SOUTH Australia's borders officially reopened today (Tuesday, November 23).

Double vaccinated residents from all Australian states and territories are now able to enter South Australia without quarantining, unless they arrive from a local government area of concern.

Questions have been asked about

how health services will cope with the strain caused by the expected upsurge of COVID-19 cases, especially in areas already under pressure.

A spokesperson for the Yorke and Northern Local Health Network said plans and processes were in place to ensure health services were well prepared.

"More than 85 per cent of people over 16 years have had their first dose of the COVID-19 vaccine and more than 75 per cent have had their second dose, and for this reason it is expected the majority of people can be cared for at home if they contract COVID," the spokesperson said.

"We have plans underway to establish a dedicated COVID-19 hospital that can assess, stabilise, treat and transfer COVID-19 patients in need of care, with arrangements in place to transfer COVID-19 positive patients to the most appropriate

hospital for treatment.

"We'd like to reassure the community our health and emergency services will remain available across our local health network, and we encourage people to get vaccinated if they are yet to do so."


SA Health's mobile COVID-19 vaccination clinic has visited many communities across the region and is set to visit Snowtown, Maitland and Minlaton this week.

"We are also working with local

councils to identify areas with lower vaccination rates and ways to deliver the vaccine to these vulnerable communities," the spokesperson said.

"People can get vaccinated at some pharmacies, GP practices, our walk-in vaccination clinics in Port Pirie, Clare, and Wallaroo, and keep an eye on the Yorke and Northern Local Health Network Facebook page for details on our mobile vaccination clinic."

Keep Watch out

ROYAL Life Saving is asking your readers to be especially vigilant of children around the water this summer and to Keep Watch at all times.

Our new research shows 532 children aged 4 and under have drowned in the past 19 years in Australia. It also shows that a child's risk of drowning triples after their first birthday; 40 per cent of children were just 1 year old when they

For every fatal drowning in this age group, eight children are admitted to hospital following a nonfatal drowning. Some will sustain life-long brain injuries.

We know summer is when young children are most at risk. Swimming pools are the leading location for drowning among children, accounting for more than half of all deaths.

The four things we recommend to prevent drowning are: actively supervise children around water (supervise); restrict children's access to water (restrict); teach children water safety skills (teach); and learn how to respond in the case of an emergency (respond).

This year has been challenging for parents and carers who are juggling so much.

Around the water you can't multitask and just check that email — actively supervising children needs your complete attention and you need to be within arm's reach.

Drowning in children is quick and silent. Please check your pool fence and gate to make sure they are in working order.

Should we, as the federal government does, just talk about total emissions, or should we primarily consider per-capita emissions, the total emissions divided by the number of people in the nation?

The highest emitting nations are China, 10.4 billion tonnes of CO2 carbon dioxide equivalent per year; USA, 5.0 and India 2.5. Australia's emissions are 0.4 billion tonnes.

However, looking at per-capita emissions gives a very different picture: of the above countries Australia is the highest emitter at 17.2 tonnes, the USA next at 15.5; China 7.4 and India 1.9.

Surely any fair-minded person would conclude that while China has the greatest total emissions, it is Australia that has the greatest moral responsibility, among these nations, to reduce its emissions?

Technology to assist SA's opening

SOUTH Australia is set to hit 80 per cent fully vaccinated this week.

This comes as the state government unveiled its new digital solutions to support the state's reopening.

A new pre-registration process, Entry Check, went live as of 5pm, Friday, November 19.

"It must be used by people entering South Australia from any state or country," Premier Steven Marshall said.

"The Vax Check and Health Check apps are also live.

"We are the first jurisdiction in the entire country that is COVID-free that is opening its borders."

Mr Marshall said we would have to be more careful than we have been in the past.

"But, we are good to go and we have made all the necessary precautions to get to this

point," he said.

"The best thing you can do for yourself, your family, your friends and your state is to go and make a vaccination appointment now.

When we look interstate and see the people who are ending up in hospital, in ICU, on ventilators, they are by and large unvaccinated."

There are currently no new cases of COVID-19 in the state, with only two active cases both acquired overseas.

South Australians will also be able to integrate their digital COVID-19 vaccination certificate into their mySA Gov app to make it easier to show your vaccination status where proof is required.

Landowners pleased with access report

A PARLIAMENTARY report into land access has finally addressed the concerns of local landowners.

The Select Committee on Land Access tabled its final report last week and with it six recommendations, welcomed by those who have campaigned for reform for some time.

Yorke Peninsula Land Owners Group representative Joy Wundersitz said the report has delivered a set of overdue recommendations to

"For the first time, there is an official report which finally acknowledges and takes seriously landowners' longstanding frustrations with the state's land access regime governing resource company access to agricultural land," she said.

"After having their views almost completely ignored during the recent Mining Act Review, this report finally gives landowners a voice!

"Most importantly, all six recommendations are very positive, and reflect what YPLOG and YP farmers have been calling for over many years."

YPLOG members and local farmers wrote submissions for the committee, and attended hearings earlier this

The recommendations include the establishment of a mining ombudsman to oversee exploration, changes to the notice around entry periods and a focus on the protection of agricultural land.

Ms Wundersitz said a mining ombudsman would give landowners an option to take their complaints to an independent source and hold the Department for Energy and Mining to account if needed.

"At present, the mining department is solely responsible for ensuring that resource companies operating on agricultural land adhere to the access conditions legally required of them," she said.

"But all too often, farmers have been frustrated and angered by the department's failure to do so effectively.

"Where breaches of entry conditions have occurred, the Department has in many cases either been unaware of them or if aware, has either ignored them or given the company a mild slap over the wrist. The establishment of a specialised mining ombudsman would change this.

"Given the importance of this Select Committee report, it is imperative whichever government is elected in March next year, implement the recommendations."

Better balance

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis was an appointed member of the committee and said he was pleased with the final report and its recommendations.

"Land access has been a highly charged issue in our community for some time and something I have stood up for in the Parliament on a number of occasions," he said.

"I am hopeful, if implemented, (the recommendations will have positive impacts in ensuring the interests of farmers and mining companies are better balanced in land access disputes.

"As a result of the evidence heard, the Select Committee has also resolved to request that the Ombudsman investigate the manner in which the Department for Energy and Mining addresses complaints of breaches of the Mining Act

"This will ensure any possible breaches, beyond the committee's scope, can be appropriately investigated to ensure the best outcomes for landowners."





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Post office licence uncertainty

ABOUT 200 residents of Coobowie and Wool Bay could soon be without a post office.

The current post office, situated in the Coobowie General Store, is set to close unless a solution can be found by November 30.

Darren Smith bought the general store business in December 2020 but has been told by Australia Post he is unable to hold a postal licence due to a decades-old criminal record.

Coobowie Progress Association members Irena De Vink and Jan Klingberg see the store as a vital community hub.

"We have quite an elderly community and I see the shop as a hub where people can meet, have coffee and get many of their essentials as well as their post," Ms De Vink said.

"We would be satisfied if they could give us a whole bunch of reasons for this decision as well as a whole bunch of options because for some people it is not an option to drive to Edithburgh."

More than 200 people rely on the store for their post and banking capabilities as well as other essential shopping.

"During peak periods the local population swells significantly with people owning holiday homes with many of them redirecting their post to the store," Mrs Klingberg said.

"Many of the boxes have multiple family members getting their mail from the same box, with sometimes four or five people sharing the same one."

Current Australia Post licensee Travis Peter said he has lost about \$50,000 now the licence cannot be sold to Mr Smith.

"I feel very bad for the local communities of Coobowie and Wool Bay," Mr Peter said.

"We have a large number of elderly in our community who rely on mobility scooters to get around and to come to the general store, and they will be impacted greatly if the postal service ends up at Edithburgh or somewhere similar"

An Australia Post spokesperson said all licensees must meet Australia Post's requirements before they can operate a post office on behalf of Australia Post.

"Coobowie does not currently have post office boxes and residents collecting their mail at this location do so over the counter during operating hours," the spokesperson said.

"Both Edithburgh and Yorketown Post Offices have boxes for lease, which provide 24/7 access and many Coobowie residents have already leased PO Boxes at alternate locations.

"Australia Post is committed to continuing postal services for the Coobowie community and is currently seeking expressions of interest to operate a Community Postal Agency in the area."

New COVID plan for schools

TEACHERS will need to have had at least one COVID-19 vaccination and a booking for a second by December 10.

Anyone who works or volunteers at a state, Catholic or independent school, preschool or childcare centre will be required to be vaccinated according to the state government's newest plan.

Masks will remain optional indoors for all staff and students, with the government also encouraging all eligible students aged 12 and older to be vaccinated.

Minister for Education John Gardner said although they weren't expecting major alterations, the government is willing to be flexible should it be required.

Gur students have lost just a handful of days of schooling because of the pandemic, thanks to the sensible management of COVID-19 and the overwhelmingly positive response from South Australians," he said.

Only those who have a medical exemption endorsed by the Chief Public Health Officer will

be permitted to work or volunteer at a school or early childhood setting without getting vaccinated.

St Columba's Memorial School, Yorketown principal Scott March said his school's community would continue to follow any set guidelines from Catholic Education and SA Health.

"We want to make sure we're providing a safe workspace for staff and students at our school, and that only happens when following health guidelines as we have done throughout the pandemic," he said.

"Over the course of the past 18 months we've been consistent with the other schools in the area – we're regularly in contact with Warooka Primary School and Yorketown Area School to ensure all in our community are receiving the same messaging."

Catholic Education South Australia director Dr Neil McGoran said the safety of staff, students and families is their priority.

"While I understand there are different views in our com-

munity about vaccination, we rely on the evidence-based advice of SA Health and the SA Government, and we appreciate this direction has been provided in the best interests of children and young people," he said

"We will be working closely with our principals, staff, volunteers and contractors to ensure they understand the requirements of this direction."

St Mary MacKillop School, Wallaroo, principal Michelle Miller said it was imperative everyone in the school community felt supported.

"Every effort is being made to make sure we keep open communication with staff and families and ensure everyone feels supported whatever their circumstances might be," she said.

A Department For Education centralised contact tracing team has been established to work with SA Health's Communicable Disease Control Branch in the event a confirmed COVID case in the education system.





Five-year transport plan in motion

COPPER Coast Council is moving forward with its five-year transport

The plan, which has taken more than a year to complete, will consist of resealing, reconstructing and resheeting of roads.

It also includes plans for sealing footpaths, stormwater management and the sealing of unsealed roads within built-up areas.

Director infrastructure services Tim Neumann said a need to focus on the area's unsealed road network was discovered as part of the investigation for the plan.

"The unsealed road network has been defined into three categories as per the service and standard levels of the roads," Mr Neumann said.

"A large proportion of unsealed roads have been classified as 'high use' or Category 1; as such, the focus of the five-year road transport plan has prioritised the roads that can be achieved to a satisfactory level and within budget over this five-year period."

CEO Russell Peate said it was a big step forward for council.

"A lot of time and effort went into this plan and we are very pleased it is moving forward with the chosen roads and paths," Mr Peate said.

"It will be a process but people will

start to see works progressing."

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said there was a mountain of work done to get to this

"This gives us a plan and the ability to look and tell the community what roads will be upgraded and when," she

"I congratulate Mr Neumann and the staff on assessing the roads and for a job well done."

Councillor Neil Sawley said it answered a lot of questions on what dirt roads will be sealed.

"It addresses the main things and gives us something to work towards over the next five years," Mr Sawley

Moonta Bay resident Neil Windsor said he was very happy the plan included upgrades to Moonta Road.

"I have been fighting for this road for about 20 years," Mr Windsor said.

"When we first bought a property here in 1998 it has gone from nine houses to more than 30, with only five vacant lots at the moment.

This program needs to continue and hopefully extra funding can be sought to the many other streets that also require attention."

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RAP warns students of motorcycle risks

METROPOLITAN Fire Service stopped by six Yorke Peninsula schools as part of its Road Awareness Program tour from Monday to Thursday, October 18-21.

MFS firefighter Jarrad Stallard was joined by road crash survivor Yudhi Mohan-Ram in visits to Kadina Memorial, Minlaton District, Moonta Area, Ardrossan Area and Yorketown Area Schools, as well as Harvest Christian College, Kadina.

The pair also presented at Wallaroo Hospital as part of the

This year's RAP focused on the dangers of motorcycles and encouraged students to speak up against selfish behaviour.

There have been 90 lives lost on South Australian roads so far this year, with motorbikes accounting for nearly 20 per cent of deaths despite only representing 3.6 per cent of vehicles.

Mr Stallard said there were 21

motorcycle-related deaths in 2020 and 15 already this year, but one death is too many.

"We want everyone to be aware of the risks involved with being a road user," he said.

"We are not saying don't ride motorcycles, we just want everyone to make informed choices."

Mr Mohan-Ram was Tboned on his motorbike and left in a coma for 46 days with a 10 per cent chance of survival.

"For (many fatalities), there are people like me who survive with serious injuries," he said.

"My crash left me with a bruised heart, broken bones throughout my whole body and reduced lung capacity."

Mr Mohan-Ram's injuries prevent him from working fulltime, so he instead spends his time volunteering.

He said he is determined to educate young drivers about the major consequences which can occur from taking just one risk.



Federal taskforce to count cost of bank closures

A FEDERAL government taskforce is set to explore the impact of regional bank branch clo-

Yorke Peninsula hasn't been spared from closures with Maitland ANZ branch shutting in August and Bank SA shutting its doors at Yorketown in 2016, amongst others.

The Regional Banking Taskforce held its first meeting earlier this month, with an issues paper expected to be out for public consultation by the end of the year.

Assistant Treasurer Michael Sukkar and New South Wales Senator Perin Davey will cochair the group, and will be joined by representatives from banks, Australia Post and other organisations.

ANZ currently operates three branches in Kadina, Minlaton and Yorketown but ANZ South Australia general manager Kathleen Jahour said the company had seen a huge increase in customers choosing online banking methods during the past year.

"ANZ is committed to regional Australia and we are working with the government and industry groups as part of the task-

"We have seen a significant shift in the way customers use branches, with a 60 per cent decline in, in-branch transactions across ANZ over the past five years.

"In the last year alone we've seen 70 per cent of our customers prefer online banking methods, which are convenient and secure."

region's Commonwealth Bank branch in Kadina was one of 90 sites to have its opening hours reduced in July, now closing at 1pm daily.

There is one NAB branch in Kadina and BankSA at Kadina, Moonta, Ardrossan and Minlaton.

"It's a great concern we've lost a lot of bank branches and there are now sizeable towns regionally without banking," Member for Grey Rowan Ramsey said.

"On the other hand, the world has moved to electronic banking, so a lot of us don't use banks like we used to and there's a certain inevitability that if the branch isn't used, it won't stay

"It's a good opportunity for the taskforce to discover whether this has a lasting impact on communities which undermines their ability to succeed in other areas.

"When you're trying to attract professionals to a town and you've got no school, no hospital, and no bank, well these are all negatives in the eyes of someone new to a community."

South Australian Senator Rex Patrick reinforced the importance in having financial options available for people living regionally.

"The spate of bank closures and decline of access to financial services across regional Australia is a very serious problem with huge implications for economic opportunity, prosperity and social justice," Mr Patrick

However, Mr Patrick also conveyed his concerns about the taskforce.

"Apart from Senator Davey, it's hard to see anyone with a direct experience of regional Australia, including the perspectives and problems of communities such as those of the Yorke and Eyre Peninsulas, let alone those of more remote areas such as the APY lands," he said.

"If this was a serious exercise the taskforce would have included more people with firsthand experience of regional and remote parts of Australia, including representation of Indigenous Australians."



Bute wastewater flowing to fruition

BUTE'S Community Waste Management System is set for a \$1.5 million redevelopment.

The project will include an upgrade to Port Broughton's Moyses Road wastewater site, as well as the installation of an irrigation system which will feed water to the Bute oval.

An improvement to the wastewater site will allow its water to process through four facultative lagoons, whilst settling and oxidising at different stages, before flowing through to the oval.

Barunga West Council initially allocated \$1m for the project as part of its 2021-22 budget, but after approaching the market it is likely to cost

Council CEO Maree Wauchope said the additional costs were mainly associated with the infrastructure to treat and reuse wastewater.

'The project is set to save up to \$40,000 a year in SA Water bills, and will enable the community to water the oval all year around," Ms Wauchope said.

"(At our November meeting) Councillors thought these benefits were well worth the invest-

"Council wants to reduce costs while increasing water supply to the oval, and by treating and reusing the wastewater we can achieve this.

"Importantly, the project will resolve compliance and functionality issues with the current lagoon."

Baker Civil Australia has been engaged for the project and is scheduled to begin works on the Port Broughton wastewater site this month.

The same tender will also commence the Bute Community Waste Management System upgrade in April next year, with an aim to complete the redevelopment in September.

Mr Braund commended the residents, council staff and elected members, particularly Councillor Adam everyone else involved in bringing the trail to fruition.





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Call for free mental health centre

LIFELINE ambassador David Boots is advocating for a free mental health service on Yorke Peninsula but needs community backing.

Mr Boots, who is also chair of SOS Copper Coast Suicide Prevention Network, has been in discussion with Lifeline about the establishment of a service; and needs data from the community to make it possible.

To obtain the data an online survey has been created.

"Lifeline has key centres across Australia and Lifeline Broken Hill Country to Coast services regional areas in New South Wales and South Australia," Mr Boots said.

"I am very keen to support any moves that will improve the mental health support for our Yorke Peninsula communi-

ty.
"The Lifeline Connect concept can provide early intervention support, reducing the chances of someone developing serious mental health issues that require clinical treatment."

Mr Boots said mental health clinicians have lengthy waiting periods due to the high demand for their services.

"If a Lifeline Connect centre can apply a 'stitch in time saves nine' strategy, then this will benefit not only the community but begin to ease pressure on clinicians," he said.

"The great thing is that you do not need a referral, you can walk in off the street and seek support.

"I urge as many people as possible to do this brief anonymous survey, the more who do, the greater our chances of achieving this aim of getting a free Lifeline Connect centre."

Lifeline Broken Hill Country to Coast CEO Scott Hammond said the Lifeline Connect centre model was first launched in Clare in March and exceeded expectations within the first six months.

"The model has proven to be a much-needed first point of contact for people struggling to navigate the complexities of services along with meeting gaps in psychosocial supports for those who experience distress," Mr Hammond said.

"Many key stakeholders have reached out across the South Australia region expressing interest and a need for this type of service in their communities.

"We are keen to explore the potential to secure funding for a satellite centre in Moonta that would be supported by hubs in Clare and Port Pirie."

Campsite rejuvenation two years on

YORKE Peninsula Council has upgraded the Goldsmith Beach bush camping reserve two years after it was destroyed by fire.

Council used state bushfire recovery funding for the project and has also earmarked improving the facilities at the majority of the region's campgrounds in the near future as a possibility.

The reserve, just 12 minutes from Edithburgh, was entirely burnt out by bushfire on November 19, 2019.

Rejuvenation has happened gradually at the site with the introduction of a gravel road, central shelter and toilet block.

YPC operations manager Stephen Goldsworthy said council had relished the opportunity to provide new facilities.

'The placement of a cen-

trally located shelter and compostable toilet, along with fencing has seen the campground facilities become as good as any in our area," he

"The rejuvenation of the surrounding bushland will allow it to re-establish itself and return the habitat to what it once was.

"Local community members are getting on board to help with weed control in the area to give the native vegetation its best chance to respond, which is great to

Of council's 19 bush-camping sites, 10 have toilet facilities and six of the remaining nine have been prioritised for an upgrade.

"Following the onset of COVID, we have seen record number of visitors to our area, and we're doing our best to provide facilities at all sites without impacting the freedom of the bush camping experience," Mr Goldsworthy

"Most of our actions are around protecting environment that people are there to see and provide the infrastructure that supports good camping behaviour."

Mr Goldsworthy said council was working through the final stage of its coastal management strategy, which included plans for potential upgrades.

Compostable toilets at

campsites are the main priority, should funding be available, Mr Goldsworthy said.

"The strategy includes requirements for all our bush camping sites but there are numerous other works to help complement not only bush camping sites, but all council visitor locations," he said.

Bush campers are required to apply for a permit through council which can be used to access any of the sites in the region.

Committee hands down coast protection report

THE parliamentary inquiry into the Coast Protection Act has been completed.

of Members Environment Resources and Development Committee visited a number of coastal locations, including Yorke Peninsula, during their investigations.

The committee has proposed a set of 11 recommendations for implementation by the state government.

During the tour, the parliamentarians saw first-hand examples of dramatically degrading coastlines and inundation, expensive dredging programs, eroding seawalls and risks to infrastructure, and met with local councils and other bodies to assess the challenges moving forward.

There were a number of areas of concern expressed by the YP Council including cliff erosion at Ardrossan. The committee

also met with representatives from the Black Point Progress Association to view first-hand ongoing concerns of that community with the boat ramp and its impacts.

Presiding member and Member for MacKillop Nick McBride said the act had not been amended in more than 50 vears.

"There's not enough money being made available at all levels of government to meet the new demands and requirements on our foreshores," he said.

"The science, as far as storm surges, erosion, and potential sea level rise, is perhaps seen as inadequate, and the bureaucratic red tape of issues having to go through local government, the Environment Protection Authority, Coast Protection Board, Department for Environment and Water, and others, caused decision making to take three to four years.

"With regards to YP, you've got some beautiful, pristine coastline with lots of small towns with boat ramps and walkways that could all be done better or enhanced, but they're problems measured in the tens of thousands of dollars, not in the millions."

Mr McBride said the committee heard the pandemic has created a major influx of visitors and new property owners to coastal regions, creating further challenges.

"YP is booming in the visitation to the area but its infrastructure hasn't kept pace," he

"It's at the minister's peril now as to whether he adopts all 11 recommendations or ignores

"This enquiry into the board and its processes has been very respectful.

"They were very concerned at the beginning that it was going to be a witch-hunt; however, they've now seen it as an opportunity to address the funding issues towards the coastline as well as the streamlining of the process."

TIDDY Widdy Beach Progress Association has set up a GoFundMe page to help make its dream of having an all-weather meeting place come true.

"It is a great option to protect goods and machinery against the elements but, more importantly, fostering and fulfilling the various needs of the local community."

Mrs Tolley said an all-weather meeting place will increase community connection and improve social inclusion and wellbe-

"Suggested ideas (to hold in a meeting place) are educational activities such as computer classes for seniors, relaxation activities, school holiday activities, art classes for kids and adults," she said.

"These activities will encourage the community to be physically active and hiring the facility for special occasions will increase usage and functionality.

"The association is always looking for opportunities to enrich Tiddy Widdy Beach's cultural attractiveness, vibrancy, tourism and liveability."

The project is expected to cost about

"At this point in time the association is committed to providing \$10,000 toward the project which we would like to see completed at the end of 2022," Mrs Tolley

"With specifications and costings completed we then shared it with the world through social media and email.

"Very valuable personal donations have been made so far but we are very open to business donations, these benefactors would make a huge difference to the project."

"I've got him covered though."



James' heart battle

LIFE has been turned upside down for Curramulka's Gavin and Sophia Roocke after their baby son James was diagnosed with a life-threatening heart

The family has temporarily relocated to Melbourne, with no return date in sight, to access the nation's leading paediatric cardiology care.

"This first began when James seemed to get a bug vomiting and diarrhoea — at home in late September," Gavin said.

"It was nothing serious, a doctor examined him, sent us home saying he was slightly dehydrated and no further concerns.

"He subsequently became lethargic/listless which was uncharacteristic of him as he was such a happy, active baby. "

Gavin said James's condition worsened and he became limp and docile.

'We went back to Yorketown Hospital before promptly getting on a MedSTAR flight to the Women's and Children's Hospital in Adelaide," he said.

"Late that night in the emergency department, he was examined by a cardiologist who informed us he was in late-stage heart failure and fighting for his life.

"The cardiologist diagnosed James with dilated cardiomyopathy (disease of the heart muscle that prevents the heart from pumping effectively) and we were straight to ICU where James was placed on extensive life-support systems to stabilise him."

Further tests revealed the cause was not genetic and most likely myocarditis (inflamma-

tion of the middle layer of the heart wall).

"Either way the condition is life-threatening and the cardiologists and ICU specialists in Adelaide made the call to send James to the Royal Children's Hospital here in Melbourne," Gavin said.

'This hospital is a worldleader in paediatric cardiac care and the only hospital in Australia to perform the Ventricular Assist Device surgery which James has undergone.

"James currently has a VAD (external heart pump) supporting the left side of his heart and is on the cusp of having another VAD inserted for the right side of his heart which is still failing."

Gavin said the reality is a transplant is the only recovery option for James.

"We have now been in Melbourne for more than five weeks after five days at the Women's and Children's in Adelaide," he said.

"It is impossible to put into words how Sophia and I felt when we were first told of James' diagnosis.

"We were numb and in disbelief, it was like the rug had just been pulled out from under us, utter and complete devastation."

"Life will never be the same again"

Gavin said watching James' struggle through exhaustive testing, treatment and surgeries during the past six weeks has been challenging and overwhelming.

"He is such a beautiful, joyful soul who currently has no quality of life whatsoever, it is heartwrenching and soul-destroying to say the least," he said.

"This effect has obviously been equally felt by our extended families and friends who all have been deeply and profoundly affected by James's plight.

"As for our return to Yorke Peninsula, this will be a considerable time down the track."

Gavin said should James end up on the transplant path it could be 12 months or longer before they are in a position to return home.

"In the unlikely event that James' heart can heal itself it will still be at least three to six months before leaving hospital is even a possibility," Gavin

"Safe to say, whatever happens, life will never be the same



Incredible support

A GOFUNDME page, set up to help ease the financial pressure on the couple, has raised close to \$20,000.

"The support from the GoFundMe campaign is paying our living expenses and potential medical costs at present," Gavin said.

"Sophia and I have both had to put our jobs on hold to be here fulltime with James so people's generous gifts to us through this forum have removed that financial worry and stress at a time when we have little to spare in our crowded head space.

"Again, we will never be able to thank these generous, giving, caring folks who have given selflessly to assist with our journey.

"The fact we have never even met many of these remarkable people is quite simply astounding and very faith-affirming."

Gavin said the support has not just been financial.

"The support we have received including practical, financial and emotional - is the reason we are still able to get out of bed in the morning," Gavin said.

"Sophia and I have been greatly humbled and in awe of the enormous number of people who have reached out to us in so many ways, from near and far.

"The nurses, doctors, social workers, music therapists, pastoral care workers and everyone else both at the Women's and Children's and the Royal Melbourne Hospitals are beyond amazing.

"They are the true saints of the modern world; words will never do justice in describing these incredible folks.'



Darren is also a member of


several community organisations in that city.

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End of an era at Sandilands

Methodist) Church and hall have been demolished after it was judged economically unfeasible to return them to a safe state.

The church's foundation stone was laid in November 1908, with the building completed and opened on February

The Sunday school hall was added in 1921 and the front porch was built in

In 1946, Mr F. E. Gersch donated extra land for tennis courts to be built behind the hall.

Now, only the three tennis courts remain.

The local community had been aware for some time the buildings, located on Sandilands Church Road, were deteriorating and action was necessary.

There had not been a service in the church for many years, so the Uniting Church of Australia put the buildings on the market and descendants of Mr F. E. Gersch purchased them.

Unfortunately, the serious deterioration of the hall (used as clubrooms when the Sandilands Tennis Club was formed in 1946) had created a safety issue for young players, precipitating the decision

to remove the hall in 2019.

The original intention was to save the church but a builder's inspection confirmed it would require considerable capital investment to make it safe for

Following consultation with the local community and discussion with original church families, it was decided the best way forward was to demolish the church building so the area could be safely used by the Sandilands Junior Tennis Club.

The buildings' foundation stones have

been retained and a structure will be built in recognition of the historical site.

This structure will also honour the area's pioneers and their commitment to faith and community service.

Tennis has been played at Sandilands for more than 75 years, and the Sandilands Junior Tennis Club continues to train and host other clubs at the courts — this will continue into the future thanks to the commitment of the Sandilands community.





Childhood glaucoma and quality of life

Flinders University, Adelaide, researchers have published the world's first study documenting the lived experience of childhood glaucoma in adults.

They hope the study will lead to better support systems and give a voice to those living with the

Study lead, orthoptist and PhD candidate Lachlan Knight said childhood glaucoma, diagnosed before age 18, was rare.

Over the past 18 months, the researchers have interviewed nearly 50 adults with childhood glaucoma, asking them how the condition had affected their lives.

Knight said it was common for research participants to feel isolated; misunderstood by their friends, family, or workplace; worried and

Participants tended to form strong bonds with their ophthalmologists and often relied on family and friends for emotional and social support.

They were also protective of their eye health because they did not want their vision to change.

"Childhood glaucoma can impact someone's decision-making when planning to have a family ... adults often sought genetic testing to understand their risk of passing on their glaucoma to their child," Knight, who is also researching the genetics of childhood glaucoma,

From the interviews, the researchers have developed a questionnaire to quantitatively measure the disease's impact, and want as many adults with childhood glaucoma as possible to

The questionnaire takes 10 to 20 minutes and is accessible to people with vision impairment or blindness.



Moonta Bowling Club highlights

November 17, 1921: A meeting was held at the residence of Dr AR Clayton to consider the idea of forming a bowling club. Dr Clayton was elected president and Mr A D Moffat elected secretary.

December 1, 1921: The Moonta Memorial Park Bowling Club was formed with 43 members who paid one guinea (equivalent to \$86 today) entrance and two guineas (\$172) subscription.

February 23, 1923: Bowls was first played. A clubhouse, measuring 7.2m x 4.8m, was built. The club took out a £300 (\$25,462) overdraft. A croquet club was formed for the wives and relatives of bowlers, as long as they were financial at the time.

1926: 68 members at the annual general meeting. New greenkeeper employed for £4

1928: 78 members and the club was affiliated with South Australian Bowling Association. Members decided to enter the country carnival over Easter. One team was selected to represent the club but other teams could enter.

1933: The first Christmas carnival had bowlers playing singles, pairs and fours. Entry was 2/6d (\$13) and prizes were two guineas (\$218) for winner of singles and one guinea for the runnerup. Four guineas and one guinea for the pairs, and eight guineas and three guineas for the fours. Profit was £8/12/6d (\$887).

November 17, 1950: Interested women met in the Unity Hall and the Moonta Women's Bowling Club was formed with 20 members. It was not an easy time as women would join as

associate members and be subject to the rules set down by the men's committee.

1952: A third green of five rinks was added to

1961: Dr AR Clayton granted life membership. 1968: A decision was made to demolish existing clubrooms and build a new complex. The new building cost \$12,000.

1987: In July, the two clubs amalgamated under one administrative committee with separate committees to function for the working of both the men's and women's clubs. In the winter, further renovations were carried out. The toilet block was demolished and the croquet room became the kitchen. Doors were installed in the end wall and a storeroom, new croquet room, toilet for disabled persons, a cleaning room, a new men's toilet and a spacious women's toilet with three toilets, three hand basins and a rest area. Cost was \$51,000 and the club took out a bank loan of \$22,000.

2010: Significant renovations again carried

August 2011: The club hosted an international test series between Australia and South Africa with a worldwide audience.

2015 and 2016: The club hosted two Australian over 60s championships.

Current: The club has 145 members with 11 sides playing pennants each week. Three members have represented SA over the years including Martin Beaglehole, Ian Hatcher OAM and Jay Phillips.



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



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Off-grid retreat goes to market for \$10m

A LUXURY off-grid retreat near Cape Elizabeth, south of Moonta, has hit the market for about \$10 million.

Known as The Dunes, the estate is nestled in sand dunes and is up for sale for the first time since it was built seven years ago.

The 273-acre property was built collaboratively between owner Peter Michell and signature architect Max Pritchard at 400 Coopers Beach Road, Nalyappa.

Upon completion, the home was commended in the Australian Institute Architecture awards for its unique location, stunning natural landscape and resort-style

It has been designed for fully off-the-grid living, with an 80-kilowatt solar power plant funnelled into lithium batteries, 300,000 litres of water storage other temperature-regulating features, an aquaponics geodome for vegetables and herbs,

and a 45,000-litre fish tank resort-style estate without peers stocked with more than 60 silver perch.

Storage features include a large equipment shed, four-car garage and parking next to a usable helipad.

The home comprises six bedrooms, five bathrooms, spacious lounge areas, a theatre, chef's kitchen with two butler's pantries, sun deck, and an outdoor alfresco terrace with a fireplace, spa, pool and sauna.

For recreation, the property boasts a dune buggy racetrack and access to boardwalks through the sand dunes.

Looking for an owner

The property is being taken to the market via a private treaty campaign run by Deborah Cullen of Cullen Royle and Grant Giordano of Giordano and Partners.

Ms Cullen said the property was expected to generate significant buyer interest.

"The Dunes is a one-off

- there is nothing that compares," she said.

"Both domestic and international buyers will be attracted to this offering, particularly with the current focus on renewables.


"It was created for family and friends to gather or escape from city life, and we are finding buyers are looking for just that.

"They want a home in lieu of travelling overseas and as an escape from dense cities, particularly now with the ability to work from anywhere."

Mr Giordano said the centrepiece of the property was its breathtaking location.

"The home showcases unparalleled panoramic views from almost every room, as well as its outdoor viewing platform," he said.

"This estate is being showcased to the public for this first time, as it has been fiercely protected as a private family compound until now."











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Unified approach improves herbicide resistance data

ORGANISATIONS across Australia tasked with surveying weeds for herbicide resistance have adopted the same protocols and methods for the first time.

Herbicide resistance surveys have been completed across the Australian grain cropping region for a number of years.

Initial surveys in the early 1990s in South Australia, Western Australia, New South Wales and Victoria assessed the extent of resistance in annual ryegrass, but most of the nation's cropping region had not been surveyed at least once until 2016.

The latest survey, supported by GRDC investment, has gone to a new level by standardising much of the sampling, testing and reporting methodology.

Individual weed species are even being screened for resistance at a single location, and not across locations as previously done.

The current survey - led by Charles Sturt University with University partners Adelaide. University Western Australia, University of Sydney and Queensland Department of Agriculture and Fisheries - conducted the sampling across the entire cropping region in 2020, except for central Oueensland where harvest had already been completed.

Project leader and Charles Sturt University senior technical officer Dr John Broster said random surveys across the cropping regions provided critical information about weed species, their abundance and their resistance status to key herbicides.

"This informs future research needs as well as enables immediate extension messages to be better targeted for each region," Dr Broster

"Annual ryegrass, wild oats, brome grass, barley grass, Indian hedge mustard, sow thistle, wild radish, doublegee (three corner jack) and capeweed were the winter growing weeds collected.

"Feathertop Rhodes grass, awnless barnyard grass, sweet summer grass were collected during the summer survey, and winter and summer growing sow thistle and fleabane were targeted across both surveys."

Dr Peter Boutsalis and researchers from the University of Adelaide recently completed testing all the annual ryegrass from across Australia for resistance to pre-emergent herbi-

"Having all ryegrass samples

from across the country at the one location for the first time was a really powerful opportunity," Dr Boutsalis said.

While overall resistance to pre-emergent herbicides is still fairly low, there are still plenty of individual populations where problems exist."

Resistance to the newer preemergent herbicides remains very low at a national level.

Dr Boutsalis said identifying and keeping herbicideresistant weeds at manageable levels was essential for the long-term viability of herbicides in Australian cropping

This harvest is an opportune time for grain growers to collect weed seeds for their own herbicide resistance testing.

Collection of samples of weed seeds (for testing levels of resistance) can occur during and even after harvest or cutting crops for fodder.

Weed seeds collected at harvest time can be sent for testing over summer and reporting in early autumn.





For reasons of public safety, there is a permanent exclusion zone covering land, sea and air around the Port Wakefield Establishment. Specific details on the Port Wakefield Prohibited Area can be obtained from Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No GN 26, 4 July 1990, and is shown on the diagram below. Trespassing in this Area is strictly prohibited and very dangerous due to the presence of unexploded bombs. Port Broughton: Blue swimmer crabs, King George whiting, snook and squid were the main catches for boat crews. Jetty anglers enjoyed blueys, yellowfin whiting and squid.

Wallaroo: Jetty fishing has been hit and miss with blueys and tommy ruff (Australian herring) here one day and not the next. Boat crews fished for whiting from the Ballast and Boiler grounds and gar/squid at Point

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Strong onshore winds were the order of most days last week, as north-westerlies ran to southeasterly and kept the white-caps working hard. Off-shore drops have gar, whiting, squid and blue crabs. The jetties have squid, blueys and the odd garfish.

Point Turton: Try the Banks and the bay for KG whiting and small flathead as dawn. Gar are off the Minlacowie shearing sheds

and Point Souttar and The Pines. The jetty has been quiet.

Marion and Stenhouse Bays: I spent much of last week on this part of the great YP coast and all it did was blow from the south! Flathead, snook and red nannygai are waiting off-shore while the jetties hold squid, tommies and flathead at Marion Bay.

Edithburgh/Stansbury: KG whiting catches are steady from just north of Tapley Shoals and south of Marion Reef. Big snook are starting to appear around the island, chasing schools of sprat tommies and garfish. Jetty fishing has a mix of ruff, squid and blue crabs, also at Port Giles when open. Klein Point jetty remains closed.

Black Point/Ardrossan: The YP Council website still has the Black Point boat ramp due to open late October 2021. Garfish and a few blueys are the main reports for here, Port Julia and Ardrossan. Squid are patchy, but should improve as the weather starts to clear. Ardrossan jetty has a few small squid
