

Solar farms back on the grid

THE discussion around solar farms within town boundaries is set to heat up again, with two new proposals for Kadina.

New South Wales based company MPower lodged two applications for 4.95MW farms with Copper Coast Council's planning department in March.

The proposed developments are on industrial zoned land on Roach Street and South Tce, southeast of the CBD. While there are no specific provisions for solar farm developments within the zone according to council's development plan, there isn't anything to oppose them either.

"The proposed solar farm, whilst it accounts for a relatively large area, is very low scale when compared to the land uses envisaged within the zone," Planning Chambers director Damian Dawson wrote in both of the applications on behalf of MPower.

Opponents of previous solar developments had cited the new state Planning and Design Code, which came into effect in the Copper Coast in July, as it required farms of this size be one kilometre from homes.

However, because the applications were lodged in March, they will be assessed against council's old development plan.

Both proposed farms will be situated on eight hectares of land, but are different from previous proposals as the panels will not rotate.

"The panels will be installed on a PEG frame system, with rows running north-south with the panels oriented east and west, tilted at an angle of eight degrees in either direction. The panels are butted up to each other to form blocks," Mr Dawson wrote.

"The panels utilise anti-reflective, highly transparent, low iron tempered glass."

At most, the panels will measure 800 millimetres above the ground, which "results in the panels being less apparent to neighbouring properties than previous solar farms constructed and approved within the Kadina region."

The developments will also have

three metres of landscaping between the proposed fence lines and the existing boundary.

Each site would take about six months to be fully operational, and would feed power through the existing lines on South Terrace to the Kadina East substation.

The South Terrace development would consist of 15,600 panels split over 44 groups while there would be 15,860 panels across 45 groups on Martin Terrace.

Public consultation is open until October 26.

Being a private hospital, the Ardrossan doctors have never been covered by the same agreement for attending and providing on-call and emergency services at that facility.

The agreement relates to doctors providing a service to public hospitals.

Whilst there is a small payment from Country Health SA for the provision of these services, it is only a small fraction of the payment for the same services in public hospitals.

This is an important distinction when addressing rural doctor payments, highlighting the long-standing disadvantage experienced by the doctors in Ardrossan.

Uncertain health

THIS week the state government announced South Australia's health workforce is bigger than ever.

Figures from the independent Auditor-General's Report showed there are more than 1000 extra frontline health staff in the past year, with an extra 2500 health staff employed during the past three years.

The Yorke and Northern Local Health Network has 1136 full-time equivalent employees — the report doesn't mention how many of these new staff were directed to the regions.

We've repeatedly, and will continuously, support the staff who do their best to serve our communities.

But simply adding more people to a system without addressing the greater issues of retention, attraction and support doesn't mean anything.

You need a strong structure in place to allow these new staff to thrive, and unfortunately we aren't necessarily seeing that come through.

Even more staff are expected to be hired in health, which is wonderful, in preparation for eased restrictions and relaxed borders.

But the question should be asked if this focus will be to the detriment of areas like ours which are already crying out for better support and funding.

Finding locum doctors is continuing to be a problem for local practices which are short staffed, forcing patients to wait up to five weeks for an appointment.

The pressure clinics face now with general care, COVID vaccinations, chronic condition management and visiting the hospital as on-call physicians is, quite frankly, a lot.

There's hope that open borders will mean better access to interstate locums, which hopefully could benefit those areas needing more doctors.

It is a good thing to have more people in such important jobs and to be preparing for the easing of restrictions.

But a little time focusing on regions wouldn't go astray either.

Debate takes root in council chambers

A MOTION to seek feedback about the possible removal of Norfolk Island pine trees in Stansbury and Port Vincent has stumped Yorke Peninsula Council.

Councillor Leanne O'Brien wanted to survey residents about the removal of the trees due to the ongoing cormorant issue.


However, after vigorous discussion the proposal was replaced with a more general motion to ask for feedback about the cormorant issue.

Elected members were divided with Mayor Darren Braund casting his deciding vote against consultation.

CEO Andrew Cameron estimated about 90 trees would need to be removed at a cost upwards of \$350,000.

Mrs O'Brien said she had received many emails, messages and photos from ratepayers concerned about the cormorant issue.

"Unless something significant is done I don't see the problem going away and it is detrimental to businesses, tourists and



locals of the town," Mrs O'Brien said.

"I feel by asking the residents of the town their feelings about the cormorants and Norfolk Island pine trees we would be able to make an informed decision going forward.

"If you are going to get

rid of the trees it would need to be all of them because there would be no point because they would move into the town." Councillor Roger Johns said more information

was needed from qualified professionals before any public feedback. "The problem I have, is

we are dealing with something we have no fully qualified information about, we need information from someone who understands birdlife," he said.

"There would be people out there who we could get information from because we are not an isolated incident when it comes to cormorants.

"There would be qualified people who would be able to advise on the consequences of removing trees."

Councillor Naomi Bittner also stressed more information was needed. "If we had a majority of

residents come back sayknow they are not native ing they want every tree removed and we then get a town. quote that is expensive and the EPA opposes it then what would we do?"

STANSBURY Progress Association chairperson Don McPhee said the community had already made its feelings known about the cormorant situation in the town.

The community submitted a petition to state parliament, asking for the government to develop a multi-faceted strategy to manage the impact of the birds.

The issue has been ongoing for decades with cormorants, commonly knows as shags, wreaking havoc by roosting in the Norfolk Island pines.

Local businesses and

residents are left with a daily clean-up and stench and motorists return to find their cars repainted with excrement.

"We have not been contacted concerning the matter (tree removal), in my personal view the community has already spoken about their views in relation to the shags," Mr McPhee said.

"They (community) want a well-researched and properly founded plan to be implemented to deal with them.

"The issue is not about whether we have the shags or whether we have the trees as an alternative, the issue is about the shags."

Mr McPhee said if the trees were removed the cormorants would find somewhere else to roost.

"These Norfolk Island pines would be getting close to 100 years old; they are a feature of the town, they are significant in the amenity of the town and there would be a public outcry if they were removed." he said.

"There is no scientific basis established to show that removing the trees would solve the shag problem."

"What it stems from is the plane

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Case delayed, Ellis pushes for Liberal return

MEMBER for Narungga Fraser Ellis has confirmed his desire to run for the 2022 state election as a Liberal candidate.

Mr Ellis suspended his Liberal Party membership in February after he was charged with 23 counts of deception, a result of an Independent Commissioner Against Corruption investigation into the misuse of the Country Members Allowance across parliament.

He was due to appear in court in November but his trial has been adjourned until June next year.

Mr Ellis's legal team successfully argued last week that Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell's High Court appeal could impact his case.

"The legal issues to be determined by the High Court in respect of Mr Bell's matter have the capacity to make a material difference to the legal issues in my own trial," Mr Ellis said.

"In those circumstances it is not possible for my trial to proceed until the High Court has ruled on the proper interpretation of the Independent Commissioner Against Corruption Act 2012 which it will do when it hears Mr Bell's matter."

Mr Ellis said, while he hoped to have the issue resolved before the state election in March, he had written to the Liberal Party State Executive to confirm him as the endorsed candidate for Narungga.

"I have consistently said and again repeat that I unequivocally maintain my innocence and look forward to clearing my name," he said.

"Given I am presumed innocent I hope the party will confirm my endorsement and allow me to stand as a Liberal candidate at the election."

Mr Ellis will run as an independent if the state executive denies his request.

Independent candidate Dianah Walter welcomed the opportunity for clarity around Mr Ellis' standing.

"Constituents deserve certainty as to the political status of candidates (so far just Mr Ellis and I) at the March 19 poll," she said.

"A definitive decision will give both constituents and other potential candidates clear air around choice on who to back and how campaigns will run.

"Mr Ellis is entitled to the presumption of innocence and I look forward to the matter of the charges against him finally coming before the court and the matter being dealt with expeditiously."

Edmund Street upgrades approved

Barunga West Council approved a \$150,000 upgrade to the street at its recent meeting.

Issues were brought to the attention of council late last year, after many locals had complained about the poor condition of the road and footpath, used primarily by Barunga Village residents.

"The residents of Barunga Village have been using the road to travel to the park at the

end of Edmund Street," BWC CEO Maree Wauchope said.

"Because of the poor condition of the surface it is really quite unpleasant for those who use walkers, wheelchairs and gophers."

The road and footpath are also used by patrons of the Port Broughton Bowling Club and visitors to and from Barunga Village.

"Work will involve sealing and widening the existing footpath on the southern side of the road," Ms Wauchope said.

"We will also extend the footpath to the entry of the gardens at the end of Edmund Street and install appropriate street lighting. "The read will be remained and received


and we will install a safe crossing to and from Barunga Village and the bowling club."

"We appreciate council listened and responded to the house members who contacted them with their concerns," she said.

A budget of \$150,000 has been allocated for the project in the 2021-22 Annual Business Plan and council will call tenders next month.

Maitland police stop two drink drivers in two days



A CENTRAL Yorke Peninsula woman recorded nearly three times the legal blood-alcohol limit on Friday, October 15.

The 47 year old was stopped by Maitland police for a random breath test at 10pm on Robert Street, Maitland, before returning a positive reading.

After being taken to Maitland Police Station for a breath analysis, she recorded a blood-alcohol reading of 0.179.

The woman was reported drink driving, was issued with an immediate 12-month loss of licence and had her vehicle clamped for 28 days.

Police stopped a Henley Beach man for a random breath test at 8.59pm on Saturday, October 16.

After recording a positive result whilst driving on Clinton Road, Maitland, the 38 year old was taken to Maitland Police Station where he recorded a 0.105 bloodalcohol reading.

The man was issued with an immediate six-month loss of licence.

At the centre of the campaign's messaging is an alarming statistic two thirds of lives lost in regional crashes are of people who live in regional areas

SAPOL Assistant Commissioner Ian Parrott said nearly half the people who have died on regional roads this year have resided 20 kilometres or less from the collision site.

"Overwhelmingly the research found people living in regional areas believe it is metropolitan drivers who die on country roads," Ass. Com. Parrott said.

"The common misconception is drivers who know the local roads like the back of their hand are less likely to

be involved in a fatal crash. "Our aim with this campaign is to dispel that myth. We need regional road users to understand they are as susceptible to the fatal five as anyone else.

"Drink or drug driving, not wearing a seatbelt, excessive speeding, distraction and dangerous driving are the behaviours killing people from our regional communities and it needs to stop."

While only 30 per cent of South Australia's population lives in regional areas, 70 per cent of deaths occur on regional roads.

Road Safety Minister Vincent Tarzia said it was shocking how many people have lost their lives in crashes such

short distances from their homes.

"Driving close to home does not guarantee your safety in the regions but this crucial new road safety campaign aims to raise awareness about the Fatal Five and urgently change driver behaviour," Mr Tarzia said.

KMS rolls up for Pfizer jab

PFIZER vaccinations are set to be offered at Kadina Memorial School later this month.

KMS students aged 12 years and older will be eligible to receive vaccinations during school hours, with vaccinations available to parents after school hours.

Other community members will also be able to utilise the hub on weekends.

SA Health will manage the hub in two blocks, each three weeks apart to allow for first and second dose vaccinations.

KMS is one of about 20 schools selected for the program, as announced by the state government on Tuesday, October 12.

A Department for Education spokesperson said schools are in a great position to facilitate the vaccination roll-out.

"(Our) position is parental consent is required for students under 18 years of age to participate in vaccination programs provided during school hours," the spokesperson said.

"However, it's important for families to know under state government law children 16 years and older can consent to their own medical treatment, including vaccination."

Minister for Health and Wellbeing Stephen Wade said the state government is determined to get young people vaccinated.

'These pop-up clinics will help more young people to get fully vaccinated before the end of the school year and before they reach their end-of-year celebrations," Mr Wade said.

"As we move towards our vaccination targets it is crucial we ensure strong vaccination rates across geographical and cultural cohorts across the state?

The new system won't affect those who purchase monthly or annual permits, and will complement the coin-only ticket machines already in place. Currently, single-launch

permits can only be purchased from onsite ticket machines. Information circulating on social media suggested there would be hidden charges associated with the applica-

tion. However, council staff have verified with EasyParks, which is also in operation on the Copper Coast, that this is not the case.

Council also decided those using the app will be charged \$5 per launch, down from \$6

at the coin machines, for the rest of the financial year.

Mayor Darren Braund said there would be no changes to the current payment systems, and the EasyPark app was just one extra new option.

"Our coin machines are still operating, and we will still offer monthly and annual permits," Mr Braund said.

"There is no charge for parking, only for launching, just the same as it already was.

"The Wallaroo and Port Hughes boat ramps already utilise the EasyPark system -it hasn't been a problem there and we don't anticipate it will cause any issues here."

Councillor Naomi Bittner said the incident on social media has been a good learning tool.

"Although it is frustrating that misinformation spreads like wildfire, in some ways it was worthwhile because we did our extra due diligence and staff clarified this is an additional service," Dr Bittner said.

"This is an additional service for people who don't carry cash, there is still the option to purchase in the traditional way."

Key points to new system

- Yorke Peninsula Council is not removing the coin ticket machines
- There will be no changes or additional charges to monthly or annual permits
- There won't be charges to park cars and trailers, it is only for boat launching
- There are no hidden charges nil establishment or monthly account keeping fees charged to users via EasyPark (activation fees in the EasyPark terms and conditions relate to business accounts, not individuals purchasing single-use permits)
- There is no requirement to sign up for monthly membership
- There is no additional cost to ratepayers establishment of the app for council's eight boat ramps is at no financial cost to council
- Signage will be provided by EasyPark for each boat ramp
- A call centre is available from 6.30am to 8.30pm Monday to Friday, and 7.30am to 8.30pm on weekends

Council received more than 100 survey responses, the majority positive, during a public consultation process.

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

A bit of give and take (at grow free cart)

GROW free carts have been popping up all over Australia in recent years, and Kadina is now no exception.

After moving from the Adelaide Hills around five years ago, Josie Watson was inspired to start a grow free cart.

"I used to live in Birdwood and there was a grow free cart there which was really popular and I just love the idea of helping the community," Ms Watson said.

"Then I saw on Facebook a friend had started one outside her work and it was going really well so she put me onto the Grow Free page and after reading through the page I thought ... this is so easy to do!"

Ms Watson started the produce cart on Matta Road about a month ago and contributes some of her own garden produce but said local donations have made up the bulk of the stock.

"It's mostly been the community, they've been amazing, and in the first couple of weeks it was up and running ... I was just gobsmacked," she said.

Grow Free is about giving away or donating free home-grown produce and seedlings so some people give and some people take, or both.

Ms Watson is taking the concept even further by adding more storage space for excess household food stores such as canned food, as well as for toiletry items.

"I've added the little cabinet next to it because there are a lot of people doing it tough out there at the moment on Yorke Peninsula," she said.

So far community reaction has been incredibly positive and has exceeded Ms Watson's most optimistic expectations.

"It's been better than I ever thought it would be and people have acted very honourably," she said.

Ms Watson said her partner had promised to build a bigger cart out of metal with a roof to protect the goods from the weather.

Jobs and careers expo providing new chances

KADINA'S first Local Jobs and Careers Expo was held last Thursday, October 14.

The expo, at the Copper Coast Sport and Leisure Centre in Kadina, had a steady stream of locals come through the door.

It was an opportunity for employers and employees to engage with each other face to face, something that has been missing in the job-seeking process since the onset of the COVID pandemic.

"It bridges the gap between the two, because sometimes job seekers can be a little bit nervous about meeting employers and, sometimes, they just need a little help," employment facilitator Lisa Brock said.

"Job seekers could bring their résumé in, apply for any vacancies available, and by the end of the day, could be walking away with a job."

Companies such as Seven Point Australian Pork, Viterra and Country Home Services were there representing many of the industries on the peninsula.

Representatives from the University of South Australia, Adelaide University, TAFE SA and Flinders University were also present to explain tertiary education.

Ms Brock said it was a chance for the people of Yorke Peninsula to make connections and extend their networks. "Only about a fifth of jobs are actually advertised," she said. "A lot of small businesses, if they're

looking for staff, they ask people they know so a lot of people looking for work are not even seeing what jobs are really advertised.

"I think a lot of employers need to see they need to be really tapping into the local talent, because they can't rely on getting people in from outside the region."

Ms Brock said there was a possibility the expo would return.

"The feedback we get is all really positive, and it's about the visibility and the connections that are really important," Ms Brock said.

"We don't want a hidden jobs market — as there currently is — let's get the jobs out there and work out how we connect the jobs to the people in the community who can do the jobs."

The day marked 50 years since the first St John Ambulance, run by a local group trained in first aid, was stationed in the town in 1971.

Today, the station is still staffed by a group of 15 dedicated volunteer officers who service the Port Broughton district and surrounds.

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Commissioner now enshrined in legislation

ABORIGINAL children and young people will now have stronger voices in South Australia.

Commissioner for Aboriginal Children and Young People April Lawrie now has legislative provisions equivalent to those of the Commissioner for Children and Young People, including powers to conduct systemic inquiries.

Minister for Education John Gardner said more must be done to improve the outcomes of Aboriginal children and young people.

"Aboriginal children and young people are disproportionately represented within the state's most disadvantaged and vulnerable children and youth," he said.

They are more likely to be absent from school and generally have poorer health outcomes than non-Aboriginal children and young people.

"They are also more likely to be subject to out-of-home care and the criminal justice system.

"The challenges which lead to these circumstances are complex, but we believe the Commissioner will assist in improving government services for Aboriginal children and young people.

"It is a very important piece of legislation that will give a voice to many Aboriginal children and young people in a formal way, with the Commissioner acting as their megaphone."

The new laws give Ms Lawrie, a proud Mirning and Kokatha woman, independent authority.

Key areas of focus for the role include improving health, education, child protection and justice outcomes.

Take the pressure down, for your heart's sake



HIGH blood pressure is a key risk factor for heart disease. It is often called the 'silent

killer' because people who

have it often do not have any obvious symptoms.

It is important to get regular blood pressure checks as, over time, high blood pressure can increase your risk of having a heart attack or stroke.

Data from the Heart Foundation reveals 23 per cent of people in the Mid North and Yorke Peninsula region have high blood pressure, which is just above the state average.

Blood pressure is the pres-

sure of your blood on the walls consistently high. of your blood vessels as the heart pumps blood around

your body. It is normal for your blood pressure to go up and down during the day, adjusting to your body's needs, depending on what you are doing.

For example, if you are lifting something heavy it might go up and if you are resting in a chair, it might go down.

With persistent high blood pressure, your readings are Blood pressure is recorded

as two numbers. Systolic blood pressure, the higher number, indicates the pressure in the blood vessels when the heart is contracting or pumping. The lower number is called the diastolic blood pressure, and this is the pressure when the heart is at rest before the next beat.

With high blood pressure your heart must pump with more force than normal,

putting extra strain on your heart.

Think about pumping up the tyres on your pushbike using a handheld pump - at first it is quite easy to do, but as the pressure in the tyre increases it becomes harder to pump

The best thing you can do is to get to know what your blood pressure numbers are.

The Heart Foundation recommends you visit your GP for a heart health check if you are 45 years and over (30 for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people).


Walking 30 minutes each day, maintaining a healthy, balanced diet, limiting your salt and alcohol intake and not smoking will also help you to control your blood pressure.

Pioneer Italian aviators meet Sir Richard

ITALIAN aviator Wing Commander Francesco De Pinedo and Chief Mechanic Ernesto Campanelli's pioneering flight to Australia in 1925 was an important milestone in Australia's relationship with the rest of the world.

This was the third journey by aircraft to Australia, after two from England — Ross and Keith Smith in 1919, and Ray Parer and J. C. McIntosh in 1920.

As impressive as these earlier feats were, the audacity and scale of the Italian airmen's flight to Australia and Japan is as outstanding as it is astonishing.

In Melbourne they were feted by many, including "father" of the Royal Australian Air Force, then Wing Commander Richard Williams.

The pair left from Savoy on April 20, arriving in Adelaide on June 8 and Melbourne on June 9.

Their route home was via Tokyo (September 26) and back to Rome (November 7).

The journey covered approximately 55,000 kilometres during some 370 hours of flight, with periodic stops along the way for rest, refuelling and repairs.

The aircraft was a Savoia S-61 hydroplane baptised Gennariello after St Gennaro, the patron saint of Naples.

De Pinedo and Campanelli reached Australia on May 31 and the Australian press followed the flight closely, giving readers daily reports on progress in evocative and colourful language.


The aviators had "grit", "pluck", and "daring", they wrote, and the world was full of "admiration" for Italy's "illustrious sons" whose voyage "full of hazard" was "without parallel".

Adelaide

When De Pinedo and Campanelli reached Adelaide and alighted at Outer Harbor, they had been in the air for seven weeks and completed about 24,000km.

There was much excitement among Adelaideans, special trains were scheduled so people could attend the arrival, and Port Road was "one long line of motors" on their way to Outer Harbor, many sporting Italian flags. By noon, 10,000 spectators had gathered along the foreshore where "cheers followed cheers". Once ashore, the aviators were met with a "tremendous CIVIC RECEPTION TO THE ITALIAN AIRMEN.





ovation from the assembled crowd".

The welcome was especially warm from Italian immigrants who "waved Italian flags frantically" as De Pinedo and Campanelli walked past.

The aviators were given a formal civic reception at Port Adelaide Town Hall. Toasts and speeches by Premier John Gunn, Port Adelaide mayor Mr A. O. R. Tapp and others extolled the aviators' skill and courage, and saw their achievement as unconditional proof that flying over very long instances was possible. The normally reserved De Pinedo, in English, admitted to being deeply touched and affected by the warm welcome. Italians, he added, had a great feeling of friendship towards the people of Australia which he hoped had been strengthened by his visit. Campanelli, with no English, simply thanked the hosts.

Melbourne

The Italian aviators left Adelaide for Melbourne the following morning, carrying additional fuel and, for their lunch in the air, six hard-boiled eggs (to which De Pinedo was partial) and two bottles of beer (there is no record about whether they drank them midflight).

On reaching Melbourne, Ving Commander Wing Richard Williams, then First Member of the Australian Air Board, was impressed by the remarkable distances made by De Pinedo and Campanelli over six weeks and spoke in admiring terms of the feat, calling it one of the most noteworthy events in the history of aviation, and one that would help convince the community that flying was safe.

complete flight had excited the greatest admiration p among Australian airmen. P

Indeed, Melbourne received the aviators in grand style, their arrival at St Kilda attracting 40,000 people.

On June 11, they were given a large civic reception on behalf of the Commonwealth Government, with Williams representing the AAB; a week later, Williams and wife Constance hosted a dinner party at their flat before a more elaborate celebration with officials from the RAAF, the government and the Italian Consulate. There was a gala night at Melbourne's His Majesty's on June 19 with lavish decorations: gum foliage, lights, festoons and balloons in the Italian colours, and flags of the Allied nations; a model of the Savoia seaplane was suspended over the auditorium. Representatives of the RAAF, including Williams,

the Navy and Army were present, together with Prime Minister Stanley Bruce, many state ministers and government officials.

Other celebratory events were scheduled and Williams was invariably present.

After Melbourne, the Gennariello flew along Australia's east coast and then to Tokyo.

This part of the journey also made history, as it represented the first flight from Australia to Japan and effectively opened up the air route between the two countries.

Sandra's passion for volunteering

SANDRA Ireland is making a difference.

A passionate volunteer, Sandra has been an ambulance officer at Port Broughton for the past 27 years.

"Ultimately, I got asked to be a volunteer ambulance officer after having children but at the time they were young and I wasn't ready," Sandra said.

"When my daughter turned 17 she was interested in joining, so we went to a community information session and we joined — she ended up moving but I stuck with it.

There have been some big changes (during my time) from technology to vehicles, and even how many crew are on board an ambulance.

"There is a lot more equipment in the trucks these days than on the original vehicles and they can track where we go now and provide maps which is helpful.

There is also a lot more training especially on the theory side of things, ambulance officers have to have a lot more knowledge now on things like medication — we travel with a lot more medications now."

Sandra volunteered on the truck for 20 years but now remains predominantly in the station doing various jobs from admin, to helping with trainings and being a general soundboard for other volunteers.

"A lot of people would come up to me and say 'oh I couldn't be a volun-



teer I don't like blood," she said. "I don't think I saw all that much blood in my entire 20 years on the

truck to be honest. "Most of the time the patient would be at their front door with their bags packed because in our region it's always more retired people seeking assistance.

"We always had callouts very close

each station always serviced their own area — now ambulances travel a lot further and can be called out to various surrounding towns depending on volunteer numbers, what vehicles are available and where, and the urgency and need."

Sandra said she was able to gain a lot of skills as a volunteer ambulance officer.

"I learned so many skills I was able to use in everyday life," she said.

"And, if I ever came across an accident I had those skills and the knowledge to really help and make a difference.

"It was always nice to see how relieved people were to see us so in that sense it was really nice as well but you definitely get more out of volun-

teering than you put in - well I do anyway."

Sandra also spends her time volunteering with various other community groups.

"I am the treasurer at our local church, president of the quilting group, I volunteer at Meals on Wheels and with the Port Broughton parkrun, and I help out with the netball and football clubs when I'm needed because I used to umpire netball and I still enjoy going to watch," she said.

"It's just nice to be involved in the community and mixing with different people.

"I think it's really important to be involved in activities and groups and keep things going in the community.

"We have a really good mix of older and younger people volunteering around town and I truly believe you'll always get something out of volunteering."

Sandra was born in Crystal Brook and grew up in Wandearah where she attended primary school before completing high school in Port Pirie.

"I then worked at the Ford dealership for about five years before meeting my husband Lynton and we moved to the farm in Wokurna and had three children," she said.

"We now live in Port Broughton and spend a lot of our time with our eight grandkids.

"Besides volunteering I also enjoy gardening, reading and sewing.

"I'm definitely looking forward to doing some more travelling when COVID permits."



"We duck and weave to avoid mentioning a number for fear it means we're entering old age, as though that label somehow defines us," a COTA spokesperson said.

"We have an irrational fear of getting older.

"The result is that, as a community and as individuals, we are at grave risk of wasting our older years.

"We are in danger of treating our older years with disdain and writing them off as if they have little value, even though we've worked so hard to get them.

"Our significant investment in clever public health over the last century has resulted in longer and healthier lives.

"As children, we are impatient to grow up fast and be older. Now that time's here, we should own it. We need to reject the use by date imposed

by ageism.

"The challenge for our community is to reframe ageing, to grasp the opportunity of our longevity, and to explore what the possibilities may be."

COTA SA is also encouraging people to reject the stereotypes about old and rewire the rulebook.

"We also need to tackle the phenomenon that many older

South Australians increasingly feel as they age — invisibility," the spokesperson said.

"Older people are disproportionately underrepresented in the media and in popular culture, despite being the fastest growing and largest segment of the population.

"Worse still, when they are, their appearance often panders to the stereotypes and is littered with ageist overtones. "Older age is made to look frail, sad, poor, and lonely.

"There is a move to refer to International Day of Older Persons, designated by the United Nations, as Ageism Awareness Day.

"It's a move that COTA SA fully supports.

"It's well and truly time that we fronted up to the damage that ageism has done and continues to do."





A talk on a park bench

THERE'S an interesting painting by William DeBurgh. It depicts a young man sitting next to Jesus on a park bench.

The young man is questioning Jesus, asking, "So why do you allow things like hate, famine, war, suffering, disease, crime and homelessness to exist in

our world?" In the painting, Jesus replies, "Interesting that you should ask because I was about to ask you the same question."

We live in a world where the things the young man asked about definitely exist.

Sometimes, like the COVID-19 virus, they hurt and destroy lives. The incredibly sad scenes in Afghanistan testify to how hate, war and suffering can tear families and societies apart.

Some people including our young man on the park bench ask, "If there's a God, why does He allow all this bad stuff to happen?"

But can we really blame God?

The point is we've been created with a free will. We're able to make decisions. At least some of the issues raised by the man on the

park bench can be resolved by us.

We can stop hating, we can share food, we can stop fighting for a start. If we have the will, we can work together to reduce suffering, diseases, crime and homelessness.

Omega-3 eye drop for dry eye disease

A post-market study of eye drop NovaTears + Omega-3 has shown it is a significantly effective treatment for evaporative dry eye disease, Australasian drug company AFT Pharmaceuticals managing director Dr Hartley Atkinson said.

The eye drop is said to be the first that combines the tear film stabiliser perfluorohexyloctane with a high-quality, vegan-sourced omega-3 fatty acid. According to AFT, the study showed the therapy delivered significant improvements in dry eye symptoms in 36 patients over eight weeks.

"The improvements were evident on a broad range of measures including total corneal staining and tear film break-up time," Dr Atkinson said.

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

Poole announces retirement

Kadina's Angus Poole officially announced his retirement from Woodville-West Torrens at the club's best and fairest count on Friday, October 15.

Poole, 28, started playing with the Eagles in the under 15 development sides and will hang up his boots after a 155-game career.

During that time, Poole has claimed two premiership medallions, the latest as part of the Eagles victory against Glenelg earlier this month.

Poole claimed the Reserves Magarey Medal in 2012 and was the leading vote catcher in the same award the following year but was ineligible due to suspension.

Poole and 34-year-old veteran Patrick Giuffreda both announced their retirement on the night.

Noted for this team-first attitude, Poole was a hard-running and fearless midfielder and small forward, having a strong football skillset and a never say die attitude.

He left no stone unturned in getting

the best out of himself across more than a decade in the Eagles colours.

"Gus is an absolute competitor; he hates getting beaten and really loves the one-on-one contest," captain Luke Thompson said.

"You know exactly what you are going to get every time Gus dons the Eagles jumper.

"He loves the place and is well respected by the entire playing group.

"I couldn't speak highly enough of Angus as a person and a player around the club.

"He's a pretty quiet person around the

group, but when he speaks the boys listen and he's a real character.

"Ultimately from a football perspective, he's a player that is prepared to go above and beyond for his teammates."

Poole was also a member of the Eagles Reserves flag in 2014.

This year he finished seventh in the best and fairest count and also secured the Best Team Man accolade.

"I leave the club satisfied as I can be, but you would have still liked to have


won a couple more (premierships)," Poole said.

"It (the club) has been a significant part of my life across the past 10 years and more.

"I have a strong friendship group I have come through grades at the club with.

"The club has played a role in shaping me as a person as well."







Three-dimension archery is quite different to ABA Paper; it tests an archer's ability to judge the distance and their accuracy.

A two-arrow round was shot first up each day, with adult and junior archers shooting off the main peg, and then there was a walk-up, whilst the cubs only shoot from their main peg; second rounds for each day were shot from their main pegs.

The scoring system is 20 for a kill, 16 for a vital and 10 for a wound, which relates to zones on each of the targets.



CFS initiates trial to join forces with farmers

A NEW program being trialled by the SA Country Fire Service will provide better coverage for farm firefighting unit operators this fire danger season.

The program will specifically look to provide registered operators who register with better access to safety and insurance arrangements.

CFS executive director frontline services support Georgie Cornish said the trial program builds on the recommendations of the Keelty Review.

"We are encouraging owners of FFUs to register with the CFS so we can work together when they respond with our volunteers to bushfires," Ms Cornish said.

"By better coordinating our approach with FFU operators

on the fireground, we will be able to provide improved support for everyone helping on the fireground."

CFS Northern Yorke group officer David Bussenschutt said the relationship between the CFS and farmers was very important and working together made so much sense.

"The farming community and the CFS have worked together for many years and many CFS members are farmers, or have ties to the industry, and they understand fire behaviour and the land," Mr Bussenschutt said.

"Having your FFU registered with the CFS helps the CFS identify resources and people who are actually on the fireground for larger fires where this is so important.

"There are plenty of benefits for the farmers including two way communication of what's actually happening, making sure we are all safe, catering for ongoing incidents and, most importantly, insurance if things go wrong."

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said FFUs played a vital role in assisting the CFS fight fires and farmers were often first on the scene.

"CFS is currently trialling a state-wide program designed to improve support and communication for farm firefighting operators and I am very keen to receive feedback on the trial that is requiring registrations and logging on and off the system," Mr Ellis said.

"I ask local farmers to please contact me with your views and experiences with this trial."

Operators are encouraged to register their units and find more details about the program at cfs.sa.gov.au/prepare-for-afire/farm-fire-units/.







Members of the public may notice noise, vibration, flashes and/or smoke during the testing. There is no risk to the public outside of the gazetted Defence Practice Areas.

For reasons of public safety, there is a permanent exclusion zone covering land, sea and air around the Port Wakefield Establishment. Specific details on the Port Wakefield Prohibited Area can be obtained from Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No GN 26, 4 July 1990, and is shown on the diagram below. Trespassing in this Area is strictly prohibited and very dangerous due to the presence of unexploded bombs. Any person found within the Prohibited Area or on Defence land will be subject to prosecution.

Specific test and evaluation activities may also require restricting public access to the Port Wakefield Defence Practice Areas over specific periods with these areas articulated in the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No. GN 40, 7 October 1992, and also identified on the diagram below. This may affect access to the Gulf of St Vincent at Port Wakefield and Port Parham.

George whiting from Point Riley, the Boiler grounds and Bird Reef. Several crews were also running berley trails south of the jetty seeking gar, blue crabs and tommy ruff (Australian herring). Gar and snook are also out from Tickera and the Magazine. Jetty fishing has been quiet.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Good catches of KG whiting continue from Coopers, Cape Elizabeth and the grounds just west of Tipara Reef. Gar and squid are in the bay with a few small blueys, while the jetties have ruff and squid.

Point Turton: KG whiting are in the bay for the canny boat crews who drift their boats here and the broken grounds out from Point Souttar and all the way down to The Pines. Gar are again up around Chinaman Wells and Port Rickaby with jetty fishing flathead, red nannygai, sweep, flathead and snook. The small whale carcass is still affecting the fishing off Port Moorowie.

Edithburgh: I enjoyed a catch of mediumsized tommies when I checked in here in the early part of last week, but this particular jetty has its secret spots as a couple of KG whiting were landed from the north-east end. Boat crews are fishing for whiting, snook and gar from Troubridge Point, Marion Reef and Sultana Point/Wattle Bay.

Ardrossan/Black Point: Blue swimmer crabs have started a decent run here and south to Black Point as tides improved in the latter part of the week. Whiting are off Tiddy Widdy Beach and just south of Windara Reef while shore-based anglers are trying for yellowfin whiting from the Pine Point wharf. *Tight lines and see you next week*
