

A month on from YP health recommendations...

YORKE Peninsula communities are still waiting for the state government's response to a report on regional health services, tabled in parliament more than a month ago.

The Economic and Finance Committee, which led the review, tabled the Inquiry into Delivery of Health Services on the Yorke Peninsula report in the South Australian Parliament on Wednesday, September 17.

In a statement issued today, Tuesday, October 21, Health Minister Chris Picton said the government was continuing to consider the report's recommendations and would provide a response to parliament "within the next few months".

"Consultation is currently underway to help the Yorke and Northern Local Health Network develop its Yorke Peninsula Plan 2026-2031, which will provide the blueprint for health service delivery and improvements to help meet changing community needs over the next five years," Mr Picton said.

"Community input will be considered alongside submissions from local doctors, allied health providers, the findings of the Economic and Finance Committee, and feedback already gathered through local hospitals."

The inquiry's recommendations include upgrading services at Wallaroo Hospital, developing emergency departments at Yorketown and Maitland hospitals, expanding volunteer ambulance crews, introducing community-based mental health practitioners, and providing hospital

support for emergency department presentations.

Proposals also covered changes to the Patient Assisted Transport Scheme to increase subsidies and make it easier to access, along with measures to attract and retain doctors, nurses and allied health staff in the region.

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said he had not yet received a response to a letter he wrote to Minister Picton on September 22, imploring urgent delivery of the report's 16 recommendations.

Mr Ellis led the petition which recorded more than 10,000 signatures and triggered the formal inquiry and report.

"We await the government's response to the recommendations which ... I described as underwhelming with far too many resolutions to 'consider' or 'further investigate' despite the clear evidence of an ill health system that was presented in the more than 80 written submissions received," Mr Ellis said.

"The comprehensive submissions from The People's Health Voice and the South Australian Council of Social Services, as well as those from impacted constituents and stakeholders that included health advisory councils, medical practices, and local councils, all had a common theme.

"Urgent action is needed and existing health service delivery on YP is lacking.

"Hearing the evidence and in many cases heartbreak, sorrow and anger from constituents who have directly experienced a local health service that is not meeting community needs has been, as the local MP, at times, personally harrowing."



Roster doctors to work in regions

I READ with interest the article, Have your say on Yorke Peninsula's health services (Yorke Peninsula Country Times 14-10-25).

Having required health services during the COVID-19 pandemic, I learned firsthand of the tremendous pressure the dedicated health staff were under then.

This pressure existed before the pandemic, continues now and will persist unless tougher decisions are made about our current South Australian health system. However, we must be mindful that problems within our health system reflect a broader national issue.

Any changes made to the state system must be done in a way other states can also implement, so the systems are consistent with each other.

We need to address the reluctance of some health staff to work in regional areas.

This can only occur if there are major changes, supported by federal and state governments and endorsed by the trade unions, with changes that impact both public and private practices.

My suggestion to improve the SA health system — and importantly, to attract highly trained medical staff, especially doctors, to regional areas — is as follows:

- All medical staff, including experienced practitioners and trainees working in both public and private urban practices, should be placed on a state medical rostering system.
- This system would require them to serve a set period in regional areas each year.
- Failure to do so could result in medical registration or licences being suspended until regional service requirements are met.

Sure, there would be administrative challenges and initial costs, but over time this approach would likely be more cost effective than the current system, which relies on offering high financial incentives to attract medical practitioners to regional areas.

This approach has not worked, and regional areas risk being staffed by less experienced medical practitioners treating conditions they are unfamiliar with.

Media reports from South Australia and other states suggest health systems are nearing crisis point. With a growing population, I believe urgent change is needed.

These suggestions for regional health reform are directed to the Yorke and Northern Local Health Network, with the hope they receive strong support from Yorke Peninsula residents.

This would enable the YNLHN to take these proposals to government, with the goal of significantly improving essential medical services in our region — and potentially in other regional areas across Australia.

OUR VIEW

Running out of patience

LIKE a long night spent in the Emergency Department waiting to see a doctor, the people of Yorke Peninsula have to draw on their reserves of patience while we wait for the state government to respond to the report on YP health services.

Despite the fact it was tabled in parliament more than a month ago, Health Minister Chris Picton seems in no hurry to give his government's response to its 16 recommendations, declaring in a statement today he would respond "within the next few months".

Mr Picton then went on to list some of the improvements the government had already made to health services on YP, which are all very welcome but clearly not enough to address the fundamental gaps identified in the report and its recommendations to fix them.

These include the need to increase services and the tiny 21-bed capacity at Wallaroo Hospital; creating emergency departments at the Yorketown and Maitland hospitals; the need for mental health support for hospital inpatients and emergency department presentations; and initiatives to tackle the dire lack of health professionals across the region.

Many of the improvements Mr Picton listed had already been made when the 80 written submissions and countless oral submissions were made to the inquiry by health consumers, health professionals, medical practices, local councils and advocacy groups.

Now he is urging health professionals and consumers to again provide input by helping Yorke and Northern Local Health Network develop its Yorke Peninsula Plan 2026-2031.

The more than 10,000 people who signed the petition that sparked the health inquiry, and the many groups and individuals that made submissions, have already made their demands clear.

It's time for the state government to get on with the job of implementing the report's recommendations.



Tourism board visit coincides with World Heritage milestone

THE Australian Cornish Mining Sites: Burra and Moonta are one step closer to being inscribed on the World Heritage List.

After the site's preliminary assessment request was submitted to the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) in September, it passed technical checks and is now included in the International Council on Monuments and Sites (ICOMOS) Preliminary Assessment workplan for the coming year.

Notified last week by the UNESCO World Heritage Centre, this milestone marks a significant advance in the journey towards a formal nomination.

"World Heritage recognition would not only honour our past, it would also create opportunities for tourism, education and community pride," Copper Coast Council mayor Roslyn Talbot said.

If successful, the listing could drive tourism growth of up to 250 per cent.

The announcement coincided with a visit to Moonta Mines by the South Australian Tourism Commission Board, as part of the ongoing World Heritage mission, on Thursday, October 16.

Mayor Talbot and National Trust SA Moonta branch president Sharron Ward welcomed the board and acknowledged the efforts of staff and volunteers behind the bid.

The consortium leading the bid is working with the tourism minister, neighbouring councils, SATC and local tourism groups, and will meet with the Mid North and Yorke Tourism Zone chief executive in the coming week.

Mrs Ward said the milestone recognised the decades of community care invested in the site.

"Our volunteers have dedicated countless hours to preserving and sharing this history," she said.

"It's rewarding to see that work acknowledged on an international stage."

More than \$4.8 million has been invested in conservation and visitor infrastructure at Moonta Mines, including restoration of the Hughes Enginehouse, stabilisation works, museum upgrades, signage, new trails and a 3.2-kilometre walkway that connect with the Walk the Yorke network and the WallaroonMoonta bike path.

Work also continues with Narungga and Ngadjuri partners to ensure truth-telling, cultural interpretation and connection to Country remain central to the visitor experience.

Project coordinator Holly

Cowan said the site continued to resonate with visitors.

"Every view across Moonta Mines is striking," she said.

"It's a place where history and heritage meet the moment — and, according to my children, it's the best backdrop for a selfie."

Site significance

The Australian Cornish Mining Sites are internationally recognised for their rare example of Cornish settlement patterns, mining and smelting technologies, and the social fabric that once drove South Australia's economic growth.

"They tell a powerful story of resilience, innovation and community," a consortium spokesperson said.

"Cornish traditions, road names - and even the humble pasty continue to shape the region's identity today."

Severe weather warning in place for state

SOUTH Australians have been warned to brace for wild weather predicted to sweep across the state today (Tuesday, October 21) and Wednesday, October

Storm activity is expected to form over the West Coast and Eyre Peninsula and move through the Mid North, Yorke Peninsula, Adelaide and the Riverland during the day.

The Bureau of Meteorology has issued strong wind warnings for the west, central and south-central coasts, Spencer Gulf, Gulf St Vincent and Investigator

Storm force wind warnings have been issued for Wednesday for the southcentral and south-east coasts as the cold front is expected to move over land.

These storms are likely bring heavy rainfall and lighting with residents encouraged to take steps to be weather ready.

Storm tips

In preparation for any wild weather, the SA State Emergency Service advises to secure loose outdoor items, check and clear gutters, downpipes and drains to prevent blockages, trim trees and branches that could fall on your home or property, fix any damage to your roof and check your insurance policy is current and covers storm damage.

During a storm, it's important to look after yourself and others.

Stay indoors and away from windows, never drive, ride or walk through floodwater, find safe shelter if outdoors, bring pets and animals inside to keep them safe, check on your neighbours, and take extra care when driving as you may not be able to see very well and trees and branches may have fallen across the road.

Power outages have ready occurred across the state with SA Power Networks advising residents to keep their phones and devices charged, find torches and check the batteries, have a plan if you rely on life-support or medical equipment and stay at least 10 metres away from fallen powerlines.

Telco complaints revealed in report

RESIDENTS across Yorke Peninsula made 69 complaints to the Telecommunications Industry Ombudsman in 2024-25, according to its newly released annual report.

Breakdown by council area shows 35 complaints from Yorke Peninsula Council, 28 from Copper Coast Council and six from Barunga West Council.

The most common issue was no or delayed action by providers, which accounted for 22 complaints in Yorke Peninsula Council, 19 in Copper Coast and four in Barunga West.

The figures form part of the TIO's annual report, which revealed a total of 57,592 complaints were received nationally in the 2024-25 financial year — a 1.6 per cent increase from the previous year.

Ombudsman Cynthia Gebert said, while complaint levels remain relatively steady, ongoing issues signal that more needs to be done.

"We're seeing more people struggle with mobile services," Ms Gebert said.

"People are telling us they can't use their phones —or they're struggling to pay to stay connected.

"When you can't rely on your mobile connection, it's not just frustrating, it can stop your life in its tracks.

"Your mobile is your link to safety, support and everyday life."

Yorke Peninsula experienced a region-wide blackout in March that cut power and disabled phone towers, highlighting the impact of unreliable telecommunications.

"If you're struggling with a phone or internet problem, contact your telco first," Ms Gebert said.

"If they can't help, or you're not satisfied with their response, reach out to us for support."

Election to fill Innes/Penton Vale seat

A SUPPLEMENTARY election will be held to fill the vacant councillor position for Yorke Peninsula Council's Innes/ Penton Vale Ward.

The vacancy follows Councillor Kylie Gray's recent confirmation as mayor, replacing former mayor Darren Braund, who stepped down in May.

The voters' roll for the election closes at 5pm on Friday, October 31.

Residents already on the state or federal electoral roll are automatically included. However, landlords, organisations, business owners or occupiers, and resident non-Australian citizens must re-enrol before that date to be eligible to vote.

Nominations for candidates will open on Thursday, November 20, and close at 12 noon on Thursday, December 4.

The election will be conducted via postal vote, with ballots to be dispatched to voters by the Electoral Commission of South Australia between January 13 and 19.

All completed ballot material must then be returned to ECSA before noon on February 9, with the count to take place the next day.

Mr Picton said the current government had increased the Yorke and Northern Local Health Network's operating budget by more than 40 per cent, from \$173 million to \$243M, compared with the final budget of the preceding government.

Four salaried doctors had been recruited for Wallaroo Hospital, including a director of emergency medicine who worked across the Wallaroo and Port Pirie hospitals.

"This year the YNLHN has four intern doctors and resident medical officers working across the YNLHN, including at Wallaroo and Maitland hospitals," Mr Picton said.

"In July we deployed 12 career paramedics to the Yorke Peninsula for the first time ever.

"Currently based in Moonta, they will move to the Wallaroo Ambulance Station after its upgrade and expansion is complete.

The paramedics were providing vital frontline services on a 24/7 basis and would be joined by a new community paramedic deployed to YP by the end of this year," he said.

Mr Picton said a six-bed rehabilitation unit had been opened at Wallaroo Hospital and 24/7 security implemented, while the helipads at the Wallaroo and Port Broughton hospitals had been upgraded.

Council defends employee over parking remarks

COPPER Coast Council has declined to comment on reports it is considering legal action against a Moonta ratepayer over remarks made on social media about a parking

According to ABC News, Brad Galloway — who resides in a commercial-zoned property on Ellen Street — posted a series of messages accusing Copper Coast Council of "revenue raising".

The ABC also reported Mr Galloway said the council refused to issue him a permit to park in front of his property

He criticised the council for use of number plate recognition cameras for parking enforcement, the report said (https://tinyurl.com/bddhb-

Council began use of its artificial intelligence system for parking enforcement, Aero Ranger, on July 1 after a year of trials.

ABC reported that Mr Galloway had received a letter from lawyers representing the council in response to the remarks, describing them as offensive and potentially de-

The letter said the council would consider legal action if Mr Galloway did not take the posts down.

In a statement issued yesterday, Monday, October 20, CCC chief executive Dylan Strong said council had "no comment in relation to reported legal proceedings".

"However, in relation to the treatment of our team members, council seeks to ensure the safety and wellbeing of all employees while they are at work," Mr Strong said.

"Any instance of offensive or threatening behaviour directed to staff will not be accepted.

In the same statement, council development services director Müller Mentz said parking restrictions were signposted in the areas they covered.

"However, parking in front of a driveway, whether it is commercial or residential, constitutes an offence," he said.

As reported by the YP Country Times on July 29 ("Not a fine day to park") Copper Coast residents were in uproar after receiving parking fines raised via Aero Ranger.

Employees and businesses expressed frustration that the system did not account for whether a vehicle had been moved before being deemed to have overstayed the four-hour limit in Taylor Street, Kadina, resulting in \$65 fines.

Council voted at its August meeting to convert a section of Taylor Street to unlimited parking while retaining the four-hour limit in another.

Mr Strong said at the time that council would do a traffic management study to determine which parking bays would have changed time limits.

A council spokesperson said today (Tuesday, October 21) a consultant had been engaged to conduct the study in the first half of next year.

Mr Mentz said no complaints had been received about the Aero Ranger in re-

Port Moorowie ramp to reopen

FISHERS have welcomed the start of repair works at the Port Moorowie boat ramp, which has been closed since May due to storm damage.

In a statement issued yesterday (Monday, October 20), a Yorke Peninsula Council spokesperson said preliminary works had commenced, with most on-site repairs expected to be completed next week.

The repairs would enable safe public access to the ramp once again, the spokesperson said.

Commercial fishers Shane Bishop, of Yorketown, and Russell Boord, Port Moorowie, welcomed the announcement.

"This is good news for the local community, commercial fishers and recreational users of the boat ramp," Mr Bishop said.

"We appreciate the council progressing these works.

"Having access to this ramp again gives us more options to work with during this difficult period where many traditional fishing grounds are desolate due to the algal bloom.

"Access to this ramp will help reduce travel time and expense whilst providing a safer option to access other areas in certain weather conditions."

Mr Bishop emailed YPC on September 2 to request the ramp be reopened.

"This ramp closure is causing significant inconvenience, particularly for our commercial fishers who are already struggling due to the current harmful algae bloom," Mr Bishop

"The closure of this ramp and others is exacerbating their difficulties.

"In addition to the situation at Port Moorowie, our commercial fishers have been dealing with less-thanideal launching conditions at Marion

Bay and Pondalowie Bay.
"The recent closure of the Point Souttar ramp during roadworks has only added to their challenges."

Mr Boord said he was pleased the ramp would reopen and expressed concern about ongoing vandalism at the site, including an incident on Friday, October 17.

He said that on Saturday morning, he discovered signs, large rocks and a mound of soil — placed by council to block access - had been moved so people could use the dirt road

leading to the ramp.

"This is the fifth time this vandalism has happened over the past few months, just so a few greedy people can go and catch fish.

"The fish should be protected at this point in time until proper fish stock assessments have been done by PIRSA Fisheries, as these may be the fish that replenish the stocks that have been decimated due to the harmful algal bloom."

The YPC spokesperson said commercial fishers have been offered free boat launch permits for this financial year, or refunds if they had already purchased the permits.

"These allow them to use any of council's 33 boat launching facilities, almost all of which have remained accessible since the midyear storms, at no charge.

'This is one of several ways council

has supported the industry during the ongoing harmful algal bloom."

Damon Bishop, who grew up on Yorke Peninsula and works at Roxby Downs, is the third generation in his family to fish at Port Moorowie.

"We have seen storm damage before, but not to this extent," he said about the ramp.

"In our lives we've never seen it wash the road out.

"It's just often there's a little sand dune in front of it and that comes and goes.

"But that event (in May) was an extraordinary one."

He said the availability of recreational fishing and diving at Port Moorowie was important for the YP economy, particularly given that both activities were restricted at locations further north in Gulf St Vincent because of the algal bloom.

Fishers support gulf ban

YORKE Peninsula's commercial fishers have again called for a ban on all fishing in Gulf St Vincent to allow stocks to rebuild.

Russell Boord, of Port Moorowie, said the extent of the damage caused by the bloom required drastic measures, and backed the request for a ban made by commercial fishers to the Senate's algal bloom inquiry committee in Ardrossan in early September.

"Most commercial fishermen I know are in agreement of shutting the gulf because they can't go out and catch enough to make a living," Mr Boord said.

"I know it's going to hurt the economy but an (environmental) collapse is much worse."

The state government has employed Mr Boord to do water testing around oyster leases in Gulf St Vincent since

He said the reason it was known there were brevetoxins around the leases was because those areas were being tested intensively, unlike other areas of the gulf.

Brevetoxins are natural toxins produced by certain microscopic algae in seawater. These toxins can build up in shellfish that feed by filtering water.

"The brevetoxins can't be just where the oyster leases are, it's in the whole system," Mr Boord said.

He said state government officials had admitted that brevetoxins had also been found in the foam that has washed up on beaches as a result of the algal bloom.

Yorketown-based commercial fisher Shane Bishop said he stood by the request he made to Primary Industries Minister Clare Scriven in June for all fishing in the gulf to be closed.

"Stocks in Gulf St Vincent are under extreme duress - losses of biomass, losses of habitat, interrupted spawning season, some species have become prone to overfishing as they move away from the bloom and are confined to smaller areas," he said.

"I personally would consider any fishing in the gulf as unsustainable. Why is the precautionary principle not being applied in this circum-

"Whilst we are hopeful things will rebound quickly once the bloom clears, I am fearful that this won't be the case — it may take a long time for habitat and stocks to recover."

"If weather patterns remain consistent with the last few years, we may also see a repeat of this bloom in summer, which will be a nail in the coffin for stocks in this fishery."

PIRSA fisheries and aquaculture executive director Gavin Begg told a community algal bloom forum in Minlaton on August 14 that decisions about stock management should wait until the completion of "rapid" stock assessments. He said the assessment, which was announced on July 22, had not begun.

In early October, Minister Scriven said fish stock assessments had been "underway for weeks" and completed for the prawn, blue crab, abalone and rock lobster fisheries.

Conservation group ready to reef

LARGE-SCALE shellfish reef restoration has the potential to turn the tide on the toxic algal bloom affecting South Australia — and help prevent similar marine disasters across the country.

That's the advice from The Nature Conservancy, the organisation behind Windara Reef, the native oyster reef built offshore from Ardrossan.

"Communities are hurting and demanding answers," Dr Michaela Dommisse, TNC director of oceans, Australia, said

"We have one - reef resto-

"It's proven, it's working and it starts with the humble oyster, the water filters or kidneys of

Dr Dommisse said TNC was keen to get involved in building more oyster reefs around Yorke Peninsula.

She was responding to a joint announcement by the state and federal governments last week of a \$102.5 million algal bloom summer plan, with \$20.6M to be invested in environmental projects (see opposite).

About half of the environmental project budget will be spent on construction of new limestone native oyster reefs and additional community recycled reefs, built using recycled ovster shells.


In addition to Windara, TNC has also built oyster reefs at Glenelg and O'Sullivan Beach.

"We know how to do this in South Australia and have seen cleaner water, more fish and greater coastal resilience for all the reef builds," she said.

"What we need now is scale.

"By establishing a strategically designed network of reefs across the Gulf (St Vincent), we can create the natural filtration and nutrient balance needed to reverse harmful algal blooms and, over time, enable the marine system to self-repair through nature's own processes."

Australia once hosted vast shellfish reef ecosystems, pri-

marily built by native oysters and mussels, that spanned the southern coastline for tens of thousands of years, Dr Dommisse said.

"Over the past century, 99 per cent of these ecosystems have been destroyed by dredging and overharvest, leaving our coasts exposed to biodiversity loss and environmental shocks, like the

"Large-scale shellfish reef restoration is essential infrastruc-

Dr Dommisse said use of the tipping point restoration strategy could help prevent future algal blooms in SA, by reaching the scale of ecosystem rebuilding that allow ecosystems to start self-repairing.

"In the context of SA's gulfs, it means restoring the minimum number of shellfish reefs in the right locations, so their combined filtration, nutrient removal and habitat creation begin to shift the system from decline to recovery.

"Once this ecological threshold is reached, water becomes clearer, seagrass returns, fish populations grow and harmful algal blooms diminish without constant human intervention.

"It is about restoring a connected network of reefs large enough to trigger lasting change - moving from small, isolated projects to a system-wide transformation that lets nature do the heavy lifting."

Dr Dommisse said the tipping point strategy drew on lessons from Shinnecock Bay in New York, where restoring shellfish reefs across just two per cent of the bay was enough to reverse decades of brown tide blooms.

"Applying this model in SA would allow local ecosystems to reach a tipping point where nature begins to heal itself, improving water quality, fisheries and coastal resilience.

Dr Dommisse said, since its creation between 2017 and 2020, Windara Reef had restored 20 hectares of lost native flat ovster reefs in Gulf St Vincent and seeded more than seven million oysters, averaging about 80 adults per square metre, exceeding global recovery benchmarks.

Monitoring had shown a four-fold rise in fish with pink snapper, blue swimmer crabs and other species returning in abundance, with the reef providing a complex habitat for invertebrates and seagrass re-

While TNC welcomed the SA Government's \$20.6M announcement, Dr Dommisse said far greater investment was needed from all levels of government, and corporate and philanthropic partners.

Reefs and robots to tackle algae

A \$37.9 MILLION environmental package announced last week will support efforts to combat harmful algal blooms and includes the construction of oyster reefs, breeding of threatened marine species, enhanced water monitoring and forecasting, and the use of AI-powered submersible cytobots.

The funding forms part of the broader \$102.5 million algal bloom summer plan, announced by Premier Peter Malinauskas and Federal Environment and Water Minister Murray Watt, to protect South Australia's coastline, support coastal communities and safeguard the state's summer lifestyle (see YPCT 14-10-2025).

The environmental and scientific measures include:

• Building large-scale native oyster reefs in South Australia's gulfs to support the natural growth of oyster reefs

 Constructing additional community recycled oyster reefs using recycled shells to create habitats for oysters and marine life

• Restoring seagrass in Gulf St Vincent to filter excess nutrients, improve water quality and support bacteria that inhibit algal growth

· Breeding and restocking threatened marine species affected by the algal bloom

• Expanding real-time ocean monitoring and forecasting, with buoys at key locations integrated with ocean modelling and AI forecasting to detect blooms early

• Analysing deep waters in Gulf St Vincent, Spencer Gulf and the southern Fleurieu Peninsula to better understand how offshore and onshore algal blooms form and spread

• Establishing a \$3.2M SA-based Office for Algal Bloom Research, serving as a national hub for longterm algal bloom research and coordination

• Launching a \$1M trial of AI-

powered submersible cytobots to improve real-time detection of harmful algal blooms and understand phytoplankton communities,

• Trialling mitigation techniques in controlled waterways (such as rivers, estuaries and lakes), including clay-based methods and gyroid absorbent sponge technology.

Mr Malinauskas said the environmental and scientific measures would put SA on the quickest path to recovery from the damage caused by the algal bloom.

"This plan isn't just about responding to a challenge, it's about ensuring our coastline remains vibrant this summer and for years to come," he said.

Mr Watt said the algal bloom was being tackled from all angles, and the federal government would continue to work closely with the SA Government.

"We're delivering funding for the science and environmental meaensure South Australia is at the forefront of our country's algal bloom research," Mr Watt said.

Opposition, Greens call for more

Recent announcements under the algal bloom summer plan have drawn a range of responses from across the community.

State Opposition leader Vincent Tarzia said South Australians were frustrated with the "belated and piecemeal" approach to navigating the algal bloom.

"It's been heartbreaking seeing fish dying, businesses collapsing and communities impacted by the algal bloom and this investment is finally an acknowledgement of the scale of this disaster," Mr Tarzia said.

This support should have come much sooner and spared much of the devastation that's been felt since March, he said.

"We're pleased to see the gov-

sures to help marine life recover and ernment has included many of the measures we have been calling for over the past few months, and we will continue to advocate for more medium to long-term support, especially for our commercial fishers and the environment."

> The Greens welcomed the package, particularly the funding for scientific research and remediation, which they had previously called for, Greens MLC and chair of parliament's joint inquiry into the harmful algal bloom, Robert Simms, said.

> However, he also raised concerns about the root causes of the crisis and the need for broader discussions on the environmental impact of industrial activity, including fossil

> Mr Simms continued calls for stronger action to prevent future algal blooms, including policy changes to address climate-related factors and reduce nutrient runoff into South Australian waters.

\$50 sweetener for coastal dining

BUSINESS registration for the state government's Coast is Calling Dining Cashback initiative is now open.

The \$15 million scheme is part of the government's algal bloom summer plan and Tourism Minister Zoe Bettison said it would support food service businesses — including on Yorke Peninsula — impacted by the algal bloom by encouraging customers to dine along the coast.

"Coupled with the Coast is Calling travel vouchers, this initiative will provide a vital boost to coastal tourism and hospitality businesses, bringing hundreds of thousands of muchneeded customers to restaurants, pubs, cafes, takeaways and kiosks over the summer months," she said.

During summer, 300,000 South Australians who receive a voucher through public ballots will be able to redeem 50 per cent off the value of their meal at participating businesses, to get cash back up to \$50.

Ms Bettison said the Dining

Cashback initiative had been designed to be simple for businesses, with a single electronic form that could be completed in less than 10 minutes.

Registrations opened yesterday, Monday, October 20, and will remain open throughout summer.

Eligible businesses are in coastal postcodes in algal bloom impacted areas, consistent with the current Coast is Calling travel voucher program.

A check of the Coast is Calling website showed that YP postcodes — from Port Broughton to Marion Bay, including inland towns such as Maitland and Yorketown, plus Port Wakefield — are included in the scheme.

Participating businesses must serve food, including restaurants, cafes, pubs, clubs, as well as takeaway venues such as fish and chip shops, although some exclusions apply.

The first public ballot will open on Monday, November 3, and close on Sunday, November 9. The first 60,000 South Australians to receive a voucher will be able to buy a meal at their favourite coastal business and obtain \$50 cashback from Monday, November 10.

A further four draws of 60,000 cashback opportunities will be held for dining periods spanning December, January, February and March, with a ballot draw at the start of each month for use in that month.

Participating businesses will provide cashback winners with a tax invoice, to be redeemed using a dedicated website.

The Cashback Dining scheme was praised by Louise and Tony Godfrey from Old Reynella, who keep their caravan at Stansbury Caravan Park, and often visit the Yorketown Hotel and other YP businesses.

"We like to shop when we are here," Louise said. "We have just been to the Yorketown supermarket and we go to the local op shops."

Tony said they enjoy the country lifestyle and the fishing around YP was much better now during the algal bloom than at Port Noarlunga, his nearest beach in Adelaide.

"You have got to support the local businesses here," he said.

New gambling harm resources for pubs, clubs and services

MORE than 450 South Australian pubs, clubs and support services will soon receive new resources to help patrons and clients recognise the early signs of gambling harm.

The Gambling Harm Support SA posters, postcards and fact sheets - developed with people who have lived experience - will launch during Gambling Harm Action Week (October 19-25).

This year's theme, Supporting those close to you, highlights the importance of recognising gambling harm, having open conversations and looking after your own wellbeing.

Minister for Human Services Nat Cook said gambling affects more than just individuals.

"It's estimated more than 200,000 South Australians are negatively affected by someone else's gambling each year," Ms Cook said.

"People often don't recognise the harm, especially early on."

The new posters and postcards include a QR code linking to the Gambling Harm Support SA website, which provides access to personal stories, local services, and information on gambling myths and facts.

Fact sheets for support services offer practical tips, including how to start conversations, support affected children, understand gambling triggers, and access counselling.

"These fact sheets are valuable tools for helping South Australians start those important conversations," Ms Cook said.

The resources were shaped by people with experience supporting loved ones through gambling issues.

A new wave of the Spot the Harm, Stop the Harm campaign will run from October 19 to November 5.

An independent review found 38 per cent of people spending \$100 or more monthly on gambling said the campaign helped them cut back.

Recent research shows 68 per cent of South Australians have gambled in the past year - slightly higher than the national average of 65 per cent.

Sleep experts to visit SYP for community sessions

THE clinical sleep team from Flinders University's Adelaide Institute for Sleep Health will run community education sessions across southern Yorke Peninsula in early November.

Specialist clinicians and researchers will discuss what healthy sleep looks like, how to recognise sleep problems and where to seek help.

The sessions follow research $\bar{b}y$ the team earlier this year with YP residents experiencing sleep issues.

Dr Amy Reynolds said the sessions were open to anyone curious about

"Maybe it's your sleep, or a partner's, or another family member or household member — our aim is that everyone in the community will have something they can take home from our sessions," she said.

"Most of our work in the sessions will be on adults; however, questions about children are welcome and we would encourage parents and families to consider attending."

Dr Reynolds said the most common sleep difficulties for Australians were insomnia, sleep apnoea and restless legs syndrome.

"By middle age, almost one in every two adults meets the criteria for a sleep disorder," Dr Reynolds said.

"Poor sleep impacts us on so many

"For some it can impact mental health and, for others, physical health. "We know it can have serious implications for our safety on the road and for how well we are able to do

The project is funded by a Hospital Research Foundation grant and delivered in partnership with Honiton local Katie Hughes and SYP residents, as part of a reference group to ensure the project meets the community's

Govt grants boost rural health care

MORE than a quarter of a million dollars will flow into regional health care across South Australia, with eight projects receiving a combined \$268,000 from The Hospital Research Foundation Group.

'Regional communities are the backbone of our state, but we know they face significant barriers when it comes to accessing quality health care," Mr Flynn said.

"This funding will help upskill our health workforce and purchase vital equipment, allowing regional South Australians to get the treatment they need closer to home."



YP participants wanted for dementia study

DEMENTIA was the leading cause of death in Australia in 2023.

Yet, despite its prevalence, little is known about whether rural and regional Australians are more likely to develop the condition than their city counterparts.

A new University of South Australia project, Re-ACTIVate, is working with regional communities to find out if country-based people are more susceptible to dementia and to develop prevention strategies tailored to rural areas.

The team is currently seeking participants aged 60 to 80 from the Yorke Peninsula for the Re-ACTIVate study.

They are also inviting adults aged over 18 from Port Lincoln and Berri, and surrounding areas, to take part in co-design sessions.

An online option is being explored for participants in other regions.

Lead researcher and cognitive ageing expert Associate Professor Ashleigh Smith said the study would directly compare dementia risk factors and brain health between rural and urban adults.

"Dementia is often considered an inevitable part of ageing, but in fact nearly half of cases could be prevented by changing everyday behaviours," Assoc. Prof Smith said.

More than 425,000 Australians are currently living with dementia, with that number expected to exceed one million by 2065.

"We know there are at least 14 modifiable risk factors for dementia, including smoking, diet, physical activity and social isolation," she said.

"We already have data on how these factors affect people living in Australian cities, but far less is known about their impact in rural areas."

Over the next six months, the UniSA team will work with rural communities to



map local services and co-design achievable, relevant dementia prevention strategies.

The result will be a dementia prevention toolkit — a suite of user-friendly resources designed to give country people the knowledge and support to reduce their risk and keep their brains healthy for longer.

We know people in rural and remote communities face different challenges — such as limited access to health services, fewer places to be physically active, and unique work and social patterns," Assoc. Prof Smith said.

PhD candidate and UniSA researcher Britt Burton said there was a critical need for a public health strategy focused specifically on dementia risk in rural and regional Australia.

"Rural and regional communities are strong, resourceful and deeply connected-qualities that make them wonderful places to live and age," Ms Burton said.

"However, with health services often stretched across vast areas, and many younger people moving to the cities, older residents can be left with fewer supports and opportunities to stay healthy, connected and active.

'That's why it's vital we work with rural people to design public health strategies that reflect their realities.

"They know their communities best, and they are key to creating practical, effective solutions."

Assoc. Prof Smith said the project was about ensuring equity in dementia prevention across Australia.

"We want people in the country to have the same opportunities to protect their brain health as those living in the city," she said.

"By placing rural communities at the centre of the solution, we can help transform dementia prevention and improve outcomes for generations to come."



Defibrillator installed at Minlaton pharmacy

A DEFIBRILLATOR is being installed at Star Discount Chemist Minlaton, providing critical emergency support in the event of sudden cardiac arrest.

The move is part of a broader rollout by the Star Pharmacy Group, which is equipping 46 of its stores across Australia with automated external defibrillators (AEDs).

Sudden cardiac arrest is a leading cause of death in Australia, with more than 26,000 cases occurring out of hospital each year, according to the Heart Foundation.

While survival rates are generally low - around 10 per cent — use of a defibrillator in addition to CPR can increase the chance of survival to nearly 50 per cent.

The installation of an AED in the Minlaton pharmacy will provide the community with improved access to life-saving equipment, especially important in regional and remote areas where emergency response times may be longer, a company spokesperson said.

In South Australia, defibrillators are now mandatory in SA Government buildings and facilities, including schools and libraries.

The inclusion of AEDs in pharmacies adds another layer of public safety in accessible, high-traffic locations, the spokesperson said.

COPPER Coast Meals on Wheels volunteer Catherine Plunkett knows first-hand the value of the service she helps to provide.


When Catherine moved to Moonta from Hobart as a single person three years ago, she had a short illness and received Meals on Wheels as a customer for several months.

After city life, Catherine says she enjoys the slower, friendlier pace of living and volunteering in a country town and the lack of traffic lights and traffic, enabling her to deliver to about 15 customers a day.

"The number one thing is the interactions with the customers," she says.

"There are quite a few people who would love you to stay and chat for a while.

"I find country people are more connected.

"There's a slower pace here and people seem to have more time for each other."





Resources available to help navigate new act

OLDER residents and the aged care sector are preparing for the new Aged Care Act 2024, set to take effect on November 1.

The new act is aimed at improving the way services are delivered to older people in their homes, community settings and approved residential aged-care homes.

Older Persons Advocacy Network chief executive Craig Gear said the new act was about rebalancing power dynamics in aged care, putting the wishes of older people first.

"It ensures older people remain at the centre of their care, supported by those they trust - whether that's a family member, friend, advocate or provider," Mr Gear said.

The new act responds to 58 recommendations from the 2018-2021 Royal Commission into Aged Care, which found existing legislation was no longer fit for

To support the transition, OPAN has launched new supported decision-making resources for older people, their families and aged care providers, developed in collaboration with all groups.

"Supported decision-making means having the support you need to make and communicate your own decisions, rather than having decisions made for you," Mr Gear said.

Resources include practical tips, easy-tounderstand information and real-life examples to help people stay in control of decisions about their care, services and daily life.

OPAN has also developed a support decision-making eLearning module for agedcare providers, which offers practical guidance on how to put supported decision-making into practice in line with their obligations under the new Aged Care Act.

The supported decision-making toolkit and eLearning module for providers are freely available at opan.org.au.







Adelaide Lightning strike new era with bold relaunch for 2025-26

With Kadina's Stephanie Talbot still leading as captain, a new coach at the helm, and a fresh look on court, Adelaide Lightning has surged back from the brink.

Just five months ago, the future of the club was in doubt.

On Sunday night, October 19, the Lightning launched its 2025-26 WNBL campaign in front of more than 2000 fans at the SA State Basketball Centre in Wayville.

Lightning unveiled its new identity under a revamped ownership group and a bold rebrand featuring plum, lavender and mandarin team colours.

'This is an exciting new chapter for the team," Adelaide Lightning chief executive Melanie MacGillivray (from the USA) said.

To have such a passionate group of South Australians investing in Adelaide Lightning signals the importance of this team and women's basketball in the state.

"As the Lightning grows, all team decisions will be centred around positive outcomes for the South Australian community and for Australian female basketballers."

The new ownership group includes Mohan Koo, John Paul Drake, James Begley and Jeevan Koo.

However, the WNBL retains majority ownership after reaching a deal with the South Australian Government to keep the club alive ahead of the 2025-26 season.

As part of the relaunch, the Lightning has welcomed Kerryn Mitchell as new head coach.

SA basketball icon and former

Opals captain Tess Madgen, now a special adviser to the club, said the changes signalled a bright future.

"I can't wait to see girls and boys from around South Australia wearing this new merch and lighting up at games," Madgen said.

We have such diverse and incredible talent here in South Australia. and the roster, our new home at the State Basketball Centre, and this new brand really cement the bright future of the Adelaide Lightning."

Madgen recalled her own Lightning inspiration.

"I grew up watching Rachel Sporn and the Adelaide Lightning on TV, and it remains one of my favourite childhood memories," Magden said.

"You cannot be what you cannot see — and with the Lightning's brand relaunch, the step-up in professionalism from the organisation, a new home at the State Basketball Centre, and incredible South Australian role models such as Steph Talbot, Tayla Brazel and Jasmine Fejo, I'm so excited for the next generation of young girls to aspire to wear the Lightning jersey and continue the club's proud legacy."

Founded in 1993, Adelaide Lightning has won five WNBL championships — including a remarkable three-peat from 1994 to 1996, followed by titles in 1998 and 2008.

Briefly, the club competed as the "Adelaide Fellas" during the 2005-06

Caitlin Adams claims stunning Melbourne marathon win

Wallaroo's Caitlin Adams has run her first marathon in spectacular style, claiming victory in the Melbourne event on Sunday, October 12.

Adams was the first woman across the line, clocking an impressive 2 hours, 30 minutes and 26 seconds to complete the 42.2-kilometre course — finishing more than five minutes ahead of the next female

She had support from some of the sport's biggest names in the lead-up to the run.

"I was lucky enough to have Jess Stenson, who is marathon royalty in our country, and her brother Jack Trengove as a personal pacer in the race, and my teammate Cam (Clohesy) played a huge role too," Adams said.

"They started the race with me and took a lot of the pressure off me, setting my pace, getting my drinks, telling me where there were potholes and stuff like that, so they did a lot of the heavy lifting for the first 20km.

"It was massive having them in my corner, Jess is so credentialled and she helped me feel calm which was important during the race.

"She gave me so many tips pre-race which was amazing too."

Adams said her legs started to feel heavy around the 37-to-38km mark, but she refused to let that stop her from finishing her first marathon.

After stepping up from shorter distances in the past two to three years, she has made a strong transition to longer events in 2025.

She began racing half marathons midyear, placing third in the Launceston Half Marathon before going one better at the Gold Coast Half Marathon, where she finished second.

The latter event also served as the Athletics Australia Half Marathon Championships.

"That was when I realised I made the jump at the right time, coming second in a half marathon in such a quality field, and I wanted a new challenge, so set myself the goal of the Melbourne marathon," Adams said.

"I started my marathon build about eight weeks pre race, and ramped up my training to 147km per week, which included two marathon-focused training sessions, a session in the gym and the rest just jogging.

"A lot of the training was trialling energy gels and Maurten, a carbohydrate-based

"I worked with a sports dietitian in the lead-up too, so a lot of work went into it."

The Melbourne Marathon finished inside the MCG, which only two weeks previously had been filled to the brim with more than 100,000 people for the AFL grand final.

"Running into the MCG was an amazing feeling, at that point I knew I had it won," Adams said.

"Hearing the crowd roar, it was so euphoric and it was an amazing thing to be part of.

"Breaking the rope was amazing, in my debut marathon, it really couldn't have

The marathon had a record number of entrants, with 50,000 making the start line, eclipsing the previous record by 8000.



"Each of the quartet is second generation Southern Eagles.


"Lachie, Jacob and Jack have each won best and fairest awards in recent seasons. "With these lads returning, I feel we've regained serious top-end talent."

Who's set to shine in 2025-26?

Harry Rennie REPORT BY

With cricket back in the swing on Yorke Peninsula, it's time to take a closer look at the teams across both local competitions — and the players who give them their best chance of success.

YPCA

We start with the Yorke Peninsula Cricket Association, made up of five teams from northern YP.

With a smaller field, each side will need a strong start and consistent form to push for a grand final berth.

Arthurton — Nicholas Dayman

Nicholas Dayman was Arthurton's standout in a tough 2024-25 season, leading the side in both runs and wick-

Opening the batting, he scored 220 runs at 24.44, including two half-centuries, and claimed 17 wickets at 15.35 - with five matches featuring multiple wickets.

Can Dayman help lift Arthurton into finals contention this season?

Kadina — Matthew Chapman

While not primarily known for his bowling, Matthew Chapman is a consistent all-round contributor — and one of the most reliable run-scorers in the

In 2024-25, Chapman finished second in total runs with 451, topping the competition with an impressive average of 56.38.

His season highlights included a century (110) against Port Broughton and an unbeaten 98 against Wallaroo. He also chipped in with nine wickets, including three in that Port Broughton clash.

Can Chapman lead Kadina to a longawaited grand final appearance?

Moonta — Blake Pedler

Reigning cricketer of the year Blake Pedler was a standout in 2024-25, dominating with both bat and ball.

He led the competition in runs and wickets, playing a pivotal role in Moonta's campaign.

Pedler piled on 458 runs at an average of 41.64, including a century (101) against Port Broughton with 14 boundaries.

With the ball, he took a league-high 31 wickets at a remarkable average of 6.55, recording three or more wickets in six matches.

Can Pedler go back-to-back and help Moonta break through for a premiership?

Paskeville-Boors Plains - Dylan Branford

Opening the batting for the reigning premiers, Dylan Branford is central to Paskeville-Boors Plains' success.

Known for his smart shot selection and powerful stroke play, he consistently sets the tone for big team totals.

In 2024-25, Branford scored 383 runs at an average of 38.3, with a top score of 99 not out.

He also made an impact with the ball,

taking 11 wickets at just 10.73 - including a five-wicket haul against Wallaroo.

Can Branford help steer Paskeville to back-to-back titles?

Wallaroo — Jamie Newton

One of the association's top all-rounders, Jamie Newton will be key to Wallaroo's push for a premiership.

Renowned for his explosive batting and sharp pace, Newton is a gamechanger with both bat and ball.

In 2024-25, he scored 326 runs at an average of 23.29, highlighted by a stunning 155 not out against Ardrossan, including 24 boundaries.

With the ball, he claimed 21 wickets at 16.24, including four in Wallaroo's grand final loss

Could Newton be a contender for cricketer of the year in 2025-26?

LYPCA

Lower Yorke Peninsula Cricket Association has only one senior grade, featuring nine teams.

Known for its high-scoring matches, teams will need to hit top form early to stay in finals contention.

Corny Point — Daniel Tilbrook

After a winless 2024-25 season, Corny Point will be looking to rebuild under the leadership of Daniel Tilbrook.

Tilbrook scored 198 runs last season, including three knocks over 40, with a top score of 59 against Maitland.

Can he lead Corny Point back into finals contention?

Eastern District — Troy Goldsworthy

Troy Goldsworthy was a dominant force in 2024-25, piling on 576 runs at an average of 52.36.

He recorded five scores of 60 or more, including a season-opening 125 against Stansbury.

Known for his power at the crease, Goldsworthy can punish bowling attacks with ease.

Can he drive Eastern District to a premiership this season?

Maitland — Aidan Kakoschke

All-rounder Aidan Kakoschke will be key to Maitland's hopes in 2025-26.

Last season, he scored 392 runs at an average of 49, with four scores above 60

and a top score of 74 against Yorketown. With the ball, Kakoschke took 18 wickets at 14.89, including five in a standout performance against Stansbury.

Can he lead Maitland back into the

SOUTH Australia's harvest has officially begun, with Bunge receiving its first delivery for the 2025-26 season a load of lentils delivered to

its Thevenard site last week.

Bunge director of industrial management Gavin Cavanagh said the first load marked a strong start to what is shaping up to be a more favourable season than last year for many farmers across the state.

"Crop production for South Australia is expected to be close to average, at around nine million tonnes produced, which is a good result given the record dry start to the year and the smaller 2024-25 harvest," Mr Cavanagh said.

However, he acknowledged some regions, such as parts of the Murray Mallee, were forecasting below-average yields.

Investments boost capacity

Bunge has completed its annual infrastructure investment program across its South Australian network.

Upgrades include four new drive-over hopper stackers, a second inwards weighbridge at Tailem Bend, and a new classification office at Wudinna to support lentil intake.

Structural improvements have also been made at Wallaroo, Snowtown, Kimba, Lock, Cummins and Wudinna, with additional storage added at Port Giles.

Roadworks and sealing works, such as at Keith, are among other site upgrades.

The company has also welcomed around 1500 harvest workers in preparation for the

With more than six million tonnes of forward shipping capacity already booked, Bunge is seeing strong buyer demand for new season grain.





Notice of Exploration Drilling Activity for Natural Hydrogen and Helium

Gold Hydrogen Ltd is an Australian company exploring for Natural or Geologic Hydrogen and seeking to verify the existence of commercial quantities in its Petroleum Exploration Licence 687, covering portions of the Yorke Peninsula. During 2023 we completed our first drilling activities and verified the existence of Natural Hydrogen and Helium on our Ramsay Project area.

We are now planning to carry out further exploration drilling near our previously drilled wells with our 2025 drilling program to commence in early November. The program will involve the drilling of up to 3 wells on locations nearby our Ramsay 1 and Ramsay 2 wells that were drilled in 2023.

The first phase of this drilling program is planned to be completed around mid-December 2025, with a possible second phase during January 2026.

Harrowing Robodebt recount

Warning: This review discusses mental health and suicide, which may be distressing to some readers. If you need support, contact Lifeline on 13 11 14 or Beyond Blue on 1300 22 4636.

BETWEEN 2016 and 2019, around half a million Australians received false debt notices from Centrelink.

The result was extreme detriment to many of these vulnerable people's mental health, and some of them lost their lives.

New SBS documentary series, The People vs Robodebt, interviews those who were on the frontline - victims and their families, Centrelink workers, social media activists, whistleblowers, ministerial advisers, journalists and lawyers.

Jenny Miller, the mother of 28-year-old Rhys Cauzzo, told of her son dying by suicide after being hounded over a debt that didn't exist, including threats that "they would garnish his wages, take his take return, his car and personal belongings and that he would be left with nothing".

Sandra Bevan, another victim, said "I was not going to let them push me into killing myself".

Centrelink compliance officer Jeannie-Marie Blake said she developed an alcohol addiction from answering traumatic calls from distressed and angry recipients of the debts.

Story upon story, in part collated by Moonta's Lyndsey Jackson, show an utter disregard by the



Coalition government of the time for human beings who had done nothing wrong.

The ongoing effects on their mental health and lives is devastating.

Jenny Miller will never get her son back. While there has been truth-telling through a royal commission, as well as repayment and compensation, no one has been prosecuted for what was an illegal scheme.

The royal commission recommended six individuals involved in the scheme face criminal charges, but their names are publicly supressed.

Scott Morrison, who oversaw the introduction of Robodebt, and Alan Tudge, who was human services minister at the height of the scheme, declined to be interviewed for the documentary.

The People vs Robodebt is free to stream on SBS On Demand.





Wednesday: Showers, apart from in the west, contracting east mostly clearing by the afternoon and early evening. Storms possible most likely on and east of the ranges, clearing late morning and early afternoon, possibly with damaging wind gusts about the south east, in the morning. Maximum temperatures above average in the far north east grading to below average elsewhere. Strong and gusty west to southwesterly winds about the coasts and the south east, with south to southwesterly winds extending throughout. Winds easing from the west later and tending south to southeasterly. **Thursday:** Isolated showers and storms in the far north west with isolated light showers possible about windward coasts and ranges. Maximum temperatures above average in the west, below average elsewhere. South to southeasterly winds, becoming light with afternoon sea breezes. Friday: Showers and storms extending across the west, reaching central districts later. Maximum temperatures above average in the west, near to below average elsewhere. Southeast to northeasterly winds, tending north to northwesterly ahead of a fresh and gusty west to southwesterly change in the west

Wednesday: Cloudy. Medium chance of showers, most likely in the morning and early afternoon. The chance of a storm. Winds west to northwesterly 25 to 35 km/h turning southwesterly 30 to 45 km/h early in the morning. **Thursday:** Partly cloudy. Slight chance of a shower in the south in the morning and afternoon. Light winds becoming west to southwesterly 15 to 20 km/h during the day then turning south to southeasterly during the afternoon

HOT FISHING TIPS

Wallaroo: Crews made the most of slight northerly winds over the weekend, heading out from the busy boat ramp to chase blue crabs, garfish and early morning King George whiting. Large crowds gathered on Sunday morning, mingling with jetty-based fishers who reported a few squid, small blueys and the occasional garfish.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: A couple of boats worked the Moonta Bay to Warburto Point blue line on Wednesday morning, chasing blueys in perfect fishing conditions. The jetties saw plenty of visitors, although catches were quiet. Further out, larger boat crews cruised to Tipara Reef in search of garfish, squid and King George whiting.

Port Victoria/Balgowan: Boat crews fishing far and wide last week mainly reported King George whiting, garfish and squid, with some big whiting landed off the north-western side of Wardang Island. At the Port Victoria jetty, fishers picked up the odd blue crab and small gar at night, but there wasn't much else on offer.

Point Turton: Charter crews hit their

quotas during the week, landing solid numbers of King George whiting and squid. Garfish are biting off the rocks at Magazine Bay, while salmon trout are moving through the high-tide shallows at Levens Beach.

Stenhouse Bay/Marion Bay: Both jetties are producing tommies and squid at night, while occasional offshore conditions have allowed crews to head out for King George whiting, small tuna, red nannygai and flathead. Local shore-based fishers have been walking the beaches in search of salmon trout, big dusky flathead and tommy ruff (Australian herring).

Port Clinton/Ardrossan/Edithburgh: Many small bluefin leatherjackets sadly washed up dead along the Port Clinton, Ardrossan and Black Point coastline over the past week. Early in the week, a few lucky anglers picked up tommy ruff from the Edithburgh jetty, sparking some hope for a break in the ongoing algal bloom - though that may be wishful thinking. Further south, boat crews fishing beyond Troubridge Point reported a couple of King George whiting and blue morwong. Please remember: snapper remain on the no-take list.

Pennas hit gold in international archery debut

Moonta siblings Brock and Ava Penna are elite junior archers who recently became record breakers at the 2025 Trans Tasman Youth Teams Cup, helping Australia to a tournament win against the host, New Zealand.

The Yorke Peninsula pair represented Australia at the event held in Christchurch, September 25 to 30.

Ava competed in the Under 14 Female Compound division, while Brock took part in the U18 Male Recurve events.

Both athletes excelled during the tournament, held at St Andrews College.

Brock claimed gold in the U18 Male Recurve division with a record-breaking score of 657 out of a possible 720 surpassing the previous WA720 Trans Tasman record of 647.

He followed this with another gold in the U18/21 Male Recurve Matchplay, going undefeated through the rounds and securing victory in the final.

Brock also added a silver medal in the Teams Matchplay event, rounding out an impressive campaign.

Ava was equally impressive, delivering standout performances across the tournament.
