WILD WEATHER HITS | CYPROAD FIXED

YORKE Peninsula was hit with hail. thunder, lightning and some rain last Thursday, October 28.

Backyards, particularly across central YP, were carpeted in hail while some sports, including golf and bowls, had to call off matches because of the wild weather.

Bureau of Meteorology meteorologist Jenny Horvat said the trough of low pressure started working its way across the state on Wednesday, and produced gusty thunderstorms.

Wind gusts reached 63km/h at 5.25pm at Edithburgh, while 102km/h gusts were recorded at Kadina at 4.12pm.

Minlaton's top speed was 72km/h at 5.38pm and at Warburto Point a maximum gust of 93 km/h was recorded at 4.26pm.

While some areas of Eyre Peninsula recorded about 22mm of rain to 9am Thursday, many parts of YP recorded more than 10mm from 9am Thursday to 9am Friday.

Pine Point scored 16mm, Edithburgh 12.6mm, Minlaton 17.6mm and Port Victoria 15.4mm.

WORKS on the Arthurton to Maitland road are now complete.

Work begins on Wallaroo to Moonta shared path

WORK on the Wallaroo to Moonta shared path is rolling ahead.

Construction on the 14.4 kilometre walking/cycling/running trail began on Monday, October 25.

The path will link existing paths from Wallaroo to Kadina and Moonta to Port Hughes.

"The State Open Space and Places for People grant received has a completion date of January 1, 2023; however, the anticipation is for it to be completed before the summer holiday season of 2022," Copper Coast Council CEO Russell Peate said.

"The majority of works are on the rail corridor, there will be some minor works in the township of Wallaroo but works will be on the footpath/verge and shouldn't cause any major disruptions.

"It will be another great cycling/ walking path for our community and tourists alike. "People will be able to cycle or walk from Kadina to Wallaroo to Moonta and there is the potential for the track to be used for events in the future."

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said he was thrilled to see work commence on the trail.

"It is such a valuable project for locals and tourists, and one I was pleased to formally support during the funding submission process," Mr Ellis said

"The trail will complement the existing Kadina to Wallaroo trail and additionally, will link the Moonta Bay and Port Hughes trails.

"All these shared paths facilitate all levels of exercise ability, which is fantastic for the health and wellbeing of all who enjoy them."

The path will start in Ryan Street, before travelling along Cornish and Park Terraces then crossing Magazine Road to link with the old railway cor-

ridor and end by the Moonta Tourist Office.

Copper Coast Council secured \$104,398 from the Federal Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program — phase 3, \$418,000 from the State Open Space Program for 2021-22 and \$187,800 from the State Bicycle Fund

Council is contributing \$744,200 and an additional \$150,000 for project management costs.





Bigger fish to fry in shag drama

AN Ardrossan resident has raised concerns about the impact the ongoing cormorant issue could be having on tourism and employment.

A petition to address the issues at Port Vincent and Stansbury was recently submitted to the state parliament.

Local businesses and resi-

dents are left with a daily clean-up and stench, and motorists find their cars repainted with excrement.

David Lutze, of Ardrossan, said another issue associated with the increasing number of cormorants is the number of fish they eat.

Mr Lutze estimates there are at least 5000 to 7000 cormorants between Ardrossan and Stansbury.

"Data on how many fish they eat per day states one pound or half a kilogram per day per bird," Mr Lutze said.

"If 5000 adult cormorants eat one fish each day that is an alarming 35,000 fish per week leaving our waters.

"That's nearly two million fish per year, we do know there is a fish shortage and shags should be considered as the problem to our fisheries."

Mr Lutze said he would like to see the state government survey the number of cormorants in the area.

"The number (of fish taken) is pretty horrific and that is only if they eat one fish per day," he said.

"There aren't many fish around Ardrossan, there would be at least 2000 shags on the BHP jetties and I don't believe anyone is monitoring the situation when it comes to the fich

"The lack of fishing leads to decreased tourism, people come to fish in Ardrossan and they leave empty handed."

Mr Lutze said the cormorants are not a new issue; however, it is getting worse with time.

"Since 1990 I have been watching the shag population


during a time when I was one BHP worker who loaded ships at the Ardrossan jetty," he said

"We walked amongst the shags to tie the ships to the wharf

"There were thousands on the jetty back then and they made a hell of a mess especially in the winter when we had to walk through their mess on the wharf."

Vaccine boosters begin this month

THE Royal Australian College of General Practitioners is warning GPs will need more support to deliver COVID-19 booster vaccines in the months ahead.

Booster doses are expected to commence for those who had their last immunisation six months ago from November 8.

RACGP president Dr Karen Price said GPs across Australia needed a helping hand.

"General practices have done a remarkable job delivering vaccines so far," Dr Price

"I am immensely proud of all the GP teams who have worked so hard in very trying circumstances to get the job done — you are truly the unheralded heroes of this roll-

"Given the enormous pressures practices are facing and the huge task ahead of us, we fought for a boost in funding to deliver the booster vaccines.

"Unfortunately, the announcement does not feature any new funding for practices delivering these boosters.

"Instead, it will be funded at the same rate as the second dose but without the COVID-19 Vaccine General Practice Incentive of \$10, which is paid to eligible practices where the patient received both a first dose and second dose at the same practice."

There are no new cases of COVID-19 today. There have been 918 cases in total notified in South Australia, including one active case acquired overseas.

Driven to distraction

ROAD users south of Minlaton and Stansbury are calling for more works on local roads.

Edithburgh resident, Rick Hutchison said the Edithburgh to Yorketown road is dangerously narrow in places and vehicles constantly have to leave the bitumen to allow oncoming traffic to pass safely.

"Particularly if there is a school bus or a large truck or if two trucks meet, especially at harvest when they're fully laden and towing a trailer, that is very dangerous for them," he said.

"People have complained about it, including myself, to the various authorities including twice to Fraser Ellis's office."

Mr Hutchison said the width of the buses from mirror tip to mirror tip almost exceeded the total width of the road in a few places.

Allan Baker, Yorketown, who owns several school buses, said one of his co-drivers recently had a side mirror ripped off by a tree branch after he left the road to allow another

vehicle to pass.

"It's so dammed narrow in places, we've got nowhere to go ... when you're off you're off and the edges can shred the walls of your tyres when you're trying to get back on," he said.

"Both buses are running on it and everyone complains about it.

"You've got to keep your hands on it because if you let it go off (the bitumen) you've got to be careful when you're trying to get it back up on the road again that it doesn't jump all over the place."

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said he was proud of the nearly \$200 million worth of road funding secured for Yorke Peninsula roads since 2018 but there is still much to do.

"I have been advocating for more sections of the Maitland to Minlaton road to be done, for the Bute to Port Broughton road, and the Wallaroo entrance section of the Copper Coast Highway which is currently a disgrace," he said.

"Of southern Yorke Peninsula, I see the Edithburgh to Yorketown road and the Minlaton to Port Vincent road as next


priorities for shoulder improvements and widening, along with slip lanes to improve safety into the townships of Hardwicke Bay and Port Vincent."

Mr Ellis spoke about the urgent need for funding for the North Coast Road at Point Turton in parliament last week.

"I questioned the decision of the Local government Transport Advisory Panel to overlook this project in favour of lesser ranked priority submissions," he said.

"I am pleased with the investments made on the Port Victoria to Curramulka Road (\$3.1m) and the Minlaton to Stansbury Road (\$3m) and encourage community members to continue to contact my office with their feedback on what roads should be made future priorities."

YP passenger ferry sunk

A PROPOSAL to run a passenger service from Glenelg to Yorke Peninsula is dead in the water.

SeaLink, which operates the ferry between Cape Jervis and Kangaroo Island, expressed its desire to run a passenger service from Glenelg to Port Vincent twice a week in 2019.

The proposal would require support of the state government including upgrading necessary infrastructure.

A Department for Infrastructure and Transport spokesperson said the department is not currently considering any

proposals to establish a passenger ferry service from Glenelg to Yorke Peninsula.

"A proposal was received in May 2019 from SeaLink to offer services from Glenelg to Kingscote and Glenelg to Port Vincent," the spokesperson said.

"However, this was contingent on significant state government funding to complete upgrades to infrastructure at all locations, this proposal was not progressed."

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis called on the state government in 2019 to include a ferry service to YP in its plans for a major upgrade of Glenelg

"I had advocated for a ferry terminal

to be incorporated in any plans that were then being mooted for a major upgrade of Glenelg jetty believing the time was right to re-commence a ferry service from Glenelg to Yorke Peninsula," Mr Ellis said.

"I made a submission and liaised with state and local governments and SeaLink, and there appeared to be some momentum.

"Certainly, Sealink confirmed their interest in a fast ferry to Kingscote and Yorke Peninsula."

Mr Ellis said he hoped fresh discussions could begin soon.

"I still believe a ferry service from Glenelg to Yorke Peninsula would provide a significant tourism boost for our region, and create local jobs for a massive economic injection for Yorke Peninsula," he said.

Yorke Peninsula Council mayor Darren Braund said it is disappointing the project has not progressed.

"Council will continue exploring opportunities to make Yorke Peninsula even more accessible to visitors," Mr Braund said.

"With the recently opened Southern Yorke Peninsula Water Tower Mural Trail, and soon-to-be-opened Yorke Peninsula Salt Lake Trail, we continue working to attract tourism to our

A tourism plan for Wardang Island

A TOURISM plan is being floated for Wardang Island.

Effektiver owner and managing director Siggi Frede was awarded the contract to create a master plan for the island and recently held a community consultation session in Point Pearce to gain a local perspec-

"This is such a great opportunity to develop a master plan and tap into local ideas and aspirations for Wardang Island," Ms Frede said.

"We definitely want the community to benefit socially and economically from this project for generations to come."

Caroline Densley, director of subcontractor Diverse Travel Australia, also shared her experiences on what types of activities and tours could draw people to the island.

"There is so much positivity and tourism opportunities going forward," Ms Densley said.

"It is integral for us to work with the Point Pearce community and a wonderful opportunity to shape Wardang Island into a tourism attraction.

"I specialise in working closely with tour operators and guides in creating journeys and in particular connecting clients to Aboriginal communities and culture."

Wardang Island supervisor Lyell Sansbury said he supported the idea for a master plan.

"I really want to see pests eradicated and endangered species reintroduced to the island," Ms Sansbury said.

"The island also needs safe landing facilities to get on and off as well as emergency facilities and practices

Point Aboriginal Pearce Corporation community coordinator Kaylene O'Loughlin said the future of Wardang Island was so important to create a better future for their youth.

"We want to see the island bloom - to generate money and jobs and to support our culture and history," Ms O'Loughlin said.

Community consultations will continue in January and March.

The initiative is supported by PPAC and Narungga Nation Aboriginal Corporation.

Doctor shortage at "critical point"

THE Royal Australian College of General Practitioners is calling for the rural GP shortage in South Australia to be addressed urgently.

RACGP rural chair Dr Michael Clements recently travelled from Townsville to meet with regional GPs to help shine a light on the challenges they face.

Dr Clements the rural GP shortage in South Australia was at a critical point.

"The lack of access to high-quality primary care has a direct impact on the health of patients," he said.

"It means people have overall poorer health outcomes and end up in hospital for health issues that could have been managed in general practice.

"As Australia's peak body for both rural and urban GPs, the RACGP is uniquely placed to tackle GP workforce challenges - and the way we do this is by tapping into our members and listening to their

"We are well aware of the challenges in attracting GPs to work in rural and remote communities in South Australia, as well as the very public concerns about the need for better pay and conditions for local doctors in regional hospitals, which has led to critical shortages.

"Everyone deserves access to highquality general practice regardless of their

Addressing GP workforce challenges is a top priority for RACGP, Dr Clements said.

One change approaching which will also help is the transition of the Australian General Practice Training program back to the specialist colleges, including RACGP this is an opportunity to reform our GP training system, and improve the distribution of GPs for the long-term benefit of communities Australia-wide," he said.









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Ready, set, go for Copper Coast parkrun

A NEW parkrun is coming to the Copper Coast this November.

Successful events at Edithburgh and Port Broughton inspired local organiser Gerry van Niekerk to bring the event to the Copper Coast.

There will be trial runs along the Rotary Trail, starting at the Kadina Pony Club, on Saturdays, November 7 and 14, before the first main event on Saturday, November 20.

Mr van Niekerk first became involved in parkrun events at Port Broughton two and a half years ago, but an increase in local participation established the need for another event on Yorke Peninsula.

Runs are held each Saturday with participants walking or running five kilometres and tracking their time against themselves, rather than each other.

"It's not supposed to be competitive, but of course you want to compare your time to that of your mate next to you," Mr van Niekerk said.

"The idea is there's no footprint left behind — so you do the parkrun, take all your stuff at the end and it's like you were never there.

"But of course, at the same

time we're able to get people out and doing stuff, which is just as important."

Parkrun has events in 23 countries, with over 428 locations in Australia alone, all helping build communities.

"There are a couple of volunteers at Port Broughton who never run, they're just there because it gets them out of the house and being social," Mr van Niekerk said.

"And that's what it's all about, getting people out and doing stuff with other people."

The event can also reap significant rewards for the overall fitness wellbeing of the community, according to Mr van Niekerk.

"When I first started it took me an hour to walk the five kilometres, but I managed to get it down to 27 minutes over the period of a year and a half," he said.

The project received significant support from the Rotary Club of Northern Yorke Peninsula, as well as a community grant from the Copper Coast Council.

The Kadina Pony Club will be open with space for parking and toilet facilities, while organisers are hopeful a coffee van will be present as well.

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Summerton Road planning confusion

DEVELOPMENT around Summerton Road, Port Broughton, is causing confusion for residents.

The land features a mix of industrial, residential and residential premises with a home business properties.

But, as part of the state government's new Planning and Design Code, the southern side of the road is considered Home Industry Zone.

Barunga West Council staff have recently received complaints about the level of light industry in the area, while developers have also added their concerns as they want to build industrial premises along the road.

Council CEO Maree Wauchope said all previous developments built in the Home Industry Zone prior to August 2020 had received the appropriate development approval.

Restrictions in the new code now prevent property owners from building sheds first.

"To satisfy the current policy provisions you are now required to construct a dwelling in association with the business activity," Ms Wauchope said.

"The Home Industry Zone now limits developers in terms of the size of business activity or shed they can build — it cannot exceed 200 square metres in total floor area and cannot exceed more than 20 per cent of the allotment area."

Prior to August 2020, development had been carried out on Summerton Road where industry buildings more than 200sqm had been approved by council with no residential component.

"At the time these developments were assessed to have achieved the requirements as per the then development plan, which didn't require developers to have a detached dwelling in association with a business activity," Ms Wauchope said.

"Nor did the policy provisions restrict the size of the building that could be constructed."

Progress associations wheely keen

YORKE Peninsula Council has received overwhelming support to develop a plan for wheeled sports and other recreational facilities.

Council regularly receives requests from progress associations and community members for new wheeled sport facilities, such as pump tracks and skate parks.

The Wheeled Sport and Recreations Parks Proposal was created to provide an evidence-based framework for the construction of facilities.

Nearly 300 responses were received during the consultation phase, with 97 per cent of respondents supporting the proposal.

A majority of respondents (44.3 per cent) were from Ardrossan followed by Yorketown and Marion Bay on 10 and nine per cent respectively.

Skate and challenge parks received the most support for potential facilities followed by pump and BMX tracks.

There were also 10 local progress associations which expressed an interest in the proposal with nine indicating a commitment to engage in the construction or maintenance of new facilities as well as a co-contribution

Marion Bay Progress Association has registered its interest in seeking funding for a first-class facility.

"We are hoping we could have

something that could host an X Games, something similar to what is at West Beach," chairperson Josh Harkin

"The skate park idea would be the start of a plan for an area we could have barbecues, toilets, basketball rings and things like that.

'The plan would be to have it at Penguin Point which has been dedicated for recreation and sport by council.

"This would give everyone who visits Marion Bay a meeting place because at the moment we don't have anything apart from the jetty."

Council will be presented with a stage-based plan to assist future development of facilities across the region at its November meeting.

Labor plans education overhaul

YORKE Peninsula children will be in preschools at age 3 under a plan announced by the state opposition in the lead up to the March 2022 election.

The plan is just one aspect of Labor's proposed education reform, which also includes building five new technical colleges — including two regionally — and an increase in allowance to country teachers.

The desired delivery of the "once-in-a-generation" revamp of early childhood learning would be investigated by a Royal Commission if a Labor government is elected in March.

A midyear intake for reception and preschool students would also be reinstated, reversing a decision from Labor's last stint in government in 2014.

Opposition leader Peter Malinauskas said the early years of life are when the seeds of suc-

"It is vital we do everything we can to support and nurture all children in the first 1000 days of their life," he said.

"Too many South Australian children are developmentally vulnerable when they start

"We know by age 5, 90 per cent of adult brain development and growth has already occurred."

Preschool programs for 3 vear olds have already been introduced in Victoria, New South Wales and the ACT.

Ardrossan and Districts Community Kindergarten preschool director Christina Bilney said it was well and good to introduce 3 year olds to a preschool setting but centres needed adequate support.

"We're already struggling as it is without 3 year olds, and while I can see where they're coming from, we want it to be done right with support," Miss Bilney

"You wouldn't think it, but there is a huge difference between 3 and 4 year olds when it comes to their development and with that, brings new chal-

"We want to make sure that adequate funding and staffing are put in place."

Education reforms

- A plan for universal preschool for 3 year olds and extended out of hours care for young children, to be investigated by a Royal Commission
- Lifting teaching quality by having recruitment and performance management decisions better reflect what schools need
- Increasing permanency among teachers
- Extending allowances to country teachers to increase retention
- Introducing a midyear intake for preschool and reception.

- Working with universities to set a minimum ATAR entry score of 70 for teaching degrees
- Building five new technical colleges in South Australia, including two regionally, featuring courses like building, construction, carpentry, bricklaying, and plumbing
- Offering 400 scholarships for teaching degrees to strengthen and diversify the teaching profession
- Hiring 100 mental health and learning difficulties specialists for schools

"The Take the Pledge program is the same as the one the City of Unley implemented back in 2016," Mrs Bruce said.

"That program has more than 1900 participating households who have committed to recycling more and diverting as much organic material as possible to the green bins."

Mrs Bruce said residents are encouraged to participate in Copper Coast Council's Take the Pledge program and register by completing the online form.

"Registrations can be received as of yesterday (November 1) and residents will be issued an A4 landscape sticker that will be adhered to their organics bin," she said.

Ten registered residents organics bin will be selected for judging from

Mr Price said the pageant was always something he watched on television while growing up but he has loved becoming a part of it recently.


"I think what I've found most rewarding about the experience is seeing what it means to the entire South Australian community," he said.

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The great plover rescue

into action to save an injured hooded plover at Port Victoria last month.

Friends of Hooded Plover Yorke Peninsula volunteer Annie Hopkins and daughter Grace Disher were alerted to the incident during an afternoon walk on Rifle Butts Beach just before the October long week-

"We saw the hoodie pair near the foot of the dunes, but we could tell straight away that something was wrong," Annie said.

"One of the birds was hopping on one foot, and tucking the other foot up under itself.

"It wasn't able to forage or scuttle along the sand in the endearing way these birds usually move."

A closer look with binoculars revealed a tangle of blue twine wrapped around the injured foot.

Annie's quick thinking set a crisis response into action and an expert team was pulled together — BirdLife Australia's Emma Stephens drove from Adelaide while Seaside Vet's Dr Veronica Bhakti volunteered her time to treat the bird on the beach.

and fading light meant everything had to go to plan for the their efforts.

QUICK thinking locals leapt experts, locals and Northern and Yorke Landscape Board officer Fabienne Dee.

> The injured hoodie, part of a pair referred to as Bob and Marge, was in need of treatment, Dr Bhakti said.

> "The bird was slightly underweight, with a body condition score of 2/5, mildly dehydrated," she said.

> "This could be due to pain and having to hop on one leg for a few days.

> "If the fibres were left wrapped around the toes, eventually blood supply would be cut off and the toes would die.

"The bird would be left without toes on the affected foot, which would greatly decrease its ability to forage and escape predators — both critical for its survival.

"As a vulnerable species, every bird counts, so it was imperative we saved one half of a breeding pair so that they could continue producing more baby hooded plovers."

After a delicate operation to remove the tiny fibres, the plover was returned to its mate and was spotted scurrying along the beach on both feet a couple of days later.

Cold and blustery weather and Watern David Speirs congratulated everyone involved on

"Hooded plovers are an amazing little species and are being slowly nurtured back from the brink of extinction by dedicated volunteers all across the state," Minister Speirs said.

"Quick thinking and commitment were the hallmark of this successful rescue and I want to thank those who did their bit."

While several nests have been lost this breeding season due to Minister for Environment bad weather, there are still plenty monitored by volunteers.

> "There are currently two families with chicks at Port

Victoria and one each at Port Hughes, Point Turton, Corny Point, Port Moorowie and Port Julia," Northern and Yorke Landscape Board officer Janet Moore said.

Fledgling birds are yet to be sighted, so it is important to watch out for nests, eggs and chicks and keep your distance by walking close to the water's edge and keeping your dogs on

Experts are also reminding beachgoers to pick up any litter on the beach to prevent further

"I used to enter things into the child which I told them about and said I could wheel the pram with my foot so I brought my new infant in and worked in the office," she said.

"It was wonderful, we loaded it

onto the computer and that helped, all the handwriting went out the window and everything was done on the computer.

"I also love that I got to know people in the community that I hadn't met through other things I am involved with?

The show society is currently looking for someone to take on the roles of entries secretary and secretary.

"It's a great thing to do for the community and you meet some really lovely people along the way," Karen said.

"I figured I can't do it forever plus we have moved towns.







Sunday, 7th November

Moonta's own "Father of the RAAF"

A CELEBRATION like no other to recognise the special achievements of one of Moonta's own will be held this Sunday, November 7.

The Sir Richard Williams RAAF Centenary Celebrations will mark the 100th anniversary of the formation of the modern Royal Australian Air Force and the role a Moonta local had in its establishment.

Sir Richard Williams was born to Richard and Emily Williams (nee Hodge) in Moonta on August 3, 1890, and attended Moonta Public School before working as a telegraph messenger at the Moonta Post Office, a greengrocer and for the Union Bank.

At the age of 19, Williams enlisted in the South Australian Infantry Regiment in Kadina.

On the formation of an army aviator corps he was accepted as a member of the first pilots' course at Point Cook, Victoria.

Sir Richard, then 24, was the first student to begin flying training, and was the first to gain his wings.

He served with No. 1 Squadron (Australian Flying Corps) in World War I and was awarded the Distinguished Service Order in August 1917 for conspicuous gallantry when attacking enemy forces and rescuing a pilot behind enemy lines.

By the end of the war, Sir Richard was the AFC's leading operational commander.

Sir Richard was instrumental in the formation of the RAAF in 1921 and was the first Chief of Air Staff for the RAAF — he would eventually rise to the rank of Air Marshal and retired after World War II.

He led the Department of Civil Aviation after leaving the armed forces and was knighted in

Sir Richard died, aged 89 years, in Melbourne on February 7, 1980.

Dr Robert Black AM, president of the Air Force Association SA, will read aloud a poem written by centenary committee chairperson Robyn Knight and unveil a plaque thanking those who supported the venture.

Copper Coast Council mayor Roslyn Talbot said it was an honour to work with the RAAF, state government and ioca committee on such auspicious celebrations.

"Relatives, officers and state representatives have been in contact to express their

gratitude for this celebration and the mountain of work that has been put into organising this celebration by everyone involved," she

CHOLESTEROL is a waxy, fatlike substance which is carried around our bodies in our

Cholesterol is necessary for us to make hormones and vitamin D, as well as helping us to digest food. Your body produces cholesterol and it's also in some foods.

It is important to keep your cholesterol at a healthy level because too much can put you at risk of heart disease.

Unfortunately, almost 46 per cent of South Australians have high cholesterol, which is higher than other states, except for

There are two common types of cholesterol. Low-density lipoprotein is the 'bad' cholesterol. It can stick to the walls of arteries and cause a fatty buildup called plaque. Too much plaque leads to blockages that prevent blood from flowing properly to the heart.

High-density lipoprotein is the 'good' cholesterol. It carries the LDL away from the arteries and back to the liver where it is broken down

Most people with high cholesterol don't even know they have it because they won't experience any symptoms.

So, if you are 45 years or over, or 30 years or older for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, we recommend you see your doctor to have your cholesterol checked as part of a Heart Health Check.

Certain risk factors contribute to high cholesterol, including age, smoking, not

doing enough physical activity, being overweight or obese, having a family history of high cholesterol and eating an unhealthy diet.

A heart-healthy eating pattern can help lower your cholesterol over time - we recommend eating plenty of vegetables, fruits and wholegrains, a variety of healthy protein sources, especially fish, seafood and legumes (such as beans and lentils), nuts and seeds.

You can eat dairy foods, but people who have high blood cholesterol or a history of heart disease should choose reduced fat options.

Nuts, seeds and avocados are packed with healthy fats, and you can use olive oil for cooking. Remember to reach for herbs and spices instead of adding salt.





Implant for n-AMD

The USA Food and Drug Administration has approved Susvimo (previously called Port Delivery System with ranibizumab) for intravitreal use via ocular implant for the treatment of people with wet (neovascular) age-related macular degeneration.

n-AMD is a potentially blinding condition that requires treatment with anti-vascular endothelial growth factor eye injections as often as once a month.

Surgically inserted into the eye during a one-time, outpatient procedure, the Susvimo implant delivers ranibizumab continuously and is refilled every six months.

If necessary, supplemental ranibizumab treatment can be given to the affected eye while the implant is in place.

The FDA approval is based on positive results from clinical trials that showed wet AMD patients treated with Susvimo achieved and maintained vision gains equivalent to monthly ranibizumab injections at weeks 36 and 40 of treatment.

More than 98 per cent of Susvimo patients in the trials could go the six months before their first refill.

However, two per cent of patients with the implant experienced at least one episode of inflammation to two or more adjacent layers of the eye.

Most common adverse events were conjunctival haemorrhage, conjunctival hyperaemia, iritis and eye pain.


Elsworthy, 25, will also be a key inclusion for the Bloods following 29 games for Port and South Adelaide.









A NEW benchmark for southern Yorke Peninsula land values has been set.

Ag land values set to continue rising

YORKE Peninsula landowners learned more about the trends driving agriculture land prices last week.

Rabobank senior agriculture analyst Wes Lefroy spoke to interested stakeholders about Rabobank's recent Five-year Agricultural Land Price Outlook report at a breakfast at the Yorke Valley Hotel, Maitland.

Mr Lefroy said the current high growth phase is likely to continue into 2023 and possibly

"Looking at the overall farmer psychology combined with favourable macro settings not seen in 30 years, the stars are aligning for this growth phase to continue for the next few years," he said.

The report states "Four of the six states recorded double-digit median price growth in 2020, a reflection of the strength of the underlying fundamentals: commodity prices, production levels and the low cost of finance."

"Very low interest rates, near record commodity prices, production yields and upward revenues should stay aligned into 2023-24," Mr Lefroy said.

Rabobank's forecast predicts land price growth to continue for at least the next five years.

Future growth predicted for . Australian canola industry

STRUCTURAL changes in the global market are set to bring future growth opportunities for Australia's canola industry.

Rabobank's Global Canola Opportunities in Sustainable-Fuel Future: Is Australia fit and ready? Report said policies to curb emissions in North America and Europe are expected to lift global demand for oilseeds through to

"This will present opportunities for Australian canola exports," Rabobank agriculture analyst and report co-author Dennis Voznesenski said.

"In our base case outlook, these are modest initially, but grow as a result of structural shifts in the global industry in 2024-25 due to Canada's falling exportable surplus and then again from 2026-27 onward due to the European Union's increasing canola import

Global supply of canola in the current season has been severely reduced by drought in Canada, the world's largest canola exporter, and by continued heavy EU import demand.

Canola prices domestically are edging towards the A\$1000 a tonne mark while overseas markets already broke through that level earlier in the year.

However, just how much Australian canola, and canola prices, benefit will depend on a number of variables including how quickly the EU phases out palm oil in biofuels and how much Canadian canola exports

Global production growth and any additional sustainability requirements placed on Australian canola growers will also have an impact.

"While the road to 2030 for canola contains many uncertainties, we can be sure that the global exportable surplus is on a downward trajectory," Mr Voznesenski said.

"And this will create opportunities for the Australian canola industry.

"In years when global production significantly underperforms, which it inevitably will, shortages will result in even greater opportunities for Australia.

"Australia can lift canola production, and it will continue to have an export surplus, potentially much larger in periods of supportive price signals and favourable seasonal condi-

These firings may require specific tidal or weather conditions, and are critical for the safety of current and new Defence capabilities. Members of the public may notice noise, vibration, flashes and/or smoke during the testing. There is no risk to the public outside of the gazetted Defence Practice Areas.

For reasons of public safety, there is a permanent exclusion zone covering land, sea and air around the Port Wakefield Establishment. Specific details on the Port Wakefield Prohibited Area can be obtained from Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No GN 26, 4 July 1990, and is shown on the diagram below. Trespassing in this Area is strictly prohibited and very dangerous due to the presence of unexploded bombs. Any person found within the Prohibited Area or on Defence land will be subject to prosecution.

Specific test and evaluation activities may also require restricting public access to the Port Wakefield Defence Practice Areas over specific periods with these areas articulated in the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No. GN 40, 7 October 1992, and also identified on the diagram below. greg@gregjamesfishing.com.au. Wallaroo: The water was not a good

place to be last week as strong, gale-force winds lashed pretty much all of the YP coast. Late Saturday and then Sunday brought calmer conditions and a few keen boat crews fished Point Riley and the Boiler grounds for a mix of King George whiting, gar and squid. The jetty has the odd small blue crab and tommy ruff (Australian herring) at night.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Tipara Reef has squid, whiting and medium gar. Bigger whiting are off Cape Elizabeth and the grounds just south of here. The jetties have small gar, blueys and squid after dusk.

Point Turton: I had a bird's eye view of the hailstorms that hit mid to late on Thursday morning as I travelled south from Wallaroo — a few boaties managed a launch much later on the weekend to fish the relative shelter of Hardwicke Bay for gar and small squid. The jetty has salmon trout and tommy ruff.

Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: Salmon and even some late-season mullet can be caught from the beach at Richards, Gym and Browns at the moment. Boat crews made the odd run on Sunday for whiting, flathead and squid, but the water was slightly discoloured from the storms. Jetty fishing has tommies and squid from late morning.

Edithburgh/Stansbury: I checked both jetties over the weekend and found them pretty quiet in terms of anglers. A few squid ink marks were at Edithburgh jetty, while boat crews fished for whiting at Sultana Passage and gar from Stansbury/Port Vincent.

Black Point/Ardrossan: Rakers working the grounds from Billy Goat Flat to James Well caught a few blue swimmer crabs last week. Anglers fishing along the local blueline in the rough weather reported small whiting, blueys and garfish. Further offshore there are snook, blueys and squid.
