Minister says search is on for a new

A NEW principal is being sought for Wallaroo Mines Primary School, the Education Minister Blair Boyer told the South Australian Parliament last week.

The incumbent principal, Tamarin Condon, who started at the school in term three, is on leave while the Department for Education investigates the school's leadership.

Tim McLeod, a former principal at Ardrossan Area School, started as acting WMPS principal, yesterday (Monday, November 17).

WMPS parents received an email from Mr McLeod yesterday, informing them he would be at the school until the end of the current term.

As reported in YP Country Times (11-11-25), school parents are waiting to be told who will be the school's principal in 2026, so they can make decisions about which school their children will attend.

New YPCT website launches Thursday

THE Yorke Peninsula Country Times will launch its new-look website on Thursday, November 20, bringing with it a new subscription structure for digital readers.

From next week's edition (Tuesday, November 25), all online subscriptions will move to monthly or yearly billing, replacing current per-week payment options.

Subscribers on weekly, four-weekly, 13-weekly or 26-weekly plans will be automatically shifted to a \$13 monthly plan, with charges to be applied on the same date each calendar month.

Customers on a 52-week plan will transition to an annual subscription of \$143 - equivalent to getting one month free.

These changes will begin from each subscription's current expiry date, starting with weekly customers.

From Monday, customers will be charged \$13 per month instead of the previous weekly rate.

To change between monthly and yearly billing, subscribers can log into the YPCT website, go to "My Account" and update their subscription details.

The cover price for the print edition remains unchanged at \$3.

YPCT managing director Michael Ellis said the newspaper continued to offer strong value

Common sense needed to help fix housing crisis

AUSTRALIA'S housing crisis is being felt just as keenly in small country towns and regional centres as it is in the sprawling suburbs of capital cities.

This crisis — particularly the shortage of suitable housing for older people — has inspired not-for-profit group Kadina Community Hospital Incorporated to propose building five purpose-designed retirement units in Kadina.

The move follows the success of its Materne Estate development, completed last year, which delivered four retirement living units in the

KCH has secured a contract to purchase a large vacant block of land on Gawler Street, subject to development approval.

The land, located in a predominantly residential area, is within walking distance of shops and

Formerly the site of a home, it has been vacant for many years and sits among other residences.

Unfortunately for KCH — and for the many people who would benefit from the development — the land is just within the Township Main Street Zone, which gives priority to developments that reinforce the traditional main street character.

KCH has committed to taking its case to the Council Assessment Panel, arguing the proposal should be assessed on its individual merits.

Copper Coast Council has stated it has no influence over the statutory development process.

Under current planning laws, councils are no longer the relevant authority for planning consent and must appoint an assessment panel that includes one elected member and two to four planning professionals, according to Plan SA.

Let's hope the panel process allows common sense to prevail.

The KCH proposal would not only deliver quality, purpose-built retirement living for five couples or individuals — it could also help free up much-needed family homes in the Copper Coast, the fastest-growing region in South Australia outside metropolitan Adelaide.

Mining reforms bill passes lower house despite landholder concern

DURING a late-night session on Tuesday, November 11, the state government's House of Assembly (Lower House) passed the Statutes Amendment (Energy and Mining Reforms) Bill.

The bill will now move to the Legislative Council (Upper House) for consideration.

First introduced to the Lower House on October 29, the bill allows mining companies to seek discretionary extensions of exploration licences beyond the current 18year limit.

Under the new provisions, tenure could be extended for up to five years at a time, with no limit on the number of renewals at the Minister's discretion, Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said.

"This means landholders face more years of the uncertainty and distress that comes with mining companies seeking to drill on their farming land," he said.

During debate, Mr Ellis moved two clause amendments aimed at reducing the impact on farming communities facing ongoing land access issues with mining companies.

"My clause amendments called for an extension of two years and that the extension can only be allowed once at the Minister's discretion in extenuating circumstances — not for five years with capacity to keep renewing every five years thereafter," he said.

"I also fought to have the bill debate adjourned until February after harvest when farmers weren't so busy, but with only five set sitting days left for the year the government had intent to finalise swiftly."

The amendments were supported by Independent and Liberal MPs but were defeated by the government in a 13-21

"What is really very disappointing is that none of the key concerns or recommendations raised under the Select Committee four years ago after extensive community input - and likewise again earlier this year in response to the Mining Act Issues Paper, have made it into this new bill," Mr Ellis said.

"This reinforced to me fears the reform process is designed primarily to facilitate new mining activity and ignores South Australia's agricultural industry."

Grain sector warns mining reforms risk long-term damage

GRAIN Producers SA has condemned the South Australian Government's decision to push through changes to the Mining Act, warning the reforms risk longterm damage to the state's farming sector.

Chief executive Brad Perry said the reforms ignored repeated calls for a fairer balance between agriculture and mining.

"If exploration tenure is extended as proposed, this will be an extremely disappointing outcome for South Australian grain producers," Mr Perry said.

"The current 18-year limit already provides ample opportunity for credible exploration activity.

"Allowing rolling extensions risks 'land banking', where licences sit idle for decades, while genuine land use and investment decisions are held

GPSA said aligning mining law with largely untested renewable energy legislation would weaken protections for South Australia's most valuable asset — its productive agricultural land.

Mr Perry also criticised the timing of the decision, which coincides with harvest.

"These reforms have been rushed through at a time when growers are on the header, with little chance for meaningful consultation,"he said.

In its submission to the Mining Act review, GPSA called for clear expiry dates, longer notice periods, a voluntary mediation service, and the removal of the outdated \$2500 cap on reimbursable legal advice.

"Our members have been calling for greater transparency, clearer timeframes, and stronger protections for farmland," Mr Perry said.

"South Australia's future depends on both strong agriculture and strong mining, but that balance must start with respect for those who grow the food to feed our country and the

Moonta mobile upgrades to cause temporary outages

TELSTRA is working to upgrade its mobile base station servicing Moonta, with works aimed at improving 4G and 5G capacity in the area.

The upgrades are expected to deliver faster download speeds, smoother streaming and reduced congestion, according to Telstra Regional General Manager (South Australia) Michael Patterson.

"As data use over our mobile

network continues to grow, adding extra 4G capacity will help deliver a better experience for customers," Mr Patterson said.

"The work will also prepare the site for a future upgrade to even faster 5G."

"While disruption is required, we'll only switch off the site when necessary and will have it back online as quickly as possible."

Mobile services will be tem-

porarily affected during the upgrade, with full site outages scheduled from Tuesday to Thursday, November 18 to 20, and partial disruptions on November 17, 21 and 22 during daylight hours.

Customers will receive SMS notifications ahead of the work. Landline, NBN, satellite internet and other mobile networks will not be affected, Mr Patterson said.

Emergency calls to Triple Zero from a Telstra mobile will automatically connect to another network, if available.

Telstra advises customers to enable Wi-Fi calling on their mobile phones to maintain service during the outage.

Businesses are encouraged to connect EFTPOS terminals to NBN or Wi-Fi to avoid payment delays.

Pushback over proposed regional speed limit cuts

THE default speed limit on regional roads could be slashed from 100 kilometres an hour to as low as 70km/h under a proposal from the Australian Government, prompting strong backlash from community leaders and industry groups.

The proposal, outlined in a Regulatory Impact Analysis released in September by the Department of Infrastructure, aims to reduce road fatalities.

It found that 65 per cent of road deaths over the past decade occurred outside major centres, with 85 per cent on roads signposted at 80km/h or above.

Federal Member for Grey Tom Venning said the government should abandon the plan, which would affect both sealed and unsealed roads.

"Grey's communities are completely opposed to the Labor Government in Canberra telling them speed limits must be slashed to as low as 70 kilometres on regional roads," Mr Venning said.

"Country people want the government to invest in fixing our roads, not letting them deteriorate and then forcing councils and state governments to slash the speed limits."

The proposed options include reducing speeds on sealed roads to 90, 80 or 70km/h, and on unsealed roads to either 80 or 70km/h.

Industry groups say investment is key

Australian Trucking Association chair Mark Parry questioned the cost-effectiveness of the proposal.

"According to the consultation paper, reducing speed limits would generate \$2.20 in benefits for every dollar it would cost," he said.

"For the same dollar, we could get \$9.60 in benefits by placing more warning signs at dangerous locations on rural roads or \$6.60 in benefits through line marking."

He said upgrades and better maintenance would offer more enduring improvements.

"Maintaining non-urban roads better and upgrading them would support industry productivity, reduce maintenance costs and improve the resilience of the road system as Australia's climate gets worse."

Grain Producers SA also criti-

cised the proposal, warning it could increase fatigue, reduce productivity and delay emergency responses.

"You don't fix bad roads by slowing people down, that's the lazy option," chief executive Brad Perry

"Invest in fixing the roads instead - a serious commitment to maintenance and upgrades of regional roads is what will actually save lives."

Mr Perry said regional drivers already travelled long distances and further delays could have major im-

"When you add up a few extra minutes each trip across hundreds of grain hauls, machinery moves or deliveries every year, the cumulative impact is significant," he said.

"Fatigue is already one of the biggest contributors to serious crashes in rural areas and slowing everyone down without fixing the roads will only make the problem worse."

Public consultation closed on November 10.

The government is now preparing a Decision Regulatory Impact Analysis, which will recommend a preferred option for amendments to the Australian Road Rules.



Call for \$500 million fund for algal bloom recovery

Australian Government history," she said. should commit \$500 million to a marine environment restoration fund to support recovery from the devastating algal bloom in South Australian waters, according to Senator Sarah Hanson-Young.

She chaired the recent Senate Inquiry into the prolonged algal bloom, which tabled a unanimous report last week containing 14 recommendations to help restore damaged marine environments, support affected communities and improve responses to future climate-related events.

"South Australians are bearing the brunt of one of the worst climate-induced events in our nation's

"We are the canary in the coal mine when it comes to responding, preparing for and mitigating the worst of the climate crisis."

She said the proposed fund would support reef restoration, seagrass regeneration and broader ecosystem recovery.

"South Australians should not be left to deal with the cleanup of this disaster on our own.

"As we come into summer, it is essential that South Australians know if it is safe to be at the beach."

Senator Hanson-Young praised community advocacy, which she said had already prompted state and federal governments to commit

significant funding.

"We don't know how long the algal bloom will persist, but we do know that there is going to be an ongoing need for funding and support... potentially for years to come."

Delays and accountability

SA Senator Leah Blyth, who served as a substitute member of the inquiry, described the government response as a "timeline of

"The algal bloom was first identified in March 2025; however, Minister Watt was not briefed until July 11 — a four-month delay that cost livelihoods and trust," Senator Blyth said.

"Scientists warned the Albanese Government months in advance. They were ignored.

"Local fishers are still waiting for support that was announced but still hasn't been delivered."

Senator Blyth called for greater transparency and accountability from agencies including SARDI and PIRSA, following revelations that key scientific advice was ignored and misleading information circulated for months.

"Trust was shattered when government scientists insisted on the wrong algae species for months," she said.

"The public deserves truth, not taxpayer-funded misinformation."

Council responds to safety concerns over swim facility **FUTURE FACILITY... MEMBERS of the Wallaroo Swimming and Aquatic Committee say they had a positive meeting with Copper Coast Council leaders on November 12, after raising safety concerns about the town's proposed swimming facility.

WSAC community leader Ian Shields had earlier criticised the initial facility design (YP Country Times, 11-11-25), saying it left a 30-metre gap between the north-eastern end of the shark net and the shore.

Councillor Peter Sims also raised concerns about the net shortfall when designs by engineers Wallbridge Gilbert Aztec were presented at council's monthly meeting on November 5.

Mr Shields, along with WSAC members Chris Wall and Jan

Paull, met with Mayor Roslyn Talbot, chief executive Dylan Strong and infrastructure services director Tim Neumann at the Wallaroo foreshore last week to discuss the issues.

In addition to requesting that the facility be fully enclosed by the shark net, the group has also called for the inclusion of shade and seating, steps into the water at both the end of each platform and the start of the main structure, and a disabled-access ramp positioned near the current water-entry stairs, all within the netted area.

"Dylan Strong and his team had reviewed, considered and investigated the WSAC community requests and ideas," Mr Shields

"Tim Neumann provided indepth feedback following his discussions with WGA, the marine engineers for this project.

"All our points were covered and the shark net issue and the need for a shallow water entry ramp were clearly communicated."

Mr Shields confirmed that council had begun the tender process and said final project costs would help guide priorities for additional features.

"This will allow council and WSAC to prioritise the additional features with the funds that may be available," he said.

"It's helpful that people understand that when the swimming jetty opens in December 2026 the potential for additional features remains strong."

A Copper Coast Council spokesperson said the project was shaped by community consultation.

"Designs have been created through ongoing community

consultation to ensure a facility that stands the test of time in a challenging coastal environment and remains an inclusive community facility to be enjoyed by all for generations to come," they

"Council is continuing to engage with all quarters of the community to take on feedback and ensure the best possible result is achieved within the available scope of the project."

Council has secured \$2,120,837 in federal funding, with an additional \$3,053,826 from council, bringing the total project cost to \$5,174,663.

Construction is scheduled to begin in February 2026, with completion expected by December 2026.

WMPS leadership questions raised in SA Parliament

WMPS parents have raised concerns about its leadership with the Department for Education, with Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis, and in an online petition created on October 27 by a group described as the Wallaroo Mines Primary School Community.

The petition calls for an urgent review of the principal's leadership due to "ongoing concerns about unprofessional behaviour, child safety, and declining school culture".

In the SA Parliament on Tuesday, November 11, Mr Ellis asked the minister if members of selection panels for school principals were provided with disciplinary records of candidates.

"I have been told by members of my community that some members of the selection panel choosing a principal

for a recent vacancy were not aware of a multitude of allegations from previous positions," Mr Ellis said.

Mr Ellis later told Parliament, "I have seen the online petition and I am wary of taking everything written online as true, but if some of them are, then I am sure the committee that considered whether to appoint might well have made a different decision".

Mr Boyer said he understood Mr Ellis was referring to the current situation at Wallaroo Mines Primary School and said "we are now in a position where we need to find another principal".

"I am sure the community at Wallaroo (Mines) are very keen for us to find a high-quality candidate, so I ask the member for his support in doing everything he can to make sure that what I know is a fantastic school is seen as a wonderful option

and future career for someone who might put up their hand to do that," Mr Boyer said.

"I am happy to make inquiries in terms of this specific case, about whether or not any previous disciplinary proceedings (as I think the member for Narungga put it), should they exist, were taken into account," Mr Boyer said.

The minister said he would respond to Mr Ellis's question after seeking information from the chief executive of the Department for Education.

At the time of going to press, the Minister's office had not responded to questions from the YPCT about whether the recruitment process for a new WMPS principal had begun.

Parents at the school have expressed their concern about its future viability if children are enrolled at other schools next year.

Parent concern

WMPS parent Jordyn Richmond said she and two other parents met with education director David Cowles of the Kadina Education Office on November 14 to seek more information following the minister's statement to parliament.

She said she was told that, at that time, the Kadina Education Office was not yet able to provide any information further to what had been said in parliament.

Ms Richmond said only 84 students were enrolled at the school in 2025 and up to 25 parents were considering shifting their children to other schools in 2026.

"They're waiting for answers for next year, but in the meantime, they've bought uniforms for Kadina Memorial School," she said.

"And I know that we're really

struggling to convince people to stay because there's no direct answer.

"If the minister is aware that someone is being brought in as a new principal next year and they're actively looking for someone, why are the community that have been asking and asking, since October being kept in the dark?

"Because if we were all told, then I can guarantee you multiple families would withdraw KMS applications and put them into the (WMPS) school because KMS is too big for a lot of these families.

Community invited to help shape future of Moonta Mines

COPPER Coast residents are invited to help shape the future of one of South Australia's most significant heritage sites, with a major planning project now underway for Moonta Mines.

Already on the World Heritage Tentative List, a 300page nomination dossier is now being compiled for the Australia Cornish Mining Sites: Burra and Moonta Mines, to be presented to UNESCO after February 1, 2028.

As part of the process, Copper Coast Council has endorsed the development of a master plan to guide future investment, safeguard heritage values and ensure the precinct's long-term sustainability.

The first stage of the master plan project focuses on community engagement, with residents, volunteers, local organisations, businesses and visitors invited to share ideas, insights

and aspirations for the site.

Consultation opened yesterday (Monday, November 17), and continues until December 15.

An online survey is available at yourcoppercoast.sa.gov.au/ moonta-mining-heritage, with hard copies also available and returnable at the Copper Coast Council office in Kadina, the National Trust SA museum in Moonta Mines, and the Moonta Visitor Information Centre.

Informal drop-in sessions will be held at Moonta Town Hall, 9am to 11.30am and again from 5pm to 7.30pm on Tuesday, December 2.

Community members will have the opportunity to speak directly with project representatives, ask questions and receive help completing the survey.

Mayor Roslyn Talbot encouraged community members to get involved in shaping the site's future.

"Moonta Mines is a place of local pride and national significance," she said.

"The master plan will ensure that heritage is respected and protected while also considering future opportunities. Community participation is essential to achieving the right balance."


Recognised as one of the most intact examples of Cornish mining heritage outside Cornwall, Moonta Mines represents the transfer of mining technologies and cultural traditions to Australia.

The site is a key destination within the Copper Coast region and continues to contribute to the local economy through heritage tourism.

Retirement unit plan for Kadina faces major planning hurdle

A NOT-FOR-PROFIT group is pursuing a \$2 million proposal to build five retirement living units in Kadina, on land near the edge of the Township Main Street (TMS) Zone.

Kadina Community Hospital Incorporated (KCH) has a contract subject to development approvalon a vacant block at 7 Gawler Street. The property stretches from Gawler Street to Number 6 Lane and has been vacant for 13 years.

The group proposes to build three two-bedroom and two three-bedroom units, designed for older people. The site is one house block away from the eastern boundary of the TMS Zone.

Planning concerns

KCH chairperson Dean Rodda said the group had received advice from Copper Coast Council's planning officer in November 2024 that the proposal would not be supported.

The officer cited the TMS Zone's goal to "achieve a cohesive, active, accessible and welcoming main street environment for residents and visitors to shop, work, meet, entertain and relax".

The advice noted that development must contribute to the vibrancy and activity of public spaces and support the traditional main street character.

It concluded: "It is considered that retirement units will not meet the desired outcome of providing a vibrant, active space for visitors to shop, work, entertain etc."

It also highlighted the limited number of vacant allotments in the town centre suitable for essential services and facilities.

Despite the advice, KCH is preparing a submission to the Council Assessment Panel.

Mr Rodda said the group is acting on the advice of its planning consultant, who believes the proposal should be considered on its merits under the Planning, Development and Infrastructure Act.

"We've had a lot of interest in the Gawler Street units and the board is confident they would be fully tenanted," he said.



Aged care housing demand

Mr Rodda pointed to the success of the board's earlier development — Materne Estate units at the corner of Digby and Christie streets — which opened in August 2024 and is now fully occupied.

"The demand for suitable aged care housing is growing, and the provision of a further five units will also free up family homes, which can help address the severe housing shortage in the area," he said.

"The 7 Gawler Street site is ideal it's the right size, has access at both ends, is surrounded by homes, and is close enough to the town centre for residents to walk to shops and services."

He said tenants would be "ideal neighbours" and the homes and gardens would be maintained to a high standard by the board.

"The vendor wants to sell it and the town is crying out for this sort of accommodation. The development is a win-win for everyone."

Council funding support

As a tax-exempt, not-for-profit entity, KCH operates under a constitution that includes aged care facility


In August, council members voted to provide in-principle support for the Gawler Street development via a Local Government Finance Authority loan of \$800,000 over two years, subject to all necessary approvals.

Council chief executive Dylan Strong said this in-principle support related only to financial assistance and council had no influence over the statutory development assessment process.

"The board is aware of the current zoning and relevant conditions for their preferred site," Mr Strong

"Council continues to work constructively with Kadina Community Hospital Inc. in pursuit of their envisioned retirement unit develop-

Yorketown school in new 40km/h speed limit scheme

Columba's Memorial School in Yorketown is among the first 162 South Australian schools to be included in a new time-based speed limit scheme aimed at improving student

A 40km/h speed limit will be introduced in a 200-metre zone around the school's Warooka Road entrance, applying on school days only, between 8am-9.30am and 2pm-4pm.

The schools were chosen based on their proximity to busy roads, traffic volumes, and crash history. The initiative is part of a statewide safety push, with plans for more than 150 schools to receive new limits by the end of 2026.

Education Minister Blair Boyer said electronic and standard signs would be installed around the selected schools.

Some locations would also receive new or upgraded safety cameras, configured to enforce the new limits.

"By lowering speeds when students are arriving and leaving school, we're giving drivers more time to react - preventing tragedies before they happen," Mr Boyer said.

The new limits will not apply on weekends, public holidays, or during school holidays, and will not replace existing 25km/h school zones on local streets.

Speed enforcement will begin once signage is installed.

A publicity campaign is under way, with schools and councils also provided information to help raise awareness.

Principal Luke Buchanan said the new limit would apply around the Warooka Road entrance once signage is in place.

Marno Street, which already has a 25km/h limit, will remain unchanged.

"Our school sits between a back street and a major road," Mr Buchanan said.

"We have trucks, buses and private vehicles passing by particularly during seeding and harvest when traffic in-

"With no marked crossings, our students rely on drivers doing the right thing.

"This new limit should improve safety for everyone."

He welcomed the initiative but said more awareness was needed to inform both locals and visitors of the change.

"Further media and campaigning are needed for people to understand the impact speed plays around schools," Mr Buchanan said.

The initiative is jointly funded by the \$168 million National Road Safety Program and the 2024-25 State Budget, which allocated \$2.36M for road safety.

FAQ on new school speed limits

Q: Where will these speed limits be introduced?

A: Locations are being chosen based on an assessment that considers the schools' proximity to busy roads. This includes traffic speed and traffic volumes. We will be advising residents and schools in advance about the changes to speed limits in their

The new 40 km/h speed limits will not be implemented in locations with existing school zones, koala crossings or emu crossings, as these locations already have a 25 km/h speed limit when in operation, or when children are present.

Q: What length of road will the new speed limit cover?

A: The reduced speed limit will apply to road sections of around 200 metres before and after a school entrance or areas with high pedestrian activity, such as popular crossing points. The length may be extended in areas with multiple schools nearby. Each location will be individually assessed to determine the most suitable extent for the speed limit.

Q: When will these new speed limits be in effect?

A:The 40 km/h speed limit will be in effect on school days only, from 8am to 9.30am and from 2pm to 4pm for afternoon pick-up.

It will not apply on weekends, school holidays and public holidays

Driver caught drink and drug driving

A DRIVER has lost both his vehicle and licence after being caught drink and drug driving near Condowie, east of Snowtown, on Saturday, November 15.

Just before 9pm, Yorke Mid North police patrols stopped the driver of a Toyota 4WD on Magpie Creek Road.

He returned a blood alcohol reading of 0.098 — almost double the legal limit.

The 32-year-old Mid North man then underwent a drug test, which returned positive results for THC and cocaine.

He was reported for drink driving, issued an instant six-month loss of licence, and had his vehicle impounded for 28 days.

He will also face drug driving charges, pending further forensic analysis, and is expected to be summonsed to court in the new year.

Mid North drug operation finalised

A major police investigation nto one of the largest drug syndicates operating in South Australia's Mid North has concluded, resulting in multiple arrests and significant drug seizures.

Since March, detectives from Port Pirie CIB have been investigating the supply of illicit drugs across the

Yorke Mid North region.

The extensive operation led to numerous property searches, key arrests, and the seizure of large quantities of drugs and cash.

Offenders from Port Pirie, the Riverland, and Adelaide suburbs were arrested and charged with a range of drug trafficking offences.

Among those arrested was a 34-year-old Moonta man, who was charged with five counts of trafficking a controlled drug.

He was remanded in custody and will reappear in court in February.

In total, police seized: 1325 grams of methamphetamine, 339 grams of cocaine, 1020 MDMA tablets and \$63,000 in cash.

Police are continuing to urge the community to help disrupt the illicit drug trade.

The South Australian and Federal Governments have released the \$100 million Algal Bloom Summer Plan, a comprehensive suite of measures to protect South Australia's coast, back coastal communities and support our summer lifestyle.

Large-scale reef and seagrass restoration.

To restore and protect the environment, we are constructing reefs along our coastline, some using recycled oyster shells. When placed in our gulfs at 25 locations around the state, these will grow into natural reefs, critical for our marine environments.

We are also undertaking research into large-scale seagrass restoration. Seagrass helps filter excess nutrients from the water and supports bacteria that naturally limit algal growth, improving overall water quality.

Very busy Parliament week

Last week was a very busy chamber week, compounded by the SA Government operating under a renewed sense of urgency due to there now being only three sitting days left for the year and, likely, before the March 2026 election.

A priority topic was the swift introduction and ultimate passage (to the Upper House) of the Statutes Amendment (Energy and Mining Reforms) Bill. To offset what I believe will cause further pain and uncertainty for farmers dealing with mining companies drilling on their land, I proposed two clause amendments to this Bill — both to stop the Minister of the day having complete discretion to grant five-year extensions to exploration licences in perpetuity.

My presented clause amendments called for an extension of two years only and that the extension can only be allowed once and in extenuating circumstances. Sadly, I lost the vote 13-21 and ultimately — at third reading of the Bill in its entirety — only three members opposed it: myself, Member for Mackillop Nick McBride and Member for Stuart Geoff Brock.

Other topics raised last week included Department for Education processes appointing school principals, timeframes for the improvements pledged for the Edithburgh to Yorketown road, and the Scrap Metal Dealers Bill that proposes new regulations in response to the growing trend of the theft of copper piping across communities, including ours.

Regarding the Edithburgh to Yorketown road, I've been advised that details of the roadworks — which were scheduled to begin on November 3, according to roadside signage - will be provided to me as soon as possible.

Bedford sold, saving 1250 jobs and clients

JUST months after facing a shutdown scare, Bedford Group is set to be sold, securing the future of more than 1250 employees and clients, Premier Peter Malinauskas announced yesterday (Monday, November 17).

Following a formal sale process, The Disability Trust — a respected not-for-profit disability service provider operating in several other states — has been named the preferred buver.

Under the proposed deal, all current Bedford employees and clients will retain their roles and services, a key condition of the sale.

With support from both state and federal governments, Bedford has worked with McGrathNicol to navigate its financial difficulties and restructure its operations.

The Disability Trust chief executive Karenza Louis-Smith said the imminent sale showed what could be achieved through collaboration.

'Today is a moment of real significance for South Australia," Ms Louis-Smith said.

"This proposed acquisition protects the programs and supports that mean the most to people — the places where they work, learn, connect and belong.

"Bedford has stood for inclusion for generations, and we are proud to help carry that forward.

"When community, government and purpose-driven organisations unite, we create stability, we create opportunity - and we create a future where no one is left behind."

Deputy chief executive Mat McIntyre said the acquisition would strengthen Bedford's legacy.

"This is about more than continuity — it's about strengthening what Bedford has always done best: giving people real purpose, real community and real pathways," he said.

To help finalise the deal, the South Australian Government will transfer a portion of Crown Land at Bedford's Panorama site to The Disability Trust at no cost, bringing its total support to \$21 million.

The Australian Government will contribute an additional \$13.2M, raising its total commitment to more than \$17.6M.

Kathy McDonald, a parent of a Wallaroo Day Options client, said she was relieved that jobs and services would remain.

"As long as it does not impact any clients or jobs, it will be a positive thing," she said.

"It is great news that the workers will remain too. They are very caring and give all their time and effort to all the clients."

Search and rescue at Port Vincent

AUSTRALIAN Volunteer Coast surface search requiring a multi-Guard Port Vincent hosted the annual Volunteer Marine Rescue simulated search and rescue exercise (SARSEX) on Saturday, November

Coordinated from the Port Vincent flotilla's radio base, the exercise brought together volunteers from across Yorke Peninsula, including the Royal Volunteer Coastal Patrol (Port Victoria and Point Turton bases), Australian Volunteer Coast Guard (Port Vincent, O'Sullivans Beach and Kangaroo Island flotillas), SA Sea Rescue Squadron (Edithburgh and Copper Coast flotillas), and SA Police Water Operations.

Led by the State Marine Rescue Committee, SARSEX included both theory and practical components.

The day focused on refreshing procedures, sharing updates in marine search and rescue practices, and conducting a coordinated agency response under the direction of SA Police Water Operations.

The annual exercise is designed to strengthen interoperability and ensure all services remain prepared for when a real marine emergency

Six VMR vessels, together with SA Police Water Operations and the POLAIR helicopter, took part in the coordinated training.

Leaving the marina at about 7.50am, the VMR volunteers and SAPOL Water Operations vessel Investigator II headed out to begin the exercise.

The scenario involved a largearea grid search, giving crews the opportunity to practise coordinated on-water techniques in real-time conditions.

After spending roughly four hours at sea, participants returned to shore for a "hot debrief", followed by a barbecue lunch.

Former students honoured

KADINA Memorial School added the names of two former scholars to the Honour Roll in its Memorial Archway at a special Remembrance Day ceremony.

Private Norman Jones, formerly of

Bute, was posthumously recognised for his service in the Battle of El Alamein in the Middle East as well as for his deployment in New Guinea against an advancing Japanese force during World War II.

Bill Daddow, of Cunliffe, was acknowledged for his distinguished 26year career with the Royal Australian Air Force, with many overseas deployments, including to the RAAF Butterworth Base in Malaysia for peacekeeping and surveillance missions in the 1980s.

A video documentary presented by KMS student Mackenzie Neumann (year 12) and Jim Monger (year 11) told the life stories of Mr Jones and Mr

Daddow. Mali Williams (year 9) was the technical producer of the videos.

Senior KMS Council representatives Breanne Peters and Sarah Coombe hosted the event which culminated in a light lunch catered by Stage 1 Food and Hospitality students in the Hospitality Centre.

Both former servicemen attended

Kadina Primary School and Kadina Memorial High School, with many of their descendants now students at KMS.

Principal Alistair Williams said maintaining the tradition of recognising alumni who served in the armed forces ensured the school's memorial legacy remained meaningful for current students.

Private Alfred Norman Jones

Fighting for freedom from the desert to the jungle

BUTE farmer Alfred Norman Jones, known as Norm, enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force during World War II in 1942.

The then almost 28-year-old became a private in the 2/48th Infantry Battalion and left Australia bound for the Battle of El Alamein in Egypt.

He was in good company, with Tom King from Kulpara and Bute's Max Trengove and Horace Axford also serving in the battalion.

In a 1988 interview recorded by Kadina Memorial High School year 12 student Gabrielle Rose (now Crouch), Mr Jones recounted his time in the Middle East and then in New Guinea.

He explained his height of 6 feet, 2 inches (188 centimetres) meant he was "one of the bigger and stronger men who could carry a Bren gun into the battlefield".

He was assigned that responsibility but noted it was more likely his naivety that earned him the role.

"I'll tell you how silly you can be; when we were in the Middle East they said they wanted someone to take on the Bren gun and decided to have a battalion shoot," he said.

"I thought I'd better try, and I won the shoot in the whole battalion.

"I found out afterwards that no one else was trying — they were firing into the ground because they didn't want to carry the gun."

He also recalled his first experi-



going, and I replied I was down a

The Battle of El Alamein was gruelling, with a heavy human toll.

From early July to 5 November, 1942, Australian casualties stood at almost 5500, of whom 1259 had been killed, according to the Australian War Memorial.

In a censored letter to his future wife, Floss Axford, Private Jones made a thinly veiled reference to the Allies' frontline gain, writing: "The flies in this desert are terrible, it's no wonder Jerry decided to move."

The 2/48th Battalion left the Middle East in 1943.

Within weeks of returning to Australia, its members were transferred to New Guinea, trading desert conditions for jungle terrain and an advancing Japanese force.

Mr Jones found the humidity, dense vegetation, bogs, rivers, mosquitoes and a camouflaged foe far worse than the desert.

"We'd cross a river, sometimes up to seven or eight times a day and it

would be the same river winding around like a snake," he said.

"Sometimes it was only up to your waist, other times you would have to hold everything above your

"You couldn't see them (the enemy). That was the biggest trouble. It was more nerve-wracking with snipers."

Private Jones was hospitalised with malaria when news arrived that his mate and best-man-to-be at his impending wedding, Max Trengove, had been killed in action.

He said he couldn't believe it and insisted on being discharged so he could return to the front to find his friend.

Private Trengove was buried where he fell. His remains were later interred at Lae War Cemetery, under the inscription chosen by his family: "He died for freedom".

He was one of more than 40,000 Australians who died while serving in World War II.

Mr Jones returned to the Bute family farm after his discharge in November 1944.

Later in life, he trained winning trotting horses.

He passed away in 1999, aged 85. His legacy includes four living children, 10 grandchildren, 22 great-grandchildren and four great-great-grandchildren, many of whom attended Kadina Memorial High School and now Kadina Memorial School to this day.

ence in a trench, taking cover from enemy fire, when a familiar voice checked in.

'Tom King was in the next trench and yelled out to see how I was foot deeper than when I started."

The desert conditions featured booby traps, land mines, tanks, barbed wire and swooping enemy planes, while the environment delivered extreme heat, wind, dust storms and flies.

Warrant Officer Bill Daddow

Cunliffe farmer earns top RAAF honours

BILL Daddow's armed services story is one of resilience and the courage to pivot mid-career to pursue a lifelong

Growing up on the family farm at Cunliffe, he loved agriculture but severe hayfever made it difficult to continue in his chosen vocation into adulthood. At age 32, he applied to and was accepted into the Royal Australian Air Force, based at Edinburgh, Adelaide.

Mr Daddow said his new ambition was driven by a strong interest in aircraft, physics and learning. He was the oldest in his intake group and was awarded dux of his RAAF rookie class in 1979.

He was then posted to the RAAF School of Radio in Melbourne, with his wife Judith and children Megan, Michelle and Stuart relocating interstate. Again, the former farmer thrived in the classroom and graduated dux, earning five distinctions and three credits.

It was the beginning of Aircraftman (AC) Daddow's 26-year RAAF career, during which he rose steadily through

Initially, AC Daddow was assigned to 492 Squadron, working with PC-3 Orion aircraft in Adelaide, prompting the family's return to South Australia. The Orions were used for maritime patrols, reconnaissance, surveillance, and search and rescue missions throughout Australia and the Asia-Pacific.

In May 1983, now Corporal Daddow was deployed to RAAF Butterworth Base on the northwest coast of the Malaysian Peninsula. Over three years, he spent more than six months in Malaysia across various deployments.

"It was a 24/7 peacekeeping operation," Mr Daddow said.

"The surveillance aircraft monitored the region's communist insurgent activity, as well as the emerging threat of Russian and Chinese fleets moving through the Penang Strait in the Indian Ocean.

"As the Orions returned to base, I had to investigate and repair any reported faults, service, prepare and refuel the aircraft for future flights."

Corporal Daddow received the Australian Service Medal South East Asia for his overseas service and was later promoted to Flight Sergeant.

When not deployed overseas, he supported operations including the high-profile rescue of British yachtsman Tony Bullimore, lost in rough, freezing seas about 1500 kilometres from Antarctica.

Four PC-3 Orions were deployed, circling Bullimore's vessel on rotation for three days until the HMAS Adelaide completed the rescue. Ground crews, including Mr Daddow, worked around the clock to keep aircraft operational.

Reflecting on his service, Mr Daddow said his most rewarding experience came during the Iraq War.

Appointed

Ioint Electronic Warfare Operational Support Unit at Edinburgh and later promoted to Warrant Officer, he was on call 24/7 managing radar-jamming programs for F-18 Hornets deployed to the Middle East.

"On one occasion, I was contacted by a pilot saying I must have got it right because the program detected a surface-to-air missile targeting his F-18, activating the radar jammer and allowing him to remain safe," he said.

"It was a very hectic and pressured time."

He was awarded a Commander's Commendation, which recognised his "exemplary achievement and personal sacrifice" as an inspiration to all and in keeping with the finest traditions of the RAAF.

His service also took him to Canada, the United States, Hawaii, the United Kingdom and the Netherlands, clocking up more than 1000 flight hours.

After retiring as Warrant Officer, Mr Daddow received the Defence Force Service Medal — Second Clasp. He and Judith returned to their Cunliffe farmhouse and remain active in the local community.

Mr Daddow said he felt incredibly fortunate to have had a career in the Australian armed services — though, he added, "the air force was the second-best vocation, with farming still my first".











THE South Australian State Emergency Service is looking to boost its volunteer numbers across the Copper Coast and locals are invited to an information session to learn more.

The session will be held at the Kadina Church of Christ Hall, 7pm to 9pm on Monday, November 24.

Anyone interested in joining or simply curious about what the SES does is welcome to attend.

"We're looking to grow our volunteer team at the Copper Coast SES Unit in Kadina so we can continue providing vital support during emergencies," SES Regional Duty Officer Dan Carter said.

In the past year alone, SES volunteers

across Yorke Peninsula responded to around 180 calls for help - including clearing fallen trees, storm damage repairs, assisting at road crashes and supporting other emergency services.

"There's a wide range of ways people can get involved," Mr Carter said. "Depending on location, tasks might include marine rescue, road crash rescue, vertical rescue, operating drones or providing support during storms and floods."

Importantly, volunteers can contribute as much time as suits them.

All training is nationally accredited and provided free of charge.

"You don't need to attend every call-

out or training session — it's flexible and fits around your life," Mr Carter said. "And not every role involves emer-

gency response. "We also need help with radio com-

munications, logistics and planning there's a place for everyone.

Register online at ses.sa.gov.au/ events, call 1300 364 587, or simply come along on the night.

The SES operates four units across the Yorke Peninsula — in Kadina, Maitland, Warooka and Port Broughton — and is part of a statewide network of more than 1800 volunteers who responded to over 8000 requests for help last year.


After collecting its one millionth bag in 2024, Northern

Lochiel memorial building nears 100-year milestone

A TREASURED part of Lochiel's history will soon celebrate its centenary — the opening of the Lochiel Methodist Soldiers' Memorial Kindergarten and School, a building created by the community, for the community, in honour of those who served in the Great War (World War I).

Officially opened on December 4, 1925, by Mrs J. H. (Alice) Nicholls, the hall stands as a lasting symbol of the town's spirit and collective memory.

Its foundation stone was laid earlier that year, on August 21, by Mrs J. R. Bidgood — the first step in establishing what would become a focal point of Lochiel's social and educational life.

The building initially served a dual purpose.

It operated as a school for four years until a growing local population led to the establishment of a larger school nearby.

Like many facilities of its time, it was built adjoining a church, in this case the Lochiel Methodist Church, strengthening its role as both an educational and spiritual centre.

Over the years, the hall has been adapted to the needs of the community — functioning as a kindergarten, Sunday School hall and gathering space for numerous events and meetings.

In 1957, a Junior Church Club was formed under the guidance of Mr and Mrs David Beare. By 1960, the group had grown to 30 members, leading to an extension of the kindergarten room in 1962.

"This hall has always been more

than bricks and mortar — it's where generations have learned, laughed, and shared life together," local historian Kathy Nicholls said.

"Its walls tell the story of a community that remembers its past while continuing to grow and give

The centenary will be celebrated on Sunday, December 7, with a church service at 10am, followed by a community luncheon at noon; all are welcome.

In preparation, organisers are calling on anyone with photos, memorabilia or stories related to the hall, school or kindergarten to contribute to a historical display that will feature on the day.

Estate planning tips for cancer support group

YORKE Peninsula Prostate Cancer Support Group members learned the advantages of having estate planning documents in place at the group's October meeting.

Guest speaker, local lawyer Eliza Taheny's presentation focused on the importance of estate planning — particularly the value of keeping legal documents such as Wills, Powers of Attorney and Advance Care Directives up to date.

Emily said a valid and current Will makes sure assets are distributed according to your wishes, helps protect your loved ones from future disputes and can manage complex matters such as superannuation, trusts and family partnerships.

Significant life events such as marriage, the birth of children, divorce or changes in assets — should prompt a review of legal arrangements.

She also discussed the purpose of Powers of Attorney, which allow trusted individuals to make financial or legal decisions on someone's behalf if they become unable to do so.

Advance Care Directives, she said, are another vital tool, allowing people to set out their preferences for health care, living arrangements and end-oflife decisions if they're unable to communicate them.

She also explained the probate process and what happens when someone dies without a valid Will — where a strict legal order determines who inherits assets.

Many people put off organising these documents for too long, and then realise the process is a lot easier than

expected, Emily said.

She encouraged attendees to store Wills and important financial documents in a secure but accessible place.

Eliza, who grew up on a farming property on the lower YP, also shared her journey from local student to practising solicitor.

After studying law at UniSA, a meeting with Kylie Mildwaters (from Mildwaters Byrth Lawyers & Conveyancers) helped reignite her passion for the profession.

She began working as a part-time receptionist in 2021, while still studying, and became a qualified lawyer in July this year.







Alan qualifies for world major marathon

Yorke Peninsula resident and Edithburgh parkrun enthusiast Alan Twartz has qualified for the 2026 Boston Marathon in April.

The 71-year-old qualified by running the Sydney Marathon earlier this year in a time under the required standard for his age group at Boston.

"The Boston Marathon qualification times can be achieved at any marathon within 12 months of the next (Boston) marathon, but you aren't always guaranteed to be granted entry," he said.

"I knew if I ran my normal time I would make the qualifying time, and then some time after the marathon I received news that I was accepted into the Boston one after coming 21st out of over 200 in my age bracket in Sydney."

Twartz said his entry into Sydney was also a case of luck, with both he and his son securing

"We had some other Yorkes locals run it with us in Sydney, Shane Fowles and William Glazbrook."

With the Boston event being a major marathon, he has increased his training load, running 40 kilometres a week between now and Christmas before adding about 10 kilometres a month until April.

"It can be challenging, I am in full-time harvest at the minute so having a weekly goal is a little more manageable; I can miss days if work gets in the way," he said.

Twartz will run the Boston Marathon some 40 years after completing his first marathon -Adelaide, in 1986.

"It was part of the 150th Jubilee celebrations for South Australia

there was an ad in the Sunday Mail 12 months out from the marathon and I knew I had to be there?

He completed five other marathons in the following seven years before taking a 10-year break for some much-valued family time, returning to marathon running at age 50.

"I managed to talk my three brothers into marathon running too, which was great for us.

"My older brother completed 30 marathons, which I think is amazing for someone who had never played sport before."

Twartz said the Boston Marathon challenge hasn't quite sunk in yet, but he is excited to be part of it.

"It is Patriots Day on the day of the marathon, so it will be a great day in Boston."

Members of his family will support him along the course at the April 19 event.

YPFL to play through 2026 Gather Round

The 2026 AFL Gather Round dates were released last week, revealing it will coincide with the opening weekend of the Yorke Peninsula Football League sea-

As a result, the YPFL will push ahead with its planned start date (April 11) rather than scheduling a bye to recognise the AFL event (April 9 to 12).

Gather Round will run the week after Easter and fall in the first week of South Australia's April school holidays.

In 2025, the YPFL season began in March before having a two-week break between rounds 3 and 3 for Easter and the Gather Round, giving both Wallaroo and Central Yorke a three-week break early in the season.

Burgess to play alongside mate

In a major recruiting coup for Paskeville Football Club, the Magpies have secured former Gold Coast Suns and Adelaide Crows AFL player Chris Burgess.

Originally from Adelaide Footy League club Flinders Park, Burgess first tested the SANFL system at age 19 when he attended a West Adelaide preseason come-and-try session, debuting in 2016 under coach Mark Mickan.

He went on to play 76 SANFL games, including a standout three-goal performance in Adelaide's semifinal loss to Norwood.

He was drafted by Gold Coast as a mature-age pre-selection in the 2018 AFL draft.

"Yes, I remember my first AFL game - it was against the Saints at Marvel

Stadium," he said. "I'm in the first kick-first goal club

... actually it was first touch-first goal. "We endured a one-point loss in hat game.

Between 2019 and 2025, Burgess played 44 AFL games — 36 for the Suns and eight for the Crows — while carving out an exceptional record at state-league level.

At Gold Coast, he was part of the Suns' historic 2023 VFL premiership and was twice selected in the VFL Team of the Year.

He also won the Frosty Miller Medal as the league's leading goalkicker in 2022 and 2023.

His strong form continued at Adelaide, where he kicked 56 goals in 2025 to finish second in the Ken Farmer Medal behind Glenelg's Lachie Hoise. He was named the Crows' 2025 best and fairest and was among

three Adelaide players selected in the SANFL Team of the Year.

Now, after nearly a decade at the elite and state-league levels, Burgess has opted for a lifestyle reset.

"I decided not to go back to the SANFL, but it would have been either West or Adelaide if I did," he told the YP Country Times.

"Footy has been my whole life for the past eight or nine years, so I wanted to step back to enjoying my footy with a couple of mates.

"It was in the works to play together with great friend Morgan Cocks when

I finished at AFL level. "I went to school with Morgan at St Michael's College, and we actually played Second XVIII footy together."

Burgess said family and balance were key factors in the move.

"This decision is a little family driven, and it is also about the time commitments required and having a good work-life balance.

"I feel like I completed what I want to do at the top level, gave myself every chance and I'm looking forward to this new step in my footy life.

"There is a chance I may come back to SANFL football in a season or two."

Looking ahead to his time at Paskeville, Burgess said he simply wants to enjoy the game again.

"I'm interested in maybe looking at coaching in the future, but I'm just looking forward to playing footy with my mates.

"It would be pretty cool to win a premiership with my best mate."

As for representative footy, he remains open to the opportunity. As long as his body holds up, he is "happy to entertain playing both representative and Central Zone SA State Country Champs footy".

Coulthard to join Wallaroo Bulldogs

Matthew Coulthard, 24, has become the latest addition to Yorke Peninsula football for 2026, signing with the Wallaroo Bulldogs.

He will wear the red, white and blue as the club looks to climb the premiership ladder after several lean seasons.

Coulthard began his senior football journey at South Adelaide before joining Glenelg, where he kicked four goals in just his third league match against Central District at Elizabeth in 2023. That performance helped propel him into the AFL, where he was selected by Richmond.

He finished the 2025 season back at Port Noarlunga, playing a key role in the club's two-point Southern Football League grand final win over Happy Valley.

"From the playing perspective he brings speed, agility, elusiveness and X-factor," Wallaroo coach and new playing mentor Matt Rankine told the YP Country Times.

"He is a one-touch footballer. "Matt is also looking to move

into a leadership role within the club, share his knowledge with the younger players at the Bulldogs.

"The boys are hungry and want to work hard to move up the ladder."

Coulthard's path has included both highs and setbacks. His rapid rise in 2023 saw him drafted by Richmond in the Mid-Season Rookie Draft with their first selection, and by round 19 he had made his AFL debut against Hawthorn in front of more than 57,000 people.


He made an immediate impact as a second-half substitute, recording seven disposals at 100 per cent efficiency and a goal assist in a one-point win at the MCG. He went on to play four consecutive AFL games to close out the 2023 season.

The boys are thrilled to have progressed this far in their debut season and hope to book a spot in the final.





Born at Mundoora on May 15, 1919, Oliver Maurice "Morrie" Arbon grew up in a family already well-known in Western Areas Football Association. By 1939, he had claimed the first of his Mail Medals, signalling the start of a distinguished playing career.

Two years later, Morrie enlisted at Port Broughton to serve in World War II, joining the 43rd Infantry Battalion (Hindmarsh Regiment).

During the war years he continued playing football in the Patriotic League's combined Norwood-North teams, contributing to premierships in both 1943 and 1944.

Roving alongside Jack Oatey in the 1943 decider, Morrie helped steer North-Norwood to a 21-point victory before a crowd of 36,000. Both players kicked goals

The following year, after managing only three minor-round victories, Northwood edged out Port-Torrens by six points in a tense grand final at Adelaide

Across the two seasons, Morrie collected the Best Junior and Best Rover awards.

Reporting on the 1944 Patriotic League grand final, the Advertiser's "Rover" observed that "Arbon roved tirelessly and well to be the best rover afield." He capped the season by winning the club's Best Rover

Known as a diminutive, hardworking rover, Morrie was appointed vice-captain of North Adelaide and joined the management committee in 1945. That year he again won the Best Rover award and kicked 33 goals, placing second in the club's goalkicking behind Hedley Hawke.

His consistency continued in 1946, playing 16 of 17 league matches and earning selection in the State Second XVIII.

In 1947 he enjoyed another strong season and received the Ern Carlsson Award for Brilliant Play. Morrie represented South Australia at the National State Carnival in Hobart, playing in the State B match against Collingwood.

In 1948, he made the Senior SA team to face Victoria at Adelaide Oval.

Through the late 1940s he formed a reliable partnership with fellow rover Darcy Cox, and his determination rarely wavered.

Morrie's 1949 season was particularly strong - he regularly appeared among the best players or goalkickers. In the second semifinal win over

the best, contributing eight goals between Morrie finished the year with 27 goals, just eight shy of leading forward Ron

Norwood, he and Cox were again among

miership to add to his two wartime flags. Morrie continued his consistent form in 1950, playing predominantly in the back pocket.

Phillips, and earned a 1949 SANFL pre-

iership rover whose league reer was shortened by wartime service, he finished with 98 league games and 125 goals for North Adelaide, along with a single state game in 1948 and 26 matches for the combined North-Norwood side during the Patriotic League years.

In 1951, Morrie returned to Mundoora as captain-coach before moving to Port Broughton in 1957, where he claimed another Mail Medal — 18 years after his first and led the Western Areas to their only Croser Cup victory.

He returned to Prospect Oval in 1960 to coach North Adelaide's Under 19s (Thirds) and received life membership of the Roosters in 1963. Morrie went on to serve as a long-term ball steward from



Arbon legacy continues: Kelly eyes Rookie Draft

Jim Kelly will be in contention at this week's AFL Rookie Draft, hoping to take the next step after an impressive 2025 season.

Kelly is the great-grandson of legendary North Adelaide premiership rover Oliver Maurice "Morrie" Arbon, a dual Mail Medallist either side of World War II.

His uncle Matt played for the Adelaide Crows in the early 1990s before injury cut short his career, and his father Richard was a SANFL best and fairest — a strong sporting pedigree by any measure.

Kelly was part of South Australia's Under 18 championship-winning side and enjoyed a consistent year with Norwood U18s, performances that earned him an invitation to the state draft combine.

Norwood talent manager Craig Roberts said Kelly's versatility has been a key asset.

"Jim is a very polished, skilful midfielder who can play inside and outside, and spent a lot of time on the wing," Roberts said.

"He is very clean below his knees, a good decision maker and doesn't panic under pressure.

"He also has a great ability to hit the scoreboard and be involved in

The 180cm midfielder played multiple roles for SA and made five SANFL Reserves appearances for Norwood after the national championships.

His strengths include clean hands, pace, vision and strong running patterns on the outside, giving him an effective inside-outside blend.

His main challenges are size and a tight draft pool, with relatively few live selections expected. Continuing to build strength and refine his kicking under pressure are areas for further growth.

The AFL Draft runs November 19 and 20, with the Rookie Draft on Friday, November 21.







HOT FISHING TIPS

Seafood recipe, spicy crumbed calamari: Ingredients – 2 whole squid, cleaned and cut into thin strips; 2 cups fine breadcrumbs with mixed herbs and spices of chilli flakes, coriander, mint and paprika; 250ml coconut milk; olive oil. Preparation - make a coating of breadcrumbs with the herbs and spices; float squid pieces in a bowl of coconut milk and then coat with breadcrumbs; cook in a hot pan for 2 mins and drain on a paper towel.

Wallaroo: The prawn trawlers have come and gone, while boat crews headed out in search of King George whiting, garfish and a few blue swimmer crabs. Jetty-based fishing has also been productive, with squid, blue swimmer crabs and night-time tommy ruff (Australian herring) featuring in most reports.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Small but legal-sized squid were again caught from the Port Hughes jetty, while boaties who managed a launch picked up King George whiting, garfish and squid. Squid catches are improving as crews venture further south. It may also be worth trying for yellowfin whiting on the beaches south of Port Hughes.

Port Victoria: King George whiting numbers have remained steady, although fishing pressure is increasing on this side of the gulf. Local shore-based fishers are landing the occasional soapie mulloway, mullet, flathead and salmon trout.

Point Turton: Strong west to northwest winds swept in over the weekend as crews targeted garfish, squid and the occasional early morning KG whiting. After dusk, the jetty has been producing squid and tommies.

Stenhouse Bay/Marion Bay: Car topper tinnies are plentiful along this stretch of The Leg, with caravanners taking full advantage of algal bloom vouchers. Surf fishers are landing mulloway, flathead, large salmon and mullet from West Cape, and Browns and Richards beaches. Offshore, big-boat crews have reported red nannygai, damaged gear from tuna and kingfish, and flathead closer to shore.

LARWOODS' FAST START IN AUSX2

Kadina's Alex Larwood has made a strong start to his 2025 Australian Supercross season, securing two podium finishes across the opening three rounds.

In round 1 at Redcliffe, Queensland, Larwood opened his campaign with third and second placings to take second overall for the weekend.

A 10th-place result in race 1 of round 2 left him with plenty of work to do, but he responded superbly, riding with composure and confidence to win race 2 and again finish second overall.

"My season started pretty much how I hoped it would; I claimed podiums in the first two rounds, which was ideal for both me and the team," Larwood said.

Round 3 proved more chal-

lenging, with ninth and eighth in the two races dropping him to ninth overall for the round and back to third in the championship standings.

"A break after the third round ... it can be good and bad," he said.

"I have had plenty of time to drill down on some weaknesses I have, but it can also disrupt the race routine a little bit.

"I have been doing it long enough that I am used to it now and can manage."

Larwood's season resumes on November 22 in Melbourne, when Marvel Stadium will again be transformed into a supercross

The venue attracted 42,000 fans in 2024, the largest supercross crowd in Australian history.

"Melbourne is always pretty surreal," Larwood said.

"When you're sitting on the start

line you can see the crowd and there are never many empty seats.

"It is the closest thing we have to the US supercross racing, so it is one race I really enjoy."

His season will conclude in Adelaide on November 28-30, with the championship final to be held under lights on the Saturday night following the BP Grand Final for the Repco Supercars Championship.

"It will be great to finish in Adelaide; a hometown race always gives you that little extra to help give you a boost, and it will be great to have plenty of family and friends there with me," Larwood said.

"Hopefully I can produce a good performance for them in Adelaide."
