SUMMER BEGINS

SOUTH Australia's fishing and marine sector will receive a further \$16 million in algal bloom support, including additional grants of up to \$275,000 per eligible business, from the state and federal governments.

The announcement was made this morning (Tuesday, October 14) as part of the governments' \$102.5M summer plan, which the opposition has accused them of "drip feeding" to the public in recent days.

Eligible businesses that received a grant under the initial \$28M support package can now apply for a second grant if they can show a separate three-month downturn.

This includes grants of up to \$10,000 for small businesses, and up to \$100,000 for fisheries and aquaculture licence holders who have been unable to catch or harvest as usual.

The hardest-hit fisheries and aquaculture licence holders may also be eligible for an additional grant of up to \$25,000.

The closing date for applications for both the Small Business Support Grant and the Fisheries and Aquaculture Assistance Grant has been extended from November 30 to March 31.

Yes, Minister

IT has recently come to light that no one from the South Australian Government formally approached the federal minister to request national disaster recognition for the algal bloom.

Whether the event qualifies as a national disaster may be open to debate — but the fact that no direct approach was made is disappointing, and contrary to what many in the community were led to believe and hoped for.

So, who should be held accountable? The premier? State ministers? The federal minister? The prime minister?

The delays in recognising the seriousness of the event, followed by a lack of timely action, public warning or coordinated response, left the community in the dark.

By the time any meaningful steps were taken, the damage was already done.

The state's response and compensation measures appeared limited and short-sighted. It doesn't inspire confidence in the system.

In our Westminster style of government, elected representatives are ultimately responsible - but how responsible are they, really?

If you remember the great UK TV series Yes Minister (and later Yes, Prime Minister), it was the career public servant Sir Humphrey who quietly steered his often clueless minister.

Humphrey had an entire department behind him — and still they often got it wrong (such as the hospital built without patients).

Under our system, politicians should be accountable — assuming they can be held to it.

At least at state and federal level, they're well compensated. Our local councillors, by comparison, work for a fraction of that.

But what about the Sir Humphreys of today those behind the scenes who often shape policy and decisions? Shouldn't they be held to account too?

In August, federal MP Bob Katter threatened a Nine News journalist who mentioned Katter's Lebanese heritage at a press conference.

In September, Lachlan Murdoch won the News Corp and Fox Corp succession battle, ousting his siblings from the business.

Also last month, Donald Trump accused an ABC journalist of "hurting Australia" by asking about his business deals while in office, saying he would tell Prime Minister Anthony Albanese about his "bad tone".

I'll be the first to admit the industry isn't perfect, but the questions asked of Katter and Trump were entirely

If journalists are not allowed to ask rational questions in the public interest of people in positions of power, we are in serious trouble.

A free press is a vital part of a democratic society.

I've talked about big players, but I think even as a small newspaper, the YP Country Times plays an important role in the news ecosystem.

We provide localised content about important issues, such as the algal bloom, elections and budgets.

We advocate for our region when it is let down on basic human rights — including access to power, telecommunications and health services.

'Stuck in limbo' waiting for home care packages

FAMILIES are facing impossible choices and heartbreaking situations as a result of the Australian Government's failure to deliver promised aged care, Member for Grey Tom Venning says.

Mr Venning was commenting on the government's decision to delay the introduction of the new Aged Care Act 2024 and the rollout of 83,000 additional home care packages from July until November.

Following sustained pressure from the Coalition, Greens and independents, Aged Care and Seniors Minister Sam Rae announced earlier this month that 20,000 packages would be released before November 1.

Mr Venning said regional areas already faced unique challenges in delivering aged care, including long travel times to appointments, a shortage of qualified staff, and limited provider options.

"These issues have been exacerbated by the government's aged care failures," he said.

"Grey has an ageing population, making aged care a critical issue for many across 92.3 per cent of South Australia."

Mr Venning said, as of July, more than 230,000 older Australians were stuck in limbo, waiting for access to home care support.

This included people waiting on the National Priority System for a home care package they had been assessed as needing and those waiting to be assessed for a home care package.

"People should not have died while waiting for care. Our elderly deserve dignity, not waiting lists," Mr Venning said.

"They deserve to live out their final years with support, not with fear that help will come too late."

The recent decision to release 20,000 home care packages immediately - and the full 83,000 by the end of this financial year — was a positive step, but more needed to be done to ensure older Australians received the support they need and deserve, Mr Venning said.

According to Mr Rae, demand for inhome care had more than doubled in the past five years, with an anticipated 320,000 people to have a home care package allocation by October 31, compared to around 155,000 in 2020



Almost 100 and waiting

AT the age of 99, Marjory Parker is waiting for extra care to help make her daily life safer and more comfortable.

Mrs Parker, who lives at home in Edithburgh, has been waiting for 18 months ago to be reassessed to determine if she is eligible to be upgraded from a level 3 to a level 4 home care package.

She is cared for by her daughter Judith Trainer, 73. Mrs Parker had a stroke several years ago and Ms Trainer believes her mother may have had smaller strokes since then.

"Her health has deteriorated to a point where she needs showering and helping with her ablutions," Ms Trainer said.

"I am her daughter and do not have a problem with this, but it means I can no longer lead a normal life.

"The staff numbers for aged care in this country are abysmal, and it doesn't seem like anyone is addressing this health problem for regional areas.

"I'm worried that she will die before she is reassessed. "She is at a risk from falls and all sorts of stuff.

"She is beginning to need more physical, medical help than I can give her."

A Uniting Communities spokesperson said they could not comment on individual circumstances, but understood that some clients could be experiencing delays in reassessments or changes to their care packages.

"These delays can occur for a range of reasons, and we acknowledge the impact this may have on clients and their families," the spokesperson said.

"Across South Australia, My Aged Care is currently facing challenges in conducting timely assessments and reassessments.


"This may affect those who require increased support to continue living safely and independently in their homes and communities."

Community aged care packages are allocated by My Aged Care, with priority given to those most at risk, including individuals without a current package or whose funds have been exhausted.

"Unfortunately, there is also a shortage of available packages at this time," the spokesperson said.

"Where possible, we work to offer interim support to help bridge the gap and ensure people feel cared for and connected.

"We hope the incoming reforms to aged care, to come into effect from November 1, will lead to more timely and equitable access to support for older Australians, particularly those in our regional

More funds for fishing

IN addition, grants of up to \$150,000 will be available for commercial fisheries and aquaculture licence holders to invest in projects that build business resilience, take advantage of new opportunities and help protect jobs.

Applications for support grants open tomorrow (Wednesday, October 15), and project grant applications open on Monday, October 20.

Fee relief for the fishing and aquaculture sectors has also been extended until at least June 30 and will be applied automatically.

The state government will support a new, dedicated research and development program to investigate possible remediation and mitigation measures that could be used by aquaculture and fisheries businesses to reduce impacts on their businesses in the future.

Travel vouchers back for summer

A new, expanded round of the Coast is Calling program will offer 30,000 travel vouchers for the summer holidays.

This second round will include eligible holiday rentals, the Kangaroo Island ferry, and a wider range of sporting, leisure and entertainment experiences.

The round will cover travel between December 5 and April 26, with a public ballot held from December 1 to 3, a ballot draw on December 4 and a booking deadline of January 19.

Any unclaimed vouchers will be put into a redraw on January 22 for travel between January 23 and April 26, with booking deadline of February 19.

Businesses in eligible coastal postcodes are invited to submit an expression of interest from October 27 to November 7 to be part of round 2 of the voucher program.

According to the government, the first round of vouchers has already generated more than \$2.7 million in booking value for coastal regions.

Help for hospitality

Up to \$50 cashback off meals in coastal areas is being offered as an offshoot of the Coast is Calling program.



The \$15 million program will include four draws from November to March, resulting in 300,000 South Australians receiving the refund opportunity.

The first ballot will open on November 3 and be drawn on November 10, with cashbacks to be used by December 7.

Participating hospitality businesses must be in eligible coastal postcodes serving food, including restaurants, cafes, pubs and clubs, as well as takeaway venues such as fish and chip shops.

To claim the cashback, diners upload their tax invoice and enter their unique code to receive 50 per cent of the cost of their meal paid back, to a maximum of \$50.

Beach patrols and safety app

Daily reports on algal bloom conditions will not initially include Yorke Peninsula beaches.

The state and federal governments have said Surf Live Saving's free Beachsafe app is set to help South Australians make informed decisions about how best to enjoy the beach.

Beach clean-up crews will conduct visual algal bloom inspections each morning at locations across the metropolitan and southern coast, from North Haven to Goolwa.

The inspections, reported on the app, will let the public know whether a beach has abnormal foam or discoloured water, and when it was last

The reports will expand to include more regional beaches ahead of summer and the school holidays.

Regular beach activities, including VACSWIM and surf rescue courses, will continue throughout summer, with the advice from SA Health that beaches are safe to enjoy, but people should avoid foamy or discoloured water, which may cause irritation.

The governments have announced a record number of daily beach patrols for summer to check for algal blooms and mark areas where the water is safe.

The patrols will operate only on metropolitan and southern coast beaches, from Semaphore to Goolwa.

Disaster declaration drama

A state parliamentary inquiry into the algal bloom has heard that the state government has never formally asked the federal government to declare it a national disaster.

The state government's lead algal bloom coordinator Chris Beattie made the revelation after being questioned by inquiry committee chair and Greens MLC Robert Simms during a public hearing last week.

Mr Beattie later said he would like to see the scope of disaster recovery funding arrangements revised.

"South Australia is of the view that we ought to be broadening the perspective of those arrangements so that, when these events arrive, it's not just-in-time policy being developed,"

But the bureaucrat also said the matter of the bloom being formally labelled a disaster or not had "no material impact" on the state government's response.

The federal Senate is also conducting an inquiry, with a report expected to be delivered on October 28.

Bourke talks home in new role

NEW transport minister Emily Bourke, formerly of Pine Point, has been unable to provide an indication of when South Australia's road ratings will be publicly released.

The news comes after Austroads — a not-for-profit, nonpartisan organisation funded by government transport agencies — revealed its latest ratings across the nation last month, but said the SA Government withheld consent to have its published.

Speaking to the YP Country Times, Ms Bourke maintained that the state government was verifying the data, saying "we'll release it when it's ready".

"When it's released, we want to make sure that it's right," she said.

"We don't want to give people the wrong information."

Ms Bourke also took on notice questions about the gazettal of Upper Yorke Road between Kulpara and Arthurton for A-double access, which was being investigated by her predecessor Tom Koutsantonis (see YPCT 11-6-25), and the numerous collisions on YP's link to Adelaide between Port Wakefield and Virginia (YPCT 3-6-25).

On the idea of raising Yorke Peninsula speed limits from 100 kilometres per hour to 110km/h, and YP not having a road death for over 600 days, Ms Bourke said "let's keep it that way".

"When we go through that analysis of that (AustRoads) data, we'll have a bit of a clearer picture of what is required," she said.

"We have to take the advice we're given ... it's about making sure it's the safest journey as possible.

"We've seen less death on our roads for a longer period of time and let's keep it that way."

When asked about the recent upgrade of the Spencer Highway between Wallaroo and Moonta, over roads in worse condition such as Bute to Snowtown, Minlaton to Port Vincent, and Minlaton to Yorketown, Ms Bourke said she was "happy to hear more from the community about what they're wanting".

"This is always going to be something that comes up from regional communities 'why this road and not this road?' ... I'm happy to take that back to the department and ask those questions," she said.

'The investments we've made so far would be having a great outcome for those communities, like Kulpara to Arthurton and Port Broughton to Bute.

"We have been seeing some of those investments from the government making a difference, from new shoulders, new entries at Wallaroo, tactile lines on the side of the road."

Ms Bourke also acknowledged YP was home to the most jetties in the state and pointed out Ardrossan's current upgrades, as well as funding for Port Vincent and Edithburgh.

Ms Bourke said she looked forward to the state government's review of regional public transport.

"Growing up, I had the privilege of having a bus at the end of my track that I could jump on and get to school, and I didn't have to worry about how I was going to get there or how I was going to get home," she said.

"I come from a family that build things and get stuff done and I'm really excited to now be in a portfolio that does exactly the same — it's there to build things, keep people connected and keep people moving.

"I'm really looking forward to how do we not only just build the roads to get people to where they need to get to, but the infrastructure at the end of that road that helps people stay more connected and feel part of a community."

Ms Bourke was sworn in as Minister for Infrastructure and Transport on September 19 after a cabinet reshuffle; she remains Minister for Autism.

Warooka mobile outage

MOBILE coverage for Telstra customers in Warooka will be interrupted this week due to 5G upgrades.

The Warooka site will be switched off from Tuesday to Friday, October 14 to 17, as well as 7am to 5pm yesterday (Monday, October 13) and 7am to 6pm on Saturday, October 18, according to Telstra.

"Bringing 5G to the area is a major mobile milestone," Telstra regional general manager for SA Michael Patterson said.

"It will deliver higher speeds and capacity to the region, meaning faster downloads, smoother streaming and less congestion.

"Some disruption is required while the upgrade is underway, but we'll only be switching off the site when we need to and will have it back online and working better than ever as quickly as possible."

Landline services, NBN and satellite internet services, and mobile coverage from other providers will not be impacted.

Telstra customers can continue to make calls and send texts during disruption to mobile services by switching on Wi-Fi Calling — a free setting that allows mobile calls to be made and received while connected to Wi-Fi.

Business owners can speak to their bank about connecting EFTPOS terminals to NBN or Wi-Fi to prevent delays in processing transactions.

More Labor movement

FORMER Wallaroo resident Ella Shaw has been announced as a Labor candidate in the upcoming state election.

Ms Shaw, a SA Labor campaign organiser, will contest the seat of Elizabeth, following a retirement announcement from incumbent Lee Odenwalder.

Mr Odenwalder and Member for Torrens Dana Wortley last week said they would exit politics at the election in March.

The resignations of the long-time Labor MPs follow those of former deputy premier Susan Close and treasurer Stephen Mullighan last month.

Reynolds exits The Voice

KADINA singer Tiffney Reynolds' journey on The Voice has come to an end.

Ms Reynolds lost her Knockout against fellow Team Ronan teammates Milly Monk and Hunter Black, the latter of whom was also sent home, on Sunday evening, October 12.

The country artist said on Facebook she was "forever thankful" for her experience on the competition television series and hoped she gave "someone the belief that they can take a risk and chase the dream".

GROUNDED on a high

THE 2025 YP GROUNDED Art Festival generated over \$100,000 in ticket and artwork sales, prizes and artist fees for local artists, Yorke Peninsula arts and cultural facilitator Molly Flanagan-Sjoberg says.

The biennial festival, held for the second time from August 15 to 24, had over 4000 attendees across its more than 30 free and ticketed events.

Some of the most popular were the fine art, sculpture and photography exhibitions (1000 attendees across Maitland and Edithburgh town halls), festival finale Lanterns and Fire: The Story of Widhadha in Marion Bay (500 attendees), and the interactive installation Sea of Light in Ardrossan (700 attendees), all of which were free to attend.

Presented by Patch Theatre and the Ardrossan Progress Association, Sea of Light invited visitors to use a UV torch to paint and stencil across the sea floor projected inside the town

"One of our volunteers was welcoming a young boy in and was like 'this is how it works' and he obviously knew how it worked," Ms Flanagan-Sjoberg said.

"And she said 'oh have you been before?' and he looked at her and went 'every day this

Seawall to go ahead at Rogues Point

A SEAWALL will be built to protect shacks at Rogues Point, south of Ardrossan, following a decision by Yorke Peninsula Council at its October 8 monthly meeting.

The project will be funded by a \$455,582 loan from the Local Government Finance Authority over 10 years, with all costs recovered via a separate rate over that period on each property benefiting from the wall.

Each shack owner will repay a portion of the principal amount plus interest, with repayment values determined based on the percentage proportion of seawall armoury in front of each property.

A report tabled at the meeting stated these would vary between \$91,634 and

An application for the project was submitted to council on behalf of the Rogues Point Shack Owners Group, representing owners of six freehold properties adjoining

It proposed that a seawall be built on Crown land immediately abutting the properties.

"The Shack Owner Group deems con-

struction of the seawall armoury necessary as storm damage in recent years has eroded a significant part of the beach and related area, to the extent that the properties are at serious risk of inundation at times of high tides coupled with strong winds, particularly from the south easterly direction," the report stated.

The seawall has been designed by Magryn Engineering Consultancy, a specialist firm with experience on similar projects in other council settlements at Chinaman Wells and Point Turton.

MA Skinner Earthmoving, based in Wallaroo, has been contracted to construct the wall, while Magryn will provide project supervision and final sign off.

"The seawall area will be added to an existing lease for the existing seawall for the southern end of Rogues Point," the

The proposed seawall armoury has been discussed at length with council, the Coast Protection Board, and PlanSA with necessary approvals being granted."

Paulo DeOliveira has taken out the Seniors Card photographic competition Through the Lens with his panoramic self-portrait, Rebirth no.6, taken at West Cape.

The 66-year-old retired ophthalmologist proved he's still all about the eye, claiming the judge's choice and portrait awards.

Mr DeOliveira lives in Adelaide

but has been visiting the national park for the past 20 years.

"The raw aspect of nature is just breathtaking," he said.

"Somebody was saying 'how did you plan the clouds?' — I didn't, it was very fortunate timing, the clouds were very in favour of my photo.

"It was a windy late afternoon and the beach was completely deserted.

"I decided to venture and I got distracted, I looked backwards and the image of the whole landscape was like a frame in my head, a eureka thing."

Mr DeOliveira said he often carried a camera with him when hiking,

and the photo was created by triggering the shutter with a hidden remote as he laid naked on the stone floor.

"It's very intimate and vulnerable — not because of the nudity because I'm in a foetal position — but because I was trying to depict a rebirth.

"That photo represents some sort of a rite of passage for my life, because from 2018 to 2022 I had gone through a very difficult period in many aspects, and that got me into a difficult time psychologically and spiritually.

"I felt an emotional inner impulse to make a stamp of what I was going through in order to move forward."

Brazilian-born Mr DeOliveira married a Maitland-born South Australian in 2015 and they were torn between which country to live in.

"We are a same-sex couple and back then the political panorama, with the rise of the right-wing with the former (Brazilian) president, wasn't exactly very favourable for LGBTQ+ rights, and I felt afraid for my safety and for his," Mr DeOliveira said.

"It was another toll to pay because it was really difficult for me and him to decide and then we arrived in Australia two weeks before the big (COVID-19) lockdown.

"The whole stress of leaving the country that was beginning to become very different from the one I once knew, and then arriving in Australia and having to deal with the pandemic, and then he lost his father, it was a very heavy period of our lives.

"People might think it (emigrating) is something that's easy to do — it's not."

"The councils represent the community and, as such, those from different backgrounds and who have a range of experiences, particularly in health services, finance, management, and/or of the needs of people of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander descent, are strongly encouraged to nominate for one of the vacant positions," he said.

The Yorke Peninsula HAC AGM will be held at Minlaton Community Health Centre, 10.30am on Tuesday, November 18, with two community representative positions available.

Two positions are also vacant on

the Northern Yorke Peninsula HAC, with its AGM at Wallaroo Hospital, 5pm, on Monday, November 24.

An SA Health spokesperson said nominations must be made in writing and signed by two community health consumers plus the candidate.

Terms of up to three years will be confirmed after the AGMs.

The Port Broughton District HAC AGM was held on October 10, with Monique Button, Steven Scott, Lynette Brown and Michael Oertel reappointed for another year.

Residents are also encouraged to complete a short survey to rank health services in order of importance and share insights for the Yorke Peninsula Plan 2026ñ2031.

Mr Kirchner said the survey takes no more than 10 minutes and will guide service improvements across services including the Wallaroo, Maitland and Yorketown Hospitals, Country Health Connect, and mental health services.

"We are committed to collabo-

rating with local doctors, the South Australian Ambulance Service, partner agencies, and clinicians to ensure that we recruit and retain the workforce to meet the healthcare needs of our communities," he said.

Rear-enders spike in spring

BACK-END crashes resulting in serious injury or death surge by 33 per cent in spring compared to other seasons, prompting the RAA to urge South Australian motorists to stay alert.

An analysis of SA Government crash data by the RAA revealed that between 2019 and 2023, the state recorded 16,109 crashes of all types during spring — more than any other season.

Of those, 84 rear end crashes caused a fatality or serious injury.

These incidents occurred most commonly during the afternoon peak (3pm-6pm), but spring also saw a 23 per cent increase in morning peak (7am-9am) rearend crashes, compared to the rest of the year.

Spring also brings an increase in kangaroo collisions, with animal activity rising during the shoulder seasons of spring and autumn.

RAA road safety senior manager Charles Mountain said motorists should not become complacent as the weather improved.

"Spring can bring unpredictable weather and changing light conditions, which may affect visibility," Mr Mountain said.

"Many people assume winter is the worst time for rear-end crashes due to rain and darkness, but it's possible drivers are more relaxed in spring and not adjusting to conditions."

He urged drivers to maintain a safe stopping distance of at least three seconds.

"No destination is worth risking your life or others'.

"Allow extra time for travel to avoid taking risks to save a few minutes," he said.

Mr Mountain also recommended keeping windscreens clean, using quality sunglasses, and positioning visors to reduce glare during dawn and dusk.

With warmer weather, more cyclists and motorcyclists are out on the roads.

"When passing cyclists, drivers must leave at least one metre on roads with speed limits of 60km/h or lower, and 1.5m on higher-speed roads," he said.

"It's legal to cross single or double white lines to pass cyclists, but only when it's safe and there's no oncoming traffic."

THOUSANDS of litres of water, and ratepayer dollars, have been flushed down the drain after Splash Town at Moonta Bay was vandalised last

Copper Coast Council said it took three days and around 70,000 litres of water to restore the park — which typically holds 14,000 litres during operation - after detergent was deliberately added to its water system.

"The detergent caused significant disruption, clinging to the internal surfaces of the pipework and requiring a complex and costly cleaning process," a council spokesperson said.

"The only effective method of removal involved shock dosing the system, backwashing the water, and replenishing with fresh water.

"While water quality remained safe and posed no health concerns, the system could not be used while it was being flushed and backwashed."

The popular, free-to-use park was closed from Wednesday afternoon (October 8) until Friday afternoon (October 10), with council continuing to monitor water quality to ensure safety.

"This type of vandalism not only disrupts access to a much-loved community facility — it also wastes

thousands of litres of water, consumes staff time, and places an unnecessary financial burden on ratepayers," the spokesperson said.

"Security cameras are installed at the site and will be reviewed as part of the investigation.

"Council urges anyone who witnesses suspicious activity around public facilities to report it to us immediately by calling (08) 8828 1200."

YP Fire Danger Season start date still to be confirmed

THE SA Country Fire Service has announced Fire Danger Season dates for six of South Australia's 15 Fire Ban Districts, urging communities to begin preparing for the risk of bushfires.

While dates have been confirmed for districts including Eastern Eyre and West Coast (starting October 15), and Riverland, Murraylands and Upper South East (November 1), the start date for Yorke Peninsula

remains to be confirmed.

Lower Eyre Peninsula will begin its season on November 15, with the declared districts all starting on the same dates as last year.

The unchanged dates reflect continued concern about below-average rainfall and soil moisture levels.

CFS strategy and compliance officer Phil McDonough AFSM reminded all South Australians to prepare their homes, businesses and families ahead of the season. "Now is the time to prepare,"

"Clean up around your home, have a Bushfire Survival Plan, and know which Fire Ban District you

live in." Dates for the remaining districts, including Yorke Peninsula, will be announced following further local consultation.





COOBOWIE 150 | 14

Coming together at Coobowie

PEOPLE from near and far with Coobowie by the Sea, written by local schoolteacher connections gathered in the town on the weekend to celebrate its 150th anniversary.

The festivities on Saturday and Sunday, October 11-12, were centred on the Coobowie Community Hall, and included historical displays, local art, live music, children's activities and the release of a 56-page book on the town's history.

Shearing, wool spinning and blacksmithing were demonstrated and visitors were encouraged to join a rendition of the song, Coobowie Francis Low in 1951.

The song was the winning entry in a competition held to celebrate the start of the rodeo at Coobowie, the first on Yorke Peninsula.

The Coobowie area was surveyed in 1838 and named Salt Creek in 1848.

It was the earliest identifiable port on southern Yorke Peninsula.

From 1848 to 1940, Coobowie — named by the local Nharangga people — thrived as a port, exporting grain, wool, lime, salt and timber.

History and sport intersect at Kadina special event

KENT Newbery launched his first book, a non-fiction account of the causes of the Great War, or World War II as it is now known, last

A Kadina Football Club life member, Mr Newbery chose the club to host the launch, on Wednesday, October 8

The evening began with an appearance by sporting royalty Erin Phillips, who was accompanied by fellow Australian Hall of Fame inductee, her father Greg Phillips.

Ms Phillips sat down for a one-

on-one style interview with club secretary Dean Angus, who asked her about her illustrious two-decade sporting career.

Choosing basketball as her focus in her teenage years — after being denied a pathway forward in her main love, football — she was drafted to the WNBA in 2005, joining the Connecticut Sun.

She went on to play for five teams over nine years and won two championships, before continuing her career in Europe.

"I went to Poland, which was eye opening and an unreal experience, they live and breathe basketball over there," Ms Phillips said.

"We once beat a top Russian team and the fans were so happy, but weeks later we lost to a team we should have beaten.

"It was an away game, and when we got home all our tyres were slashed — the fans didn't come to the games for two weeks until we played better basketball, they are so passionate."

After the one-on-one, the evening paused briefly before Mr Newbery took the stage for a discussion with Ed Rowntree about his new book, The Why War.

The book discusses the origins of WWI, starting with events as far back as 70 years before the conflict.

"A lot of people think that the cause of the war was the assassination of Archduke Franz Ferdinand (heir to the Austria/ Hungary throne, while in Bosnia and Herzegovina, in 1914), but it goes back a lot earlier than that," Mr Newbery said.

"I think that was just an excuse, in the end, to start a war.

"A lot of people ask if it was preventable, I really don't know if it was, I think it was always going to happen, the Great War."

Mr Newbery also announced he is currently working on a second book, focused on World War

Weetulta celebrates 150 years

A CENTURY and a half ago, ing Weetulta families. the first newly surveyed sections in the Hundred of Tiparra were released for sale.

Land suitable for clearing and cropping was first purchased in the final week of September and the first week of October, 1875.

On Sunday, September 14, past and present residents of the Weetulta-Nalyappa district, along with their descendants, gathered at the Weetulta Hall to celebrate the 150th anniversary of this historic milestone.

Á small committee coordinated the day, which began with a 10am church service at the Uniting Church — formerly the Methodist Church.

The church was filled for the occasion, with the service led by Reverend Sandy Webb and music provided by Judith Earle (nee Ferguson) on keyboard.

On display in the adjoining hall was a collection of photographs featuring early residents, farming scenes, sports teams and school groups, which had been compiled by the late Peter Ferguson — alongside memorabilia from many long-stand-

After the church service, Alan Ferguson welcomed everyone to a sumptuous pooled lunch, coordinated by the Ladies Fellowship group and reminiscent of gatherings from times past.

The hall was abuzz with conversation and laughter as former residents reconnected with one another and with those still living in the district.

Many names synonymous with the Weetulta-Nalyappa district were represented on

Sadly, two of the oldest living former residents, Graham Bagshaw and Bernice Clasohm, were among those unable to attend.

Bygone times

After lunch, Geoff Bagshaw spoke about the collective efforts of so many who contributed to the prosperity of the district today.

He emphasised the importance of water availability during the early years of settlement and development, and noted that the first land pur-

chasers were astute in their selections — choosing sections immediately east and west of the Weetulta township, and land bordered by Maitland Road, The Gap Road, Boundary Road and Rocky Bend Road.

These areas have since proven to be some of the district's most productive cropping land.

Geoff acknowledged the contributions of landholders, their wives and children, farm workers, schoolteachers and storekeepers, all of whom played a vital role in opening up the farming land.

He reflected on the large number of families that once supported local football, cricket and tennis teams, as well as the local school and general store/post office — all of which have now disappeared from Weetulta.

He also highlighted the continuing significance of the church and the Ladies Fellowship, established in the 1920s, both of which remain active in the community today.

Peter Bagshaw served as emcee for the day, keeping the crowd entertained by interviewing several attendees and sharing light-hearted moments throughout the program.

Julie Bagshaw prepared a short performance program, which was met with enthusiastic applause.

A choir made up of Weetulta locals performed a bracket of songs, including a heartfelt rendition of "I Still Call Weetulta Home".

Adding to the atmosphere, Alan Ferguson, with his trademark charm, recited the classic poem "Said Hanrahan".

The Weetulta Ladies Fellowship brought laughter to the hall with a highly amusing skit — a playful dance routine performed in oversized hats that covered their upper bodies, with painted faces on their

It was a light-hearted nod to the spirit of the long-running Weetulta Strawberry Fetes.

It was a joyful and memorable day for all who attended to reconnect with Weetulta, and a rewarding outcome for those who worked hard to bring the celebration together.

Keen gardeners flock to Warooka

WAROOKA and Districts Garden Club hosted more than 160 enthusiasts from eight clubs for a zone get-together on Saturday, September 20.

Garden Clubs Australia Yorke Peninsula, Mid North and Riverland zone members travelled from Balaklava, Wallaroo, Ardrossan, Kadina, Minlaton, Warooka and the Barossa Valley to the Warooka Town Hall for the day.

WDGC president Judia Detmar welcomed everyone and introduced the first guest speaker, renowned Mediterranean botany expert and Open Gardens SA scheme instigator, Merilyn Kuchel.

Merilyn captivated listeners with stories of her journey to create a flourishing Mediterranean garden in Stirling, in the Adelaide Hills.

Her gardening journey led her to the United Kingdom, where she met TAFE botanist and author Trevor Nottle. His expertise in Mediterranean plants helped shape her garden and broaden her knowledge.

Another influence was Heidi Gildemeister, a pioneer of waterwise gardening and author of Gardening the Mediterranean Way.

Inspired by her, Merilyn established the SA Mediterranean Garden Society 25 years ago.

Her presentation included a slideshow depicting typical Mediterranean gardens with shaded walkways, gentle water features and carefully placed seating under trees and shrubs to create cool spaces.

She highlighted features such as gravel between pavers to reduce glare, colourful pots, painted tree trunks and garden sculptures — all techniques to make gardens more enjoyable in hot weather.

Merilyn explained how Mediterranean plants are adapted to their climate.

They grow during the cooler, wetter months, bloom in spring and enter survival mode in sum-

She emphasised the importance of avoiding overwatering or fertilising, as these plants thrive in poor soils and harsh conditions.

Examples included hardy sun-loving plants like geraniums, pelargoniums and succulents.

Merilyn also spoke about her role in coordinating volunteers who maintain the Mediterranean section of the Adelaide Botanic Garden and contribute to the work of the National Trust of South Australia.

Judia thanked Merilyn for her presentation and presented her with a gift.

Members then paused for lunch before plant sales opened, drawing an eager crowd.

Plant auction

Zone coordinator Rex Herde ran the plant auction, drawing enthusiastic bids for standout specimens such as a large Cymbidium orchid from Mays Nursery, a towering Kangaroo Paw, and a variety of Calantheas, Begonias, Bilbergias and Bromeliads.

His light-hearted commentary encouraged heated bidding between the clubs.

The raffle followed, with garden-themed prizes donated by Diggers, Neutrog, Yates, Bunnings and WDGC members. Winners left delighted with their spoils.

The afternoon continued with a talk from WDGC member Christina Ball, titled A Look at the Early Years of Gardening in the Warooka District.

Her stories of early European settlers growing food for the local community long before supermarkets captured the audience's attention.

She described the challenges they faced, including irrigation and pest control, while showcasing historical photos of large-scale crops such as sweetcorn and cabbages.

Judia presented Christina with a bouquet of flowers in appreciation.

The day concluded with final plant sales and homemade treats offered for the journey home.

"Every member of the band has been touched by cancer in one way or another," Ms McDonald said.

Having experience under her belt as the fundraising coordinator for the Wallaroo Hospital Auxiliary, Ms McDonald said every couple of years she puts on a fundraiser for a cause that has personally affected her life.

"My great-aunt on my mum's side and an aunt on my dad's side have passed away from breast cancer," she said.

"October is Breast Cancer Awareness month so I thought it was the perfect time to do

According to the National Breast Cancer Foundation,

58 Australians are diagnosed every day with breast cancer, and nine Australians die every day from it.

Ms McDonald's last fundraiser was for leukemia, where she shaved her head to show her support for the cause.

"One of my daughter's, her best friend had leukemia," she

"My daughter would always colour her hair and this was my way to raise money for it."

She hopes the message of "it's not just women" who can be diagnosed with breast cancer, spreads from this event.

"Males should be checking too," Ms McDonald said.

One man in 550 is diagnosed with breast cancer in their lifetime.

"A mammogram is the earliest detection and it can detect breast cancer before it shows," Ms McDonald said.

"Getting checked early is better than ignoring the signs." She said those with a family

history of cancer should get

tested. "It's very important to look after your own health," she

Ms McDonald said the afternoon will be filled with "music, games and fun" with local businesses donating items for raffles and games.

BCNA urges early self-checks

BREAST Cancer Network Australia has launched a new awareness campaign, Know Yourself. Feel Yourself, encouraging women — especially younger women — to give their breast health the same attention they give their faces.

The campaign urges women to develop a regular breast self-check routine, which could be life-saving.

New data from the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare shows that tumour size is a key predictor of survival. This reinforces the importance of early detection.

By checking their breasts regularly, women are more likely to notice changes early and seek medical advice.

The campaign uses familiar routines — such as looking in the mirror — to prompt self-checks and includes a step-by-step breast check video.

This practical tool helps build confidence and encourages women to be proactive about their breast health.

BCNA CEO Kirsten Pilatti said the campaign was about awareness and promoting behavioural change.

It was shaped by insights from women with breast cancer, who wanted to support the next generation to detect issues early. understand their bodies and advocate for themselves.

Breast cancer is now the most common cancer in Australian women. More than 1000 women under 40 are diagnosed each year around three each day.

Younger women often face later-stage diagnoses, more aggressive disease, and additional challenges such as being dismissed by health professionals, financial strain, fertility issues and career disruption.

The Know Yourself. Feel Yourself campaign includes a short film and digital tools featuring diverse women, many with lived breast cancer experience.

A look back

BRENTON Rowntree gave a brief history of the Ardrossan Bowling Club at the centenary event, and presented the following:

After a meeting on September 22, 1925, 12 interested town folk agreed a bowling club should be formed - provided they could secure the interest of 30 members.

Thirty members were found and from there, a suitable site was secured, levels were pegged out and on October 27, 1925, Mr Herb Hosking brought in his tractor and Mr J. R. Brown brought in a team of horses to the chosen site, and promptly put down the first five rinks.

The greens were opened for play on April 1, 1926.

During 1926, another rink was laid, electric lights were installed over four rinks and water was laid onto the site — a remarkable occurrence given the short timeline.

The annual subscription was £4.4.0 (\$8.40). There were 36 members and the club colours of blue and white were approved.

In 1932, it was decided to join Yorke Peninsula Bowling Association; in 1933-34, Ardrossan competed against Moonta, Kadina, Wallaroo Mines and Bute.

In July 1953, the women of the town decided to form a bowling club and applied for permission to use the greens. This was granted for play on designated days, and they were admitted as associate members of the Ardrossan Bowling Club. They joined the YP Women's Bowling Association in October 1954.

In July 1961, the club submitted plans to demolish the old tin shed clubrooms and replace them with a new clubhouse, which was completed and opened by Sir Thomas Playford on October 20,

In 1981, the club decided to plant a third green and 1500 tonnes of fill had to be carted and placed on what is now C green.

The passing of the Equal Opportunity Act required a new constitution, which combined the men's and women's clubs into the present-day Ardrossan Bowling





Between netball courts and equestrian arenas, the family


travels across South Australia and sometimes interstate throughout the year.



Diamonds shine as YP trio takes centre stage

It was a marquee moment for the Australian Diamonds — and for three players with strong Yorke Peninsula ties, Sarah Klau, Georgie Horjus and Test debutant Lucy Austin — as they capped off the series against the South Africa's SPAR Proteas at the Adelaide Entertainment Centre on Sunday afternoon, October 12.

Klau was ruthlessly efficient as a circle defender, while Horjus started for the first time in her Diamonds career and came on in the second half, and Austin became Test debutant number 196 for the national women's netball team.

Completing a series whitewash 3-0, the Diamonds won the last encounter by 23 goals, 65-42.

Klau started at goal keeper, picking up an intercept and a couple of rebounds in the first half before being rested in the second.

Despite being one of the smallest players on court, Horjus impressed in the first half at goal attack before being rested for a quarter and a half. She returned seven minutes into the final quarter, linking up with Lucy Austin in the shooting circle.

The duo enjoyed their moment together, drawing a roar from the vocal crowd of 8535.

Horjus delivered a strong allround performance, finishing with 12 goals from 13 attempts, 11 goal assists, nine centre pass receives and 13 feeds.

If the crowd roared for Horjus, it lifted even louder when Austin entered the fray at the start of the second half.

She quickly hit the scoreboard, helping to settle any nerves and finished her first Test with 18 goals from 22 attempts and added an offensive rebound in an impressive showing.

The Diamonds, who had won the first two games of this series - 64-53 at Bendigo on October 4 and 67-40 at Wollongong on October 8 — were already nine goals up at the first break in the

against South Africa by 20 goals at the long interval.

While it was Austin's Test debut, she had previously suited up for Australia in the Fast5 Netball World Series victories in 2022, '23 and '24, and was Australia's Player of the Series in 2024.

Horjus made her Diamonds debut in the 2024 Constellation Cup, against New Zealand.

Both Austin and Horjus have connections to the Bute Netball Club through their mothers, Meredith Austin (nee Krieg) and Andrea Horjus (nee Lodge).

Klau, whose Diamonds debut was in 2016, hails from Yorketown and the Southern Eagles; she currently plays for the Sydney Swifts in the Super Netball League.

Horjus, now 23 and a dual SNL premiership player, will continue with the Adelaide Thunderbirds, while fellow 23-year-old Austin is set to join the GWS Giants for the





Spring: time to spruce up weed control

SPRING is the ideal season for grain growers and their advisers to assess weed management programs and identify opportunities to integrate new technology.

That's the advice from Yorke Peninsula-based Chris Davey, WeedSmart's extension agronomist in South Australia, who said the focus should remain on managing the weed seed bank when adopting new tools.

"Precision agriculture is undoubtedly the new frontier of weed control," Mr Davey said.

"Although the capabilities of new technologies are astonishing, there are many challenges to navigate.

'Weed control will always be a numbers game.

"When considering any new technology, the big question is whether it will help you achieve 96 per cent weed control or better."

He said the fast pace of technological development made it difficult to know the

right time to invest and how best to integrate tools into existing farming systems but, currently, autonomy, weed detection and drones were commonly mentioned in discussions about weed management strategies.

Mr Davey said herbicide resistance emerged in the 1980s and 1990s, largely due to reliance on a single method of

'The advent of new herbicides or application techniques will never provide the panacea of complete weed control," he said.

"Weeds are incredibly adaptive, and the only way to keep herbicides and other technologies working effectively is to focus on weed seed bank man-

"Objectively asking, 'how would this technology help me reduce weed seed set?' can cut through the complexity of choosing what technology to

He encouraged farmers

to use the WeedSmart Big 6 framework to guide decisions.

Crop rotation and competition

"Keep weeds guessing with crops and varieties that offer different planting timing, rapid canopy closure, vigorous early growth, and enable the use of diverse herbicide modes of action and/or application timing," Mr Davey said.

"A robust crop rotation will underpin a successful weed management program and provide multiple benefits to the farming system, including stubble biomass, nitrogen fixation and friable soil struc-

Crop competition technology included precision planting and variable rate applications of seed, fertiliser and ameliorants.

"Many growers have realised benefits from mapping their soils and addressing soil constraints that allow weeds to outcompete crops," he said.

"Row spacing, stubble management, crop safety and depth control all play a part in planter decisions."

Mr Davey said the increasing availability of proprietary chemical mixes had made it easier to apply multiple modes of action to a single weed cohort.

'Testing for herbicide resistance and susceptibility in weeds is going to save money and keep you one step ahead of evolving resistance in weed populations," he said.

Growers could also use advances in spray technology and weed detection to improve accuracy and reduce waste.

Efficient spray capacity and logistics laid the foundation for effective weed control, but understanding where weeds grow and acting fast was key, Mr Davey said.

"Low-tech scouting for weeds can be as simple as dropping a pin, and sometimes sacrificing a patch of crop using chemical fallow or cutting for hay or silage is the most economical and effective way to stop herbicide-resistant weeds setting seed," he said.

"Weed detection in-fallow and in the crop opens the door for targeted management that can also reduce the impact and cost of herbicides.

"Finish the season with technologies that collect and destroy weed seeds that have evaded control.

"Harvest weed seed control decisions need to dovetail with your seeding system, header front, controlled traffic farming and stubble management."

Call SafeWork SA for farm safety advice

FARMERS are being urged to contact SafeWork SA's free Advisory Service for specialist advice on improving safety across their operations.

The call is part of SafeWork SA's 12-month Safety in Agriculture campaign, which began on October 1 and aims to reduce the number of deaths and serious injuries on farms.

In 2024-25, SafeWork SA was notified of six workplace fatalities on farms across the state. These included three quadbike crashes, one worker trapped in machinery and two deaths involving grain silos.

At least 13 other serious injuries were also reported during this period.

As part of the campaign, SafeWork SA inspectors will visit farms to assess compliance with work health and safety laws. Properties with a high number of workplace injury claims will be prioritised for inspection, SafeWork SA executive director Glenn Farrell said.

'Inspectors will focus on areas such as plant and equipment maintenance, machinery guarding, working at height, electrical safety, use of personal protective equipment, safe chemical handling and storage, and worker training, including for confined spaces such as silos," Mr Farrell said.

Farmers are encouraged to contact SafeWork SA's Advisory Service for support in identifying hazards and reducing risk."

The service provides free resources and guidance, and can arrange an on-site visit by a specialist advisor with agricultural experience.

Agriculture is a vital part of SA's economy, employing more than 30,000 people — around three per cent of the state's workforce.

Primary production, including agriculture, forestry and fisheries, contributed over \$7.8 billion to the state's economy last financial year.

The sector is one of six national priority industries due to its high rate of serious workplace incidents.



HOT FISHING TIPS

Yorke Peninsula jetties — Port Clinton: Featuring deep water less affected by local tides, Port Clinton was surveyed in 1862 and soon became a key stopover for shipping from Port Adelaide and mail coaches servicing the Moonta and Wallaroo Mines copper mines. A 274-metre jetty was constructed in 1863, used initially by local farmers and later for loading rock phosphate. After years of neglect, the jetty fell into disrepair and was rarely used after 1900. Today, the last remaining jetty stumps can occasionally be seen among the mangroves at low tide. (Source: Jetties of South Australia – Past and Present, Neville Collins.)

Wallaroo: A one-metre brown snake was sighted on the entrance road to the local marina in on Thursday, so caution is advised for anyone out and about. The jetty was active during the week, with King George whiting, flathead and squid all being caught. Boat crews contended steady southerly to westerly winds while heading out in search of whiting, squid and garfish. Jetty repairs are scheduled for completion by the end of October.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: There was an unconfirmed report last week of a concerning mass of black seawater in and around Moonta Bay, although it is unclear whether it is linked to the algal bloom. Garfish are being caught off

both jetties, while King George whiting have returned to Cape Elizabeth and West Light. Gar are also present over the broken ground off Second Beach, though berley is needed to bring them on the bite.

Port Victoria/Balgowan: Onshore winds kept many smaller boats in sheds for much of last week. However, garfish, squid and whiting remain in steady numbers at most local spots, with crews often finding a feed without needing to travel far. Night-time squid are active at the Port Victoria jetty, and a few small blue swimmer crabs have also been reported

Point Turton/Corny Point: Salmon up to one kilogram have arrived at local beaches, with standout sessions reported at the Dust Bowl, Gym Beach, the sandy spits at Corny Point, and off Daly Head. Boat crews are targeting King George whiting, garfish and the occasional squid, while the jetty has been relatively quiet.

Stenhouse Bay/Marion Bay: Late in the season, mullet, salmon trout and a few quality dusky flathead were caught off Marion Bay jetty late last week. Boat crews who braved the elements reported catches of red nannygai, kingfish, large flathead and the occasional big King George whiting. Some large snook are also running across Foul Bay and along the coast to Port Moorowie.


