Catch and release

THE state opposition has called for the release of an independent review into the cost recovery model for commercial fishing, following the announcement of new fees.

Yorke Peninsula fishers have said their fees could go up by 400 per cent under new Individual Transferrable Quota fees to be imposed by Primary Industries and Regions SA from 2024-25.

The fees will apply to King George whiting, garfish and calamari in the Gulf St Vincent and Spencer Gulf Marine Scale Fisheries.

Opposition spokesperson Nicola Centofanti said Primary Industries Minister Clare Scriven had left the industry in the dark over reforms which could have huge impacts on fishers' livelihoods. "It's unacceptable for the government to sit on this cost recovery review for three months, without any decision making, then suddenly hit fishers with this new fee structure out of the blue." Dr Centofanti said.

Under the model, fees are structured to cover the costs of administering the fishery, including compliance, administration and scientific research.

Ms Scriven said the fees were not new, but part of restructuring the

changed operations of the fishery, as planned by the previous state government.

"Licence fees are a crucial part of cost recovery for access to our state's marine resources," she said.

"The proposed changes would see those with greater quota, and therefore greater access to the resource, pay more than those with minimal or no quota entitlements for tier one species."

Ms Scriven said industry represen-

tatives were part of a working group which developed the new structure.

"We will continue to work with industry to identify ways in which efficiencies can be implemented to assist industry with the costs of managing the fishery," she said.

Ms Scriven said the review would be released once it was finalised, and would be worked through with industry.

How to fund our roads

IT was the best of roads; it was the worst of roads.

I guess it depends on where you live as to which road you identify with most.

This week we welcomed the great news that North Coast Road, Point Turton, will receive another \$1 million for works, which will allow the second stage of drainage and sealing of more than 1.82 kilometres to occur.

It's a worthwhile project which has been the focus of a push by locals for many years, and Yorke Peninsula Council is rightly happy with the decision.

Council will contribute just over \$1m to the project, which is expected to start next month.

The need for the works grew from concerns about the safety of the stretch, used by tourists and locals alike for beach access, and the creation of dust and maintenance issues.

The Copper Coast Highway, a key entrance road to Yorke Peninsula, through Paskeville, is also in a state of

But, a technical report estimated works would cost about \$5m, and the state government says works are a low priority.

There's not enough traffic or flooding to bring it up the list.

It's astounding how many times we hear a lack of traffic being used as a reason why works aren't needed.

Granted, if everyone got all their road repairs funded, we'd be in some financial troubles.

I can understand a lack of use being a reason to not buy a new guitar if you only rarely pick it up, but it shouldn't be a reason why vital infrastructure is neglected, or maintenance put off.

WORKS on North Coast Road, Point Turton, will continue after Yorke Peninsula Council received a significant boost from Commonwealth, state and local government joint venture, the Special Local Roads Program.

Council's proposal was one of 28 projects to benefit, picking up \$1,157,000 through the Roads to Recovery stream for stage two of the project, and will also contribute \$1,067,000 itself.

Stage two will feature improvements to drainage, strengthening pavement and the sealing of over 1.82 kilometres.

The project will commence next

month at the end of the existing sealed stage one and conclude near the end of the 50km/h speed zone.

"The North Coast Road upgrade is the result of years of advocacy from local residents and from council, and it is great to have confirmation that stage two of the project has been funded," CEO Andrew Cameron said.

"Stage two will double the length of sealed pavement to a total of 3.64 km, improving road safety and providing better access to our outstanding coastal tourist destinations.

"It is great to see this project progressing and we look forward to the many benefits it will bring, from reduced dust affecting local residents, through to lower maintenance requirements which will save

ratepayer money in the long term.

"We thank the state government for partnering with council to achieve this long-awaited outcome.

"Council will continue working toward funding for stage three which will significantly improve the remaining unsealed road section."

The Special Local Roads Program supports South Australian councils to construct and maintain significant and strategic local roads that otherwise would exceed an individual council's capacity.

Council was unsuccessful in gaining funding for stage one on two occasions, in 2019-20 and 2020-21, before breaking through in 2022-23.

Minister for Local Government and Regional Roads Geoff Brock "It is great to see this project progressing and we look forward to the many benefits it will bring..."

 Andrew Cameron, CEO Yorke Peninsula Council

said the state government would continue to highlight how important it is for councils to receive their fair share of local roads funding.

"In the current economic climate, we know councils are facing

increased challenges with rising material and labour costs and have the difficult job of trying to keep rates low for residents while still maintaining essential infrastructure, like local roads, in their communities," he said.

"This project will mitigate the majority of road safety issues, high road maintenance costs, dust related environmental and health impacts, storm water and drainage issues at low points, and be a step towards improving tourism appeal and wider community access."

Bild Infrastructure was selected to complete the works by council's elected members, following a tender process, at its October meeting.

Stage two is expected to be complete by April 2024.



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Masterplan momentum builds around Wallaroo foreshore

COPPER Coast Council is closing in on a final masterplan design for the Wallaroo Foreshore.

The plan will act as a framework for several small projects along the foreshore which aim to improve the precinct's connectivity.

Council engaged Hatch Design to prepare the plan, and it was presented to elected members at an informal gathering last Wednesday, October 18.

Elected members were also asked for feedback to refine the plan's key

Hatch director Corey Brown said the latest consultation was about trying to work out the best way to make the plan a reality.

"We're now trying to identify a few projects which should be invested in," Mr Brown said.

"Some priorities we've identified for zone one (from the Wallaroo jetty to the boat ramp) include increasing the viewpoints to the ocean, controlling erosion, increased safe swimming areas, creating a greater activation of spaces for youth, more consolidated carparking and an improved boat ramp area.

"Zone two includes the linear connectivity along the sailing club beach, connection to residential areas, stormwater management and enhancing local heritage stories."

Mr Brown said it was important to remember the masterplan was a long-term project, and could take up to 20-years to complete in full.

"Many of the projects we decide on will be conditional on grants and council's works budgets," he said.

'We'll be using the design development phase to respond to the funding we need."

Deputy mayor Peter Sims said new toilets at the boat ramp should be the plan's number one priority.

"We need to be giving people who get out of their boats appropriate access to toilets," Mr Sims said.

"It's embarrassing when you see people running from their boat because there's nothing immediately

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said she was pleased with the feedback from the community through consultation so

"It is a very long-term plan with some things easy and affordable to achieve and some of the areas will be more difficult," Mrs Talbot said.

"I think the needs of all users have been considered with an emphasis on easy access and multi-use spaces."

Following further refinement, the Wallaroo Foreshore Masterplan will be presented to council for final adoption.

Push for more boat ramp toilets

WALLAROO Swimming and Aquatics Committee is pushing for a toilet facility at the Wallaroo boat ramp.

WSAC spokesperson Ian Shields proposed Copper Coast Council purchase temporary portable toilets whilst it awaits results of the Wallaroo Foreshore Masterplan.

"I believe the final draft plan is comprehensive and it's pleasing to see (scope for) provision for public toilets near the boat ramp, but unfortunately, that could be in five years," Mr Shields said.

"It is difficult to understand why one of South Australia's top tourist towns with a long history of recreational fishing and boating does not provide boat ramp toilets.

"I suggest council could purchase a modular male/female portable toilet block which could be based at the

permanent facilities are built, and then (the portable toilet could be) used all through the Copper Coast area during events for years to come.

"These units cost about \$35,000 to

The proposal from Mr Shields was rejected by council at its September

Council informed Mr Shields there were public toilets located within 500 metres of the boat ramp, the masterplan included scope for new toilets and the cost to maintain council boat ramps already exceeded income derived.

"I cannot see a toilet being so vital for the boat ramp that we overlook the masterplan," Councillor Brent Walker said.

"We need to have some foresight and faith the masterplan will deliver on projects like this."

Thomas Ackland jailed ahead of sentencing

FORMER Kadina Memorial School teacher Thomas Ackland spent his first nights in jail after an appearance in the District Court last Wednesday,

The hearing in front of Judge Paul Muscat was initially scheduled for victim impact statements and submissions, but defence submissions were delayed until next month.

The delay was unwelcomed by the victims and their families, who've had to deal with several postponements to proceedings this year alone.

Judge Muscat revoked Ackland's bail at the hearing and told him he should expect to receive a prison sentence at the end of proceedings.

Ackland was arrested in March 2021, and earlier this year plead guilty to a charge of maintaining an unlawful sexual relationship with a child and 13 aggravated counts of communicating with the intention of making a child amenable to sexual activity.

The charges span from January 2018 to March 2021.

Eleven victim impact statements were read out in court, with the former students, and families, describing the damage Ackland's "sinister" offending had on their lives.

The former students detailed how they now find it difficult to trust people, especially teachers and older men and put their lives on hold.

They explained how Ackland, a senior school English leader, befriended them and, used their vulnerabilities against them.

"He added me on Snapchat and gave me a specific set of instructions," one student said.



"I thought it was for his protection but looking back it allowed him to groom me."

Ackland encouraged the students to share secrets, engage in sexual innuendo, invasive questions and inappropriate conversations with him.

Another student said they initially thought the behaviour was normal and it was only when talking to other people, they realised it was not.

"When I got the first snap, I knew it was wrong but it didn't affect me as much as it should have because it was such a wide spread thing, I thought it was normal to be honest," they said.

"I started talking to other people and realised this wasn't a normal relationship between a student and teacher.

"It's not something anyone should

have to go through, but it's unfortunate that I and many others did."

One mother, who anonymously called CrimeStoppers to report Ackland, said his actions made her "feel like a bad mother".

"I used to be a very trusting person and always saw the good in others, now I find it hard to trust people," she said.

Another student, who reported Ackland to a school counsellor with a friend, said it had also affected how they saw other teachers and would continue to do so in his life.

"When we did say something, I felt relieved but more and more felt guilty that I had not said something sooner,"

Ackland will appear in court again on November 24.

Woman impaled whilst visiting local cemetery



AN ELDERLY woman has been impaled after falling onto a grave at the Maitland Cemetery yesterday afternoon (Monday, October 23).

The woman, aged in her 70s, was pierced in the leg by a metal rail whilst visiting the cemetery and is believed to have waited at the scene for multiple hours before help arrived.

SA Ambulance Service was called to the scene just prior to 1pm, and the woman was airlifted to the Roval Adelaide Hospital by a MedSTAR helicopter.

Her injury is serious but not life-threatening.

Statewide prescribed burns kick off in SA

NATIONAL Parks and Wildlife Service has begun prescribed burns across South Australia as the state braces for an above average fire danger season.

A total of 56 burns will be carried out across the state, 38 within the Adelaide and Mount Lofty Ranges region and 18 others in rural and regional areas.

Below-average rainfall levels during the late winter in all but the far north-east of the state has resulted in the fire danger outlook increasing from below average to above average for spring across much of the southern half of SA.

NPWS fire management director

Fiona Gill said prescribed burns played a vital role in managing landscapes and reducing the risk of bushfires across the state.

"It makes bushfires easier to control, provides a safer environment for firefighters, and ultimately saves lives and property," she said.

NPWS fire crews have carefully planned the prescribed burns to help minimise smoke exposure.

Some roads as well as walking and riding trails may be closed or restricted during the burns to ensure public safety.

Plan to ease the pressure on parking at North Beach

MORE than 50 new carparks could relieve traffic congestion and improve accessibility at North Beach.

A draft traffic management plan, designed by Be Engineering Solutions, has been endorsed by Copper Coast Council in an attempt to reduce risk to pedestrians.

The plan proposes 37 90-degree carparks on the eastern side of Pamir Court, eight parallel parks at the beach entrance end of Pamir Court (currently a footpath), and a nine-space carpark at North Beach Kitchen (currently an empty gravel space), totalling 54 parks.

A designated walkway from the beach to North Beach Kitchen, extended concrete footpath from Otago Road to the beach, accessibility parks and ramps, and a kerb realignment have also been proposed.

Be Engineering Solutions senior associate Darren Blasdale said the plan aimed to expand parking and improve pedestrian connectivity.

"To accommodate the footpaths, the traffic lane widths will be reduced to three metres in each direction," Mr Blasdale said.

'Typically, reduced traffic lane widths result in slower vehicle speeds.

"The additional footpaths reduce the road width and provide separation between pedestrians and vehicles."

A 1.5 metre wide footpath will be maintained on Pamir Court, nearest Wallaroo Holiday Park, despite the proposed new parallel parks.

Wallaroo Holiday Park manager Michael Byrne said the beach entrance



often gets congested during the peak summer period.

"A lot of people park on the beach, but as you're coming off Pommern Way onto Pamir Court there's always cars lined up out the front of the kitchen... there's only a small roadway to get through," Mr Byrne said.

'When there's a lot of kids running around coming out from behind cars, it could be hazardous.

"There's a huge space from the road kerbing to the (Wallaroo Holiday Park) fence and it's just wasted land.

"We have a massive shortage of visitor carparking (at the holiday park), so it overflows through summer.

"Extra visitor carparking will make it safer inside the park, because at the moment we're trying to cram as many

cars as we can in there because we don't have space elsewhere, which is causing hazards."

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said there was very minimal space for cars to park in summer

"This plan will bolster parking which will ease the congestion, make it easier for people getting on and off the beach and limit the risk to young children

who can get excited and run ahead of mum and dad," Mrs Talbot said.

"Further down Pamir Court, additional parking will create more spaces for people wanting to visit the caravan park."

Council is set to consult with the public regarding the traffic management plan, particularly with adjoining landowners, before it comes back to elected members for final approval.

Hydrogen procurement begins Hugo earns

QUEENSLAND company Gold Hydrogen officially commenced drilling for natural hydrogen on southern Yorke Peninsula on Tuesday, October 11.

The company is seeking to prove a large natural hydrogen field exists in the area, after geologists discovered nearly 100-year-old records from oil and gas drilling tests in the area.

International companies Savanna Energy and SLB are leading the drill program, which began at Ramsay 1 well, near Minlaton, and adjacent the site where tests alluded to the presence of hydrogen more than 90 years ago.

Gold Hydrogen managing director Neil McDonald said the company was grateful for the support it has received from stakeholders and the pace at which the government had moved to enable exploration.

"South Australians have moved faster on hydrogen than anyone.

"As you can imagine, there is huge excitement in our team as we try to be the first in this country to discover natural hydrogen," Mr McDonald said.

"We believe hydrogen is continuously produced from the interaction underground of certain rock formations and water.

"Independent estimates have shown the South Australian field could hold enough gas to power the city of Adelaide for 40 years.

"Getting natural hydrogen from the sub-surface could come at a major cost discount to man-made hydrogen, such as green hydrogen made with renewable energy or blue hydrogen from natural gas."

Mr McDonald said Australia needed projects like this to achieve its net zero goals.

"We hope to be part of the solution, and we'll know in weeks how big an opportunity this is for us, and the country," he said.

Tom Koutsantonis said South Australia was the only state in the country which currently has a well dedicated to hydrogen exploration.

"It has been fantastic to see recent high levels of interest in exploration for naturally occurring hydrogen in South Australia — I'm confident it will have a place in our emerging hydrogen industry," he said.

"Combining natural hydrogen prospects, our HRE Bill and our Hydrogen Jobs Plan, South Australia is quick becoming recognised as a global hub for all things hydrogen.

"Considering this and coupled with our favourable geology for natural hydrogen generation, it's little wonder why a Queensland company is looking to explore here.

"It's good to see Gold Hydrogen intend to use local civil contractors to construct access tracks and I understand they've even had to book out the nearby Port Vincent Motel to accom-Minister for Energy and Mining modate the drilling crew."

Time to move fishing industry from cost recovery

MEMBER for Narungga Fraser Ellis said it was time for the government to stop kicking commercial fishers and move away from cost recovery.

Speaking in parliament last week, he said SA was the only state which imposed the cost recovery model but it did not have the critical mass of fishers to fund it.

Mr Ellis said an option could be for fishers to instead be charged a percentage of their gross value of production, as was done in Western Australia.

He said this would be more equitable and would enable fishers to keep contributing to their communities, including assisting in marine rescues, and to supply fish markets, hotels and restaurants with fresh fish.

Mr Ellis said one licence holder he spoke to currently paid fees of \$7000, which would climb to \$30,000 next financial year, yet he only had a taxable income of \$50,000.

Marine Fishers Association executive officer Pat Tripodi said the Marine Scale Fishery was a community-owned asset and commercial fishers have an obligation to supply the non-fishing community with fish.

"Presently, the fishery is being managed in isolation to all of the state's users, with the commercial sector essentially funding the management of the state's aquatic resources," he said.

"The state government needs to put their hand in the coffers and fund the management of the state's aquatic resources for the common good of the community."

Curramulka commercial fisher David Short said if fishing businesses collapsed, it would further limit consumer access to fresh local fish.

"This large increase in costs suggests the fishery since reform is being poorly managed because the new system is not cost effective as promised," Mr Short said.

Copper Coast Council flips on YP Tourism project

COPPER Coast Council has opted not to support Yorke Peninsula Tourism's Brand Evolution Project, despite originally endorsing it.

The decision came after both Yorke Peninsula and Barunga West Councils voted against the proposal.

YP Tourism requested \$20,000 funding contributions from Copper Coast and YP Councils, and \$10,000 from BWC for a new website, photoshoot featuring the entire peninsula and increased promotion to Australia's eastern seaboard, among other promotional strategies.

Former CCC CEO Russell Peate recommended council should not financially contribute to the project given the stance of neighbouring

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said it was unfortunate the project was put to councils when they were finalising annual budgets, making it difficult to allocate funding towards it.

"I also wonder if they (YP and Barunga West Councils) recognise the importance of continually evolving and rebranding to target the correct audience, which is why we originally wanted to support the idea," Mrs Talbot said.

"We have to look at refreshing what we're doing, who we're appealing to and making sure our branding is current for today's market.

"I'm hoping it will get brought back to councils early next year so it can be reconsidered."

YP Tourism chairperson Craig Costello said he respected the decision of each council.

"We have taken on board feedback and the reasons why on this occasion the support wasn't across the board

for the Brand Evolution Project," Mr Costello said.

"The project would achieve a superior result with the support of Copper Coast, Yorke Peninsula and Barunga West Councils together as a united force."

Mr Costello said YP Tourism's recently completed Strategic Plan 2030 identified a need for the peninsula's brand to be evolved to assist in capturing more year-round visitation.

"We have seen businesses reporting a significant drop off this offseason when compared to the year-round strong visitor activity we experienced during the Covid period," he said.

"Our current brand is very much focused around a 'sun and beach' summer feel.

"At this stage, the direction of the board is to revisit the proposal with our council stakeholders prior to their 2024-25 budget deliberations."

Focusing on facilities and funding for CFS

CURRENT CFS facilities need to be urgently audited ahead of South Australia's bushfire season, according to the South Australian Greens party.

The party is calling on the government to take action after the CFS Volunteer Association revealed it is unable to address several workplace safety hazards across stations due to insufficient and inconsistent funding.

In the strategic plan "Building on Strong Foundations — 2021 and Beyond", the CFSVA recommended the state government allocate additional funding of \$10 million over four years for the ongoing maintenance and upkeep of stations across the state.

CFSVA executive director Sonia St Alban said the CFS' emergency response area covered more than 93 per cent of the state, and included more than 420 stations and facilities.

"These stations must be maintained to an acceptable standard to ensure our professionally trained volunteers are able to continue providing excellent emergency service," she said.

"Many regional areas would have no emergency responses to road crash rescue, structure fires, bush fires, hazmat and assist SA Ambulance calls if not for the generosity of CFS volunteers donating their time and skills to defend and support South Australian communities.

This year, and indeed over the next few years, is predicted SA will suffer severe bushfire seasons which means the state will be more reliant on CFS

volunteers to protect, defend and serve our communities.

Ms St Alban said several CFS stations currently had no toilets, with volunteers required to use nearby community facilities.

"A high number of CFS stations do not have dedicated change facilities and whilst some stations have locker areas where PPE is stored, the same area is used by volunteers to change," she said.

"Whilst at other CFS stations there is no change area and our volunteers must make do, regardless of gender.

"The question is whether this is acceptable in 2023?"

Ms St Alban said the CFSVA was taking a responsible, professional and a measured approach to the matter by seeking an audit of all CFS stations.

This will ensure the establishment of appropriate levels of funding and realistic timelines for the CFS building and maintenance program into the future, providing fit-for-purpose and safe facilities," she said.

"The CFSVA believes as a minimum, our CFS volunteers deserve this investment by government and have referred this matter to the minister's office."

Government needs

to take action

The Greens said due to historic and current lack of funding, CFS stations could be a barrier to attraction. recruitment and retention of an inclusive and diverse firefighting service.

"The lack of funding has seen the


identification of some important structural issues, specifically taps, toilets and a place to change with dignity and privacy," Tammy Franks MLC said.

"Other safety issues include the presence of asbestos and electrical issues.

'Our communities are resilient, and we support each other in times of crisis — but the government also needs to do the same for those who battle the climate crisis on the front line."

Ms Franks said funding all the necessary upgrades was non-negotiable.

"CFS volunteers risk their lives to protect our community, and they deserve the unconditional support of the state government and to be provided with equipment and stations of the highest possible standard," she said.



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Pasky upgrade hits road block

A POTENTIAL upgrade to the Copper Coast Highway through Paskeville has been classed as a low priority by the state government.

A technical report obtained by Copper Coast Council, which outlined potholing, poor drainage, cracking and other faults along the road, estimated an upgrade would cost \$5 million.

Minister for Regional Roads Geoff Brock said the Department for Infrastructure and Transport identified necessary improvement works based on priorities across South Australia.

"An upgrade to the Copper Coast Highway through Paskeville is not currently programmed for drainage upgrades due to funding being directed to higher priority statemaintained roads," Mr Brock said.

"Roads prioritised for upgrades are predominantly based on safety matters but also on other factors such as traffic volumes and types, inspections by departmental staff and feedback from drivers and other stakeholders."

DIT estimated the the traffic volume of the highway through Paskeville to be 2400 vehicles per day east of Prices Road, of which 12 per cent are heavy vehicles, and 2700 vehicles west of Prices Road, of which 13 per cent are heavy vehicles.

'Water flows across the road in this location during weather events when there is 20 millimetres or more of rainfall, which occurs on average between four to six times per year," Mr Brock said.

Paskeville engineering company A Thomson and Co owner Andrew Thomson said it didn't take any more than an inch of rain for the road to completely flood.

"It's getting worse — I've heard a lot of people saying the road is a bloody disgrace and asking me when is something going to be done about it," Mr Thomson said.

"When trucks pull over, they leave big culverts on the side of the road and the drivers are getting out in ankle-deep water.

"It doesn't take much for water to build up on both sides and the pooling basically joins together."

Councillor Peter Oswald said council would investigate a temporary solution to address the drainage issues.

"Kerbing and stormwater are council's responsibility, so we should be able to come up with a solution to improve the drainage," Mr Oswald

"There's a possibility we could do something with the gutter such as a potential V-drain, but that will be up to council staff.

"The state government has said it (the road) is not a priority at all, which is disappointing from council's point of view.

"It's ridiculous how much water can pool on any road in the area, let alone the main entrance road to the Copper Coast."

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said he requested Mr Brock consider investment in an upgrade in May but was advised the road was a low priority based on relatively low daily traffic count and the flooding being infre-

"This is not acceptable and I will continue to advocate (for an upgrade)," Mr Ellis said.

Traffic numbers should not be used as an argument against allocating funding to fix roads deemed unsafe due to lack of maintenance."







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

Ceremony marks centenary of mine closure

LOCAL history has been preserved after the replacement of a historical plaque, which was stolen from its cairn last year.

The replica plaque was unveiled at a ceremony held on the spot shepherd James Boor discovered copper on Monday, October 23, exactly 100 years since the closure of Wallaroo

The plaque was unveiled by Copper Coast Council mayor Roslyn Talbot and local history volunteer Ken Rudd following a donation from the Apex Club of Kadina to fund its replacement.

The original cairn was unveiled by Sir Walter Duncan MLC on October 8, 1960 to celebrate the centenary of copper discovery in the region.

Mrs Talbot said the discovery was incredibly significant to the establishment of the surrounding area and congratulated Mr Rudd on his dedication to ensuring local history was maintained.

"The discovery of copper led to lots of developments here on the Wallaroo Mines and I've been

fortunate enough to read Keith Bailey's book titled James Boor's Bonanza," Mrs Talbot said.

'There were lots of stories out here but I think what was brought home for me was the community and the communities which were established everyone helped each other and worked together.

Wallaroo Mines alive."

Mr Rudd, a former Department of Environment and Water employee, thanked supporters of the project for their assistance in restoring the plaque in time for the centenary of the mine's closure.

Moonta Mines which got me out here and is how I originally noticed the plaque had gone missing," Mr Rudd said.

"I came to check on a few biological control sites of pest plants out here (at the mine site) before I went along to a meeting at Moonta.

"I thought I better make sure I had stocks so I came out only to see the area was all overgrown by bushes and, lo and behold, the plaque was missing."

Grayson's guardian "app" angel

GRAYSON Patterson, Wallaroo, is lucky to be alive.

The 2-year-old went into cardiac arrest in June, after a barbecue smoker fell on him.

If it wasn't for the GoodSAM app, and the quick response from an off-duty ambulance officer to deliver life-saving compressions and care, the outcome could have been a lot different.

Within seconds of a Triple Zero (000) call, the GoodSAM app notifies registered responders of a person in cardiac arrest.

The responder can accept the call for help and head to the scene to provide emergency care while an ambulance is on the way.

Mum Ashleigh Garrad said Grayson was playing outside and because she hadn't seen him for a couple of minutes, her sister went looking for him.

She found him unconscious and turning blue as he was trapped under a barbecue smoker.

"I stayed with Grayson while my sister called Triple Zero we took it in turns attempting what little we knew about CPR," Ms Garrad said.

"I honestly thought he was dead at this point and I had lost my little boy.

"I didn't think the ambulance would make it in time and my sister ran next door to get a neighbour to help but we were still unsuccessful."

Off-duty paramedic Robert Davis then arrived, to Ms Garrad's surprise.

"I thought maybe they were just driving by and heard the commotion, and I was quite distraught and screaming at this point," she said.

"Off-duty ambulance officer, Rob, came in and just took over the situation — he moved Grayson to a better position and took over doing CPR."

At the time, Ms Garrard had no idea what the app was but said she was grateful now for the initiative.

"I 100 per cent think the outcome would have been different if it weren't for the app — it is part of why my son is here today," she said.

"I will forever be grateful for the app and Rob who came to our aid that day.

"I would encourage anyone with the capability and knowledge to sign up to this app because you never know what may happen around the corner.

"Grayson is back to himself, you would never know we nearly lost him a few months ago — he is definitely our little miracle boy."

South Australians with first aid training can now sign up to receive smartphone notifications about cardiac emergencies near them, with the state's ambulance service expanding the GoodSAM system to help save even more



Expanding the service to boost responder numbers

THE expansion of GoodSAM to allow members of the public with first-aid training to sign up will further boost responder numbers and the chances of survival when cardiac arrests occur in the community.

The app doesn't alter SA Ambulance Service response times, as cardiac events are the highest priority, SAAS executive director

Ms Clarke said GoodSAM was improving

the chances of early intervention when cardiac arrests occurred in the community and was helping save lives in the vital minutes before an ambulance arrived.

"We are now accepting registrations from the public with first aid training," she said.

"After they register, their details will be subject to verification before they are approved as GoodSAM responders."

"GoodSAM responders will only be alerted to suspected cardiac arrest cases and their role is to provide CPR while ambulances are on the way, along with defibrillation if an automated external defibrillator is available."

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Races halted by great wall of Fisherman Bay

A TREASURED tradition has been stymied and a precious beach dep-leted, by a large rock wall in front of Whiting Road, according to Fisherman Bay resi-

The wall was built in February to protect two homes as part of a coastal protection strategy by Fisherman Bay Management, which was approved by the former Development Assessment Commission in 2014.

Fisherman Bay Progress Association chairperson George Blair-Nicholas said the wall extends 14 metres onto the beach and is 35 metres long.

"Prior to this wall being erected, we had a wide, sandy beach," he said.

"This has now been filled with dirt and rock, which has severely depleted the area."

Mr Blair-Nicholas said the rock wall has reduced the beach to the extent there is no space to hold Fisherman Bay's annual Easter foot races, which attract up to 200 people a year.

"We have been having those races for 56 years," he said.

There were only two years when we didn't have it because of Covid.

"The new rock wall has taken away 14 metres of soft sand which was part of the race area."

Resident John Jones said the precast concrete panel seawall on the shore should have been extended westwards in front of the two houses instead.

'The rock wall takes up two thirds of the beach," he said.

"At high tide, you can't get past it."

FBPA committee member Jan Blair-Nicholas said she was also concerned the loose rocks in the wall were a safety risk.

'We told council about it and they put signs up — children don't read signs," she said.

Mr and Mrs Blair-Nicholas said there was no consultation by Fisherman Bay Management, Barunga West Council or the Coast Protection Board about the rock wall.

"One day, it wasn't there and the next day we went down there and what the hell — there is no beach left," Mrs Blair-Nicholas said.

In response to a letter from Mr Blair-Nicholas, CPB chairperson Jeff Tate said the board had approved different design measures to protect property whilst minimising impacts.

But he said he understood some design amendments were made by the contractor prior to construction, including to the wall in question.

"I am advised these amendments were made in consultation with Barunga West Council, and the works will ultimately be transferred into council's care and control," Mr Tate said.

BWC chief executive Maree Wauchope said the rock wall was shown on plans as far back as 2014 and its location was consistent with State Commission Assessment Panel approval which was the subject of community consultation.

She said the measures to protect the two properties on Whiting Road against a 100-year storm tide were a requirement of the state government.

Ms Wauchope said council staff had been advised by engineers, reducing the wall's footprint would involve replacing it with a precast wall at a cost of up to \$300,000, and there was no budget for this work.

Residents have also called for better access to the beach and Ms Wauchope said council intended to install two sets of steps near the toilets once Fisherman Bay Management had handed over the town-

These would provide better access to the beach and the toilets and discourage people from climbing on the rocks.

"I went to Cornwall in July and I honestly think the assets we have here (at Moonta Mines) are just as impressive as Cornwall's," he said.

"The connection is pretty amazing... the enginehouses in Moonta Mines have the same names as what they have over there, so they literally brought a piece of Cornwall to Australia.

"I'm hopeful my skills in project management will help to complement the Moonta Mines bid for World Heritage Listing."



A new approach for **Barunga West leases**

COMMUNITY groups and organisations which lease buildings from Barunga West Council, or own buildings on council land, will be asked to arrange and pay for insurance and all other running costs.

The groups may then be eligible to apply for financial support through community grants to cover the costs.

Elected members voted for this initiative at council's meeting on Tuesday, October 10.

This follows an extensive audit of council's financial and non-financial contributions through the use of council owned or controlled land and council buildings as well as council's payment of insurance policies and utility bills, and community grants.

These contributions, and the opportunity cost of council land and road reserves leased to community groups and farmers for cropping, were found to be the equivalent to \$360,405.29 per annum.

Elected members will discuss three other issues — the term of new lease agreements for council owned land and buildings, an audit of council owned land which is sublet to other parties and the negotiation of commercial lease agreements with landowners cropping unmade roads — at an upcoming workshop.

Chief executive Maree Wauchope said the tabled report of recommendations based on the initial audit was not about a grab for cash.

She said the aim was to inform elected members and the wider community of the financial and non-financial contributions made by council to sporting groups, progress associations and other organisations.

"This is about ensuring our lease agreements are accurate and to enable us to talk to sports groups and community groups to

make sure they are valid," Ms Wauchope said. "I am not talking about charging a sport-

ing organisation a lease rate per acre, I am talking about valuing the land.

"We are just asking for your support to negotiate new lease agreements."

Ms Wauchope said council insured buildings which were owned by community groups and built on council land on ground leases, meant council had no responsibility for their operation and security.

"We are the only council in this region which is insuring buildings that we don't own," she said.

Ms Wauchope said the Local Government Risk Service strongly recommended groups be made responsible for insuring their buildings.

"The current insurance costs total \$44,081.17 and council can decide whether to continue providing support to these community groups and sporting associations by covering the costs of this insurance," she said.

"Under this arrangement, council could require groups to provide evidence they are providing a community service to the Barunga West community, and demonstrate to ratepayers these funds are being appropriated properly."

Elected members expressed their concern about the complexity of the tabled report and asked for more time to consider it.

"This is the most difficult agenda we have had in my 23 years on council," Mayor Leonie Kerley said.

Councillors Margaret McDonald and Cynthia Axford both expressed concern some community groups could struggle to pay costs currently being met by council.

This could have very strong ramification for community buildings all around our area," Cr Axford said.

"We don't want to rush this."

Boxthorn blitz at Tickera

NORTHERN and Yorke Landscape Board is funding a targeted African boxthorn blitz north of Tickera.

African boxthorn is one of Australia's most widespread weeds and an aggressive invader of the coast, where it outcompetes native vegetation, forms dense, spiny thickets and harbours foxes and rabbits.

The work is funded by the board's coastal resilience project, Djulda-wawa Badja.

"Tickera's coastline is fragile and unique, but it faces significant pressures," Djulda-wawa Badja project manager Janet Moore said.

"The area provides habitat for shorebirds and coastal wader birds, and a refuge for woodland birds, reptiles and insect species.

'The cliffs and low dunes are quite susceptible to erosion and damage from off-road vehicles and

"With the added pressures of climate change, it's important we make the coast as resilient and healthy as it can be to withstand these pressures into the future.

"Removing the boxthorn will give native plant species like the black oak tree, pearl bluebush, umbrella bush and coast daisy bush space to breathe.

"These plants which grow naturally along Tickera's coast provide an important home and food source for the birds, lizards and insects that live there."

The Tickera community has been fighting African boxthorn since 2020, through its Bash-a-Boxthorn initiative which has raised awareness about the destructive pest.

The idea was the brainchild of local Mick Spencer who is passionate about controlling pest species.

"I've always had a dislike of feral

plants and if caught early, the removal job can be done in seconds," Mr Spencer said.

"Most of us have heard Mum or Dad say, 'a stitch in time saves nine' and this applies very well to this

"If we sit back and let them grow to metres tall and reproduce for years, the job can be tens of thousands of dollars to fix, plus the loss of our native plants which should be growing in that area."

Mick and wife Kath have invested many days controlling pest plants around Tickera and have appreciated the support of Barunga West Council, which has supplied chemicals and also contracted the removal of other invasive species in the area including bamboo, Aleppo pines and peppercorn trees.

A NYLB woody weed control workshop in 2020 equipped residents with safe pest plant control skills and a \$5000 Grassroots Grant two years later helped them clean up boxthorns, succulents and other woody weeds in the town and replace them with species native to

The board's roadside weed control program has also reinforced the community's effort by treating roadside boxthorn surrounding the township to help prevent the plant from quickly re-entering the

Ardrossan Museum celebrates 50 years

brated the 50th anniversary of its opening on Friday, October 6.

National Trust of SA president Warren Bonython officially opened the museum during the town's centenary on October 6, 1973.

Rod Dutschke is a member of the original committee and he continues his commitment as the current curator.

His son Bruce spoke about the early days of the museum, following donation of the former C. H. Smith agricultural machinery factory's powerhouse building to the National Trust in 1972 by M. L. "Bob" Sanders and family for the purpose of establishing a museum for Ardrossan and district.

The building was built in 1907 and supplied electricity for the factory across the road while also being used for pattern-making.

Mr A. L. Sanders purchased the building in 1935 for use as a depot and later it became the home base for a freight business.

Bruce described the work required to make the building suitable for a museum including re-roofing, cementing the floors and an extension, all assisted by a grant from the National Trust of SA and assistance from the local council and Apex Club.

Maitland historian Beryl

THE Ardrossan Museum cele- Neumann told of her involvement with the Ardrossan museum when there was one CYP branch of the National Trust representing Ardrossan, Maitland and Port Victoria.

> The establishment of the museum was greatly helped by members of the Maitland committee, in particular Mrs Sid Wundersitz (granddaughter of C. H. Smith) and Miss Neumann who wrote a booklet titled The Smith Brothers and the Stump Jump Plough, which is still in print today.

> Avian Pink then described some of the major events during his 20-year association with museum including the relocation of the agricultural machinery display to the Gundersen Reserve and the commissioning of Neddy, the Clydesdale made by Ty Manning.

> SBS also made a short documentary about the stump jump plough for the Great Aussie Inventions series during this

> Current committee chairperson Brenda Bowman spoke about present times including the beneficial relationship with Ardrossan and District Progress Association, who own the building.

> This relationship enables the museum to be open every day, resulting in more than 2000 visitors during the past year.

Understanding risk factors key to healthy bones

A NEW report by Healthy Bones Australia is calling for earlier investigation of bone health through bone mineral density testing and a greater emphasis on medical intervention.

The Know Your Bones Community Risk Report third edition 2023 was released at a Parliamentary Friends of Aged Care event in Canberra last week.

It summarises data from more than 104,000 Australians who completed the Know Your Bones online self-assessment.

Healthy Bones Australia CEO Greg Lyubomirsky said the goal was to improve the diagnosis and treatment of osteoporosis, to reduce the impact of preventable fractures.

'We are pleased so many Australians are using this selfassessment, which represents a simple first step to checking bone health," he said.

"However, we need to close this gap between identifying risk factors, and taking action.

"Our goal is to improve the diagnosis of osteoporosis, and advocate for early intervention to reduce the impact of preventable fractures.

*Concerningly, our 2023 report reveals half of all fractures are occurring in adults aged 50 to 69 years, and nearly a quarter of respondents over 70 years (24 per cent) with clinical risk factors for osteoporosis, have not undergone a BMD test.

"More than one-third of respondents reported a clinical risk factor (36 per cent), yet only half (52 per cent) reported having a BMD test.

"The report also confirms lifestyle risk factors are common, and addressing inadequate calcium and vitamin D levels, lack of exercise, smoking and excessive alcohol intake, are important for supporting bone health."



"When you constantly strain to hear and understand, the brain literally becomes stressed," Chris Laird's YP Audiology's owner Chris Laird said.

"Instead of committing what is being said to memory, all of the brain's effort is spent on trying to understand what is being said which reduces the likelihood of the information being committed to memory.

"Through brain imaging, it

has become evident older adults with hearing loss have less grey matter in the part of the brain responsible for hearing.

"This is because certain structures of brain cells shrink when they do not get enough stimulation."

Chris said social isolation is a common occurrence in people with a hearing loss, but the avoidance of going out can also make the situation worse.

"When you have a hearing loss, it is quite challenging to hear what people say and to follow conversations," she said.

"For some people they then prefer to just stay at home instead of going out.

"However, if we stop seeing our friends and family and we stop engaging in our normal social activities, the brain does not receive enough stimuli through the day which can increase the risk for dementia.

"Hearing loss is one of the

most common conditions affecting older adults, with more than half of Australians aged between 60 to 70 years having some degree of hearing loss."


Of those needing help, only 25 per cent access hearing services and the average time taken to do so is seven years.

"Don't wait seven years to get your hearing assessed as the risks of doing so can be serious," Chris said.













Family marks farming centenary

ONE hundred years ago, Friend Storer Dayman and his wife Ettie took up land on Warburto Road, Kadina.

The milestone was celebrated by about 100 members of their extended clan in early September.

FS Dayman Farming has expanded significantly since the original 817 acres (330.6 hectares), and is now led by Paul "Wick" Dayman, the thirdgeneration to work the land.

In the 1920s, the farm was a mixed enterprise, with the Daymans running sheep, pigs, poultry, dairy and beef cattle and growing fruit and vegetables for their kitchen, as well as cereal crops

In common with other Australian farms of the 1920s, the property was almost self-sustaining for Friend, Ettie and their five children - Doreen, Angus, Douglas, Wick's father Garth, and Mavis.

Friend was a staunch Methodist and lay preacher in Kadina; he and Ettie needed all their faith to keep their farm going during the Great Depression, which followed a run of dry years from 1926.

"My grandmother supported the family by selling cream, butter, eggs and poultry in Wallaroo," Wick said.

"In about 1932, my grandfather had had enough.

"He was ready to go, he was going to walk off and my grandmother said 'no, we're staying' and I'm glad she did."

Wick farms the original property and other nearby holdings with his wife, Charmaine, and daughter and son-in-law, Sarah and Nathan Clifford. Their children Zara, Nate and Travis are the fifth generation on the farm.

"To me it (the centenary) was a very emotional day and for the other family

members too," Wick said.

"Out of the original family, it's only Auntie May (Mavis), Dad's youngest sister who is left."

Mavis Frost, nee Dayman, is 91 and lives in Kadina; she and late husband Des worked on the farm.

Des was the brother of Wick's mother. Joan Dayman (nee Frost), 89, who still lives on the farm.

FS Dayman Farming is now focused on broadacre crops, growing wheat, barley, lentils, field peas, canola, and some hay for cattle and ration sheep.

"That's probably something which hasn't really changed in the 100 years," Wick said.

"My grandfather slaughtered his own stock to feed the family and nothing has really changed in that respect."

But farming has changed in almost every other way since Friend and Ettie travelled from Bute to take up the land.

"We have gone from horse-drawn equipment to small tractors and headers, now machinery is huge and we are not far from having autonomous machinery," Wick said.

"The varieties of wheat and barley are generally a lot shorter in stature, they're bred to put their energy into growing grain rather than straw.

"We have gone from a rotation of half pasture, half crop and burning the stubbles. We haven't really burnt very much for more than 30 years now.

"We've gone from cultivation to minimum till and now, virtually zero

"We continuously crop, but we

rotate between legumes and cereals, with a little bit of canola thrown in."

Wick said Garth was a great innovator of farming techniques and inven-

"If someone told him he couldn't, do it, he did it," Wick said.

"He loved to make something work out of nothing, such as the scrap he found in the back of the shed."

In the early 1950s, Garth developed a rotary drum mower for cutting hay based on the principle of a garden lawn mower.

When Garth became an early adopter of direct drilling in the early 1980s, suitable machinery was hard to

He needed a rotary slasher to cut down stubble before direct drilling but the widest slashers available were only 6.5 metres wide.

So, Garth and Wick set about designing and fabricating a slasher which folded out to 18 metres.

"The most impressive thing Dad built was automated feeders in the pig sheds," Wick said.

"The conveyor belt went down the length of the sheds, with a metering system which put out the correct amount of feed for each pen and ran on a cable and cog system with an electrical motor."

Wick said the 40 years he spent farming with his father were the best years of his life.

"I have been really privileged to be born where I was and very privileged to have the parents that I have had," Wick

Curramulka land sells for second-highest YP price

THE second highest price per acre for rural land on Yorke Peninsula was paid when three lots south of Curramulka went under the hammer on Friday,

Lot two, comprising139.86 arable acres (56.63 hectares) sold for \$2.82 million or \$16,402 per acre.

Nutrien Harcourts Minlaton

agent Troy Goldsworthy said the price was slightly less than the previous highest price in the region of \$16,785/ac near Arthurton earlier this year.

Two other lots were sold in the Arthurton sale, attracting \$16,250/ac and \$15,244/ac.

Lot one in Friday's sale sold for \$7.91m or \$14,981/ac.

Lot one adjoins lot two and comprises a home, sheds and 528.06 arable acres. Lots one and two are 4.5 kilometres south of Curramulka on Quarry Road.

Lot three, which is 8.5km south of Curramulka on Port Vincent Road, comprises 196.77 arable acres and sold for \$2.95 million or \$14,898/ac.

Mr Goldsworthy said the prices paid for all three lots on Friday were considerably above the previous highest price paid in the Curramulka district, which was recorded 18 months ago when a 331-acre parcel sold for \$12,200/ac.

He said a sale of land which was located close to lot three had netted \$9500/ac for 631 acres two years ago.

Lots one and two were bought by a neighbouring farm business, while lot three was bought by another neighbour.

All three parcels at Curramulka were offered for sale by the Longbottom family as the holding known as Pineview.

"Lots one and two had been held in the family for around 130 years so it certainly shows just how infrequent opportunities in the area can be and just why strong competition can drive prices up," Mr Goldsworthy said.

He said the high prices reflected ongoing strong demand for rural land on Yorke Peninsula and the lack of properties for sale.

"There are not too many



"It's important to plan your trips ahead, drive to the conditions and ensure it is completely safe before overtaking trucks and large agricultural vehicles."


Mr Perry also urged heavy vehicle operators to check registrations and permits before use.



HOT FISHING TIPS

Recipe: Curried fish. Ingredients: four fish fillets (cubed), one chopped capsicum, two chopped onions, curry powder, one red Preparation: Cook the fish pieces in hot water for two to three minutes and set aside. Saute the onions, capsicum and chilli in oil until soft, adding curry powder, water and lemon juice for a delish sauce. Add fish pieces and cook on medium for five minutes. Serve with a bowl of hot, sticky white rice.

Wallaroo: The spring weather has turned from brilliant one day to horrible the next as warm sun midweek gave way to strong/gale force south westerlies. Chows, squid and a few tommy ruffs (Australian herring) are at the jetty while garfish, squid and snook are just north of Point Riley.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Try the jetties in the late afternoons for (small) gar and squid. Boat crews are fishing off the back of Tipara reef for King George whiting, squid,

flathead and snook.

Point Turton: The Banks has KG whiting to 34cm in the early mornings at dawn. Gar and small squid are at Point Rickaby and Minlacowie, while the jetty has tommies and small squid and the shore-line holds mullet at times on the high tides.

Marion/Stenhouse Bay: Boat crews are reporting snook, flathead, squid and the odd whiting from local inshore grounds. The two jetties have squid and tommies at night. Local shore-based results have been quiet but Richards and Brown's Beaches have a few salmon trout.

Edithburgh: Blue morwong, snook and whiting were caught from the Troubridge Lighthouse grounds midweek and a few whiting came in from Rocky Gully. The jetty has squid and tommy ruffs and Port Giles has large squid and snook.

Ardrossan: Long Spit fished well during the week for KG whiting, garfish (in the shallows) and even a couple of blue swimmer crabs. The jetty again is worth a try for overnight mulloway and a bluey during daylight hours.

Constellation **Cup retained**

The Australian Diamonds have retained the Constellation Cup despite losing the last two games of the four match series to New Zealand.

Australia won the first two matches on home soil, which all but guaranteed they would retain the cup.

The sides played their first game in New Zealand last Thursday, going
