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# **Medical centre sale potential**

THE future of the Minlaton Medical Centre is looking a little healthier.

Owner Adelaide Unicare is in discussions with a potential purchaser for the centre, with processes underway to secure the sale.

Members of the Minlaton District Business Group received a promising update from Unicare CEO Michael Chalk last week.

Unicare advised its staff and students of its intention to withdraw from owning its four healthcare practices, including Minlaton, in May.

Two practices were sold but discussions have continued around the Minlaton site, with Mr Chalk announcing in September the clinic could close if a buyer was not found by November.

The clinic comprises a private GP practice and 24/7 public accident and emergency service, which was established after the hospital's closure in the 1990s.

Minlaton's accident and emergency department has been closed since Wednesday, September 22, and was initially expected to reopen later this month.

However, the department will

remain closed until further notice, with emergency patients diverted to Yorketown or Maitland Hospitals.

"Like many other regional and rural health centres in South Australia (and nationally) Minlaton Medical Centre has, from time to time, experienced difficulties in the retention and recruitment of GPs," Mr Chalk said in a statement last month.

"These difficulties are complex and multi-factorial.

"This includes the maldistribution within the broader health system of the GP workforce across Australia, with a relative oversupply of GPs in affluent metropolitan suburbs and a significant undersupply of GPs in regional and rural areas.

This problem remains and is perhaps more critical than ever before, with the COVID-19 pandemic having exacerbated and highlighted these longstanding issues."

Mr Chalk said Minlaton also faced specific issues relating to the personal medical condition of a long-serving doctor, who is expected back in coming months, and the delayed arrival of a new international medical graduate.

"The ability to fill short-term short gaps in the A&E on-call roster by using interstate-based locums has been virtually eliminated due to COVID-19 interstate travel restrictions and quarantine requirements," he said.

"COVID-19 has also created significant market distortions in the supply and demand for GP services in regional and rural areas.

"We regret having to make the decision to close A&E, due to a lack of available GPs.

"We have implemented our agreed contingency measures with relevant stakeholders.

These will mean that A&E presentations will be automatically diverted to the Yorketown Hospital, which is about 30 minutes away by road."

## **COP** that

THE 2021 United Nations Climate Change Conference, also known as COP26, is now officially over.

For two weeks, leaders from across the globe discussed how to limit the effects of climate change and addressed cuts to emissions.

COP president Alok Sharma was hopeful at the beginning of the summit. In his opening address he stated, while the window of time to cap global warming to

1.5 degrees Celsius was closing, he was hopeful of achieving an outcome "the world can be proud of" But the conference had to be extended by a day to finalise a pact which, according to

Sharma, delivered a "fragile win".

"But I would still say that the pulse of 1.5 is weak," he said.

"What this will be judged on, is not just the fact that countries have signed up, but on whether they meet and deliver on the commitments."

Not overly positive language, is it?

More than 100 countries agreed to slash methane emissions and signed a pact to end deforestation and 140 counties (not Australia) agreed to strengthen targets for 2030.

One of the biggest points of discussion was around coal power — a last-minute move by India meant the wording changed from "phase out" to "phase down".

You would imagine then this means governments, where able, start to take action. Not in Australia, with Resources Minister Keith Pitt saying the high quality of

Australian thermal coal will mean it continues to be produced decades into the future. Climate activists and organisations, as well as other countries, have been left more than disappointed by Australia's actions.

While Prime Minister Scott Morrison has committed to a target of net zero emissions by 2050, he didn't set a new emissions reduction target for 2030.

Climate Council head of research Dr Simon Bradshaw said Australia cemented its reputation as a laggard and blocker.

'The federal government showed up empty-handed to a pivotal moment in the fight for our future," he said.

'They've let down our Pacific neighbours, as well as Australians who do not deserve to endure more frequent and severe bushfires, floods, droughts and heatwaves."

An increase in global temperatures of 1.5 degrees Celsius may not on paper seem like much, but it will have huge impacts on the world, particularly vulnerable regions, including small islands and least developed countries.

For 1.5 degrees Celsius of global warming, there will be increasing heat waves, longer warm seasons and shorter cold seasons; at 2 degrees heat extremes are more likely to reach critical tolerance thresholds for agriculture and health.

There is no safe level of warming — it's all bad, it's just the depth (quite literally in island nations) that varies.

The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change's latest report on the matter, released early this year, further highlights the need to move and is why the lack of action at COP26 is so disappointing. The report was prepared by 234 scientists from 66 countries and found human

influence has warmed the climate at an unprecedented rate in at least the past 2000 years. Atmospheric carbon dioxide concentrations were higher in 2019 than at any time in at least two million years, and concentrations of methane and nitrous oxide were higher than at any time in the last 800,000 years.

We can and should all make small changes to reduce our impacts in an imperfect way, but, ultimately, the greatest responsibility for change rests on our governments. We need action and we need it now.

BUTE recorded its heaviest November rainfall in 80 years last week.

Records tumbled across the state as part of the unseasonable weather Thursday and Friday, November 11 and 12.

Bute received 54.4 mm in the 24 hours to 9am Friday, breaking the previous 1937 record of 44.7mm (according to incomplete rainfalls records).

After having the frustration of an extended dry period only to have too much rain at the wrong time, farmers in affected areas face heartbreak.

Agronomist Stefan Schmitt said there would be a benefit to next season's crops on certain soil types which have the ability to store rainfall and access subsoil moisture.

"Unfortunately, it also means growers in these areas will likely have to get straight on the boom spray after harvest," he said.

"As for the harvest, on lentils this may cause quality issues with wrinkled seed coat but, fortunately, most growers on northern YP were able to get some or all of their lentil program harvested prior to the rain.

"In wheat, reductions in protein levels and test weights of crops were likely but dependent on the conditions for drying after the rain." Agronomist Luke Harrop said

he expected downgrades to be somewhere in the order of \$50/tonne and \$200/hectare in badly affected areas.

"However, for the majority, the most recent rain event is the first of this harvest season and, with good drying conditions and minimal follow-up rain, losses should be kept to a minimum," he said.

Koolywurtie farmer Ed Brown runs a sheep and cropping operation and said at this stage his region had dodged a bullet having recorded only 8mm of rain in the 24-hour period last Thursday and Friday.

"We've been very fortunate compared with some of our northern friends and we'll start harvest as soon as it dries out," he said.

"Our Italian ryegrass, which was sewn in the autumn, will get a bit of growth out of this which will benefit our weaners," he said.

The wet weather not only stalled the grain harvest in many areas, it also created problems for Remembrance Day commemorations and washed out a number of Thursday lawn bowls fixtures.

"The greens became unplayable after the deluge soaked the greens and left puddles all over the place," Ardrossan Bowling Club president Jim Burgess said.

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# More pop-up vax clinics at schools

STUDENTS and staff at Maitland Lutheran School and Moonta Area School will be next in line for a COVID vaccination, as more clinics at schools in South Australia are announced.

The state government announced earlier this month 54 new schools would be involved in the rollout before Christmas.

South Australians are being urged to roll up their sleeves and get vaccinated, before the state opens up on November 23.

Moonta Area School will be offering vaccines to students aged 12 and above, staff, parents and siblings of those who attend the school.

The school's first day of vaccination will be tomorrow, Wednesday, November 17, and a follow up day will be held on Wednesday, December 8.

At Maitland Lutheran School, vaccinations will be offered to staff and students, an opportunity principal David Field said the school was very grateful for.

"Maitland Lutheran School was offered the opportunity to host a vaccination clinic for staff and students wanting to receive COVID vaccinations," he said.

"The school confidently partnered in this program with vaccinations on offer on Thursday, November 11 and before the school year ends on December 3.

"The school community appreciates this opportunity to receive full vaccination before the conclusion of 2021."

Kadina Memorial School had previously been announced as a vaccination hub.

Chief public health officer Professor Nicola Spurrier said making vaccinations mandatory for South Australian teachers was something that was being looked at.

"It is every child's right to have an education, it is an essential service in my eyes," she said.

"But we have to think of all the pros and cons of going down that path (of mandatory vaccination) and we're in the process of doing just that."

Premier Stephen Marshall said getting vaccinated was an integral part of South Australians regaining freedom.

"The rapid expansion of the school-based hubs means students and their families have a more convenient way to get vaccinated during this school term and ensure our school communities remain as safe as possible," Premier Marshall said.

"With the festive season fast approaching, South Australians have Christmas in their hands.

"If we all get behind the rollout and push up past the 90 per cent double vaccination milestone, we can have a more normal Christmas."



# **Understanding storm damage**

YORKE Peninsula Council is working closely with the state government to understand the extent of recent storm damage.

"Yorke Peninsula farmers are among those who have reported storms impacting on crops and infrastructure," a council spokesperson said.

"Council and PIRSA are committed to a community-led recovery, which puts the focus on those who have been affected, their needs and at their pace. "This recovery style is known to be the most effective and will provide opportunities, build future capacity and improve resilience.

"PIRSA will continue working with council to gather information, coordinate on-the-ground assistance and provide advice.

"Council and PIRSA are committed to supporting growers to identify their own recovery needs, and empowering them to lead recovery activities." The spokesperson said primary producers can access the PIRSA Recovery Hotline by dialling 1800 931 314 and pressing #1.

"All primary producers are also invited to participate in a survey to help the state government understand the impacts of the storms, available at www.pir.sa.gov.au/storms, which closes 11.59pm Monday, November 22," the spokesperson said.

"Details about storm damage

will help identify the type of recovery support required.

"PIRSA has been working closely with SA Health and SAPOL so specialist agricultural insurance assessors can enter South Australia.

"Family and business mentors are also now available in the region to provide free, informal, confidential and independent help, with more information available at www.pir.sa.gov.au/ fabs."

WHEN Ardrossan electrician Nick Brind saw his granddad Geoff lying in an ICU bed after emergency heart surgery, he felt the need to act.

Mr Brind said he was shocked to see his seemingly indestructible grandfather lying there looking frail and struggling for his next breath.

"It was pretty confronting," he said.

"He went from helping out on the farm, cutting wood and climbing ladders one day, to looking like he might not pull through the next.

"When I was there with him, I noticed a Heart Foundation pillow perched on his chest, so I did a Google search and found out they were promoting a marathon walk or run during the month of October."

Mr Brind decided to jump on board and complete the challenge by walking the 47 kilometres from Ardrossan to Port Victoria.

With 24 hours warning, Mr Brind asked his 11-year-old daughter Shayla if she wanted to join him. The pair set off early with a charged speaker for music and aims of jogging amongst their walk.

Blisters however were not on the agenda and 6km outs, Mr Brind's new sneakers were causing problems.

Luckily, Mr Brind's wife Sarah, who was invaluable as support crew, was on hand to provide support and replacement footwear.

Shayla too began to get blisters and between Maitland and Port Victoria, she felt the biggest one pop, retiring at the 42km mark.

"Once the music died and Shayla was no longer with me, it was just a nasty headwind and my thoughts and the last 6km felt like forever," Mr Brind said.

Mr Brind raised more than \$3000 from the walk, and was ranked in the top 20 of more than 20,000 participants.

Geoff is now recovering well at his Maitland home.

# Pushing for more ambulance officers

INDEPENDENT candidate for Narungga Dianah Walter met with Ambulance Employees Association officials to discuss the need for greater workforce capacity.

Ms Walter met with AEA secretary Leah Watkins, senior industrial officer Rob Leaney and industrial officer and paramedic Josh Karpowicz, as well as local career paramedics in Wallaroo recently.

"The AEA released a comprehensive document to the public which outlines what measures are needed to build resilience into the SA Ambulance Service, ensuring there is appropriate capacity and resources available to meet the current demands both now and into the future," Ms Walter said.

"I used feedback I received from community engagement sessions, and the AEA document, as the basis of my conversation with the representatives.

"As an ardent and longterm advocate for better regional health services, and as a health consumer myself, I have grave concerns for the health and wellbeing of the existing SAAS workforce and their ongoing resilience and capacity to cope with existing workloads.

"This concern exponentially grows as workloads are predicted to increase once the borders open and the summer influx of holidaymakers steams into the region.

"The inadequate existing capability, which includes heavy reliance on the volunteer contingent, limited access for volunteers to realtime clinical and other support and scant or non-existent general practitioner and emergency medicine specialists only adds to my concerns."

Ms Walter said she largely supported the AEA's recommendations and was keen to review the costings.

"Investment is needed urgently but I would like to better understand the numbers projected over the next two election cycles and forward estimates, and importantly what a return on that investment will look like for Narungga," she said.

"I will openly advocate that the government of the day immediately agree on a fair enterprise agreement for members and does so without eroding existing conditions."

Ms Walter will join the AEA at Parliament House tomorrow (Wednesday, November 17) as a petition calling for more ambulances and an end to ramping is tabled by Opposition leader Peter Malinauskas.

# Reduced quarantine time for fully vaxxed

FULLY vaccinated South Australians will complete a reduced quarantine if they are a close contact of a COVID-19 positive case, under new testing and quarantine requirements.

Premier Steven Marshall said fully vaccinated South Australians will only need to quarantine for seven days, while unvaccinated people will need to quarantine for the full 14 days when the borders reopen on November 23.

Updated testing and quarantine requirements also redefine who is classified as a close and casual contact, with fully vaccinated casual contacts only isolating until they receive their first negative test result. "South Australians rolling up to get vaccinated have put our state into an excellent position to be prepared for COVID-19 cases in our state," Mr Marshall said.

"Fully vaccinated people will no longer face long periods in quarantine if they come into close contact with a positive case.

"Achieving high vaccination rates is a key part of our strong plan to be COVID-ready and South Australia's pandemic control going forward."

Chief public health officer Professor Nicola Spurrier said testing, tracing, isolation and quarantine will continue to play a very significant role when our borders open. "Our contact tracing team are 'match-ready' to carry out their vital work with contact tracing and outbreak control as we know this is a key preventative measure to limit infections, illness and the impact on our healthcare system," Professor Spurrier said.

"The team will continue to get in touch with all individuals who have come into contact with a case to inform them if they are a close or casual contact and what is expected of

YORKE Peninsula Council will pause the delivery of food organics green organics waste management until it receives more information.

Council received two information reports from market research agency McGregor Tan at its November 10 meeting. However, council wants to wait until it



receives the Legatus Group's Draft Waste and Resource Recovery Strategy 2021-26 before making any decisions.

Council received funding from Green Industries SA through the Waste and Resource Recovery Modernisation and Council Transition Package to conduct a feasibility study of food organics/green organics waste management options in May 2020.

The study considered kerbside collection and residential onsite management to enable the diversion of FOGO from landfill, including the feasibility of technologically innovative solutions.

Council currently has a green organic (garden waste) only collection that is collected monthly.

# Man arrested after attempting to light fires in Kadina

A MAN has been arrested after he tried to start fires at service stations in Kadina last Wednesday, November 10.

Patrols were called to a service station at about 3.35pm, where they will allege a man had tried to pour petrol into rubbish bins and start a fire.

He had also tried to do the same thing at two other stations nearby.

The 25-year-old local man was charged with three counts of acts to endanger life. He was refused bail and appeared in court on November 11.

"We set off on a journey in a caravan around Australia evaluating regional areas ... while we were on the road, we tried to determine what sort of business we wanted to do."

The couple chose the Copper Coast because they felt the three towns were big enough but still had great community connection.

"We found our way to the Copper Coast; we did a viability assessment and it felt right here," Troy said.

"Our timing was lucky because it



was December 2019 that we bought our place in Wallaroo which was a few months before the pandemic hit.

"At the end of 2019 we both got accepted into the (brewing) course, we got the house and then COVID happened."

After completing the course, the couple started to focus more on the product and business plan.

"We established Hedonbar Brewing Company, put together a business plan, began engagement with Copper Coast Council and put out an expression of interest looking for potential sites for a larger brewery," Troy said. Rayma said deciding to start a brew-

ery was as simple as one day enjoying a

beer together.

"It couldn't be just running a business, it had to be a career where we were creating something crafty and we enjoyed," she said. "We were sitting there having a beer

and I said 'why don't we run a brewery?'

"Troy has a technical background

and it's quite common for people with that sort of background to get into brewing because there is quite a bit of science behind it.

"As part of the process we entered into Australian Amateur Brewing Championships.

"To get that accolade ahead of time was really humbling."

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# **SACE** exams the final test

YEAR 12 students across Yorke Peninsula have now completed their final school challenge, with exams ending yesterday, (Monday, November 15).

For many students, the final exams are an important part of securing an opportunity at university or other future endeavours.

There were 150 year 12 students enrolled across seven secondary schools on Yorke Peninsula in 2021, although not all participated in exams.

Kadina Memorial School had the most students enrolled with 79 taking on their final year.

"I felt okay about my exams and I certainly felt strong in my general mathematics exam," KMS student Ryley Hansen said.

"I prefer the paper exams but the online ones were well organised and I'm really glad I put the time aside to study carefully."

For Yorketown Area School student Indilee Pedler, exams are an opportunity for her hard work throughout the year to pay off.

"Throughout the year I prepared for exams by frequent revision of course content through reading, rewriting notes, and making flashcards and taking quizzes," she said.

"The teachers have been helpful by encouraging us to write a revision plan coming into the exam period and giving us resources such as practice exams to use for revision."

Yorketown Area School had 10 students enrolled in year 12 in 2021, six of whom participated in end-of-year exams.

"Much of my learning has been done on a personal and independent level with less help from peers and family members because that's how I learn best," Indilee said. Minister for Education John Gardner congratulated the graduating class of 2021 for their hard work.

"While exams are an opportunity for students to show off what they have learned, it's also important to remember they're just one part of their schooling journey and won't define their pathway beyond school," he said.

Students will be able to access their year 12 results online from 8.30am on Monday, December 13.



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# Waste changes for businesses

MORE waste changes are coming for Copper Coast businesses.

Copper Coast Council introduced a weekly three-bin collection for all traders in Kadina, Wallaroo and Moonta in February.

Monday has been pick up day for businesses in the CBD, industrial and light industry areas for about 20 months.

But collection will change to Tuesdays as of December 1.

YP Work and Safety Wear's Sandra Herbert signed up early on for the new collection system.

"It's been great for us and this move is good too — it means we don't have to think about it on a long weekend," she said.

"We won't have to leave the bin out over a long weekend."





# Lighting up Kadina

CHRISTMAS in Kadina is going to be big this year.

The Kadina Hub has purchased a 26-foot (eight metre) high Christmas tree for Victoria Square and is kicking off the festive season with an official lighting ceremony on Friday, November 26.

Hub secretary Annette Smith said the night would be a celebration for all in the community to enjoy.

"We've been thinking about getting a big thing for Christmas for at least four years," Mrs Smith said.

"So last year I did some research, found an Australian-based company which makes some of the biggest trees around Sydney and got a quote."

The Hub received funding support from the local Apex, Lions and Rotary clubs as well as Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis and a Copper Coast Council community grant to purchase the tree.

# **Big YPFL honour for Big T**

TREVOR "Big T" Price has been strapping ankles longer than most of his footballers have lived.

Price was recognised for his tireless volunteering with Paskeville Football Club and the wider Yorke Peninsula Football League with a YPFL life membership last week.

The honour was approved by the YPFL board at a meeting on Tuesday, November 9.

Now 88 years old, Trevor has been a Paskeville boy through and through, growing up on his family farm alongside his siblings.

"I remember walking two miles to school and back every day — my school had 70 kids and only two teachers," Trevor said.

"I also walked two miles to footy practice every Wednesday, and nowadays, kids won't even walk two metres!"

Trevor's love for PFC started when he began playing B grade as a 15 year old, as there were no junior teams.

"We lost more than we won back then, but it was a really good environment to get tied up in," he said.

After watching his father C. W. Price wear the black and white number 11 guernsey, Big T wore the same number for as long as he could remember, before handing it down to his sons Chris and Brenton.

The Price legacy still lives on with Big T's grandson Hamish still running around in the 11.

"My guernsey was a lace-up and I often couldn't even thread it together," Trevor said.

Trevor hung up the boots after more than 300 senior games, including a combined total of five A and B grade premierships.

Just two years later, Trevor was apprenticed by his father who was head trainer at the football club.

"Dad taught me everything he knew



about being a trainer — he even made his own rubdown oil and (I) still have the recipe," he said.

Trevor recently brought up the 50year milestone as PFC head trainer and has only missed a handful of trainings in his stint.

"Just about half the players I've strapped have been high maintenance and there's even junior colts asking for rubdowns now!" he said.

"We've won a few premierships in my time as trainer, making it all the more worth it.

"I've still got the 2015 grand final footy at home — after the siren went, I grabbed the ball and tucked it under my shirt."

On top of his head trainer duties,

Trevor also enjoyed a three-year stint as PFC president and seven years as social committee president.

Trevor said it has been sad to see the Paskeville township become significantly smaller over his years, but the sporting community has remained strong.

"Some of the biggest improvements to the footy club have been new floodlights, oval upgrades and the new clubrooms in 1981," he said.

"We used to all just use the old grandstand (which remains to this day) — I have plenty of great memories from over there.

"I've made numerous lifelong friends and don't think I've had one argument in my time here. "The beauty of a small town like Pasky is that it's all one community."

Trevor said he would love to see more volunteers put their hands up to help their clubs.

"Volunteering is such a good way to socialise — you can get a lot of enjoyment from doing jobs here and there," he said.

Trevor only retired from the family farm three years ago, but has no intention of stopping his footy commitments.

"Not a lot keeps me busy nowadays, but I do enjoy cooking and gardening with my wife," he said.

"I'm hoping to continue being a trainer next season and have no plans of stopping just yet."

IN addition to his Paskeville Football Club commitments, Trevor "Big T" Price has also been a devoted volunteer for representative teams.



SHARE the Dignity is calling on South Australians to support people in need who menstruate through their annual #ItsInTheBag Christmas appeal.

People are being encouraged to donate a bag and drop off at local collection points, including in Moonta, Kadina, Minlaton and Ardrossan, by November 30.

The initiative, which is now in its seventh year, aims to ensure those spending Christmas in a domestic violence shelter receive the basic essentials

These essentials include pads and tampons, deodorant, toothbrush and toothpaste, shampoo, conditioner and soap as well as luxuries such as hair accessories or a handwritten note. With COVID-19 pushing more vulnerable people who menstruate below the poverty line, and at greater risk of homelessness and domestic violence, #ItsInTheBag donations are in high demand. According to recent research from the Queensland University of Technology Centre for Justice, more than 60 per cent of domestic and family violence service providers across the country reported an increase in the number of people seeking help during the early stages of the pandemic. "We clearly saw the impact of COVID-19 last year — nationally, we received 50,000 fewer bags in 2020, compared to 2019," Share the Dignity founder and managing director Rochelle Courtenay said.



# **Car preparations**

- I Check under the bonnet. Check the engine oil, coolant and windscreen washer reservoir, and top up if needed. If you have been topping up any fluids more frequently than usual, especially coolant, now is the time to get a technician to check it out.
- Make sure all car lights and indicators are working. It is important to make sure all the indicators are functional to avoid accidents.
- Make sure you have a clear view. A clear view of the road ahead and the surrounding area is important. Looking through a windscreen smeared with dirt and road grime can be tiring, as well as unsafe. Clean your windscreen inside and out and check the fluid washer level. A clear windscreen is especially important if you're going to be

driving at night. Be sure to turn on the wipers and make sure they're in good working order. Clean them regularly and replace them if they begin to squeak or leave streaks behind.



Even if you've had a heart attack before, the symptoms might be different if you have another one. Some people experience just one symptom while others will have a combination of symptoms.

Australians do not recognise the typical warning signs.

A heart attack occurs when one of the arteries supplying blood to the heart muscle becomes blocked stopping blood flow to the heart muscle below the blockage.

If this isn't fixed quickly, the heart muscle will start to die and can lead to permanent damage.

The warning signs of a heart attack can be different for each person.

- Pain (or discomfort) in one or more of the arms, shoulders, neck, jaw or back
   Shorthage of breath or diffi
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- Sweating or a cold sweat
- Dizziness, light headedness, feeling faint
- Vomiting, nausea, indigestion
- Feeling anxious

Some people who have had a heart attack say it is "like an elephant sitting on my chest" or a "belt tightened around my chest" or they thought they had bad indigestion.

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

# Diabetic retinopathy during pregnancy

Diabetic retinopathy is the leading cause of visual impairment in people aged between 20 and 64, and pregnancy is an independent risk factor for its progression.

Management of DR has changed dramatically over the past 10 to 20 years but it continues to be a challenge, especially during pregnancy, with reasons including a potential for rapid progression, treatment effects on foetus, and numerous competing medical appointments.

Diabetes affects 9.9 per cent of pregnancies in Australia. The vast majority are gestational diabetes (GDM), occurring in 8.9 per cent of pregnancies, with one per cent having preexisting diabetes.

GDM resolves after giving birth; however, a proportion of patients diagnosed with GDM may have undetected pre-existing diabetes, and this subgroup is at risk of developing DR during pregnancy.

Pregnancy is an independent risk factor in the progression of DR and is estimated to progress at twice the rate when compared with nonpregnant women.

Other risk factors that accelerate DR progression are poor glycaemic control, disease duration, severity of pre-existing DR and hypertension.

Ideally, people with diabetes should have a comprehensive eye exam before conception, or as soon as possible in the first trimester; follow up then depends on the severity of DR.

Management of pregnant people with diabetes requires a team approach. Close cooperation and communication between the patient and obstetrician, ophthalmologist, and other physicians, as necessary, is essential to develop an individual management plan for optimal outcomes.

# Garden project grows community engagement

KADINA Memorial School sowed the seeds for better mental health impacts as it officially opened its community garden on Wednesday, October 27.

The school partnered with SOS Copper Coast Suicide Prevention Network for its Sowing the Seeds of Resilience project, before receiving \$50,000 through the state government's Healthy Towns Challenge for the garden.

Copper Coast Council completed groundworks and paved wheelchairaccessible pathways for the site, while students created garden beds, installed irrigation and built a boundary fence.

Numerous features have been added to the garden, including an Indigenous painting created and donated by Nharangga student Cheylen Wanganeen, other decorative paintings, sculptures, a seating area, birdbath, as well as sensory and Nharangga-themed plots.

School principal Alistair Williams said the project had come along amazingly.

"The garden is an ideal space to spend time and relax," Mr Williams said.

"Research shows time spent outdoors in a green space, as well as volunteering and contributing to a joint project, is beneficial emotionally and physically.

"It's a great way to prevent mental health issues and take some reflective time.

"As a school, student wellbeing is a priority and we believe by extending this to our community we are taking a more holistic approach to long-term health." Mr Williams said the project wouldn't

have gone ahead without the help of students and volunteers.

"Students have been paramount by not only working (on the garden) during lesson time, but also coming in on the weekends," he said.

"It's been a great community project with parents volunteering so much of their time as well.

"The main project coordinators were ag teacher Mary-Jayne Hickman, who's on maternity leave, and volunteer Meagan Daniel — they both did some networking to get it off the ground."

Mr Williams said he hoped community members would visit the garden after school hours and on weekends.

"It will be good to have Estia (Health Kadina aged care) residents walk through and for kindergarten kids to come and visit," he said.





Yorke Peninsula was well represented in Adelaide for the SAP-SASA year 6/7 boys' cricket carnival recently.


The southern Yorke Peninsula side finished the carnival runners-up after playing games against Upper South East, Southern Fleurieu and Southern Valley.

Yorke Peninsula girls from 12 to 15 years old will have the opportunity to participate in a Girls Strikers Gala Day at Maitland oval this Friday, November 19.

The event is being offered as a response to the recent growth in popularity of women's cricket, according to North-West country cricket officer Drew McDonald.

In the aftermath of the gala day, it is hoped a four team Girls Strikers League can be established. McDonald said the day was about encouraging new participants to take up cricket.

"It's going to be a fun and excit-

#### ing day with lots going on and huge opportunities for participation," he said.

"The program is based for schools which allows us to reach people who probably aren't already involved in cricket.

"We'll have as many local clubs present as possible, so that way kids know where the outlet is."

The region currently has the Cricket Peninsula Yorke Association, servicing teams from Port Broughton/Mundoora to Arthurton/Weetulta, as well as the Lower YPCA, with teams from Maitland, south.

However, these leagues — and their junior programs — only offer predominantly male competitions.

Maitland Cricket Club president Michael McCauley said his club currently has five girls who play across the colts competitions with the boys.

"The girls we have playing for us are the daughters of the guys who play senior cricket, so apart from that, it can be difficult at times finding others," he said.

"It's all about trying to promote the product and let it be known that if girls want it, they can have it.

"My daughter plays in Adelaide, so there's definitely a pathway there, and who knows where you could end up maybe playing for a club in Adelaide or for the Strikers."

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

This award to Aaron Jak is well overdue.


Aaron is firmly community minded, always doing or thinking of ways to better the town.

"We've had lots of pre-approvals lately and people are getting their contracts signed really fast," she said. "This is likely (a result of) the low

about buying locally, not only in real interest rates and people wanting to purchase rather than rent.

"It could also be because people are staying home and saving more money, or because owning your own property is becoming a priority."

However, Ms Horsell mentioned most major banks had lifted their fixed interest rates slightly in the past few weeks.

"Variable rates are still very low, so it's still a good time to take out a home loan," she said.

"The market is still looking pretty steady, but we don't know for certain what will happen."

### **Strong national** housing demand

POTENTIAL property buyers waiting for price reductions will be disappointed, according to BuyersBuyers co-founder Pete Wargent.

"Low mortgage rates are still attractive for investors, and asking rents are rising much more quickly now, up by about 10 per cent over the past year," Mr Wargent said.

"Activity in the housing market is robust and likely to pick up as Sydney and Melbourne (COVID-19) restrictions ease.

"Lending figures and historically strong auction clearance rates over the past week also show that the market remains strong.

"The immigration intake next year will add to housing demand, and family-suitable properties are experiencing strong demand across many areas of the country."



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# Fungicide resistance awareness in the spotlight

GRAIN growers and advisers are invited to take part in a national Australian Fungicide Resistance Extension Network survey to gauge awareness of fungicide resistance issues and management.

Whether you consider yourself an expert, a responsible fungicide user, or just want an idea of how your current knowledge measures up, your participation will be valuable to the network's ongoing fungicide resistance extension work.

The network represents a significant investment by the Grains Research and Development Corporation in partnership with the Centre for Crop Disease Management at Curtin University and a network of regional plant pathologists, disease management experts and extension specialists.

The anonymous survey is being conducted online and takes an estimated 15 to 20 minutes to complete.

"Fungicides are essential chem-

ical tools in all cropping regions of Australia and their continued effectiveness is a key factor in achieving optimum grain yields," GRDC grower relations South manager South Randall Wilksch said.

"Understanding current levels of grower and adviser knowledge will help us maximise our extension efforts."

The survey is designed to measure any changes in behaviour following an initial baseline survey conducted in 2020, which had solid engagement from across Australian growers, advisers and agronomists.

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# Nightmare weed for livestock

LIVESTOCK farmers and landholders should be on high alert for noxious pest plant Noogoora burr which can inundate pastures and contaminate wool.

The declared weed produces spiny burrs that stick to sheep's wool and remains dormant during winter before germinating with spring and summer rain.

Northern and Yorke Landscape Board Officer Alexia Catford said with recent rain events, growers will need to watch out for the

germination of Noogoora burr on their properties.

"Noogoora burr lies in wait for the rain, but once it comes, it grows rapidly and sets seed quite quickly, so early detection is vital," she said.

"It's a ruthless weed that can dominate entire cropping and pasture paddocks and as it's an annual plant, there is only a small window of opportunity to control it."

Noogoora burr is notorious for moving quickly across the landscape as the burrs are covered in hooked spines that are easily lodged and carried in wool.

Good hygiene and biosecurity practices are essential to protect the value of stock and limit the weed spreading to neighbouring properties or even further afield via stock transport.

"It's a good idea to graze all newly purchased livestock in paddocks that you visit regularly, so any germinating weeds can be seen, identified and controlled before seed set and widespread establishment," Ms Catford said.

Farmers can expect Noogoora burr to germinate from September to January, with the burrs forming between February and April.

Landscape officers from the Northern and Yorke Landscape Board can help land managers identify weeds and also provide advice about the best control methods for individual situations.

# **Consultation opens** on Australia's first biosecurity strategy

INITIAL consultation is open to help develop Australia's first national biosecurity strategy.

Minister for Agriculture and Northern Australia David Littleproud said a national biosecurity strategy will provide direction for Australia's biosecurity system and ensure it remains fit to meet the challenges of the next decade.

"The management of the national biosecurity system is becoming increasingly complex, creating new challenges for governments, industry and other stakeholders," Mr Littleproud said.

"Strong and efficient biosecurity is even more important as we, and the rest of the world, respond to emerging challenges and recover our economy post-COVID.

"A national biosecurity strategy will link our ambition and collective efforts to strengthen our biosecurity system, in order to protect our environment, economy and way of life."

The strategy is being developed by the Australian, state and territory governments through the National Biosecurity Committee with industry, environmental groups, community and other stakeholders.

Public submissions for the first phase of consultation can be lodged until November 26.

# **National traceability** for all horses

THE federal government is providing \$1.1 million towards establishing national traceability arrangements for all horses.

"Horses and maintaining their health status are part of the rural social fabric on which Australian agriculture's continued productivity relies," Mr Littleproud said.

"Reliable national horse identification and traceability support good biosecurity, exports, food safety and animal welfare outcomes.

"The Australian Government is prepared to do its part, to support the horse industry and state and territory regulators, to kick-start practical traceability arrangements that benefit the horse industry and community."

Mr Littleproud said establishing appropriate national arrangements will also help to bolster trading partners' confidence.

"Horse traceability will safeguard our rural and regional industries and communities and the enviable horse health status on which they rely," he said.

"Agriculture ministers established the working group, which comprises state, territory and Commonwealth officials as well as horse industry and interest group representatives.

"I look forward to receiving, alongside my state and territory ministerial colleagues, the advice of the working group."


Test and evaluation activities involving static firings and/or firings of naval and artillery weapons are conducted at the Proof and Experimental Establishment Port Wakefield throughout the year. The Proof and Experimental Establishment Port Wakefield is a vital Defence test and evaluation capability that has supported Defence since 1929.

These firings may require specific tidal or weather conditions, and are critical for the safety of current and new Defence capabilities. Members of the public may notice noise, vibration, flashes and/or smoke during the testing. There is no risk to the public outside of the gazetted Defence Practice Areas.

For reasons of public safety, there is a permanent exclusion zone covering land, sea and air around the Port Wakefield Establishment. Specific details on the Port Wakefield Prohibited Area can be obtained from Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No GN 26, 4 July 1990, and is shown on the diagram below. Trespassing in this Area is strictly prohibited and very dangerous due to the presence of unexploded bombs. Any person found within the Prohibited Area or on Defence land will be subject to prosecution.

Specific test and evaluation activities may also require restricting public access to the Port Wakefield Defence Practice Areas over specific periods with these areas articulated in the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No. GN 40, 7 October 1992, and also identified on the diagram below. This may affect access to the Gulf of St Vincent at Port Wakefield and Port Parham.



There is no doubt in my mind Katie was a questionable choice for the show and has some pretty vile opinions.


However, I know for a fact she makes entertaining viewing because I watched her on the UK's Celebrity Big Brother.





Wallaroo: A number of prawn trawlers have been in the bay as they prepare for or unload catches of Spencer Gulf prawns for the Christmas market. Strong southwesterly winds and heavy rain were along this part of the coast last week so fishing opportunities were somewhat limited. A quiet jetty with small blue crabs and a few squid and gar from Point Riley being the main reports. Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: King George whiting have been in the bay and up in the broken grounds at Warburto Point. Gar and squid are at West Light, while the jetties hold a few bluevs and tommy ruff (Australian herring) after dusk.

fishers in a tinny along the local blue line on a bait of soft squid. Gar and squid are up at Minlacowie and Port Rickaby. The jetties at Port Rickaby and Point Turton have squid at first light.

Marion Bay and Stenhouse Bay: Nice tommies have continued their run at Stenhouse Bay jetty while I had an unconfirmed report of mulloway from Berry Bay on Sunday night. Boat crews are making spasmodic trips out for red nannygai, flathead and snook. Edithburgh/Stansbury: KG whiting are off Sultana Passage and Tapley Shoals, but rugger snapper are about and cannot be kept. Good catches of ruff came from the jetty on Friday evening. Rakers enjoyed a catch of blue crabs from The Hut last week. Black Point/Ardrossan: The Black Point boat ramp is closed due to works. Blueys, squid and garfish are at Ardrossan and yellowfin whiting in the high tide shallows at the Pine Point wharf.
