# ABS figures show birth rate rise

THERE is a baby boom in the Barunga West Council area.

Birth rates for 2021 revealed by the Australian Bureau of Statistics showed Barunga West Council has the third highest in the state.

Rates hit record lows in 2020 with an average 1.59 births per woman; this figure rose to 1.70 in 2021.

The 2021 rise is first time

the annual average had increased since 2008, which had an average 2.02.

Despite the lowering averages in recent years, BWC's birth rate has increased dramatically since 2018, rising from 1.78 to 2.82.

These figures rank the area as the ninth highest in the country and third in the state behind Mount Remarkable 3.26 and Tumby Bay 3.41, both of which are in the top three councils in the country.

Yorke Peninsula Council ranks sixth in the state with an average of 2.30, while Copper Coast Council women average 1.92 births each.

Despite having three local councils in the top 10 nationally, South Australia (1.66) still ranked behind New South Wales (1.78), Queensland (1.79), Western Australia (1.75) and the Northern Territory (1.82).



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# Ellis tables mining bill in state parliament

MEMBER for Narungga Fraser Ellis introduced the Mining (Land Access Inquiry Recommendations) Amendment Bill 2022 to state parliament last Wednesday, November 16.

The bill is an attempt by Mr Ellis to legislate the recommendations from the select committee formed in the previous parliament which delivered a report on how to better improve the system.

"Work on this topic has been a long-held passion of mine and it is not something I will let die away," Mr Ellis said.

"I continue to believe this would never happen in the city; you would never have a multigenerational cafe get a knock on its door from an alternative private enterprise saying, 'you need to vacate because our returns to the government will be more lucrative.

"But it does happen in the country, where farm families get that knock on the door regularly, asking them to vacate because a mine needs to be built so we can get access to the lucrative royalties that will flow from it."

Mr Ellis explained the propositions which featured in bill, including the establishment of a mining land commissioner, an increase in legal assistance support and a code of conduct for exploring companies to abide by.

'Currently, the law allows for \$2500 to be paid in legal assistance; this bill would increase that to \$10,000 of professional assistance," he said.

"Secondly, and perhaps most importantly, is the establishment of a mining land commissioner, which would separate the functions of Department for Energy and Mining and allow the regulation of land access to be considered by someone independent of the promotion of the same industry.

"A third feature of this bill will be a compulsory code of conduct for explorers to abide by; I am particularly hopeful of this part achieving widespread support because I note the department is currently working on a code of its own." Mr Ellis said land access is a cause he will pas-

sionately champion as long as he can.

"I have introduced this bill because I earnestly believe that it will provide improvements to the way in which land access disputes are conducted, thereby providing benefit to both the farming and mining communities," he said.

"I continue to believe this would never happen in the city; you would never have a multigenerational cafe get a knock on its door from an alternative private enterprise saying, 'you need to vacate because our returns to the government will be more lucrative'.

Minister for Energy and Mining Tom Koutsantonis said the government would assess Mr Ellis's proposed legislation in its entirety.

"Fraser is obviously very committed to the local farming communities of Yorke Peninsula, and that's admirable," he said.

"But the government has to approach this with a state-wide view.

"I understand exactly what his frustrations are, but I won't be supporting this bill, because I believe these issues are best approached by broader government-led reform, rather than private members' legislation.

"Nonetheless, debate on this legislation will give us a useful summary of regional members' views on what needs to be done - and we can use that to inform future reform of the Mining Act."

# **Greener surfaces on Moonta's horizon**

MULTIPLE sporting surfaces in Moonta could receive improved irrigation.

Copper Coast Council is working on a plan to harness its wastewater and benefit the town.

The Drought Proofing Sporting and Community Facilities project would service the Moonta oval, 18 fairways of Moonta Golf Club, and a driving range at The Dunes, Port Hughes, through a 2.7 kilometre pipe network stemming from the Port Hughes Wastewater Treatment Plant.

A 2500 square metre lawned area could also be established in the Moonta Cemetery as part of the plan.

Council estimated the project would supply about 310 megalitres of treated wastewater per year by the end of 2025.

"The clubs would expect to save between \$15,000 and \$20,000 every year, which could then be used towards bettering our facilities."

A copy of the project plan has been sent to Moonta Golf, Football and Cricket Clubs, as well as the Copperclub for comment prior to the finalisation of the report.

Once finalised, the plan will be submitted to council for consideration.

CEO Russell Peate said the plan aimed to utilise and balance the available wastewater to drought proof each surface into the future.

"Council has considered how this plan could help population growth and whether there would be sufficient take up of a sewerage connection," Mr Peate said.

"It is hoped there would be sufficient water supply during summer months when there is the greatest demand.

"This project would benefit the community environmentally as the wastewater would be used more sustainably.

"Council, with the involved sporting clubs, will contribute \$1.18 million of the total cost, and we would be seeking about \$700,000 in state and/or federal government funding."

Wastewater could also be supplied to the proposed 64 hectare stage two development of The Dunes, south of the current golf course, which was sold in March.

Moonta Football and Cricket Clubs committee member Josh Ritter said the plan would allow the oval to be irrigated at a far lesser cost.

"The clubs would expect to save between \$15,000 and \$20,000 every

vear, which could then be used towards bettering our facilities," Mr Ritter said.

"An irrigation upgrade will be very timely - the current system was installed in the 1980s and is definitely due for an upgrade.

"This project will ensure a yearround watering system and make for better playing surfaces."


Moonta Golf Club outgoing presi-

dent John Teague said he was pleased the plan considered the whole town.

"Every year, our surfaces are affected dramatically by the warm weather and become noticeably dry during summer," Mr Teague said.

"The project would help to increase the golf club's membership and attract more visitors to Moonta.

"It's a very sustainable option and would be a joint benefit for each club."

# Wild weather resumes throughout peninsula

A SECOND consecutive significant weather event has been felt across most of Yorke Peninsula.

Intense thunderstorms rolled across the region leading to wind gusts of up to 100 kilometres per hour and more significant rainfall between Saturday and yesterday (Monday), November 19-21.

Wind speeds reached 100km/h in Kadina at about 3.15pm on Saturday, while Minlaton felt 80km/h gusts in the same afternoon.

Edithburgh notched 94km/h, and Stenhouse Bay 76km/h, both late Sunday morning.

The Northern YP CFS Group received at least five callouts to windrelated incidents on Saturday afternoon.

"All NYP CFS brigades were called out to incidents of trees and branches falling over," Group Officer David Bussenschutt said.

"But everyone was back to their stations in about half an hour so it was a good response by our crews."

Despite the severe winds, Southern YP CFS Group did not receive a callout on the weekend.

Central YP felt the heaviest rainfall across the three days, with Maitland topping all towns at 25.2 millimetres.

Minlaton, 19.6mm, fell just short of its November average of 20.6mm, while Kadina 15.2mm, Stenhouse Bay 14.2mm, Yorketown 14mm and Bute 12.3mm, all had rain gauges filled.

# La Niña, IOD expected to ease

Weatherzone meteorologist Andrew Schmidt said the weekends isolated storms meant more rain was received under the passing storm cells.

"A strengthening low-pressure system south of Tasmania and a highpressure ridge over Western Australia moved closer together which caused a tight pressure gradient and strong winds to develop," Mr Schmidt said.

"The low-pressure system continues to send a series of troughs and cold fronts through South Australia, which is why we are seeing so many days of stormy and showery weather.

"This was all occurring under the jet stream (winds much higher in the atmosphere) which further enhanced the strength of the winds."

Mr Schmidt said La Niña was still contributing to increased rainfall and storm activity in the state.

"But there are other climate drivers and factors which have also increased rainfall events, such as a negative Indian Ocean Dipole (a change in temperature patterns)," he said.

"Both La Niña and the IOD are weakening and are expected to return to neutral values (hence ending the events) heading into next year.

"This means rainfall is more likely

to conform to averages, as opposed to the higher-than-average rainfall we have seen in previous months."

When compared with the past fortnight, Mr Schmidt said he expected winds and showers to ease slightly thanks to a building high pressure system.

"However, the next front should push through this Saturday, bringing another round of showers and storms," he said.

"That system will quickly move through before it becomes generally dry and settled towards the end of November and start of December.

"December rainfall totals should closer align to averages as La Niña and the negative IOD weaken."




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

The prosecutor said Mr May's immigration status was listed as offshore, meaning he returned to Australia through an unknown

The magistrate refused Mr May's application for bail due to the seriousness of the charges.

Mr May is yet to enter a plea.

# Diving into jetty discussion

YORKE Peninsula Council is working with the local community to upgrade the Edithburgh jetty steps.

The jetty is a premier diving location and swimmers, snorkelers and divers all use the steps to access the water.

Council has obtained concept designs for new dive access steps which have platforms at different heights, allowing safe and easy entry regardless of the tide.

The designs were funded by council in its 2021-2022 Annual Business Plan and Budget.

Staff hosted the community at a codesign workshop at Edithburgh last week.

"The workshop aimed to foster conversation among the community and key stakeholders to determine how to maximise the project," CEO Andrew Cameron said.

"It was not only about upgrading the steps but looking at other ways to improve the Edithburgh jetty experience for visitors and locals, and help turn the site into a true attraction befitting the area's amazing sea life.

"We thank everybody who attended the workshop, in person and online, to contribute to these discussions."

Additional ideas included a shelter area for people to change into and out of diving gear, an underwater camera showing people the water clarity and an artificial reef structure on the bottom of the lowest divestep platform.

"We are collating and assessing the ideas raised at the workshop," Mr Cameron said.

"We are waiting for an appropriate grant opportunity to be announced, and the funding available will help determine the scale of the project — we will start with the jetty steps upgrade as our top priority and see what's possible from there.

"We want this to be a fantastic facility for Edithburgh and the wider Yorke Peninsula."



Australians - no matter where they live," Minister for Communications Michelle Rowland said.

Newly appointed community engagement officer Rebecca O'Leary said there are some exciting ideas for the community to consider and new suggestions are also welcome.

# New workplace vaccine policy

THE state government has introduced an updated workplace vaccine policy, outlining the minimum standards of immunity SA Health employees must have to certain preventable diseases.

This policy comes as the remaining vaccine requirements in healthcare settings will now transition to workplace health and safety policies, with each site responsible for its own requirements.

The new state policy applies to all SA Health services, including hospitals, ambulance services, disability and aged care sites and follows extensive feedback from SA Health workers, unions and business-

Every role within SA Health will be assessed and classified either Category A, Category B or Category C depending on various factors, including direct physical contact with patients and performing duties in highrisk clinical areas.

Chief Public Health Officer Professor Nicola Spurrier said healthcare workers have an increased risk of acquiring some vaccine preventable diseases because of the nature of their work.

"In some circumstances, there is an increased risk of transmitting these diseases to other healthcare workers and patients," she said.

"We have a responsibility and duty of care to our staff and patients to ensure we're providing the safest possible work environment, and this vaccine policy will help us to do that."

Other South Australian Public Health Act directions expire on November 24.

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# Van Schaiking up NYC Marathon

TOM and Sarah Van Shaik have gone from slogging it out in central Yorke Peninsula rain to the New York City Marathon finish line.

The Maitland couple ran 42 kilometres through the five New York boroughs (suburbs) to finish in less than four hours and 44 minutes on Sunday, November 6.

It was Sarah's second NYC Marathon medal — her first came in 2018 when Tom watched from the sidelines.

"The day before the marathon ballot closed in March this year, Tom asked if I'd be keen to put our names in and see what happens," Sarah said.

'Usually, there's a less than 10 per cent chance of getting in through the ballot, so I was incredibly lucky for a second time and we did a travel partner entry for Tom."

The couple completed 700plus kilometres of training across 28 weeks which consist-

ed of two "shorter" runs through the week before a longer distance effort, which often reached half-marathon distance, on weekends.

"We both work full-time, Tom runs a building company, we are building our new home and we have a 1-year-old son, so fitting in our training schedule was a fine art and came down to a very good routine," Sarah said.

"I know a lot of people saw us running up and down the Maitland to Arthurton (Upper Yorke) road, a lot of the time in wind and rain!

"Just getting to the marathon completing the training and arriving injury free is a feat in itself which I'm incredibly proud of."

Sarah said the atmosphere at the event had to be experienced to be believed.

"There were DJs, bands, homemade signs, bars packed with people and people lining the streets yelling at us to keep going - we didn't need headphones that's for sure!" she said.

"The plan was always to run together no matter what, but our goal time flew out the window when I was sick during the race.

This was the second hottest NYC Marathon on record, and the humidity made it very difficult.

"There were a lot of unwell people along the way due to the conditions - the men's pro leader for almost 20 miles (about 30km) collapsed due to heat exhaustion.

"Tom claimed a two second victory, even though we finished side by side, but I wouldn't have made it through without him after he patiently waited when I took five bathroom stops!"

More than 50,000 runners were staggered across three start lines and six start times, and they all merged to one group at about the 8km mark.

"Weaving our way through the runners on the course wasn't easy, especially when people started to walk up the bridges," Sarah said.

"The crowds were also so large in some areas they spilled onto the course, leaving only a five-person wide gap to run through.

"Running through the five boroughs of New York is an amazing way to see the diversity of the city."

Sarah said crossing the finish line alongside Tom was a moment she would never forget.

"It was a very special moment and we were beyond proud of each other," she said.

"Unfortunately, we had to leave our son Jack at home with my parents, who we cannot thank enough for allowing us to take this opportunity."

### **TICKERA MASTER PLAN** - HAVE YOUR SAY

A draft master plan for Tickera is open for public consultation for three months as Council looks to establish sustainable growth and development policies for the quiet fishing and farming settlement.

Council wants to define a vision and general plan for the entire township of Tickera, located 40km south of Port Broughton, and is seeking feedback from the community and other stakeholders between 26 September and 9 December 2022.

The master plan, once finalised, will be used as a basis for planning code amendments and capital works grant funding.

Among its draft recommendations are to pursue funding avenues for road upgrades including sealing the Alford to Tickera Road, recreational walking trails, an improved boat launching facility, and for a Telstra site base station.

The draft master plan also proposes an expansion of tourism facilities including seeking funding to redevelop the disused Tickera Oval into a ground that could accommodate camping, caravans, motor homes and boats along with toilets, potable drinking water, picnic areas, shaded BBQ facilities, an onsite dump point and a rubbish bin station.

Other draft recommendations include seeking the release by the State Government of 31 Crown Land allotments, investigating whether eco cabins could be placed south of the community centre and golf course, and working with the Landscape Board, Tickera community and Aboriginal nations to formalise one coastal camping location.

Council will be holding a drop in community consultation session this Thursday (24 November) at Tickera's Community Centre from 6pm onwards where residents can ask questions of staff and provide their feedback in person.

### **ELECTION RESULTS - 2022**

The citizens of Barunga West are to be congratulated for their healthy engagement in the democratic process of the 2022 Council Elections, with the region recording above average postal ballot returns.

While it is not compulsory to vote in local government elections, a high number of Barunga West residents responded and had their say on their local decision-makers.

The level of interest and participation shows a strong interest from our community to contribute to the civic leadership of our region.

There were nine councillor vacancies in Barunga West contested by 11 candidates.

The newly elected Council for the next four years is made up of Peter Button, Cynthia Axford, Leonie Kerley, Kim Gregory, Kevin Beinke, Brian Lockyer, Margaret McDonald, Dave Eason, and Grant Rowlands.

Former councillor Rebecca Hewett has served several terms with Barunga West and decided to nominate for a position with Mount Barker Council and has successfully been elected.

### **GRANT SUCCESS**

Nature-based coastal protection measures to better protect the Port Broughton coastline from erosion will be implemented after Council won a \$359,000 funding boost from the Australian Government.

The funding, awarded under the Coastal and Estuarine Risk Mitigation Program (CERMP), will enable Council to undertake a range of nature-based coastal protection measures.

The measures will target areas from Port Broughton Beach South to the northern extent of the beach adjacent John Lewis Drive, and will include sand replenishment works and re-vegetation. Council was one of six successful grant applicants from South Australia for the 2022-23 funding round, announced this month by Emergency Management Minister Murray Watt.

The \$50 million national CERMP, funded by the Emergency Response Fund, supports projects that reduce the impact of disasters on coastal communities. The \$359,000 will enable Council to build on sand replenishment works to date and for ratepayers it will mean work can immediately start to build up the profile of the beach around the jetty and foreshore area over the next 12 months.

It will involve bringing in locally sourced sand to build up the profile of the beach by approximately 50 to 75 centimetres along the coastline every 12 months for three years.

Once the sand is settled and reaching a stable height, we will re-vegetate some areas with endemic plants to hold the sand in place and encourage continual stability of the coastline. Council is planning sand replenishment works around the jetty and foreshore next year once the Easter holidays are over.

# **Draft bill out for First Nations Voice**

A DRAFT bill, which would provide a directly elected First Nations Voice to state parliament, is out for public consultation.

The First Nations Voice Bill 2022 forms part of the government's commitment to a state-based implementation of the Uluru Statement from the Heart.

The bill proposes a State-wide First Nations group, made of a number of First Nations Voices, be formed (the State First Nations Voice), to advise and address Parliament.

around the state, each with their own directly elected Voice who would talk and consider matters of interest to local First Nations

The State First Nations Voice will consist of the two joint presiding members (male and female) from each of the Local First Nations Voice and will able to address parliament on particular legislation of interest to Aboriginal people, make an annual address, provide reports on matters of interest and engage

Regions would be established Ministers and Chief Executives about department budgets and priorities in annual meetings.

> "Overwhelmingly, people have told me about the need for grassroots voices to be heard and that First Nations people should choose who represents them," inaugural First Nations Voice commissioner Dale Agius said.

> "Following my first round of engagements I have worked closely with the Attorney-General Kyam Maher and his department to ensure the bill has been informed

by the voices of South Australian First Nations people.

"My report captures the resounding message I heard in these conversations — First Nations people in South Australia want to have a say in their affairs based on the principle of selfdetermination.

"They want to be able to influence the decisions being made about them at the highest of levels in the Parliament."

LEGISLATION to fast-track Adelaide's new Women's and Children's Hospital has passed through both houses of parliament.


The New Women's and Children's Hospital Bill 2022 removes planning and development barriers which could increase the new hospital's cost and construction timeframe.

# Cervical self-screening available

SOUTH Australians who are due for cervical screening can now choose to perform the test themselves with self-collection kits now available through

The You Can Do It campaign aims to encourage women aged 25 to 74 to consider self-collection for their five-yearly screening.

Around 800 Australians are diagnosed with cervical cancer every year and about 70 per cent of these cases occur in women who were not up to date with their screening or who had never screened before.

A cervical screening test (previously called a pap smear) is a simple test to detect the human papillomavirus (HPV), which is a common infection which can develop into cervical cancer.

Cervical screening, including self-collection, is facilitated by a doctor, nurse or healthcare worker with a rebate provided through Medicare.

"If you are eligible and together with your GP decide collecting your own sample is the best option for you, your healthcare provider will give you a long-handled cotton swab and instructions on how to collect your sample in private," Minister for Health and Wellbeing Chris Picton said.

"Having a cervical screening test every five years is the best way to protect yourself as screening can help prevent more than 70 per cent of cervical can-

"Self-collection is a game-changer for many people who, for a variety of reasons, may be putting it off or never had a cervical screening test before.

'This new campaign highlights this new option and will ensure fewer women miss out on regular testing which will ultimately save lives."

Wellbeing SA executive director of prevention and population health Professor Katina D'Onise said a self-collection test was just as safe and accurate as a clinician-collected sample.

"We know it's important to keep up with regular screening as detecting HPV infection early allows your healthcare provider to monitor the infection and intervene with appropriate treatment, if required, which could save your life," she said.

# Margaret reflects on lengthy **Copper Coast commitment**

MARGARET Pope has stepped away from serving the community after 14 years.

Margaret, with Dean Rodda, were the only two incumbent councillors who decided not to run in the recent Copper Coast Council elections.

Margaret, of Wallaroo, said it was time for some fresh eyes to take over after four (not consecutive) council

In her sole stint as deputy mayor, Margaret chaired two monthly council meetings in place of Mayor Roslyn Talbot, including her third meeting in the role and second to last meeting four years later.

She successfully ran for the District Council of Copper Coast (now CCC) in 1997, one of three members elected to represent the Wallaroo Ward.

"I first decided to run for council because I didn't want to see the development of Wallaroo get left behind when the Corporation of the Town of Wallaroo amalgamated with the District Council of Northern Yorke Peninsula," Margaret said.

"I thought running for council was the best way to have a voice for my town.

"Council was much different when I first started (to what it is now) — there were four different wards with councillors who only really focused on their respective towns," Margaret said.

"There were often disagreements about where our money went."

Since renaming to Copper Coast Council in 2010, elected members haven't been required to nominate for individual

"Once there were no wards, it broadened our (councillors') outlook on the whole district and we started looking at the big picture," Margaret said.

A lifelong school teacher, Margaret's career began at Port Pirie where she taught primary students for four years.

"I loved my early teaching days they turned me into a country girl," she said.

"There were lots of other young teachers there (in Port Pirie) at the time so it was a great social environ-

Margaret later took her teaching passion overseas and became an English teacher at a school in Indonesia.

"Living in Indonesia for four years really made me realise what it's like

to be in a minority group," she said.

"It gave me a huge appreciation for people of other cultures who come to live in Australia and have to learn a new language."

In 1975, Margaret returned to South Australia and started working at Kalori Catholic School (now St Mary MacKillop School), Wallaroo, where she met future husband Neville and commenced a life on her beloved Copper Coast.

"When I first started on council, (monthly) meetings were held at

9am which was very inconvenient for a teacher, so we had it changed to the evening," she

"I spent many Sunday afternoons driving around the Copper Coast to try and be the eyes and ears of the community as best I could.

"I always tried to learn as much as I could about what our towns needed, particularly outside Wallaroo."

Margaret said monthly meetings were often important decision-making times for coun-

"Prior to meetings, we (councillors) would read the agenda and have ideas about what results we hoped for from each item," she said.

"But during meetings, it was important to listen to the opinions of other councillors and quickly decide whether they aligned or outweighed my thoughts.

"Keeping an open mind was crucial in achieving the best outcomes."

When it came to reaping the rewards of council decisions, Margaret's favourite moments involved seeing the completion of projects, drawing new visitors to the region and planning for the future.

"I like to think I've helped initiate

a few major projects (including) the Food Organics and Green Organics bin system, the new shared recreational trails and the Resource Recovery Centre," she said.

"(Potential) future projects I would love to see include a new walking ramp over the Wallaroo marina to improve accessibility to the township, and a Kadina to Moonta bike trail to create one big trail net-

Margaret said she was very disappointed to see just eight people nominate as area councillors in the recent elections.

"I think more people definitely would've put their hands up if nominations were able to be disclosed, so I think the nomination process could potentially be changed," she said.

"It would be great to see some younger faces run for council in the future, that way a broader range of needs could be considered.

"The most recent council was very stable, thanks to Mayor Talbot's great

"We all got along well and seemed to agree on most things, which probably had something to do with all of us being around the same age!

"I've absolutely grown a passion for the Copper Coast and certainly wouldn't have run for as long as I did if I didn't love where I live."

# Join South Australia's Friends of Osprey

NEW group Friends of Osprey is working towards increasing South Australia's population of this endangered raptor, including on Yorke Peninsula.

The group's chair is David Speirs, former Environment Minister and now Opposition Leader.

Funded by grants and donations, the group's conservation activities have so far included constructing elevated nesting platforms to increase the number of birds successfully fledging from nests, GPS tracking the birds, and community education.

Nesting platforms have been built in partnership with Ardrossan Men's Shed members, who worked with conservationists to design and build these structures.

So far, five platforms have been installed on YP, at Price, Port Broughton, Gleesons Landing, Point Davenport and Sheoak Flat.

Others are planned, including at Edithburgh where an osprey pair has nested successfully in a telecommunications tower.

Friends of Osprey management committee member Kylie Correll from the Price Progress Association said she believed the Price platform had the potential to draw birders to the region.

"The platform was installed in Wills Creek Conservation Park in 2021 with the assistance of Malcolm Walker from Price, and Friends of Osprey committee members Ian Hodson and Ian

About the osprey

LARGELY coastal dwelling, ospreys are found around the world and feed primarily on fish.

The South Australian osprey subspecies — the eastern osprey (Pandion haliaetus cristatus) - is distinct from interstate species and was once widespread around the state's coastline and along the River Murray.

Now, they are now mostly found on offshore islands and isolated Eyre Peninsula and Kangaroo Island coasts.

Ospreys are susceptible to disturbance when breeding and will quickly abandon their nests if they feel threatened; there are also examples of nests being preyed upon by foxes.

Consequently, the success rate of nests is low, which has sent the population into freefall over recent

Falkenberg," Mrs Correll said.

"We're excited about the success of last year's fledglings, which are now nearly 12 months old.

"Planned educational signage and a mural will enhance community engagement."



Eastern District Cricket Club is set to celebrate its 30th anniversary on Sunday, February 12.

The Lower Yorke Peninsula Cricket Association club was formed from the amalgamation of the Port Julia and Curramulka Cricket Clubs.

The day will also celebrate 145 years since the humble beginnings of the Curramulka Cricket Club in 1877 and more than six decades of the Port Julia Cricket Club which started in 1926.

Across the 30 years, EDCC collected its first premiership title in 2014-15, breaking Stansbury's 11-year streak.

A second premiership came last summer, 2021-22, also defeating Stansbury by 33 runs on March 12. In a great season

personally, Troy Goldsworthy collected Troy Goldsworthy has the highest score, man of the match honours, making 73 with the bat in a team total of 9/140 and collecting three top order wickets.

He fell agonisingly three runs short of a 1000-run season, finishing with 997 runs from 17 innings with 1 not out, averaging 62.31.

His performance included four centuries and a quartet of 50s, as well as 32

In a game driven by records, the Eastern District statistics have been meticulously kept.

As at the start of the current campaign EDCC had played 503 games, enjoying 254 wins, four ties and having 13 matches where there was no result.

The club's first 100 was scored by Dennis Hayles in November 1992 against Maitland in an away game, while 200, against Warooka in January 2017.

Goldsworthy (at the start of 2022-2 had compiled 8580 runs and is poised to overtake the current leader Graeme "Charlie" Short whose 8636 runs at an average of 28.98 included seven centuries and a highest score of 122.

Of the five individual scores of more than 150 scored by an EDCC cricketer, T Goldsworthy has produced four.

The other, 155 against Corny Point in December 2015, was made by current West Torrens cricketer, Murphy Short,

The highest partnership in club history is still held by G Short and Hayles on February 13 of 1992-93. Playing at Sunbury, the pair produced 239 for the first wicket.

Ed Brown is the club's leading wicket

taker with 323 scalps at an average 20.38 and the best analysis of 6/23.

T Goldsworthy is also secon list with 231 wickets at 20.13 and a best performance of 6/12.

Left arm quick Andrew Parsons has the best match figures in Eastern District club history, collecting 7/10 in a home semifinal against Honiton on March 2, 2013.

Josh Hoyle, against Port Victoria in October 2014, Patrick Way and Ned Watters, both during the 2021-22 campaign, are the only three Eastern District players to have achieved a prized hat-trick.

Throughout the history of Eastern District, 10 members of the Short family have worn the green and white cap, John, Tony, David J, Graeme, Des, David S, Will, Toby, Angus, Patrick and Murphy.

Not far behind them are the Agnew clan with seven participants, Jamie, Callum, Fergus, Fraser, Ray, Bruce and Tim.

Besides its two flags, EDCC has played in five other grand finals, runner-up in its initial season, 1992-93, and between 2009-10 to 2012-13 during Stansbury's run.

Another heart-breaking day was the 2008-09 semifinal against Stansbury, where EDCC had a tie in a rain shortened game of 30 overs.

As Stansbury was top, it proceeded to the grand final.

All the peaks and troughs of 30 years of cricket along with the rich history of the Curramulka and Port Julia Cricket Clubs will be remembered on February 12.









GROWERS have been encouraged by Grains Research Development Corporation to take extra precautions before and during harvesting on wet paddocks this year.

Extension specialist and deputy chairperson of the GRDC Southern Panel Pru Cook said it was important for growers and harvest workers to look after themselves this harvest.

"Harvest will be a long, drawn-out process which will present a range of physical and mental challenges for growers and harvest workers," Ms Cook said.

"We want to remind everyone

involved in harvest operations this year to take their time to prepare, understand the risks and how to reduce them, and to look out for each other."

GRDC and the Rural Safety and Health Alliance have published guidelines for safe work this harvest.

One potentially fatal risk of harvesting in wet conditions is retrieving bogged headers.

We used to use chains or cables to pull out bogged headers," contractor Rod Gribble said.

"I had the chain break once and it came hurtling back at me.

"It hit the back of the tractor and was only a metre away from breaking the window and taking me out."

He now uses snatch straps to pull out equipment as they are less likely to break and do damage, but caution is still required.

"People have got to be patient," Mr Gribble said.

"Someone will get bogged, and when you do, just stop.

"Remember a header might weigh 25 to 30 tonnes, but you're probably going to bog it when it's got a fully loaded grain tank.

"The effort to pull out a loaded

header is much greater — they are a dead weight stuck in the ground.

"Unload the grain first, take your time and clear the mud away from all the tires with a shovel or excava-

Mr Gribble emphasised growers should also review their machinery's operator's manual and learn the specific guidance for retrieving equipment should it get bogged.

AgHealth Australia reports tractors are the leading cause of unintentional deaths on farms, responsible for 251 fatalities between 2001 and

Seafood recipe, marinated scallops fried with ginger and garlic: Ingredients — 12 fresh scallops, soy and Worcestershire sauce. crushed garlic, ginger, olive oil. Preparation -Make a marinade of all ingredients and mix in the scallops. Refrigerate for 1hr min. Heat a pan to high and cook scallops in oil for 2-3 mins. Serve with the marinade drizzled over the scallops and some cooked sticky white rice.

Wallaroo: Believe it or not I sighted a couple of small boats out in the bay just before the gale force winds cracked in on Saturday! Garfish, squid and a few tommy ruff (Australian herring) are here and out from Bird Reef and The Magazine. Verbal friction between anglers at times from the jetty has resulted in their numbers dropping in recent weeks as they tried for squid and blue swimmer crabs.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Boat crews had to choose their timing last week as they ventured out for gar, squid and King George whiting. Jetty-based anglers reported slow results but caught an occasional squid before

Point Turton: Crews fishing the Hardwicke Bay drift grounds have caught small to medium KG whiting, squid and even a couple of legal flathead. Gar and squid are off Point Souttar and The Pines. The jetty again has quiet but squid and tommies are here at times

Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: Watching the huge seas rush past Penguin Point was a popular pastime last week as boats pretty much remained in sheds. Offshore crews will be targeting red nannygai, tuna and trevalley with crews in smaller boats trying for gar, KG whiting and squid. Salmon trout to 1 kilo are off Richards, Gym and Dust Bowl Beaches.

Edithburgh/Stansbury: Heavy weather means canny boat crews will be catching whiting, flathead and tommy ruff from Sultana Passage. Marion Reef and Taplev Shoals later this week as things ease off. Orontes Bank and the grounds west of the Stansbury foreshore caravan park will also have whiting, snook and a couple of blueys. Jetty-based anglers are fishing for tommies, squid and blue crabs.

Black Point/Ardrossan: Catches of blue crabs, squid and garfish should resume this week from Black Point, Ardrossan and Price saltwater flats.
