# SHARKNET SHORTFALL

SUPPORTERS of the proposed swimming facility at Wallaroo foreshore have raised safety concerns over a gap in the shark net shown in the current draft design.

The design, submitted by Wallbridge Gilbert Aztec engineers and presented at Copper Coast Council's meeting on November 5, reveals a gap between the north-eastern end of the net and the shoreline — prompting fears it could pose a risk to swimmers.

Copper Coast Council secured \$2,120,837 in federal funding for the project in 2024 and council is contributing \$3,053,826 for a total cost of \$5,174,663.

# **Royal Commission**

REGARDING the algae bloom, is there a disconnect going on? Many people are reporting pneumonia-like symptoms, and yet the government health advice remains unchanged, asserting the bloom causes only minor irritations, particularly in asthma sufferers.

The more recent discovery of Karena cristata in the bloom has not changed the health advice.

Some sectors are calling for a Royal Commission into the bloom, and I would have to agree that this would lead to a clearer picture not just about the likely cause or causes, but also the fallout, where people who have suffered serious health complications perceived as bloom-related can have their say.

One of the problems for those who feel their health has been compromised is disbelief and even ridicule. Just how many people are in this category? It would be interesting to know.

Whilst I am not one to feed into conspiracy theories, this whole algae bloom saga is beginning to feel like one — smoke and mirrors, opinion versus opinion.

Really, it is a debacle — so much guesswork rather than a measured response that is cautious and sympathetic, taking the whole picture into account. A Royal Commission would be a logical next step.

# **Algal bloom mystery**

on the algal bloom affecting many of South Australia's popular beaches.

In my view, it has done little to encourage a positive or informed response.

Many beachgoers and businesses that rely on the summer season — such as fishing charters, fish and chip shops, and other coastal traders — stand to lose thousands in income. ("Choppy waters for charter boats", YP Country Times 4-11-25.)

I feel there's been a lack of detailed explanation about the bloom, including:

- · Why has it formed now, when floods and warmer water — both said to be causes — have occurred before without similar blooms?
- What are the chemical contents of the bloom, and which components are most harmful to humans, and why?
- Why is marine life dying while health authorities report only mild human health risks?
- Could there be long-term effects on humans, even from swimming near — but not in — the bloom?
- Can skin contact cause irritation, even after wiping it off?
- Why is the bloom only appearing in some areas and not others, despite tidal movement? There are likely many more unanswered

Understandably, many coastal residents are concerned — thousands of marine animals are dying, yet we're told there's little risk to humans or business as usual.

For charter operators and others, I hope the bloom proves harmless. But I remain unsure about possible long-term effects, especially from consuming fish exposed to the bloom.

Some may see these questions as pedantic, but we only have one life — and for people like my family, who love swimming in the sea, uncertainty around this algae bloom could pose a serious risk if not properly addressed.

# **Algae toxins**

THE government has recently commented that it did not want the ongoing algae bloom referred to as toxic, as it was creating a negative impression in the community, and stated that live seafood captured was safe to eat.

Previous testing of samples taken during the bloom has shown the presence of both cytotoxins and brevetoxins — a byproduct of this algae — both of which are toxic to some fish species and can have negative health impacts on animals.

The government has also stated that a newly discovered algae species is susceptible to warmer water and that, promisingly, algae counts are coming down, possibly due to the warmer conditions — after previously suggesting it was a marine heatwave that started this event.

While water quality appears to have improved on this side of Gulf St Vincent, dead fish continue to wash up on our beaches after rough weather. It is clear we do not have a full understanding of this event and the ongoing consequences of any lingering toxins in the water after the algae has gone.

While the government regularly tests for brevetoxin in aquaculture leases, it does not test for the presence of these toxins in wild fish or the environment.

Overseas studies have indicated that brevetoxins can accumulate and linger in the marine environment.

In New Zealand, when algae blooms occur, they do toxicity tests on wild seafood to ensure it is safe for human consumption.

Instead of trying to downplay the severity of this event, it would be nice if our government started spending some of the money set aside for its summer plan to expand testing of brevetoxin levels in our aquatic environment and make this information public.

One could speculate as to why this has not been done, but without this information, it is impossible to fully understand the impact and consequences of this event.

# **Honouring their** service: a family's **ANZAC** story

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AS the nation pauses for Remembrance Day, many of us reflect not only on the service of those who gave their lives, but also on the personal threads that tie our families to history.

My grandfather, Frederick Carl Stolz, and his brothers — Lance Corporal George Alexander "Sandor" Stolz and Private Ernest Edward Stolz — were among the many ANZACs who served in World War I. All three spent time at Gallipoli.

Fred, a lieutenant in the 32nd Battalion, and Ernest, who served with the 4th Australian Field Ambulance, returned home. But Sandor, serving with the 1st Stationary Hospital, was killed on the Gallipoli beach, on December 3, 1915, aged 29.

Just two days earlier, a group photo of the unit was taken. The image I have today has four men marked: the four who died from that single tragic

Captain F. Le Messurier wrote, "This was one of the saddest days since leaving Australia." A shell struck the tent where six men, including Sandor, were playing cards. Stolz was killed instantly. "He was the most popular man in the unit... a man I admired very much and I felt his death keenly."

Ernest was present at his brother's burial. The four who died were the only casualties from their unit during the war.

Twelve days after Sandor's death, the ANZACs began their withdrawal

The successful, multi-stage evacuation was carried out under the cover of darkness, beginning on December 15, with the majority of troops departing by December 20.

The Stolz brothers were the sons of Georg and Sabina Stolz, who had emigrated from Germany and England in the 1880s.

With German ancestry, my mother, Dorothy Prouse, often wondered why the family wasn't scrutinised more closely during wartime.

But they were Australian. And like so many others, they served with honour, loyalty and courage.

Today, and always, we remember them.

PARENTS say the future of Wallaroo Mines Primary School is threatened by a lack of clarity about its future, as the Department for Education investigates the school's leadership.

The incumbent principal, Tamarin Condon, is on leave while the investigation takes place.

Parents were informed by the Department for Education on November 7 that Tim McLeod, a former principal at Ardrossan Area School, will be acting principal from November 17.

A statement from the Department for Education said Mr McLeod had more than 40 years' experience as a teacher and leader across the state, including serving as principal at Mount Barker South Primary School, Rose Park Primary School, Athelstone School and at the Open Access College, in addition to leading Ardrossan Area School.

Current acting principal Natasha Hefford, from the department's

Kadina office, has been in the role since November 3.

Parents from the school have raised concerns about its leadership with the Department for Education, with Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis, and in an online petition created on October 27 by a group described as the Wallaroo Mines Primary School Community.

The petition has attracted more than its creators' original "target" of 200 signatures, with 265 signatures recorded and 165 comments as at 10am today, Tuesday, November 11.

It calls for an urgent review of the principal's leadership due to "ongoing concerns about unprofessional behavior, child safety, and declining school culture".

WMPS parent Nicole Fergusson said that, while there had been media reports, parents had still not been notified by the Department for Education that an investigation was

"My main concern is that nobody still knows what is going on," she said. "Nobody can tell us whether she

being carried out.

(Ms Condon) has been stood down permanently or whether she's going to come back to the school."

The school's 2024 Annual Report to the Community stated that 99 students were enrolled that year; however, Ms Fergusson said only 84 students were enrolled this year, with the shift of year 7 students into middle schools taking effect.

Ms Fergusson said the uncertainty about future leadership at WMPS was prompting many parents to seek enrolments elsewhere and up to 25 students could leave in 2026.

She said her son had been accepted for enrolment at Kadina Memorial School next year.

"He's begging me to go across because all of his friends are going across as well," she said.

However, her daughter would have to stay at WMPS because there were no spaces available for her year level at KMS.

for a few kids."

A spokesperson said the Department for Education was aware of the allegations about the school and was investigating the claims.

"While this process is underway the principal will be on leave," they said.

"The department takes these concerns seriously and has met with a number of parents multiple times."

YPCT reported (4-11-25) its understanding that complaints made by parents included that Ms Condon's partner, Simon Condon, had attended a recent school camp, despite not being an employee of the school.

Mr Boyer has been quoted in media reports as saying that the allegations in question include that Mr Condon attended the camp but neither he nor the department would respond to questions from YPCT about the nature of these allegations.

A number of those who have signed the online petition or commented state they are parents from Poonindie Primary School, near Port Lincoln, where Ms Condon was principal in 2024.

There are also comments from people who say they were a parent or staff member from Mil Lel Primary School in the South East, where Ms Condon was principal prior to PPS.

Mr Boyer's office did not respond to other questions, including whether or not the Department for Education had received any complaints from parents at Poonindie Primary School.

YPCT is not reporting that the allegations made by the concerned parents or by the creators or commenters in the online petition are true, but simply that they have been made.



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# Council clarifies cat by-law consultation

BARUNGA West Council has refined its cat management consultation to focus on education and awareness — not changing the existing rule — following legal advice.

Under BWC's Cats By-law 2025, effective since September 22, cats must remain on their owner's property at all times unless under effective control, such as on a lead or in an enclosure.

At a special meeting on October 28, councillors endorsed a community engagement approach to help residents understand their responsibilities.

"This is not about changing the rule," outgoing chief executive Maree Wauchope said.

"It's about making sure people know their responsibilities and have the right information to comply."

The by-law aims to reduce nuisance, protect wildlife and support animal welfare.

Residents can view the by-law and provide feedback via the council website or at the Port Broughton and Bute offices.

Council will review submissions before finalising its education and enforcement strategy.

# EPA, Flinders Ports return serve on ferry closure

THE Environment Protection Authority and Flinders Ports have pushed back against criticisms from Spencer Gulf Searoad, which recently suspended its ferry service between Wallaroo and Lucky Bay.

SGS chief executive Chris Carvill last week confirmed the service had been halted following the sale of the Aurora V ferry to the Samoa Ports Authority.

In a statement, Mr Carvill said the company was exploring vessel replacement options but first needed to resolve "significant, outstanding operational issues" — including what he described as an "unfair" Vehicle Traffic Service fee and "regulatory obstruction" to dredging.

"We require the removal of the voyage 'dog leg' VTS fee imposed by Flinders Ports — a charge that is not levied on any other ferry company anywhere in Australia or, to our knowledge, globally," he said.

However, a Flinders Ports

Holdings spokesperson said the company did not charge a VTS or any other fee for SGS to deliver or collect passengers.

"Under regulatory requirements set by the state Harbors and Navigation Act, all ferries travelling through a port, such as Wallaroo, must have a pilot-exempt master or use a pilotage service like that operated by Flinders Ports," the spokesperson said.

"In the absence of pilot-exempt masters who have completed the required training, SGS would need to use a Flinders Ports-qualified pilot and pay a pilotage fee."

The spokesperson said Flinders Ports had worked with SGS in recent years to identify the safest and most cost-effective route for passenger access to Wallaroo.

"This included suggesting SGS travel an additional 500 metres to circumnavigate the port's channel, avoiding the need for either exempt-master training or pilotage services,"

"In the unlikely event of an onboard emergency, Spencer

Gulf Searoad has always been able to access the port directly."

An Environment Protection Authority spokesperson also addressed Mr Carvill's claims, stating that any individual or company holding a dredging licence must submit a Dredge Management Plan before undertaking any activity.

"Every dredging campaign must be assessed according to the SA EPA Dredge Guideline 2020 to ensure environmental impacts are identified and appropriately managed," the spokesperson said.

This includes measures to protect water quality, marine habitats, flora and fauna, as well as the management of noise, air quality, waste and hazardous materials.

The spokesperson confirmed the last DMP submitted by SGS was in 2020 for dredging at the Wallaroo berth.

"There have been no DMPs submitted to the EPA since then for that location," they said.

"The company holds a fiveyear dredging licence which remains active."

# Ferry loss a 'blow' — Venning

MEMBER for Grey Tom Venning says the loss of the Spencer Gulf Searoad ferry service between Wallaroo and Lucky Bay is a blow to local economies and communities which had depended on the connection.

"A decrease in safety for residents is a concern of mine," Mr Venning said.

"The SGS made the trip from Eyre Peninsula to Adelaide much safer, breaking an eight-hour drive from Port Lincoln to Adelaide into just two, twohour drives."

Mr Venning said SGS had faced a "long line of issues" to provide the ferry service and the state government had provided little support.

"From planning restrictions to route restrictions and unjust environmental rules the ferry has been up against it from the start," he said.

"My concern is that this service could be finished because of regulatory hurdles, like those faced by T-Ports and its efforts to provide a valuable shipping alterative for farmers on Yorke and Eyre peninsulas.

"This closure is yet another example of regional communities and businesses being pushed to the margins."

GOLD Hydrogen has started drilling a new well, Ramsay 3, on farmland east of Minlaton in search of natural hydrogen.

The company has previously drilled two wells on Yorke Peninsula — Ramsay 1 and Ramsay 2 — which delivered world-leading results.

Natural hydrogen was found at air-corrected purity levels of up to 95.8 per cent, with helium concentrations reaching 36.9 per cent.

Ramsay 3 is located just a few kilometres from the original sites.

Gold Hydrogen managing director Neil McDonald said the company verified its initial drilling data before engaging a firm to conduct 2D seismic testing.

"This combination of work identified Ramsay 3 as more optimal than the original two wells," he said. "Significantly, it is on a high

Mr McDonald said the team is confident it is drilling in a more promising location.

"We found hydrogen and helium at record levels in 2023," he said.

"Will we hit on a better result now, allowing commercialisation? "That's the beauty of exploring

— there's no guarantee." Drilling is expected to finish

in December, with early results

"We'll be back in quarter one to do the main tests like flow testing, which help determine the commerciality of the project," Mr McDonald said.

Last week, the Ramsay 3 site hosted over 30 Japanese investors and officials from the Ministry of Economy, Trade and Industry

(METI), the Japan Organisation for Metals and Energy Security, and industry representatives from Iwatani Corporation, Tokyo Gas, Eneos Xplorer, Toyota and Mitsubishi.

Visitors observed the drill rig being assembled.

METI spokesperson Hasegawa Yuya said the visit was crucial due to Japan's reliance on imported

"If we had an abundance of natural hydrogen, it could be a game changer," he said.

Mr Yuya noted Japan's existing dependence on Australian energy exports and its ongoing vulnerability to natural disasters such as earthquakes.

A projected 20 per cent increase in electricity demand over the next 20 years - driven by artificial intelligence and emerging technologies — makes energy diversification a priority.

"We are lacking natural resources," Mr Yuya said.

"We need to diversify our en-

ergy sources. "Hydrogen is a potential candi-

date for our energy." With green hydrogen still years away from being commercially viable, Gold Hydrogen's explora-

tion holds significance. "Natural hydrogen could be really important," Mr Yuya said.

"If it's economically viable, Japanese companies will start to show interest.'

Gold Hydrogen will assess the new well's results to determine if commercialisation is possible.

If successful, a pilot project will follow.

# **Sandilands** crash victim remembered as "pure sunshine"

THREE-year-old Ava Ferguson, who tragically died in a crash at Sandilands on Friday, October 31, is being remembered as "delightful, magical and sparkly".

Ava was a passenger in a car that collided with a truck on Sandy Church Road, near Davies Road, just before 3pm.

She died at the scene.

The car's driver, a 31-year-old local woman, was airlifted to hospital with serious but non-life-threatening injuries.

The truck driver, a 71-year-old Yorke Peninsula man, was not physically harmed.

An online fundraising page, created by friends with the family's permission, is helping raise money for funeral costs.

As of Monday, November 10, it had reached \$17,049 of its \$20,000 target.

In a tribute posted to the page, Ava was described as "pure sunshine and delight wherever she went".

"To know Ava was to love her — those beautiful blonde curls, mischievous blue eyes, and most gorgeous rosy cheeks," the statement reads.

"Ava is the much-loved, cared for, and wanted little girl of Britney Bodie and Josh Ferguson, and adored little sister of Riley

"No family ever plans to have a funeral for their child," the statement continues.

"Now Britney and Josh are not only trying to survive each second without Ava, they also have to find a way to lay their precious little girl to rest.

"Ava Cakes leaves behind many little friends at childcare, playgroup and preschool activities across the peninsula. Her loss is felt by so many in the community."





# Shark net shortfall

CONSTRUCTION is expected to start in February and be finalised by December.

Wallaroo Swimming and Aquatic Committee community leader Ian Shields said he estimated the gap at around 30 metres and would advocate for it to be closed in the final design.

Mr Shields is scheduled to meet with council chief executive Dylan Strong and other senior staff tomorrow, November 12, to discuss the draft.

He will also present feedback the committee has received from 142 members of the public regarding the gap and other elements of the proposed design.

The shark issues around the

a major concern with the community," Mr Shields said.

We have been requesting and pushing the council to ensure that the current net finishes on the shoreline, leaving no gaps.

"It's hard to believe that ... a draft design shows a shark net with a gap of that extent."

Mr Shields said he had obtained figures from Primary Industries and Regions South Australia showing shark sightings near jetties, beaches and shallow waters across the state — excluding those more than one kilometre offshore and sightings by abalone divers.

The figures showed 35 such sightings were reported to PIRSA

swimming jetty have always been in November 2023, plus there were local reports of a bronze whaler near the Port Hughes jetty and a shark of unknown species spotted near the Wallaroo jetty.

Mr Shields said dolphins and seals had been seen inside the current semi-enclosed swimming area at Wallaroo.

"If they can get in there, a predator can get in there," he said.

Mr Shields said he would also raise issues with council about how the enclosure design needed to meet the needs of a range of users, including parents with babies and toddlers, school age children, lap swimmers, and people with restricted movement and disabilities.

He said he had received very

strong community feedback on the need for shade and seating, steps into the water at the end of all platforms and the start of the main structure, and a disabled ramp located near the current stairs into the water, within the proposed shark net.

Mr Shields said he had made several suggestions to council on how project costs could be reduced to allow for the inclusion of additional proposed features.

These included attaching the shark net to the platform structure, rather than securing it with additional pylons to save about \$200,000 and offering the current wave attenuator for sale to achieve a potential price of \$100,000.

# Sims speaks out

COUNCILLOR Peter Sims has spoken out about the proposed design of the Wallaroo swimming enclosure.

At the Copper Coast Council monthly meeting on November 5, he said he was concerned the shark net was not fully enclosed on the draft design.

"If we are going to create a safe environment of an enclosure, one would think that the shark proof net would be all around the whole three areas (sides)," he said.

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said if the shark net fully enclosed the swimming area, it could preclude some people with disabilities from entering.

Cr Sims said he hoped the facility would enable all people to use the swimming enclosure safely.

"I just think it's a bit odd that we have come to a standstill and still leave the elements open (for) anything that might get in there at any time when the tide is up," he said.

"Why can't the engineers or whoever design something, so that people in wheelchairs or similar, can be included within this design?"

Chief executive Dylan Strong said the exclusion of a disability access ramp from the proposed structure was due to cost constraints.


"It was explored with our engineers but it was deemed, at least for these draft designs, that there may be alternative access from the beach for someone who is not necessarily able to use the jetty itself and enter the water or down the stairs," Mr Strong said.

"They may need to come from the other side, the beach side, with some sort of mobility device then they would be able to enter the semi-enclosed space."

Mr Strong said he was happy to raise Mr Sims's point with the engineers.

"The reason we are out seeking feedback at the moment is to ensure that kind of view or opinion is incorporated."

# Fire destroys home and shed at Clinton

A HOUSE and shed have been destroyed in a major fire at Clinton, with damage estimated at more than

The blaze broke out around 3.15pm yesterday (Monday November 10).

About 50 firefighters responded, with 10 CFS trucks and a hazardous materials crew called to the scene.

When crews arrived, both the house and adjoining shed were fully alight.

Two cars were also destroyed in

Thanks to the swift response, firefighters were able to stop the flames from spreading to nearby properties, crops and native scrub.

CFS crews remained at the scene into the evening to monitor for hotspots using thermal imaging cameras.

They were supported by the Metropolitan Fire Service, SA Police, SA Ambulance Service, SA Power Networks, and fire investigators, who attended the site today (Tuesday, November 11).

Investigations into the cause of the fire are ongoing.

### Drink and drug driving

Two Yorke Peninsula men have lost their licences after being caught drink and drug driving over the weekend.

# Be aware of increase in heavy vehicles

AS farmers enter the final leg of the cropping year, motorists can expect to see more heavy vehicles and farm machinery on the roads.

Yorke Peninsula's grain harvest typically continues through to January, and drivers are urged to take extra caution during this busy period.

Locals, in particular, are reminded not to become complacent and to remain alert on regional roads.

Farmers are encouraged to ensure all vehicles display correct signage, comply with road conditions and regulations, and to monitor mass limits and avoid driving while fatigued.

Agricultural and heavy vehicles often require longer distances to stop, are less manoeuvrable, and may be significantly wider and longer than expected.

Because of this, motorists are urged to plan ahead, remain patient and alert, and always drive to the conditions especially in poor visibility.

Drivers should keep their headlights on at all times and only overtake large vehicles when safe; allowing plenty of room.

It's also important to slow down when approaching slower vehicles or when vehicles are entering or leaving

Motorists should remember that heavy vehicles have much larger blind spots than standard cars, so extra caution is needed when driving near

# Students monitor marine health at Ardrossan

ARDROSSAN Area School students are helping monitor the local marine environment by collecting and analysing sea water samples from the town's boat ramp and observing conditions at the nearby beach.

Students from years 5 to 10 are participating in a water-monitoring project in response to the recent harmful algal bloom.

The initiative is a collaboration between the school, Yorke Peninsula Council, National Parks and Wildlife Service, and the Ardrossan Progress Association.

Under the guidance of teacher librarian Kallie Eglinton, students have been collecting weekly samples since the start of term 4.

Their findings are recorded on a spreadsheet and through a dedicated app.

They assess water clarity using a black-and-white metal disc made by the school's technical studies department and cross-reference colour changes with a visual chart.

Ms Eglinton recently attended a microscope workshop run by council and led by marine ecologist Faith Coleman.

"Here in Ardrossan, the coast and the gulf are extremely important to us, and so I think being able to be part of the monitoring of that is a great opportunity,"

She plans to continue weekly monitoring herself during the summer holidays.

Students Harry and Seth, both keen fishers, say they're concerned about what they're seeing in their local waters.

"All the fish are dying and you can see all the foam," Seth said.

"It's just not very good for the environment."


Harry said much of the dead marine life they had observed appeared to be juvenile leatherjackets.

He and his family now travel to the west coast of Yorke Peninsula to fish, but he misses having the option closer to home.

"After school most days, me and my mates would just go down to the boat ramp and catch mainly squid," he said.

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# **Recognition for Stansbury** volunteer on Remembrance Day

TODAY, lay preacher Peter Bilney led his 20th Remembrance Day service at the Stansbury War Memorial.

This year also marked the 27th year he led the local Anzac Day dawn services — both at the memorial and the former Eldercare Elanora nursing home in Stansbury.

Mr Bilney has served the local community in many roles, including 35 years as a volunteer with the SA Ambulance Service, a first aid officer with the CFS, a lay preacher with the Baptist Church, and chair of the Yorketown Park Committee, among others.

In recognition of his service, the Stansbury RSL sub-branch today presented Mr Bilney with a certificate of appreciation during a gathering at the Blue Lime Cafe.

Stansbury RSL member Kathy Ricketts said Mr Bilney had always shown respect for veterans and genuine care for their well-

"He has always had the community in mind, evidenced by his 35 years as a volunteer for SA Ambulance," she said.

"In recognition of his wonderful commitment to volunteer service in many fields, the Stansbury RSL sub-branch would like to thank Peter for all the years he has placed others before himself."

Mr Bilney said he was too young to serve in the Korean War and too old for the Vietnam War, so leading Anzac and Remembrance Day services became his way of contributing.

"I counted it as an honour that I was able to do it," he said.

When he first began officiating at Anzac Day services, around 20 local World War II veterans would attend.

Over time, he has seen their numbers dwindle until none re-

However, he said it had been uplifting to see more children and young people attending both Anzac Day and Remembrance Day services in Stansbury.

"At my first Remembrance Day service, I had about 10 people turn up, but now it's up to about 150 to 200 people," he said.

Mr Bilney said nearly all students from Stansbury Primary School attend both services, along with many teenagers and young adults.

"Truly, it was a joy to see the young people at the Anzac Day services at 6.30am," he said.

"I would see great numbers of young ones sitting there, waiting for the service to start."

The Stansbury dawn service now draws between 300 and 500 people, depending on the day of the week, with weekend visitors often boosting numbers.

Mr Bilney said he was honoured to be recognised by the

"I have enjoyed it as a community service," he said.

"When you live in a country town, you just do your bit."

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# Forgotten veterans of Boer War remembered

YORKE Peninsula's forgotten war veterans have been remembered in a new book about the region's connections to the Boer War, launched in time for Remembrance Day.

The book documents 121 veterans of the war, fought from 1899 to 1902 between British imperial forces and farmers of Dutch descent in the Transvaal and Orange Free State regions of what is now South Africa.

Entitled Yorke Peninsula Connections to All Those Who Served, the book was launched on Thursday, November 6, at the Ardrossan Soldiers' Memorial Hall.

Amateur historian Wayne Barrie, of Tiddy Widdy Beach, said he wrote the book to honour the involvement of YP soldiers in the conflict and is making copies available to RSL sub-branches across the region.

"Travelling around Yorke Peninsula, not a single Boer War soldiers' honour roll was discovered, not a single name was found on a wall of remembrance,"

"Australia's military remembrance ends with the words 'We will remember them'.

"But what if nobody knows who they are?"

### **Telling their stories**

Wayne said, when the war began, Australia was suffering from a severe financial depression followed by a terrible drought.

More than 16,000 Australians served in the conflict.

"Up to five shillings a week to ride a horse and shoot at the enemy seemed a patriotic and welcome escape to many struggling families," he said.

The South African conditions were harsh, with scorching heat, bitter cold and torrential rain.

A lack of understanding of hygiene meant more soldiers died of typhoid than in combat, and hospitals were overcrowded and inadequate.

Wayne said he hopes the book will help family researchers, RSL subbranches and community members begin their own searches for information and recognise those who served.

### **Local families among** those who served

Among those featured are the three - Ralph, Thoma Nathaniel and Daniel — who served

in the South Australian Bushmen's Contingent, the SA Bushmen Corps and the Third Australian Commonwealth Horse (Queensland).

Daniel and Thomas are identified in the book as two of 17 children born to Thomas and Margaret Rickaby at Port Rickaby, though their birth dates have not been found, while Ralph was born in 1880 near Minlaton.

Another soldier, Herbert Ralph Hosking, served as a trooper in the 5th South Australian Imperial Bushmen.

His name appears on the Boer War Memorial outside Government House on North Terrace, Adelaide.

Born in Moonta in 1879, Herbert later lived in Ardrossan, where he worked as a butcher and farmer, served on the local progress association and district council, and was known as a skilled horseman.

"A family story has Herb losing his seat when his horse was spooked and bolted headlong into a large South African river," the book says.

"But by grasping his horse's tail, valided home due to gunshot wounds.

Herb never lost his mount despite the long swim to the other side of the river."

Herbert was the grandfather of Ardrossan resident Don Hosking, who attended the book launch.

Don said the book had added to the limited knowledge his family had about Herbert.

"We knew very little about what he got up to while he was away (at war)," Don said.

"They (the veterans) were very courageous, even to think they put their names down to fight in something they knew very little about."

Also featured is Edwin Joseph Hancock, son of Captain Henry Richard Hancock, manager of the Wallaroo and Moonta Mining and Smelting Company.

Edwin joined the 2nd South Australian Mounted Rifles alongside the infamous Harry "Breaker" Morant, earning a Queen's Service Award with five clasps before being inLEST WE FORGET... The date and time also coincide with the official ceasefire starting that ended the Great War (World War I) in 1919.



# **Harvest students** reflect on war through poetry


YEAR 11 students at Harvest Christian College, Kadina, spent time in the lead-up to Remembrance Day preparing poetry as part of an English assignment.

# **Restoring Port Broughton coast**

SOUTH Beach reserve and walking trail in Port Broughton have been transformed thanks to hundreds of native plants and more than a kilometre of new fencing.

An initiative of the Djuldawawa Badja (Narungga for resilient coast) project, the restoration was completed by local school students, council staff and the Northern and Yorke Landscape Board.

Replacing fencing damaged by a 2016 storm surge was the first step, playing a crucial role in safeguarding the sensitive dune ecosystem.

Port Broughton Area School students and staff then got to work on revegetation, with all primary classes helping during planting days at the site over the past two years.

Principal Scott Moore said students were excited to care for their local environment.

"The kids loved coming back again and were eager to check on the seedlings they had planted the previous year and see how they were doing," he

"What we wanted them to get out of it first and foremost was a connection to the land, which I think they definitely got, as they were so excited to come back for the second planting."

NYLB and Barunga West Council provided the native plants for the 2025 season.

BWC mayor Leonie Kerley, who has grown seedlings for decades, propagated many of the 2024 plantings herself.

The Port Broughton site is one of several locations across Yorke Peninsula to benefit from the Djulda-wawa Badja project, including Port Victoria, Point Pearce, The Bamboos (near Balgowan), Port Hughes, Moonta Bay and Barkers Beach (near Tickera).

These locations have had similar restorations, with more than 6.5 kilometres of fencing and thousands of seedlings planted in total.


"Through this project, I hope to see a long-term improvement in the health and resilience of the local coastal environment," Ms Kerley said.

"By reintroducing endemic vegetation, we can stabilise the dunes, reduce erosion, and create habitat for native wildlife.

"I also hope the area becomes a place where people can connect with nature and better understand the importance of caring for our local ecosystems.

"Ultimately, it's about leaving the landscape in better shape for future generations — healthier, more diverse, and more sus-

"I relate it to the newspaper, plenty of people read the newspaper online now, but it feels amazing to sit down and read the physical paper and feel the ink on the paper," she

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




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# **Michele Bennetts to chair Care in Motion**

# Museum makeover led by **Minlaton Volunteers**

NATIONAL Trust South Australia Minlaton Museum has been significantly upgraded, with volunteers spending countless hours sorting, restoring and reviving the

Over the past eight months, Ann Williams, Deb Harris and Regina Tang have worked together two days a week to improve the museum's appeal to the public.

Their efforts have included cleaning and polishing items, digitally recording the collection, and rearranging displays.

The transformation began in October 2024, when the museum shop was repainted by Colin Hill, assisted by Rick Hawthorne.

Ann has compiled eight catalogue books into a single Excel spreadsheet, which is being refined as they work through the full inventory.

Display case bases have been refreshed with second-hand fabric, and each item has been washed, polished and recorded.

Silver pieces were polished, and Emu Oil used to brighten and protect wooden items.

Materials were donated by Michelle Glass, Rae Peterson (including fabric, cushions and craft items) and Cindy Thompson, and cut and hemmed by Ann.

The uniform colour of the new display case linings helps highlight each object on show.

Further trimming, gluing and stapling was done by Deb, Regina and Ann for the remaining dis-

Ann also uncovered 13 photographs of local servicemen who lost their lives in World War I.

She treated the wooden frames with emu oil, restoring their orig-

Joyce Yeomans' sons, Paul and David, later installed the photos.

Model aeroplanes, donated by Fred (brother of Maree Anderson), have been suspended from the ceiling and placed under glass, with assistance from Colin Hill. Michelle made additional changes to displays.

Joyce also donated a large desk from the former Bank of Adelaide

Rae donated a cable to connect a PC to a USB drive containing hundreds of historical photos, which can now be viewed at the museum; A4 printouts are available at the customer's cost.

Timber furniture at the site is being treated using a furniture restorer product donated by Liz

To help raise funds, volunteers are making small animal critters from seashells and other craft items to sell in the shop.

Although the project is still a work in progress, the team has achieved a great deal in preparation for Minlaton's 150th anniversary celebrations in 2026.

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# **Keeping blister packs out of landfill**

SINCE its launch in 2022, Pharmacycle – the country's only end-to-end blister pack recycling program – has recycled more than 100 million blister packs across Australia

This milestone represents the recovery of approximately 150 tonnes of valuable materials, including plastic and aluminium, that would otherwise have ended up in landfill.

With more than 900 drop-off points located at pharmacies, hospitals and councils nationwide, the program helps Australians give everyday medicine packaging a second life.

Every pack is tracked from drop-off to reprocessing, ensuring transparency and keeping resources circulating within the local economy.

Once collected, the blister packs are separated into their component materials

Recovered plastic is sent to Pharmacycle's Australian manufacturing partner, Think Fencing Pty Ltd, where it is transformed into durable fencing products made entirely from recycled content.

Recovered aluminium is processed into deoxidant pucks, which are used in the steel-making industry to remove impurities.

Pharmacycle is also expanding into aged care facilities, which often generate large amounts of medication packaging but have limited recycling

The aim is to make it easier for more people to recycle and reduce waste.

Local residents can drop off their used blister packs at the Copper Coast Council Resource Recovery Centre, located at 14 Recycle Way, Wallaroo.

**COPPER Coast Council is** leading the way in sustainable waste management, with the region's food organics and garden organics (FOGO) program continuing to grow.

As part of its commitment to the circular economy, council provides residents with a free roll of compostable bags, available for pick up from the Kadina council office.

These bags are ideal for kitchen caddies and can be transferred directly into greenlidded FOGO bins for collection.

The FOGO program is already showing strong results, with households diverting an average of 5.32 kilograms of organic material per week from

Council is introducing several new initiatives to boost

community participation, including the rollout of purposebuilt waste stations across local parks and reserves.

These include three bins: a dedicated FOGO bin for compostable takeaway items (identified by the seedling logo), plus a bin for 10-cent deposit containers and the third for general landfill waste.

Council is also currently seeking expressions of interest from local community groups and not-for-profits to partner in the container deposit scheme.

Participating groups will have the opportunity to display their logo, assist with maintenance and benefit from the refund revenue

To support sustainable events, a second CCC events trailer has been added.

These trailers offer a complete three-bin setup

- FOGO, 10 cent recycling, and landfill — and are available for event organisers through council's events team.

Over the Christmas and New Year period (December 8 to January 30), residents will be able to present two FOGO bins for collection, based on regular collection days.

An additional 30 public FOGO bins will also be deployed across the region to accommodate increased seasonal waste.

Copper Coast Council continues to provide free kitchen caddies to all new residents, along with Resource Recovery Centre fridge magnets and brochures to help everyone to stay informed.

# Sun protection in focus

AUSTRALIANS are urged to make sun protection a daily habit ahead of National Skin Cancer Action Week (November 16-22), with two in three people likely to face a skin cancer diagnosis

The campaign urges Australians to take sun safety seriously, especially when UV levels reach 3 or above — when skin damage can occur, even without feeling the heat.

Dr Adriene Lee, Australasian College of Dermatologists president, warns that incidental exposure adds up.

With UV overexposure causing up to 95 per cent of melanomas, Australians are reminded to protect their skin from UV exposure.

People are also urged to check their skin regularly and see a GP or dermatologist if they notice any changes.

# Chelsea Biddell's milestone moment

Port Vincent export Chelsea Biddell has become a key pillar in the Adelaide Crows' defensive

But she admitted her journey to a landmark 75 AFLW games hasn't always been smooth sail-

Drafted from SANFL club West Adelaide as a key marking forward in the 2019 AFLW Draft, Biddell initially found it difficult to break into a strong Crows side, moving in and out of the team until her switch to defence in 2022.

That move proved careerdefining.

Biddell found her stride, becoming an ultra-consistent performer, helping secure the Crows' 2022 (season 6) premiership and earning her first All-Australian blazer the following season.

"It hasn't always been easy," Biddell said.

"At the start of my career I was in and out of the team, so it was pretty tough throughout those first couple of years.

"I was able to make my way into the team eventually as a defender.

"Probably at the start I was a bit inconsistent, so to now play at this level consistently has been a huge thing."

Biddell said she grew up supporting the Adelaide Football "This club means so much to

me, so running out for the 75th time wearing the tri-colours was a very special moment."

Biddell's milestone came during the Crows' strong elimination final win over St Kilda.

She played a pivotal role, tasked with shutting down Saints' 185cm key forward Jesse Wardlaw in a commanding 44-point victory.

Biddell holds an impressive 70 per cent win-loss record across her 75 AFLW games, winning 52 in Crows colours.

She has also been remarkably durable, not missing a match since the beginning of season 6 in 2022.

Her consistent performances have earned her All-Australian selection in three consecutive seasons — 2022, 2023 and 2024.

Ahead of the 2025 campaign, she had also finished top five in four consecutive club champion

Adding to her achievements, Biddell was named in the Crows' leadership group before the 2025 season, recognising her growing influence on and off the field.

With AFLW seasons shorter than the AFL mens, playing 75 games is considered the equivalent of 150 matches in the men's competition — an impressive milestone for one of the league's most consistent performers.

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# **Doug Olds: Norwood Hall of** Famer and champion wingman

Doug Olds, standing at just 162 centimetres (5 feet, 3 inches), was a brilliant wingman and is widely regarded as one of Norwood's finest footballers across the club's 150-year history.

A clever, creative and hardworking player with explosive pace, Olds was a master of the stab-kick and drop-kick. He was known for his precision, consistently finding leading forwards with pinpoint disposal.

Originally from Maitland, Olds was an apprentice in the printing trade when he moved to Adelaide as a 17-year-old.

He played his first senior game in 1944 for the combined Norwood-North team in the wartime Patriotic League. In that first season, he played for both the league side and the colts.

Olds' decision to sign with Norwood while playing in the colts drew protest from North Adelaide, who claimed Norwood had broken a gentleman's agreement that clubs would not pursue their own interests during the war.

North believed Olds should have remained a country permit player.

The controversy nearly dissolved the Norwood-North side, which ultimately went on to win the flag.

With the return to an eightteam SANFL structure in 1945, Olds was named Norwood's best junior and runner-up in the Magarey Medal, won that year by future Kadina publican Bob Ouinn.

Still early in what would become a Hall of Fame career, Olds represented South Australia against Victoria and a Victorian RAAF side in 1946.

He had enlisted in the Navy and was due for call-up on August 20, but the war ended before he was required to serve.

In 1946, Olds won his first best and fairest award and played a key role in Norwood's grand final victory over Port Adelaide.

He also represented South Australia again in a drawn match

against Victoria in Melbourne.

Olds claimed a second best and fairest in 1947 and represented SA at the national carnival in Hobart.

In 1948, he played in his second SANFL premiership, defeating West Adelaide, and again represented SA against Victoria.

His third premiership came in 1950 under coach Jack Oatey.

That year, he won a third best and fairest award, despite suffering a knee injury in the grand final win over Glenelg, which required surgery to remove a cartilage in December.

He was also part of the state side that travelled to Brisbane for the national carnival.

Olds was a standout in the 1952grand final, despite Norwood's heavy loss to North Adelaide. and was awarded Norwood life membership in 1954.

In 1957, Olds became the first Norwood player to reach the 200-game milestone, marking it in a match against Glenelg at Glenelg Oval on May 25.

His final appearance came later that year in the grand final against Port Adelaide.

He retired with a club record 214 games, three premierships, and three best and fairest

After retiring from league football, Olds coached Payneham, then led Norwood's reserves to a premiership in 1961, and coached again in 1962.

He was appointed Norwood league coach in 1963 and 1964, following Alan Killigrew's departure, and later coached Gaza in the South Australian Amateur Football League.

Olds was named on the wing in Norwood's Team of the Century and was an inaugural inductee into both the Norwood Hall of Fame (2006) and the South Australian Football Hall of Fame (2002).

A talented all-round sportsman, Olds also played A grade cricket for East Torrens and competed as a professional runner in the Bay Sheffield Handicap.





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## Mouse warning for SA farmers as activity rises

FARMERS are being urged to remain vigilant as mouse numbers continue to increase at key cropping and trapping sites across South Australia.

The latest CSIRO Mouse Monitoring Report has identified moderate to high activity in some cropping region — particularly on the Adelaide Plains and parts of Yorke Peninsula — while most other areas remain low.

On YP, recent testing revealed no mice at two sites, low activity at nine, and moderate levels at one site.

Grain Producers SA chief executive Brad Perry said it is vital growers stay proactive and report local mouse numbers to help researchers and industry monitor potential problem areas.

"We've seen what happens when mouse numbers get away from us — the impacts can be devastating, not just to crops but also to stored grain, machinery and infrastructure," Mr Perry said.

"While the latest report shows patchy activity, there are warning signs that we could see a population build-up over summer if food sources remain and weather conditions stay mild.

"GPSA encourages growers to monitor paddocks, clean up spilled grain, and use chew cards to gauge activity."

Farmers are also reminded to walk their paddocks and stay alert around homes and farm buildings.

## Research highlights bait challenges

CSIRO researcher and mouse expert Steve Henry said current studies are exploring whether cropping practices can be adjusted to reduce background food, how

bait visibility can be improved, and whether technology such as optical sprayers can efficiently map burrows for targeted baiting.

"We're looking at how background food in stubbles supports mouse populations through the off-season," Mr Henry said.

"Background food significantly affects bait effectiveness.

"The less food available, the better the chance mice will find and consume enough bait to receive a lethal dose — about two or three grains."

As crops mature, an increase in high-quality food can support breeding through the warmer

The CSIRO warns that clean harvest practices and careful monitoring are essential to reduce the risk of a mouse outbreak in autumn 2026.

#### Call for access to stronger bait

Mr Henry said CSIRO research has also shown that mice are more resistant to the zinc phosphide toxin than previously thought.

While older data suggested one milligram was enough to kill a 15gram mouse, new findings show it now takes two milligrams.

Mr Perry said GPSA is con-

cerned about the current restriction on using double-strength bait (ZnP50), which was critical during the last major plague when accessed under an emergency per-

"We believe decision-makers should consider the latest CSIRO data and whether an emergency permit will be needed," he said.

"If numbers continue to rise, South Australian grain producers need access to all tools available - well before next year's seeding.

"We can't afford to be caught off guard.

"Being prepared now, both onfarm and at a policy level, is the best defence against a repeat of previous mouse outbreaks."

Growers are encouraged to report and map mouse activity via MouseAlert (mousealert.org.au) so other producers can monitor local conditions.

Monitoring will continue over summer, with the next CSIRO national report due March-April

## Heavy vehicle access improved and streamlined

ACCESS for heavy vehicles has been improved and red tape reduced for operators in South Australia.

The reforms include transitioning access permits to notices, improving route access and cutting the need for more than 1000 road manager con-

Key updates include new notices to enhance crane movements and expand vehicle eligibility under the Livestock Transport Notice.

On August 29, the South Australia Class 3 Specified Routes Dimension Exemption Notice 2025 replaced an earlier notice, expanding network access and including B-doubles, while excluding some vehicle types.

The changes aim to streamline operations, improve safety and efficiency and reduce administrative burdens, and were jointly delivered by the National Heavy Vehicle Regulator, the Department for Infrastructure and Transport, and local councils. Transport Minister Emily Bourke and NHVR chief executive Nicole Rosie highlighted the reforms as a major step towards safer, smarter and more productive freight movement across the state.

Operators are reminded to review the Heavy Vehicle - Road Operations Access Map (tinyurl.com/4yyebfuj), and that travelling with an Oversize Overmass vehicle and load in South Australia is in accordance with the document titled Escorting Guidelines for oversize and overmass vehicles and loads in South Australia (tinyurl.com/

Operators are also reminded to review the Specified Road Manager Network Requirements, contained within the Operator's Guide for each notice, ahead of travel.

## Grassland **Fire Danger** Index unchanged

SOUTH Australian grain producers will continue using the Grassland Fire Danger Index of 35 measured at two metres under the Grain Harvesting Code of Practice for the 2025-26 harvest season.

Confirmation that the threshold will remain unchanged follows advocacy by Grain Producers SA and an agreement with the Minister for Emergency Services and the SA Country Fire Service.

GPSA chief executive Brad Perry welcomed the consistency.

"The Grain Harvesting Code and GFDI provide a practical, effective and well-understood framework for fire safety during harvest," he said.

"Our surveys show most growers measure the GFDI of 35 at two metres, and this decision supports continued clarity and safety onfarm and in the community."

The code sets out guidelines for when harvesting and grain handling should cease based on in-paddock weather conditions.

GPSA has long supported the current threshold as a reliable, science-based measure of fire risk.

Mr Perry said the code's continued use reflects strong collaboration between industry, government and the CFS.

"We know the Fire Behaviour Index is used in other parts of Australia, but at this stage, introducing a new system in South Australia would create more challenges than benefits," he said.

He also acknowledged grain

producers' proactive investment in fire safety, including equipment to help extinguish fires if needed.

"This decision allows growers to continue using a proven system that protects lives, livelihoods and rural communities," Mr Perry

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

#### **CAT CONTAINMENT UNDER THE CATS BY-LAW 2025**

**Public Consultation Notice**



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

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#### **HOT FISHING TIPS**

Jetties of Yorke Peninsula, Price: Originally located at the site of the current boat ramp in Wills Creek, Price once had a wharf, built in 1882 and, over time, extended to 80 metres. Coastal traders brought timber, phosphate and other cargo, returning to Port Adelaide with wheat, wool and mallee roots for firewood. Farmers received four shillings (40 cents) per ton as they cleared land for agriculture. Salt became the main export during and after World War II and continued up until the mid-1960s when the wharf was demolished. (Source: Jetties of SA Past and Present by Neville Collins).

Wallaroo: Strong southerly winds reaching up to 25 knots dominated most days last week, particularly over the weekend. Despite the conditions, jetty anglers managed to land a few blue swimmer crabs, tommy ruff (Australian herring) and squid. Offshore, boat crews reported good returns of King George whiting, squid and garfish.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: A few squid and the occasional blue swimmer crab were caught from the Port Hughes jetty, while garfish have been showing up in Moonta Bay and off the northern end of Tipara Reef. Boat crews also reported catches of whiting from Cape Elizabeth and waters south of Rifle Butts Beach.

Port Victoria: Good catches of whiting and some large squid were the main reports

over the past week, with boat crews needing to carefully time their trips around strong southerly winds. Balgowan and Chinaman Wells are producing solid numbers of whiting and garfish, while a few blue swimmer crabs have been taken from the Port Victoria jetty.

Point Turton: King George whiting have been biting well in this part of the Yorke Peninsula, with stronger-than-usual tides positively influencing their feeding patterns. Garfish have again been caught at Magazine Bay. The Pines and Port Minlacowie. The local jetty is producing mullet and the occasional

**Stenhouse Bay/Marion Bay:** Salmon up to 2kg made an appearance at Hillocky Beach last week, while smaller fish were reported from Butlers Beach and Salmon Beach, west of Foul Bay. When conditions allowed, boat crews headed out for red nannygai, kingfish and whiting (along with undersized snapper, which must be released immediately). Local jetties are producing mullet and tommy ruff.

Stansbury/Edithburgh: Following extremely low tides mid to late last week, undersize female blue swimmer crabs carrying eggs were reported at the Stansbury jetty. These must be returned to the water immediately, as per regulations. Squid remain scarce, but large tommy ruff are still being caught at night from the Edithburgh jetty. There's little to report from the boating scene at this stage.
