not just investors coming in and then being able to dictate rents."

A MAN and his dog have been rescued after falling down a mineshaft at Hughes Enginehouse in Moonta Mines.

The Moonta Mines man went into the mineshaft on Shepherdson Road to rescue his adventurous dog that had slid eight metres down on Sunday, May 6, SA Police said.

"The owner had attempted to rescue the dog and also become stuck," a police media release stated.

The rescue effort began at 4pm and took four hours. Passers-by could hear the Staffordshire terrier cross barking while the CFS, SES, paramedics and police attempted to rescue the pair.

STAR Group officers arrived at the scene from Adelaide and used ropes to climb down to the man and dog, bringing them safely to the surface at about 8pm.

The man, who was wrapped in a blanket after he was rescued, was taken to hospital as a precaution.

Wallaroo entrance works on way

UPGRADES to Wallaroo's eastern entrance roads will begin this week.

From Wednesday, May 8, pavement works will start with the aim of improving Magazine and Sharples Roads, as well as Hughes Street.

This phase is part of a \$9 million investment by Copper Coast Council and the state government to boost the safety and efficiency of the Copper Coast Highway, Irwine Street, Hughes Street, Bowman Road, Sharples Road, Magazine Road, Victoria Road and Owen Terrace.

Copper Coast Council mayor Roslyn Talbot said she was pleased works were progressing into key streets within the town.

"These works are a direct response to the community's call for improved road conditions after years of council joining with Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis to advocate for Wallaroo to state government," Mrs Talbot said.

"It's wonderful (the transport department) have partnered with us to give our residents and tourists safer and more accessible main roads."

CCC chief executive Dylan Strong said the scope of the works would continue across multiple years.

"While we focus on the immediate improvements to Magazine Road and Hughes Street, it's important to recognise that this project is part of a larger vision to improve the entrance to Wallaroo and the flow of traffic in and out of the township," Mr Strong said.

"Council's investment in this project is significant and long term, reflecting our commitment to the community's immediate needs, as well as its continued growth."

Narungga MP Fraser Ellis said he credited the council for driving the project and was pleased the state government was convinced to contribute.

Stolen truck intercepted at Kadina

A woman has been arrested after a stolen truck was recovered at Kadina on the weekend.

The 12 tonne Hino truck was taken from a service station on Main North Road at Willaston at about 3.30am on Saturday, May 4, while the driver was making a delivery. The driver's phone was in the cab, allowing the truck to be tracked as it headed north.

When the truck stopped at a service station in Kadina at about 5.30am, a 41-year-old woman was arrested and charged with illegal use of a vehicle.

She was refused bail and was scheduled to appear in the Port Pirie Magistrates Court on Monday, May 6.

Domestic violence regulation increased

New laws aimed at better protecting domestic and family violence survivors have passed state parliament.

Defendants granted bail on a charge of breaching a DV-related intervention order (by threatening or committing a violent act) will be subject to mandatory home detention and electronic monitoring.

They will be unable to leave home unless for permitted reasons, such as travelling to work or a medical appointment.

The government has also passed laws to allow for 15 days of paid leave for domestic and family violence in the public service, and for DV to be a ground of discrimination in the Equal Opportunity Act.

A Royal Commission into Domestic, Family and Sexual Violence will start on July 1, examining prevention, early intervention, response, recovery and healing, and coordination.

The royal commission will be aligned with the National Plan to End Violence Against Women.

Minister for Women and the Prevention of Domestic, Family and

Sexual Violence Katrine Hildyard said the prevalence of DV is unacceptable.

"Our community is filled with anger, frustration and sorrow that this year, a woman has been killed by a man every four days (in Australia)," Ms Hildyard said.

"These laws will help give survivors confidence that defendants in these cases will be closely monitored and have their movements restricted should they be granted bail."

Harassment and stalking laws strengthened

Stalking laws will be updated to reflect new and emerging technologies that perpetrators may use to stalk or harass individuals.

These include social media, electronic devices to track movements, and email or internet browser monitoring. The changes are intended to address common misconceptions about what behaviour breaks the law after the government received feedback that victims can often be unaware their experiences constitute stalking or harassment.

Attorney-General Kyam Maher said the reforms will modernise the legislation and broaden public understanding.

"Stalking or harassment can have a significant impact on a victim, even where the harm intended by the perpetrator does not meet the threshold of being 'serious," Mr Maher said.

"We want to address this.

"Ultimately, we will seek to introduce a bill to parliament that better protects victims and ensure perpetrators are held to account for their actions."

Bute rural care covering shortfalls

CHILDCARE options across Yorke Peninsula are scarce.

However, Bute Early Learning and Primary School has been offering an alternative for parents since the Rural Care Program opened in 2003.

Principal Richard Hall said the program provided a long day care and after-school care service which operated in a state government Education Department preschool site.

"The service is offered to small

rural communities that are unable to sustain other viable childcare options," Mr Hall said.

"The program has a strong focus on providing care for children in communities where there are limited childcare options.

"The aim of the program is to provide families with access to long day care, before and after school hours care and vacation care for children from birth to 12 years.

"It enables parents to participate in work, study and non-workrelated activities and promotes young children's development and learning by increasing access to a high-quality, early childhood education and care program."

Mr Hall said the program had provided significant relief and support to families for several years.

"We have had families attend from all over the region, from Maitland to Redhill," he said.

"The majority of our families are working families, which enables these people to commence or return to the workforce.

"This is hugely beneficial to our local and wider districts as these people provide vital services in health care, education and similar."

The number of children serviced by the RCP varies daily and is based on factors such as the ages of the children and the number of educators funded on each day up to a maximum of three workers at a time.

The centre's capacity is 27 children, which also takes into account preschool children.

Mr Hall said the program had been the answer to shortfalls in smaller communities when it came to child care.

"The program offers long-day

care, before and after preschool and school care and even a weekly playgroup," he said.

"The fact Rural Care is integrated with a preschool means children of all ages get to mix and learn with and from one another.

"The affordability for families is another significant benefit, as the cost of Rural Care is lower than a private childcare service."

There is an ongoing commitment from the Education Department to fund the program.

"Our rural care, in Bute, currently has a high level of demand," he said.

Onlookers have gathered as a part of South Australia's History Festival - a month-long opportunity for the Port Broughton Sailing Club to celebrate its maritime history.

Mark stands in front of a huge cabinet of bottled sea creatures.

Paintings of boats and maritime artifacts are scattered on the stone

walls of the villa, which is more than 100 years old.

In the background is the sound of sailors singing, coming from a blackand-white documentary about a huge ship.

Mark continues regardless.

"Days like today are important," he says in a bellowing voice.

He pauses and carefully selects his words. The crowd is engaged.

"We started the club to teach youngsters," he says.

"Sailing vessels are going full circle,

so it's important to know why you use traditional boats and harvest the land.

"Wind is free!"

He says it is pivotal for upcoming generations to understand the history of boat making.

"The old ways of building the ships were done by people who had been to war and who had sailed around the world," he says.

"It's just a whole knowledge system that we just don't have very much of today."

Mark says the old ways will likely become the way of the future.

"It'll come back once again to having smaller vessels to supply everything around the coast.

"We need to train the kids up."

There are 16 boats in repair at the club, which Mark says can be used to teach younger generations how to build boats.

Fellow club member Angela Ball reiterates much can be learned from older generations.

"As you get older, history means

more to you," Angela says.

"History tends to repeat itself. "You need to know your history to know what is to come."

Port Broughton Sailing Club will be hosting two sessions each Wednesday for the rest of May as a part of the SAHF which include a boat display and a talk about the maritime history of Port Broughton and its iconic boats.

Leading by example in footy and in life

LESSONS learned on the footy field that can be applied for success in all facets of life are being shared by high-achieving former footy player and coach Michael Wanganeen.

Now chair of Nharangga Aboriginal Progress Association, Michael has released a book that draws on the lessons he learned through his illustrious football career, his trajectory from farmhand to agency manager, and the education he undertook to grow his skills and knowledge.

"What you learn through sport can be applied through life," he says, speaking at the NAPA centre in Moonta.

"If you are successful in one sphere, you can be successful in other spheres."

He says leaders — at work or in sport - should think carefully about how they communicate with their teams.

"It doesn't matter what environment you are in, if you give them praise for what they are doing, they will feel so chuffed, they will produce even better results," he says.

"You also get them to understand that they are the only ones that can master their own destiny."

The book, entitled Education, Employment and Sporting Achievements, traces Michael's 30-year football career, starting from his early days with Point Pearce Football Club.

At the tender age of 16, he won best and fairest for the Point Pearce A grade in 1962, then played and coached with

many South Australian regional teams, including Moonta, North Clare, Blyth and at South Clare, where he was a pivotal member of the premiership teams of 1971 and 1972.

One of the many high points of Michael's life in football was when he coached the Aboriginal All Stars in their match against the combined Richmond/Sunraysia team at an exhibition match in Mildura in 1983.

The All Stars, which included the Krakouer brothers, Phil and Jim, and 1982 Norm Smith Maurice Rioli, medalist thumped Richmond/Sunraysia 138 points, 37.11 (233) to 14.11 (95).

Michael says one of his coaching secrets was to ensure there were leaders all over the ground, from the backs to the forward line, who could relay his instructions and inspire by example.

In the book, Michael's coaching skills are praised by Eugene Warrior Snr, a player from the 1987 SA Aboriginal team.

"Michael Wanganeen was able to take a group of individuals from various cultures, playing styles, strengths, weaknesses and mindsets, and some players he had never met, put them in a tumbler and churn out champion teams over many years," Eugene says.

"That was outstanding quality to possess, and he did it so successfully."

Michael says he started to learn about football, and what makes people tick, as a small boy growing up at Point Pearce. "I was propped in the middle of the table between the men of the family while they discussed football while I was still a young child," he recalls.

"I was also raised by my grandmother to become a proud Nharangga man.

"She instilled in me her belief that education, employment, sport and its subsequent social opportunities would be my route to success."

After working as a farmhand when he left school, Michael became a first-class linesman with the former Electricity Trust of SA and was later a manager for organisations including the Aboriginal Housing Board and the Aboriginal Legal Rights Movement.

During that time, he studied in fields as diverse as community development, industrial relations, legal studies and mental health first aid.

NAPA board member Lisa Weetra says she puts into practice what she learns from Michael and the other board members in her role as an Aboriginal services engagement officer with the Department for Education.

"I've been on the NAPA board for nearly three years now and it's amazing to be surrounded by the Nharangga leaders and Elders," she says.

"They inspire me and share their Nharangga knowledge and history so that I can also share with other community members or school students.

"I hope I can inspire the young Aboriginal students myself by being a role model for them so they will work hard in school to achieve their

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Discipline set to make comeback in schools

SOME Australian students will be taught more discipline in an effort to rid classrooms of abusive and disruptive behaviour.

A new behaviour model will be rolled out nationally this year after a Senate inquiry heard horror stories from teachers of abuse by students.

There will be renewed focus on how to enter the classroom quietly, and how to sit, listen and ask questions.

The Australian Education Research Organisation has distributed teaching material to education departments that outlines practical steps to teach children how to behave, but the new strategies will vary between schools.

AERO chief executive Dr Jenny Donovan said the organisation's role was to support teachers and others in education to make good decisions about teaching.

"This isn't about a return of the good old days, but rather a contemporary, forward-looking view — applying what we know now to our work," she said.

"It's not our role to mandate practice, and nor do we seek to do so.

"We know that teaching is a complex task that requires consistency, patience, good humour, thoughtfulness and application of best practice."

Australian Education Union SA president Jennie-Marie Gorman has criticised the changes, saying an old-fashioned approach to discipline was a copout by AERO and governments.

"Today's classrooms have many students who have complex learning and behavioural needs," she said.

"An old-fashioned approach doesn't reflect the modern reality facing teachers every day."

State Education Minister Blair Boyer said there had been a deterioration in behaviour in classrooms in Australia for decades, and dysfunction at home could be to blame.

"It is really tough because our schools so often become the place we expect all society's ills to be fixed," he said.

"You name all the things that we talk about... vaping or bullying and harassment through social media and mobile phones.

"We keep looking at schools to say 'right you've got to fix that as well', but so much of behaviour, which actually plays out in the classroom or the schoolyard, is learnt elsewhere.

"We're just heaping more and more stuff into the plates of teachers and principals and saying this is your job."

Mr Boyer said one in two teachers were quitting the profession in their first five years.

School funding bid steps up

AFTER calculating South Australian public schools have been underfunded by \$337 million this year, the Australian Education Union has stepped up its campaign for funding to be increased.

The AEU's 2024 State of our Schools survey during March and April showed three-quarters of SA public schools had experienced teacher shortages in the past year.

And 98 per cent of principals surveyed said they had to combine classes at some point due to this, while one-third said they had run classes without a teacher.

Student wellbeing was reported by 70 per cent of principals to be in decline, while 90 per cent of staff reported a decline in teacher wellbeing.

Only 18 per cent of teachers said they were committed to teaching until retirement.

AEU federal president Correna Haythorpe said, while SA private schools were overfunded by more than \$64 million, state schools were funded below the Schooling Resource Standard, the minimum level required to meet the needs of students, as agreed to by governments a decade ago.

"This is decade ago. "This is despite the fact public schools educate twice the proportion of students from disadvantaged backgrounds and over three times the proportion of First Nations students," she said.

"The challenges in schools have never been greater more diversity and complexity in student need, increasing wellbeing and mental health issues and acute shortages of teachers due to unsustainable workloads.

"Our principals, teachers and support staff are doing an extraordinary job, but they are being asked to do too much with too little and there just aren't enough of them." Ms Haythorpe said she wanted a new agreement between the state and federal governments to be signed this year that delivered full funding.

"Principals, teachers, parents, unions, community members and the SA Government all believe the Commonwealth should lift its SRS share from the current 20 per cent to 25 per cent," she said.

SA Education Minister Blair Boyer said the five per cent of extra funding would be worth up to \$190 million per year.

"We are seeing levels of disadvantage rise in the public system — that has been the case for many years now," he said.

"We need this money now more than ever before, so in the future we can actually look students and staff in the eye and say we are contributing the amount of money they need to make sure they get the same opportunities students in private schools do."

Advocating for carers in regional areas

INADEQUATE carer payments, access to respite, inconsistent decision making and superannuation — these are just some of the key issues raised by foster and kinship carers in regional South Australia.

The state's peak body representing them, Connecting Foster and Kinship Carers SA, recently visited regional areas, including Kadina, to advocate for their rights and needs.

CFKCSA senior advocate Sharee Borlace said they had a productive visit to Kadina meeting with many foster and kinship carers, some of whom they had advocated for already and others they met for the first time.

"Some of the common issues they raised with us include the inadequacy of their carer payments to support the rising living costs of young people, getting access to respite, inconsistent decision making, and the impact that foster and kinship caring has on their superannuation," she said.

"We regularly hear from carers across the Yorke Peninsula and the state's Mid North about the challenges they're facing, and our visit to the region was an opportunity to connect with them face-to-face and learn more to better inform our advocacy and support for them.

"Our trip was also an opportunity to strengthen our relationships with foster agencies which can refer their carer clients to us for support."

Ms Borlace said advocacy was more than

The end of the road

CLOSE to a decade in the making, stage two of the North Coast Road upgrade is nearing completion at \$400,000 under budget.

Recent works on the road, which runs between Point Souttar and Point Turton, have included about 1.8 kilometres of drainage and footpath works.

Yorke Peninsula assets and infrastructure director Andre Kompler said engineering staff and a design consultant had found a more cost-effective solution that would still have a long life.

"Helpful for stage two delivery was a very competitive contractor market, which enabled an additional \$400,000 saved relative to the original project budget without any compromise to quality or project delivery," Mr Kompler said.

The third and final stage of the road upgrade is due to start in December, but this is subject to availability of grant

funding.

The road is one of the council's best-used roads with about 500 vehicles per day travelling on it during the off-season and 1000 in peak season.

Mayor Darren Braund said the upgrade had already made it safer and enhanced tourists' experience.

"Yorke Peninsula is a magnet for intra-regional and interstate visitation, so positive visitor experiences are really important," Mr Braund said.

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something that was simply nice for carers to have access to.

"It's a fundamental right for all carers, just like being in a union as a retailer worker," she said. She encouraged foster and kinship carers to become members of CFKCSA.

Mr Norris-Green could not use typewriters at the time, so he wrote 40,000 words by hand and Mrs Norris-Green typed them into their portable typewriter while nursing their daughter.

Now his daughter Robyn Farrell helps him edit his novels.

He has written eight novels based on the Yorke Peninsula and surrounding areas, the latest being Irish Girl.


He has also published under many aliases including Cole Shelton, Ben Taggart and Sundown McCabe.

Local artist sharing his culture for decades

LOCAL artist and past winner of an Our Mob exhibition award Cedric Varcoe has been sharing his culture through creative avenues for decades, and you may have already seen examples of his work.

Mr Varcoe, who grew up at Point Pearce, has been painting since he was a child, inspired by his family, the stories of the Narungga and Ngarrindjeri people and the those told to him by his grandfather and Elders.

Being a contemporary artist, Mr Varcoe mainly uses acrylics on canvas to convey the narratives of his culture.

One artwork that is now displayed in St Mary MacKillop School, Wallaroo, was created with the support of students to share the connection between the Narungga people to their lands.

"(The artwork tells) the story of Narungga Country and how in the Dreamtime our ancestors created life, country, culture and resources on Country for our Narungga people," Mr Varcoe said.

The piece depicts the four clans of the Narungga people living throughout the Yorke Peninsula, and how the dreaming sites are still visible today.

"Our fish traps in our waters, our waterholes and more are proudly displayed through the artwork at the school today," Mr Varcoe said.

Mr Varcoe has won various awards over his career, exhibiting his works since 1997 with various murals in schools across Yorke Peninsula and some artwork in Parliament House.

In 2008, Mr Varcoe completed a mural in one of the cells at Port Pirie Police Station hoping to inspire young people to have a better outlook on life, and he has been told it's the most askedfor cell.

In 2023, Mr Varcoe won the Country Arts SA Regional Our Mob professional development award through the Our Mob art exhibition.


Entries are now being accepted for the 2024 Our Mob exhibition, to be held from August 3 to October 12.

Honouring Cecil Thomas Peters in Alford

WORLD War II veteran Cecil Thomas Peters was honoured during the Anzac Day dawn service Alford, where he has been memorialised on the windows of the Alford Hall.

His brother Gordon Peters and many relatives made the trip from Adelaide to pay their respects and honour Cecil.

Cecil was one of seven children born to Cecil and Myrtle Peters and lived behind the Alford Hotel.

He was born in 1918, never married, and his occupation was farm labourer.

At the outbreak of World War II, he enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force in 1940 at the age of about 22.

His brother Gordon was just 11 years old when Cecil went off to war.

Cecil joined the Detachment of 2nd Reserve Motor Transport Company, which was located at the Wayville Showgrounds.

He spent some time working on the track from Alice Springs to Darwin and later moved back to Adelaide, and then interstate, where he sailed for Malaya on the Queen Mary in 1941.

In 1942, Cecil was among allies captured by the Japanese on Singapore Island, but it was not until 18 months later, in 1943, he Japan, where he lies to this day.

was officially recorded as a prisoner of war. It was documented he was shipped to Japan on a ship.

Although several ships carrying POWs were sunk by the Allies due to a lack of appropriate markings on them, Cecil's arrived safely, although the deprivation experienced on board was said to be disgraceful.

At some stage he was relocated to Camp 17, Fukuoka.

Here he was employed in an underground coal mine where the conditions were atrocious.

Coal was moved using a system of rail cars and elevators, and Japanese guards had a habit of riding on them and hitting prisoners with sticks.

Cecil was hit and brushed against a wall which caved in. He was buried underneath, and it took half an hour to dig him out.

He died in hospital three days later, on December 20, 1944, and was buried at the POW camp.


Cecil was uninterred by the Australian War Graves Unit in 1946 and reburied in the British Mausoleum in Yokohama,



types of milk, vaccinations, and at Easter, chocolate.


Our AGM was held in early March.

Hailing our 'hidden heroes'

YORKE Peninsula's foster carers have been praised for their profound impact on the children they take into their care.

Speaking in the lead-up to Mother's Day, Uniting Country South Australia chief executive Dr Harry Randhawa said foster carers were "hidden heroes" and thanked them for their contributions.

"They provide safe and loving environments to children who otherwise might not experience such care," he said.

These children often emerge from challenging backgrounds and depend on the steadfast love, support, and opportunities their caregivers provide."

UCSA is one of the agencies which provides foster carers on Yorke Peninsula.

UCSA foster care and respite services manager Kerry Court said the organisation supported about 25 foster households across the region, including those which provided respite care.

"We have a wonderful community of foster carers on YP, with households from Wallaroo to Yorketown," she said.

Ms Court said prospective foster carers must undergo an assessment and training process which takes about six months.

EMILY Calley and Naomi Fulton are upfront about the challenges that can come with being a foster parent but they say the joys make it all worthwhile.

Emily was inspired to become a foster parent as a teenager while watching TV advertising and programs appealing to people to adopt orphaned children from overseas.

She and her former partner have a biological son, now aged 21.

"I couldn't have another child of my own after my son, but I knew I still had a lot of love to give," Emily

says. "I always knew that I would foster or adopt.

"I looked into adopting a child from overseas but it's really difficult, so then I looked closer to home." Emily and her former partner took care of their foster daughter from soon after she was born.

Her daughter attends a regular school and now has access to specialist care for autism - thanks to Emily's determined advocacy.

"She has a disability and we knew from birth we would be facing hefty health challenges," she said. Naomi, from Moonta, has taken

care of her foster daughter from the age of 7.

Her daughter had been in care since age 5, having had placements in five other households.

Naomi says has also had to battle to get her foster daughter access to specialist services.

Now 10 years old, the girl has only recently started to have counselling with a psychologist to help her deal

with the trauma she experienced before coming to live with Naomi.

Emily and Naomi agree it can be difficult to navigate health and social services agencies to get foster children the specialist care they may need.

But they say the formal support provided to them through Uniting Country SA and the informal networks between fellow foster carers and parents of special-needs children can make a big difference.

"We are learning as we go along," Naomi says.

"It's all about the community and all of us working together.

"My girl is doing really well now she is coming on in leaps and bounds. "It's great being able to see the dif-

ference you have made in a child's

Naomi took on the care of her fos-

ter daughter as a single parent of her biological son, now 15.

She says that, while in the past only parents in traditional nuclear families were approved to be foster carers, it is now much easier for people of diverse backgrounds to take on that role.

Naomi and Emily both say people who may be interested in becoming foster carers should reach out to those who are doing it.

Emily's face lights up when she talks about her daughter.

"I don't want her to think being different is something to be ashamed of," Emily says.

"She is incredible, she is one of the easiest children ever to look after.

"She is unique — she is her own little spirit."

TAMARA Gill will be celebrating her first Mother's Day with two extra-special additions, after recently welcoming twin daughters Edith and Olive after six years of trying to have more children.

Tamara and husband Joshua, of Bute, had their son Patrick, 9, in 2014 after only one round of IVF – but their journey to bring twin girls into the world in July was a rollercoaster ride.

In 2017, two-and-a-half years since Patrick was born, after the couple had been trying unsuccessfully to conceive, they decided to use two frozen embryos from Patrick's IVF cycle.

Neither worked, however, and Tamara, now 39, went through four egg collections and nine transfers across the next five years

"When you're in a stimulative, or fresh, cycle, you basically get scanned every second day for follicle growth, and it wasn't offered to me locally," Tamara says

"I would book the 7.30am appointment and I'd travel down to Adelaide the night before, get the scan done, and basically be back at work by 9.30am.

"Living in the country certainly adds a layer of complexity." Tamara says IVF was the hardest thing the Gills have had to face together.

"It's the whole gamut - the emotional toll, physical toll, financial toll," she says.

"There were things that we didn't do socially because of either how I was feeling or I was going through procedures, or for our son we had to shunt him here and there so we could go down to Adelaide and access treatment.

"It has a global effect on your family." One in six Australian couples is

affected by infertility, and Tamara says talking about it - both in person and online - has helped her, and others experiencing it, immensely.

'The more I've been open about - and that's something that's quite easy for me to do, it's not easy for everybody to do the more people are able to talk about it around me as well," she says

"I would love to see the stigma of infertility, pregnancy loss, in

IT IS important to take time to celebrate the special people in our lives every once in a while.

May is the perfect month to start, with International Day of the Midwife on the first Sunday (May 5) and Mother's Day on the second (May 12). With celebratory dates so close, midwives and mothers recognise the special roles they play in each other's lives.

Kiah Degrono is expecting her fourth child soon, and says the support the midwives offer at Wallaroo Hospital is important for regional communities. "The support that they give when you're here... and even when you're at home is amazing," Ms Degrono says.

"It's like having your mother that knows everything right here.

"You can text message, call — every time they are right there.

"There's seven years between my youngest and this one, so it's like doing it all over again."

Lindsay Rover says her daughter Paige experienced a medical emergency not long after she was born. "We only had a few hours before

Flinders Hospital," she says.

"I rang the midwives at Wallaroo at 8 o'clock on a Friday night when I was sitting in the emergency at Flinders, and they still answered and prompted me to seek extra help."

Jasmine Ritter has just had her newborn baby Rory, and she says she felt reassured by her midwives throughout her pregnancy.

"No question was dumb, they were completely supportive all of the way. "Rory was in a rush to get here and it was a bit up and down, but the girls were just incredible — the whole team are. "We are very lucky to have them."

Brochures going digital

THE Yorke and Northern Midwifery Group has introduced a new virtual platform for mothers.

The online service offers resources typically given to mothers in various brochures at their first pregnancy appointments, but is now available on electronic devices at any time.

In line with the 2024 theme of sustainability, the virtual resource for women, families and midwives aims to reduce the use of paper, cartridges and electricity.

University student Vaine Guy and mum Hayley Daly have been working on the platform since January.

Vaine says the virtual platform will work on any device as long as they

can access the QR code or link. "All of the midwifery groups on the Yorke and Northern have groups on Facebook and with the ability to pin it, we'll post it there too," Vaine says.

"There are a few brochures we will still want to keep in the orange book, but with less of them in there it's not going to be as overwhelming to open it up.

"We're going to trial it for a few weeks, and I can see how many people access it, how long they stay on it and other analytics."

The virtual platform was launched at Wallaroo Hospital on Friday, May 3, and has now been rolled out to mothers. families and midwives across the Yorke and Northern areas.



Gold medal to Taheny and SA Sharks

Will Taheny, of Point Turton, and the South Australia Sharks claimed gold at the Wheelchair Rugby National Championship played in Adelaide on the weekend.

The competition took over the Netball SA courts in Mile End from Friday to Sunday, May 3-5.

"We beat Queensland in the final on Sunday, 58-52, giving us back-to-back titles," Taheny, 25, said.

"It was the second champs I've competed in, after playing in my first national titles event on the Gold Coast last year.

"My role in the team is as a defensive screening player.

"Sunday was one of the best games we've produced.

"We certainly celebrated the win, going out on Sunday night into town.

"Along with the nationals, there are three other tournaments during the year, with the next one during June in Brisbane.

"The ultimate dream is to play at the highest level, for the Australian Steelers at the Paralympics."

Taheny sustained a life-changing injury in mid-2022 and said the wheelchair rugby community has welcomed him into their ranks.

"These people are in a similar spot to me, and there is a connection," Taheny said.

"It is a pretty brutal sport.

"It is nick named murderball and it is pretty full on."

Wheelchair rugby is an aggressive, fastpaced, full contact team sport for male and female tetraplegics (quadriplegics) in a team environment, and collisions between wheelchairs are a major factor.

It combines elements of rugby, basketball and handball, with men and women competing in the same teams and same competitions.

The sport originated in Winnipeg, Canada,

in 1976, as a quadriplegic equivalent to wheelchair basketball for athletes with reduced arm and hand function.

It was recognised as an official sport for athletes with a disability in 1993, when 15 countries participated, and the International Wheelchair Rugby Federation was established the same year.

After being a demonstration sport at the 1996 Atlanta Paralympic Games, wheelchair rugby was recognised as a full medal sport for the 2000 Paralympic Games in Sydney, where Australia won silver.

Australia has competed in every Paralympics, World Wheelchair Rugby Championships, and IWRF Asia-Oceania Championships since each competition was established, with increasing success.

"As I started to play at 21, I was never in any state underage programs, so I'm very grateful for the opportunity to wear the red, gold and

blue SA state jumper.

"It was special to be a part of history again, playing in the first SAN-FLW state game."

The achievement is another high watermark in Button's distinguished football career, which has had its peaks and troughs.

She started with West Adelaide in 2018, winning the SANFLW best and fairest in her debut season.

Drafted to the Crows, she played 39 AFLW games and was a member of the club's 2019 and 2022 (season 6) premiership sides.

She was delisted by Adelaide at the end of the 2023 campaign.
