Ship's wild return

DESPITE some wild weather, about 80 tourists were tendered from the expedition ship Coral Adventurer, moored in Stenhouse Bay, across to Dhilba-Guuranda Innes National Park on the weekend.

This was the first of three ships from Coral Expeditions that will stop off the coast of the park throughout November.

Coral Expeditions chief officer Jeff Gillies said this was the second time the company had included Yorke Peninsula on its itinerary, because it was a lovely place to conduct excursions for passengers.

"Expedition leaders will look to show the shipwrecks and talk about the history of the coastline," Mr Gillies said.

"It is a privilege to share the natural beauty and warm hospitality of Yorke Peninsula, and we look forward to welcoming more visitors in the future."

YP regional tourism manager Jess Greatwich said the return of the cruise ship was a step in the right direction.

"Dhilba-Guuranda Innes National Park, we often talk about it being one of the jewels in the crown for the Yorke Peninsula," Ms Greatwich said.

"It really highlights the Marna Banggara project as well, which is the only one of its kind in the country."

Marna Banggara is an ambitious project that aims to restore southern YP's spectacular landscape by returning locally extinct species and reinvigorating the ecological processes that ensure the bushland's health. Ms Greatwich said she hoped the cruise gave greater exposure for what the YP had to offer, but there were many other hidden gems in our region to discover.

"We will also be on the lookout for wildlife in the national park such as emus and tammar wallabies along with marine species like dolphins, seals and whales."

As for the future, Mr Gillies said the company's sailing schedule visits the region roughly four times a year.

Yorke Peninsula Council mayor Darren Braund said he was thrilled to have the passengers stop by and take the opportunity to explore Dhilba-Guuranda Innes National Park.

"This stop on Coral Expeditions" itinerary is a testament to the dedication of Yorke Peninsula Tourism, whose efforts have brought cruise

She said the obvious choice was Wallaroo with its high-quality port and diverse area to provide passengers with a range of experiences.

"Port Vincent is also recognised as a place where offshore mooring with guests being brought in by a tender vessel is possible," she said.

"For smaller expedition vessels, that's a fantastic opportunity in the future as well."

Farmers in crisis

SOUTH Australian farmers are facing a mental health crisis that cannot be ignored.

This issue isn't just about long hours in the paddock; it's about the isolation, relentless pressures, and the lack of accessible mental health support for those who keep our economy thriving.

Farmer suicide rates are double those of other workers, yet farmers are far less likely to seek help.

Why? Because of a deep-seated stigma and the independent spirit that runs through rural life.

Our farmers are not just enduring "one bad season", as some out-of-touch remarks suggest. They are dealing with rising costs — fuel, feed,

insurance unique to farming — which make every drought or failed crop a potential disaster. The public's misconceptions are far removed

from the reality of farming life, and our policymakers need to understand the severity of these struggles.

Recent stressors, including a live sheep export ban and severe frost in the vineyards, further compound the daily challenges faced by our rural communities.

Efforts by groups like Beyond Blue, R U OK?, and ifarmwell to support our farmers are vital, but this is not enough.

We need government policies that genuinely address the unique needs of our farmers.

They aren't asking for special treatment, just a fair go.

I will be advocating for our State Parliament to take this issue seriously and hope to see an inquiry begun soon.

Farmers are the backbone of our economy. If we truly value them, we must act now to support their mental wellbeing.

For some, tomorrow may be too late.

Cost of living – a constant challenge

AS A 21-year-old, when I want to tune into the "real world", the current cost-ofliving crisis is usually front of people's minds — and, to be honest, it's discouraging.

Never has it been more expensive to buy or rent a house in Australia.

My weekly shopping bill just for one person is consistently north of \$150.

The price of fuel, although cheaper on average than last year, is regularly reaching record highs.

Then there's my university HECS debt. After three years at uni, it was around \$40,000, and now interest is only pushing it higher.

If you aren't in a high-paying job, you must forfeit some of life's essentials.

Conversely, while most of us are cutting back, pokies players on Yorke Peninsula lost more than \$22 million throughout the 2023-24 financial year about 10 per cent increase on the year before.

South Australian farmers are also facing a year of tough conditions, bracing for one of the lowest-yielding seasons on record.

And I can hear sceptics thinking as they read this, "just another young person complaining" but it's not just me.

According to realestate.com, 59 per cent of young Australians aged 18 to 24 feel it's unlikely they'll ever afford a home.

Ignoring these concerns won't change the reality of how challenging this costof-living crisis has become.

'Country kids can do anything' says Sara

TWO former Port Broughton residents are set to host a prestigious national radio show.

The first is award-winning journalist Sally Sara, who will replace Patricia Karvelas as the host of ABC's Radio National Breakfast next year.

She will be joined by producer Joe Sullivan, also formerly of Port Broughton, who will work on the show from behind the scenes.

Despite their mutual hometown, Ms Sara said she and Mr Sullivan only met through the ABC.

"We sometimes send messages backwards and forwards about how Broughton-Mundoora is going in the footy," Ms Sara said.

Ms Sara grew up in Port Broughton, where her parents owned a local shop, and attended Kadina Memorial High School until year 10.

At age 8 she was the first girl to play for Port Broughton Football Club, and she has continued to break boundaries.

Ms Sara was the first woman to hold the roles of Africa correspondent and South Asia correspondent at the ABC.

"It's important to keep encouraging girls to follow the path that they've got their heart set on, not to be put off by those barriers or being the first," Ms Sara told the YP Country Times.

"And we see among the foreign correspondents with the ABC that a significant number of them are either country kids and/or regional journos.

"So, I think that country upbringing is pretty good for resilience and risk taking and knowing how to talk to people and being very curious."

Ms Sara said country kids could do anything, and she hoped her career inspired young people growing up on Yorke Peninsula to pursue their aspirations.

"I'm often looking at the YP Country Times, seeing kids that are doing amazing things in all sorts of areas, and how proud I feel to see them chasing their dreams and taking on the risk of disappointment and failure and all of that as well."

In her new role, Ms Sara said she would

aim to bring regional stories to her audience. "While I've worked as a foreign correspondent, a fair slice of my career has also been working as a rural and regional journalist and working for Landline as well," she said.

"It's really important that we connect and reconnect with those communities to make sure that we are covering the stories that they're interested in."

Ms Sara will present RN Breakfast from 5.30am to 9am each weekday, from January 20.

NARUNGGA MP Fraser Ellis has successfully had his sentencing postponed as he awaits the outcome of his Supreme Court appeal.

Mr Ellis was found guilty of four counts of deception in July, related to claims made under the Country Members Accommodation Allowance between April 2018 and June 2020.

Although initially charged with 23 counts of deception, he was acquitted of 19.

Following the verdict, Mr Ellis appealed the convictions, while the Director of Public Prosecutions lodged a separate appeal challenging the acquittals.

Mr Ellis appeared before Magistrate Simon Smart in the Adelaide Magistrates Court, where sentencing submissions were due to be heard, last Thursday, October 31.

However, Magistrate Smart adjourned the matter to May 21, allowing time for the Supreme Court appeals to conclude.

Both appeals are scheduled to be heard on April 14.

This delay will leave the final outcome of Mr Ellis's case pending until both the defence and prosecution appeals are resolved.

Outside the Adelaide Magistrates Court last week, Mr Ellis described the sentencing delay as a "sensible decision" that would prevent any premature outcomes.

"It'll be nice to have Christmas in peace and with family," he said.

"I look forward to coming back next year, having my appeal heard, and hopefully succeeding."

"The appeal process will take its course, and I am confident we will put a good argument forward," he said.

Funding for coastal councils

SOUTH Australia's 34 coastal councils are being invited to submit local projects focused on coastal hazard adaptation for a share of \$1.3 million in funding.

This funding, part of the Coastal Hazard Adaptation Grants, supports initiatives under the SA Climate Ready Coasts program, which aims to accelerate planning for coastal hazards and improve coastal management practices across the state.

The Local Government Association of South Australia has opened an expressions of interest round, providing councils with an opportunity to outline their initial project ideas.

This approach encourages councils to share earlystage planning, which could then be developed further with the support of the grant.

Projects funded through this initiative are expected to strengthen local councils' ability to address challenges such as sea level rise, coastal erosion, and storm surges.

AN INTERIM chief executive to the Top of the Yorke. has been appointed by Barunga West Council while Maree Wauchope takes extended leave for health reasons.

Paul Simpson, the departing chief executive of the District Council of Orroroo Carrieton, has been appointed to the interim role, which he will take up in mid-January.

BWC manager of assets and infrastructure Steve Davey will continue to serve as acting chief executive until then.

A BWC spokesperson said Mr Simpson had led Orroroo Carrieton since 2022 and was previously director of works infrastructure for and Kangaroo Island Council.

"Mr Simpson brings more than 20 years of management experience from a variety of roles across local and state government and not-for-profit organisations," the spokesperson said.

BWC mayor Leonie Kerley said the council and community looked forward to welcoming Mr Simpson and his family

"Mr Simpson is a proven leader who brings a deep understanding of what it means to work in regional local government and the challenges we face," Mayor Kerley said.

"In addition to his knowledge of local government, Paul's decades of experience in the management of projects, operations and asset management will be invaluable as council looks to continue making Barunga West an attractive place to live, work and relax."

Mr Simpson said he was looking forward to life on upper Yorke Peninsula and drawing on his farming life background, having grown up in South Australia's Mallee region.

"I look forward to this new opportunity to support Barunga West's progressive developments and engage with the local community," Mr Simpson said.

"I also look forward to moving my young family into the region and getting to know the team at BWC."

Lambie and Patrick stopover in Kadina

POLITICIANS Jacqui Lambie and Rex Patrick visited Kadina last week as part of a regional South Australian road trip ahead of next year's federal election.

Mr Patrick, who was previously a senator with the Centre Alliance and as an independent, is running for a Senate seat for SA as part of Tasmanian Senator Jacqui Lambie's party The Lambie Network.

"At the moment, we don't have (an independent in the Senate from SA), which means you've got a whole bunch of people that are generally constrained by their party lines," Mr Patrick said.

"They're not really allowed to necessarily come out and talk about particular issues."

During the pair's time in Kadina on Monday, October 28, they held a meetand-greet at Kadina Cinema, and walked the streets of Wallaroo.

Mr Patrick said people they spoke to were concerned about the cost of living and energy prices for small businesses, as well as the shortage of grain due to this year's weather.

"The price of grain usually goes up (when there's a short supply), that's not happening, and that's a real worry," he said.

Ms Lambie said they would look at relief options for this, and that it was important to listen to rural people's opinions about agriculture, irrigation, manufacturing and food security.

"It really places a strain on the farmers, but then that actually flows through pretty much everywhere,

throughout the community, because there's less money around, there's a lot of pressure," she said.

"(Regional) people have a voice, and they deserve to be heard," Ms Lambie said

Ms Lambie and Mr Patrick visited during Gambling Harm Action Week (October 27 to November 2).

Both politicians have expressed strong views about gambling legislation, and Ms Lambie said she was disappointed it was not on the government's agenda.

"We had Peta Murphy's inquiry more than a year ago, and the government simply hasn't acted upon it," she said.

"The government could do us all a favour and ban gambling donations and advertising."

More public housing for YP

THERE are 10 public housing properties under construction across the Copper Coast.

The homes are being built as part of the State Government's \$232.7 million Public Housing Improvement Program.

Overall, 65 new public homes have been recently completed across the state, and 91 new homes are under construction, with a further 16 being contracted and set to start in the coming weeks.

All 10 Copper Coast homes are being built by Constructwell, a boutique design and building company based in Adelaide, and will comply with the Livable Housing Australia Silver Standard.

These homes comprise three two-bedroom homes in Moonta, three two-bedroom homes in Wallaroo and four two-bedroom homes in Kadina, and all will be completed by August 2025.

A spokesperson for the SA Housing Trust said adhering to the Silver Standard meant the new homes would ensure future flexibility and ease of adaptability.

The seven core Silver Standard design elements include components such as a safe, continuous and stepfree path of travel from the street and parking area to a dwelling entrance that is level, and a toilet on the ground level that provides easy access.

They also include factors such as reinforced walls around the toilet, shower and bath to support the safe installation of grab-rails later, and that stairways are designed to reduce the likelihood of injury.

Travel show heads to YP

ADVENTURE All Stars Legends 3, a socially conscious television travel show, will be heading to Yorke Peninsula from November 10 to 15 to film its cast of 12 members while they experience the best of YP.

Each Legends episode brings together cast members at different locations, where the audience sees them having a "trip of a lifetime".

Executive producer of Adventure All Stars, Troy Gray, said they have created television history by raising millions of dollars to support a record number of charities.

Inquiry on impact of alcohol, drugs

THE House of Representatives Standing Committee on Health, Aged Care and Sport has held a series of public hearings as part of its inquiry into the health impacts of alcohol and other drugs in Australia.

Referred by Minister for Health and Aged Care, the Honourable Mark Butler MP, the inquiry aims to investigate key issues affecting Australians' health and the healthcare system.

The hearings brought together a diverse array of experts, including representatives from peak bodies in alcohol and drug treatment,

researchers, clinicians and other service providers.

Committee chair Dr Mike Freelander MP said the inquiry had attracted substantial public interest, with numerous written submissions outlining significant challenges within the sector.

"The committee has received a large number of submissions that highlight pressing issues such as the stigma surrounding substance abuse, which prevents early intervention, the correlation between substance use and domestic violence, and the need for better service integration," Dr Freelander said.

The inquiry's findings will aim to inform recommendations to strengthen the coordination between the health sector and other relevant sectors.

The committee's objective is to develop innovative, equitable policy solutions to tackle the health impacts of alcohol and other drugs more effectively.

Submissions would continue to be accepted until Tuesday, December 31, to ensure individuals and organisations could continue to contribute to the conversation on improving Australia's approach to alcohol and other drug-related health issues, Dr Freelander said.

Register now accessible to public

LAWS enabling South Australians to access certain information held on the child sex offenders register have passed State Parliament.

SAPOL maintains a database of registrable offenders, which includes child sex offenders, as well as those offenders convicted of certain other serious offences against children.

Under the new laws, the public will be able to seek information about serious child sex offenders living in their area. It will also enable parents to

check whether individuals who have unsupervised access to their children are registrable offenders, and what offences led to their inclusion on the register.

The disclosure scheme will also enable the Commissioner of Police to publish any or all personal details, including a photograph of the registrable offender if their whereabouts is unknown and they have failed to comply with reporting or provided misleading information.

They will also be able to publish photographs of dangerous and high-risk offenders living in the same suburb or town as some one who applies for information about an offender who has unsupervised contact with a child in response to an application from the child's parent or guardian.

The disclosure scheme will be implemented as part of the Digital Police Station initiative, funded in the 2024-25 State Budget.

eSafety move to protect young

AUSTRALIAN youth using Apple products will now have the ability to report unwanted nude images directly to Apple.

The roll-out will begin by targeting young people, but Australian adults will also be able to opt-in to the feature.

This comes after eSafety Commissioner Julie Inman Grant first highlighted the safety measure as missing from Apple's platform in a December 2022 report.

Ms Grant said this step was important because users could be reported and banned for offences, such as sexual extortion and grooming.

"It can only take one report to ensure an offender is banned, and significant ongoing and future harm to multiple children prevented," Ms Grant said.

"Where appropriate, these user reports can also be referred to law enforcement, providing them with vital information to apprehend the offenders perpetrating these crimes.

"While we welcome this new feature, we continue to call for Apple to broaden its approach, including by introducing measures that help further protect children and all users from the full range of online harms, including terrorist content, technology-facilitated abuse and re-traumatisation through the hosting and sharing of child sexual exploitation material.

"Other services without these key safety features must follow wsuit."

New laws on artificial intelligence

NEW laws aimed at outlawing the use of artificial intelligence to create violent and sexually explicit deepfake images, audio or videos were introduced to

purporting to be of real people, would be outlawed and offenders could face up to four years in prison, or fines of up to \$20,000. Authorities estimate as much

has stated explicit deepfakes have increased on the internet as much as 550 per cent year on year since 2019.

Upgrades just in time for summer

UPGRADES to the Moonta Bay barbecue shelter and the old VACSWIM building are now complete, just in time for the warmer weather.

Upgrades include an additional double barbecue and park bench seat arrangement for families, beachgoers and the wider community to enjoy, as well as new concrete flooring.

The old VACSWIM building has also had a makeover, with new eaves, roof frame and roof, ceiling, door and door frame, and a fresh paint inside and out — but leaving the painted murals on the external walls.

This included the removal of asbestos eaves and ceiling.

The completed work on both structures cost \$120,000, encompassing the removal of the old shelter, along with new concrete flooring and footings.

The level of the shelter's floor has been dropped to match existing paths, and spoon drains have been utilised to help with access to the new shelter, incorporating a grated sump for stormwater catchment to replace the old side entry pit.

A new garden bed is also in place. Moonta Progress Association president Kym Roberts said it was a nice, new area, ready for the summer holidays.

^{'*}When you think back to what it used to be, you would probably never (realise) what used to be here," Mr Roberts said.

Copper Coast Council's infrastructure services director Tim Neumann said he was excited to see the two structures get plenty of use as summer, and the beach season, ramped up.

"The old shelter was structurally unsound and subsequently becoming subject to regular unplanned maintenance works," Mr Neumann said. "The structure had different floor heights to the surrounding paths and kerbing, so council decided it was timely to act, with works commencing in July.

"An update to the electrical cabinet was also required — this was to allow for the installation of new lighting, a new electric double barbecue, and a charging point for mobility scooters."

Mr Neumann said the old First Aid/VACSWIM room held significant historical value for the local community as it had been used for many purposes over its lifetime.

"We believe it was even a fish and chip shop at one point."

Investment into RFDS

THE State Government has invested more than half a billion dollars in a historic new agreement with the Royal Flying Doctor Service SA/NT.

This investment will significantly boost aircraft services and staff, enabling faster patient transfers.

The 10-year contract with the RFDS is worth \$509.4 million and will boost operational capacity at Adelaide Airport, increasing RFDS operations to four aircraft during the day and three overnight.

The available fleet will also feature, for the first time, a dedicated emergency response aircraft.

Stillbirths inquiry in SA

THE extent and impact of stillbirth in South Australia will be the focus of a significant new inquiry, which is aimed at reducing loss and better supporting women and their families.

Member for Newland Olivia Savvas has successfully moved a motion to establish a parliamentary inquiry to examine the prevalence, causes and effects of stillbirth and how to enhance supports.

More than seven in 1000 births in SA are stillbirths, leaving families asking why.

The parliamentary inquiry will assist already-existing work done by medical experts from the Women's and Children's Hospital, as well as community support grounds.



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Fee-free TAFE here to stay

FEE-FREE TAFE will become an enduring feature of the national vocational education and training system, funding 100,000 places a year from 2027.

Since its start in 2023, Fee-Free TAFE has had more than 500,000 enrolments in priority-area courses, including care, technology, construction, and early childhood education, according to the Federal Government.

Six in 10 places have been taken up by women, and one in three by regional and remote Australians.

Digital divide grants

THE current Grants SA Digital Inclusion Round will provide eligible organisations with funding of up to \$20,000 for projects that address barriers to digital inclusion.

Funding focus areas include organisations seeking to acquire equipment for community or public use, improve accessibility to existing platforms, or deliver skills training.

Grant applications are open until 3pm on November 19. For more information and to apply, visit dhs.sa.gov.au/howwehelp/ grants.

Year 12 exams begin

SOUTH Australia's official year 12 exams have begun, with more than 12,500 students working towards their SA Certificate of Education.

General Mathematics and Mathematical Methods exams kicked off the main examination period yesterday (Monday, November 4), which will run until Friday, November 15 and consist of 31 exams.

Language exams began last month, bringing the total of exams to 71, Education Minister Blair Boyer said.

"I have high expectations and want our students to do well, but appreciate that exams can be a stressful time," he said.

"It's important to remember that working hard and trying your best is the only thing we can ask of our young people during these final few weeks of year 12.

"As they get ready to embark on their next chapter — whatever that might be — I wish all our students every success for their future."

SACE Board chief executive Michaela Bensley congratulated students on their hard work.

"The SACE team has worked closely with schools throughout the year to ensure a successful and positive examination experience," she said.

"We look forward to recognising and celebrating their efforts."

Students will receive their SACE results (including Australian Tertiary Admission Rankings) on December 16, and the first round of university offers will be made on January 10.

Culture returning health to Country

AFTER about a 200-year hiatus, the Narungga Nation cultural burning practices have returned to Guuranda (Yorke Peninsula) to help bring back balance to a landscape traditionally shaped by fire.

Throughout the year, a series of workshops have brought the burning practice back to Country at Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park, Ardrossan grasslands and Minlagawi nature reserve.

This year's biggest burn covered 0.7 hectares.

The fires helped reduce invasive species and boosted native plants, bringing to life dormant seeds in the soil.

Nharangga cultural burns practitioner Peter Turner said every First Nation had a fire practitioner, and their practice was only stopped because of the restrictions that colonisation enforced on Aboriginal people.

"They removed the people off the land, and they stopped the practice of fire," Mr Turner said.

"And now we've got that much fuel load out there in this Country.

The project is supported by the Australian Government's Preparing Australian Communities grant, and is a part of the Marna Banggara project, which aims to restore Guuranda's landscape.

First Nations people developed the

science of cultural burning over tens of thousands of years, which ingrained fire management deeply into the hundreds of different cultures across this country. Mr Turner said an important part of

cultural burning was using the right type of fire for the right type of Country. "Our plants have evolved with fire, to

accept the fire and work with it," he said. "The animals will remember, Country will remember, the plants will

remember fire because it all evolved with fire."

The fire trickles through the landscape and leaves a mosaic pattern, which reduces the fuel load, but allows the habitat to remain intact.

The grant-funded burns have now concluded; however, Yorke Peninsula Council intends to continue the burns as a part of operational landscape management.

Footage captured during the workshops has been turned into a short film with participants from Narungga Nation Aboriginal Corporation, Point Pearce Aboriginal Corporation/Indigenous Protected Areas Rangers, Nharangga Aboriginal Progress Association, Nharangga Aboriginal Cultural Tours, Northern and Yorke Landscape Board, Firesticks, and Narungga community members contributing.

Tackling gambling harm

THE South Australian Government has introduced the Take A Break initiative to help prevent gambling harm, launching a 30-day trial as part of Gambling Harm Action Week (October 27 to November 2).

This trial allows people to scan QR codes in pubs and clubs, directing them to a form where they can self-exclude from gambling easily and discreetly.

Minister for Human Services, Nat Cook, said Take A Break was designed for those who may feel hesitant to discuss their gambling issues but recognised a need for support.

"Stigma and shame often

prevent people from seeking help," Ms Cook said. 'This initiative provides a dis-

creet way for South Australians to pause gambling, enabling time to rebuild relationships or engage in positive activities."

Uniting Country SA's Vicki Jacobs welcomed the initiative, expressing hope that it would expand to most clubs and pubs across SA to aid more people facing gambling harm.

She also advocated for tighter regulations on sports betting, noting that younger men (aged 18-25) were particularly vulnerable to gamblingrelated harm. "The prevalence of gambling ads, especially in sports, is concerning," Ms Jacobs said.

To coincide with Melbourne

Cup Day on November 5, Ms Jacobs emphasised the importance of responsible gambling practices, community support, and compassionate language, noting that 2024's Gambling Harm Action Week theme, Let's Change the Conversation, encourages respectful dialogue around gambling.

Reflecting this shift, the government has rebranded the Office for Problem Gambling to Gambling Harm Support SA

Ms Jacobs also highlighted the broader impact of gambling on families and communities, stressing that acknowledging these wider consequences could motivate people to seek help not only for themselves but also for their loved ones.

POKIE players on Yorke Peninsula lost more than \$22 million during the 2023-24 financial year, according to State Government statistics. People in the Barunga West and Copper Coast council areas combined lost \$15.4 million, and those in the Yorke Peninsula Council area lost \$6.7 million.

Both statistics are up almost 10 per cent from the previous financial year.

Around 10,000 South Australians engage in high-risk gambling and have experienced significant adverse consequences from it, according to a 2023 State Government report.

"For every person involved in high-risk gambling, at least six other people may also be affected," the report read.

"This means the number of South Australians affected by someone's high-risk gambling could fill Adelaide Oval."

Art to remember An anthem for Yorke Peninsula

YORKE Peninsula is about to get its very own regional anthem - made for the community, by the community.

A Day at the 'Burgh, on Saturday, November 16, will be host to a range of musicians and craftspeople from around YP, but this year that local talent will extend all the way to the crowd.

The annual Edithburgh event kicks off at 9.30am and goes throughout the day, culminating with a cabaret at the Institute in the evening (see separate story this issue for information).

Country Arts SA and Yorke Peninsula Council cultural facilitator Molly Flanagan said her team of musicians was excited to get creative with the local community and write an anthem for YP.

"There is a song to come out of every group of people who get together," Ms Flanagan said.

"There's a bit of fun with the unknown because we don't know exactly what this song will sound like."

To help manage and create the new song, Ms Flanagan has brought in local musicians, Liam Smith and Sarah Johnson, who participated in the highly successful Lullaby Project last year.

'This time we're looking to take the project further into the community and use it with different aspects of the community and different parts of the population," she said.

"They won't be writing a lullaby necessarily - it might be more like a Yorkes anthem."

Ms Flanagan encourages everyone to get involved, even if they are not musically inclined, because a song needs more than just instruments and singers to be created.



"I think that Yorkes has just so many creative people, but what can happen is they end up not even being aware of each other or the ways their skills are really valuable and inspiring to the local community," she said.

Ms Flanagan said it was important to bring these opportunities into regional and rural communities because it not only upskilled local people, but allowed their skills to be spread further into the community.

Before the Lullaby Project began, none of the Lullaby project musicians - Caleb Raymond, Meggie Moon, Liam Smith or Sarah Johnson - knew each other existed, despite living only a few towns away from each other.

"Now they work together and perform at weddings and venues, so I think it has connected artists and found ways for them to bring those skills into the community, and keep them here," she said.

"Sarah, Caleb and Darren (Braund) are the band Sea and Salt, and are going to be performing at Day at the 'Burgh.

"Projects like this benefit local musicians because it not only connects them together, it also gives them more viability to actually work in the country."

Those who want to participate in the Yorkes anthem do not need to bring anything with them, but Ms Flanagan said it could be helpful to come with some ideas around what they love about YP.

"No musical experience necessary, we always encourage singing or you can just hum along," she said.

NOT many people could say they've managed to maintain a friendship for more than 60 years, but Geoff Ellis and Roger Spray can.

"Even a fortnight ago he was at our house, and that's the second or third time in past 12 months that he's been here," Mr Spry said.

WAKEFIELD Regional Council is seeking community consultation to improve its bridges and stormwater management.

The improvements will be part of the WRC Infrastructure Asset Management Plan to progressively renew assets in poor condition.

Balaklava, Blyth, Snowtown, Port Wakefield, Hamley Bridge and Brinkworth were all identified as towns with assets requiring investigation, design and construction, a WRC spokesperson said.

"The draft plan builds on the work undertaken since the last plan, to continue to develop the stormwater system to meet service levels and to renew assets in poor condition," they said.

There are plans to implement levees at Port Wakefield, Balaklava and Bowmans, for protectection against flooding from the Wakefield River.

WRC also plans to

improve stormwater drainage in Balaklava, where flooding is exacerbated during "minor storm" events.

Mayor Rodney Reid said, while council was conscious of its budget, community consultation would help it to prioritise works to focus on.

"Council hopes to receive feedback on components of the plan that might impact our community," Mr Reid said.

"We want to ensure we continue to deliver the community's vision for Wakefield and the maintenance of our assets on behalf of our community.

"These plans provide guidance for council on the future maintenance, renewal and upgrade requirements and the funding required.

"We want to ensure properties are protected and our assets are safe for our communities, which is why several of the future stormwater projects proposed relate to reducing the risk of flooding. "Some of council's bridges

are ageing and are not able to be accessed by heavy vehicles and wide farm equipment. "The challenge is whether to renew these bridges or provide alternative routes."

WRC has oversight of 11 vehicular and pedestrian bridges, 22,538 rural and township drains, one footbridge and more than 1800 nodes (side entry pits, junction boxes, headwalls and vertical walls).

Mr Reid said, while WRC spent on average \$237,848 per year on rural and township stormwater renewal, where possible it would combine projects to reduce costs.

"We (aim to) align stormwater works with other projects, such as road, kerb and water table renewal.

"This provides cost efficiencies and reduces the likelihood of having to go back and dig up roads or footpaths to install stormwater infrastructure in the future.

"Actual spend on stormwater assets per year will depend on the scope and scale of the projects to be completed each year."

Community consultation closes November 19.



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Lost at sea without volunteers

OUR marine rescue volunteers have once again shown how important they are to our community after another successful Search and Rescue event at Edithburgh over the weekend.

This year it was Edithburgh's turn to host the annual Yorke Peninsula search and rescue exercise, when crews from Edithburgh, Copper Coast, Port Victoria, Point Turton, Port Vincent and Kangaroo Island came together to train for an emergency rescue situation.

Volunteer Marine Rescue manager Darryl Wright said it was a great turnout for a Saturday morning.

He thanked the volunteers who gave up their time to protect their community.

For this year's exercise, crews spent about three hours at sea and were tasked to find a 40 kilogram humanshaped target which had been deployed by South Australia Police.

"We run it like it is a real emergency, and they really don't know what's going to happen," Mr Wright said.

"We continually feed information into the scenario, so it mirrors what would happen in a real-life situation."

Once the target was found, crews were advised by communications the missing "person" was still alive, and was now suffering from medical conditions.

The crews then needed to use their training to keep the rescued person alive and safely bring them back to shore.

"We generally don't have to throw too many curveballs because it happens naturally at sea, but I'm sure there'll be some occurrences that will arise that will keep them on their toes," Mr Wright said.

The exercise comes after three people tragically lost their lives in a fishing boat accident near Port Lincoln in March.

"One of the debrief comments from that search was the importance of this exercise that we're conducting today that we do all around the state," he said.

"It brings people together and then they're used to operating alongside of each other.

"Even though they're from different groups, the operation ran really smoothly.

"It's not only teamwork within the boat, but across the boats when they're on the water, and also extending through to communications who play a vital role."

Despite a sad outcome, Mr Wright said the Port Lincoln incident showed how important it was to run multiagency exercises to practise the high level of communication needed in a surface search.

"We would be lost as a state without the marine rescue volunteers," Mr Wright said.

"The only occupational resources for maritime search and rescue are located in Adelaide and therefore the entire state's coastline and inland waterway along the Murray rely heavily on volunteers to respond to an emergency."

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

Harvest Christian ready to get reading


HARVEST Christian College, Kadina, students can look forward to a new library in the next school year.

Klynton Kitto — a sporting and farming icon

BORN at Clinton Centre in 1936, Richard Klynton Kitto became an icon in the Yorke Peninsula sporting community and an innovative farmer.

He and Joy, his wife, had been married for 65 years at the time of his passing on August 21, 2024.

Klynton followed in his father Percy Kitto and grandfather Robert Kent Kitto Junior's footsteps as well-regarded professional sprinters.

He attended Prince Alfred College, where he excelled in sports and academics. He played first XVIII football, competing successfully at the intercollegiate level, and opened the bowling in first XI cricket, forming a formidable partnership with Brian "Bunger" Hurn from the Barossa.

Together, they led PAC to win the SA Cricket Association B grade district competition premiership, with the opening bowlers taking over 100 wickets that season.

Klynton was also the athletics team captain, competing at the national championships in Brisbane in 1958, and served as the PAC Boarding House captain.

He participated in 24 Stawell Gift races; one of his greatest disappointments was finishing third in the 1965 120 metre sprint final.

In a memorable race at the Kadina trots, he competed in a novelty race against a cyclist (Malcolm Hicks) and a horse, placing second and beating the horse, which was owned by Alan Wearne, of Moonta.

For over 40 years, Klynton coached runners in Arthurton, Maitland, Moonta and Wallaroo and was closely involved with the Northern Yorke Peninsula Little Athletics Club.

His football career included a premiership as a teenager with Arthurton in 1955, playing a key role in the Yorke Valley Football League premiership win over Point Pearce.

He signed with Norwood without prior training and played a post-season game under Jack Oatey at Norwood Oval where, at centre half-forward, he faced Port Adelaide's Roger Clift.

At 21, Kitto declined an offer from VFL club Essendon to work as a meat buyer in Melbourne. He won the Yorke Valley Mail Medal in 1958 and returned to SANFL football in 1961 with Port Adelaide, playing four league games under Alan Killigrew.

After retiring from playing, Klynton umpired in the Yorke Valley association for 22 seasons.

He also enjoyed a long cricket career with the Weetulta, Arthurton and Price clubs.

Notably, he played two matches for South Australia Country against the West Indies in Berri during the 1960-61 tour, when he hit a Garfield Sobers ball out of the ground, and bowled against South Africa in Whyalla in 1963.

He was part of the Yorke Peninsula team that won the 1963 Harry Meyer Cup (SACA Country Championships), and is believed to be the only person in the cup's nearly 100-year history to take 10 wickets (36 runs, 19.1 overs) in an innings.

Going on to play in the SA Country

team against SACA at Adelaide Oval, he bowled unchanged for 15 eight-ball overs and took five wickets for 61 runs. His first 10-wicket haul was for

Arthurton against Urania in 1958, conceding 17 runs in 6.2 overs (including a maiden).

Klynton later took up bowls, serving as president of the Arthurton Bowling Club and winning singles and pairs championships.

Outside of sport, he managed a 2000-acre farm, Wattle Park, with his

family. The farm primarily grew wheat and barley and for a time included 300 head of Shorthorn cattle.

The family property, originally 5000 acres, was purchased in 1925 by his father Percy and uncle Robert.

Known for his expertise in Poll Dorset sheep, Klynton's stud won a prestigious Melbourne Show championship.

The Kitto farm was among the very first in Australia to acquire an International axial flow header, bought sight unseen.

Klynton also served on the SA Meat and Livestock Board in Adelaide. Klynton Kitto led a long, rich life filled with passion, family, and dedication. His legacy remains deeply rooted in the Yorke Peninsula community.

Klynton and Joy's children are Peter (a professional running champion), Sue, John, Anne and Linda (an elite premier league field hockey player), and they have given their parents nine grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.





Central Yorke's South Australian Aboriginal Secondary Training Academy Connect team overcame more than 28 schools to win South Australia's Aboriginal Power Cup, at Alberton Oval, last month.

The CY Academy earnt the cup by excelling both on and off the field with academic success, as well as achieving on-field victory against Para Hills High School in the grand final.

CY School, Maitland, teacher Charlotte Nixon said students had to complete "tasks" centred around Indigenous culture before competing in the football.

"It is good because it's not just focused on the footy," Nixon said.

"It's like a combination... there's a lot of things behind the footy.

"They work on their tasks and do other types of cultural activities; it's a sort of topic by itself.

"There are tasks are about Aboriginal language, astrology, NAIDOC stuff [and] art.

"Altogether there were more girls than boys, but a few girls weren't that keen on playing so we had some goal umpiring and some scoring and that sort of thing."

This is CYA's second SAASTA Connect victory in three years and its second SAASTA Power Cup victory this year following CYA's senior girls' win earlier this year.

Nixon explained the CYA side was made up of a combination of years 7-9 Indigenous students from Yorketown, Minlaton, Kadina and Moonta who travelled from their respective schools to Maitland one day a week to participate in the SAASTA Connect program.

CYA captain Duwan said having the range of students from across Yorke Peninsula made the team strong and SAASTA enjoyable.

"I was proud of my teammates for accomplishing something this big... this is the main school for SAASTA," Duwan said.

When asked if it felt strange to fight her friend, McDonnell said doing so pushed them both to new levels.

"I think our ability to flip the switch from close friends to competitors is unique and speaks to the respect we have for this sport, our teams and most of all each other," she said.

Parsons said she was proud of both of them for pushing boundaries to succeed in the sport.

"It's really quite fascinating that two girls from a small country town, where there was no boxing or even a gym at that time, have both fallen into the most challenging sport and dedicated their lives to it," she said. "It's really a credit to us."

Both Parsons and McDonnell will fight on consecutive days at the week-long National Championships in Canberra, where it is imperative to win to stay in the event.

A gold medal at the conclusion of the tournament would grant the winner a ticket to Australian team selection, they said.

"I truly believe the bouts, training sessions and friendship we share have helped us both rise as athletes, and I cannot wait to see all our hard work pay off at nationals this year," McDonnell said.

"These will be our toughest fights of the year but we've put in the work and we are ready!" Parsons said.

McDonnell and Parsons said they credited their boxing success to their home gyms, their teams and sparring partners.

Both boxers said that, without this support, combined with that of the wider community, their home towns, their respective partners and coaches Donald Jones and Friday Nwaiwu, their boxing wouldn't be at the level it is.

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





The inaugural Southern Yorke Peninsula Interschools Orienteering Championships took place at Yorketown Area School on Friday, November 1.

This was followed by the Yorke Peninsula Community Orienteering Sprint Carnival, held at Minlaton District School, on Sunday, November 3.

During Sunday's community event award presentations, it was announced that a new club, the Yorke Peninsula Orienteering Club, would be formed early next year.

The founding committee is Lisa Martin, Beth Purdy-Dart and Amanda Johnson.

At the schools' event, there were 78 students keen to show their map-reading and navigation skills.

Many of the students had taken part in a pilot Learn to Orienteer program offered free of charge to the local community by the state peak body, Orienteering SA.

Coaching was held in community parks and schools around Yorke Peninsula, including Yorketown Area, Warooka Primary, St Columba's Memorial, Minlaton District, Curramulka Primary, Stansbury Primary and Maitland Lutheran Schools.

Event director, Orienteering SA schools coaching officer, Zita Sankauskas, thanked all

the teachers and students who helped make the event a success.

"Over the course of 11 weeks, the Learn To Orienteer program attracted 151 people of all ages from across the peninsula to come and try the sport, which is essentially about learning to navigate as fast as you can through a pre-set course, while reading a map," Ms Sankauskas said.

"It is like solving a puzzle while on the move, and that means exercising your brain and body."

The Learn to Orienteer program was made possible by a grant from Orienteering Australia, and the schools orienteering program was aided by an Australian Government Sporting Schools grant, which enables participating schools to be mapped by specialist cartographers.

"Thank you once again to Warooka Primary School principal Beth Purdy-Dart who has gone over and above to help all attendees enjoy the experience," Mrs Sankauskas said.

"Thank you also to the entire team of volunteers from Orienteering SA who spent many hours on the road to share their love and enthusiasm for our sport."

The YP Community Orienteering Sprint Carnival drew 49 competitors and many more spectators.



SheepMasters prove popular

SOUTH Australia's second ever SheepMaster ram sale first time and were the top volume buyer, snatching up was held at Orrie Cowie Genetics, Warooka, last Wednesday, October 30.

SheepMaster sheep shed their skin, negating the need for shearing, crutching or tailing.

Forty-seven of the 48 rams on sale were sold at an average price of about \$2100, with the top ram going for \$7500.

While the average and top prices were slightly down on last year (\$2945 and \$16,000, respectively), owner John Dalla said this was expected due to the dry season.

"It (the sale result) kind of exceeded what I thought it was going to be just because of the way a lot of sales have been this year," Mr Dalla said.

"Top price is back a little bit but I didn't expect it to be better with the year.

"With people looking like they're going to have a smaller harvest they spend less on their rams."

Daniel Parsons, from RL & SJ Parsons & Son, Edillilie, returned for the second consecutive year to buy the top-priced ram, while the Duncans from Wentworth, New South Wales, joined the sale for the 10 rams.

Mr Dalla said the Duncans had done plenty research before deciding to buy from Orrie Cowie.

"It's their first try into shedding sheep, they did a lot of research into all the different breeds and settled on SheepMaster as probably the pick breed of all the shedders.

Mr Dalla said he was trying to create healthy sheep and, because of this, he was excited for future sales.

"We want a very structurally sound sheep with a perfectly clean shedding skin and then we want plenty of growth and muscle and weight in those sheep, while keeping your lambing percentage at a high rate.

"The rams we put up for sale this year were a big improvement on last year.

'The gains we made in 12 months are huge, I'm pretty excited about next year's drop - they should be a very good drop of rams.

"I think they're a pretty exciting breed of sheep." Mr Dalla said he appreciated those who supported the sale and looked forward to next year's ram sale.

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

A blast of the blues

LOCAL blues lovers were treated to an afternoon of footstompin', toetappin' blues on Sunday, when musician Brett Littlefair played his stunning range of cigarbox guitars at the Prince Edward Hotel, Wallaroo.

Accompanied only by drummer and long-time mate, Jimmy James, the pair filled the pub's beer garden with the sound of raging blues using just two instruments, interspersing Littlefair's own songs with beloved blues numbers that got the crowd up on the dance floor.

Littlefair says he is inspired by RL Burnside, John Lee Hooker, Justin Johnson, Seasick Steve, Rolling Stones, Jimi Hendrix, Hound Dog Taylor and Elmore James.

These influences shone through in his raucous style and the covers he played, including Roll Your Moneymaker, Let's Work Together and Poor Black Mattie, ending the gig with a rousing rendition of the Hendrix masterpiece, Voodoo Chile.

Among the original songs Littlefair in Sunday's set was Where've You Been, which was used on the 7 Network travel show, South Aussie with Cosi, and featured on his first album, Red Devil Lye.

Littlefair's subsequent albums, Footstompin' and Toetappin' charted in the Australian Blues and Roots Airplay Charts and stayed there for 18 months, reaching as high as number 4. He has also won two Adelaide Roots and Blues Association awards for Blues Album of The Year, making him


the first artist to go back-to-back in 2022 and 2023. Littlefair's iconic, cigar box style guitars,

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

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

Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: Stenhouse Bay jetty has tommies in the late afternoons, with the Marion Bay jetty holding gar and squid. Boat crews are running out for nannygai, kingfish and trevalley well offshore. Shore based fishers from Yorke Point and The Dairy are casting into some stiff breezes searching for mullet, mulloway and salmon trout.

ruff (Australian Herring) and squid at night. Boat crews launching in the early morning calm weather are reporting King George whiting well offshore towards Plank Shoal, as well as snook, blueys and garfish.

Wallaroo: The weather was decent (until the strong winds cracked in on the weekend) as boat crews ran down to Bird Reef for tommies, gar, squid and salmon trout. KG whiting are at the Boiler grounds and well out from the Magazine. The jetty has blue crabs and the odd squid.

Port Hughes/Moonta Bay: Both jetties have a few squid and garfish on the incoming tides. Anglers fishing by boat are reporting blue crabs and KG whiting well south of Tipara Reef.

Point Turton: Slack tides last week made for slow fishing for both boat and jetty fishers. There are scattered reports of garfish and whiting from Corny Point and The Pines, with the jetty quiet.

Edithburgh/Stansbury: Edithburgh,

Troubridge Island channel marker, Klein Point and the Orontes Bank all had KG whiting during the week, the deep water drops in particular. Marion Reef through to Rocky Gully has snook and leather jackets, while shore-based fishers caught mullet and salmon trout from Sheoak and Goldsmith beaches. Both jetties have a mix of tommies, squid and salmon trout.

Black Point/Ardrossan: Boat crews caught gar, blue crabs, squid and a few tommies from Black Point, Long Spit and well out from Billy Goat Flat last week. Rakers are also chasing blueys from Pine Point all the way to Ardrossan, Rogues Point and Price beaches, while the Ardrossan jetty is worth a try for overnight soapie mulloway and blueys.
